County installs flashing signal at Palm Valley Bridge following death of Nease High School student in July

St. Johns County officials say the fatal traffic death of a Nease High School student at the foot of the Palm Valley Bridge in July influenced the county's decision to install Rectangular Rapid Flash Beacons (RRFBs) at that crosswalk recently.

We want to make sure our roads are safe for motorists, pedestrians or anybody that uses them," Public Works Director Neal Shinkre said. "We didn't think what was there was bad, but because of the fatality and the outcry, we looked at it more."

On July 6, Christian Meier, 17, was riding his bike eastward on the sidewalk along Palm Valley Road when he was hit and killed by a car as he tried to cross the road near the foot of the bridge.

Prior to the accident and the installation of the flashing signals, there was an existing midblock crosswalk that Shinkre said met traffic standards. Yet after the accident occurred, he said the county addressed public demands and assigned its traffic

engineers to conduct a study of this section of Palm Valley road, specifically concerning the number of pedestrians that walk the sidewalks in the area and the grade of the hill descending from the bridge.

Between the engineers' findings, the accident and the public outcry that followed, Shinkre said it was a necessary and logical decision to implement the RRFBs.

Now, when pedestrians cross the street, they can push a button to activate the flashing signals on the signs, which are supposed to continue flashing for as long as it takes for them to cross the street. In theory, the signals should then alert any oncoming motorists to stop and yield for the pedes-

Master Sgt. Dylan Bryan, a spokesman from Florida Highway Patrol (FHP), said any additional authorized warning devices can be beneficial.

"These would hopefully reduce the amount of crashes and/or hazardous drivers in our area by grasping the attention of roadway users," said Bryan.



When pedestrians now cross the street at the foot of the Palm Valley Bridge, they can alert motorists by pressing a button that activates flashing signals on the crosswalk signs.

Feedback from the community, Shinkre said, has been positive so far.

"I think feedback has been great," said Shrinke. "I think the community appreciates that we reviewed the situation and looked for opportunities to upgrade. When a pedestrian is walking there, it (the RRFBS) will make them feel safe."

Annual beach passes for St. Johns County on sale

Annual passes to drive vehicles on St. Johns County's beaches are now on sale at all office locations of St. Johns County Tax

Passes are required to drive on the beaches during the 2017 season, March 1 through Sept. 30. St. Johns County residents can purchase passes at the preseason rate of \$30. Non-residents can purchase passes for \$40. Passes for disabled persons, regardless of residency, are available for \$20. There is no fee for 100 percent disabled military veterans.

Customers will be asked to provide proof of residency and disability status to receive the passes at the specified rates.

All fees increase by \$10 March 2, at which time passes will no longer be available for purchase at the Tax Collector's office.

St. Johns County Public Library system launches'Food for Fines' program

The St. Johns County Public Library system has once again launched its "Food for Fines" program to benefit a local food

This program allows patrons to lower or eliminate library fines while providing assistance to the Health and Human Services Food Pantry. The program, which continues through Dec. 19, enables patrons to remove \$1 worth of fines for every item of non-perishable food donated.

Overdue fines, charges for damaged items, debt collection fees and interlibrary loan fees may be removed through this program. Fees for lost items, printing, faxes, computer guest passes and other similar service fees are not eligible. For a complete list, visit www.sjcpls.org.

Due to the impact of Hurricane Matthew, residents and rescued animals need more assistance than usual. Food donations may be dropped off at any St. Johns County Library branch or with a Bookmobile.

Last year, St. Johns County residents provided more than 18,000 non-perishable items through the Food for Fines program. All food collected will remain in St. Johns County. For more information, call (904) 827-6925.

Nocatee to build new water spray park, expanded activity field

4-story spray playground to highlight additional amenities

A new four-story water "spray playground" and an expanded activity field twice the size of Nocatee Town Center field will be the newest amenities added to Nocatee, The PARC Group has an-

In what the developers say is the largest addition of new amenities since the master-planned community was founded a decade ago, The PARC Group unveiled plans for the new offerings, the first of which – an expanded activity field to be located behind the Nocatee Swim Club is expected to be completed in Summer

The new Spray Park has an anticipated completion date of Summer 2018.

"This is all part of our ongoing commitment to continually raise the bar for fun and lifestyle here at Nocatee," said PARC Group President and CEO Rick Ray in a video announcing the new amenities.

Nocatee Spray Park

Building on the popularity of its signature Splash Water Park – which features a resort-style lagoon pool, lazy river, a water slide tower and a 330-foot zipline - The PARC Group has developed plans to build the Nocatee Spray Park. To be located

between the Nocatee Swim Club and the Nocatee Community Park, the four-story "water playground" will enable guests to be sprayed with water while sliding, climbing and playing. The new park will also feature a deck, food court and bar. Construction is scheduled to begin in Summer 2017.

Activities Field

The new activity field, officials said, will provide expanded parking and twice as much space as Town Center Field for community events and activities, including the popular monthly Nocatee Farmers Market and drive-in movie nights. A band stage, meanwhile, will accommodate concerts and special events such as the annual Roscolusa songwriters' festival.

"Events and activities are a major part of the Nocatee lifestyle," Ray said. "By expanding this area and adding the band stage and parking, we're ensuring our residents have the perfect spot to host even bigger and better events and activities for vears to come "

The announcement of the new amenities follows the continued growth of Nocatee, which for the past several years has ranked as the third fastest-growing master-planned community in the nation. In November, Nocatee surpassed 5,000 homes, with nearly 1,000 of those homes sold during 2016.

And Nocatee's amenities, PARC Group officials said, are key to that growth.

"Nocatee is more than homes, neighborhoods and shopping centers – it's the lifestyle we enjoy," Ray said. "That lifestyle is centered around the parks, trails, swimming amenities and community events. And that lifestyle is about to get

How long have you lived in Palm Valley?

My maternal grandfather, Will De-Grove, arrived in Diego (Palm Valley) in 1896 and built a large house, which still stands today. I grew up in what became known as "The Big House."

How did you become interested in pottery as an art form?

During a trip to Santa Fe, New Mexico in 1989. I became aware of Pueblo pottery. I visited the pueblo of famed potter Maria Martinez. This visit began my journey with "The Clay," which has lasted now for almost 30

Where do you get your inspiration for your pieces?

The design of my work is derived from meditation and dreams.

Describe the process for creating a typical piece.


After the general design and dimensions of the piece are determined, I visualize the form, texture and finish of the piece. Once these details are set, then it takes up to four weeks to create a large piece. The work then dries for at least three weeks and is then fired. Firing determines the color of the work. Black pieces are cooled to 900 degrees in the kiln and then submerged in saw dust. I never use glazes: All shiny portions of the pieces are burnished with a smooth stone, just as was done by the Pueblos. All of my hand tools used in construction could be fabricated in the woods. I only use earthenware clay dug from a pit in Georgia.

Where do you exhibit your works?

My work is exhibited at Cutter and Cutter Fine Art located at 25 King St., St. Augustine and also in Sawgrass Village. My work is also in private collections throughout North America and Canada.

How do you enjoy spending your free time?

We have three children, eight grandchildren and four great grandchildren, so family time is one of our greatest joys. My wife Dena and I also love spending time with family in Hopetown, Abacos, Bahamas.

the Grateful Dog A story of rescue...

'Karl the grateful dog' centerpiece of effort to save seniors' dogs





Karl the grateful dog, writers Jeff Ousley and Penny Wagner insist, is no ordinary dog.

The golden lab rescue is the titular character in a series of books penned by the two authors. The first book, "Karl the Grateful Dog: A Story of Rescue" (2014), follows the fateful spring night in 2011 that Ousley was tasked with picking up the lab to transport him to a local SAFE (Saving Animals from Euthanasia) shelter in St. Augustine. Through a series of hijinks, the lovable pup manages to cause some major trouble for everyone he encounters throughout the course of the evening. But soon-to-be owner Ousley sees something worth saving in his

amber eyes and drooping head: a dog who needed love, and who wanted to give love in equal measure, whose very presence has touched the lives of many.

"We felt that it was a story that just needed to be told," Ousley said. "When it comes to rescues you're really ... giving them a second or third or fourth chance. You never know just what they've gone through."

Wagner doesn't hesitate to assign their meeting to fate. The former teacher and writer said she connected with Ousley, a touring guitar technician for Ann and Nancy Wilson of the rock band Heart, at a time when she had a lab of her own named Kingsley. When he unfortunately died, Wagner said Karl worked to erase the hole left behind.

"Karl worked to fill an empty spot at that time," she said. "I really believe it was God given."

Recognizing the healing power of animals, she and Ousley began taking Karl to others in need of love.

The certified service lab dons his vest and visits senior and nursing homes, children and friends offering a bit of the pet therapy methods that are increasingly adopted in the Northeast Florida area. Karl works in small ways just about every day, and Wagner and Ousley are determined to see his purpose to new heights.

With the support of the book series, they've set ambitions high to build a home for seniors' dogs. Wagner and Ousley realized that many of the seniors Karl visited had pets of their own – some of whom were the last of their living "family" – and unfortunately had to surrender them. Understanding the significance of giving up a furry friend, they're determined to make the home happen.

"Somewhere along the line there will be a senior home for senior dogs with Karl's name above the door," said Wagner. "We felt how much Karl meant to them...so we decided we could build a home for dogs that were surrendered from certain facilities and provide an opportunity for a safe haven for them."

Wagner also said she'd like to establish a program that helps at-risk or incarcerated youth by exposing them to the love of an animal and allowing the responsibility of its care to be an integral part of healing.

As for the not-so-distant future, Wagner feels that Karl acts as an example of kindness that everyone can emulate – and she and Ousley both hope his message is received during the most wonderful time of the year.

"People can learn so much from Karl during the holidays," Wagner said. "The purpose of the book is not to commercialize Karl but to make people experience an unconditional love that dogs surrender so easily.

"Everybody and everything needs a place to call home," she continued. "We're not looking to make money, we're looking to make a difference."

Karl's story continues

Karl's adventures don't end with book one – Ousley and Wagner have "soft-released" its sequel, "Karl the Grateful Dog: Karl in Koncert," chronicling the adventures Ousley and Karl share on the road. Most recently, an audiobook of the first story was released on Amazon and Audible featuring narration by Nancy Wilson of Heart.

Karl and Wagner will also make an appearance at St. Augustine's Barnes and Noble, located at 1930 U.S. 1 South throughout the afternoon on Sunday, Dec. 11.

at 9 Aviles St. and Dogtown at 6988 US-1, Ste. 301.



The Jacksonville Symphony will be conducted by Associate Conductor Nathan Aspinall. The program will include Bach's "Sarabande" from Partita No. 2 in D minor, Mendelssohn's "Calm Sea and Prosperous Voyage," Wieniawski's "Polonaise brillante No. 2" in A major and Maher's "Symphony No." 5 in C-sharp minor.

The concert will be presented in collaboration with the "Anne Frank: A History for Today" exhibit to be on display at the Museum of Science and History (MOSH) in January and February.

"We are honored to participate in this community initiative that gives voice to the many who were silenced," Symphony President and CEO Robert Massey said.

International series

The "Violins of Hope" international series of concerts was started by Israeli luthier Amnon Weinstein, who in 1996 was asked to restore a violin that had been played by a man interred in one of World War II's concentration camps. Weinstein – whose parents fled Europe in 1938 only to learn later of the deaths of more than 400 relatives – felt compelled to bring the violin back to life. After restoring the first violin, he actively sought out other violins that had been played in concentration camp orchestras. Thirty violins have now been restored.

Supermarket to anchor expanded shopping center featuring new fitness center, restaurant

Build-out for the new Publix is expected to start in early 2017 and be complete by 2018.

"Palencia residents and nearby retailers have expressed the need and desire to have another grocery store anchor here in the center," said Katy Figg, senior director of retail leasing for Franklin Street, which announced the lease agreement in conjunction with shopping center manager Cape Asset Management.


"Publix has been asked for by name for many years and we're proud to say we've been able to attract them to the center and take advantage of the growth in the Palencia area."


According to a statement announcing the lease





Sharks extend streak, head to state championships

After a thrilling 52-42 road win over Clay High School Dec. 2, the Ponte Vedra Sharks football team can justifiably be classified as an offensive juggernaut. With a record of 13 wins and no losses, the Sharks boast a 41 points per game scoring average. By virtue of their victory over Clay, they will play for the state championship against American Heritage on Friday in Orlando. It will be the Sharks' first time ever in the title game.

A most compelling aspect of the Sharks' potent offense is that it puts enormous pressure on opponents to match Ponte Vedra score for score to avoid falling too far behind. Adding to this pressure is the presence of a reliable field goal kicker, Chris Howard, who is capable of converting good field position into potential game winning points — a powerful weapon in close games.

Those aspects were each evident last Friday. The Sharks took the opening kickoff and needed just eight plays to score the big play, a 33-yard run to the end zone by Hal Swan. The Blue Devils answered with a 13-play drive of their own, tying matters.

The Sharks then moved in front 14-7 on a Nick Tronti five-yard keeper and this time Clay wasn't able to answer as the Shark defense stopped them on a fourth and four play from inside the PV eight-yard line.

Ponte Vedra then drove 95 yards for its third touchdown and a 21-7 lead. Swan's 29-yard run, a pass for 20 to Jake McGuire and Tronti's dash for 20 more set the stage for a 12-yard scoring

pass to McGuire.

The hosts climbed back with a quick strike to pull within 21-14, then survived a rare field goal miss by the Sharks to go to the locker room behind by just seven.

Following the Sharks' second-half kickoff, Clay drove to the PV 16 but turned the ball over on downs again when the Shark defense stiffened. Passes to Jarrett Stepp, Marshall Few and McGuire put Ponte Vedra in field goal range and Howard converted the 37-yard attempt for a 24-14 Shark lead.

Clay used 10 plays to pull within 24-21 with two minutes left in the third quarter. From here on both teams would combine for 49 more points in the final 14 minutes. Tronti connected with Stepp for a 50-yard score that the Devils quickly matched.

Clay's attempt at another on-sides kick-off failed, giving the Sharks a short field. A 10-yard completion to Kyle Barker followed by a 25-yard burst by Swan put PV up 38-28. At this point, touchdowns would come quickly. Clay scored at the five-minute mark on a 75-yard pass play, then seconds later, Tronti raced 73 yards to answer.

After Clay made it 45-42, another onside kickoff failed. Stepp recovered for the Sharks and Tronti raced 25 yards for the deciding touchdown and a 52-42 advantage. The Blue Devils threatened in the final minutes but Andrew O'Dare's interception sealed the win and a trip to Orlando for a spot in the state championship game against the





As was evident in the Clay game, Ponte Vedra indeed has all the weapons associated with an offensive juggernaut. In Tronti, they have a quarterback who is capable of dominating a game with his arm or with his feet – as he did Friday night – and the judgment to make good, instant decisions about what to do with the football in any situation. Against Clay, he completed 28 of 39 passes to seven different receivers and rushed for 244 yards on 18 carries. His 3,063 yards passing for the year is a school record that will probably stand for a long time.

In Swan, they have a dominant running back with incredible vision who is strong enough to pick up the tough yards in short yardage situations, and has the speed and ability to break tackles, make would-be tacklers miss and outrace defenders. Swan gained 112 yards on 13 carries and also caught four

passes.

In Few, JD Pirris, McGuire and Stepp, they have four quality receivers with remarkable hands and great speed, each capable of running precise routes and picking up additional yards after the catch. The four caught 19 passes for 242 yards against Clay.

In Taylor Montroy, Rob Wortelboer, Zach Lowery, Korey Johnson, Parker Shannon and Kit Connelly, they have a solid and cohesive offensive line capable of opening holes for the elusive Swan or providing critical protection for quarterback Tronti. At


center, Montroy's reliable shotgun snaps are an essential element of the Shark shotgun offense. Connelly provides the same reliability as the long snapper for Ponte Vedra's kickers while Few's good hands as the holder on field goals and PATs mitigate potential dangers.



Defensive battle goes to Broncos as Jags drop seventh straight

Denver rookie quarterback Paxton Lynch led the Broncos to a 20-10 win over the Jacksonville Jaguars Sunday at EverBank Field, but defense decided the game.

"A little bit of what we expected," Jacksonville coach Gus Bradley said. "Really two good showings by two defensive units. I thought our defense came out and played

Jaguars QB Blake Bortles was 19 of 42 for 181 yards while rushing for 29 yards. He scored on a 22-yard run in the final quarter.

The Jacksonville miscues began with the Broncos leading 10-3, Denver's Von Miller hit Bortles, causing his pass to be picked off by cornerback Bradley Roby, who returned it 51 yards for a touchdown.

The interception was the 11th returned for a score in Bortles' career, including the third in the past four weeks

"It wasn't a great throw," Bortles said. "I'll have to look at it again; (it was) probably behind him. It's kind of what we want, man coverage with A-Rob running across the field with a guy behind him, so you've

Broncos' cornerback Chris Harris picked off a pass in the second quarter and returned it 36 yards.

Denver sealed the game with a fumble recovery by Shane Ray, after Miller forced the ball from Bortles, that set up a 41-yard field goal by Brandon McManus.

Tight end Neal Sterling was the Jaguars' leading receiver against the Broncos,

finishing the game with five receptions for 53 yards, including a long reception of 17 yards.

In the second quarter, Jason Myers converted a 47-yard field goal to give the Jaguars a 3-0 lead.

The Jaguars defense held the Broncos to 206 total net yards while Lynch completed just 12 passes for 104 yards.

The Broncos' 206 total net yards were the fewest the Jaguars defense has allowed this season and the fewest since holding Baltimore to 146 total net yards in the 2011 season

With two sacks, the Jaguars defense held the Broncos to 102 net passing yards. Linebacker Telvin Smith and defensive tackle Sen'Derrick Marks each recorded a sack. Smith was tied with linebacker Paul Posluszny with a team-leading with six

For Lynch, making his second career start in place of injured regular QB Trevor Siemian, it was a homecoming of sorts.

"It was exciting to come back in front of my family and friends, too, with them being

able to watch me start in the NFL," said Lynch, who grew up in Central Florida. "I played with most of them growing up, too. It was a special moment to go out there and get my first win as a starter."

The Jaguars have lost seven in a row and host Minnesota Sunday

"We talked in the locker room about total team effort though," Bradley said. "They got three turnovers on the defensive side and we didn't get any. We had a couple drives where we were driving and then one of the interceptions took place. They made more plays than us and the turnovers were a big key."

Game notes: Lynch attended high school at Trinity Christian Academy in Deltona. Florida, which is less than two hours south of Jacksonville... Denver finished with just 206 yards – the fewest allowed by the Jaguars under Bradley...wide receiver Shane Wynn made his NFL debut against Denver. Wynn had two rushes for five yards... running back Chris Ivory, receiver Allen Hurns and tight end Julius Thomas were out due to injury... the Broncos finished the game 1-for-13 on third down.




