Chris Strickland runs for St. Johns County Sheriff

Chris Strickland announced his candidacy for the office of St. Johns County Sheriff earlier in the year after he learned Sheriff David Shoar would not be running for re-election.

Strickland has been a law enforcement officer all his professional life. His career started at age 19 at the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office where he worked for over 25 years serving residents and their families. He retired in 2016 as the Director of the Office of Sheriff.

"All my career, I have had a goal of leading the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office in the capacity of Sheriff and have worked to earn the qualifications necessary for this position," Strickland said. "With the approaching retirement of current Sheriff, David Shoar, I have filed to run for the office of Sheriff in St. Johns County.

During my career, I have put the folks in this county first when it comes to the

safety of our families and property. Nothing about that is going to change. I have raised my family here and this has been my home for over 40 years. I have watched this county grow

tremendously and have had the experience of watching three sheriffs lead the growth of the sheriff's office as it grew with the county's population."

Strickland was hired as a deputy sheriff for St. Johns County by Sheriff Neil Perry. He had served as a member of the Sheriff's Explorer program since age 14. Strickland graduated from St. Augustine High School and went on to graduate from Flagler College with a bachelor's degree in Public Administration. He continued his education at Columbus State University in Columbus,

Georgia completing a master's degree in Public Administration, with a major in Justice Administration. He also attended and completed the Georgia Law Enforcement Command College, located in Columbus, Georgia. He was promoted to ranks of sergeant, lieutenant, commander and finally director of the office of sheriff.

"There are many challenges facing law enforcement and our country today," Strickland said. "It is extremely important that our sheriff is in tune with all aspects of law enforcement, as it relates to what has happened in the past, what's happening at present and what we face in the future. As a resident of this county, you have a right to ensure you, your family and property are all protected. Being part of a community that works and lives cohesively with their law enforcement is the best way to ensure a culture of mutual respect and compassion toward one another.

"We can make this county an example to follow for all the counties in this state and country for that matter. But we must do it together and if you care about building that culture as much as I do, we can do it," Strickland said.

Changing administrations in a position as critical as sheriff is a big concern for everyone he said.

"That is why experience in this position is critical. The position of Sheriff should be regarded as one which you can look to for answers when things go wrong. It holds a tremendous amount of responsibility and can work for you to restore order and normalcy when life takes unfamiliar turns," Strickland said. "Please know, I have made a career of protecting our families here in St. Johns County and with your help, I will continue to do just that."

His most recent assignment in the Florida Army National Guard was as a Senior Non-Commissioned Officer Instructor at the Camp Blanding Regional Training Institute's Officer Candidate School. In 2018, after 25 years of active and national guard service, Chief Hardwick honorably retired.

Chief Hardwick is very active in the community. He was appointed in 2016

by Governor Rick Scott to serve on the Criminal Justice and Standards Training Commission. He also serves on several boards, including the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office Police Athletic League, the St. Johns County School's Academy of Law & Homeland Security, and the School Advisory Board for St. Joseph Academy Catholic High School. Finally, he continues to volunteer as a local youth coach.

Chief Rob Hardwick has been married to Kendell for 28 years, and they have two adult sons. They worship at St. John Paul II Catholic Church.

Lend An Ear Outreach, PVB Rotary Club to provide free hearing aids

Thanks to grants received from the Ponte Vedra Beach Rotary Club and Rotary District 6970, Lend An Ear Outreach will be able to provide First Coast residents in need with free new hearing aids. To identify and select recipients, Lend An Ear will identify eligible recipients at screenings in Hastings Oct. 24 and 25.

"We decided to host the screenings in Hastings because we identified a particular need in that area for our services," Lend An Ear Executive Director Scott Hetzinger said. "Thanks to the generosity of the Rotary Club, we will be able to provide 40 people with brand new hearing aids."

The grants will allow them to be purchased at significantly reduced prices through the Starkey Hearing Foundation's Hear Now program.

"Typically, new hearing aids cost around \$3,000," Hetzinger said. "So,

through this outreach program, we hope to provide \$120,000 in free hearing aids to local residents in need."

To qualify to receive the hearing aids, residents must meet certain income guidelines and be screened by an audiologist. Hearing screenings will take place from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 24 at the Hastings branch of the St. Johns County Library, 6195 S. Main St. A second screening event will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday, Oct. 25 at the W.E. Harris Community Center, 400 East Harris St.

Those who qualify will complete an application and return in December, when they will be professionally fitted. They will also receive a cleaning kit, instructions on the proper use and care of their hearing aids and a year's supply of free batteries.

Hetzinger said those who do not qualify for the new hearing aids may be able to re-

ceive a refurbished one from Lend An Ear.

Ponte Vedra Beach Rotary Club President Vickie Cavey credited Rotarian Bruce Jones – head of the Vicar's Landing continuing care community and president of Lend An Ear – with alerting the club to the need for hearing aids in the community. "The theme of Rotary International this year is 'Rotary Connects the World' – and

hearing loss can be so isolating," Cavey said. "By funding this program, we hope to help those with hearing disabilities connect to the wider world."

Down Syndrome Association of Jacksonville to host 17th annual Buddy Walk Oct. 19

The Down Syndrome Association of Jacksonville (DSAJ) will host its 17th annual Buddy Walk on Saturday, Oct. 19, at the Seawalk Pavilion in Jacksonville Beach. Event proceeds will support DSAJ's programs, all of which are designed to enhance the lives of children, teens and adults with Down syndrome in Jacksonville and surrounding communities.

Day-of registration opens at 9 a.m. with the 1-mile walk starting at 10:30 a.m. on the beach. In addition to the walk, attendees can enjoy family-friendly festival activities, including inflatable jumps, carnival rides, music, face painting and more.

The Buddy Walk is a nationwide event created to celebrate individuals with Down syndrome and to ensure they are given the opportunity to become valued members of our community. Last year, more than \$12.1 million was raised worldwide by 305,000 participants.

DSAJ Executive Director Debbie Revels said her organization is aiming to raise \$255,000 at this year's walk and would like to increase participation to 3,500 walkers.

"This event has a special place in my heart," she said. "Not only are we raising money for the critical programs oper-

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Ponte Vedra teen awarded for 'repairing the world'

In May, Ponte Vedra High School's 2019 valedictorian, Grace Freedman, gave a speech about the power of youth, a subject close to her heart.

"America's youth has proven time and time again that it has the power to wield an enormous impact via our collective voice and remarkable actions," she said. "Whichever issue you deem important, it's incumbent upon all of us to leave the world in a better shape... For if we do so, we will be remembered as a class, and by extension, a generation of action and hope."

Freedman personally experienced the extent to which teens can make a difference. And in August, she learned that she had received the Helen Diller Family Foundation Diller Teen Tikkun Olam Award. Granted in recognition of her outstanding work in leadership and service to her community, it also included \$36,000 toward her tuition at Yale University.

"Their foundation believes in supporting Jewish teen leadership because they know that by supporting us today, that mobilizes us to become better activists and leaders for the future," Freedman said, explaining that the award is inspired from the Jewish precept, "Tikkun Olam,"

or "repairing the world."

Freedman cofounded JaxTHRIVE, a nonprofit organization based in Jacksonville, that provides mentoring and educational assistance to refugee children in the area.

"Every Saturday, we mentor refugee youth in math, reading and English and after, we have lunch with them and do STEM projects or go outside," Freedman said. "The main focus is helping refugees acclimate to the education system in the U.S. and giving them support through the volunteers and each other with the friendships made."

She said she was inspired to create JaxTHRIVE after she volunteered for an international resettlement organiza-

tion called World Relief, which received federal budget cuts after the 2016 election, forcing it to shut down some of its programs.

"I felt that I couldn't just abandon the kids that I formed such close bonds with," Freedman said. "So, I decided to take initiative and cofound JaxTHRIVE with Chase Magnano, who's currently a senior at Ponte Vedra High School."

Initially, the cofounders struggled with the organization, both financially and with finding dedicated volunteers. But the Ponte Vedra Beach and Jacksonville communities rallied to help. Support for the endeavor led to more than 100 volunteers tutoring on a rotating basis.

The Bolles School recently formed a JaxTHRIVE chapter, and Freedman is planning to create another chapter in New Haven, Connecticut, while studying at Yale.

She also wants to change the name of the organization from "JaxTHRIVE" to "THRIVE" and expand it on a national level. In order to do that she is seeking more volunteers and financial donations. "Because we live in a very privileged area, we often don't think that certain issues would be present in our area," she said. "But really, there's a large population of refugees in the Jacksonville community and there is a need to help."

Children's Home Society of Florida to host 36th annual Caring Chefs event

The Caring Chefs event draws over 2,000 guests from around the region.

"This event is definitely deep rooted in our city's history," D'Agostino said. "It's growing and it's getting bigger than ever."

This year, unlike past years, Caring Chefs will also host a VIP Pre-Party for an "exclusive look at the event." The Pre-Party will include early admission and also a designated VIP area with food, beverages and live entertainment.

At the heart of the Caring Chefs, however, is the Children's Home Society of Florida, which receives about 90% of sponsorship dollars from the event. The nonprofit serves more than 10,000 children and families in Northeast Florida, which includes services like counseling, adoption, fostering and child welfare programs.

"CHS was founded in 1902, we are celebrating 115 years of being a leader in serving kids and families," D'Agostino said. "It's events like these that really help us to continue to help support our local families and the programs we offer them."

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Featuring Wounded Warrior Project

Tony Mediate

In this edition of Why I Serve, featuring Wounded Warrior Project, the Recorder sat down with St. Augustine resident Tony Mediate, an Army veteran who served in Vietnam as Armament Officer, Helicopter Gunship Aircraft Commander. He served in the National Guard Reserve from 1974 to 1991. Mediate retired from a career as a mining engineer and now focuses his attention on God and family.

When did you enter the service?

I first went into the service in 1968. I was in the service for 23 years until 1991. I entered the service when I flunked out of college and, at the time, helicopters were very big on the list. If you're 18 years old and some guy tells you, "Hey, how would you like to fly helicopters," I thought that was pretty crazy. I went in and took a few tests and they said, "You can be a helicopter pilot."

Where did you serve?

Part of my group was sent to Fort Bragg, North Carolina. We trained with the Special Forces. I guess they thought it would prepare us better for Vietnam. Twenty years old and I went to Vietnam. I was there for one year and one day.



What did you do after leaving Vietnam?

I continued in the reserve program then my civilian job as a mining engineer for 20 years and then from there I moved into the engineering field and into energy. When we retired, we looked at Savannah, Georgia, we came to St. Augustine and we really liked it here. I stay busy with the grandkids, the church and a nonprofit.

Sister Hazel to headline NOCtoberfest

The Gainesville band Sister Hazel drifts effortlessly along the edge of Southern rock and country to the delight of loyal fans known as "Hazelnuts." The five talented musicians cemented their place in musical history with "All for You" topping the adult alternative charts in 1997. The album went platinum.

To get up close and personal, plan to attend NOCtoberfest from 8:30 p.m. to 10 p.m. Oct. 26 at Nocatee Station Field near the Splash Park. Four back-to-back Billboard Top Country Albums Chart entries shift the band to a new, or maybe just expanded, audience. The most recent project is a series entitled "Elements" that was released Sept. 6. "Good for You" is the first single.

The Recorder caught up with Sister Hazel drummer, Mark Trojanowski, who answered some questions about the band.

How did you guys meet and decide to form a band?

In 1993 Ken Block was looking to put together an original music project. He was already in other bands and playing a duo gig with Drew Copeland. Ken put up a flyer looking to form a new original project. Jett Beres, our bass player, was the first to respond to the flyer and for the first year there was another drummer and guitar player in the band. I joined the band in the summer of 1995 to fill the drum slot and Ryan Newell came on in January of 1996. Since January of 1996, it has been the same five guys in the band.

"Hazelnuts" know the origin of your band name but tell the rest of our readers why you're called Sister Hazel.

I was not around when the naming of the band happened, but I would imagine

there were a multitude of names being discussed. When Ken was thinking of naming the band after Sister Hazel Williams, he did not know she was still alive. In the early 1990s she was not present in Gainesville, as she was running missions in Belize and Haiti. It wasn't until she came back to Gainesville that she learned a band had taken her name. She reached out to Ken one early Sunday morning on the phone and they set up a meeting at a Shoney's. Sister Hazel Williams was okay with the band using her name after sitting down and talking with Ken, who described the types of songs he had written and that the band was promoting a very positive, uplifting experience.

Can you recall your first "real" gig as a band?

One of my first shows with the band

was the Floyd's Music store in Tallahassee. I had just joined the band in the summer of 1995 and our bass player had just left for Europe. So, I had to wait about two months before playing my first show.

I have been playing drums since I was 10 years old. During my early years of instruction and through my college music experience I was put under many high-pressured musical experiences. All of that training and practicing helps to create confidence and a feeling of calmness.

Only two of you still call Gainesville, Florida home. How does that work with your schedules recording and touring?

When we need to rehearse, write songs or record we will get together either in Nashville, Gainesville or Atlanta. We still spend over 80 days a year playing shows so we are also able to use the time on the

road to work on things if we need extra days.

What music did you listen to growing up and why?

I listened to a lot of jazz music growing up. From Count Basie to Miles Davis, I just listened to it all. I think the biggest way it shaped me was how well those jazz players were able to play each night. They had such an extensive vocabulary and were always listening to the music around them. They also had an amazing sense of time.

How has your music changed since "All for You"?

I actually think our current sound is very close to the Somewhere More Familiar record. We have always had piano, organ and other keyboard parts on our records since Somewhere More Familiar. We just never took out a keyboard player on the road. A while back we met Dave LaGrande and had the ability to bring him on as a side musician with the band. We enjoyed having that other instrumentation live and he has stayed out with us for seven years. I think if you compare the sound of the new "Element" records to Somewhere More Familiar you will hear a lot of the same instrumentation. There are a lot of acoustic instruments on these new records and not a lot of layering of instruments. I think the sounds on Fortress, Chasing Daylight and Absolutely are very different than the new records and Somewhere More Familiar.

Tell us about your new music on EP, Earth. Do you play any of the songs from it live currently?

We are trying to play one song from each record live. It gets hard some nights

New K-8 school to be located south of Crosswater neighborhoods

St. Johns County School District has announced that the newest K-8 school will be located south of the Crosswater neighborhoods. The new school, K-8 School "MM," will be located on approximately 25 acres at the intersection of Crosswater Parkway and Pine Island Road.

K-8 School "MM" will accommodate approximately 1,500 students. It has been designed to provide both traditional and nontraditional settings with classroom areas that can accommodate groupings by grade or as multi-age students using teaching teams. Movable walls between classroom pairs facilitate the team teaching approach. Common area with computer labs and kitchen areas allow for flexibility of instructional methods and group learning activities. This school's

spaces include 32 primary classrooms; 22 intermediate classrooms; six science labs; resources rooms; skills labs; exceptional education spaces; art rooms; music rooms; physical education spaces; vocational education labs; a media center and support spaces; an administrative suite; food service and dining facilities; stage; multipurpose room; student and public restrooms; and custodial spaces.

This new school is the fourth school site donated by Nocatee's developer to the St. Johns County School District. Palm Valley Academy opened for the 2018-2019 school year, Valley Ridge Academy opened its doors in 2014 and Ponte Vedra High School opened in 2008 — all on land donated to the District by the developer.

"Education is an important cornerstone of the Nocatee lifestyle," said Greg Bar-

bour, chief operating officer of The PARC Group. "This new school reinforces that the Nocatee lifestyle incorporates all of its residents' needs, from education to health, wellness, recreation, employment, and more."

The PARC Group is expediting con-

struction of the Crosswater Parkway extension to provide access to the school site for Nocatee residents. The St. Johns County School District anticipates opening for the 2021-2022 school year.

Zoning of students will be determined by the School District at a later date.

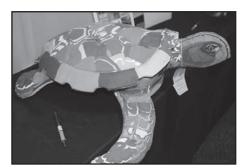

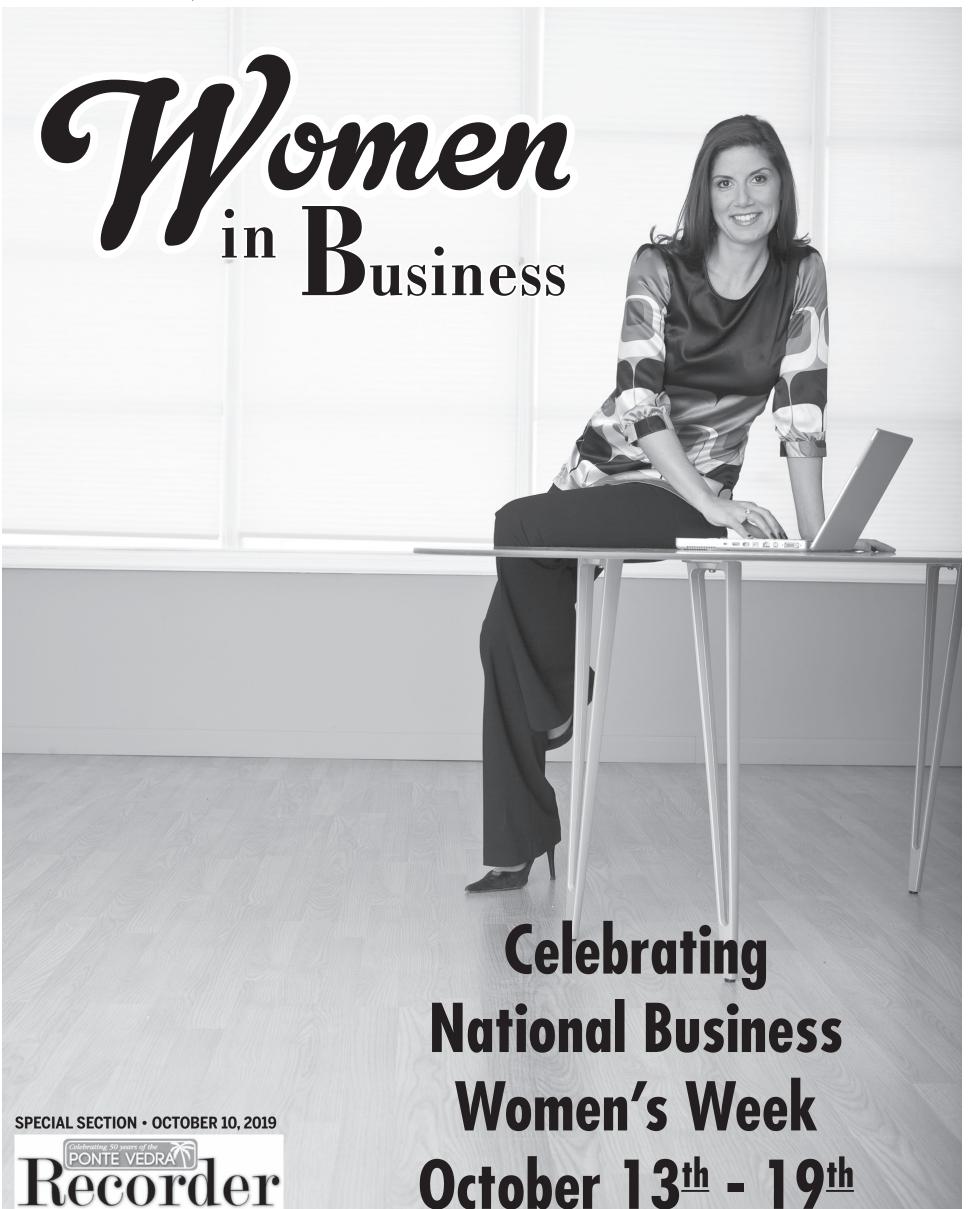

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Financial Focus: Are women better investors than men?

probably agree that men and women frequently behave differently, and these differences often show up in professional, family and social situations. Of course, this certainly doesn't mean either

gender has an advantage in these areas. However, here's an interesting question: Do women possess attributes that may make them better investors?

Some evidence suggests this may indeed be the case. Consider the following:

■ Long-term focus: Women seem to focus more on long-term goals, according to some studies, whereas men may concentrate more on short-term track records of potential investments. Generally speaking, taking a long-term approach to investing is a good strategy because it can help you maintain discipline and avoid subjecting yourself to the dangers of overreacting to market swings. One such danger: selling an investment whose price may have dropped but may

still have strong fundamentals and good prospects.

- Less frequent trading: A wellknown study University of California study found that men traded investments 45% more frequently than women. Other more recent studies have produced somewhat different results, but the overall picture does seem to show that women do significantly less buying and selling than men. This tendency is important because frequent trading can undercut a longterm, cohesive investment strategy. If you're constantly buying and selling, you won't give some investments a chance to achieve their full growth potential, possibly disrupting the diversification necessary for long-term success.
- More thoughtful decisions and more receptiveness to professional advice: Women take more time to make investment decisions than men, and more readily accept investment recommendations from financial professionals, according to a survey from InvestmentNews. And women are more likely to consult a professional financial advisor in the first place, according to a study from the

Spectrem Group, a financial research firm. Given the number of factors involved in successful investing – setting long-term goals, evaluating risk tolerance, navigating volatile financial markets, diversifying investment portfolios, and so on - it's important to get solid financial and investment advice from trained, experienced professionals.

■ Greater risk aversion: When it comes to savings and investing, women are generally more risk averse than men, according to a large-scale survey by BlackRock, a global investment management firm, and supported by numerous other surveys and studies. Having a greater risk aversion can help women investors reduce the likelihood of incurring short-term losses from highly volatile or speculative investments. Nonetheless, it's not really possible to avoid all investment risk – and it's probably not even desirable. In fact, there may well be a flip side to women's risk avoidance, in that

And this indeed is a danger to which women investors should be alert. Generally speaking, neither excessive risk nor excessive caution will serve investors well.

A long-term perspective, avoidance of excess trading, willingness to take advice from professionals, and careful risk management - these characteristics of women investors can be of value to everyone. Consider putting them to work for yourself.

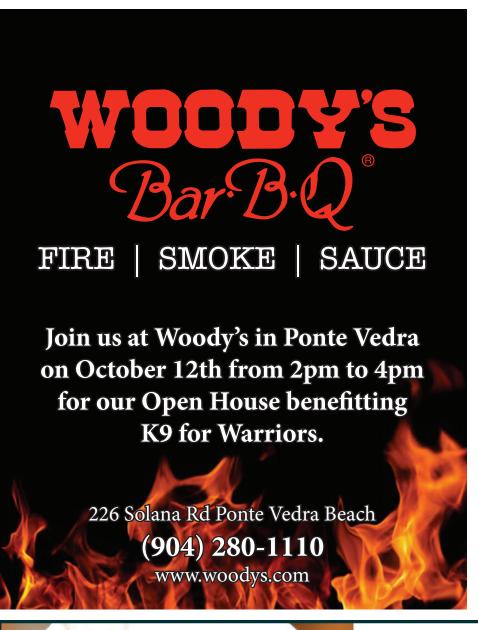

Celebrating its 25th anniversary Oct. 4, the Cultural Center of Ponte Vedra Beach hosted its first national exhibit, "1¢ LIFE," as well as the 55th anniversary of the "1¢ LIFE" landmark publication, which debuted in 1964.

Guests came to the evening celebration in their favorite 1960's attire, with outfits inspired from the luxurious Marilyn Monroe to the groovy vibes of Jimi Hendrix. Light snacks and an open bar were offered, along with a silent auction.

"Thank you to my staff for your team spirit, dedication and enthusiasm," said Cultural Center Executive Director Donna Guzzo. "And remember that access to the arts is vital to a vibrant community, so I appreciate everyone here tonight."

With more than 55 original graphics and poems from the landmark publication, the "1¢ LIFE" exhibit features 1960's pop-art from famous artists, including Andy Warhol and Roy Lichtenstein. The poems, produced by Walasse Ting, delve into the author's life experiences of the everyday, including subjects such as racism and identity politics.

"We decided that we wanted to expand our bubble and bring as much culture to the cultural center as we could," said Cultural Center Community Connections Director, Jennifer Jordan. "We decided this exhibit would be more popular to a broader range of audience."

Scott Grant, financial advisor and local historian, was among the guests at the Oct. 4 event. He partnered with the Cultural Center Sept. 27 to give a historical presentation of the "Summer of '64" in St. Augustine and Jacksonville, Florida, regarding essential local events in the Civil Rights Movement that changed the course of U.S. history.

"We're doing programs for it for all ages. We did the "Summer of '64" with Scott Grant," and "all this 1¢ LIFE artwork is from 1964, so it's a really interesting year to talk about," Jordan said.

Barbara Colaciello, performance artist and educator who once worked with Warhol in New York, said, "What I like about this exhibit is that it has historical references and it's not just about Warhol. It's important to educate people to what pop-art really is. Warhol was part of it, but if you take your time with the art and actually read the poetry, it encompasses what the sixties was really about."

Ranging from the stunningly enchanting to the legitimately phantasmagorical, Palm Valley native Serena Bass takes Halloween to a whole new level.

Don't ask her who she is supposed to be, however, because she doesn't have an answer for you.

About a week before the holiday arrives, Bass begins a frenzy of piecing together, digging though rubbish and materializing ideas. In the past, she has been an Ice Bird, a puppet being "mastered," a traveling fortune teller, with booth included, and a tropical jungle.

"One thing about my costuming is I have all these ideas for different things, then, at the last minute, it all goes haywire," Bass said. "Then I'll choose something else."

Her ideas stem partially from practicality — utilizing random bric-a-brac and debris around her house. The other half, however, is derived from somewhere deep the in cavernous depths of creative appetite.

Growing up, the Bass family always made an effort to scale-up their Halloween costumes. Some of her earliest memories include being a nurse and wheeling around her father on a gurney with his intestines out. From that happy childhood, Bass was inspired to piece together her own ideas out of fragments of household salvage. She remembers during her senior year of high school, she made for a very convincing anglerfish, complete with luminescent fleshy lure.

Over the years, Bass added wings, audio enhancements and even stilts to her costumes. "I was not thinking that walking on stilts was going to be hard," Bass said. But, "Going out, there were like, flights of stairs to go up. Also going to the bathroom was kind of awkward. Because I was higher than all the stalls."

Par for the course, Bass doesn't know what this year's Halloween will look like. But she has some ideas. She is particularly inspired by the revival of Jim Henson's Dark Crystal on Netflix.

"If I have an idea I like enough, I'll make it work somehow," Bass said. "I change my mind a lot though."

With her creative costumes, Bass enters contests hoping to win. But she says she hasn't won in years past. "I make these elaborate things, and you would think, there has got to be nothing like this. People are going to love it," she said. "And then, you go to the Halloween costume contest and the girl with the least clothing wins."

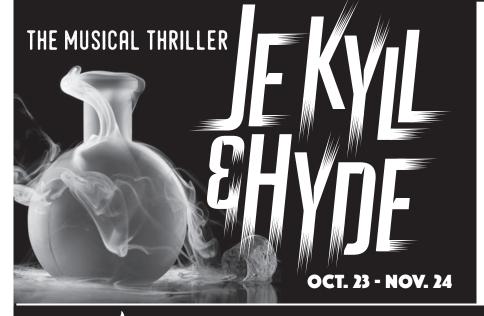

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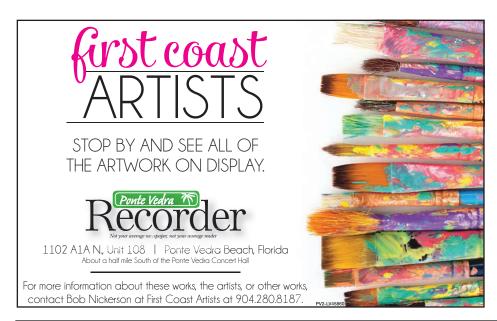
Ponte Vedra Concert Hall Art Contest awards party rescheduled for Oct. 26

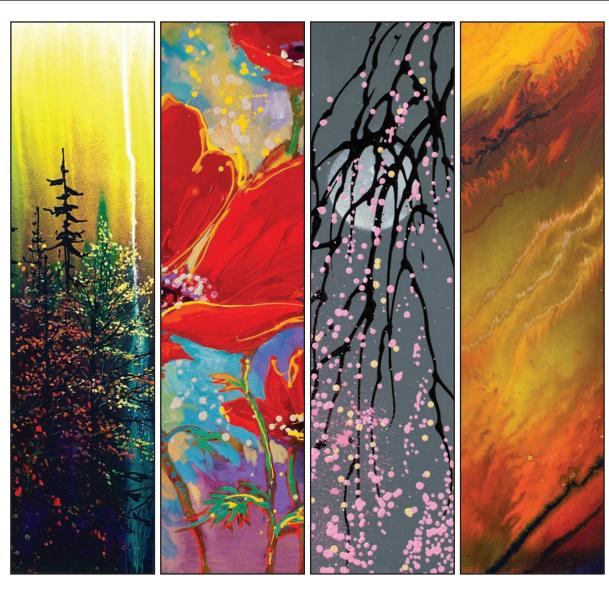
The awards event is free and open to the public. Light hors d'oeuvres will be served, and there will be a cash bar.
