Elevating timeless style with Talbots personalized shopping service

Fashion, ahoy! Talbots will be hosting the afternoon fashion show at What Women Want, bringing their elegant and enticing style to the runway. Talbots has been dressing ladies at its current Dover location since 1999.

It's a national brand with a boutique feel at the local level. "Classic with a modern twist," they promise, with an emphasis on "fit, fabric, print, pattern and irresistible color ... We're here to wow our customers with great style and exceptional service every time."

The Dover team offers personalized attention, too. A shopper can ask for advice—or schedule an entire personal styling session (at no cost).

"Turn it over to us. Honestly, that's what we do every day," said Store Manager Vickie McGown at the Route 8 location. Anyone who feels hesitant to shop can just ask for advice from the staff. "We're comfortable styling people, getting them out of their box."

The team can also share the best ways to wear an item, from tying a pretty scarf to zhuzhing up an outfit with the perfect piece of jewelry or jacket.

Designs are fashioned to appeal to a range of ages, from young college-aged people or first jobs to older women. "Talbots stays trendy, but keeps the classics. As long as you take care of them,



they're going to last for years," McGown emphasized.

Talbots often releases complimentary colors and designs, so a person could mix and match a few nice pieces to create a week's worth of outfits. A wide range of accessories is also icing on the cake for shoppers, great for gifts or a personal treat.

Talbots also hosts shopping parties and workshops.

"It can be 2 to 20 people ... and we have extra staff to help you, and it's a lot of fun," McGown said. For example, the store might open an hour earlier

than usual for a teachers' back-to-school shopping experience, "so they have run of the store, and we can focus more on what you want."

"We've done different workshops here, like a scarf-tying workshop or pants fitting workshop— which is the hardest thing to fit because each one fits so differently," she recalled. "Once you find a pant that works for you, that's your go-to."

Of course, the Route 8 shop is part of the company's national system, so the local staff can help customers select even more inventory options. "So, for the customer, you don't have to worry about your size selling out right away, and more styles that are in the catalog are available," said McGown.

"Anything you see in the catalog, we can order, free shipping, to your door," McGown emphasized. "And if we do the order for the customer, the store gets credit for the sale ... We have people calling every day, they want to help us out. If you allow us to do it, we can get free shipping to your door, and it helps us stick around."

Woman-centric charitable organizations also benefit from the Talbots company. March 2025 marks the 11th anniversary of the company's partnership with Dress for Success, which was originally founded to help provide women with professional attire to help improve their lives, such as for a job interview. Today it "empowers women to achieve economic independence by providing a network of support, professional attire and the development tools to help women thrive in work and in life." In 2024, Talbots also lent fundraising efforts to the Breast Cancer Research Foundation.

Easterseals leader shares her life in advocacy, advice for the public

Verna Hensley has been a longtime advocate: in government, in her career and for her children. Today, much of her energy goes toward the organization that supports her own daughter: Easterseals Delaware & Maryland's Eastern Shore.

"I was drawn to get involved in this community because I had a personal connection to it. And I've been here 20 years!" said the Easterseals VP of Public Affairs & Communications.

For the past 75-plus years, Easterseals Delaware and Maryland's Eastern Shore has provided direct services for families living with disabilities and seniors. Services are incredibly broad: occupational therapy, supported employment, day services, personal attendants, memory care—plus and assistive technology and caregiver support programs.

"Last year, we served people from 4 weeks to 108 years old—from the littlest child maybe struggling with their developmental milestones—literally to the end of life, when you have an older person maybe struggling with Alzheimer's or dementia," Hensley said. "It's the intersection of my previous career in government—I worked for the late Sen. Bill Roth for about 20 years—and the birth of my daughter, who has a disability, and the marketing and communications side from the first part of my career," said Hensley.

Answers have been edited for clarity and length.

Q: It sounds like this is more than a career—it's a personal mission. Is that correct?

V.H.: "Absolutely. When you have

a personal connection to a disability, it makes it more real, you have an understanding of what that disability is, and I think it fuels that passion I have.

"Easterseals was just a natural home for me because I so respect the organization that has a long history here. It's not hard to advocate because of the quality of services and difference it makes in the community every single day. I benefit from that personally because my daughter benefits from Easterseals. She's part of a prevocational work training program, and she loves what she does. She's quite a social butterfly, and she loves being out in the community, being with her peers and feeling like she has purpose—and that's really possible because she's supported by Easterseals staff at those jobs.

"And that feeds into my advocacy because, as an example: The staff works for Easterseals, but we're contracted by the State to provide services to people like my daughter in the community. But the contracts don't pay the full cost of these services, which is why we have to fundraise.

"We went to the [Delaware] Joint Finance Committee last month, and my daughter testified about why her direct support staff was so important to her. It's all about putting a face to the need—I don't care what you're advocating for, the most important thing you can do when advocating is put a face with the issue—help them understand why what they're discussing impacts people in the community every day."

Q: How did you share that passion of advocacy with your daughter, Julia?

V.H.: "When you have a child with a disability, teaching them to be an advocate for themselves is one of the

most important things you can do as a parent—I think that's true whether they have a disability or not. You do that by instilling confidence in who they are as an individual and having open communication with them, starting when they're very young. It's helping them be self-empowered. Also teaching them to listen—because I think the other important part of advocacy is to also listen to make sure you're as informed as you need to be, because that's how you learn and how you grow."

Q: Easterseals services are so wideranging. What else do you want people to know about the services, or the staff?

V.H. "We have this wide range of services, literally from birth literally to end of life, and I don't know that people realize that. We really can help at just about any stage of life and any age. And the staff is amazing. They care so much about what they do and the people they're working to serve. It is so clear how vital they are to the community and the state."

Q: What is your advice for people who have opinions on the government,

but don't know how to speak up?

V.H.: "I think it comes back to
sharing your story and putting a human
face on the issues—what is it that
fuels your passion as an advocate?
And of course, legislators are more
interested in hearing from people who
are in their district ... a potential voter!
In Delaware, especially, our elected
officials are so accessible. Showing
up at a town hall meeting, calling an
office, asking 'hey, can I meet you in the

"Also, listening: that's how you get a productive conversation going. Maybe it's an issue they don't agree with you on—why is that? Having curiosity is such an important part of advocacy because as people seek information, it helps people to be more empathetic. You may not agree with them in the end, but it helps to see what's behind that position."

district?' I think they're very responsive.

Q: This event is called What Women Want. So, what do you want, or what do you hope for yourself, or the community, or the world?

V.H.: "I think it gets back to less scrolling and more conversations. If the natural inclination could be to seek out information, then that leads to more understanding. If you don't agree, at least you become more informed, and I think ultimately that can lead to more kindness. And hopefully that makes a difference! My daughter's first inclination is to be kind and engage and learn about the person. I think that's a wonderful model for just about everyone else too."



Energy efficiency tips by DEMEC

People can save money by using electricity a bit more responsibly or replacing appliances that don't.

Delaware Municipal Electric Corporation (DEMEC) is a not-for-profit utility partnership of eight municipalities. Each of these towns (Milford, Middletown, Smyrna and more) provides power to local homes and businesses, but they partner through DEMEC to increase their purchasing power and services to each community.

"Many of our member communities have been serving power for over 100 years," said Heather Contant, Director of Government & Community Relations. "It's a unique business model because we're constantly looking for ways to ... save them money and energy.

"Prices everywhere have gone up, so we're trying to reduce the impact on that energy bill that they get monthly. We want to help customers find simple little things that they can lower their energy bill and take control of their usage."

So DEMEC offers these tips to improve your energy efficiency:

Close window blinds and curtains

during hot days, so extra heat and sunlight don't seep inside. This will keep things cooler and reduce air conditioner use.

- Use a room fan instead of the AC. In summer, switch ceiling fans to turn counterclockwise, pulling the heat away and keeping cool air down.
- Use a drying rack or clothesline instead of the clothes dryer. Large appliances like washers or dryers can use up a lot of energy, so air dry to save energy. (Similarly, let dishes air dry instead of using the heat setting on your dishwasher.)
- Clear air vents inside and outside the home. Inside, check your air filters and replace them every 3 months. Reducing that dust and blockage from the system helps your HVAC move air more effectively. Outside, keep your AC unit clear of debris, plants and lawn care equipment, so it gets good airflow.
- Ovens are toasty in winter—and in summer. Instead of using the stove (another major appliance), cook outdoors on the grill or eat something cool like a salad or sandwich. Or cook during cooler hours of the morning or night. This both saves energy and avoids putting extra heat into your

home when you're already trying to stay cool.

- Meal prepping can save energy because when you cook all of your meals at once, you're only preheating your oven or stove once a week (then hopefully using less energy to quickly reheat the meal).
- Consider installing a programmable thermostat in order to control temperatures precisely.

Visit the website demecinc.net for even more suggestions. Even non-customers can get excellent insights to their energy usage with online tools. (Click "Development," click any community link, and then scroll to "Residential Customer Energy Savings Tools."

Numbers may be more accurate for residents of these member cities, but the online tools are insightful for anyone, regardless of their electric company.

The Residential Energy Advisor tool is especially fascinating. The online quiz considers the precise details of a person's house, like size, location and appliance age. "It will only take a couple minutes, and at the end, it will give them savings tips and ... link them to local, state and federal

programs that can provide additional financial incentives [tax rebates, etc.]," Contant said.

"You can see the difference and start to understand the real impact that's having on your annual costs."

Playing with the various energy calculators, "I think the biggest surprise was the impact a space heater has on your electric costs. Just using two space heaters for a month was about \$40 per space heater, if you were using them to heat your bedroom every night ... You could be taking that money and investing in upgrades or making your home more energy efficiency," she said, especially when "HVAC is about 50 percent of a person's energy costs. It is the biggest user of energy by far in a person's home."

DEMEC customers can also benefit from equipment rebates at EfficiencySmart.org, from lightbulbs to bigger appliances.

People should call their local electric utility or provider to learn more about their energy efficiency programs and ways to save money and energy all year.
