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THE PLAYERS surprises DePaul School students, faculty with new technology

The Red Coats of THE PLAYERS Championship concluded their annual Red Coat Ride Out last Wednesday, Sept. 26 with a visit to the DePaul School of Northeast Florida in Jacksonville, where the tournament's redjacketed volunteer leadership surprised students and faculty with a gift of eight new SMART Boards, valued at \$40,000.

A school that serves students in second through eighth grade with dyslexia and related learning differences, the DePaul School relies heavily on interactive teaching methods to help students learn.

"One in five people has dyslexia," advised Dr. Amber Oliveira, head of school at the DePaul School. "They are neurologically wired differently than a typical learner, so anything we can do to make learning multisensory and interactive is a must — it's a priority."

For that reason, tools such as tablets and SMART

Boards, or interactive whiteboards, have proven invaluable to the school's teachers and students alike. Unfortunately, the costs for such technology can be steep, so all eight classrooms have been sharing the one SMART Board the school currently has on campus.

"Our teachers arm wrestle over it, basically," Oliveira joked.

Given that the tool has become such a hot commodity, those at the DePaul School were thrilled when they were initially told they would be receiving one new SMART Board as part of THE PLAYERS' annual charitable giving initiatives. When it was revealed to them last Wednes-

UF Health Proton Therapy Institute receives 2 donations from THE PLAYERS Championship

A new 14-passenger shuttle bus for patient transportation and a \$5,000 donation to enhance the social programming for adolescents and young adults being treated for cancer were received by the UF Health Proton Therapy Institute from THE PLAYERS Championship during the annual Red Coat Ride Out last week.

THE PLAYERS' volunteer leadership, the Red Coats, presented the gifts on Tuesday, Sept. 25, as part of its record \$9 million of charitable outreach in Northeast Florida from funds generated by the annual golf tournament.

"We are deeply grateful to THE PLAY-ERS and the Red Coats for your generosity," said Stuart Klein, executive director of the UF Health Proton Therapy Institute. "Your gifts will make a positive impact on the patients entrusted to our care."

The UF Health Proton Therapy Institute has a van to transport patients and their caregivers, primarily children and their families, who stay at the Ronald McDonald House to and from their daily treatments.

"Many of our patients are from other countries or cities, and navigating unfamiliar roadways is an unnecessary stress

for them," Klein said. "The shuttle service is part of the comprehensive social support we have in place to help patients cope with their treatment and reserve their energy for healing."

The UF Health Proton Therapy Institute has treated more than 650 adolescents and young adults and 1,600 children. It has the largest pediatric proton therapy program in the world, treating on average 25 children per day.

"In the United States, cancer is the leading cause of disease-related death in young people age 15-39," said Dr. Daniel J. Indelicato, the William and Joan Mendenhall endowed chair of pediatric radiotherapy and associate professor at the UF College of Medicine. "For many cancers, this age range has seen little improvement in survival over the past four decades. Some of this is related to poor understanding of patient and tumor biology that distinguishes cancers in this population. But adolescents and young adults also have unique needs and often feel out of place in an oncology network designed for children and older adults. If we can create a supportive environment more tailored to adolescents and young adults, it will improve their ability to cope with treatment and ultimately, we hope, improve their outcomes."

According to UF Health, proton therapy is an advanced form of radiation therapy that can effectively target tumors and reduce side effects. For young people whose bodies are still growing and developing, proton therapy offers the advantage of reducing the amount of radiation in healthy tissue, which may reduce the incidence of health complications and secondary cancers later in life.

THE PLAYERS was among the early donors who made the UF Health Proton Therapy Institute possible. Since opening in Jacksonville in 2006, more than 7,700 patients have walked through THE PLAYERS Championship lobby at the UF Health Proton Therapy Institute.

Lend an Ear Outreach donates hearing aids to deaf and hard of hearing students in St. Johns County

Scott Hetzinger, the executive director of the Lend an Ear Outreach nonprofit, presented a donation of hearing aids to the St. Johns County School District on Friday, Sept. 28 at Vicar's Landing to help deaf and hard of hearing students hear in the classroom.

Hetzinger said the nonprofit got involved with the district after contacting Kyle Dresback, the associate superintendent for student support services. Dresback then forwarded information about the organization to Sonia Howley, a program specialist with St. Johns County schools in the area of deaf, hard of hearing, interpreting services and speech and language pathology.

"Most of our kids are coming with personal hearing aids," Howley said. "We do occasionally get students — as we have just this week — with nothing, not even the beginning which is a doctor's clearance for hearing aids."

Howley noted that students who can't hear in the classroom often have a hard time acquiring information and succeeding in school.

"If you can imagine you're in a classroom," she said, "this is new material for you, you're learning every day and you're building on what you learned the days prior. If you lose a month not being able to hear what's happening in the classroom, it's a pretty big deal."

Students without a hearing aid will notice an impact on their speech, Howley added, and those with severe hearing loss will start to pull away from peers. She also noted that students who are deaf and hard of hearing could get frustrated and struggle to maintain good grades.


"We don't want a child to think that they can't get it when it's really just that they can't hear it," Howley said.

The program specialist said the hearing aids provided through Lend an Ear will transform the academic careers and lives of St. Johns County's hard of hearing students.

"Deafness removes you from people because our communication is what drives our social aspect, our education, our learning, everything," she said. "Not being able to communicate is a big, big deal."

Lend an Ear, a 501c3 nonprofit operating out of Vicar's Landing, collects hearing aids through donations. The organization's mission statement is to provide the gift of hearing by furnishing quality hearing aids to those with limited or no means, in an atmosphere of dignity and compassion.



Roadway conditions of Roscoe Boulevard to be addressed at upcoming meeting

The Palm Valley Community Association is holding a special meeting on Monday, Oct. 8 at 7 p.m. to discuss roadway conditions in Ponte Vedra/Palm Valley in general and on Roscoe Boulevard specifically.

To be held at the Palm Valley Community Center at 148 Canal Blvd., the meeting will host Commander Brian Harrington of the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office.

Long-time Palm Valley resident Celeste Burger expressed her concerns about the traffic conditions of Roscoe.

"Several times a week I struggle to just get out of my driveway onto Roscoe Boulevard, and when I do, I'm often looking at another driver riding right on my bumper," Burger said. "It's only a matter of time until we see frequent serious accidents on this road."

Marcie Gallagher, another longtime resident of the area, agrees.

"We have two young children and a dog, and speeding cars on Roscoe are very dangerous," Gallagher said. "As a mother, my main concern is the safety of the children on the school bus. There are constantly reckless drivers passing the stopped school bus as my daughter gets on and off."

Roscoe Boulevard resident Greg Leonard, who is a member of the Ponte Vedra Beach Citizens Traffic Task Force, said driving behavior has deteriorated along Roscoe in recent years.

"Congestion and aggressive driving on Roscoe is a direct consequence of increased population density and traffic congestion throughout the area, combined with student drivers from Ponte Vedra High School and commuters from Nocatee using Roscoe as a pass-through to avoid even greater congestion on Palm Valley Road and A1A," Leonard said.

The meeting on Monday is open to the public, and all interested parties are encouraged to attend. The Palm Valley Community Association, founded in 1948, is one of the oldest, continually operating community associations in all of North Florida. The organization works to represent the common interests and shared views of all members of the greater Northeastern St. Johns County area.

Nancy Morrison

Can you please tell us about your background?

My husband and I have been in the real estate and luxury home construction business for many years. We owned and operated Benchmark Custom Luxury Homes for the last 20 years, where we built high-end homes in Ponte Vedra and the surrounding area. The next week, we will be hosting guests at our annual cocktail party, which will be held Oct. 11 from 6 to 9 p.m. at a home in Marsh Landing. Tickets are still available at \$100 per person. The party will have a silent auction featuring pieces from many local artists thanks to the help and coordination of Village Arts. On Nov. 8, one of our original sponsors, Underwood Jewelers, will host our annual check presentation at a David Yurman trunk show where we will present the 2018 check to our beneficiaries, Baptist Medical Center Beaches and Mayo Clinic-Jacksonville. We hope to raise at least \$300,000 this year. To date, we have raised over \$1,465,000 for the local fight against breast cancer.



The Nov. 6 general election is quickly approaching, and an important deadline is coming: Oct. 9 is the deadline to register to vote.

Simply visit our website at www.votesjc.com. You can register to vote online or update your voter information. By using My Voter Status under the quick links, you can also check your record, locate your polling place, request a vote by mail ballot and view your sample ballot.

If you prefer to register to vote in person, simply visit the Elections Office, your local library or the Tax Collector's office.

November's ballot will be a very long one with 12 constitutional amendments. Although legal challenges have been made to remove Amendments 7, 9 and 11 from the ballot, time will tell. No. 8 has been removed and does not appear on your ballot. Be sure to visit our website and use the 2018 Constitutional Amendments link on the front page. Research materials have been placed there for you.

You may wish to consider voting by mail to avoid lines at your precinct on election day. Requesting a ballot is simple. You can call the office at (904) 823-2238 or use the online request form available on our website. Vote by mail ballots were mailed beginning Oct. 2, so you will have plenty of time to do your research, vote and return your ballot prior to election day. The deadline for requesting a ballot to be mailed for the general election is Oct. 31.

Early voting will be held between Oct. 24 and Nov. 3. There will be seven early voting locations open in St. Johns County from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily where you can cast your ballot in person. The information is already available on our website and will be included on your sample ballot.

Sample ballots will be mailed to all registered voters to help you prepare for the long ballot. Voters should begin receiving them around Oct. 10. They are already available on our website.





that are qualified to join is a pretty small pool of people."

Simpler asserted, however, that the nationwide challenge regarding military recruitment doesn't apply to the Florida National Guard, as there are several potential members waiting to join, receive training and take advantage of the ensuing benefits.



Understanding hurricanes: St. Johns County Chamber members encouraged to be prepared, know risks

On Sept. 19, as the Carolinas began their walk down the long road to recovery following the devastation incurred by Hurricane Florence, St. Johns County **Emergency Management Deputy Director** Jeffrey Alexander encouraged local members of the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce to stay vigilant.

"The tropics are quieting down after having six storms out there all at once, and we're looking like we're going to get a bit of a respite from it, but it's coming back," he warned the attendees of the Chamber's Ponte Vedra Beach Division luncheon at Sawgrass Country Club. "Don't think that we're out of the woods, because hurricane season runs all the way to the end of November."

Alexander, who recently served as the operations and logistics chief for St. Johns County during Hurricanes Matthew and Irma, said it is imperative that residents obey mandatory evacuation orders when they are issued.

"This is really all about keeping people alive," he said. "We can't save your property, we can't save structures ... but we can save lives. Everything else we can replace or repair."


While Alexander acknowledged that evacuating can be a hassle, he urged residents to remember that they don't necessarily have to go far.

"You don't have to go thousands of miles to get away from a hurricane,

you just have to get out of the hurricane evacuation zone," he said. "Step over the line; that's all you have to do."

Stressing the importance of being proactive, rather than reactive, Alexander also encouraged both residents and business owners to have a line of credit ready and make sure they have flood insurance.

"Folks, you live in Florida," he said. "Florida's a swamp, it's always been a swamp and it will always be a swamp. You can flood, no matter where you live."

"We file the claims for them and any revenue that is generated from anything that's sold in here or provided through insurance stays in Jacksonville," she said. "When people come in that have a Medicaid card or come to us from a foundation as a referral, then they receive the items they need for free."

Millard noticed a shortage of information during her cancer battle, she added, which was the catalyst for her to found the In the Pink nonprofit. The Jacksonville resident revealed that the



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



The 24-hour gym offers members a free, personalized "Get Started Plan," personal training classes and a community-like atmosphere.



Strong words for a subject title? Perhaps. But nonetheless, it is true. If you do not believe me, perhaps the words from legendary Princeton University economist Burton Malkiel will lend more credibility: "Emotions get ahold of us, and we, as investors, tend to do very stupid things." Yep, I have been there,

done that, and even got the T-shirt! In fact, I have suggested for the longest time that personal finance has more to do with people's behavior than it does finance. For example, according to my latest research, psychologist, and economist, there are at least 117 emotions (biases) that have an incredible influence on our prudent financial decision-making. Said perhaps more simply, there are 117 ways for us get it wrong! Moreover, the foundation for these various prejudices is controlled by two emotions: fear and greed.

I have always been fascinated with the field of behavioral finance, where economists try to figure out why investors repeatedly make irrational decisions and how to overcome one's natural tendencies to do the wrong thing at the wrong time. For instance, when we succumb to fear or greed, we are essentially under the illusion that we can predict the future, which of course, we cannot. So why play that game? Regrettably, in the world of invest-


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United Way of SJC celebrates renovated office at Chamber 'After Hours' event

According to United Way of St. Johns County President and CEO Melissa Nelson, the organization's office, which is located at 117 Bridge St., was severely damaged from the last two years of hurricanes. The space was in such bad shape, she said, that the office's front counter was taped together.

"If we did not improve our infrastructure, we could not increase our impact," Nelson said. "The time was now."

The renovations to the office included new flooring, a newly painted ceiling and a few general redesigns to allow for more space. Nelson described the renovations as "simple changes that led to great, new circumstances." The office now has a collaborative area for volunteers to have more room.

Through support in the community, Nelson said her organization has raised nearly enough money to cover the cost of the renovations, which totaled \$100,000. Thanks to a match from the Community Foundation of Northeast Florida, the United Way only needs to raise another \$10,000 to meet its goal.

"It's been a journey to get to this point," Nelson said. "We just want to thank you."

ing, we are wired to be counterproductive when fear and greed enter the arena. In other words, we are programmed to run from perceived danger, which is often a poor decision when it pertains to fear in the markets.

I have argued for years that personal selfdiscipline is the No. 1 delineating factor between the rich, the poor and the middle class. Successful investing is emotionally difficult. It often requires waiting for longterm results (discipline) when our portfolios get pummeled, owning an investment when others think it is a dog, staying in stocks when the market appears to be declining every day and not succumbing to the doom and gloom narrative from the hyperventilating talking heads who scream, "Armageddon!" Yes indeed, it often takes great courage not to allow fear mongering or greed to affect our sensible decision-making.

Just like you, I have biases (beliefs)

that dictate how I handle my money. For example, I do not gamble (investing is not gambling!), because winning a few hundred dollars at the casino does not provide me with great pleasure. If I would lose a few hundred greenbacks, however, I am a wreck! This emotional bias is called "loss aversion," which states that people react more strongly to the threat of a loss than the possibility of a gain. For example, if I receive a notification that I am about to be charged a \$95 fee, my emotions immediately kick in while my blood pressure may rise a bit. However, if my investment portfolio increases \$95 for the day, I think nothing of it. No emotions. It is chump change.

So if I am a full blown loss aversion human, why does this same bias not carry over to my investment portfolio? It is because I have another preconception known as "confirmation bias," which is the tendency for me to search for, interpret, favor and recall information in a way that confirms my preexisting beliefs or hypotheses. For example, nobody will convince me otherwise that stock market corrections, market volatility, bear markets, recessions and especially uncertainty are the psychological price I pay for potentially high returns in the stock market. Furthermore, since I am still employed and save monthly, I am not afraid of bear markets, as I perceive them as good news, as every bear market is a potential opportunity for me to buy quality assets on sale and subsequently build my wealth faster with the succeeding bull market. Folks, this has been my belief (confirmation bias) since I started investing 35 years ago and it has served me well.

In the final analysis, I suggest that the key to making money in stocks is not to get scared out of them. This advice sounds simple to follow, but far too many folks surrender to the messenger of misery and throw in the towel when things get ugly. So, the takeaway message from this narrative is straightforward and blunt akin to a Brooklyn cabbie: We are the biggest risk to our long-term wealth creation, so toughen up cupcake and cure your bad behavior. Silence the enemy within!



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St. Augustine Orchestra opens 57th season with 'Symphonic Triptych'

Orchestra to hold first Nocatee performance Oct. 13

The St. Augustine Orchestra (SAO) will start off its 57th season with two performances of "Symphonic Triptych" Oct. 12-13.

According to the Orchestra, a triptych is a set of three associated musical, literary or artistic works intended to be appreciated together. Maestro Scott Gregg has chosen three European and Scandinavian composers of the Romantic and Victorian era, including Antonin Dvorak, Gioachino Rossini and Jean Sibelius. The orchestra will play Dvorak's "Symphony No. 8 in G Major;" "Simiramide Overture" by Rossini and "Valse Triste" by Sibelius.

The Oct. 12 concert will be held at the Lightner Museum in St. Augustine at 8 p.m. The Oct. 13 afternoon concert is a first for the SAO, as it will be the orchestra's first public performance in Nocatee - at Saint John Paul II Catholic Church — to reach other areas of St. Johns County.

Other new initiatives include the SAO joining forces with the St. Augustine Community Chorus to hold two joint concerts next spring and performing as part of the Romanza Festivale.

"We have a wonderfully rich arts culture in St. Augustine, and we are pleased to be one of the anchors of it and able to highlight the talented musicians that live in St. Augustine and surrounding areas," said Mitch Kolesaire, chair of the SAO Board of Directors, who further noted that the orchestra has added three new players this year on flute, violin and percussion.

The SAO sold out most concerts in advance of their performances last season, so the public is encouraged to purchase tickets early. Tickets are \$22 for adults, \$12 for youth ages 11-17 and free for children 10 and under, and can be purchased at staugustineorchestra.ticketleap.com.

Nease (0-6) will host Middleburg Friday night.


