Daphne puts off action on health insurance

DAPHNE — City Council members said they support a self-insured health insurance plan but stopped short of approving the change at their last meeting. A resolution to adopt a self-insurance plan was on the agenda for Tuesday, Sept. 7. When the issue came up, however, no council member moved to consider the proposal and the resolution died. Mayor Robin LeJeune said the city would save money by going to a self-insured plan. He said Blue Cross Blue Shield premiums increased 11 percent in the last year and are now more than \$4 million.

“So, we reached out to try to find some ways to save some money,” LeJeune said. “Looks like our biggest savings could come with a \$100,000 deductible, self-insured which in a worst-case scenario could save us about \$500,000 and then best-case scenario we would save about \$900,000.”

Councilwoman Tommie Conaway said the recommendation to the council included only one report from a consultant.

“I’m in favor of the self-insured health insurance plan,” Conaway said. “My only concern is maybe we need to hear from more consultants. We only heard from one and I’m concerned about maybe having a comparison chart so we can see actually what they are offering there.”

Councilman Steve Olen said the council should have more information before making a final decision.

“I am 100 percent in favor of the city moving to self-funded or self-insured health plan. However, that needs to come only after the city has sought and obtained multiple proposals for how to accomplish this and given itself sufficient time to make a number of important decisions to go along with that,” Olen said. “The city of Daphne and especially its 280-plus employees absolutely deserve our very best consideration and that means multiple proposals.”

LeJeune said he had hoped that the council could have passed the resolution Tuesday to allow the plan to go into effect before the new budget year on Oct. 1. The

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Fairhope marks 9/11 anniversary with memorial, dedication

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FAIRHOPE — Fairhope commemorated the 20th anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks by recognizing the sacrifices of those serving during past and current disasters and the service of one local public servant.

On Friday, Sept. 10, Fairhope residents unveiled a memorial outside the city’s justice center and the city named the center for former Police Chief Joseph H. Pettis.

“Today, we are here to honor the 20th anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks, to honor our local police, healthcare workers, firefighters,

paramedics and other first responders and to dedicate this building in the name of the former police chief, Joe Pettis,” Mayor Sherry Sullivan said.

Pettis served the city of Fairhope for almost 36 years, starting in the Public Works Department before joining the Police Department and working his way up through the ranks to chief in 2012. He left the position in 2018.

“Joe came through the ranks of the city of Fairhope and along the way, he built relationships, earned trust, mentored younger employees and lived the life of a great leader,”

Spanish Fort VFD marks 9/11 with truck dedication

SPANISH FORT — Firefighters and residents marked the 20th anniversary of the 2001 attacks that took the lives of more than 400 first responders with the dedication of a new fire truck in Spanish Fort on Saturday, Sept. 11.

The new 2021 pumper was put into service at the Spanish Fort Volunteer Fire Department station after being purchased at a cost of \$537,947 Chief Roger Few said.

“It’s a beautiful truck and we’re proud to be able to put this forth for our guys,” Few said. “We thank our board members and the city for their contribution to keep us moving forward with equipment.”

Byron Hayles, Spanish Fort VFD board president, said the truck dedicated on the anniversary of the day when more than 300 New York firefighters died in the line of duty is a symbol of the dedication of all firefighters.

“Especially on a day like today, as we remember the sacrifices made by firefighters on Sept. 11,” Hayles said. “This fire truck and all the other fire trucks, the fire engines you see, every one you see going down the

road from any department, that is a living, breathing, working memorial to every firefighter, regardless of where he served, who gave the ultimate sacrifice. They went before us

and paved the way to make our lives a little bit better.”

He said the truck is also a tribute to the firefighters and community members of Spanish Fort.

“What these fire trucks represent is the standards that this fire department has kept over the years, over

Daphne sets moratorium on multifamily rezoning

DAPHNE — By a split vote, the Daphne City Council imposed a six-month moratorium on rezoning

property for apartments and some other multifamily housing.

The council voted 5-2 Tuesday, Sept. 7 to restrict changes in zoning for apartments, mid-rise condominiums, townhomes and planned

unit developments, or PUDs, that include those types of multifamily residences. Councilmen Ron Scott and Benjamin Hughes voted against the resolution.

Most council members said the

resolution will help the city plan for growth.

“With the moratorium limited to new requests for rezoning or pre-

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Fairhope strategic plan meeting Sept. 22

FAIRHOPE — City officials are looking for comments and ideas from residents to help prepare a plan to deal with growth in the region, Mayor Sherry Sullivan said Friday, Sept. 10.

The city will hold a public meeting Sept. 22 to discuss the comprehensive land use plan being developed for Fairhope. The meeting will

be at the James P. Nix Center from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.

“You hear people criticize every day, the growth and the development that we’re seeing,” Sullivan said. “This is their opportunity to have input into that plan so it’s really important to us to have the community engagement. It’s the most important part of this plan.”

City officials and supporters are working to develop a strategic plan to address

growth with an emphasis on environmental stewardship and legal foundation for implementation, according to a city statement. The proposal includes sustainable community growth combined with green infrastructure.

Sullivan said the city is reaching out to homeowners’ associations, property owners’ associations and other community groups to ask their opinions on issues such as growth.

“The most important part of this to me is engaging our community, so we really are trying to do a lot of outreach to everybody and make sure that people know about these meetings, make sure they know how important it is for us to get their input,” Sullivan said.

She said the meeting will be an open forum, so residents can bring up whatever issues concern them.

“It’s mostly about growth,

zoning, how you want to see Fairhope grow, what you would like to see here, what kind of developments you want to see, those kinds of things,” Sullivan said. “So, I would just, again, tell people to be sure to come to those public meetings to make sure their voice is heard.”

The Sept. 22 event is the first of several public meetings planned in the next three months. The meetings will be held at different locations

around Fairhope. Virtual options will also be available, according to a city statement.

The community engagement portion of the project is expected to run through February 2022. Residents can email CompPlan@FairhopeAL.gov for more information.

The project is sponsored by the RESTORE Council in cooperation with the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.

Sullivan said. “Joe was, and still is, a Godly man who is loyal, has integrity and earned the respect of our community.”

Council President Jack Burrell said Pettis was selected as chief from a pool of more than 100 applicants from across the country in 2012. He said he could think of only two other city buildings in Fairhope named for local leaders. Burrell said naming the Justice Center for Pettis was a fitting recognition.

“There is no finer man that I have ever worked with in my life than Joe Pettis,” Burrell said. “If you know him, you know that his life has been about service, service always above self and I’m so proud that we’re able to name this building after you chief.”

Pettis thanked city officials and fellow Police Department members.

“I want to thank everyone who has sacrificed your time to be with me this morning to

celebrate this great occasion. It’s just a blessing and I’m just so excited to see so many friends,” he said.

He said he had driven by the building several times and seen the new name on the facility.

“I’m just overwhelmed with that. My wife asked me yesterday. She said has it set in yet? And I said it’s slowly sinking in each time I pass

by,” Pettis said.

Sullivan said the memorial outside the Justice Center also recognizes the sacrifices made 20 years ago during terrorist attacks on the United States. The mayor said the event is also a commemoration of the efforts made by heroes in more recent struggles.

“Today, we also honor those healthcare workers who have been on the frontlines of our current battle,” Sullivan said. “Much like the 9/11 terrorist attacks, we have lost some of the freedoms that we take for granted every day. These healthcare heroes — doctors, nurses, respiratory therapists, administrators — have never hesitated to serve and

protect the patients fighting this virus. Many are their neighbors, friends, church members and sometimes even their own family.”

Bob Weltlich, chairman of the Fairhope Memorial Committee, said these heroes have served long before and since Sept. 11, 2001.

“Even though first responders, veterans, teachers and other essential workers have been around for hundreds of years, their roles in serving and protecting us have become even more pronounced with the advent of the 21st Century,” Weltlich said.

“Now the battles are not as clearly defined, nor fought just against enemies on foreign soil, but instead, we are also faced with terrorism and tragedy at home, especially since 9/11, which we’re honoring today, and throughout the weekend, things have dramatically taken on a new look as evidenced by our involvement in conflicts such as Afghanistan, Iraq, cybersecurity problems, challenges to our national security from the likes of Russia, China, North Korea and extremist groups both abroad and domestically that would undermine our very democracy.”

The memorial features a bald eagle and American flag. It was paid for through donations and with the sponsorship of the Fairhope Rotary Club, supporters said.

new plan would not change any employee’s current health insurance benefits, according to the resolution.

Olen said the council could approve the change after Oct. 1. He said he felt more current information is needed, however, before members decide.

He said the most recent claims data given to city officials was from May.

“We thought that was particularly important because the best indication of which way your claims are going is your most recent months,” Olen said. “What I had in mind, at least, was if those months were trending upward in a steep fashion, then, yes, we still want to be self-insured but maybe we don’t make that change right away. We need to see where we are.”

Councilwoman Angie Phillips praised officials’ efforts to cut costs. She said the city should have enough information on which to make a decision in the future.

“I am thrilled with what I am seeing with the progress and the different ways that our staff and our mayor are thinking outside the box and looking at ways that we can approach things, do things differently, do things to the best of our ability and I can’t applaud you guys enough for that,” Phillips said.

60 years," Hayles said. "The foundation of this department was laid by some very strong independent men. They were all volunteers and they set standards that we still live by today and these firefighters I expect them to live by today too."

Hayles said the purchase of a truck costing more than \$500,000 shows that the city and department have come a long way from his early years as a Spanish Fort volunteer firefighter.

"We had some trucks, we didn't know if they'd crank when we came into the fire station," he said. "No air conditioning. Sometimes we

didn't have the money to get the brakes renewed so it was an adventure going down hills sometimes."

Few said the new truck is one of the safest models built. The apparatus includes an enclosed cab with built-in roll cage to protect the firefighters riding in the vehicle.

The new truck can carry 530 gallons of water and has a pumping capacity of 1,250 gallons a minute.

Department members dedicated the new truck with two old firefighting traditions. The new truck was washed by being hosed down with water from the vehicle it replaces, a 1999 model that will be placed in reserve status.

Following the "wet-down," firefighters pushed the truck into its garage bay. Few said

the ceremony of pushing in the vehicle dates back to the time of horse-drawn fire engines in the 19th century. At that time, firefighters pushed the engines back into the station after the horses were unhitched.

Mayor Mike McMillan said the dedication was a fitting way to commemorate the anniversary and the growth of the department.

"On this solemn day, 9/11, we all recognize the importance of this dedication," McMillan said. "This wet-down of this truck. What our firefighters do on a daily basis. We can't thank you enough on behalf of the citizens of the city. All of you guys and ladies. Thank you so much for what you do. It's a great day. It's a great event."

zoning that it's in the best interests of the city of Daphne to impose this limited time moratorium in order to better get a handle on the rapid growth in multifamily units in the city of Daphne," Councilman Steve Olen said.

Councilwoman Angie Phillips said the moratorium does not affect property that is already zoned for multifamily use.

"This is not limited development," she said. "Property owners who already have property within the city of Daphne that by right it is zoned, if it's already zoned for those types of development, they can still do that. This does not limit them in doing that."

The resolution will also not affect property where the owners had applied for rezoning before the change went into effect.

Scott said he supported efforts to control growth but felt that the market should

determine how property is used.

"When this first came up, I felt like it was very appropriate and then the more I looked at it and talked to certain people, while I think the concept of us wanting to get control as far as the ratio of multifamily to single-family, I think that is a legitimate concern and goal for any municipality. We can decide how we want to develop our city," Scott said.

He said the resolution could also limit annexations if the owners of land outside Daphne want to rezone that property.

Hughes said he did not think the council should set how property can be used.

"At first I was very concerned about what's going on and I still am, but I just feel that our government should let the market dictate what is built as opposed to us saying what can and can't be built," Hughes said. "With that and infringing on property rights, I also agree on Councilman Scott on this issue."

Phillips said the resolu-

tion does not take away any existing rights to develop property in the way that it is now zoned

"What this resolution is for is not to infringe on the property rights of existing owners that already have that zoning, it is to simply get a handle on the growth of our city," she said. "We have had tremendous growth, particularly in our police jurisdiction, of apartment complexes."

She said development is straining infrastructure in the area and the moratorium will allow Daphne officials to plan how to prepare for growth.

"There's some strategic planning that we need to do that's also in the works in our city and we want to see what the outcome on that is," Phillips said. "It's not that we don't want to grow, and we welcome these types of units. It's just that we've seen quite a few of them come very quickly and the impact to our infrastructure, our city services, our schools, all that needs to be considered."

SA Health opens Saturday clinic for injured athletes

To get injured players back in the game quickly and safely, USA Health's Department of Orthopaedic Surgery opened a Saturday walk-in clinic at the Strada Patient Care Center in Mobile. The clinic serves middle school, high school and collegiate athletes.

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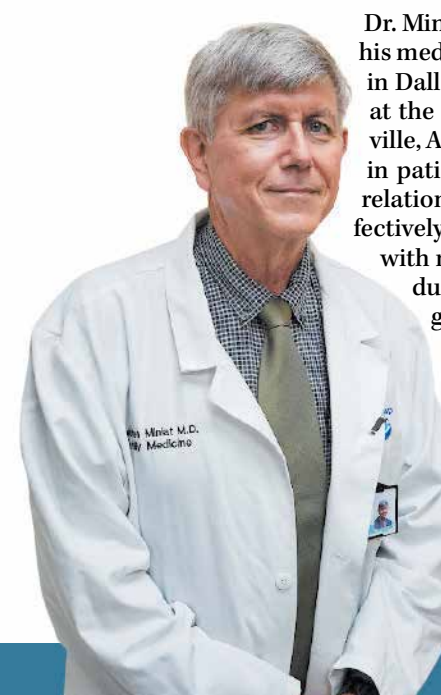

ADPH warns about the dangers of ivermectin

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and other health agencies have advised against the unauthorized use of the drug ivermectin to treat or prevent COVID-19 in humans. The Alabama Department of Public Health (ADPH) has sent a health alert message to healthcare providers in the state requesting reporting and cautioning them about the many side effects and serious harm caused when people take this medication for an unapproved use.

Ivermectin is not an antiviral drug and is approved for humans only at specific doses for specific conditions. An FDA consumer alert explained that ivermectin is often used in the U.S. to treat or prevent parasites in animals. The agency has received multiple reports of

patients who have required medical support and have been hospitalized after taking high doses of ivermectin which can be highly toxic in humans. Side effects occur, and drug interactions are common.

Two forms of ivermectin are available for human use, tablets to treat parasitic worms and a topical to treat head lice and skin conditions such as rosacea. The FDA has advised against human use of ivermectin produced for animals such as cows and horses as the doses are much higher and could contain ingredients intended only for animals and are thus harmful to humans. <https://www.fda.gov/consumers/consumer-updates/why-you-should-not-use-ivermectin-treat-or-prevent-covid-19>

Ivermectin is not without side effects, even at a single dose. With the doses being

given or found in livestock products, the risk of overdosing increases as does the severity of side effects and drug interactions. Noted interactions occur with common medications which include but are not limited to allergy medicines, antibiotics, anticonvulsants, antidepressants, benzodiazepines, some anti-hypertensive medications, blood thinners and many others.

Common side effects for ivermectin include itching and hives, dizziness, headache, nausea, diarrhea and muscle pain. More serious adverse reactions associated with toxicity and possible ivermectin poisoning documented in clinical literature include loss of consciousness, drowsiness, tremor, seizure, hypotension (low blood pressure), vomiting and coma.


Ivermectin has not been

given emergency use authorization (EUA) by the FDA to prevent or treat COVID-19. There are drugs available, including monoclonal antibodies, which are FDA-EUA authorized for COVID-19 post-exposure prevention and treatment. The newly named Pfizer COMIRNATY (COVID-19 vaccine, mRNA) now has full FDA approval, and the Moderna and Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccines are FDA-EUA authorized in the U.S.

Nationally and within Alabama the number of calls being received by poison control centers concerning ivermectin is increasing. In Alabama, as of Aug. 23, the number of calls from persons taking ivermectin had doubled from the prior year. The Alabama Poison Information Center is tracking calls related to ivermectin side effects, toxicity or poisoning.

Anyone who has taken ivermectin and has signs and symptoms consistent with side effects, adverse reac-

tions or toxicity/poisoning is advised to call the Alabama Poison Information Center at 1-800-222-1222.

FAMOUS HAND

Everyone is occasionally guilty of becoming enamored of a particular hand and overestimating its value. All players should, of course, strive to keep such excesses to a minimum, as steady overbidding is a serious fault in anyone's game. The best policy in bridge is to try to bid your hands as accurately as possible — neither overbidding nor underbidding them — but this is not always easy to do.

Consider this deal from the Italy-U.S. match in 1951. Howard Schenken was South for the American team and, at favorable vulnerability, decided to open one club.

He found his partner with a huge hand, and North never did stop bidding until a small slam was reached. Schenken did everything he could to slow his partner down, but North had the bit firmly in his teeth and refused to let go.

The Americans were exceptionally lucky on the deal because, as the cards were divided, the slam could not be stopped. West led a diamond. Schenken won the trick with dummy's queen, finessed the jack of clubs, led a heart to the queen and cashed the A-K of trump. When he next led another heart, West took the ace, and that was that. Declarer had 12 ice-cold tricks.

Schenken would have gone down had West held the queen of clubs or had East held the Q-10-x of trump, or had East held the ace of hearts, or if West had led a spade initially and East had the king.

North was extremely pleased by the favorable outcome, which was attributable for the most part to his optimistic series of bids. But he knew he had dodged a bullet, and no doubt vowed not to press his luck quite as much in the future.

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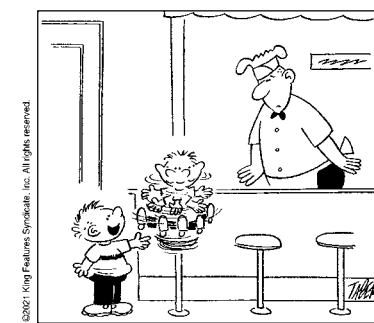

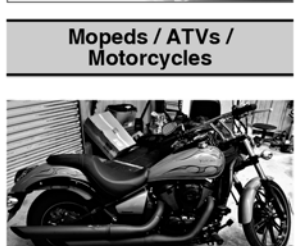

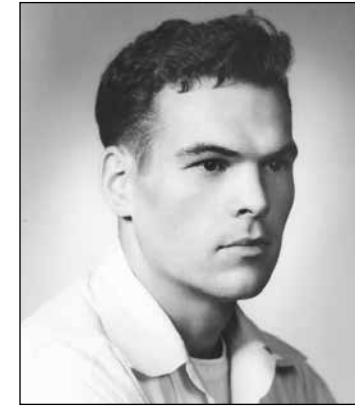

Hog Wild License Package available

The Alabama Wildlife and
Freshwater Fisheries (WFF)
Division is offering a one-
click solution for those who

want to hunt feral swine at
night.

The new law that allows
nighttime hunting of feral
swine and coyotes went into
effect on July 1. The 2021-2022
licenses, which became avail-
able Aug. 30, allow hunters to
choose from a variety of all-
access packages, including the
“Hog Wild” package that
gives hunters all the license
privileges needed to take ad-
vantage of the new nighttime
hunting opportunities.

“When the nighttime feral
swine and coyote hunting
license was passed, it seemed
like a good idea to create a
new license package,” said
WFF Assistant Director Fred
Harders. “In that package,
residents and non-residents
will be able to click one but-
ton and purchase a small-
game license, a bait privilege
license, which would allow
folks to use bait while hunt-
ing feral swine at night, and
the nighttime license. We
felt that those three licenses
would be what most people
would like to purchase.”

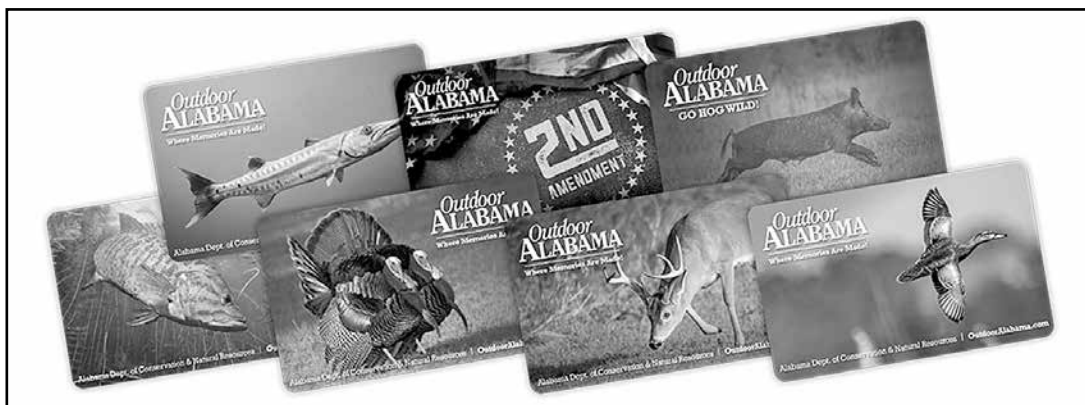
“Of course, the price will
vary depending on whether
you are a resident or non-
resident. This will allow that
individual to just click that
package instead of going in
and figuring out what they
need. It’s a convenience for
people who would like to
hunt feral swine at night over
bait and not the regular all-
game hunter.”

Harders said hunters who
wish to purchase the all-game
hunting license will need to
go through the regular pro-
cedure of buying separate li-
censes to be able to hunt feral
swine and coyotes at night.

Harders also reminds hunt-
ers that all of the current
year’s licenses expired on
Aug. 31. Licenses for the 2021-
2022 seasons are available
now.

“We pre-sell these licenses
for the coming year for
several reasons,” he said.
“Several seasons open early
in September. We don’t want
to make it difficult for hunt-
ers to participate in those
seasons. Also, with all the
licenses expiring the same
day, the volume at the be-
ginning of the year is very
heavy, so we want to spread
out the demand to ensure the
license system performs as
designed.”

Harders said since the
nighttime licenses became
available this summer, about
700 hunters have taken ad-
vantage of the new opportu-
nity.



A variety of new hard-card licenses will be available for the 2021-2022 seasons, including the new Hog Wild card and license package.

“We expect pretty good
interest in the nighttime li-
cense for the upcoming year,”
he said. “It’ll be interesting
to see how many we sell the
opening month. Whether it
will be as popular as the bait
privilege license, time will
tell.”

During the current license
year, WFF sold about 160,000
resident bait privilege li-
censes and more than 17,000
to non-residents. A bait privi-
lege license is required for
anyone who wishes to hunt
deer or feral swine over bait,
which includes corn and
other food, protein suppl-
ements, mineral blocks, juices
and sprays. Unlike other
licenses, the bait privilege
license and the nighttime
hunting license do not allow
for exemptions for age or
landowner status.

When purchasing the li-
censes for the upcoming sea-
sons, don’t forget about the
collectible hard-card licenses
that are available for an ad-
ditional fee of \$5. Seven new
hard-card license designs will
be available next week.

As the fall hunting seasons
approach, WFF Director
Chuck Sykes said the news
about chronic wasting dis-
ease (CWD) is encouraging,
but WFF will remain vigilant
in trying to prevent its spread
into Alabama. Positive cases
have been reported in Missis-
sippi and Tennessee.

“So far it’s moving slowly,
like we told people it would
if it wasn’t artificially trans-
ported,” Sykes said. “It’s
inched a mile or two closer
to us, but we’ve got several
miles to go, and we have a
major river system as a bar-
rier. I think we’re as fortu-
nate as we can be right now
on the CWD front.”

Freezers that allow hunt-
ers to drop off their deer heads
at self-service sample sta-
tions are located throughout
the state and are available

to receive samples for CWD
testing 24 hours a day, seven
days a week. Visit www.outdooralabama.com/cwd-sampling
for a map of sampling
locations.

At the self-service loca-
tions, hunters must first
remove the deer’s head with
4-6 inches of neck attached.
For bucks, antlers can be
removed at the base of each
antler or by removing the
skull plate before bagging the
head. Hunters will then place
the head in the provided
plastic bag and tie it closed.
They will need to complete
all sections of the Biological
Sample Tag and attach the
tag to the bag with a zip tie.
Hunters will take the bottom
receipt portion of the Biologi-
cal Sample Tag before plac-
ing the bagged head in the
freezer. All materials needed
to drop off a sample are pro-
vided at each freezer location.

“We wish the hunters
would participate more with
their volunteer drop-offs at
our freezer locations,” Sykes
said. “Our biologists are still
sampling deer, and our en-
forcement officers are still
patrolling the roads to keep
people from bringing deer
carcasses into the state.”

A ban on the importation
of live deer into Alabama
has been in effect for many
years. The regulations were
amended several years ago to
prohibit the importation of
deer carcasses from all states
and countries.

Regulations do allow for
the importation of certain
parts of the deer but not
whole carcasses. Permitted
parts include:

- Meat from the family Cervidae (white-tailed deer, mule deer, elk, moose, fallow deer, red deer, sika deer, caribou, etc.) that has been completely deboned
- Cleaned skull plates with attached antlers if no visible brain or spinal cord

tissue is present

- Unattached antlers or sheds
- Raw capes if no visible brain or spinal cord tissue is present
- Teeth if no root structure or other soft tissue is present
- Finished taxidermy products or tanned hides

“We’re doing everything we
can to keep the state as safe
as we can and to be prepared
if it does get here,” Sykes
said.

Alabama’s deer hunting
opportunities are divided into
five zones to allow WFF to
manage the deer harvest on a
more local level. For the 2021-
2022 season, Zone C in north
Alabama has been adjusted
according to the latest data
on deer populations.

“Every year we tweak the
zones a little,” Sykes said.

“The more data we get com-
ing in through Game Check,
our staff and hunters, we
can fine-tune those zones.

We made a small tweak in
the north central part of the
state. Some of the areas with
a reduced antlerless harvest
limit fell in areas with a
higher deer population, so we
took them out of Zone C. The
more we work with the hunt-
ers and staff in these areas
and the better information
we get from Game Check,
the more we can refine these
zones.

“Our deer populations are
in a good place right now.
We’re going to continue to
monitor and make tweaks
where we need to.”

Speaking of Game Check,
Sykes is happy with the in-
creased participation from
hunters to report all their
deer and turkey harvests. A
change in the possession regu-
lation last year significantly
increased participation in
Game Check. The posses-
sion regulation requires that
hunters who harvest deer
and turkeys must maintain
proper paperwork when
transferring possession of
that animal to a processor,
taxidermist or any other in-
dividual.

The person in possession of
all or part of a deer or turkey
that is not their own must
retain written documentation
with the name of the hunter,
the hunter’s Conservation
ID number, the date of the
harvest and Game Check
confirmation number. The
information can be docu-
mented on any piece of paper,
or a transfer of possession
certificate is available in the
Alabama Hunting & Fishing
Digest or online at www.outdooralabama.com.

“Game Check partici-
pation went through the roof
last year,” Sykes said. “We
tweaked the regulation, and
it made all the difference in
the world. Our participation
went from 40 percentile into
the 90s. We’re now getting
more of the valuable data we
need to make quality man-
agement decisions.”

Yellow Jackets shutout the 'Phins

McGill-Toolen Catholic 14, Gulf Shores High 0

MOBILE — Missed opportunities and 3 turnovers in the fourth quarter proved costly to visiting Gulf Shores High in a 14-0 road loss to McGill-Toolen Catholic in a 6A Region 1 showdown at Lipscomb Stadium on Friday night.

"That was a slobber-knocker," Gulf Shores coach Mark Hudspeth said. "Our defense battled all night long. I am proud of the way our kids battled against a really good opponent. We hung in there all night long and had some chances, we just couldn't find enough answers offensively. The game was really closer than the final score."

At 7 p.m. this Friday the Dolphins (2-2 overall, 0-2 region) will travel to Robertsdale High, while the Yellow Jackets (1-2, 1-1) will play host to Citronelle High for homecoming.

"I will say this, our defense played lights out," an excited McGill-Toolen coach Norman Joseph said. "We are right back in the thick of the race with the region. Hat's off to Gulf Shores. It was an unreal

game."

In this defensive gem of a game featuring 2 freshman quarterbacks in starting roles, McGill-Toolen gained just 10 first downs and 259 yards of total offense. Braylon McReynolds led all rushers with 107 yards on 24 carries and Trey Inge added 34 on 4 totes. Andrew Murchison was 13-of-18 passing for 131 yards, while Anthony Eager had 3 receptions for 55 yards and James Mayhall added 2 for 31 yards for the home team.

The Dolphins picked up 132 yards of total offense and 6 first downs. Ronnie Royal ran 17 times for 54 yards and Keeshon Siaoosi contributed 11 for 48. Landon Jones was 2-of-5 in the air for 7 yards and Royal 1-for-1 for 19, with Taevon Anderson hauling in 2 receptions for 23 yards and Joseph Gardner adding 68 all-purpose yards, including 3 returns for 57 yards and 6 carries for 11 yards.

Defensively, Anthony Brown recorded a sack, interception and 2 tackles for loss, Braden Turner an interception, Cameron Stadther a fumble recovery and Devaughn Batain a pass break-up for the home team.

Keenechi Titi recorded a pair of sacks and 2 tackles for loss, James Morgan an interception and R.J. Taylor, B.J. Elston and Charlie Hollis each a tackle for loss for the

visitors.

The Yellow Jackets drove into the red zone on their opening possession, but Michael Shine was just wide right on a 31-yard field goal attempt. Late in the quarter, McReynolds went 76 yards for a score on a screen pass that was negated by a holding penalty. Midway through the second quarter, the Dolphins drove to the 25-yard line, but Bruce Davis stopped Royal for no gain on fourth-and-5.

The opening half ended scoreless with McGill-Toolen having 3 first downs and Gulf Shores 2.

McGill-Toolen would score on drives of 28 and 51 yards in the second half. McReynolds, who ran 9 times for 50 yards in the fourth quarter, scored on a 22-yard trap up the middle with 2:27 to go in the third quarter to cap a 3-play drive and Shine added his first of 2 PATs for a 7-0 lead.

"We know he is a playmaker so we are going to get the ball to him as best we can," Joseph said. "He is so talented, he loves the game and loves to play. We were able to stay on the field offensively."

Late in the fourth quarter, McReynolds topped off a 6 play drive with a 27-yard run from the shotgun formation, faking a sweep right and heading up the middle with 3:21 left in the contest for a 14-0 advantage.

"After halftime we just said, 'This is McGill ball, we've got to go out and do what we normally do and that is win,'" McReynolds said.

"One thing I like to focus on when I'm working is endurance. I understand there will be games when I am tired, but I just have to fight through it. At the end of the day, it was a team effort and the team put just as much into it as I did."

The Jacket defense forced 3 turnovers in the fourth quarter to seal the deal.

On a 12 play, 49-yard drive, Brown intercepted a shovel pass that bounced off a Gulf Shores player on a fake field goal attempt with 8:55 to go. On the next possession, the Dolphins drove to midfield, but Stadther recovered a fumble to set up the final scoring drive. With 3:05 to play, Turner intercepted a pass at midfield, returning it 50 yards for a score that was negated by an illegal block, but the change of possession allowed McGill-Toolen to run out the clock and ice the win.

"We did finally start moving the ball in the second half, we just couldn't get it into the end zone," Hudspeth lamented. "I know we have a lot of football ahead of us. We can compete against really good teams. The past two weeks we've competed against the best two teams in our league and really played them very well."

2021 United States Senior Women's USGA Amateur Championship underway at Lakewood

SUNDAY'S THIRD ROUND DETAILS

Two-time defending champion Lara Tennant, of Portland, Ore., the No. 1 seed in match play, led a parade of top-seeded players who advanced to the Round of 32 with victories on Sunday in the 59th U.S. Senior Women's Amateur Championship

at The Lakewood Club. Tennant, 54, the stroke-play co-medalist who is trying to win a third consecutive championship after titles in 2018 and 2019, battled past No. 64 seed Tina Barker, 2 and 1. Barker earned her spot in the bracket in a three-hole playoff that ended Sunday morning. The match was tied through 14 holes, but Tennant edged ahead on No. 15 and closed out Barker with a birdie on the par-3 17th hole.

"I'm very aware that there's never an easy match when you're playing in a USGA event," said Tennant, who has now won 13 consecutive matches over three championships, since she lost in the Round of 64 as the No. 1 seed in 2017 at her home course, Waverley Country Club. "You have to be resilient and keep your

head in the game, and that's what I did. At this point a win is a win and it doesn't matter the margin."

Thirteen of the top 16 seeds advanced, but Sue Wooster, of Australia, the runner-up in each of the past two championships to Tennant, was one of three eliminated on Sunday. Louella Kanew, of Palm Beach, Fla., the No. 50 seed, defeated Wooster, 3 and 2. Two single-digit seeds were ousted: No. 6 Amy Ellertson, of Free Union, Va. (4 and 2 to Tara Fleming, of Jensen Beach, Fla.), and No. 9 Laura Coble, of Augusta, Ga. (1 up to Sue Curtin, of Westwood, Mass.).

Co-medalist and No. 2 seed Gigi Higgins, of Cape Coral, Fla., earned a 4-and-3 win over Jennifer Hoyt, of Horseshoe Bay, Texas, while No. 3 Ellen Port, of

St. Louis, Mo., a seven-time USGA champion, defeated Angie Whitley Coleman, of Wilmington, Del., 5 and 4. No. 4 Susan Cohn, of Palm Beach Gardens, Fla., also advanced, 5 and 4, over Maria De Orueta, of Spain.

The three players from Alabama who advanced to match play all moved on to the Round of 32. Susan West, of Tuscaloosa, a four-time state player of the year and the No. 24 seed, edged Lisa McGill, 1 up; while No. 5 seed Kathy Hartwiger and No. 7 seed Patricia Earhart, both of Birmingham, each earned 3-and-2 victories. Hartwiger, the 2002 U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur champion, topped 2010 U.S. Senior Women's Amateur champion Mina Hardin, of Mexico, while Earhart ousted Kelly Morris, of Franklin, Tenn.

WHAT'S NEXT

The Rounds of 32 and the Round of 16 were contested on Monday, respectively. After the quarterfinals and semifinals on Tuesday, the 18-hole championship match was set for today, Sept. 15.

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
