
St. Johns County Pet Center



Oak Bridge development to go forward

County Commission unanimously approves proposal

In a unanimous 5-0 decision, the St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners voted Tuesday to approve Alta Mar Holdings LLC's proposed development plans for the back 40 acres of the Oak Bridge Club at Sawgrass' golf course.

The public turned out in full force for the May 15 meeting, with representatives from the Sawgrass Players Club, Vicar's Landing and the Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach there to support the plan, and representatives from the Hidden Oaks subdivision and some local businesses there to oppose it. With those in favor of the development seated on the left and those opposed on the right, the tension was palpable.

"Realistically, we're all here because we all have an economically unviable, 140-acre golf course embedded in one of the most prestigious communities inside Ponte Vedra Beach," Alta Mar's David Miller said. "The course desperately needs \$2 million, that isn't rebutted, and the improvements need to come from a yes vote and the subsequent sale of the most logical and least impactful portion of the course."

Jane West, Hidden Oaks' legal counsel

commercial and age-restricted residential development has been a subject of local controversy for the past two years. Although it received majority support from the surrounding Sawgrass Players Club community, concerns were raised by others — particularly those living in the neighboring Hidden Oaks subdivision.

"The loss of view, the construction noise, the increased traffic congestion and the decreased property values are of significant concern to my clients," said Jane West, Hidden Oaks' legal counsel. "We respectfully request that (the board) deny this application."

Responding to the opposition's con-

cerns, however, Alta Mar's legal counsel, Ellen Avery-Smith, countered that the company had already made multiple concessions to lessen the development's adverse impacts, including increasing buffering and property line setbacks, as well as removing the parking waivers it had originally requested.

"We have done everything that we could possibly think of to mitigate the impact of this development and make it compatible with the surrounding community," she said.

Indeed, West confirmed that representatives of Hidden Oaks and Alta Mar had met recently to negotiate and reached a handshake deal, but that deal ultimately fell through when it was presented to the Hidden Oaks residents.

"When it comes to decisions of where you put your head down to sleep, the community that you live in, where your kids grow up, the view that you look at every single morning when you have your cup of coffee, it's just not that easy to get a room full of people to agree on what that is worth and how to save it," West said.

After hours of presentations and public comment, Miller announced in his final statement that he would make one last concession and decrease the number of residential units he was requesting from 330 to 280 units — a move which Commissioner Jay Morris praised.

"Of all the emails I've gotten, one of

the biggest (issues) has been density, so I really appreciate you taking it down those 50 units," Morris said. "People who totally aren't happy with 330 aren't going to be happy with 280, but that is over a 15 percent reduction ... and I appreciate your willingness to do that."

Pointing to a similar situation surrounding the failed Baymeadows Golf Club in Jacksonville, Morris went on to say that, although he sympathized with those who might experience a resultant decrease in property value, he felt it was best for the overall community that the development be allowed to go forward.

"People are going to lose real estate value, in my opinion, far more if that golf course goes under," Morris said, adding, "I'm voting for this."

In apparent agreement, the other four commissioners followed suit and voted in favor of the development. For Miller, the unanimity of their decision was meaningful.

"Greater Ponte Vedra and TPC won, and 5-0 is just an ultimate validation that it's the best thing for the community," Miller said. "I really appreciate the commissioners taking into consideration everything that was presented before them ... and there are going to be some affected parties, but that's America. Our supporters outnumbered the detractors probably 7-1 and ruled the day, and that's how it should work in America."

So, to all the wives, husbands, kids and parents out there, thank you so much for your unmatched support and sacrifices on behalf of your service member. The event was capped off by Combs, who fired up the crowd with some of his most popular songs, including "Hur-

Tesori Family Foundation holds golf clinic for children with special needs

For the third consecutive year, the Tesori Family Foundation hosted a group of local children with special needs and their families for a golf clinic at Sawgrass Country Club that included a special demonstration from PGA Tour player Jordan Spieth.

A field of "VIPs" participated in the All-Star Kids Clinic, which was held Wednesday, May 9, on the eve of the opening round of THE PLAYERS Championship. Among the volunteers at the clinic were coaches from The First Tee of North Florida and PGA Tour caddies, including Paul Tesori himself, who is the caddie for THE PLAYERS Championship 2018 winner Webb Simpson, a former PGA Tour player and a Nocatee resident. Paul and his wife Michelle started the golf clinics for kids with special needs in 2014 after their son Isaiah was born with Down Syndrome.

Spieth kicked off the clinic by demonstrating different shots and a few trick shots. Spieth's younger sister Ellie has learning disabilities herself.

"He did a great clinic," said Paul Tesori.
"He engages with the kids. He's never in a rush to get out of here, which is extremely special to us."

After Spieth's demonstration, the children were divided into groups and rotated through 15- to 20-minute sessions on putting, chipping and driving, which to the enjoyment of the kids, included using the automated ball teeing system known as Power Tee.

Following the clinic, the Tesoris presented awards and prizes to each of the participants and then sent them in golf carts to Sawgrass Beach Club, where they enjoyed an all-you-can-eat pizza party. Also at the event, the PGA Tour Superstore and Cal Ripken Foundation presented the Tesori Family Foundation with donations.

Founded in 2009, the Tesori Family Foundation supports several local and national nonprofits throughout the year. In addition to supporting the special needs community, the foundation benefits the elderly and the homeless, as well as many other groups in

Can you please tell me about your background?

I've been a professional photographer in the sports arena for about 30 years. I got started in sports when I was in high school, where I did high school yearbook. I just fell in love with the magic of photography and learning how to develop film and make prints. I realized that's how I wanted to get into a career in photography. I fell in love with sports as I was in college. I stared doing a lot of motorsports at the Daytona Speedway, and then eventually it led to options with working for the Jacksonville Jaguars and then eventually the PGA Tour.

What have you experienced throughout your 20-year career with the PGA Tour?

I think overall when you look back on 20 years of what I've been a part of, it's pretty amazing. Coming into the Tour in 1998, it was right after Tiger Woods became a professional. So, I was able to be part of an amazing era of golf. I got to know the players before him: Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer, Gary Player, Tom Watson ... the legends of the game. And then being able to see Tiger in his career, and now watching the young guys like Rickie, Jordan and Dustin who are taking over the game now, it's pretty amazing when you think of all those experiences together.

What are your primary roles and responsibilities as manager of photo/video content for photographic services?

I recently took on the position, and it's a little bit different. It's not going to be as much travel. It's not going to be as much with the camera in my hands. I'll still shoot some, but it's mainly going to be managing other photographers and other video content creators to gather content, illustrating the fan experience and how amazing it is out here on the Tour.

Do you have a favorite shot you've taken in your career?

I think there are probably two that come to mind the most. One was in South Africa at the Presidents Cup in 2003. It was a pretty interesting day because we got to meet Nelson Mandela. He was the honorary chairman for the tournament that year. I have a really cool photograph of Tiger Woods, Nelson Mandela and Ernie Els shaking hands together. It's just one of those things that really resonated with me.

The second one would have been Presidents Cup in Ohio where I had a shot of Tiger Woods, Phil Mickelson and Jason Dufner before the opening ceremony, wearing suits, just kind of relaxing in the theater before they went on stage. It was a very nice, candid moment that really is just a behind-the-scenes type of situation that most people don't get to see.

What makes THE PLAYERS so special to you?

To ask about what makes THE PLAYERS special is really tough because it's everything about THE PLAYERS. One, it's a home game. We don't have to stay in a hotel. We get to see our family and friends on the golf course. The golf course is so spectator-friendly. Everything from the different venues for food, the different places you can go get out of the sun, the kid zones, the autograph area and then just the general views you can get on the golf course. There are not many golf courses that have the mounding and the sight lines that we have here at TPC Sawgrass. It just makes for an amazing spectator experience. It's so cool to see the fans having such a great time.





Gold-Star mother to fallen Navy SEAL releases third children's book written in honor of son

Award-winning author Krista Keating-Joseph, the mother of fallen Navy SEAL Charles Keating IV, released the third children's book written in honor of her son — "Big-Hearted Charlie Learns How to Make Friends" — which focuses on how to handle bullying.

"With classroom bullying and bullying by classmates on social media so preva-

I thought the message of how to respond to bullies, and forgiveness, were some strong messages children need to hear," said Keating-Joseph, a Ponte Vedra Beach resident. "As with all the previous books, this book also allows us to keep Charles' memory alive, along with his ideals.'

Based on a true story when

Charlie was in second grade, the new book involves young Charlie being ridiculed for his looks by another boy at school — and how he used humor to defuse the problem. The story also focuses on the theme of forgiveness, with Charlie befriending the bullying classmate, making a friend by being a friend.

Charles Keating IV died in Iraq on May 3, 2016, while fighting Islamic State militants. His death prompted Keating-Joseph to revisit publishing a book about her son's perseverance and determination on his school's track team that she had started a decade earlier, publishing "Big-Hearted Charlie Runs the Mile in

2017," with that book winning a Royal Palm Literary Award in the children's category. Working with her mother, Phyllis Holmes, as illustrator, the team released "Big-Hearted Charlie Never Gives Up" later in the year.

"We were proud to win the award, but it's even more rewarding to know that Charles would be proud that the stories of his exploits in school are helping

> children to learn about overcoming life's obstacles and the importance of being kind and forgiving to others along the way," Keating-Joseph said.

She also said book writing has helped her cope with the sudden, tragic loss of her

"To lose someone close to you, especially a son or daugh-

ter, can be life-altering," she said. "In that sense, these books have been therapeutic for me and our family in coping with that loss and creating something positive out of a tragedy."

Apart from creating the children's books about Charlie, Keating-Joseph said she relied on faith and support from loved ones to help her through the loss — and the importance of not taking life and friends and family, for granted.

"I miss him every day, but his loss taught me to appreciate every day too," she said. "It also led me to share the positive attitude that young Charlie had with children grow-

ing up now, so they would know other kids have faced and overcome the same challenges they're facing in school today."

By sharing the story of her son's loss, she hopes others who are facing the same types of tragedy in their lives will know they're not alone.

"Tragic things sometimes happen in

our lives, but you do have the strength to overcome them," she said.

fishing line — often referred to as monofilament – to biodegrade? Because it is thin and often clear, birds and animals can't see it and become entangled in it or mistakenly ingest it, resulting in injury or death.

That's one of the reasons why the St. Johns County Parks and Recreation Department and Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) have teamed up to take part in the Monofilament Recovery and Recycling Program (MRRP).

"Almost all of the bins were donated by FWC," said Kelly Ussia, park naturalist for SJC Parks and Recreation. "Between myself and volunteers from the GTM Research Reserve, we will all work together to empty the bins to cut down on monofilament trash that ends up in the water. Now it's even easier to keep our waterways tangle-free."

Betty Griffin Center receives \$100K matching challenge grant from the Delores Barr Weaver Fund

Donations received through the grant will be used to fund its shelter operations, counseling and educational programming, rape care unit at Flagler Hospital, child advocates and many other operational needs.

"Donations like this one from Mrs. Weaver are crucial in helping us cover our operating costs, which will enable us to continue to help the growing number of victims of sexual and domestic assault in our community," Mahr said. "As St. Johns County continues to grow, the demand for services at Betty Griffin Center has increased by more than 50 percent since 2017, and there's been an increase in our costs as well. The shelter and transitional housing continue to be over capacity, so this grant will help us close that gap."

North Florida Land Trust receives Historic Preservation Award

Nonprofit honored for saving last remaining fort in Jacksonville

North Florida Land Trust (NFLT) was recently presented with the 2018 Historic Preservation Award at a ceremony held May 3 at the Jacksonville Main Library Auditorium. Presented by the Jacksonville Historic Preservation Commission, the award recognized NFLT's work in acquiring and preserving the 1898 Spanish American War Gun Emplacements, the last remaining fort in Duval County.

"We are grateful that we were chosen to receive this award, but we could not have saved this fort without the help of the entire community," said Jim Mc-Carthy, president of NFLT and a Ponte Vedra resident. "We share this honor with our contributors who made this possible, including the City of Jacksonville, the



Delores Barr Weaver Fund, an anonymous donor who matched up to \$39,000 in donations and to all those who helped us raise the money to save this important piece of Jacksonville's history.'

ment, the only remaining military installation in Jacksonville out of a total four that once acted in defense of the river. Fort Caroline, the first fort in Jacksonville, was constructed in 1564 by French Huguenots and was later taken by the Spanish and renamed Fort San Mateo, according to NFLT. That fort's exact location is unknown, but it is believed that changes

in the river left it submerged. An English fort was later constructed in 1778, according to NFLT, and was likewise lost when man-made changes to St. Johns Bluff caused considerable erosion along the marsh. NFLT representatives said a Confederate Earthworks was also built in 1862, but it has since been buried and now lies underneath a residential develop-

NFLT led the campaign to purchase the 1898 fort from an individual who had acquired it at a tax deed sale with plans to destroy it and build a house. NFLT acquired the fort in 2016 and will be turning it over to the National Park Service, which plans to add it to the Fort Caroline National Memorial as a public access park. NFLT's campaign to save the fort assures that the only fort in Duval County will remain intact and become a critical addition to the National Park Service's interpretive and community education outreach programming.





Which branch of the military did you serve in?

As a senior medical student at Nova Southeastern University, I joined the Florida Army National Guard. I was thinking about going active duty, but I was convinced by four of my classmates to join the National Guard and do a civilian residency. The plan was to eventually go active duty later in life, but I never actually did. I was assigned to a unit in Tampa, and did a humanitarian mission in Ecuador where we took care of some of the natives in that country. I later was deployed for operation Iraqi Freedom in 2003. My unit that I was assigned to was a 161st area-support medical battalion in St. Augustine that was made up of a



lot of folks from around Jacksonville and St. Augustine. We were supposed to invade Iraq from Turkey, but Turkey said no troops, so we had to wait a little bit at Fort Stewart up in Georgia and eventually we came in through Kuwait. There, I spent time at the border of Kuwait and Iraq taking care of troops as a field surgeon...

Vicar's Landing donates Toyota SUV to Council on Aging

Vicar's Landing donated a 2013 Toyota Venza SUV on Thursday, April 26 to the St. Johns County Council on Aging (COA) to enhance the organization's Meals on Wheels program, and to transport health professionals throughout St. Johns County who care for elders in their homes

"We have a need for vehicles to help us deliver meals," COA Executive Director Becky Yanni said. "We do the home delivery of meals to homebound elders and we also have five dining sites around the county. We have one main commercial kitchen where we do the cooking and we have a need for vehicles to help us get those meals out to the elders who need it in the community."

Yanni noted that the Council on Aging and Vicar's Landing have a "great working relationship" and Bruce Jones, the CEO of the retirement community, is on the COA Board. According to Yanni, the COA had been using older cars (some up to 15 to 20 years old) to facilitate its program. As a result, the group needed a new vehicle, and Vicar's Landing answered the call.

Yanni also revealed that without partnerships with other organizations, COA wouldn't be capable of achieving its mission to feed and care for the elderly. The executive director added that COA serves about 260 Meals-on-Wheels per day in

the county, along with about 600 meals in dining rooms in Ponte Vedra, Trout Creek, Hastings and other local areas.

"If we didn't have partnerships like with Vicar's Landing, we wouldn't be able

to do the work that we do to the extent that we do it," she said. "They increase our capacity. If we had to buy our own vehicles and pay staff and pay gas and all those things, we could maybe serve 80 to

100 meals a day as opposed to what we're doing."

Tips to improve memory

When people reach their 50s, chemical and structural changes in the brain may begin to occur, and these changes can affect a person's ability to process memories

Father Time may be a formidable foe, but people can take steps to give their memories a boost as they get older.

- Embrace recognition instead of trusting recall. Dr. Joel Salinas, a neurologist who specializes in behavioral neurology and neuropsychiatry at Massachusetts General Hospital, noted that human beings are better at recognition than recall. That means people are more likely to remember something they read, such as a note or a list, than something they're simply told.
- Recognize the value of repetition.

 The Harvard Medical School noted that people might be more inclined to remember what they hear if they repeat it out loud. Names and addresses might be more easily remembered after they're repeated out loud because repetition increases the likelihood that the brain will record the information and be capable of retrieving it later. When studying for exams, many students repeat important points to themselves time and again, and that same approach can be applied by adults who are trying to improve their memories.
- Eat a healthy diet. A study published in 2015 in the journal Neurology found that people who eat healthy diets with lots of fruits, vegetables, nuts, and fish and little alcohol and red meat may be less likely to experience declines in their memory and thinking skills. Authored by Andrew Smyth of McMaster University in Ontario and the National University of Ireland in Galway, the study followed more than 27,000 people in 40 countries for an average of roughly five years. All participants were 55 and older and had diabetes or a history of heart disease, stroke or peripheral artery disease. Those who ate the healthiest diets were 24 percent less likely to experience cognitive decline than people with the least healthy diets.
- Break things down. Breaking things down into small chunks also can help improve memory. If tasked with remembering something extensive, such as a speech, focus on a single sentence at a time, only moving on to the next sentence when you're confident you have successfully committed the preceding sentence to memory.

Periodic memory lapses are often nothing to worry about. But men and women concerned about maintaining their memories can employ various strategies to do just that. THE CARE, THE PEOPLE,







Learn to downsize before a move

Baby boomer care on the rise

I have long advocated that people prepare for the future rather than merely take what outcomes the future has in store for them. One area that particularly concerns me is the

potential use of long-term care services.

According to the Social Security Administration's Life Expectancy Benefits Planner, men aged 65 can expect to live, on average, to 84.3 years. On the other hand, women aged 65 can expect to live, on average, until age 86.6 years. These are just averages. One out of every four 65-year-olds today will live past age 90, and one out of 10 will live past the age

The use of long-term care services is skyrocketing, as is the cost for those services. If you are not prepared for this situation, you could either be severely impacted financially or, worse, be unable to get the care you require.

There are three trends that concern me:

- 1. The probability of needing longterm care services is roughly proportionate with age. For example, according to Medicaid.gov, an 85-year-old has an 85 percent chance of using some level of long-term care services before they die. So, as our average life spans increase as noted above, a larger percentage of the elderly population will require long term care services than ever before.
- 2. As you know, the baby boomer generation has begun to retire, with the first boomers (those born in 1946) hitting age 72 this year. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, there are well over 75 million baby boomers, so the number that will ultimately need long-term care services is likely to be huge in relation to the availability of such services.
- 3. While neither Medicare nor Medicaid pay for home care or assisted living services, Medicare pays for some nursing home care under certain circumstances and Medicaid pays for nursing home care for indigent persons. As our population ages and the use of long-term care services expands, state Medicaid programs are running short of funds and, as a result, are reducing daily payments to nursing homes almost every year. Given that Medicaid covers about 70 percent of all nursing home patients, nursing homes are finding themselves unable to survive financially on these limited reimbursements for 70 percent of their business and many are closing their doors.





How older adults can reduce risk of recurrent stroke

According to the CDC, nearly 800,000 Americans experience a stroke every year, and roughly one in four of these cases are second,

or recurrent, strokes. In addition, per the National Stroke Association, having a stroke dramatically increases your risk of another one, especially in people ages 65 and older

The good news is that up to 80 percent of recurrent strokes can be prevented by managing risk factors like high blood pressure and atrial fibrillation (AFib), again according to the National Stroke Association. During May's National Stroke Awareness Month, it's important to take the time to learn how to reduce your or your loved one's risk of recurrent stroke.

The prevalence of recurrent strokes

Within five years of suffering a stroke, your risk of having another one increases by more than 40 percent, according to the CDC. Recurrent strokes are more likely to affect older adults who experience 75 percent of all strokes, says the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke. They also have a higher risk of mortality and disability, as the parts of the brain previously injured by the original stroke may not be as resilient.

The role of AFib in stroke risk

AFib is the most common heart arrhythmia and increases your stroke risk by five times. In fact, AFib is present in one out of every five stroke cases,

according to the American Heart Association.

The reason AFib is such a potent risk factor is because the upper chambers of the heart (or atria) do not contract properly, allowing blood to pool in a cavity known as the left atrial appendage. The pooled blood can form a clot that travels to your brain's arteries, interrupting blood flow and leading to a stroke.

Asymptomatic, or "silent," AFib is particularly dangerous as people don't know to seek treatment for it. Analysts from the American Heart Association report that screening for silent AFib among adults 65 and older could prevent thousands of strokes worldwide every year.

Steps to prevent second strokes

When it comes to preventing recurrent strokes, the best defense is a good offense. The vast majority can be prevented with diligent monitoring and lifestyle changes. According to the American Heart Association, some of the top ways to help prevent a second stroke include:

- Monitoring your blood pressure
- Controlling your cholesterol
- Keeping your blood sugar down
- Being active
- Eating better
- Losing weight if you need to
- Not smoking
- Keeping alcohol intake under one

drink per day for women and two for men

- Considering testing for and treating sleep apnea
- Talking to your doctor about whether aspirin or other medications are right for you

Having a stroke can be a life-altering and difficult experience, but it's also an opportunity to re-evaluate your lifestyle. By fully understanding your health, you can reduce the risk of recurrent stroke and make changes to improve your overall well-being.

So, the picture is basically this: The probability of using care is increasing, the length of time one is using care is increasing, the percentage of our population in the age group most likely to need care is increasing and the amount that Medicaid can pay for care on an individual case basis is decreasing. As a result, nursing homes are going out of business. Not a pretty picture.

My advice for you is to either sequester sufficient resources to pay for care in the future and not tap these funds for other uses, or secure some form of insurance coverage to pay for these services should the need arise. If you don't adopt one of these two strategies, you put yourself in the position of either bankrupting yourself trying to pay for care (which will get much more expensive in the future) or relying on Medicaid to pay for your care, which is problematic at best. Worst case — you just cannot get the care you need. Talk with your insurance professional about the



WSOS Radio, LLC. "Because of a variety of FCC regulatory limits, 103.9 FM can't reach many people in Nocatee and Ponte Vedra — the new simulcast on 95.7 FM will address that.

"St. Johns County radio listeners will now be able to access our classic hits of the 60s, 70s, 80s; updated hourly weather forecasts; local community spotlight interviews; high school and Flagler College sports coverage on 95.7 FM, 103.9 FM and 1170 AM," Geddings continued. "WSOS also streams live at www. staugustineradio.com and via the WSOS app available at the Apple app store and Google Play."

Geddings purchased WSOS 1170 in 2012 and added an FM simulcast at 103.9 and now 95.7. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) granted the company's request for the new station at 95.7 on Jan. 3, 2018. A few great reasons to adopt your next pet

There is no end to the companionship, love and joy a pet can bring to one's life.

That is perhaps one reason why the number of pets surrendered to shelters each year so greatly upsets animal lovers. But the same places that house animals that were lost or abandoned can be the very locations where families find new pets to love.

The ASPCA estimates that 6.5 million companion animals enter animal shelters in the United States each year.

Animal shelters, rescue groups, pounds and humane societies are great places to begin searching for new companion animals. The organization DoSomething. org states that, each year, approximately 2.7 million dogs and cats are euthanized because shelters are too full and there aren't enough adoptive homes. Homeless animals outnumber homeless people five to one. While private breeders and reputable pet stores may have purebred animals that make great pets, to relieve the problems of relinquished or homeless pets residing in crowded shelters,

prospective pet parents are urged to first consider adopting shelter pets. The following are reasons why adopting shelter dogs or cats is such a great idea.


- Well-behaved animals: The Humane Society of America says most shelter pets end up in facilities not because of behavioral issues or something they did wrong, but due to circumstances affecting their owners, such as moving or divorce. That means there are thousands of housebroken, behavior-trained pets just waiting for a new family.
- Lower costs: When a person adopts a pet, microchipping, first immunization costs, neutering/spaying and some vet costs may be covered by the adoption fee. Plus, that adoption fee can be hundreds of dollars less than purchasing a pet from elsewhere.
- Longer life expectancy: The Canine Journal says "mutts," or animals whose genetic makeup are a combination of at least two breeds, tend to have fewer health problems and live longer than their purebreed counterparts. But

shelters also house many purebreeds for those who prefer to go that route.

- Room for others: For every adopted cat or dog, room is freed up to take in more pets that need assistance.
 - **Hurt puppy mills:** Puppy mills

produce pets in factory-style facilities that seldom take the welfare of animals into consideration. Adoption hurts puppy mills' bottom lines and helps fight against their inhumane breeding techniques.





Local groomers host nationally recognized certification event

Dog groomers from Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and Tennessee attended a two-day workshop and certification event by the National Dog Groomers Association of America (NDGAA) April 29 and 30 at Green Dog Spa in Jacksonville. The workshop drew 40 participants to the mother-daughter-owned facility.

"We chose NDGAA because of their availability of offering testing sites, their 45-year experience and their reputation," Green Dog Spa owner and event sponsor Erica Benson said. "We want the public to be aware of the credentials, because, so far, it is not a regulated industry. When, and if, the state decides to regulate the pet-grooming industry — like they do for nail and hair salons — we can demonstrate that we already meet high standards that make sense for breed standards and safety."

The entire process can take many years to earn the coveted title of Nationally Certified Master Groomer, said Benson. Participants groom four dogs, take three different tests and then take the master test. Groomers previously had to travel to a city where testing is offered and arrange for dogs to be available for the hands-on portion of the test.

Due to the success of the Jacksonville-based event, the NDGAA invited Benson and her mother/Green Dog Spa owner Lynn Lamoureux to host the next workshop in 2019. Additionally, Lamoureux and Benson will offer monthly classes (the first is scheduled for May 27 from 10 to 11 a.m.) to help the community learn about the grooming process.



In 2009, Abdullah conducted a 12-city tour of the United States with Orquestra de São Paulo, one of Brazil's most celebrated ensembles. Internationally he has made appearances with ensembles including the St. Gallen Symphony Orchestra, New World Symphony, the Boca del Rio Philharmonic and the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra.

Joining Abdullah and the Symphony for the Concerto for Cello and Orchestra is cellist Julian Schwarz. He was born to a multigenerational musical family in 1991. Heralded from a young age as a cellist destined to rank among the greatest of the 21st century, Schwarz's powerful tone, effortless virtuosity and extraordinarily large color palate are hallmarks of his style, according to the Symphony. In 2016, Schwarz won first prize at the Boulder International Chamber Music Competition's "The Art of Duo" with Canadian pianist Marika Bournaki.

Featured on this program is a work by modern composer Lowell Liebermann. Simpson overcomes TPC Sawgrass, ruling bodies to win THE PLAYERS Championship

It was his to lose.

Despite what Webb Simpson said Friday after his course record tying round of 63 — which was that no lead was safe — it was virtually impossible for anyone to catch him on Sunday. He had history on his side.

But Simpson, who finished 18-under 270, had more than a victory on Sunday, he overcame a rules change that damaged his career in his prime earning years. The putting style he had used to win the U.S. Open in 2012 was banned by the R&A and the USGA in 2016. It was not a pleasant time for him.

Simpson tried conventional putting, but finally settled on a style preferred by Matt Kuchar and allowed by the USGA.

However, it was a tip from Tim Clark — who is now out of golf, some say due to injury and some say due to the ban of the anchored putter — that turned his game around 12 months ago.

"He (Clark) asked me had I ever tried the claw grip, and I said no," explained Simpson. "It felt pretty awkward."

Before the first round of THE PLAYERS in 2017, Simpson's caddie, Nocatee resident Paul Tesori, asked him if he was going to use the claw.

"I said, 'I still don't know,'" recalled Simpson.
"But I warmed up with it, and it felt pretty good, and last year, especially the first two days, was the best I had putted in a long time."

He had a year of practice before creating a seven shot lead going into the final round of THE PLAYERS. Historically, that was insurmountable. In all the rounds that have been played on the PGA Tour, no one has ever lost a seven-shot lead.

The only question that remained was would he break Greg Norman's 1994 scoring record of 24-under par for the tournament? It would have been a fitting way to celebrate the last time THE PLAYERS was held in May. (THE PLAYERS Championship 2019 will be held March 12-17.)

The rest of the field

Galleries were lined up five to 25 and more deep, depending on whether there was a viewing mound. At the start, you could see between a quarter and a half-mile of fans stretching from the practice area to the first green. It wasn't possible to see that until the course was redone, so that there are broad expanses of grass and less structures. More like Augusta National, if you have been there. (I'm sure that's the plan.)

Rising above those lines of fans were even more people packing the left side of the second hole and the left side of the third hole, the first par

three, where you can watch the tee and the green without moving. Many were waiting for Tiger Woods and Jordan Spieth to make a run.

As the afternoon progressed, Woods was one of a handful who did deliver a charge. Playing four groups ahead of Simpson, he moved early, with birdies at the third, fourth and fifth. He saved par at the eighth by hitting an explosion out of a greenside bunker and banking the ball off the slope on the right side of the green. It rolled to within three feet.

He birdied No. 9 from the swale right on the green and turned in 32. He would have to go much lower on the back side to scare Simpson into making mistakes.

There were five 32s on the front, and one of them belonged to Woods. Kiradech Aphibarnrat posted a 30.

Meanwhile, Simpson wasn't giving up anything. He was steady through the first six. He birdied the seventh and bogeyed the eighth. When he turned in even par, it looked like Norman's 24-under score would remain the lowest ever.

Simpson would have had to shoot 6-under in the final round to break the tournament record, and he was content with pars. He was safely ahead, and that was all he wanted.

Simpson's win at THE PLAYERS equates to hometown victory for Tesori

While Webb Simpson was on his way to tying the course record at TPC Sawgrass Friday at THE PLAYERS Championship and ultimately winning the tournament, his caddie's wife, Michelle Tesori, was also keeping track of another score outside the ropes.

"I've been keeping track of the number of people who have approached me today and said they know Paul (Tesori) or wanted to say hi," said Michelle on Friday of the tournament, who subsequently glanced at her phone to take note of a rising statistic. "We're at 40-something people."

By the end of the second round, in which Simpson finished 9-under 63 and atop the leaderboard at 15-under, the number on Michelle's phone had closed at 48.

"This is home for Paul," said Michelle. "This tournament means the world to him."

Born and raised

Paul Tesori, 46, grew up down the road from TPC Sawgrass in St. Augustine. He fell in love with golf at a young age due to the influence of his grandfather, who was a starter at the Ponte Vedra Inn & Club for 30 years.

His first golf tournament as a fan was in 1977 at THE PLAYERS Championship when the tournament was first played at Sawgrass Country Club across the street. At the age of 9, Paul played at TPC Sawgrass before it opened to the public, hitting balls from the dirt of No. 17 with his grandfather and the first course superintendent.

"I've played this course over 700 times in my life," said Paul, who lives with his family in Nocatee. "This place is extremely special to me."

Paul attended the University of Florida, where he played golf, and later played a few years himself on the PGA Tour. He ultimately transformed his playing career into a caddying career, working with Vijay Singh, Jerry Kelly, Chris Couch, Sean O'Hair and then Simpson, who hired Paul in 2010 after O'Hair fired him. In 2012, Simpson and Paul, who share a deep Christian faith, accomplished the pinnacle of their careers, winning the 2012 U.S. Open at the Olympic Club in San Francisco.

Now six years later, however, this past weekend's win at Paul's old stomping grounds may have trumped that milestone.

"It's different," said Paul to the Recorder after winning THE PLAYERS Championship. "The roots mean more than the U.S. Open. The experience of winning the 2012 U.S. Open will never be erased from my mind. But this one, it's different.

"I probably had a thousand people out there today, all praying for us because we needed every single bit of it, rooting, yelling and screaming," continued Paul. "These are friends I had growing up, from the time I was 5 years old that I got to see, to new friends we met in the church or the community."

The mayor

After winning THE PLAYERS Championship at 18-under 270, Simpson himself acknowledged that Paul received more recognition and attention than he did.

"It was definitely Paul 100-fold," said Simpson. "I had to spend extra time in the morning warming up because he'd take forever to get from the putting green to the range. I call him the mayor. He's the mayor around here. Everybody loves Pauly."

One such reason for that love is the work that Paul and Michelle do in the community via the Tesori Family Foundation, a nonprofit organization founded by the couple in 2009 to help those in need in Northeast Florida. Following the birth of their son Isaiah, who has Down Syndrome, they expanded the organization to add programs for children with special needs.

On Wednesday, May 9, the Foundation hosted its annual All Star Kids Clinic at Sawgrass Country Club, gathering a group of local children with special needs for

a golf clinic that included a special demonstration with Jordan Spieth.

"It's such a special week for us," said Michelle. "We kick off this week with our All Star Kids Clinic, which is one of the most special things we do as a family together."

Fast forward four days, and Paul was able to win THE PLAYERS Championship with his family by his side, marking the first time he's won a tournament with his wife and two children, Alexis and Isaiah, all in attendance.

"I thought a ton of my son today, and I thought what would he say to me right now?" said Paul. "He'd say, 'Daddy, why are you nervous? What's the problem?' It was a calming influence thinking of him out there today. It was a hard round, and thinking about him calmed me down for sure."

So, this place — Ponte Vedra and TPC Sawgrass — and this tournament — THE PLAYERS Championship — will forever hold a special place in Paul's heart, making this past weekend's win all the more special.

"This is going to go down as my biggest enjoyment win for sure," said Paul, with a smile on his face and a tear in his eye.

Simpson

"Odds of him losing this are one in 20," broadcaster Johnny Miller said about Simpson.

Woods birdied the 11th and 12th, but when he bogeyed the 14th, it seemed finished for him. He had climbed to within five shots of the lead, but with the bogey, mojo had moved on. At that time, he was five shots back with five holes to play.

Simpson remained stuck on 19-under, refusing to budge for Woods or anyone else.

The only way anyone other than Simpson could win, was if Simpson started making bogeys and doubles, which he refused to do.

When Woods drove into the right rough on the 16th, his chances were completely gone, and then things got worse for him. The 17th. Water.

At that juncture, there were about 12 players left on the golf course. None of them pressed Simpson. In all, it was amazing that so few golfers were able to mount a serious charge against Simpson after Friday, but the course is not user friendly.

Webb Simpson actually won the tournament on Friday and Saturday. His lead stymied the rest. He could only fire and fall back like ping pong balls thrown against a

"I think he demoralized the field," Miller said as Simpson walked to the 17th green.

For Simpson, THE PLAYERS victory came nearly six years after his U.S. Open title, and some will say it's his second major. However, more importantly for him, it was an extraordinary career comeback for someone who had previously been at

the pinnacle of the game and then, due to the whims of the R&A and USGA, fallen victim to a change in rules on equipment and method of play.

Simpson overcame more than past putting problems this week. He overcame two golf organizations that had conspired against him to ruin his career. With the drop of the final putt, plenty of middleaged men gave loud cheers from their sofas and bar stools saying, "Take that, ruling bodies." Then they went out to the garage to find their old long putters to start practicing with the claw.

Tiger Effect takes Ponte Vedra by storm

While Webb Simpson was slaying the Stadium Course at TPC Sawgrass to ultimately win THE PLAYERS Championship 2018, Tiger Woods was simultaneously captivating the attention of thousands upon thousands of people who stormed upon Ponte Vedra Beach for the sole reason of watching him play the game.

From Thursday to Sunday, fans traveled in a mob mentality with Woods, sprinting from hole to hole and emphatically yelling absurdities like, "He's like Elvis Presley," and, "We want to roar with you, baby!" along the way. It was the "Walking Dead" meets "Caddyshack." A strange combination but the truth.

On Sunday of THE PLAYERS, he was wearing a red shirt, with a picture of Woods shushing the crowd, and the words, "Look out Jack ... Greatest Golfer Ever" written above and below the image. From hole to hole, he carried a step stool, and subsequently stood upon it to ensure he had the greatest view of all.

"I've been following him for years," said Hosang, who didn't watch any golfer but Woods at THE PLAYERS. "This is the most excited I get about anything in life."

The Port St. Lucie resident said he's attended every golf tournament that Woods has ever played in Florida. From the Honda Classic to Bay Hill to the Valspar Championship and now THE PLAYERS Championship, he goes if Tiger goes. His reasoning? Simple.

"Tiger made golf cool," he said. "The things he does, more than half of his competitors can't even imagine what he just pulled off. Every facet of golf has changed because of him."

The Long Island resident attended the tournament to watch Tiger live thanks to a surprise birthday gift from his girlfriend.

Tatti has always idolized Woods. At work, he'll pull up vintage YouTube clips in his free time of the golfer winning tournaments in the late 1990s and early 2000s. He called him the "pinnacle of golf"

"He was everything," said Tatti. "He's brought out the best of the players."

What about Woods' indiscretions and recent low points? The mass migration from hole to hole continues regardless.

"He's a fallible human being," said Tatti. "It brings him more back to earth."

"He brings out energy," said Campbell. "He has an aura of greatness around him. It's just cool to say you were there."

Cool for Calais? No wonder it was cool for everyone else.

Based on Woods' performance at THE PLAYERS, the Tiger Woods Effect is bound to continue to make its mark on golf courses and towns across the country.








Sharks fall to **Blue Devils** in playoffs




