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Oak Bridge development to receive final verdict

County Commission vote set for May 15

The two-year controversy over the potential sale and development of the back 40 acres of the Oak Bridge Club at Sawgrass' golf course may finally reach a conclusion Tuesday, May 15, when the St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners (BCC) is scheduled to vote regarding its approval.

Originally scheduled for the BCC's Jan. 16 meeting, the final vote on the proposal was postponed by the board with a request for further information.

"There's no plan here," contended Commissioner Jay Morris at the meeting. "I know what you want to do, or what you're talking about doing, but I have no idea where it's going to go. Where are you going to locate it? Whose backyard is it going to

As a result, Alta Mar Holdings LLC, which owns the Oak Bridge Club, was forced to revise its application.

"Specifically, what they asked us for is more specificity," Alta Mar's David Miller said. "What we didn't have the first time was the location of buildings, the specific

height the buildings were going to be, so that was really the biggest thing that the commissioners asked for. The second thing they asked for was a reduction in the number of variances we were requesting. We removed the parking variance that we were requesting, and we also removed the phasing variance we requested."

According to Miller, the development of the land in question would not only improve the marketability of Oak Bridge's golf course — which he contends is in desperate need of repair — but it would also result in an increase in property values for those who reside in the Sawgrass Players Club community, which encompasses the course.

"People's homes are often their largest stow of their personal wealth," he said. "If your largest stow of personal wealth depreciated by 20 percent, because a golf course went foul in your backyard through the inaction of the BCC ... Well, that's why people are really motivated and mobilizing this time."

The controversy over the development, however, has more to do with those living outside of the Players Club than those inside it. Residents of the neighboring Hidden Oaks subdivision, which abuts the portion of the course Alta Mar wishes to sell, have expressed concerns regarding traffic

impacts and a potential decrease in their property values.

"We've always felt that the development was very intense — 330 (residential) units and 15,000 square feet of commercial," said Frank Levene, an outspoken leader among Alta Mar's opposition. "If the argument being made by the owner of the golf course is that they need to sell off that 40 acres to sustain the balance of the 12 holes. I don't think it would require 330 units. You don't need that level of money to sustain the golf course. It's profit maximizing and development opportunity, really."

Seeking an alternative solution, Levene and other detractors of the planned development had previously proposed turning the land in question into a public park instead, but due to a lack of funding and support for the idea, the group has since formed the Foundation for the Future of Ponte Vedra and refocused their mission.

"The park is still an aspiration, but there's no point in talking about solutions if you haven't got resolution around the issues being created by the proposed development," Levene said. "Our goal is to ensure that all of the questions are being asked. We thought we'd focus on the open issues that

Christ Church renovations, expansion to begin this summer

This summer, as part of a comprehensive capital campaign to secure the future of the church, Christ Episcopal Church will break ground on its planned expansion project, which will include the remodeling of some of the church's existing buildings, as well as the construction of a new Christian Formations building.

"The components of this capital building project are not intended to grow the size of our preschool and kindergarten, nor to grow substantially the size of our worship and congregation on Sunday," said Rev. Thomas Reeder, the church's rector. "The essence of this capital project is that it will enable us to be more effective with the space that we have in mission and ministry."

The church recently presented the details of its project to the Ponte Vedra Architectural Review Committee (PVARC) and the Ponte Vedra Zoning and Adjustment Board (PVZAB). The purpose of the meetings was to address the church's non-zoning variance

request to allow relief from certain Ponte Vedra Overlay District regulations as it goes forward with its expansion.

Specifically, the church requested exceptions be granted to allow: a two-story, 35-foot building to be located within 150 feet of a residentially zoned property; a two-story building to encroach less than 10 feet at the required 50-foot setback from the roadway; an auto court along Solana Road to encroach the required 20-foot buffer from the roadway by less than 10 feet; a combination of flat and pitched roofing; and the construction of a 180-foot building parallel to the roadway. Additionally, the church also requested that the requirement for an 8-foot masonry wall (or vegetation with 100 percent opacity) when a twostory building is constructed within 100 feet of a residence be waived, noting that

the residence in question belongs to the church. Ultimately, following the PVARC's recommendation, the PVZAB voted 7-0 to approve the requested variance.

Proiect Details

The first phase of the project, according to Reeder, will involve the renovation and repurposing of the church's Christian Family Center to house the Christ Church Preschool and Early Learning Program.

After the children have moved into their new building, Reeder said the church intends to demolish the old school buildings to make way for its new Christian Formations building, which will be used for classes, meetings, training, administration and the church's arts programs.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

At a St. Johns County Commission meeting earlier this year, the owners of the newly renovated Oak Bridge Golf Course asked the Commission for a slew of variances that would materially alter the landscape of A1A in Ponte Vedra Beach.

In place of six holes of golf just off A1A, the property owners want the County to approve up to 330 age-restricted single-family and multi-family units, nursing/memory care facilities and 15,000 square feet of commercial space, all adjacent to the Sawgrass Village shopping center. The owners also want the right to construct buildings longer and taller than currently allowed, plus the right to construct flat roofed structures, effectively permitting the construction of five-story buildings. And to top it off, the owners — who are actively seeking developers for the property — want the flexibility to put the buildings just about anywhere on the property, notwithstanding the proximity of several homes, apartments and A1A.

The rationale is obvious. The property is much more marketable – and valuable — with the variances in place. However, there is a price for the rest of Ponte Vedra Beach. Sawgrass Players Club, whose members overwhelmingly voted to support the new owners' plans, received a beautifully renovated golf and tennis club and a promise that the 300+ new residents and countless vendors and visitors would access the property not from Sawgrass Players Club's private road, but rather via A1A, where traffic and traffic accidents are already issues. It's a win-win for the new property owners and Sawgrass Players Club; it's another source of pain for those who live on and drive A1A every day. The result is a divided Ponte Vedra Beach reflecting the age-old Florida split between the interests of gated and non-gated communities.

The owners were represented by an attorney at the commission meeting. She was quick to reference setbacks and buffers between the proposed 58-foot tall structures and adjacent neighborhoods. She also cited hotels (Sawgrass Marriott and Hilton Garden Inn) and certain office buildings that are located on or adjacent to Sawgrass Village shopping center as examples of other buildings receiving height variances. To a few sneers, the attorney tried to sell the idea that 55-year-olds don't drive that much and that 300 of the proposed residences had already been approved by a county plan originating from the 1970s. She

explained these points without providing context, however.

First, the hotels and office buildings used as examples of present variances are set far back of A1A (see attached aerial view). They also don't block the views of neighboring residences. Second, the attorney did not have traffic, storm water, environmental or hurricane preparedness studies for the requested development parameters. Third, a recent modification to the development plan states affirmatively that the new owners want permission to put the tallest and longest of the proposed buildings just 80 feet off of A1A, when similar buildings in Sawgrass Village are more than three times as far away from A1A. And finally, the attorney could not assure the commissioners that the proposed setbacks would protect the views of adjacent homeowners or that vast areas of current green space would not become parking lots. Indeed, the recent

plan modifications show between 270 to 280 parking spaces spread throughout the subject parcel.

To their credit, the commissioners recognized the foregoing faults at the January meeting, but provided a lifeline to the owners of Oak Bridge by promising a future opportunity to provide more specifics. That opportunity is scheduled for May 15 at another public meeting. The question is "Why?" The owners of Oak Bridge are not the developers, and they bought the property knowing what restrictions were placed upon it. It is not the community's obligation to make a property owner's investment more valuable or marketable. If variances are necessary, make the actual developer of the property apply for them. Let the developer explain his or her ideas to the community. It's the only way to assure that the plans so carefully put in place by the community to protect their neighborhoods are upheld in a manner agreeable to the community.

St. Johns County announces 2018 polling places

According to the office of St. Johns County Supervisor of Elections Vicky Oakes, polling places for the fall elections have been finalized for St. Johns County's 46 precincts.

Primary elections will be held Aug. 28, with the general election to follow on Nov. 6. As 12 precincts will be sharing voting locations, there will be 38 total polling places open on election dates for voting. Most St. Johns County voters will continue to vote at the same location they voted at in 2016; however, four polling places were unavailable this year or required changes due to growth. Only one location is in the Ponte Vedra area: Precinct 405.

There are currently two precincts (403 and 405) voting at the Ponte Vedra Presbyterian Church on Palm Valley Road. Due to growth in the Nocatee area, voters that live in Nocatee on the north side of Nocatee Parkway, as well as those living in the Sawmill Lakes subdivision, will now vote at the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall at 1050 A1A North in Ponte Vedra Beach. Voters in precinct 403 will continue to vote at the church.

Can you please tell us about your background?

I grew up in Malone, New York, which is as far north as you can get in the state of New York. It's about three hours north of Albany or Syracuse. I grew up on the first hole of the Malone Golf Club, which is now today a 36-hole, semi-private facility. About 10 percent of the town's population were members of the club there. I worked there for the majority of my career, and then I moved down to Jersey City, New Jersey, and I managed Liberty National Golf Club, host of the 2017 Presidents Cup. It also hosted the 2009 and 2013 Barclays FedEx Playoffs. Last December, I moved down here to start managing TPC Sawgrass in lovely Ponte Vedra Beach.

What makes TPC Sawgrass so special?

The course was designed to challenge the world's best golfers. It sets up to not favor any particular shot. And the fan experience here that THE PLAYERS produces is really second to none. With Tiger coming back this year, it's going to be extra special for those who attend and get a glimpse of him and all the other great players. It's just a wonderful venue that not only challenges the best players in the world but just a great stadium for all the fans to watch that great play.

What does it mean for TPC Sawgrass and THE PLAYERS for Tiger Woods to be coming to town?

It's very exciting, not only for the fans but for the players who are going to play. I think all the Tour players will tell you they love playing when Tiger's in the field. You hear the stories from the young players today who idolize Tiger. And he's still playing very, very well. I think it's maybe a little bit of a "David and Goliath" story.

What are you most looking forward to with the tournament in your first year as general manager?

I've been to this tournament as a spectator. It was a great experience then, and now, I'm looking forward to working with our 350 team members and 2,000 volunteers. I'm looking forward to seeing our team execute on months and months of planning to deliver a great experience, not only for the fans but the players themselves. This is the home of the PGA Tour. We're here to serve the Tour players. It's our biggest stage.

What does it take to prepare for the tournament?

It's about a 120-day buildout, which means building all the structures and temporary structures that go on here. Preparation for that is with the structures, the cable crossings for all the TV that will be here, repurposing of all our permanent structures, etc. That all begins to unfold about 120 days out. It's staged over those 120 days right out to the first tee shot. In 2019, THE PLAYERS moves up from May to March, so we're going to have an accelerated turnaround. It's going to a new ballgame for many of us. We're going to be overseeding this November. That closes the Stadium Course for about 20 days. That's going to be new for our agronomy team. All of our other planning and special events we've held in March now need to move because of THE PLAYERS. We have to orchestrate those calendars to make it work in 2019.

The people here are so nice. It reminds me a lot of Malone, New York, where you have those small hometown values. I keep thanking my team here for welcoming me at TPC Sawgrass. They've made my wife and myself feel right at home, and it hasn't been a big adjustment in that

regard, where I need to learn a whole new way of living. It just seems to be like coming back home. The cherry on top is the weather. The Northeast has had a cold and long winter, and I picked a good year to come south.

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
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

Happy Mother's Day



Consider financial gifts for your adult children

Mother's Day is almost here. If you're a mother with grown children, you might receive flowers, candy, dinner invitations or some other type of pleasant recognition.

However, you might find that you can get more enjoyment from the holiday by giving, rather than receiving. The longest-lasting gifts may be financial ones — so here are a few moves to consider:

■ Contribute to your child's IRA. If your children have earned income, they are eligible to contribute to an IRA, which offers tax benefits and an almost unlimited array of investment options. You can't contribute directly to another person's IRA, but you can write your child a check for that purpose. This could be a valuable gift, as many people can't afford to contribute the maximum yearly amount,

which, in 2018, is \$5,500, or \$6,500 for those 50 or older.

■ Give gifts of stock. You know your children pretty well, so you should be familiar with the products they buy. Why not give them some shares of stock in the companies that make these products? Your children will probably enjoy being "owners" of these companies, and if they weren't that familiar with how the financial markets work, having these shares in their possession may greatly expand their knowledge and lead to an even greater interest in investing.

■ Donate to a charity in your child's name. You might want to donate to a charitable organization that your child supports. In years past, such a donation might have earned you a tax deduction, but the new tax laws, which include a

much higher standard deduction, may keep many people from itemizing. Still, it's possible for a charitable gift to provide you with a tax benefit, depending on your age. If you're 70½ or older, you must start taking withdrawals from your traditional IRA and your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored plan, but by moving the withdrawal directly to a qualified charitable group, the money won't count as part of your adjusted gross income, so, in effect, you can get a tax

■ Review your estate strategy. Like virtually all parents, you'd probably like to be able to leave some type of legacy to your children, and possibly your grand-children, too. So, if you haven't already started working on your estate strategy, consider using Mother's Day as a launching point. At the very least, you'll want to

break from your generosity.

write your will, but you may need much more than that, such as a living trust, a durable power of attorney and other documents.

And don't forget to change the beneficiary designations on your life insurance and retirement accounts if you've experienced a major life change, such as divorce or remarriage. These designations are powerful and can even supersede whatever instructions you might have left in your will. As you can guess, estate planning can be complex, so you almost certainly will want to work with a legal professional to get your arrangements in order.

Mother's Day is a good opportunity for your children to show their love for you, and you can do the same for them by helping bolster their long-term security through financial gifts and legacy planning.



Rotary Club of PVB Sunset awards scholarships to Nease's Briana Howard, PVHS' Harrison Snowden

The Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach Sunset recently awarded scholarships to two local students as part of its Service Above Self scholarship program.

Brianna Howard was chosen as the 2018 Service Above Self Scholarship recipient at Nease High School, while Harrison Snowden was chosen as the recipient at Ponte Vedra High School. Each student received \$1,000 toward their college education.

Howard was recognized for achieving a high level of academic success, including a class rank of 11 with a GPA of 4.68. She has served her community with more than 1,800 service hours during her high school years.

Howard has served as vice president and president of the Nease Interact Club, and hosted numerous fundraisers that helped members of the community. Through Howard's leadership, the number of members in the Interact Club increased from 10 to 70 students. With her leadership, the Nease High School Interact Club was awarded the prestigious Zone 34 Award (covering Florida and Southern Georgia) for outstanding service at the southern regional Rotary Club Conference.

Howard has volunteered in the area arts community, working with children at the Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach, and serving as vice president of the Florida Federation of Music Clubs, where she assisted with organizing regional and state competitions for orchestral instrumentalists. From her love of music, Howard helped start the Vibrato Music Group, where music is taught, concerts are performed and the mentoring of children and the elderly about elementary musical studies is reinforced.

"The humble notion of making a bit of a difference to mankind remains the primary reason why I serve," said Howard.

Snowden maintains a 4.73 GPA while ranked No. 2 in his class. He has served nearly 1,700 hours throughout his high school career.

He also earned the rank of Eagle Scout by selecting a nontraditional project focused on issues of tolerance and community building. He became interested in these issues after attending a week-long program call Metrotown. This program was organized by nonprofit organization OneJax, which gathered a diverse group of high school students across Jacksonville and engaged them in activities and discussions to promote respect and understanding. Subsequently, Snowden started Metrotown-In-A-Day, which is now an ongoing event. Snowden has also volunteered and encouraged other friends to volunteer at Arbor Terrace Ponte Vedra.

Snowden's most essential contribution to the community is his involvement in serving local domestic abuse victims. He established a fundraiser called Teens Take a Stand, which consists of

a benefit concert and silent auction. Through his leadership and countless hours, he produced, directed and co-hosted the 3-hour show that benefited area domestic violence centers. In the last two years, Snowden has raised more than \$30,000 to help victims of domestic abuse.

"If I am only for myself, who am I?" said Snowden.

To be eligible for the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach Sunset Service Above Self scholarship, a student must be a junior or senior in good standing at Nease High School or Ponte Vedra High School. The student should be planning to attend a four-year college, a two-year college, a trade school or a vocational/technical school with a program of study of one year or longer. Immediate relatives of Rotarians are not eligible for this scholarship.

Additional changes will include the addition of a welcoming Connections Center to the church's existing administration building, as well the renovation and slight expansion of Cooper Chapel. Currently, the chapel seats 55 people, but the church is looking to add roughly 20 to 25 more seats.

"We have two large worship spaces here on campus," Reeder explained. "We have a traditional sanctuary that seats 600, and we have a contemporary worship space in our parish hall that seats maybe 250 or 300, so our chapel is the small intimate choice for people that prefer that. So, we're not trying to make our chapel huge, we're just trying to make it a little more user-friendly."

To tie everything together and make

the campus more cohesive as a whole, the church also intends to add a garden courtyard in the middle of the campus and an outdoor gathering area adjacent to its new chapel and memorial garden. Despite these changes, Reeder said Christ Church has no desire to add to its current campus footprint.

"We want to be good neighbors," he explained. "We want the neighbors to feel at home here, even if they don't go to church here — heck, even if they aren't Christian."

Selected through a competitive bidding process, the architectural firm that designed the plans for the project was Jacksonville-based ELM — Ervin Lovett Miller. Having previously worked on other local projects, like Sawgrass Village, Christ Church staff felt ELM was the perfect fit for the job, and ELM couldn't have agreed more.

"Christ Episcopal Church's campus

renovation is one of those truly inspirational legacy projects that has a profound positive effect on so many present and future lives," said Russ Ervin of ELM. "This is such a unique opportunity to serve a residentially-integrated community church and the neighborhood in which it resides."

With construction on the overall project expected to be completed by 2020, Reeder said the church was grateful for the help of county staff throughout the approval process and is looking forward to continuing its role as a central part of the Ponte Vedra Beach community.

"The bottom line of what Christ Church is about is calling people to Jesus Christ who don't know Jesus and taking the ones who are here who already know Jesus and getting them closer to him," he said. "We're trying to make more and better disciples of Jesus Christ, but we have to do that in ways that respect where we are and the neighbors that we have."

are caused from the development being put forward, like the absence of a traffic study. We were also very disappointed by the (maximum building) height — 58 feet is very concerning for a lot of us living close by."

Miller, who turned down the group's offer of \$6 million to purchase the land, said he wasn't surprised by the lack of enthusiasm within the Sawgrass Players Club for the addition of a public park.

"Right now, they're a gate-guarded community," he said. "You have to give your name and they capture your license plate when you come through the gate. They're not at all keen on the idea of having the public ingress into their community."

As for traffic concerns, Miller said he thought it unlikely that the addition of a 55-plus, age-restricted community would add more traffic to A1A than a public park.

"The frontrunner to buy the property is Vicar's Landing, as everybody knows, and they've done their own internal traffic analysis of their residents," he said. "It's just absolutely negligible, the impact that such a community has on the broader traffic issues of A1A."

With the BCC's final vote fast approaching, supporters on both sides of the issue are now rallying to make their voices heard while they still can. But while they may disagree on the specifics of how, both those for and against the development seem able to agree on one thing: The stakes are high.

The BCC hearing will take place in the St. Johns County Auditorium located at 500 San Sebastian View in St. Augustine. The Oak Bridge item will go before the County Commission no sooner than 2 p.m. Ponte Vedra Recorder · May 10, 2018 COMMUNITY NEWS 21

If you've been to THE PLAYERS numerous times, you already have your favorite spots to sit and holes to watch. But if you're new to the tournament or you want to try a couple of new viewing areas, you might want to glance through our all-star locations. There are a few tweaks to the course this year: nothing to throw you off your game but things you'll want to know and avoid.

My information is based on first-hand experience. In the more than 300 PGA Tour events I've attended as a member of the media in the last I'm-not-going-to-say-how-many years, I've had about every problem you can have on a golf course. I've been trapped by bad gallery roping with no way out countless times, harassed by marshals who wouldn't let me go where I knew I was allowed to go and gotten crushed by antsy crowds from coast-to-coast. I once broke an ankle behind the 8th green at The Olympic Club. If you've ever been there, you know why. That hole should be banned!

There are good ways and bad ways to watch golf. Do you want to stand on the side of the fairway where the sun is

in your eyes, or do you want the shady side of things? And because several holes come together at TPC Sawgrass in many places, you can take shortcuts or circle back to see another group.

Some people like to watch the first or tenth tee shots, and those are both easy to do at TPC Sawgrass. My dad liked to do that at The Memorial a couple of times. He had a small folding stool and binoculars, and, no lie, he would sit by the tee and take out the binoculars to see what ball the players were using. He'd study the drivers, watch the tee shot, and, I

guess, pick up the balls as they got to the fairway. He was a little golf-possessed, but there's nothing wrong with that. He won his club championship six times and still has the course record even though he's been deceased for several years. (To be fair, my mother was also a club champ. Twice.)

FRONT NINE

This year, there are a few small changes starting right at the first hole. The tee now has no bleachers. However, the PGA Tour has made a little bit more of a hill behind it, so there's a little more slope to stand on. Honestly, I tried it out

last year, when the hill was small, and it was great. If you only want to see one or two players, you can probably slither in, watch their shots and then slither out. If you want to watch Tiger Woods or Phil Mickelson, you'll have to get there a few groups early.

There's a shortcut language to knowing where to go. It's pretty simple: left or right side of the hole. At THE PLAYERS, it's left on the first five holes. And sometimes it's smart to go right to the landing area and skip the tee shot.

Here's a tip to speed you on your way. As soon as you hear a tee shot being hit, you can walk for 30 seconds. Then stop and wait for the next tee shot. It works on second shots, too. But do NOT move when a guy takes his putting stance until after he hits the ball. Golf is all about courtesy to all the players.

On the 1st, even from 30 yards away from the green, you can see the putts, depending on where the pin is. Worst case, you can see the reaction of the golfer, and you'll know if it was miss or make.

Skip ahead to the middle of the 2nd hole. There are plenty of mounds for standing. You can see the tee shots land and second shots hit. Walk up a little to watch bunker shots and putts.

After that, if you are following a particular player, your best bet is to go around the 3rd tee to the slope left of the hole.

You can go behind No. 2 green and walk down right of the 3rd. But if you do that, you can get trapped when players leave the hole and go to No. 4 tee. You will have to wait while players, caddies, TV people and scorers get to go ahead. It's a bit of a bottleneck. If you are watching Tiger or Phil, definitely take the left side, not the right.

At No. 4, give up the tee shot and hike half or three quarters of the way down to see where the tee shots land and how the approach shots are hit. Players aren't hitting booming drives anyway. It's a layup hole unless you are nuts. Walk a few more paces for putts. They have supposedly made that hill left of No. 4 a little lower so it's an easier walk.

Give up the drive on No. 5 because the tee is now so far back it's practically in Nassau County. If you really want to walk back there, circle back of No. 4 green and you'll see it. I think you'll change your mind.

The 5th is a little hilly, like the 4th, but go on up to where the second shots land. You can cross over to the right side of the hole there, but I don't recommend it. I've found that the mounds on the right side block your view of half of the green. The left has plenty of areas to watch from, and you can watch the putts from there,

too. In addition, they've added some mounding back of No. 5 green for better viewing.

Here's a bonus: There's a variety of food and beverage options behind the 5th and left of the 9th. If you can't get happy with refreshments in those places, you can't get happy.

The next group of holes is right on the 6th, right on the 7th, left on the 8th and left on the 9th.

Before the 6th, you have to make your first big decision. Do you really want to walk the 6th and 7th? Or do you want to take a break and let them play two holes and come to you on the 7th green?

Once you go down the 6th, you are committed. There's no way back except by going forward. If you go to the 6th and 7th, beware of the bottleneck between the two holes. You don't want to be right of No. 6 green when Tiger Woods is playing the hole. We might have to send a search party after you. You could scoot ahead to the back of 6th green and as soon as the putt drops, get over to the 7th early to see the tee shots. Unfortunately, the marshals are pretty quick with those ropes, and you can easily get blocked.

If you take the 6th and 7th, you have an easy shot to the 8th tee. There's a mound behind it with excellent viewing of the tee shots.

There is also a bleacher behind No. 8 green. You can watch car crash golf all

day from there. That green is unhittable and unholdable. If golf balls bled, the green and surrounding area would be crimson.

BACK NINE

The 9th is another hole where I let them do their thing off the tee while I take the cart path and walk up to the second shots.

However, the 9th has a great shortcut to the 18th and 17th. Take the crosswalk that's in front of the tee area, and you'll end up by the 18th tee. It might be perfect for you. You can sit and watch disasters and brilliant shots all day.

If you do it the traditional way and walk all the way down the 9th, there's supposed to be new mounding behind No. 9 green. There's also more food and beverages.

The next holes are right at 10th, right at 11th, right at 12th, green at 13th and right at 14th

You'll have quite a walk from the 9th to the 10th tee, but once there, the best place to see the tee shot is either on the mound to the right of the tee, or on the mound that's behind the tee. Then, it's the right side of that hole to the green. Don't go behind the green. You'll get stuck and have to wait for groups of golfers to go to the 11th tee.

Look right when you are halfway up



the 10th hole, and you'll see the 11th fairway. That's your next target. You'll be able to see tee shots land on the 11th, but you can only see the actual tee shots if you walk back another par three. Once again, the tee is back, back, back, back ... basically in the Publix parking lot.

The 11th is a great watching hole. From the right side, you can see the drives land, see the second shots hit and see the putts, as you stroll down the cart path or grass on the right.

To reward you for going to the 12th tee, there's a food and beverage bonanza in the shade between the 11th green, 12th tee, 14th green and 15th tee. Tacos on 12 from TacoLu is hard to pass up. Lots of your friends will probably be there. You'll also find Candy Apple Café, Hawkers Asian Street Fare, Mojo Kitchen and Zoe's Kitchen.

They modified 12 green again this year. The green slope was so severe last year that balls bounced off of it and into the water. Complaints ensued. They have now raised the surface of the green on the left-hand side to solve that. However, there is still a bleacher area, and it was so popular they added another one behind it that faces the 13th green. It's an excel-

lent area to watch scoring nightmares, point and moan when there's a disaster. And the 12th should have lots of birdies because it's so short.

Now, I've been assured there's a bridge you can take along the left side of 12 to get to the green on 12, but there's probably zero way a Tiger Woods-sized crowd could get over this bridge in any kind of hurry. I'm serious. I would just avoid it. If you are determined, try it on Tuesday or Wednesday and see how it works to see if you can handle it on Sunday.

I tend to find my way up to the 12th and 13th greens by way of the grassy area between the right side of 12 and the right side of the 14th. In fact, I'll walk backwards up the 14th to get to the 13th green if necessary, or take the shortcut across the 11th tee and access that area from there.

Don't even worry about the 13th tee. There are some places you don't have to go, and that's one of them.

The 14th is a tough go. Once again, I say skip the tee shot unless you get stuck in the gallery behind the 13th. The tee area is small, and just wiggling your nose is enough to bother a player's tee shot in that location. It's traditionally one of the two hardest holes. You have to barely breathe because you never want to cost a golfer a shot with something you do. Never.

After the tee shots are hit, take the cart path on the right side of the 14th to the landing area. Make sure you preserve a view of the green. If you get too close to the green, it gets hard to see the putts.

Now on the last four holes, there are a bunch of choices. On the 15th, you can go right or left with two different outcomes. If you want to see the hole and see the tee shots of a particular group you are following on the 16th, take the right.

If you go left, you can get stuck before you get to the green. Your only way out is to go backwards over to the 16th hole and do a crossover and then walk backwards toward the tee. By the time you do that, the tee shots will be hit. So, if seeing those shots is important to you, go right at the 15th.

After the 15th hole, take the cart path that brings you out by the 16th tee. From there, take the cart path on the right of the 16th to the crossover, and you'll end up on the left side of 16.

If you continue down the right side of the 16th, you'll get trapped behind the crowd at the 17th, and believe me, there's little room to even get on that hill behind the island green. You'll be stuck.

If you take the left side of the 15th for tee shots, you can watch a part of the hole, and cross back into the woods to the left side of the 16th. You'll come out somewhere near where golfers hit their second or third shots. You'll be able to see the 16th green and the side of the 17th green from there.

I like to find my way to the left side of the 16th hole, see where the tee shots land, watch the approaches and putts, or disasters, and then watch the 17th from there or follow around the left side of the 17th and up and behind the 18th tee and on to the finish.

Now, sometimes what you think is the best place to watch might not be. For instance, late on Sunday, the best place to watch the final hole might be across the pond, on the hillside that is actually to the right of the 9th green. There's a hospitality platform there, but there's still grass someplace unless they've "hospitalitied" the whole thing down to the water. It's worth checking early in the week to see if you like that location.

In that area, you won't be looking directly into the sun on Sunday when the last putt drops like you would be if you were on the right side of the 18th hole. You can see the second shots from across the pond, and you can see the final putt. To get there, you can take the crossover back from behind the 18th tee to the 9th hole, stay on the right side of the 9th and you'll be in the right place to watch the finish. Again, check it a day or two in advance to see if you like it.


17th, 16th, 18th green, 3rd, 11th, 10th, 4th.

SHORTCUTS

- 1-5 and 9th. Sometimes, if I only want a flavor of what's happening and don't need to see every shot, I'll do No. 1-5 and then skip ahead to No. 9 by cutting through that area behind five.
- 3rd to 5th to 9th. You can skip the first two holes and start at the 3rd. Then do the holes through the 5th, and skip over through the woods to the 9th. This is handy if you want to watch two different players who are a few groups apart. Or if you are hungry. There's food there. And then you can even cross over to the back nine.
- **9th to 5th.** You can start at the 9th green and walk backwards to the 5th to catch a group.
- 9th crossover to 18th. Walk backwards down 9th and cross over to 18th and 17th.
- **10th to 12th to 13th and 14th.** After the 10th, go near the 11th tee and take the crossover to the 12th and 13th greens.
- 10th to 11th to 15th to 16th. Start at the 10th and do the 11th, then walk over the mound behind 11 green and you'll be on the right side of the 15th hole that takes you back up to a location under the 16th tee.
- **10th tee to 16th.** Start near the 10th tee and take a right on the cart path to the right of the 16th tee. Take the cart path on the right side of the 16th to the cross-walk that gets you halfway down the 16th.

FREEBIE AT THE END

The 18th will have folding chairs to sit on, and if you are in one of them when the tournament finishes on Sunday, you can take that chair home with you. Serious. How about that? You must wait for the last putt to drop. Then it's yours.



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Simple golf ideas gone wild

In 2018, there are some significant improvements in golf products, and, as usual, there's a proverbial plethora of products to help golfers get better at the game.

This season brings more trampoline for the driver and fairway woods, hot orange and yellow golf balls and so many other colors you could match them to outfits. There's a mini TrackMan-like device you can afford, tablets that read your putting stroke and shoes that measure your weight transfer. It's technological craziness. It's ideas gone wild.

With THE PLAYERS Championship this weekend, here are a few of those new products you may find in your nearest pro shop or online after the tournament inspires you to improve your game.

Bring the High Heat

Let's start with the new trampolining driver, and its cousins, the fairway wood and hybrid, called High Heat 257+(www.knuthgolf.com).

We mentioned High Heat last year, but this new design might be the biggest thing in golf you'll never hear about because High Heat doesn't have a big advertising budget like TaylorMade or Callaway.

The new High Heat 257+ takes advantage of a measurement change the USGA made for different parts of the club face, according to Dean Knuth, inventor of High Heat clubs. Instead of just defining trampolining for the center of the club, the USGA now allows more trampolining for the heel and toe.

This is big because, let's face it, how often do average golfers actually hit the center of the face of the driver or fairway woods? Almost never. So, they don't get the benefit or power of a center hit. They never know where the ball is going to hit on the clubface. Average golfers just hope for contact.

Now, Knuth is no stranger to golf or the USGA regulations. He was a senior executive at the USGA, and he created the slope system in golf. Immediately, he was christened the Pope of Slope. But after he left the USGA, he started High Heat.

When Knuth saw this regulation change, he went, "Aha!" He understood what it meant and what benefit it could provide for golfers. Then he went to work on a titanium clubface that has three separate bouncy parts instead of one. It's like three trampolines, one in the center area, and an even bouncier part for the toe and heel. But it's one seamless face. It's a breakthrough in engineering and materials know-how.

The result? More measurable bounce off the entire clubface for the driver, the fairway wood and the hybrid, particularly the heel and toe hits. It's something designed specifically for the average golfer who specializes in offcenter hits. It puts more oomph in the effort.

The way the USGA previously measured the clubface bounce or trampoline effect was Coefficient of Restitution or COR, but they changed it to Characteristic Time, which gives a measurement in microseconds.

To put it in simpler language, High Heat 257+ has 257 CT in the center of the club and 266 CT on the heel and toe surfaces because the USGA now allows it. That's significantly more than other golf clubs. More is now ok, and more is preferred.

Unfortunately, you can't go to the PGA Superstore or Edwin Watts to buy or test High Heat. You can get them online, but it might be worth a drive over to The Villages where High Heat does several demo days each year.

Track ball flight for less

While the High Heat clubface is an innovation in clubface design, there's a new, modestly priced ball flight tracker that provides information on shots and mimics the abilities of TrackMan.

A tad larger than a garage door opener, this new device tracks the golf ball and provides information on carry distance, clubhead speed, ball speed, vertical launch angle, spin, height and flight time. And it can transmit the data to a phone or tablet. If a golfer takes video of his/her swing, it can superimpose the data onto that.

It's called mevo, it's made by FlightScope and it costs

Until now, this kind of technology had cost around \$2,500 and went up to \$15,000. TrackMan goes for \$19,000 for an indoor version and \$25,000 for outdoors.

With mevo, golfers pair their phone or tablet to the mevo device using the app. A golfer puts a sticker on the ball, hits and moments later, mevo can spit out stats on the screen with video of that swing.

mevo uses doppler radar to measure the clubhead and the ball separately. The mevo device fits in a pocket or purse and has a handy, flip out stand so one can set it up nearly anywhere.

A ball with a chip?

OnCore, the company that made the ball with the hollow metal core. is getting ready to put a chip inside a ball that supposedly can be used for on-course play.

It will have a Bluetooth communications device inside that will communicate with a phone. The company plans to call it Genius. OnCore is trying to crowdsource the money to build more of them, and the company currently anticipates product to be shipped this

Hopefully the big

ball companies will follow suit quickly. Many would be willing to pay more than the price of a premium ball if it meant always being able to find it and not wasting time looking for balls in the rough. Talk about a pace of play improvement.

OnCore does make other balls, and one of them, a low compression (86) Elixr, made the Golf Digest hot list for 2017. The company also has a lower compression (80) metal core ball called Caliber and a still lower compression (65) ball called Avant made for slower swing speeds, although many long hitters like the softer, low compression golf eggs.

Elixr is \$35 per dozen; Avant is \$20 per dozen; and Caliber, with the metal core, is \$30 per dozen.

Putt Breaks

Are you a great reader of greens, or does the idea of plumb bobbing and figuring out slopes drive you nuts? If it's the latter, you may want to investigate a new phone app called Putt Breaks.

The idea is simple, although the technology isn't. But that didn't stop GolfLogix founder Pete Charleston from creating it. The Putt Breaks phone app shows every break on every green, and that should help golfers save some strokes.

Equipment

GolfLogix up to now has mainly been a GPS course mapping service for golfers. Putt Breaks, the company's newest addition, gives golfers superior information on how to read greens by showing the break of the terrain based on where the ball is sitting on the green. It doesn't show a track for the putt, but it does show arrows that indicate where the ball will go from any spot on the green.

According to Charleston, Approach View on the app even helps golfers plan



where to land the approach shot, based on the break of the green. It will work for golfers using the Golf Logix GPS app or if they are using a rangefinder and not the GPS app.

In addition, according to Charleston, those who are already members of GolfLogix get unlimited access to Putt Breaks. Golf Logix's other services include GPS for courses, green fee deals and some extras. Putt Breaks is \$4.49 per month or \$29.99 for 12 months.



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Inventors behind the great golf inventions

Every year, it seems, there are more and more new products from the fertile minds of people who think about ways to improve things in and around golf. The assortment grows every season, almost exponentially. Golf inventors are just plain and unstoppable forces of nature.

Here are a few stories of those inventors and their products as THE PLAYERS Championship takes Ponte Vedra Beach by storm.



Jack Grace shoes

He was a banker, who liked shoes. He just wanted to make something really fashion-forward for himself. He cut up old shoes and designed something in the kitchen like a lot of inventors do. Finally, he got someone to make the shoes for him. His friends liked them, so he continued to work on the project, and soon it

After a while, the business became so successful that he and his wife Erinn quit their day jobs to focus on what became Jack Grace shoes.

Here's how it works: Golfers buy the base shoe with a saddle in one color. Then, they buy saddles in different patterns and colors. There are 25 basic colors, and there are printed saddles with fish, sharks, paisleys, plaids, ginghams, Norwegian or Canadian flags, college logos and more. If someone buys several saddles, they give that person a break on the price.

The shoes are not expensive by golf shoe standards. They're \$160 in black, white or gray. And there's an option to buy a shoe plus a group of four saddles, sometimes themed, for \$260. There's also a starter bundle with the shoe and three saddles for about \$230. Saddles can be bought separately or in bundles. Single saddles alone are \$40 each.

The saddles attach with special, small magnets that snap onto the sides of the shoes, making changing them out fast, easy and fun.

As Walker pointed out, he would never spend the money to buy new golf shoes to change his look. But new saddles? No


Eye-Putt-Pro

If you're having trouble with your putting, it might be what your eyes are seeing or what position they are in before you

Most putting experts will tell you that you should have your eyes right over the ball. Whether yours are there or not is testable by taking your putting stance and then without moving anything else, dropping a coin from where your eyes are to see where it lands. If it lands on the ball, your eyes are in the right place.

While that's good for diagnosing the problem, it's not good for fixing it. However, Casey Schiel, a PGA pro in Denver, came up with a small level and mirror system that lets you check where your eyes are and practice putting with them stationed over the ball in the right place. If you have not tried this before, it can be a little disconcerting to see eyes reflecting from your putter, but you'll just have to trust that it works. Pretty soon, muscle memory kicks in and you'll be putting with the right eye alignment.

The Eye Putt Pro attaches with adhesive strips or magnets, and there are extra adhesives for you in the package. It's \$19.95 at golf shops, via www.eyeputtpro.com or on Amazon.com.



Acu-Strike mat

Low Tech Swing Analysis

While many are focused on high-tech solutions to analyze a golf swing, the Acu-Strike golf mat uses old-fashioned golf teaching methods to show golfers what they are doing with their swing by showing the swing path at impact.

The mat itself is a green fabric with a surface on it that behaves like velvet. It has what is called a nap. When smoothed one way, it is a light color, and when smoothed the other way, it is a darker

When a golfer puts a ball on the Acu-Strike mat and hits or even makes a swing without the ball and strikes the mat, there's no confusion as to what the swing path is. The surface of the mat changes from light green to a darker green to trace the path of the clubhead.

Golfers are also able to see if the swing path is straight, inside out or outside in. Golfers are able to tell if they are hitting the ball too early or too late. It gives golfers verifiable information for each swing in a low-tech way. Acu-Strike won't correct a swing, but it gives a starting point for making a swing better.

The inventor, Mark Seiver, came up with the idea after recalling that his mother, who became a club champ, used to say, "If I could only see what my clubhead was doing when it came in contact with the ball." Now, it's possible to do that without spending a fortune.

Acu-Strike comes in indoor and outdoor versions. The outdoor mat is 19 x 10 inches and is yours for just \$39.95. The indoor version has a pad underneath and is \$49.95. There's a \$5 saving if you buy both at the same time. For more information, visit acustrikegolf.com/ golf-shop-store.

Planning and Zoning Agency recommends approval of major modification request for Panera Bread in PVB

The St. Johns County Planning and Zoning Agency (PZA) voted unanimously last Thursday, May 3, to recommend approval of a a major modification request to the Fairfield at Ponte Vedra Planned Unit Development (PUD) that would pave the way for a new Panera Bread restaurant in Ponte Vedra Beach.

Casey Keough of the St. Johns County Growth Management Department presented the request, followed by land planner Karen Taylor and Hamilton Williams of GreenbergFarrow. The proposed location of the restaurant is in the Ponte Vedra Point Shopping Center, where Pet Supermarket, Tire Kingdom and Beach Diner currently stand. The proposal and site maps indicate that the Panera will be freestanding and situated along A1A where parking is now available.

The applicant's request allows for additional square footage for the construc-

tion of a 3,100-square-foot Panera Bread location, a parking regulations update to meet the current Land Development Code requirements of one space per three seats for restaurants and four waivers to the Land Development Code, to allow for



Let it rain: Kathy Nyman and Rain Girl Golf Wear

Kathy Nyman, founder of Rain Girl golf wear, has the entrepreneurial personality.

She's always had it, even when she didn't know she had it. How do you tell? When she wants to do something, she finds out how to do it, and she does it. That's the litmus test. She's Elon Musk or Richard Branson on a smaller scale. Instead of rockets and airplanes, she's making rainwear for women. But who is to say that she won't be the next women's clothing magnate?

Nyman started playing golf when she was in high school in Tampa. Pretty soon, she decided to walk on to the high school team where she played for two years. In college at Florida State, she did the same thing.

Nyman was redshirted her freshman year and by her last year, she had a full scholarship. She played at Florida State as Kathy Grant, for those Florida State alums in the area.

"I won my very last collegiate tournament, the Metro Conference, which was the last year we were in the Metro Conference at Florida State," she explained. "I won that by about eight strokes."

She wasn't bragging when she said it. She was just stating a fact. And it was while playing golf that she got inspired to start a company for women's rain gear.

As collegiate golfers do, she progressed in the sport and turned pro, soon deciding she wanted to become a member of the LPGA Teaching division. She was an assistant at The Plantation to Bobby Duval.

All professionals who are members of the LPGA or PGA of America — even those who are not touring pros — must be able to perform at a certain level on the course. They take what is called a Playing Ability Test (PAT) to earn their LPGA or PGA status

Nyman's PAT was a 36-hole event, and in the middle of it, it started to rain. However, it was hot where she was, and the last thing she wanted to do was put on a heavy-duty rain suit.

That's when she had her "Aha!" mo-

When she finished the 36 holes, she started looking for rainwear for women. She found a supplier who had what she wanted, but they did not sell in the U.S. She asked one of the members at the club where she worked to help her cut up some men's rain pants and turn them into a claim

"She offered to buy me a rain suit, but I explained I already had rain pants," Nyman said.

She just didn't want to wear them. One reason was, really, vanity.

"Rain pants are frumpy, and I'm short, so I never look good in rain pants," she said. "So, I went on a mission to make something that would be kind of quiet and attractive."

The beginning

It was 2012. That's where the journey began.

"I registered the name in March of 2013," she noted about Rain Girl. "So, 2013 was sort of prototyping and searching for a manufacturer, and then I got my first shipment in 2014, in February. Just the skirts."

Along the way she had to learn about water-resistant and waterproof standards in the clothing industry. Rain Girl clothing is a waterproof polyester.


"It's Teflon-coated so it makes it a lot softer," she explained. "As far as waterproof, it's not Gore-Tex."

Gore-Tex is a well-known brand of fabric and manufacturer of a variety of wind and weather-resistant and waterproof clothing. It's made by a process of laminating three layers of different materials together. However, there are waterproof fabrics and fabric treatments that are not Gore-Tex.

According to Nyman, tests for water resistance and waterproof comprise a range of numbers

"They have the range of 0 to 5,000 is water resistant, and 5,000 and up is water-proof," she explained. "All my things are right at 5,000."

After skirts, she added jackets. They are the half-sleeve style jackets that are

Her next move was adding reversibility to the skirts. Those arrived in November 2014

"Then after that, I wanted a rain hat that could go over a golf hat because I always try to put my FootJoy hat over my visor because I don't want to have to change my headgear, and it [the FootJoy hat] wasn't long enough," she said. "So, that next year, I started researching rain hats."

From idea phase in 2012 to 2015, she went from zero to manufacturing non-frumpy rainwear and hats for women.

"I was criticized like you would not believe in the beginning," Nyman said. "Every man would say, 'Kathy, women don't play golf in the rain. That's crazy, why would you do that?'

"I would say, 'Well, they might not play golf in the rain, but they get stuck in the rain all the time," she continued. "That was the reason why I kept going forward."

As Nyman pointed out, golfers get stuck on the golf course in unexpected rain. Here that can be any afternoon in summer. So, the idea of having a rain skirt, jacket and hat for when the drops start falling during a round, well, that makes sense.

"The skirt's easy because you can just wrap it over what you are wearing," Nyman explained. "You can wrap it over shorts or a skirt. It doesn't matter. It's got five snaps so it's adjustable up to five inches, three sizes, and they are adjustable with each size."

One reason the skirts are popular is because of the adjustability. Each size has five snaps. There are three basic sizes, and they all are adjustable the same way. That's important because if you are caught in the rain, you are putting the rain gear over what you are already wearing. It's not like the size you normally wear. It's going to be slightly bigger.

In 2016, she added rainwear for girls because she had another "Aha!" moment. She was caddying for one of her junior students in the U.S. Kids world championship at Pinehurst when it started raining.

"There are a lot of little girls that play on the U.S. Kids (Tour), and they don't really have rain gear, so that's one reason I thought of them," Nyman continued. "It rains every year in Pinehurst [at that tournament], so I kind of thought there was an opportunity there."

These days, Rain Girl can be found in about 30 country clubs, including Bay Hill Club and Lodge, Sawgrass Country Club, Queen's Harbour, Deercreek and the Jekyll Island Golf Club. The Mid Ocean Club in Bermuda was her first. She also has an online business at https://raingirl-golf.com/

In addition, Nyman sells to tournaments, and she attends EWGA events and sells to participants there. By the time you read this, she will be on Amazon with a combination featuring the pink/black hat with the pink trim and black skirt.

The sizing is different than with regular clothing, but similar. Her extra small/small starts at a size 4 and goes up to almost a size 8. The medium/large starts at a size 8 and goes up to a size 12 plus. Then the extra-large/double extra-large goes up from there.

"I can always add more snaps if it's not just right," she said. "The most popular size is probably the medium/large in the line. I don't sell a lot of the larger size because it's not large enough. They're either small or much bigger."





Golf historian discusses Florida's golf history at Beaches Museum Boardwalk Talk

The first known golf course in Florida and the humble beginnings of THE PLAYERS Championship were among the anecdotes shared by Billy Dettlaff last week at his Boardwalk Talk hosted by the Beaches Museum.

The former TPC Sawgrass national director of golf and now a golf author and historian, Dettlaff discussed the history of golf in Florida, and how the sport helped build tourism in the state. The event was held at the Beaches Museum Chapel on Thursday, May 3.

Dettlaff first told the story of Henry Flagler, the former partner of John D. Rockefeller at Standard Oil Company who constructed the Florida East Coast Railway and developed a large portion of the state. The American industrialist opened resorts along the railway, said Dettlaff, and ultimately used golf to promote his efforts.

Flagler's first golf course — and what Dettlaff referred to as the first course in Florida — was a nine-hole course located around the perimeter of the Castillo de San Marcos fort in St. Augustine.

According to Dettlaff, Flagler later built an 18-hole course in St. Augustine in 1916 that was known as the Ponce de Leon Golf Course, which played host to several ce-

lebrities, including President Warren Harding. According to Dettlaff, Harding visited there a few weeks before his presidency to decompress and prepare for his upcoming responsibilities.

After discussing Flagler's other courses throughout Florida, Dettlaff addressed the origin of the Ocean Course at the Ponte Vedra Inn & Club. Prior to its construction, the golf historian said it was a ninehole course built by the mining company that previously owned the property.

Then, the property was sold in the 1930s, and the Ocean Course was built. Dettlaff said it soon became one of the toughest courses in the United States. In fact, Dettlaff noted the PGA of America planned to host the 1939 Ryder Cup there, until World War II began and caused the cancelation of the tournament.

Dettlaff concluded his address with the story of former PGA Tour Commissioner Deane Beman, THE PLAYERS Championship and TPC Sawgrass. Beman first brought the tournament to Sawgrass Country Club, said Dettlaff, where it was played from 1977 to 1981. Then, after failed attempts to buy Sawgrass, Beman hired Pete Dye to build his own course in the Florida swamp, and the beauty that

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



the award for the highest GPA among the 20-and-under roster-size squads, and the D.B. Milne Sportsmanship Award. Amanda Detmer earned the Davis College of Business' International Business Student of the Year honor and Maria Juliana Fueyo was named DCOB's Student of the Year. The team also earned the WGCA Scholar Award as a team last summer for having the highest team GPA in the country among women's golf programs and were recognized for their volunteer efforts as well.

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
