The Hot Shop

By land or by sea (we know it's not the sea)

The waterways in and around the Alabama Gulf Coast offer a wide selection of restaurants that can be reached via boat or Jet Ski. Stop by one of these 12 local eateries to quench your thirst and satisfy your hunger

GULF SHORES

LuLu's – Sitting on the Intracoastal Waterway, LuLu's is a perfect spot to stop with the whole family. The scratch-made menu offers something for everyone in the family, from fresh seafood to amazing burgers. Adults can enjoy a cocktail from an extensive list while children play in the sand or the on-site arcade. LuLu's also offers an allergy menu for those with dietary considerations. **Tacky Jack's** – Tacky Jack's has been a local staple since the 1970s and offers three waterfront locations across the island in Fort Morgan, Gulf Shores and Orange Beach. Stop by and grab breakfast before spending the day on the water, or grab lunch or dinner after a full day of water-bound fun. The atmosphere is casual and laid back. The menu has everything you might crave on a beach vacation or winter escape, from smoked tuna dip and fried green tomato fries to po'boys and seafood platters. Early weekend risers should try their brunch.

ORANGE BEACH

Avenue Pub – Avenue Pub is located in Orange Beach's most unique building. Shaped like a boat with amazing views from the decks, it is a top spot to grab a drink and watch the world motor past. It opened in 2021 and offers a coastal twist on classic pub food like fish and chips and burgers or tacos. The menu also includes eats for the kids and a cocktail menu for the adults.

Cobalt – Cobalt is nestled under the Perdido Bay Bridge and offers amazing views of the water. There are numerous boat slips available for small vessels as well as mediumsized yachts. The menu spotlights local seafood available on the coast. Start your meal with the Cobalt crab and shrimp dip before diving into an entrée of Gulf shrimp and grits. The menu is extensive and includes stone hearth pizza. Enjoy live music during happy hour beside a spectarular sunset.

Fisher's Upstairs – Fisher's Upstairs offers an upscale dining experience with white linen tablecloths. Every dish is made with the freshest local products, produce and just-caught Alabama Gulf seafood.

Fisher's Dockside – Heading downstairs, Fisher's Dockside offers a more laid-back, fresh-off-theboat atmosphere. Enjoy the view overlooking yachts moored in Orange Beach Marina. The menu offers something for everyone, from freshly prepared burgers, Gulf Coast seafood, salads, sandwiches and more.

Fresh Off the Boat – Pull your boat up at SanRoc Cay Marina and enjoy the lively laid-back atmosphere. Did you catch a fish? No need to wait till you get home to enjoy it. Let the experts at Fresh Off the Boat prepare it for you. The menu also offers plenty of non-seafood dishes for those wanting a land-based meal.

OSO at Bear Point Harbor – Take

in the sunset and enjoy live music at Oso at Bear Point Harbor. The menu at this locals' hot spot includes everything from seafood to brisket tacos. The kids will also enjoy their time and the menu at Oso.

Playa – Brought to you by the team at Fisher's at Orange Beach Marina, Playa offers a menu of creative coastal cuisine. Start your meal with shrimp ceviche or guacamole. The main entrée options include redfish on the half shell, tuna poke bowls or taco bowls.

The Tiki Bar at Safe Harbor Sportsman – Unwind with friends, enjoy a meal, grab a cocktail, and listen to live music at The Tiki Bar. Take in the views overlooking Terry Cove, and watch as the boats pass by. The menu offers everything from pizza to burgers and every cocktail you desire.

PENSACOLA

Flora Bama Yacht Club – Located just across the street from the legendary Flora-Bama, the Yacht Club is a family friendly spot to grab a bite. The menu includes seafood, salads, steaks and sandwiches.

ELBERTA

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Alligator Alley

ear not. The 600 alligators crawling, swimming and sometimes hissing just under your feet can go up to 18 months without food. t's rare. But possible

It's rare. But possible. That's one of the unusual facts you will learn as you peruse the elevated boardwalk that crosses 20 acres of natural cypress swampturned-preserve for these prehistoric looking creatures.

Wes Moore opened the attraction in 2004 on land that had been in his family for nearly 75 years. At least one alligator may have lived there for nearly as long, too. As the story goes, the gator, named Old Joe, lived in a swamp on the family land. Everyday, Moore's grandfather would feed him. One afternoon when he arrived without fresh meat on hand, the alligator chased him down.

The gator never caught his grandfather, though the story quickly became local legend. Eventually, Moore turned the legacy of that tale into a must-see destination for Baldwin County.

Now, visitors can hold young gators that seem cute compared to the likes of the park's most famous resident, the more-than-800-pound

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Where the light shines

A visit to Middle Bay Lighthouse is a must for tourists and locals alike

attery McDermott, a seemingly impenetrable Civil War defense, once rose as a giant above the Mobile River.

Now, trees fill the landscape where its walls once stood. Sawgrass sways in the water below. Where the past has fallen, the future will rise.

The I-10 Bayway was built in the fort's shadow with barges that chugged back and forth across the watery expanse as the bridge took shape. The barges may well return once work begins on the newly approved bridge project that will likely carry travelers into the 22nd century.

It's a clear day. The clouds mound along the edge of the horizon. When you squint, you can't quite tell if they are sea or sky.

Today, the flat-bottomed "Delta Explorer" passes the now silenced fort and floats under the bridge full of cars that zoom past the serene seascape without pause.

The boat heads out into Mobile Bay chasing that confluence of blue and white shadows. It scoots between what are surely lazy alligators below and busy sea birds above. As the official vessel of Blakeley State Park, it ferries locals and tourists alike to what seems, from shore, to be a world away.

Out to the light.

Here, the past stands. It illuminates the dark. It inspires those who catch a glimpse of it, often through the fog that attempts to muddy their path.

While it is 26 nautical miles from nearby Lake Forest Yacht Club to the mouth of Mobile Bay, this trip will clear just four to five of those lengths. If you squint in the direction of the Gulf, you can make out the shape of trees near Point Clear. The view today stretches a crystal clear







five miles toward the horizon. But you can't see the light. Not yet.

Brown, heavy, fuzzy-looking Pelicans soar above like pterodactyls. They alight upon the craggy outcrops of branches and trees that jut from the water. They land and seem impossibly to balance on each branch's thinnest point.

Our captain laments the obstacles. He steers around them as the water, he says, grows skinny.

"The history of the Mobile River is connected to the trees in the river. It's always been a concern," he tells his passengers.

Hence, the light.

The red and white flash of the hexagonal

Middle Bay Lighthouse has guided ships into the famously shallow Mobile Bay since 1885. When thick fog rolled across the bay, a bell sounded every five seconds.

Now, for every captain that casts an eye to the structure and steers away, a dozen tourists set a course straight for its shadow.

Middle Bay Lighthouse tops many tourists' must-see lists for a plethora of reasons. You can only reach the light by boat, meaning a relaxing trip down the scenic Eastern Shore is in order.

It's also a tough stamp in your local passport to attain because a pilgrimage to the light takes good weather and good timing, so you may visit Alabama several times before finally making it to the light.

And for lighthouse aficionados, Middle Bay Lighthouse is a chance to glimpse one of the last of its kind – a screwpile lighthouse that is literally fastened to the bay's basin below.

When lighthouses began appearing on America's shorelines in the 1800s to help steer crews safely ashore, there was no good way to place a beacon in the center of shallow mucky waters that boats often ran aground in, such as Mobile Bay.

A blind Irishman developed a contraption that would screw the lights into shifting sands. After much cajoling of bankers to give his idea a shot, he installed the first light in London in the 1830s. He sunk 20-foot-





long piles with cast iron screws 4 feet in diameter into the murky bottom. The piles were screwed into the sand by a team of men turning it by hand.

The light stood, and a trend was born. Soon, builders in the United States began constructing the new lights, including Middle Bay Lighthouse, which switched its light on Dec. 1, 1885.

Today, many of those early lights are gone, moved to dry land for protection from the sea they were built to warn against. But Middle Bay stands. It has endured 137 years, major storms such as Hurricane Katrina, a bid by the Coast Guard to destroy it in 1967 and an effort to remove it from its watery station and relocate it to Battleship Memorial Park in Spanish Fort, home of the USS Alabama.

The Alabama Historic Commission argued that the light would be safer on land, seen by more visitors and cost less to repair.

Opponents of the move reminded the state that after Hurricane Katrina the lighthouse remained while damage to Battleship Memorial Park swelled to over \$4 million. Boaters also maintained that the light continued to guide them into Mobile Bay, just as it was intended over 100 years ago.

Though the last keeper left in 1935 and the lighthouse was deactivated in 1967, repairs by the Alabama Historical Commission have restored it to its original glory.

In the early 2000s, nearly \$350,000 was spent on replacing the original iron tower and light with a solar-powered red light. Structural repairs were made to the stainless steel tierods underneath, windows were replaced, and the entire structure received a new paint job.

Officials have said that those repairs should give the light many more years of service, more chances to make the trip, more opportunities to see the light.

When the fog clears and the bay shimmers like glass, head toward that place where the sea and the sky meet. The light is worth the trip.

ark Hudspeth's journey to the Alabama Gulf Coast is like and unlike many who now call it home.

Like many, it's where his family came to vacation. However, their path here was different because the Hudspeths have been riding the football coaching roller coaster for 30 years now after his first two seasons as the Gulf Shores Dolphins' head football coach.

A few of those stops included sharing the same coaching room with former LSU head coach Ed Orgeron and former South Alabama head coach Steve Campbell at Nicholls State, earning four straight bowl wins as the head coach of the Louisiana Ragin' Cajuns and, most recently, hosting the first home playoff game in Gulf Shores football history.

There has been plenty of winning, paired with the corresponding losses, but along the way, Hudspeth has remained true to a few core values and holds a few things near and dear to his heart.

Here are seven things and values that define him, according to the man himself.

. FAMILY

Hudspeth, his wife, Tyla, and their five children visited their summer home in Gulf Shores often. Once the pandemic hit and following Hudspeth's time in the college ranks, they decided not to leave.

He said he felt he wasn't done coaching yet and picked up a job with the youth rec league before eventually accepting the job to lead the Dolphins. Now, he'll have a chance to coach his younger sons, Major (seventh grade), Captain (second) and Rocky (pre-school), when they get to that level.

Hudspeth's two older children, Gunner and Carley, are also both heavily involved in sports. Gunner is in his third year as a graduate assistant football coach at Troy University, and Carley is in her fifth year of college basketball with Mississippi College after four years at the University of Central Arkansas.



2. Faith

Another major facet of his life goes through up-and-down seasons as it does with football.

"Everybody goes through different seasons of their faith, and I'm in one of the strongest seasons I've been in," Hudspeth said. "Just thankful for how the Lord has blessed me and my family here in Gulf Shores and on the island."

3. CAREER

Part of those blessings include 30 years of coaching during which he's collected 170 wins as a head coach between high school and college.

Hudspeth was honored by the Touchdown Club of New Orleans as the college coach of the year and by the American Football Coaches Association as a regional coach of the year, and he was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame at Delta State University where he played and coached.

The biggest thing he's learned through it all?

"There's an old saying, 'Things are never as bad as they seem and never as good as they seem either,'" Hudspeth recounted. "So, I've tried to keep a little more even keel, although that's not really who I am."

4. PASSION

If you've shaken Hudspeth's hand, you could probably have felt the excitement he brings to every interaction.

"I like bringing energy to everything that I do. I try to bring the juice," Hudspeth said. "I believe in not doing anything unless you do it with enthusiasm. Everybody that I talk to, I'm going to try to make them feel like they're the most important person in the room, let them know how much I appreciate them. I think when you ask people, 'Hey, what about Coach Hud?' I hope somebody will say, 'Man, he's got passion, and he loves what he does.'"





5. FOOTBALL

By now it should be clear one of his passions is football, but it's not for the accolades and the titles. Rather, he appreciates the life lessons its young players get to learn.

"Imagine every little community that has a high school team, and then picture them at three o'clock every day turning out every kid on the street and not having a football. If there was no football and these guys didn't come down and be around men, men of character, men that work them hard and hold them accountable, that sometimes have to discipline them, what would our country look like if they were out of school hanging out in the street? Who knows?"

6. FRIENDSHIPS

He's been able to develop relationships with those men of character and has remained close with his coaching tree network.

'I've got so many friends that I keep in touch with all across the country," Hudspeth said. "I'm so appreciative of so many friends that have been there for me, in good times and bad, and the experiences we've had together."

HOBBIES

There's not a lot of time in the offseason, so Hudspeth doesn't get too far away from the game. But when he does, he likes to hang around his family.

"Boating, traveling and weightlifting are the things that I enjoy the most," he said, "and honestly most of those I can do with my family."

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Bama's best

Nick DiMario is a veteran of the food industry and now *Alabama's 2022 Restaurateur of the Year*, but he's far from slowing down.

hen getting to know the 2022 Alabama Restaurant and Hospitality Association's Restaurateur of the Year, Nick DiMario, a few things are clear. He loves his family, his work and training up the next generation of restaurant industry professionals.

DiMario and his wife, Amy, moved to Gulf Shores over 11 years ago with their daughters, Sofia, Gabby and Mia, for his job as director of operations for Bob Baumhower's Aloha Hospitality. After nearly 23 years, he left the company to join "Panini" Pete Blohme as operating partner of the PP Hospitality Group. Together they opened Sunset Pointe in Fairhope. PP Hospitality has rapidly grown and now includes Panini Pete's, Sunset Pointe and Fairhope Squeeze in Fairhope and Squid Ink and Mob Town Proper barbershop in Mobile. They also have several projects underway, including reopening Ed's Seafood Shed in a new location in Spanish Fort, The Waterfront in Daphne and a food hall in the RSA Bank Trust Building in Mobile called Parc Le Tralour.

As a project separate from PP Hospitality, for which this statewide award was focused, DiMario also owns Peace, Love & Taco in Gulf Shores, a casual joint across from Rouses he opened for his daughters.

Just listing the many projects DiMario oversees is exhausting, but he loves his work. His passion and excitement are palpable. It is no surprise that his idea of fun is working, and he credits his wife for making it possible.

"The important part of business to me is having a great foundation and family.

My wife has put up with me for 25 years, but she has always let me do what I do and supported me," DiMario said. "Pete's wife, Jodi, is the same. They let us do what we do, and that is probably the reason that I am where I am because they allowed me to paint."

While DiMario works six and a half days a week and sometimes seven, Sundays are family days.

"We do a buffet and fill up the stove in the morning and usually for dinner. We typically are not alone with family. We usually pick up a minimum of one visitor," he said.

DiMario's favorite home meals include Conecuh or turkey bacon and lots of coffee for breakfast. For dinner, he likes grilling salmon, a burger, thigh meat and corn or a five-bean chili with corn.

several kitchens, but at home he shares the cooking duties with Amy. He laughed when he admitted they are both messy cooks. So messy, in fact, that neither wants to be the sous chef and do the cleanup.

WHERE IT ALL BEGAN

DiMario was born and raised in South Philadelphia. He came from humble beginnings and learned from his immediate and extended family as the son of a police officer and grandson of a master butcher.

"I have always had a strong work ethic. Even when people were smarter than me, I would outwork them and show up. First there and last to leave," DiMario said. "I think what Baumhower saw in me was that I had an unbelievable work ethic."

That work ethic took him from his first job in a Philadelphia restaurant at 14 years old to the football field to being vice president of operations at Aloha Hospitality, running a \$40 million company. The same work ethic gave him the hustle to walk away to join Blohme and create something of his own.

Where he comes from and the people who have given him the knowledge sticks with him. He credits Baumhower for teaching him the foundation and credits Blohme for showing him he is a superstar.

"As my partner, Pete has taught me I am a superstar and with the assets I have he allowed me to paint my own pictures," DiMario said.

The pictures he has painted over the years in his partnership with Blohme range from growing their brand and systems, establishing internship programs and relationships with several high school and college culinary programs and thinking outside the box in the kitchen.

DiMario and Blohme are certainly seeing their share of success in terms of getting noticed. Seven Baldwin County residents were named as the top of their industry at the Alabama Restaurant and Hospitality Association's annual awards, including Blohme, who was given a humanitarian award, and two employees from Panini Pete's.

Training up the next generation and seeing them succeed is something DiMario is passionate about.

opportunities, and when I see opportunities I see money, and when I see money, I see people that I can help and pull with me because I am not going to do it alone," DiMario said. "I have gotten to a point where I have done the right things to move forward with my life and taking care of my family. It is my duty now to put hooks in people and reach back and pull them forward."

DiMario visits different properties each day and takes time to speak with at least three team members about their personal, professional and financial goals. On the day of this interview, he was speaking with a team member worried about their credit score. DiMario said he told the person to put a plan in place and take certain steps, and then he checks in periodically to see if they are progressing toward their goal.

"A mentor is not there to give you rainbows and unicorns. They are there to push you and tell you when you are not working out or your car is dirty," DiMario said.

WHAT'S NEXT?

At 55 years old, DiMario shows no signs of slowing down. Rather, he is accelerating and continuing to learn. He said he is at a point where he is looking for mentors who have done what he has not, and he is spending time listening to a lot of audiobooks by those who inspire him.

"I am crazy, but I want to use my minutes wisely every day. I put a notepad in my car and write my goals and make sure I am centered," Dimario explained. "You can be inspired about what you are doing and have fun. I don't know it all, and I am looking for a mentor."

DiMario and Blohme have a lot of irons in the fire with three restaurants scheduled to open in 2023, but they are always thinking, dreaming and grinding.

"Success leaves footprints," he said, "so I want to be able to do what people did for me."

BEACH ACCESS? We've got you!

Alabama Point East-A Gulf State Park Beach Area is located 0.3 miles east of Perdido Pass Bridge and offers over 6,000 feet of wide beach in addition to sand dunes, boardwalks, picnic areas, restrooms and outdoor showers.

Cotton Bayou is located at the intersection of Highway 182 and Highway 161 between some of the area's most popular condominiums. There are restrooms and showers on site.

Romar Beach-A Gulf State Park Beach Area is located 6.8 miles east of Highway 59 and has a limited amount of free parking (no facilities).

Gulf State Park Pavilion is located six miles east of Highway 59 and offers a beach pavilion with air-conditioned restrooms, private showers, a snack bar, shady spots to sit and eat, plus a large fireplace for chilly days. There is a \$5 fee to park for four hours and \$10 to park all day, but there are plenty of spaces and a lot of room for large vehicles and RVs.

Gulf Place (Gulf Shores Main Public Beach) is located where Highway 59 ends. There are beach attendants, three open-air pavilions, a picnic area, restrooms and showers. Parking is \$5 for four hours and \$10 to park all day between March 1 and Mov. 30. Arrive early to get a prime spot in this popular hangout.

Gulf Shores 2nd Street Public Beach

is just two blocks west of Highway 59. Facilities include an accessible restrooms, outdoor shower and covered pavilion with picnic tables.

Gulf Shores 4th Street Public Beach offers only pedestrian crossing beach access, perfect for those staying at nearby properties.

Gulf Shores 5th Street Public Beach is located five blocks west of Highway 59 with parking on the north side where the boardwalk leads to the beach. Parking is also available on the south side beside Bahama Bob's.

Gulf Shores 6th Street Public Beach is located six blocks west of Highway 59. Walk the boardwalk to the beach. Facilities include an outdoor shower and accessible restroom. **Gulf Shores 10th Street Public Beach**

offers beach access only with parking across the street. Facilities include restrooms and showers.

Gulf Shores 12th Street Public Beach

offers beach access but no parking. Facilities include restrooms and showers.

Gulf Shores 13th Street Public Beach has street-side parking with a dune walkover. Facilities include restrooms and showers.

Lagoon Pass Beach is 2.9 miles west of Highway 59 and has restrooms, outdoor shower and a water fountain. Parking if \$5 for four hours and \$10 to park all day and is located on the northeast side of the Lee Callaway Bridge.

Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge Beach is located at 12295 State Highway 180 (Fort Morgan Road) in Gulf Shores. Park along Mobile Street for easy beach access. It is a wildlife refuge, so there are no facilities. There is a Refuge Office located nearby.

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Fishing in Baldwin County

Bait your hook or cast your net in more than **660 miles of shoreline** from Orange Beach to the south shore of Mobile County and Mobile Bay. Baldwin County offers a multitude of angling opportunities for fishing enthusiasts at every level.

WHAT KIND OF FISH CAN YOU CATCH?

Amberjack can be found all year, but peak from May until September. Abundant around wrecks, reefs and gas platforms in Gulf waters off Baldwin County's south coast.

Blackfin Tuna can be found May through December, with a peak in late June through July, by trolling and jigging in offshore Gulf waters.

CATCH

Flounder are abundant on and around structures like piers and drop offs along the Eastern Shore.

Grouper can be found all year in the Gulf of Mexico off Baldwin County's south coast.

King Mackerel can be found along coastal and offshore Gulf waters, particularly around wrecks, rigs, obstructions, ledges, lumps and other structures from May through October.

Mullet can be found near inshore artificial reefs and around oyster reefs and tidal river mouths.

Redfish are abundant around the mouth of Mobile Bay near Fort Morgan.

Red Snapper season and limits change based on the abundance of the fish. Red snapper can be found offshore around natural structures or artificial reefs.

Seatrout can be caught along Gulf beaches in March and in rivers and above the Mobile Bay Causeway in late fall and winter. **Sharks** are commonly caught from March through November around oyster reefs, bridge pilings, inshore artificial reefs, rock jetties and oyster reef areas during flooding tides.

Speckled Trout can be found in the shallows of Mobile Bay.

Wahoo can be found by trolling in offshore Gulf waters from May through October.

Whiting can be found in the Gulf surf zone of coastal waters and off Gulf piers and lower portions of the bays, including lower bay piers.

Yellowfin Tuna can be found in offshore Gulf waters from April through December with a peak in June and July.

BALDWIN COUNTY HERITAGE MUSEUM

Preserving the culture of the farm communities of early Baldwin County by creating a home for historically significant buildings, documents and artifacts. It is not filled with elaborate antiques or expensive collections, but rather bits and pieces of items used in the daily lives of men and women who lived in Baldwin County.

BLACK EDUCATION MUSEUM

Located on the original site of the Eastern Shore Baptist Academy and later the Baldwin County Training School, the museum chronicles the history of black education in Baldwin County, which began in 1882 when the Eastern Shore Missionary Baptist Association saw a need for educating black children. In 1916, the school was deeded to the Baldwin County Board of Education and became a public high school that provided an education for black students in Baldwin and other surrounding counties until 1970.

The Fairhope Museum of History hosts changing exhibits as well as permanent ones, located on the first floor which depict Fairhope's history. The second floor of the museum is home to the original town council chambers. The museum offers interactive projects for children and has files available for research projects. It boasts a collection of more than 250 pieces of historic pottery from the area. Every Tuesday at 2 p.m., the museum hosts a tea, where guests can enjoy a cup of Baldwin County tea, eat a cookie and hear a story detailing Fairhope history from a local resident. FOLEY RAILROAD MUSEUM

For over 60 years, Baldwin County's agriculture industry relied on a railroad system to transport goods from farms to the rest of the country. In 1971, the Louisville and Nashville Railroad ceased operations at its depot in Foley. Now, it houses the Foley Railroad Museum, offering exhibits about Baldwin County's railroading and agricultural history.

A model railroad layout depicts the evolution of railroading in the 1950s, complete with three operating double-track routes, 12 different railroads and several animated sites, along with representations of a fire station, church, bus station, city park, farm, sawmill, coal company and an oil refinery. The museum also has a train that carries children around Foley's Heritage Park.
