

Throughout the mall, chefs from around Jacksonville volunteer their time and talent to serve a diverse menu of flavors the city has to offer.

"There are so many great and unique restaurants that are all over the city and I know that sometimes depending on where you're located you don't necessarily get out to certain areas and try certain restaurants," said Samantha D'Agostino, special events manager of Children's Home Society of Florida. "I would really love this event because you get a chance to experience some places that maybe you always wanted to try but have never had the opportunity."

In addition to trying new foods, guests can enjoy wine, craft beer and

live entertainment.

The Caring Chefs event draws more than 2,000 guests from around the region.

"This event is definitely deep rooted in our city's history," D'Agostino said. "It's growing and it's getting bigger than ever."

This year, unlike past years, Caring Chefs will also host a VIP Pre-Party for an "exclusive look at the event." The Pre-Party will include early admission plus a designated VIP area with food, beverages and live entertainment.

At the heart of the Caring Chefs, however, is the Children's Home Society of Florida, which receives about 90% of sponsorship dollars from the event. The nonprofit serves more than 10,000 children and families in Northeast Florida, which includes services like counseling, adoption, fostering and child welfare programs.

"CHS was founded in 1902, we are celebrating 115 years of being a leader in serving kids and families," D'Agostino said. "It's events like these that really help us to continue to help support our local families and the programs we offer them."

Record-breaking 334 national, regional and local performers to play 88 showcases at 11 venues during Florida's largest free music festival in September

Setting a new record for number of acts performing during the month-long Sing Out Loud Festival, 334 national, regional and local performers will play 88 showcases at 11 St. Augustine venues beginning Friday. Florida's largest free music festival and benefit concert happens right in Ponte Vedra's backyard.

Each weekend in September, beginning Friday, Sept. 6 and running through Sunday, Sept. 29, 11 St. Augustine venues will host free live performances by hundreds of singers, musicians, poets and comedians in an epic celebration of live entertainment. The full schedule detailing the acts, the venues and set times is available at www.singoutloudfestival.com.

Festival performers range in genres from indie rock, Americana, blues, hip-hop and electronica to spoken word, bluegrass, punk rock, jazz and comedy. This year's Festival brings local and regional acts together with headliners such as Grammy awardwinning country music star Kacey Musgraves, retro soul group St. Paul & The Broken Bones, indie pop songstress Jenny Lewis, lo-fi guitar hero Kurt Vile, Americana troubadours Shovels & Rope, hip-hop icon and member of Wu-Tang Clan GZA, beach goth purveyors The Growlers, punk rock torchbearers Hot Water Music

and Propagandhi, indie rock charmer Phosphorescent, New Orleans brass troupe The Dirty Dozen Brass Band and many more.

Every performance is free and open to the public with exception of the Saturday, Sept. 21 Kacey Musgraves Benefit Concert, which has been sold out for weeks. Musgraves' concert benefits HorsePlay Therapy Center and Green Hands Initiative Community Outreach Programs.

In addition to live performances, workshops led by national music industry professionals will be held the weekend of Sept. 21 and 22. The topics will focus on artist development, music marketing and the recording industry.

The St. Johns County Cultural Events Division, which owns and operates the St. Augustine Amphitheatre and Ponte Vedra Concert Hall, and the St. Johns County Tourist Development Council produce the annual Festival. Since its inception in 2016, the festival has welcomed an estimated 75,000 music fans, featured more than 900 performing artists at a dozen local venues and raised over \$100,000 for charitable organizations such as the Betty Griffin House of St. Johns County, United Way and the OneOrlando Fund

All the world may be a stage, but Suzanne Hudson-Smith has realized her dream role as executive director at a First Coast community theater where she encourages players to bloom in their craft and shares her love of theater and the magic it creates.

What can you share about your background?

I grew up in a small town in Northeast Texas. School was fun. I performed in talent shows in elementary school — ever singing, pantomime and just silly stuff. I was senior class president, National Honor Society president and graduated ninth in my class of 350 — so I did OK for a theater-minded student.

Have you always loved theater?

I committed to majoring in theater when I was in seventh grade, so I took all that silly and focused it on theater. I didn't really know what that meant at the time, but I knew I was good at it (remember, small town). The summer before my senior year I went to a theater workshop at Southwest Texas State in San Marcos, Texas ... and I was hooked. I saw the school, met talented like-minded actors. did a little Moliere and I was sold on theater. My parents were not, so I do have a minor in journalism (she said smiling).

Did you aspire to be an actor?

Yes, I aspired — and through my four years of BFA Acting, that was what I was training for. So when I stepped off the stage with my diploma, I got on a plane and flew to my first audition at the Alliance Theater in Atlanta, Georgia to be a part of their equity training program. Hundreds auditioned — and I got in... as a character actress.

I chose not to stay in the equity program because it was too limiting, so I went back to Dallas, worked in corporate America while performing, directing and opening theaters in my spare time.

What was your first paid role?

I was in the one-woman show, "The Search for Signs of Intelligent Life in the Universe," in Sarasota.

What made you come back to community theater?

Community Theater is where it all starts — you get a chance to be in a show, you make friends, you grow as an actor, you learn hands-on about everything! It's the spirit and the passion of theater. Community Theater is where the heart of theater is. It is where people come together simply for the love of the art and performing.

Tell us about your role and Players by the Sea.

As Executive Director of Players by the Sea, my role is to work with the Board of Directors, focusing us all on connecting







Murder mystery set on Ponte Vedra golf course

Christopher Stone has released his first effort as a novelist, "Murder At The 17th," a murder mystery centered around the world of professional golf set in Ponte Vedra Beach and along the First Coast.

The two came up with the idea of writing a book after discussing a mutual love of Carl Hiaasen's style. Both had read all of his books and decided to begin a book of their own.

"They say you should write what you know," Stone said. "By the way, 'they' say a lot."

Stone has a background in video production and a knack for storyboarding. As a social worker with an MSW from FSU and employed by Shands, Johnson knew mental health.

"A year before Ron passed away from


pancreatic cancer in September 2014, I was teaching him the greatest game ever played — golf," Stone said.

The friends spent the first six months on the driving range and putting green only. Every Saturday morning, they were on Bent Creek's practice facility for two hours. On one of Johnson's first rounds playing the course, he scored a birdie, one under par.

"It was a par 4, and after a good tee shot and a 6 iron to the front of the green, he rolled in an 18-footer for birdie," Stone said. "A remarkable feat unheard of from a beginner."

It seems the two had a great relationship and brought out the best in one another.

Johnson looked to Stone, a single-digit golfer, and Hiasson, a syndicated colum-

You can't always get what you want

RTomJunior gets his name back

There's a lot in a name. Names carry weight — so much so that some are banned, and some are trademarked so that they can't be shared. Names are the last thing to be printed on our graves and the first things to anoint us when we are born. They both identify and label. They tell us who we are.

Some would even say that a name can make something exist, not the other way around.

With RTomJunior Chambers, names are very important. Two names, to be precise. One, his birth name, Robert. Another name, however, was one that he wanted very much to be never used, lest it should happen to make it true. That name was DISABLED. Both were names he detested the day he walked into Jax Legal Aid in June of 2018.

Megan Wall, an attorney in the office, overheard Chambers speaking with the receptionist at the front desk. He had peddled his bike there and was surprisingly neat looking from coming in out of the heat. Chambers is a well-dressed man who speaks slowly, sometimes making the listener wait long enough between sentences to wonder if he was going to continue. He has a slight limp and big smile.

"My first name is the common name 'Robert." Chambers said. "It's so common that I don't like it. (When) I attempt to take care of business, Roberts are so common I have difficulties."

Chambers is in the middle of his second attempt to have his name legally changed. Originally, Robert Thomas Chambers, he requested to add the "Junior" to his first name, a mistake that allegedly was supposed to be on his original birth certificate.

"My mother should know (my name), she birthed me," Chambers said. "She said it's supposed to be on there, but she couldn't read that well and it wasn't. My mother calls me Tom Junior."

So, Tom Junior Chambers filled out his application to have his name changed and did. The state added the Junior in his name and sent him a new identification card. Only this time, they didn't get it right either.

Why? TomJunior. One word. Confusing, yes. But that was the original intention and Chambers intended to honor that. He hated his common first name, Robert. He wanted a new name, one paying homage to his mother's original intention of him going by his middle name, Thomas Junior. A name that suited him and that was original, like him. First

name — RTomJunior. One word. Last name, Chambers. What is so difficult to understand about this?

Which is precisely what he was trying to tell the receptionist at Jax Legal Aid that hot day in July when Megan Wall came over to try to assist him (or perhaps relieve the receptionist).

"What I do is a holistic approach to any client situation," Wall said. "Why do

you want to change your name? Sometimes when someone's all irritated about something, it's really not that. It's really something wrong (in their) life."

Chambers truly does want his name changed. Ask him and he will tell you about the phone book being chock full of Robert Chambers. This is a point of contention for him but Chambers himself is more than a legal name. He a man with a

On one of the reasons he wanted to change his name

sense of humor and an iron will. He is an ex-felon. And, he is also homeless.

It turns out, originally when Chambers filed for a name change, he was accidently granted one against the state's policy. They don't do name changes for ex-felons and this is probably why he was having such a hard time correcting their mistake. Additionally, when you live in a tent in the woods off state road 16, people tend not to listen to you very much.

How does Social Security fit into your retirement income strategy?

It might not be on the calendar, but Aug. 14 is Social Security Day. Since it was enacted on Aug. 14, 1935, Social Security has provided some financial support for millions of Americans during their retirement years. While Social

Security benefits, by themselves, probably aren't enough to enable anyone to retire comfortably, they can be a key part of an overall retirement income strategy – if used wisely.

To help make decisions about Social Security, answer these questions:

When should I start taking my benefits?

You can take Social Security once you reach 62, but if you wait until your full retirement age, which will probably be between 66 and 67, you'll get much bigger monthly checks, and if you wait until 70, you'll get the biggest possible payments. Before deciding when to begin receiving

your benefits, you'll need to weigh a few factors, including your estimated longevity and your other sources of income.

How should I consider potential spousal benefits?

If you are married, or if you're divorced but were married for at least 10 years, you could receive up to half of your spouse's full retirement benefit (offset by your own benefit, and reduced if you claim early). If you outlive your spouse, you could claim survivor benefits, which can provide either your own benefits or 100% of your deceased spouse's, whichever is larger. Consequently, the higher-earning spouse might want to postpone taking benefits for as long as possible to maximize the survivor benefit.

How much can I earn without reducing my Social Security benefits?

If you are younger than your full retirement age and you are receiving Social Security, the Social Security Administration will withhold \$1 from your benefits for each \$2 you earn over a certain threshold (which, in 2019, is \$17,640). For the year

you reach your full retirement age, your benefits could be withheld by \$1 for every \$3 you earn over \$46,920. But once you reach your full retirement age, you can earn as much as you want without your benefits being withheld, although your benefits could still be taxed, depending on your income.

How much of my pre-retirement income will Social Security replace?

Generally speaking, you should expect Social Security to replace slightly more than a third of your pre-retirement income. However, the higher your income during your working years, the lower the replacement value of Social Security will be.

What other sources of retirement income should I develop?

Contribute as much as you can afford to your IRA and your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan. You may want to consult with a financial professional, who can look at your entire retirement income picture and recommend moves to help you achieve the lifestyle you've envisioned for your later years.

Keep in mind that decisions about Social Security filing strategies should always be based on an individual's specific needs and health considerations. For more information, visit the Social Security Administration website at socialsecurity.gov.

One final word: You may have concerns about the stability of Social Security. While no one can predict the future, many potential solutions exist to put the program on more solid footing. Consequently, try to focus on the actions you can control.

Wall did, however. She listened to his whole story and determined that what he needed was more than a new name. First, he needed to have an income over \$300 a month, which was what he was currently sustaining off. Second, he could use a better tent, or, at least something that wasn't falling apart and letting mosquitos and other "creepy crawlies" in.

"I said, you know what, I see the bigger problem here," she said.

Chambers had been charged with battery more than 20 years earlier and had been living in a tent for the past 10. Directly after his release, he swore off not only alcohol, but women as well. He describes himself as a "happy loner," perfectly content with seclusion in the woods. He isn't content with his station, however, and says he has been applying for jobs the entire time he has been homeless. With 64 years behind him, a record, myriad physical handicaps and no formal education to speak of, he isn't exactly being messaged by recruiters on LinkedIn. That didn't stop him continuing to put "applications all over St. Augustine," however.

Wall describes the following conversation thusly —

"Why can't you find work?"

"My knee collapses on me and I'm always falling on the ground. I can't really remember stuff very well."

"So, you're disabled."

"No."

"If you're not disabled then why can't you find work?"

"Well, I can't really see out of this eye and I can't really hear out of this ear."

"So, you're disabled."

"No."

And so on.

At 64 years of age, Chambers was one year shy of qualifying for Medicare. Although, as much as Wall tried, she could not get him to admit to being disabled. She tried regardless. She decided to donate her time to represent him and take him though the legal process of claiming a disability. Even right up to being interviewed at a disability hearing, however, he denied having one. Wall took him to doctor appointments and interviews with a claims representative for Social Security. He showed up to all of the appointments on time but each time, when asked, "Do you have a disability?" Chambers would

ay, "no."

"So, I said look, this is a man who's just told you all his impairments and whether those do or do not add up to something you think (is your choice)," Wall said. "There is nothing he can do in the market-place."

Then, one day, Chambers checked his bank account and found there was \$2,900 of back pay from the federal government. This was more money then he had seen in a long time and it was far more than he expected after going though the disability claims process. It was also a prophetic amount of money, considering he owed exactly \$2669.60 to reinstate his driver's license, which is exactly what he peddled his bike all the way to the DMV off of

U.S. 1 to get. He used the rest to buy a (very) used van, which he parked outside his nephew's house and ran power to a fan that runs while he is sleeping.

"It surprises me how cool my fan keeps me in the van at night," Chambers said. "I don't know why it keeps me that cool. (With the tent) even being as careful as I can, the zippers pop. I don't want to wake up and a creepy crawler in there with me, but I don't worry about them coming into that van."

Chambers gives full credit to Megan Wall for her help, however.

"Now I don't have to worry about the court, the collections or nothing," he said. "It went through so smoothly because I had a lawyer.

"Over here ,they run up against the WALL," he added.

Now at 65 years old, Chambers can claim Medicaid, although he stresses that "the government has retired me," not himself. He won't admit to choosing retirement any more than he will a disability, which he says means, "having to depend on other people to survive." Certainly, Chambers doesn't need anything from anyone. He finds happiness in the small things like have a fan at night, but he can certainly live without it. Preference isn't necessity with him — not by a long shot.

That's not to say that he doesn't get what he wants when he has made up his mind. After everything, one of the first places Chambers went in his van was to a local print shop to have a tee shirt made — one that corrected what he couldn't get the state to correct. Emblazoned across the chest in bold print, the shirt says RTom-Junior.

Does something exist because it has a name, or because someone listens?



Ponte Vedra startup engineers online portal to rent medical equipment

Travel can be daunting for those with disabilities. A Ponte Vedra startup seeks to eliminate some of the obstacles that discourage or even prohibit people with temporary or permanent disabilities from venturing away from home. HandyQuip is a new online marketplace designed to make it easy for anyone to rent medical equipment.

"Were doing this because we strongly believe everyone should be able to live comfortably and to freely explore the world," cofounder Stephane Poussou said. "People with disabilities are less likely to travel or visit family and that excludes them from society."

The idea for HandyQuip was borne out of a personal experience.

"A few years ago, my brother-in-law was graduating from college and wanted to go to Las Vegas to celebrate," Pousso said. "It was very difficult for him to travel because he was in car accident that caused a spinal cord injury and he is paralyzed from waist down."

The trip was kind of a milestone for recent graduate Brandon Bonaquist, so Pousso and his wife said they would help him plan the trip. Bonaquist would be flying, and leaving the state, for the first time. Pousso said his brother-in-law was very nervous that something would go wrong. When Pousso's wife started looking to get medical bed for the hotel, she could not rent a bed.

"There was nothing for us to easily rent bed from another state," Pousso said.

After extensive time and research, she arranged to have a bed delivered to the hotel just before they arrived in Las Vegas. It was the wrong bed, so Bonaquist could not use it.

The unfortunate scenario revealed to Pousso that people do not have access to medical equipment online and small businesses do not have the resources to create a tech-savvy site to facilitate rentals.

"I quit my job (in 2013) and started to solve the problem," Pousso said.

Demand is growing for medical equipment, but there are very few resources. According to the National Service Inclusion Project, 24.1 million people in the country live with a severe disability. Pousso said 12 million require medical equipment to live every day. People can also use the site to try equipment before making a purchase.

The website seeks to allow them the flexibility to do whatever they want. The idea is to help people focus on the important things like visiting family, taking a vacation or traveling. The goal was to engineer a site where anyone could easily rent medical equipment like they would rent a hotel room. Pousso worked with a software engineer to design algorithms so users would not be overwhelmed with too many choices and still match people with what they want at a good price.

The medical equipment may serve everyday needs with items like wheelchairs, scooters, walkers or tools to take a bath safely. Other specialty home health equipment may include lift chairs, specialty beds or sleep apnea machines.

The steps to rent equipment at HandyQuip.com are straightforward. Choose what type of equipment is needed, select the rental period dates from a calen-

dar, and type in the location. "Quinn," assists renters through the process to match equipment with the user who selects desired features.

For now, delivery is available throughout Northeast Florida, from Jacksonville to Ponte Vedra and Nocatee. HandyQuip also seeks to be a resource for local tourism and hospitality providers in Ponte Vedra, such as resorts, hotels, conference centers and other short-term rental hosts. It's a free tool that can be shared with guests to make their experience more comfortable, inclusive and enjoyable.

Ultimately, HandyQuip wants to make medical equipment rental available worldwide.

"For many people medical equipment is a necessity; it is vital in their life," he said.





ADLs, IADLs and long-term care policies

There is a lot of information in the media recently regarding Long Term Care Insurance Policies. There is news about rising premiums and adjusted benefits. If you or a loved one have an LTC Policy, you should contact

your agent or the carrier and have them explain in detail any or all changes.

One thing is certain, every policy contains language centered around Activities of Daily Living and Instrumental Activities of Daily Living. Basically, these are things that we do in our everyday lives that help contribute to our overall level of independence.

ACTIVITIES OF DAILY LIVING

Also known as ADLs, they are essentials necessary to the dignity and physical and emotional well-being of our elderly parents is to ensure their daily living re-

quirements are met effectively. The basic ADL activities are typically listed as:

■ Toilet hygiene

This includes getting to the toilet, selfcleaning and getting up from the toilet. If they have impaired mobility and health issues that make it difficult or impossible for them to take care of these ADLs independently then you need to find them the appropriate help. Whether it's providing care (you or someone else who is qualified) or investing in the proper equipment and accessories to help them continue doing daily tasks independently, be aware that there are many choices and options available.

■ Ambulation, movement without assistance

This includes moving while performing activities, getting in and out of bed and getting in and out of a chair.

- Dressing
- Bathing or Showering
- Personal Hygiene

Activities include brushing or styling hair, shaving and other grooming activities.

■ Ability to feed oneself

If they have impaired mobility and health issues that make it difficult or impossible for them to take care of these ADLs independently then you need to find them the appropriate help. Whether it's providing care (you or someone else who is qualified) or investing in the proper equipment and accessories to help them continue doing daily tasks independently, be aware that there are many choices and options available.

INSTRUMENTAL ACTIVITIES OF DAILY LIVING

Also known as IADLs, these other types of daily living activities are not necessarily fundamental, but related to independent functioning. IADLs most often refer to the following types of activities with long-term care:

- Cooking and preparing meals
- Cleaning and maintaining the home
- Shopping and buying necessities
- Running errands
- Managing money and paying bills
- Speaking or communicating on the phone or through other devices

■ Taking prescribed medications

Again, it's important to the overall wellbeing of elderly parents that their IADLs are taken care of effectively and consistently. If there are obstacles or difficulties with doing these tasks alone, there is help. Whether it's you, other siblings, relatives or friends that help out, or even professional caregivers, arranging help is possible. Other sources of help include technological devices that can provide assistance or even various community services geared at helping seniors.

It's very important to continually monitor your loved one's ability to perform both ADLs and IADLs.

Also, if they do have a Long Term Care Policy, these items will dictate if they qualify for benefits.

Seniors embrace the digital world

Studies show how technology improves cognitive function in older adults

Cynthia floats to the middle of the lane and slowly aligns her body to be just shy of the center pin. She cocks her arm back and hurls the ball, which connects perfectly with her aim and causes a mass cataclysm of pins knocking and tumbling down. A strike.

Cynthia, herself explodes. "YES!" she screams, "STRIKE!"

Her teammates congratulate her, excited for her accomplishment. The rest of the Senior Center is very quiet, with the shuffling of feet heard only between the crash of pins and excitement.

No, there is not a bowling alley in the back room of THE PLAYERS Senior Center. There is only a tiny white box and a television screen to host the tournament for National Senior League Wii Bowling Championship. The seniors at the center call themselves the COA Jaguars and are fierce contenders for the title. They've won first place in the nation in the past and their team captain, Betty Kraft, has recently bowled a perfect game.

Secondary to having fun, it turns out seniors who play digital games are also improving their brain function.

The axiom "video games will rot your brain," is proving to be inversely correlated as new studies on the impact of games are concluding a beneficial effect on cognition. The trend toward implementing the games in education has led a few researchers to also look at its influence on memory

As it turns out, grandma isn't a "noob" and she isn't alone.

A 2013 study published in "Computers in Human Behavior" showed that not only are seniors improving their emotional health with digital games, but they're playing with their friends surprising numbers. The survey revealed that almost a third of seniors reported on using video games at least once a week, with 17% playing them every day.

Former Ponte Vedra resident, Dennis Berkholtz, founded the NSL tournament in 2009. Today he lives in Atlanta and donates his time to coordinating the annual tournament which has almost 300 teams from 80 different communities across the United States. He originally got the idea when his parents were staying at an assisted living

"I was amazed at that time that the senior community did so little for their residents either physically or mentally," he said.

Tips for managing summer dry eye

During the long days of summer, we have plenty of time to get outside, enjoy the sunshine and play in the water. Unfortunately, symptoms of dry eye — including stinging, itching, aching and blurred vision — can make us see summer in a different light. A recent report published in "The Ocular Surface" Journal suggests that up to half of the adult population is affected by dry eye. This figure can rise even

higher during summer months when exposure to sunlight, spending more time outdoors, dehydration and swimming in the ocean or pools can exacerbate symptoms of dry eye and make it harder to manage.

Don't let dry eye throw shade on your summer plans. By reviewing the causes, symptoms and treatment options for dry eye, you can break the cycle of eye irritation, feel better and take control of your eye health.

CAUSES OF DRY EYE

Dry eye occurs when the eyes produce poor-quality tears or not enough tears. While summertime activities can worsen dry eye symptoms, there are many potential underlying causes. For some, certain medications like antihistamines, birth control pills and nasal decongestants can cause a lack of tear production, which results in dry and irritated eyes. For others, environmental factors can cause dry eye, as can wearing the wrong type of contact lens. Some sufferers experience dry eye because of their digital device viewing habits.

SYMPTOMS AND EFFECTS OF DRY EYES

Symptoms of dry eye usually affect both eyes. They include blurred vision, stinging, burning or scratching sensations in the eyes, stringy mucus found in or near the eyes, eye redness, eye fatigue, the sensation of having grit in the eyes and contact lens intolerance. Wearing contact lenses or performing an activity that requires prolonged visual effort (like reading or working on a computer) often worsens these symptoms.

People who suffer from dry eye are more susceptible to eye infections. And, if untreated, the condition causes ulcers and scars on the cornea, and can rarely result in a permanent, partial loss of vision.

TIPS FOR PREVENTING DRY EYE IN SUMMER MONTHS

There are a few things to be mindful of while managing dry eye symptoms in the summer. Wear sunglasses with UV protection to avoid excessive sun exposure. Goggles or snorkel masks can block irritants from the pool or ocean. Be sure to wash your face of sweat and sunscreen. And, keep a healthy distance from smoke caused by camp-

fires and cookouts, which is harmful to your eyes.

All year-round, you can use store-bought, preservativefree hydrating eye drops to help keep the symptoms of dry eye at bay. However, for those who still experience symptoms after using store-bought or medicated eye drops, a visit to an eye doctor may be needed to determine the specific cause of the problem and viable treatment options.

DRY EYE TREATMENT

Getting the right treatment is key to stopping the progress of dry eye condition. Treatment options include artificial tears, gels, eye drops or plugs inserted in the tear ducts. A newer treatment offered at the Florida Eye Specialists Dry Eye Center is LipiFlow Thermal Pulsation, which uses warm temperature and gentle massaging to open blocked glands.

Dry eye is a chronic condition that is often permanent, but if treated, relief is in sight. Make an appointment with a medical professional to determine the cause of your dry eye and come up with a custom-tailored plan of treatment to suit your needs and lifestyle.

console with friends, which had just come out three years earlier. He immediately noticed the bowling game's simple user setup and low impact play, making it the perfect transition game for those unfamiliar with video game consoles like seniors.

Recently, Berkholtz said he is getting more individuals with dementia participating. In fact, he recently visited a facility with two teams consisting solely of dementia patients.

"For whatever reason, maybe they bowled in their younger years, but they recognize what they are doing," he said. "It gets them up and out and all they got to do is press that button and laugh when the ball goes somewhere."

A 2017 study by the U.S. National Institutes of Health indicated that it was possible video games could cut the risk of dementia by 30%. Another study published just last year by Oxford University suggested that neurological decay could even be slowed down by using them.

At the Palms at Ponte Vedra retirement community, a team with two players from MorningSide, a memory care facility, play Wii bowling every day they can get out of bed. Staff encourages them and when they hit strikes, everyone cheers. Resident Estelle Barfield plays from her chair, flicking her wrist to send slow balls precisely aimed like a master marksman at spares, which she calls "her specialty."

Exercise alone doesn't account for the cognitive improvement the study indicated. There is speculation that the games' ability to improve motor skills, develop a technique and promote social interaction help seniors create a buffer for dementia.

Primarily, however, social interaction has long been known to be a key element in making seniors happier and healthier over time.

Asking any senior player why they enjoy the game and what keeps them coming back to play, the usual answer



is "the friendships." The game's ability to bring people together creates an environment of comradery that mimics actual sports while also being low impact for aging adults. Wii bowling isn't the only technology facilities like the Palms are using, however. In addition, they provide iPads with games for seniors with failing eyesight and encourage computer literacy among members wanting to connect with their family over the web. It's a skill that not only encourages learning outside of their comfort zone but promotes an easy way to socialize from their homes.

Resident Bud Dalton has a Windows desktop computer set up in his living quarters. He likes it because, "you can check out things on google and know just about anything." Another reason is to stay connected to his family, which he is on Facebook for. He has 10 grandkids and four great-grandkids, so he has his plate full. He likes watching videos of them on his feed but complains that since he "hooked up" with people outside his family, he is "loaded with crud" on his news feed. He is still working out the kinks of being connected.

"It's unbelievable the stuff I got," Dalton said. "I got some people on here that I just don't know anything about."

Recently, however, he figured out how to "slumber" people (snooze) so he is making progress with getting back to what's important — his family.

Saying bye, bye to stretch IRAs?

As you may know, Congress passed, and the President signed, a new tax law near the end of 2017 that changed many provisions of the tax code for individuals and businesses. While many people and businesses have benefitted from the changes, they came at a cost – the annual budget deficit of the Federal government has risen from about \$500 billion on average to about \$1

trillion on average. Some of the increase has been offset by higher tax revenues resulting from increased employment, greater business profits and tariffs on imported goods. However, there is a concern inside the beltway that \$1 trillion-plus annual deficits cannot continue without wrecking the economy.

Enter the SECURE Act. SECURE stands for Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act

Wow, quite a mouthful. Basically, this proposed legislation — it has NOT passed yet — would (a) delay when required minimum distributions would need to be taken from IRA accounts.

(b) provide more flexibility in handling retirement funds and, hopefully, (c) provide some greater comfort to those entering retirement. Please understand that all the proposed provisions of the Act are still being negoti-

However, there are also provisions intended to increase tax revenues. One provision that appears to have widespread support is the abolishment of the "stretch IRA." As a reminder, there are presently two distribution methods which can be used by non-spousal beneficiaries of an IRA account — one is to cash it out within five years of the year of death of the IRA owner and the second is to stretch the distributions from the IRA over the lifetimes of the non-spousal beneficiaries. The latter approach is often used as a tax-favorable distribution/ estate planning strategy.

The SECURE Act would replace the stretch strategy with a 10-year mandatory payout for essentially all nonspousal beneficiaries, thus effectively destroying the estate planning strategies that many people have put in place regarding their

pre-tax accounts. There are a variety of exceptions to the new rule which may exist, but my take on it is that the planning we've done to minimize taxes on these accounts will largely be eradicated.

What can you do if this act becomes law?

Assuming you have traditional IRA accounts that are unlikely to be spent during your lifetime, you need to rethink how you pass these assets. If you are contem-

plating converting traditional IRA accounts to Roth IRA accounts, you may also want to reconsider as Roths will be treated under the Act using the same 10-year distribution schedule (no tax effect but the earnings on Roth funds, once distributed, are taxable). Finally, using trusts, including IRA trusts, to handle these funds may be less advantageous under the provisions of the Act. One strategy continues to be life insurance

buying a life insurance policy on the IRA owner using annual distributions from the IRA. The death benefits paid by the policy are income tax free, although earning on the funds, once received, are taxable.

As is always the case, each situation must be studied in the context of whatever ultimately passes Congress and gets signed into law. I recommend that you track what happens to this proposal and, if something passes, contact your financial advisor or estate planning attorney to determine what changes might be appropriate in your estate plan. Remember that we cannot

change what Congress might do, but we certainly can change our plans based on new circumstances. Stay tuned.





News from THE PLAYERS: MaliVai Washington Youth Foundation

Few people know the impact of the MaliVai Washington Youth Foundation quite like Marc Atkinson. The organization's Director of Tennis first walked through the doors of the center in 2000, after just failing the sixth grade. Introduced to the organization at a community event hosted to educate youth about the risks and dangers of drugs, Atkinson embraced the Foundation's offerings of a safe place, character development, academic supporttutoring and tennis.

Located in an urban community with disproportionately high rates of violence, the MaliVai Washington Youth Foundation operates a recognized afterschool program that utilizes the sport of tennis to promote academic achievement and positive life skills to kindergarten through high school students.

"I wouldn't be honest if I told you I was a good student and wasn't every bit of a knucklehead when I arrived," Atkinson said. MWYF Executive Director Terri Florio echoed Atkinson's comments, adding that upon joining the program, Marc's grade point average never went lower than a 3.0. "Over the years, I grew to love tennis and I left the center with the tools, skills and experiences that afforded me the opportunity to walk on to the tennis team at FAMU (Florida A & M University), where I earned my bachelor's degree in Sociology," Atkinson said.

Atkinson is the first college graduate of MWYF. Since its inception in 1997, more than 22,000 youth and families have benefited from programming that promotes leadership, sportsmanship, self-esteem, confidence, discipline, accountability, and the value of hard work, teamwork and individual effort.

Committed to "serving hope and changing lives," MWYF launched a \$5 million capital campaign for a new Teen Center to increase the number of youth served. In support of MWYF's efforts to reach the final \$1 million of its fundraising goal, THE PLAYERS announced a community challenge grant, providing a dollar for dollar match, up to \$500,000, for all funds raised. THE PLAY-ERS' gift will fund the center's middle school wing, serving and supporting students like Marc who grow up to be-



come champions in their communities. The new MWYF Teen Center is slated to open in the spring of 2020.

"This place gives what so many in this community don't have—resources, support, and love," Atkinson said. "And for many of the kids—including this big kid here a second family."

Atkinson and his wife, Tashika, have three children and live in Jacksonville.
