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# Pedestrian struck by car on Palm Valley Road

SJSO says man jumped in front of vehicle

Jacksonville resident Robenson Watson, 24, was injured this past Saturday, Sept. 1 when he was struck by a car at the inter-

section of Palm Valley Road and Ranch Road in Ponte Vedra, according to the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office (SJSO) and Florida Highway Patrol (FHP).

Per SJSO Cmdr. Chuck Mulligan, St. Augustine resident Richard Thatcher, 54, was driving along Palm Valley Road at approximately 1:35 a.m. when Watson, who had been walking along the shoulder of the

road, suddenly jumped in front of his vehicle. Thatcher called the police, and when deputies arrived on the scene, Watson proceeded to jump in front of their vehicle as well. Watson — who Mulligan described as acting erratically and potentially under the influence or suffering from a medical condition — then attempted to fight the deputies, but was eventually wrestled to

the ground. He was then transported to Memorial Hospital for treatment, and is reportedly in good condition.

In the initial incident report released by the Florida Highway Patrol, Thatcher was identified as a deputy with SJSO. Mulligan, however, stated that the initial report was incorrect in that regard, as Thatcher is not employed there.

## SJSO seeking woman suspected of credit fraud

The St. Johns County Sheriff's Office (SJSO) is currently seeking the whereabouts of Kristie Marie Parsons, who is suspected of credit fraud.

According to the Sheriff's Office, Parsons allegedly used another person's credit information to open an account at Kay Jewelers and fraudulently purchase more than \$5,600 worth of jewelry. She is also accused of using the victim's information to open additional accounts.

Parsons is believed to be driving either a 2008 gray Audi S4 bearing the Florida tag JGBQ18, or a 2007 white Lexus ES350 bearing the Florida tag HZQR07. Both vehicles were recently seen in the north end of St. Johns County.

### Palm Valley Community Association to host hurricane preparedness meeting Sept. 10

The Palm Valley Community Association will host a special presentation by Jeffrey Alexander, deputy director of emergency management for St. Johns County, called "Understanding Hurricanes & Evacuation Planning," on Monday, Sept. 10 at 7 p.m.

To be held at the Palm Valley Community Center at 148 Canal Blvd. in Ponte Vedra, the presentation will inform the public on the significant impacts of Hurricanes Matthew and Irma and prepare the community with important information should the First Coast be threatened by another hurricane this year. The event is open to the public and all interested parties are encouraged to attend.

Alexander, who served as the operations and logistics chief for St. Johns County during both Matthew and Irma, has led numerous statewide and regional emergency management initiatives. In 2004, he served as the logistics and plan chief during Hurricanes Frances and Jeanne, and he also served as the logistics chief in Mississippi and South Florida counties during Hurricane Katrina in 2005. Currently, he is serving as a member of the National Hurricane Program Technology Modernization Committee, working to modernize evacuation studies and develop national hurricane evacuation planning guidance.

The Palm Valley Community Association, founded in 1948, is one of the oldest, continually-operating community associations in North Florida. The PVCA works to represent the common interests and shared views of all members of the greater Northeastern St. Johns County area.

## New 11-lot neighborhood coming to Palm Valley

A new suburban neighborhood is coming soon to Palm Valley.

St. Johns County Growth Management Director Suzanne Konchan said the community, called Valley Point, will be an 11-lot subdivision on six acres of land at 4485 and 4495 Palm Valley Road, near the Ponte Vedra Beach YMC. She noted the developer, R. Wayne Flemister, has submitted an application for approval to rezone the area from Open Rural to Single Family Residential.

"The application says they are asking to rezone so they can develop 11 single-family residential lots averaging between 10 and 12,000 square feet each," Konchan said, "which is similar to the size of the residential lots that surround them."

According to Konchan, there is an eagle's nest near the property that will require the developer to seek an Eagle

Management Plan to address the issue and develop within the area.

Flemister, a Ponte Vedra resident who is behind the Valley Point project, said the neighborhood will be a "boutique development" surrounded by nature and wildlife.

"It's kind of small," he said. "One of the things that drew us to the area is the wildlife, it's so plentiful and beautiful to observe."

Flemister added that he is cooperating with St. Johns County regarding the eagle's nest, and he intends to comply with all federal government regulations aimed at protecting the birds.

Regarding the future of Valley Point, Flemister said he has spoken to a number of different builders to get them involved with the property. The neighborhood should be completed in mid-spring or early summer 2019.

"They are all very interested," he

said. "There isn't a lot of land like this, it's still large enough to put a nice little quiet development in there. I'm looking forward to working with the builder or builders and watching them build the end product."

One of the unique aspects of the upcoming neighborhood, Flemister added, is that it will be nestled in a quiet area away from the noisier parts of town.

Valley Point is not the only community Flemister would like to develop. The Ponte Vedra resident plans on purchasing other lots to develop more residential zones in the future.

"This is the first," he noted. "We're already looking to duplicate this idea and take another piece of land, not the large ones, but the smaller developed ones. We want to keep Ponte Vedra Beach as close to the quaintness that it's had in the past. There's only so much land and wildlife left."

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I have been working with teens for over four decades and one thing is universal: They all want to be known and become famous.

After Maddie Clifton was murdered by a local, young teenage boy, I surveyed the males locked up in the Duval Regional Detention Center. Over 90 percent said he killed her so he could become famous and have his picture shown in the media. I recently surveyed some teenagers about the killings at the Landing and they gave me the same answers.

**SOLUTION:** Have all media STOP putting up pictures and names of killers, so they are not me-

morialized and they don't become famous. ONLY the victims should be the ones with their pictures shown and their lives memorialized. The teenage brain learns by what it sees and hears.

Many teens don't really care if their fame comes from negative behaviors or positive ones. They just want to be recognized and have others see them. Adults, especially ones working in the media, need to correct this problem immediately or more shootings will happen soon.

### Can you please briefly tell us about your background?

These guys have started a place in Nocatee that is almost like "Cheers." You see the same people in there all the time. You get to know them, you get to be friends with them. It's a great way for people out there to meet their neighbors.

### What makes you so passionate about wine?

When I worked in Corporate America, I covered Western Europe, and Bordeaux was part of the territory. We did some business with a few wineries there, and it didn't take long to get hooked. Wine became a large part of our holiday meals. To me, it's all about sharing wine with family and friends. I believe I have passed this love of wine to my children.

### What are your favorite parts about Ponte Vedra?

My favorite things about Ponte Vedra aren't even the obvious ones, like the beach and golf. It's the sense of community and all the friends I have made here. It's a friendly, friendly place. The people are just warm, and everyone seems to want what's best for everybody else here. It's like you're on vacation all the time. The lifestyle is so relaxed and easygoing, which fits me because I'm not a big city guy. I feel fortunate to have been able to be here.

### What do you like to do in your free time?

Even at this point, there isn't much of that. I love to travel, play golf and follow college football and baseball. I enjoy sitting on my porch sharing wine with my family and friends. Pretty simple, really!

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# PVHS to present a show to never forget in observance of 9/11

On Tuesday, Sept. 11 at Ponte Vedra High School (PVHS), actor and PVHS theater instructor Jason Nettle will perform "9/11: We Will (Never) Forget," an original one-man show exploring the perspectives of 17 characters from different backgrounds on the 9/11 tragedy.

Nettle, who lived in New York at the time of the 9/11 terrorist attacks, spent six months researching and four months writing "9/11: We Will (Never) Forget," and performed it for the first time on the 10th anniversary of the attacks. The play has won numerous awards and has been performed in venues all over Florida and the U.S.

"This show will allow you to look into 17 drastically different points of view of the millions that are out there and touch on the humanity and unity we experienced in the minutes, hours and days after this horrible ordeal," Nettle said.

Nettle received his Bachelor of Fine Arts in theater performance and his Bachelor of Arts in music theory from Otterbein University in Columbus, Ohio. He received his Master of Fine Arts in theater from the University of Central Florida. He has worked as stage manager at the Alhambra Theatre & Dining and taught acting, voice, musical theater and improvisation at Jacksonville University and Ponte Vedra High School.

The show contains strong language and graphic details. The performance will take place at 7 p.m. in the Ponte Vedra High auditorium, and tickets are \$11 at the door. Proceeds will go to the Ponte Vedra High drama department, with \$1 per ticket going to K9s for Warriors.

A native of St. Louis, Missouri, Ken attended Roosevelt High School and graduated from General Motors Institute of Technology in mechanical engineering. Ken served in the Korean War aboard the U.S.S. After GMI, Ken accepted a position with Western Engine in St. Louis, a GM dealer headquartered in Chicago with branches all over the Midwest. Ken was the ultimate entrepreneur, building a successful, thriving business. Intelligent, resourceful and with never-ending energy, Ken drew his son Steve into the business (and son-in-law Greg for a short time). He retired in 1988 to pursue adventures across the globe, including extended time in South Africa and Russia. He owned and flew a variety of planes and he never ceased to enjoy sharing his experiences of travel and adventure with family, friends and complete strangers.

He is survived by the love of his life and wife of 18 years, Linda Kay Hurt, (also first wife, Anita (Ousley) Hurt of Hillsboro, Oregon); son Steve (M.J.) of Austin, Texas and daughter Linda (Greg) Beary of Portland, Oregon; and his older brother Irvin Edward Hurt (Marlene) of St. Louis, Missouri. Ken will also be fondly remembered by his six grandchildren, three great-grandchildren, three stepchildren and 10 step-grandchildren.

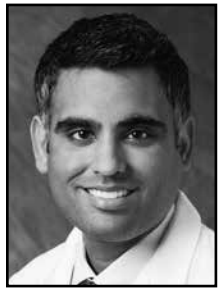

# Addressing heart disease in women

Heart disease has long been considered a condition that primarily affects men — a misperception that can cause women to overlook potentially deadly symptoms.

Despite efforts to increase awareness, the CDC reports that only 54 percent of women know that heart disease is the No. 1 cause of death for women in the U.S. In fact, an estimated one in three women die from heart disease each year.

I will speak about this critical topic during a luncheon being held at the Ponte Vedra Inn and Club this Friday, Sept. 7, at 11:30 a.m. While my presentation is part of the Delicious Destinations fundraiser for St. Vincent's community outreach programs, it's also the perfect opportunity to help educate women about the unique risks they face when it comes to heart disease.

## Identifying heart disease in women

Although it tends to be generally associated with heart attacks, heart disease is an umbrella term that encompasses myriad conditions. Heart disease can present itself in many ways, from congenital heart disease and cardiomyopathy to atrial fibrillation and coronary artery disease.

While heart disease is the leading cause of death in the U.S. for both sexes, the issue can be more difficult to spot in women. For example, while chest pain is widely considered a telltale sign of heart problems, less than half of women who are diagnosed with heart disease present with this symptom.

Instead, women more commonly show other indicators such as shortness of breath, nausea, vomiting, indigestion or dizziness. These symptoms are more likely to appear while resting or beginning physical activity and can even be triggered by mental stress. Still, many women show no symptoms at all, instead discovering the disease while being assessed for other medical issues.

Heart disease also becomes deadlier with age, sometimes building over decades before showing any obvious presence in a woman's body. It is possible that the very first symptom a woman shows could be a major heart attack. In fact, women under 50 who have a heart attack are twice as likely to die from it when compared to men of the same age.

## Taking control of your heart health

With an abundance of troublesome facts and figures surrounding the ailment, women may feel overwhelmed by the possibility of developing heart disease. Fortunately, doctors agree that women can take steps to not only prevent heart disease but to also reverse it in some cases.

Be proactive and take your heart health into your own hands. I recommend women focus on achieving healthy blood pressure and cholesterol levels, maintaining a healthy weight and diet and decreasing the amount of alcohol they consume to fend off heart disease.

As always, consult with a physician before making major changes to your health regimen, but don't be afraid to be proactive. It's important to keep your finger on the pulse of your heart health and encourage all the women in your life to do the same.

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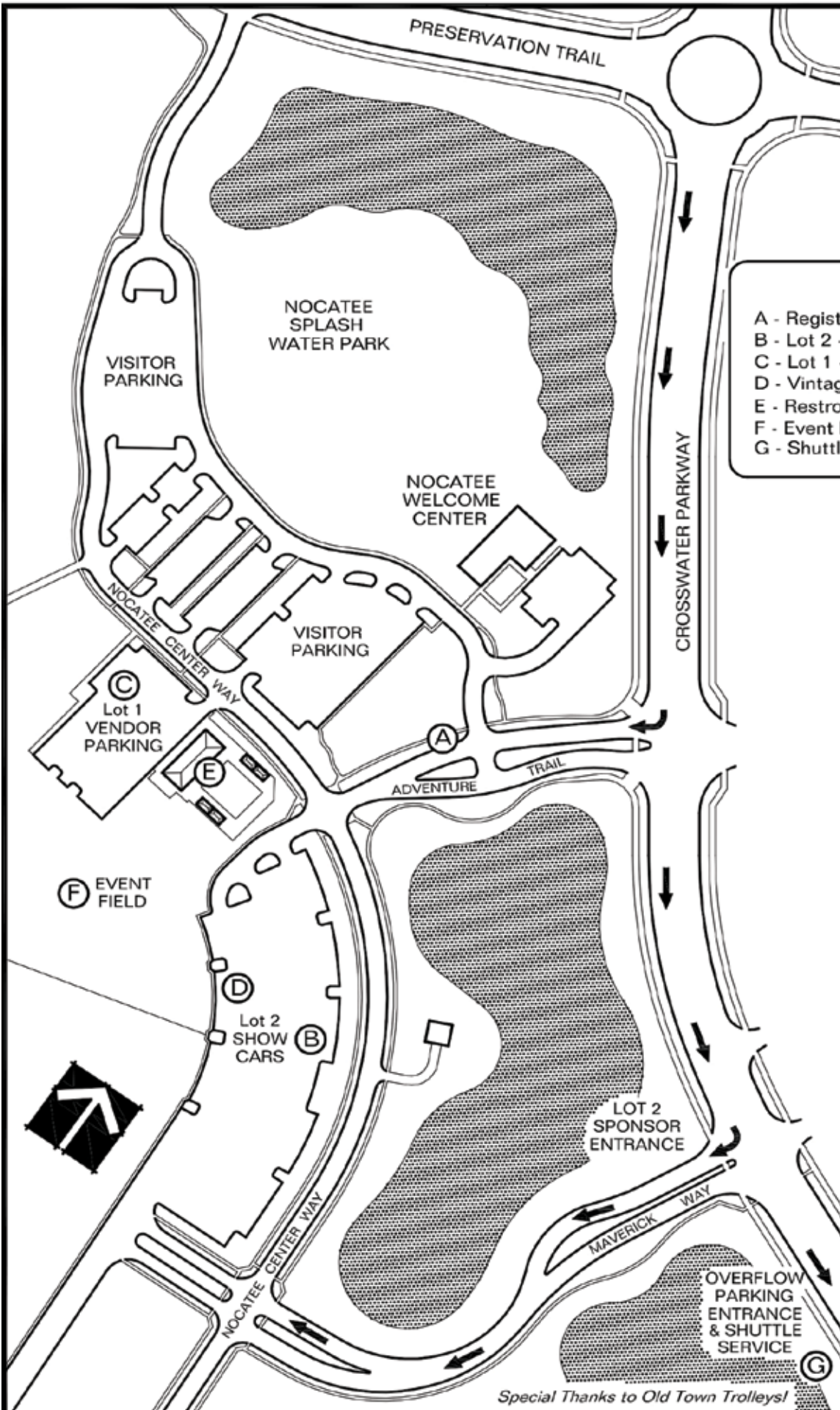

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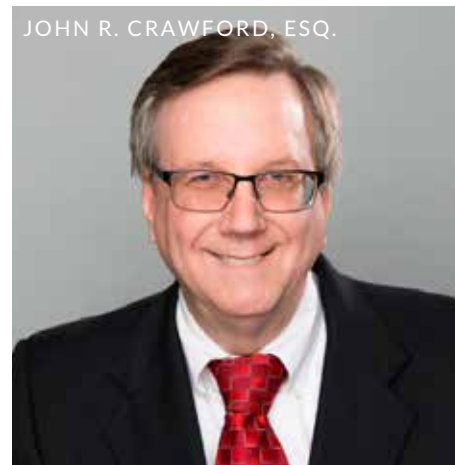

“We were lucky,” Redig said about sponsoring the Auto Show. “We took over from Brumos. We thought it was a really good fit for the group.”

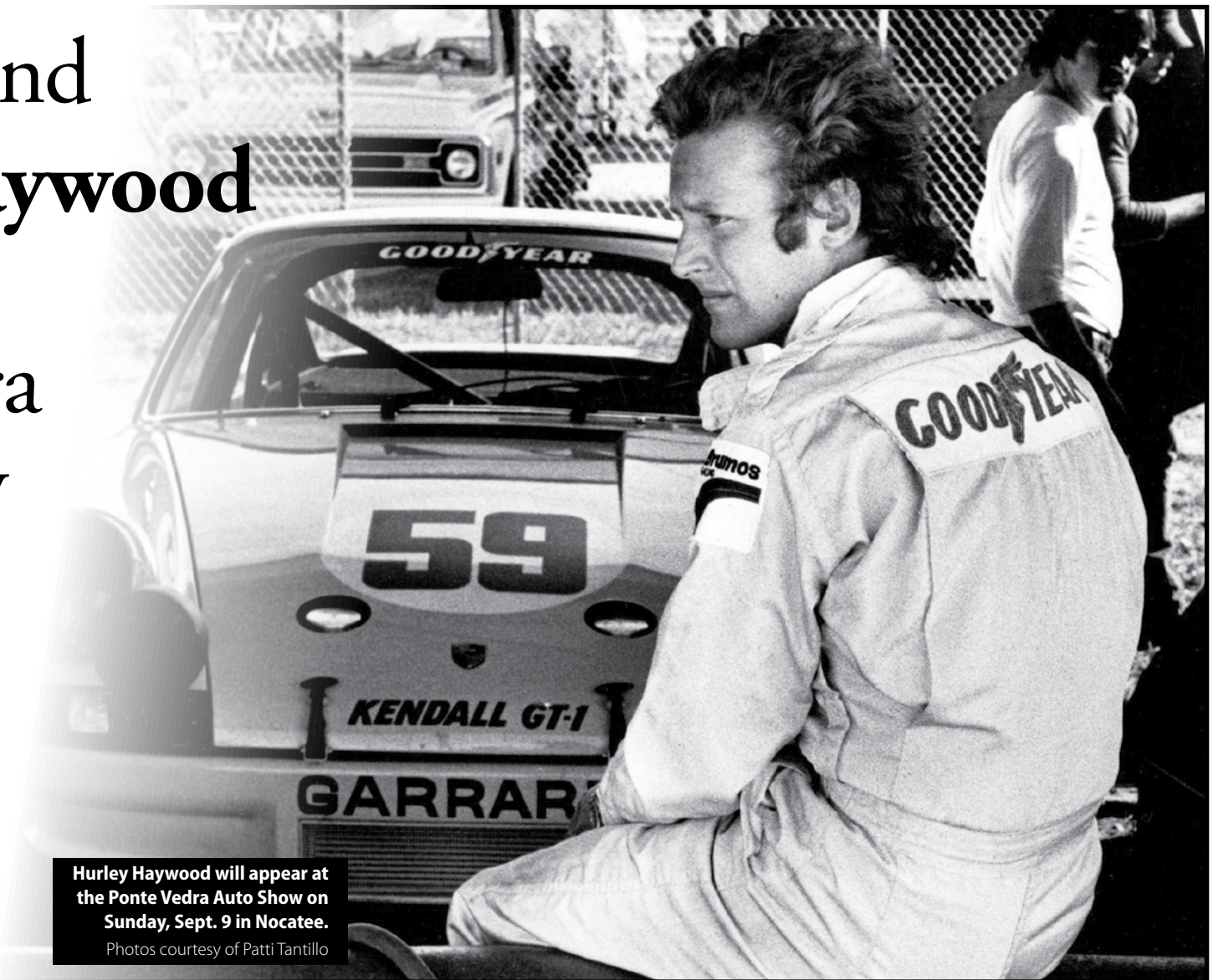
Haywood said his book, “Hurley from the Beginning,” will be available at the auto show. He will be signing copies at the event.

# Fields anticipates arrival of new, exciting cars

Fields Auto Group — the presenting sponsor of the Ponte Vedra Auto Show — is looking forward to adding several new and exciting cars to its portfolio in the coming months.

Perhaps the most intriguing is the Jaguar I-Pace, the brand's first all-electric SUV. According to Garry Redig, vice president of operations for Fields in the Jacksonville market, the I-Pace can travel 240 miles per charge, and goes from 0 to 60 mph in four-and-a-half seconds. The starting range MSRP for the vehicle is \$69,500, and Fields is expecting it to be available in Jacksonville within the next few months.

"Every article written about it says it's going to give Tesla a run for its money," Redig said. "It's stunning."

On a similar note, Brandon Starks, general manager of Porsche Jacksonville, said Porsche's all-electric car will be available within the next 12 months. In addition, he said the Porsche Cayenne will soon be completely redesigned.

Another car of interest for Fields is the Mercedes-Benz UX, which is coming out in early November. Blair Sharpe, general manager of Mercedes-Benz of Jacksonville, said this car is being praised for its technology and subsequent ability to learn and adapt to the user. Sharpe noted the UX will have a Siri or Alexa-type capability that will enable users to make changes in the car by simply saying them out loud. The car will be part of Mercedes-Benz's A Class and be priced in the mid \$30,000s.

"Instead of saying, 'Hey Siri or hey Alexa,' you say, 'Hey Mercedes, can you turn the heat down?'" Sharpe explained about the UX. "That in itself is a huge leap forward."

Mercedes-Benz of Jacksonville is additionally looking forward to the brand's new, redesigned G-Wagen. Sharpe said it will still have the same attributes of the original G Wagen, such as off-roading capabilities and its iconic styling, but it will be both wider and longer. Sharpe is expecting that to come out in the fall.

In addition, Redig said Fields is anticipating the arrival of Cadillac's new XT4, a smaller version of the brand's XT5 Crossover. The XT4 has a MSRP of \$35,000, which Redig noted is a price point that is very attractive to consumers, especially the younger demographic. After waiting for the XT4 for three years, Redig said the car should be available in Jacksonville in a few months.

Redig added that Lexus is coming out with a brand-new Lexus ES sedan, which has a base MSRP of \$39,500. Not to mention, Lexus is unveiling another small crossover sports utility called the Lexus UX. Redig expects that to come out in December.

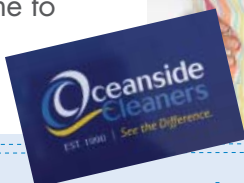

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## Analyzing risk after Jacksonville Landing shooting

Local expert provides tips for organizations, businesses

Risk is inherent in everyday life, and human beings take risks every day, simply by getting out of bed in the morning.

Common risks at home, like falling in the shower or setting fire to the kitchen, are typically mitigated by using floor and shower mats, cook timers and fire alarms. When heading off to work, common risks exist like tripping over a street curb or getting in an accident. These risks are mitigated by walking with your head up and eyes focused, rather than reading from a cell phone or being unable to hear because of blaring headphones.

People take risks and mitigate risks every day without much thought. It is expected that parents will manage risk to their dependent children, individuals will manage risk to themselves and companies will be responsible in managing risk to their employees, facilities, operations and reputation.

The shootings at Pulse nightclub in Orlando, Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland and Chicago Pizza in Jacksonville are stark reminders of the safety and

security risks facing businesses and individuals. Today's changing risk landscape requires individuals to be more mindful of risks in general, and organizations to be more diligent in their strategic and practical efforts to mitigate risk.

Over the years and in the wake of several tragic incidents, regulatory mandates directed organizations to establish risk mitigation practices and emergency response plans. Too often these were hastily created in an effort to be compliant. Too often these policies and plans sit on a shelf collecting dust rather than being reviewed and updated to consider new and emerging risks.

Who would have thought a North Carolina farmer could essentially shut down Washington D.C. for days? It happened. Who would have thought someone would be found in the middle of a street with a bomb strapped to his chest? It happened. Who would have thought that someone would open fire on the campuses of Virginia Tech and Florida State, and on the grounds of too many elementary, middle and high schools? And yet it happened.

Who would have thought that a video game competition would become the scene of another horrific mass shooting? It happened, and this time it happened in our community, and it happened as a community of gaming enthusiasts looked on from around the country and maybe even around the world. When the game competitors put on their headsets and sat down to compete, in all probability they

did not consider or anticipate they would be targets and victims of violence, previously experienced only through a video game controller.

The looming question is, how do we mitigate the risks and prevent future incidents? This is not an easy or simple question to answer, but there are a few things that are critical to answering the question.

First, it is important to really understand risk to effectively manage risk. Risk is made up of both vulnerabilities and threats. Vulnerabilities may be more plentiful than threats because a discussion of vulnerabilities considers the possibilities of harm and hazards to people, places, structures and venues, and includes consideration of both the physical and emotional toll. All potential vulnerabilities should be explored, identified, considered and assessed.

A threat is different than a vulnerability. A threat is much more specific. A threat is a known, intended, hostile or damaging action. Knowing about an intended act provides for a more straightforward discussion of existing and needed preventative security and risk mitigation measures. Think about large meetings. It is now common for the host to address the "housekeeping issues" at the start of meeting, advising attendees the location of exits, outside gathering points and a call-in number, website or app available to assist in the event of a crisis incident.

Matrixes are a good option for identifying, assessing and documenting risk

mitigation efforts, and a number of assistive technologies exist to support risk mitigation and crisis response. Like it or not, today's reality demands risk be a part of everyday planning for individuals, organizations and event planners and keeping with the motto of "hoping for the best but planning for the worst."

Start by considering these tips:

### For organizations

- Develop a formal risk mitigation process.
- Assess risk for every event hosted or sponsored, internally or externally.
- Establish event-specific security standards.
- Use assistive technology in risk assessments.
- Make employees aware of the risks as well as safety and security procedures.
- Encourage all employees to have heightened awareness.

### For individuals

- Be aware of your surrounding — look — listen — assess — plan.
- Know your exit options and have an exit plan.
- Run or hide — leave personal items behind.
- Keep hands visible to law enforcement.

## Sharks finish strong in win over Palatka

Ponte Vedra scored 15 unanswered fourth quarter points to overcome a 26-24 deficit in last Friday night's win over the visiting Panthers from Palatka.

The Sharks' multifaceted offense — with Jack Murrah and Cobi Myers sharing time under center and Campbell Parker and Mark Calvin alternating at running back — proved more than the visitors could handle, as Ponte Vedra beat Palatka 39-26.

In addition, the lightning fast Panthers had difficulty keeping their offense on the field. Ponte Vedra converted two onside kickoffs (a favored strategy of coach Matt Toblin), recovered two fumbles and blocked two extra points and a punt. The result was complete domination of time of possession by the Sharks.

Palatka's four quick strike touchdowns covered a total of 278 yards but consumed less than six minutes on the clock. On the other hand, Ponte Vedra scored five touchdowns and a field goal while racking up 247 yards on 48 rushes to take big chunks of time off the clock.

Murrah guided the Sharks to their opening touchdown when he tossed a perfect 37-yard scoring strike to Kyle Barker. Barker, who had beaten his man by three steps, made a brilliant catch on the play. After Palatka tied matters at 7-7, Myers

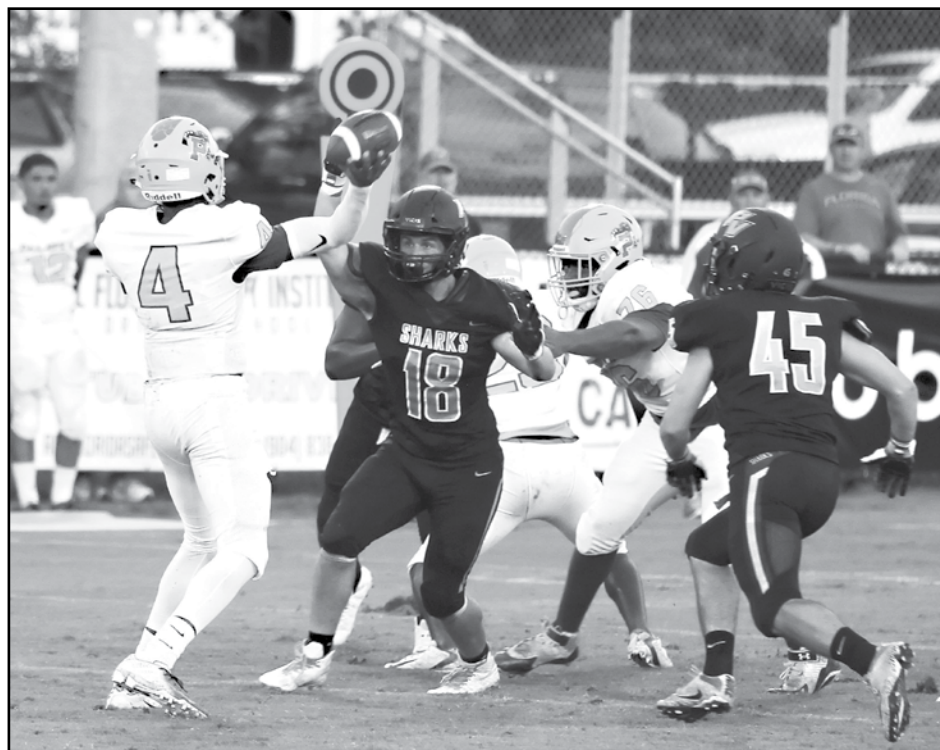

found Parker uncovered in the left flat for a 3-yard touchdown completing a 16-play drive.

The Sharks got the ball right back when Raj Patel recovered his own kickoff. This time it was Murrah's turn to run the offense and he engineered a 7-play drive that ended with Parker running in from 10

yards out. The Sharks led 21-7 with five minutes left in the half.

A second consecutive, successful onside kickoff was recovered by Connor McDonough, but the Sharks fumbled the ball back to the Panthers on the next play. After the teams traded three-and-out punts, the visitors mounted a six-play scoring

drive in the final minute of the half to draw within seven at 21-14.

Ryan Chase returned the second half kickoff 41 yards, but Ponte Vedra had to settle for Patel's 27-yard field goal. Palatka took just three plays to score again thanks to runs of 25 and 40 yards. Cole McCormick blocked the PAT, and the Panthers trailed 24-20.

The Sharks lost the football on a fumble at the Palatka 10-yard line, and the Panthers took advantage of the mishap to score in two plays — a pass of 20 yards and a run of 70 yards. Peter Merlini blocked the PAT, so Palatka led 26-24 for the first time in the game. It was also the first time the Sharks trailed this season.

Myers and Parker came on and single-handedly set up the next Ponte Vedra touchdown. First, Myers lobbed a screen pass to Parker that was good for 27 yards. Then, he faked the screen and ran for 26 more. Parker bulled over from a yard out. Murrah took over for the two-point conversion and ran it in to put the Sharks back on top, 32-26, with 10 minutes left.

Ponte Vedra iced the game on the next series when Christian Desanto blocked Palatka's punt, and Myers turned it into the game's final touchdown.

Statistically, Merlini, with four tackles, and McCormick, with three, led the Ponte Vedra defense. Parker rushed 19 times for

Jim Furyk, Ryder Cup captain for 2018 and Ponte Vedra Beach resident, made three of his four captains picks Tuesday, Sept. 4. He also added three vice captains to the team.

Furyk's team picks were Bryson DeChambeau, who won the Northern Trust and Dell Technologies back-to-back, and veterans Phil Mickelson and Tiger Woods, the latter of whom has been instrumental in the reorganization of Ryder Cup teams following a loss in 2014.

In addition to selecting team members, Furyk appointed David Duval, Matt Kuchar and Zach Johnson as vice captains. Davis Love III is already a vice captain.

The challenge ahead will be to win in Europe. The Euros have won every Ryder Cup played in Europe for the last 25 years, and one reason is the fan base that supports the European teams.

"They're boisterous," Furyk said in the announcement made on the Golf Channel. "I have a lot of respect for them. We were looking for players we thought would handle that situation well and that would thrive, would love the challenge ahead of them."

The U.S. will need a strong team from a

DeChambeau finished ninth on the points list, and only the top eight are automatic selections.

"It's tough to get really close and not quite get over the hump," Furyk said about DeChambeau. "I'm sure he put a ton of pressure on himself."

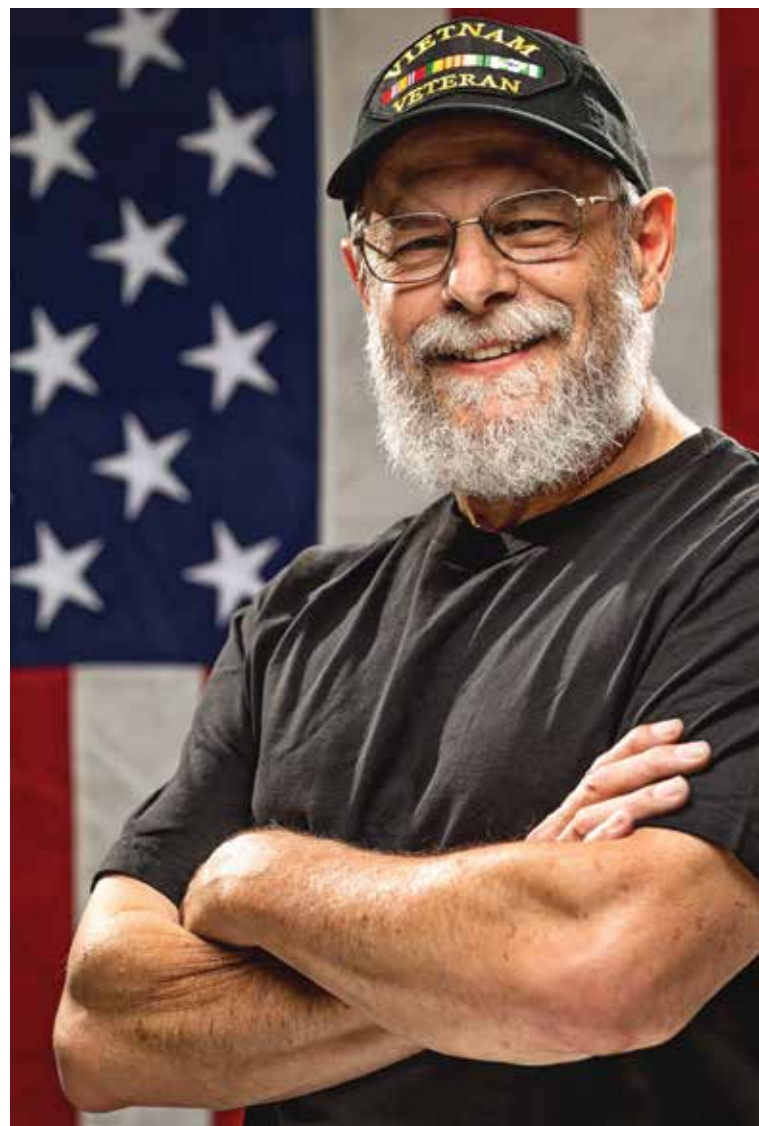
Winning the last two events made it easy for Furyk to pick him.
