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

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


St. Brendan participated in a school-wide canned food drive to benefit the Help Center.

Dr. Slater is currently Professor and Chairman of the Dept. of Educational Leadership and Foundations, The University of Louisiana, Lafayette, La. Having received his Education Doctorate at the University Of Chicago, and his Masters of Education from Harvard University, Doctor Slater has also been selected as a national Fulbright Scholar three different occasions: once to Greece, to Peru, and to Bolivia where he helped developed these countries educational systems.



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A research author of numerous publications and book chapters (over 60), he was Senior Research Associate with the U.S. Dept of Education in Educational research and Improvement in Washington D.C. as well. An Excellent teacher, Professor Slater has also been recognized for his outstanding teaching excellence at LSU, Baton Rouge and Texas A & M University where he previously was taught.

He was a graduate of St. Brendan's school in 1962 following 8 years. He is an active member of The Catholic Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist in Lafayette La. He is married to Maria, who also teaches at LSU and they have two sons, one in High school and one in college.



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
