

Spring maintenance checklist for homeowners

(StatePoint) As the weather warms, there are a few maintenance tasks every homeowner should consider completing. Use this checklist as your guide:

Outdoor Upkeep

• Wash window exteriors for a better view.

• Clean gutters and downspouts to ensure proper water flow. Neglecting this task for too long can cause rot, mold and damage to your foundation.

• Get your patio or deck in tip-top shape for outdoor living. Sweep and hose it down. Remove patio furnishings from storage. Wipe down surfaces and vacuum cushions (or launder them if they're machine washable).

• Inspect lawn equipment and tools for needed maintenance, repair and fuel refills.

• Mow the lawn. Trim the edges.

• After the next rainfall, inspect your yard for standing water, which can damage your home and invite mosquitoes. Consider hiring a landscaper to level out an uneven lawn.

HVAC Maintenance

• Change HVAC filters at least once each season (ideally monthly). Dirty filters make equipment work harder and cause more wear and tear on equipment. They also increase your energy bill and lessen indoor air qual-



ity.

• According to Energy Star, 20-30 percent of the air that moves through the duct system of a typical home is lost due to leaks, holes and poorly connected ducts. Consider professional duct sealing for improved energy efficiency and lower bills.

• Check to see whether your furnaces and air conditioners bear the ENERGY STAR logo. If not, consider a new unit. A properlysized and installed ENERGY STAR air conditioner uses up to 20 percent less electricity than older models, and doing so may make you eligible for a Federal Tax Credit.

• Have a technician give your home's cooling system a pre-season tune-up so that everything is running efficiently by the time warmer weather arrives. You know the "personality" of your heating or cooling unit best, so be prepared to provide the technician with important information. No fact is insignificant, as it may help them diagnose and fix a problem.

• Be sure that all HVACR installation and

maintenance is performed only by a qualified professional. Read company reviews and ask the contractor if they have technicians certified by North American Technician Excellence (NATE). NATE-certified technicians have demonstrated knowledge of today's increasingly sophisticated heating and cooling systems. • Carbon monoxide, often referred to as the "silent killer," is odorless, colorless and tasteless. When changing a furnace filter, make sure the new filter is correctly positioned and the access panel is securely fastened. Have your home's furnace inspected and serviced annually by a NATEcertified technician.

• Likewise, test all the smoke alarms in your home and replace batteries as needed. The National Fire Protection Association recommends smoke alarms on every level of the home, including every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area.



Should you buy or sell a home in 2021? Here's what to know

(StatePoint) While the roll-out of the COVID-19 vaccine has left a lot of question marks about the future of the U.S. economy at-large, analysts expect the housing market to remain strong and stable in the coming year.

"Despite the uncertainties of the pandemic, the housing market performed well in the second half of 2020," says Sam Khater, Freddie Mac's chief economist. "Low mortgage rates and the ability to work remotely continued to propel demand for housing, which is reflected in home sales reaching levels not seen in 15 years."

Whether you're a potential homebuyer, a current homeowner or considering selling, here are some of the biggest takeaways of Freddie Mac's Quarterly Forecast:

• Interest rates are likely to remain low. The average 30-year fixed-rate mortgage (FRM) hit a record low over a dozen times in 2020. The low interest rate environment is projected to continue through 2021, with the 30-year FRM expected to average below 3 percent. Low rates are good news for buyers looking to purchase a home, and homeowners looking to reduce their mortgage payment through refinancing.

• Home sales to remain high. The demand for housing is expected to remain strong in 2021, creating a favorable market for sellers. Last year, low mortgage rates and the ability to work remotely drove up home sales (the measure of the number of homes sold every month). This year, home sales are expected to ride that wave, averaging 6.5 million for the year.

• House prices to grow moderately. In the second half of 2020, the high volume of home sales and low supply of housing drove up house prices. In 2021, house price growth is expected to moderate for the full year.

• Refinances to start declining. Low mortgage rates spurred refinance activity in 2020, boosting mortgage originations (the process in which borrowers apply for a home loan) to historic highs. As mortgage rates rise modestly in 2021, refinance activity should start to slow. "While many homeowners took advantage of these low rates in last year, evidence suggests that many lower income homeowners still have the opportunity to strengthen their financial position by refinancing," says Khater.

How and why to build a raised garden bed this season

(StatePoint) Fairly easy to construct and even easier to maintain, raised garden beds are a great way to raise plants and vegetables in the comfort and convenience of your backyard.

In a recent episode of the Exmark Original Series, "Done-in-A-Weekend-Extreme," landscape designer and show host, Doug Scott, spoke to organic gardener Joe Lamp'l of "Growing a Greener World" about the ins and outs of raised garden beds.

Here are some of the top insights and tips Lamp'l shared.

• Why use raised garden beds? A raised garden bed can help facilitate the ideal growing environment, as most people don't have that perfect soil naturally in their yard. Their accessibility makes them easier to work in and maintain. Plus, they're a nice architectural design element in any landscape.

• What's the ideal size? The main rule of the thumb applies to width. The bed should be no wider than 4 feet, as you never want to compact the soil when working. Length however, is based on personal preference and needs. As far as height is concerned, you want the roots to be able to grow out and down as much as possible -- 6-inches at minimum. While 12-inches is common, anything higher is a bonus.

• What materials work best? Treated lumber is the most readily available and economical material and will likely last the longest, however, being an organic gardener Lamp'l prefers untreated hardwood, as it lasts almost as long and doesn't contain chemicals. Other materials you have around the home and yard, such as rocks, old tubs, etc., can work too.

• Where's the best location? Build your raised garden bed on level ground, in full sun exposure near a water supply.

DIY Instructions:

To build a 10-foot x 4-foot x 18-inch raised bed, you'll need:

• Nine 6-inch x 6-inch x 12-foot cedar timbers

• Tape measure, t-square and marking pencil

• A saw and extension cord

• One box of 10-inch heavy-duty exterior wood screws

- Ten 24-inch x 1/2-inch rebar stakes
- Twenty 10-inch galvanized timber spikes
- Sledgehammer
- Impact drill and long drill bitLevel
- Level
- HammerShovels

• Hardware cloth, wire cutters and fence staples

• Work gloves, safety glasses and ear plugs • Wheelbarrow (to transport soil)

1. Begin by cutting six, 6 x 6 timbers, each

measuring 10-feet 6-inches in length. And six, 6 x 6 timbers, each measuring 4-feet 6-inches in length. Drill rebar holes in each timber.

2. Once the first layer of bed has been placed, leveled and squared in your desired location, fasten the corners using 10-inch wood screws. Secure the entire layer to the ground with 10 pieces of rebar.

3. Place the second layer of timbers, staggering the corners and fastening them with wood screws. Secure this layer to the first with ten 10-inch galvanized spikes.

4. Install galvanized cloth to prevent burrowing pests from eating earthworms and destroying plants.

5. Place the third layer of timbers (following above directions.)

6. Fill with soil and plants.

Birds attacking your windows? Here's how you can stop it

(StatePoint) If you've ever noticed a bird attack your windows, you may wonder why this strange behavior is occurring. Beyond the potential disruption it might cause your family, repeated attacks can be harmful to birds. Understanding the problem however, can help you put a stop to it, and better protect the birds nesting on your property.

The Problem

Many birds will stake out a territory, perhaps by your home, and vigorously defend it. If a territorial bird discovers its reflection in your window, it may perceive this reflection to be another bird competing for its territory and mate, compelling the bird to attack. This attack of its own reflection can take the form of pecking or scratching at your window, as well as flying up and banging into your window. When repeated, these actions deplete a bird's energy and put its health and the health of its nesting young at risk. Though this can occur at any time of year, it happens most often in spring, with males.

A Solution

You can help stop this problem from occurring. One good solution designed to do so is Stop Bird Attack, a removable, white coating that may be sprayed on any window. It eliminates the bird's window reflection, calms the bird and stops the attack. Effective for Northern Cardinals, American Robins, California Towhees and other territorial birds, Stop Bird Attack is made by WindowAlert, a brand that also makes bird window decals and UV Liquid products that help prevent bird strikes (another common hazard to birds). Take it a Step Further

While you are at it, consider other dangers to birds that you can eliminate on your property. For example, by swapping out conventional pesticides with essential oils, you can ward off pests in your garden without putting birds at risk. You might also try keeping pet cats indoors or in an enclosure to prevent them from attacking birds.

Own a home in SC? Here are tax tips for SC homeowners

If you're a South Carolina homeowner and want to save money on your tax bill, the South Carolina Department of Revenue (SCDOR) wants you to know about tax credits that may be available.

All South Carolina tax credits related to home ownership are nonrefundable, meaning they cannot reduce your tax liability below zero. Each of the credits applies to specific circumstances. Review the facts in your situation to see if any of the credits detailed below apply.

Certified Historic Residential Structure Credit: Taxpayers who rehabilitate a certified historic residential structure in SC are eligible for the credit, which is limited to 25% of restoration expenses, which must exceed \$15,000 within 36 months. The credit must be taken over a three-year period and has a fiveyear carryforward. Use form TC-22 to claim the credit.

Residential Retrofit Credit: This credit is for individuals who retrofit their legal residence to be more resistant to hurricanes, floods, or catastrophic wind damage. Taxpayers can claim the lesser of 25% of the costs or \$1,000. Also, taxpayers can claim up to \$1,500 in Sales and Use Tax paid on purchases of qualifying tangible personal property. Use form TC-43 to claim the credit.


Excess Insurance Premium Credit: Individ-

uals who pay residential property and casualty insurance premiums in excess of 5% of their adjusted gross income qualify for this credit. The credit is limited to \$1,250 and has a five-year carryforward. Use form TC-44 to claim the credit.

Energy Efficient Manufactured Home Credit: Taxpayers who buy a manufactured home that meets or exceeds the energy-saving efficiency requirements or Energy Star program requirements of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency or U.S. Department of Energy may claim this credit. The credit is limited to \$750 and requires a certification letter from the South Carolina Energy Office. Use form TC-53 to claim the credit.

Solar energy, small hydropower system, or geothermal machinery and equipment credit: This credit is for those who own and install a solar energy system, small hydropower system, or geothermal machinery and equipment. The system must be used for heating water, air cooling, energy generation, space heating, heat reclamation or energy demand response. The credit is limited to 25% of the cost of purchasing and installing the system. The credit can't exceed \$3,500 for each facility or 50% of tax liability. It has a carryforward of 10 years. Use form TC-38 to claim the credit.

Individual Income Tax returns are due April 15.

Celebrating 41 years, Wicker's Greenhouse & Nursery's roots are still strong in 2021

Judy and Larry Wicker started Wicker's Greenhouse and Nursery with a single greenhouse 41 years ago. Since starting in 1980, after gaining support from her father, Wicker and her husband embarked on the journey of being one of the go-to spots for all things gardening in the Clinton, Laurens and Newberry counties.

"We started with one little greenhouse and we both worked full time. We did that for six or seven years. Then I came home – Larry's mama and daddy were still working. We had a small child so I had come home. Larry worked in Joanna/Greenwood mills and when the mills shut down he went to Greenwood. It just got really, really aggravating so he quit and came home in 1991. We kept adding a greenhouse here, a greenhouse there as our business expanded. At first we did all of our planting at night and we just opened late at night when we got off work. It's just kind of grown from there," Wicker said.

Over the years, according to Wicker, she and her husband continue to refine how they grow their products.

"We grow ginormous ferns. We've always been known for them and our geranium baskets. Now I do a lot of mixed baskets and I plant 90 percent of these mixed baskets myself. It's very, very time consuming. You don't have a life, but you love what you do. This is our heart and soul," she said. "We try different plants and items (2-3 new things a year). We don't do landscaping anymore – used to do a lot of landscaping, but health just want let me do that. I still do design. I work really well from cell phone photos and photos folks bring."


Wicker's Greenhouse and Nursery has also expanded in the last couple of years, offering fish, Koi and Goldfish, to their customers along with the necessary supplies to care for them.

"I can order the liners to make ponds. We don't make the ponds ourselves anymore. We have potting soil and all of your soil amendments – what we sale is what we use in the greenhouses," Wicker said.

And while Wicker said there will no more expansions in the future, customers are more than welcome to come out and browse through the assortment of azaleas, evergreen shrubs, ornamentals, vegetable plants and more.

"We consider the customers our friends. We love the folks and love the plants. I hope to give this business another 10 years," she said.
