





Homicide, suicide leaves 2 teens dead in Ponte Vedra

The St. Johns County Sheriff's Office Major Crimes Unit are currently investigating the death of two individuals at a Ponte Vedra Beach residence as of early Sunday, Feb. 9.

The individuals are 17 and 18 years of age, according to an SJSO media release.

At approximately 1:30 a.m. deputies responded to a report of two deceased males at a residence on Solano Cay Circle.

The individuals were located in the master bedroom of the residence.

The cause of death of both subjects has been ruled death by a gunshot wound. The manner of death of the 17-year-old has been ruled as a homicide and the 18-year-old's death has been ruled a suicide.

The circumstances surrounding why the incident occurred and if any intent was involved are still under investigation and are pending additional forensic-digital examinations.

MSD favors construction of sidewalk along San Juan Drive

The Municipal Service District discussed the issue of sidewalks at the board of trustees meeting, Monday, Feb. 10 at Our Lady Star of the Sea in Ponte Vedra Beach.

The recent topic of constructing a sidewalk along San Juan Drive has been contentious among residents. The board, however, voted in unanimous favor to advocate the addition of one along the

While the vote passed in favor of the resolution, the MSD would not be building the sidewalk but standing behind the residents of the area that are working toward its construction. Not all residents are in favor of the plan, however

"Numerous people said that the answer to traffic and speeding was to widen San Juan Drive," said MSD Treasurer Gary Jurenovich. "With my years of experience doing this, if you widen a roadway — people drive faster. To widen San Juan Drive, the amount of time and the years and the dollars would take four or five billion dollars."

Recently elected MSD chairman, Brad Wester, said he is "emphatic" about the idea, as well as a possible sidewalk addition to Ponte Vedra Bouleyard

"We are here for the betterment in the



totality of the community in terms of a safer passageway," Wester said. "We are stewards of that cause."

Additionally, the board touched on a few other community news subjects, including the recent resignation of Billy Zeits, assistant director of St. Johns County Parks and Recreation. The board also reported the Mickler's Beach access, which has been under construction, will continue operation during the next two weeks while repairs are made

to the concrete access. New restrooms and changing rooms are also currently being constructed, however, a late March completion date of those facilities has been announced.

The next MSD board of trustees meeting will be held Monday, March 9 at Our Lady Star of the Sea in Ponte Vedra Beach. The board will be not continuing their meetings at this location, however, and is currently exploring other options.

St. Johns County funding news

St. Johns County anticipates receiving Community Development Block Grant funds for the 2020-2021 Federal Fiscal Year and invites citizens and community organizations to interact, receive information and apply for funding in the following ways:

Survey – Citizens may provide input on the housing and community development needs of the county by sharing opinions in the 2020 Community Survey.

CDBG Application – Through the application process, the county makes CDBG funds available to eligible community organizations. The 2020 application is now available. Completed applications are due on April 17.

Community Meetings – Several meetings are planned in locations across the county for the purpose of providing information about the CDBG program and learning about the needs of local communities. At these meetings, the Community Survey and CDBG applications will be available.

Vote by mail procedures change

Approximately 22,500 vote by mail ballots were mailed Feb. 6 to voters who requested them for the March 17 Presidential Preference Primary Election.

Because of a 2019 law, a big change for St. Johns County voters is the vote by mail drop boxes will only be available from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., March 7-14 inside early voting locations. A 24-hour drop box in front of the elections office will also be available for voters' convenience.

Drop boxes will no longer be available at all public libraries, the Tax Collector's offices in Julington Creek and Ponte Vedra Beach or at St. Augustine Beach City Hall.

In order to be counted, vote by mail ballots must be returned to the elections office by 7 p.m. on Election Day.

As a reminder, the March 17 election is open only to registered Republican and Democratic voters to select their party nominee for president, and for voters who reside in the City of St. Augustine to vote on charter amendments. Voters registered with a minor party or no party affiliation (NPA) are not eligible to vote in that election.

2 golf legends take the stage together on JAGA awards night

The Redcoats are a familiar sight at THE PLAYERS Championship every year. Given that nickname because of the red jackets they wear, the Tournament Chairmen, and Chairwomen, are volunteers who oversee the thousands of other volunteers who help make the championship the success it has become.

John Tucker was the first Redcoat. In 1965, he helped create and launch the Greater Jacksonville Open, which became the Tournament Players Championship and then THE PLAYERS.

Tucker also helped bring Deane Beman to Jacksonville, and the city has Beman to thank for putting it on the golf map.

Beman moved the Tournament Players Championship and the PGA TOUR headquarters to Jacksonville. Then as Commissioner of the PGA TOUR from 1974 to 1994, he led efforts to grow the tour, including establishing a successful television model, establishing a pension plans for players, and starting the Senior Tour and the President's Cup.

The Deane Beman Award was created in 2015 to recognize individuals who have had a significant, long term impact on golf in the First Coast area.

And on Wednesday, Feb. 5, at the Jacksonville Area Golf Association awards dinner at TPC Clubhouse, John Tucker was recognized at this year's Deane Beman Award winner.

During a special appearance together on stage, Beman and Tucker reminisced about

Tucker spoke about how Jacksonville was much different in 1964, when as general manager of Florida Publishing Company, he and company President Robert Feagin - both avid golfers — worked to lure the PGA TOUR to Jacksonville.

The first GJO in 1965 was played at Selva Marina Country Club. Then, working with others to convert the GJO to

Mentors make difference in local schools

On Feb. 5, the St. Johns County School District, Retired and Senior Volunteer Program of St. Johns County and other local mentor groups hosted a mentor fair to introduce interested residents to local programs. RSVP focuses on opportunities for people 55 years of age and better to assist children and adults in their educational pursuits. But St. Johns County schools welcome mentors of

Cheryl Freeman, director of RSVP, began the presentation of an hour-long orientation by asking the group to share attributes of a mentor they had in their lives. Honest, direct and reliable were a few of the responses. Then she invited Charlie Judice, a volunteer

who mentored a student from eighth grade through high school, to share his experience. Judice has a PhD in physics and a successful engineering career behind him.

"I mark mentorship as my biggest success," he said. "... I get back more than I

Judice's mentee went on to receive a scholarship to the University of Florida, graduated and is now a bank manager. Judice currently mentors a high school student who is interested in aerospace and welding. Judice quickly pointed out that being a mentor is less about teaching and more about showing up. Sometimes it's just having lunch. An advanced degree is not required.

When did you open your dry-cleaning business?

In 1990. Our first location was 1,000 square feet on Southside Boulevard. Three years later we opened the Ponte Vedra location, where we are now, on Solana Road.

What inspired you and Mike to go into that type of business?

We had been married for two years, working in our careers. He was working in the pipe fitting industry and I was selling personal computers. His company was closing the office here and he always wanted to own his own business. So his mother, who owned a local laundromat in Atlantic Beach, encouraged us to look at opening a dry-cleaners. Her business was thriving, and she saw a need for quality dry-cleaning.

Has the business changed a lot since 1990?

Yes. From 1,000 square feet our main plant is now 8,000 square feet. That's on Southside Boulevard, so we have two locations. In 1993, we opened this one in Ponte Vedra Beach; we don't clean any clothes here. We are in our third location in Southside, so we have grown. We went from 1,000 square feet to 3,000 to 8,000. We are thankful for the growth.

Has the industry in general changed?

I think the biggest ways are in getting more creative in serving the customer. Pickup and delivery in the last eight to 10 years has really increased. We have also changed our cleaning process to be more environmentally safe.

Who else in your family works the business?

Mike and I work full time. His mother, Marian, is also involved. She sold the laundromat in 1996 and came to work for us full time. She works part time now, since she's 83, and solely at the Ponte Vedra location, where the customers love her. Our daughter, Clare, is our wedding dress specialist.

Where did you grow up?

In Jacksonville. I went to Englewood High School and I was a member of the first freshman class at UNF, the year it went four-year.

Where did you and Mike meet?

We were at UNF at the same time, but we were introduced by Mike's cousin, who went to high school with me.

What do you do outside of work?

I'm very involved with my church, Christ Episcopal,

with the youth group. I mentor for confirmation, have served on the Vestry and as a mission trip chaperone. Both of our families are still here in Jacksonville, so we have a lot of family commitments we enjoy.

Tell us about your children.

Clare is 26 and Mark is 23. Both graduated from Ponte Vedra High.

Any hobbies?

I enjoy walking on the beach. I also exercise in a boot camp group class.

What do you like about the dry-cleaning business?

Like owning any business, it's making your own decisions. Seeing your hard work create growth. But it's a tough business, there's a lot of moving parts. There are a lot of challenges to owning a business today. No matter what it is. We've invested a lot in automation, but there's only so much that can be done with automation. It's labor intensive. We have 75 employees and started out with one.

What areas do you serve on the First Coast?

We serve from Fernandina Beach to North Vilano Beach and west to Ortega. We have about 10 vans and many routes.

what eventually became THE PLAYERS, Tucker spearheaded a tournament that had hundreds and hundreds of volunteers and land available in Ponte Vedra Beach for \$1.

Beman reminisced about how moving the tour to Ponte Vedra Beach was an offer that he couldn't refuse.

Tucker pointed out that so many people offered to volunteer at the tournament

every year, that "pretty soon, when Deane came down, the whole town supported us."

"It's because of the volunteers," Beman said. "When I became commissioner, golf was a minor sport. In 1974, bowling had more events on television."

"Look what this man has brought to Jacksonville," Tucker said, pointing to Beman. "There are over \$100 million in charity dollars in our community today. Deane, we think of the tournament as the gift that keeps on giving."



Volunteers in Medicine hosted its fourth annual Women with Heart luncheon Feb. 5, honoring 10 outstanding women who have made a difference in the First Coast community.

In addition, Nina Waters received the top honor, the Dorion-Burt "Heart of Gold" award.

"The Dorian-Burt Heart of Gold is in honor of our two founders, Dotty Dorian and Dr. Jim Burt," said Jennifer Ryan, CEO of Volunteers in Medicine. "The honoree is someone who's not only advocated and helped Volunteers in Medicine, but someone who's advocated and helped the whole community for health. Past recipients are Sherry Magill and Dolores Barr-Weaver. This year is Nina Waters."

Waters is president of the Community Foundation for Northeast Florida, Florida's oldest and one of its largest community foundations since 2005. During her tenure, the foundation's assets and annual grantmaking quadrupled since her leadership, with \$47 million worth of annual grants to the community by the end of 2018.

"When we think of philanthropy, we often think of people giving money but actually, money is sometimes the least important gift you can give," Waters said. Then she laughed and added, "except for today when you text VIM" to donate to Volunteers in Medicine.

"But there are many ways individuals can support—through work, wisdom and wealth—and Volunteers in Medicine is a perfect example of people giving all three," Waters said. "I'm very honored and humble to receive this award," she added, thanking her friends and everyone attending the luncheon.

Women with Heart is not only an awards ceremony, but also VIM's top fundraiser of the year.

News4Jax anchor Joy Purdy encouraged guests to donate to VIM's \$10,000 goal and said that if the goal is reached, Florida Blue and an anonymous donor would match the \$10,000.

Guests donated via their smart phones from their seats and could view the progress on a large projector screen at the front of the room.

To show where their donations would go, videos of clients' stories were aired on

the screen.

One story featured Maria Gabbard, who's a hypertension diabetic who lost her husband 11 years ago, along with her health insurance. VIM was and continues to be a safe haven of support, said Gabbard, who attended the luncheon.

"It's been the most amazing thing for me," Gabbard said. "I can't thank the nurses, doctors, supporters and all that make Volunteers in Medicine possible."

The luncheon also highlighted the 2020 Women with Heart honorees one by one, with videos that explained and highlighted their contributions.

One of the honorees, attorney and shareholder at commercial law firm Smith, Hulsey & Busey, Charmaine Chiu, does not directly deal with patients or work in the medical field. But she does help acquire land and property for medi-

cal practices to flourish.

She said in her video that although she doesn't deal with patients first-hand, she feels proud and honored to "indirectly" impact organizations like Volunteers in Medicine.

There was a "whole lotta shakin' goin' on" at the fifth annual Ayla's Acres No-Kill Animal Rescue gala, Shake, Rattle and Roll Casino Night, to raise funds for its Peter's Friends Animal Resource Center.

Fang, the Jacksonville Icemen hockey team mascot, greeted guests at the door Saturday evening at the River House in St. Augustine. On the patio overlooking the Matanzas River, the full moon rose behind the lighthouse and glistened on the still water. The air was chilly, but inside the gambling, bidding and dancing was hot.

Ayla's Acres is raising funds to build the St. Johns County-based Peter's Friends Animal Resource Center, which will serve as an adoption facility, low- or no-cost spay and neuter clinic and education and outreach center. The 10,000-square-foot facility will be located on 17 acres in St. Johns County at 5051 County Road 208 at the intersection of 13A. It is designed to house up to 40 cats and 40 dogs, but 60 animals would be optimal.

The nonprofit receives no government funding, relying instead on private grants, donations and fundraising activities. Ayla's acres also benefits from donated items that are sold through its thrift shop in St. Augustine.

Award-winning actress, Loretta Swit, supports the mission and vision of Ayla's Acres through her nonprofit, the Switheart Foundation. Swit greeted guests warmly and posed for pictures in what seemed an endless line of fans and supporters.

Susan Welch was especially eager to connect with Swit. She started watching the television series M*A*S*H after her late shift at Wendy's when she was about 14.

"She's the reason I became a nurse," Welch said of Swit's character, Major Margaret Houlihan. "My entire goal in life was to become an Army major."

Welch understands Houlihan is a character, but believes it was Swit's own strength showing through the role that made it so believable. Welch, although not a major, made the rank of captain in the Army, and currently works as an emergency room nurse in Palatka. She also shares Swit's love of animals. Welch and Rick Sheldon have a "minifarm" with about 120 animals off County Road 208 and hope to make room for more.

"She's probably guided a lot of my life," Welch said.

Luxury 'garage condominium' concept takes off in Nocatee

There's a new community in Nocatee, but it's not a traditional neighborhood. In fact, it's a storage facility. But it's not a traditional warehouse, either. WheelHouse Storage is a secure site with 36 luxury "garage condominiums." Chris Pilinko and David Wallace make up the WheelHouse development team. Pilinko, president, introduced the concept in 2015.

When collectors or enthusiasts purchase a climate-controlled unit, ranging from \$100,000 to \$360,000 depending on size, they are free to build-out the interior however they want. Most of the units contain cars, but some store boats or recreational vehicles. One of the owners, Jeremy Price, didn't modify the space much at all. He had plans to build a structure, but purchasing a unit at WheelHouse was more cost-effective.

"We love anything outdoors," Price said. He stores watercraft, four-wheelers and a vehicle in the space, and appreciates the security, convenient location and climatecontrolled environment. He also has access to the owner's lounge at the front of the complex to relax and watch TV, grab a cup of coffee or use the restroom. Some owners have used the lounge for small meetings as a way to get employees or clients out of the typical office environment.

Other owners convert the space, or spaces if they buy multiple units, into somewhat elaborate man caves with a mezzanine, car lift, bathroom, media room and lounge area.

"Community is a big part of Wheel-House," Wallace said. "Yes, it is functional storage space that they need, but big draw is the opportunity to be around other likeminded individuals with similar passions. In our case, it's typically cars."

Greg Bennett stores an eclectic collection at WheelHouse that includes his first classic car purchased about 20 years ago — a 1963 Thunderbird. He doesn't consider himself a serious collector because his vehicles are more in the daily driver category instead of show quality.

"This is just kind of a fun passion for me," he said.

Bennett has a mezzanine upstairs that's about 12 by 20 feet. Along with a variety of automotive signage, models and memorabilia, he has an older model pinball machine and comfortable seating. He said they had a large garage in Palencia, but decided to downsize to a condo at Vilano Beach. He stores two Auburns, the T-Bird, a Plymouth Cranbrook and a surfer's dream — a Woody Wagon.

"I buy cars because I like them, they strike a chord," he said. "They're fun to

About once a month, Wallace and Pilinko open the gates and garage doors and invite WheelHouse friends and family to spend the afternoon swapping car stories and adventures as well as check out the latest addition to a collection or the latest build-out inside a unit. It's a way to reinforce the community concept as it was originally intended.

The Ponte Vedra units are sold out, but

another WheelHouse Storage is under development on Wm Davis Parkway, across the street from the Mayo Clinic in the San Pablo area. It will be roughly double the size of the Nocatee location.

Mentors schedule about 45 minutes per week to meet with a student to support academic pursuits and other goals. No experience is required and background screening and training are provided at no cost. Even though the district is A-rated, most schools have a need for mentors and Freeman can facilitate a connection.

"One reason we're No. 1 is because we look at students as individuals," Freeman said. "All schools are wonderful across the district, but there are still students in need at each school."

Paul Goricki, principal at Hartley Elementary School, said the mentorship program is irreplaceable because, while traditional teaching provides knowledge, mentors share experiences.

"Now we know kids learn by doing," Goricki said. "When mentors come in, everybody gets more. They introduce kids to a world of possibility."

He said it's important for students to hear about experiences from someone other than school staff. Students interact with teachers almost daily, so having a mentor come in exposes them to a different point of view.

"It enlarges their world," he said.







Stroke deaths rising in St. Johns County: Link between stroke, heart health

Stroke is the second most common cause of death worldwide, and 1 in 6 of us will experience stroke in our lifetime. Unfortunately, new research from the American Heart Association shows that stroke deaths are on the

rise in certain counties across the country, including here in St. Johns County. The data shows that stroke deaths among individuals over age 65 in St. Johns County increased 19% from 2010 to 2016. There was also a 12% increase among middleaged individuals, age 35 to 65. These numbers show a tremendous need for stroke prevention and care.

A stroke happens when a blood vessel that supplies blood to the brain is blocked or ruptures. What most people don't realize is that heart health has a lot to do with your risk of suffering from a stroke. About 3 out of 4 people who have a stroke for the first time have high blood pres-

sure and atrial fibrillation — an irregular heart rhythm — is present in about 20% of strokes.

The good news is that you can defend against stroke by promoting a hearthealthy lifestyle. With February serving as American Heart Month, now is the perfect time to learn how to promote your own heart health and lower your risk of stroke.

LINK BETWEEN HEART HEALTH AND STROKE

Heart disease and stroke are closely tied together, because the brain needs oxygenrich blood pumped from the heart to function properly. A stroke occurs when blood flow to the brain is suddenly interrupted. This can be caused by a blood clot creating a blockage or a blood vessel rupturing. Risk factors for stroke include high blood pressure, high cholesterol, smoking and diabetes. However, one of the leading causes of stroke people may not know about is atrial fibrillation, or AFib.

AFib is the most common heart arrhythmia and increases your stroke risk by five times. AFib is such a potent risk factor because when the upper chambers of the

heart, or atria, do not contract properly, blood pools in a cavity known as the left atrial appendage. The pooled blood can form a clot that travels to your brain's arteries, interrupting blood flow and leading to a stroke.

HOW TO REDUCE STROKE RISK

To reduce the risk of stroke, the best defense is a good offense. First, know your risk factors. A stroke can occur at any age, but it's more common in those 65 and older. In addition to high blood pressure and AFib, diabetes can also increase your risk. There are many effective medications to treat these conditions which can reduce the risk of stroke, so work with your doctor to ensure you're on the right treatment plan for you.

The vast majority of strokes can be prevented with lifestyle changes. Your number one goal should be to maintain a healthy blood pressure. You can lower your blood pressure by eating a hearthealthy diet, avoiding salt, sugar and high-cholesterol foods. Get at least 30 minutes of activity a day, quit smoking, and if you drink, do it in moderation. If you're over-

weight, losing as little as 10 pounds can have a real impact on your stroke risk.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU HAVE A STROKE

It cannot be overemphasized — know the signs of stroke. Nearly 800,000 Americans experience a stroke every year, and roughly 1 in 4 of these cases are second, or recurrent stroke. The important acronym to remember for identifying a stroke is F.A.S.T. That stands for face drooping, arm weakness, speech difficulty, time to call 911.

It's common to mistake or minimize signs of stroke, but don't delay treatment. For example, if your arm is suddenly numb or weak, and it doesn't go away in a few minutes, don't assume it just fell asleep. Call 911.

Stroke is preventable, treatable and beatable. Through small, easy changes, you can start reducing your risk right now.

Amazing benefits to seniors having pets

Pets bring much joy to the lives they touch. So it should come as no surprise that the 2019-2020 National Pet Owners Survey, which was conducted by the American Pet Products Association, found that about 85 million families in the United States own a pet.

Pets offer companionship and unconditional love. While they are fitting for any family, seniors may find that having a pet is especially beneficial. The organization A Place for Mom, which helps match families with senior living residences, says pets provide a comfort system that produces measurable health results. A recent study from the Mayo Clinic, which looked at 1,800 people between the ages of 25 and 64 who had healthy hearts, found that almost half owned a dog. Having a dog was likely to spur heart-healthy behaviors, like exercising with the pet, eating well and having ideal blood sugar levels.

Pets also provide emotional sup-

port and companionship that can help seniors — including those who may be divorced or widowed — feel more secure and happy. The National Poll on Healthy Aging found that, among respondents who had pets, 88 percent said their pets helped them enjoy life, and 86 percent

said their pets made them feel loved.

Seniors considering getting a pet can explore the many benefits to doing so.

■ Reduce pain: A 2012 study published in Pain Magazine found therapy dogs provided "significant reduction in pain and emotional distress for chronic

pain patients."

■ Feeling of purpose: Caring for an animal not only stimulates physical activity, but it also can give seniors a reason to get up and go, which equates to

Leave your mark: Business execs, boomers, seniors turn to professional biography writers to record life's successes

E.L. "Ed" Wilks has long believed that everyone should have their life story written in a book for their family. That idea was the premise in 1999 for Wilks to start his biography firm, Legacies & Memories. 10 tips for writing your life story

- 1. Determine the primary purpose for writing the book. Are you writing it to preserve the story for your family and future generations? For personal healing and coping and not to be read by anyone else? Preserving the story of your business? Are you writing your story to publish and sell? Whatever your reason, you should have a clear purpose to keep in mind as you write. Also, the story should be written differently if it is to be published and sold to a general audience as opposed to writing for family members.
- 2. Determine the scope of the book. Is it a complete life history or will you cover only one aspect of your life, your family or your career? Will you be writing about a specific event or series of events in your life? For example, your time in the military. Focusing on one aspect of your life would mean you are writing a memoir rather than an autobiography. Regardless, it's a good idea to think about the scope of the book before you begin.
- **3. Determine whether you will interview others.** Do you want your book to be only about your remembrances, reflections

and thoughts? Or, do you want to ask other family members or associates about stories and events they shared with you?

- **4. Determine whether you will conduct research.** Will you write strictly from memory or do you need to research some of the places, events and people in your story?
- **5.** Add historical context to your story. Relate your life and your family's life within the context of historical events or changes. For example, the Great Depression; wars; changes in technology; social, cultural, and economic changes, etc. Write about how the way of life was affected by these changes.
- **6.** Make your story more than just a list of facts. Think about and describe places, people and personalities. Include your feelings, emotions and attitudes. Also, include dialogue when possible.
- 7. Be sure your story has a strong beginning, middle and end. Any good story grabs attention early and pulls the reader into it so he or she will want to read more. You don't have to write your life story in chronological order. Write so the story flows and so the beginning, middle and end are tied together.

8. Think of including items other than photos. Recipes, awards, report cards, resumes, excerpts of newspaper articles about you and your family, and letters you have written are all examples that could be included in your book if they add to or help tell the story. The purpose for writing the story, for family or business or to publish and sell, will help determine items to be included.

9. Have a professional edit your manuscript. Every writer, whether inex-

perienced or professional, needs an editor.

10. Be aware of the lifespan of your story. Make sure the paper on which you print your life story or memoir is acid-free and archival quality. Be sure the type of printing method used will stand the test of time. A life story is usually written so it can be passed down to children, grand-children and future generations. Also, be sure the cover and type of binding you use will last, whether the back is bound as a paperback, in hardcover, or in leather.

■ Perennials last indefinitely. Most of them bloom in and out of color but do not give the constant vibrant color of annuals.


- Many perennials die down in the winter and tend to look dead, but they are not. Wait until spring and they will just need pruning. Prune off dead stems and wait for them to re-appear.
- Perennials should be about 90-95% of your landscaping as they grow back and bloom. However, this is why you need to incorporate both in landscaping to give extra color in those die down months. Annuals should only be about 5-10% of your landscaping due to time, effort and repeat expense.
- Perennials recommended to plant now: Blue Daze, Foxtail Fern, Geranium, Drift Roses

Flower of the Week: Knockout Roses

Knockout roses and drift roses (dwarf knockout roses) are great in 9A zone. Their bloom cycle is every 5-6 weeks and they are relatively easy to grow. Very disease resistant is a great appeal to many people and they add beautiful perennial color to your gardens!

SECURE Act and 529 Savings Plans

Before discussing the impact of the SECURE Act on 529 Savings Plans, I want to comment briefly on the Coronavirus outbreak and its impact on world markets recently.

As you know, this virus started in China but has spread

to some other countries as millions of people travel between countries every day. To date, there is no vaccine for the virus although a number of pharmaceutical companies and various government agencies are working diligently to develop one. So, for the time being, we are all urged to be particularly rigorous in washing our hands and taking other preventative measures. The financial markets have reacted to this situation by selling off, expecting a slowdown in China's economy and the growing concern to impact consumer spending. I believe that a cautious perspective in the face of this threat is wise but hope that we don't turn a measured concern into a global panic. Panics are hard to stop once they start and are driven far more by emotion (fear) than by logic. Hopefully the combination of everyone taking precautions and the development of a working vaccine can arrest the spread of this virus soon. Stay informed but don't panic.

Turning to the SECURE Act (the new tax law passed in late December), there are several provisions included which positively impact 529 Savings Plans. You may recall that these plans were created some years ago to encourage saving for college by allowing people to shelter the income earned in such plans from both Federal and state income tax and the distributions to be tax free as long as the funds were used for higher education. A couple of years ago, Congress expanded the program by permitting the funds to be used for any formal education, from pre-kindergarten through graduate school, either public or private. Now, Congress has expanded the program again to permit the use of 529 funds to pay off student debt (up to \$10,000) and to funds appren-

How to encourage kids to take care of their teeth

Parents of young children know getting kids to brush their teeth can sometimes feel like pulling teeth. Kids have a long history of disliking dental care, which can frustrate parents who know the importance and long-lasting benefits of proper dental hygiene. While many youngsters may never excitedly run to the bathroom to brush their teeth, parents can try various approaches to get kids to embrace proper dental care.

- Start early. Parents should not hesitate to begin cleaning kids' teeth once the first tooth appears. - Involve kids in choosing their dental care products. While parents should be mindful of the type of toothbrush their children use, always sticking with products recommended by their child's pediatric dentist, let youngsters choose their toothbrush and toothpaste. Kids might prefer a particular flavor of toothpaste, and a colorful toothbrush with a favorite film or television character might make kids more enthusiastic and less fussy about brushing.
- **■** Compliment kids after positive dental appointments. When pediatric dentist appointments go well, compliment children and express your pride in them for taking dental hygiene as seriously as they do.

TIPS INCLUDE:

Keep chocolate and candy away from your pets: Just 3 ounces of baking chocolate can kill a 15-pound dog. Xylitol, an ingredient often used as a sugar substitute in many candies, is also extremely dangerous for pets. Keep all chocolate and candy away from dogs and cats.

Avoid certain flowers: A variety of plants, including lilies, azaleas, oleander and rhododendron are also poisonous for pets. Keep your pets away from any flowers and plants to be safe.

Watch thorns on roses: Roses are a very popular Valentine's Day gift but the thorns on the flowers can hurt dogs and cats. Thorns can cause cuts on pets' paws and in their mouths. If swallowed, they can also lead to stomach issues.

Keep an eye on flames: While candles are popular on Valentine's Day, pets can easily burn themselves or knock over candles, causing fires. Make sure all candles are out of reach of pets.

On Valentine's Day, you can give your spouse or life partner a traditional gift such as candy or flowers. But once you've done that, why not think about something that can provide longer-lasting benefits for your loved one?

Specifically, think about ways to provide a lifetime of financial protection.


You can do this in several ways, including:

■ Protection while you're alive: As you know, it's usually necessary for both partners or spouses to work to maintain a household — so if your income were to disappear, even temporarily, it could present a big problem. Your current employer could offer disability income insurance as an employee benefit, but it might not be enough for your needs, so you may want to consider purchasing

your own policy. Keep in mind, though, that disability coverage typically only lasts for a few years, and, in any case, probably won't completely replace your income. ticeships. Also included is a provision that permits the use of funds to pay off the student debt of the beneficiary's siblings up to \$10,000 each. I suggest you read the article in the link below, which describes the changes in some detail.

One of the criticisms of 529 plans has been that money can get trapped in the plan, i.e., cannot be used for education purposes (or is not fully required for that purpose) and will be fully taxed if used for anything else. I believe the changes made more recently address those concerns directly and make these plans far more attractive than was the case previously. Whether you are a parent or a grandparent of children, you may want to take a renewed look at 529 plans – they are a much better and more flexible way of funding almost any level of education than they were initially.

Jack Broadbent to perform in Beaches Museum Chapel series

Singer-songwriter Jack Broadbent will perform at the Beaches Museum Chapel in Jacksonville Beach on Feb. 17 as part of his cross-country North American tour, performing songs from his fifth and latest record "Moonshine Blue."

"The young English slide-guitar bluesman has it all," said Jeff Spevak, 30-year Rochester, New York arts reporter, who saw Broadbent play at the Xerox Rochester International Jazz Festival. "The songs, the gruff-to-caterwauling voice, the out-of-the-mainstream look and a guitar style best described as ruthless."

Broadbent was named "the new master of the slide guitar" by the Montreux Jazz Festival and has been mastering his craft since early childhood with his father, musician Micky Broadbent, who played alongside U.K. vocalist Bram Tchaikovsky during the late '70s and early '80s.

"Being brought up with guitars all along the wall and going to shows, it was definitely inspiring," said Broadbent, while sitting in an Applebee's, taking a break for lunch. "Seeing my dad up there and all the people in the audience, I knew I wanted to do the same and create music that will impact people and make them happy."

The album, "Moonshine Blue," created half in Nashville, half in Montreal, is an ode to Broadbent's travels, with songs inspired by life on the road.

"If' depicts a "broken man" who must venture out in the world to find a breakthrough. "If you're leaving, where you going? I hope you're searching for yourself out there," Broadbent sings in the upbeat track.

The album blends the sounds of blues and folk with subtle jazzy tunes and the occasional saxophone solo like in the track, "The Other Side."

But no matter the genre, Broadbent only hopes to reflect one thing in his music, honesty, a trait he's admired since listening to musicians like Radiohead, Joni Mitch-



ell, Little Feat, Robert Johnson and more.

"If you look at all those artists, they're all actually very similar," he said. "They were honest in their music, in their lyrics. They were fantastic lyricists. My father (for example) was and continues to be a great musician and songwriter."

Broadbent is following his father's footsteps with over 6 million streams on Spotify. He'll be opening for U.K. musician Peter Frampton in May, but regardless

Artist John Bunker honored by Community Foundation for NE Florida

John Bunker, a visual artist and respected veteran of the Jacksonville museum community, recently received the 2020 Ann McDonald Baker Art Ventures Award.

Beyond creating an extensive and varied body of work over his 50-year career as a professional artist, Bunker also helped shape Jacksonville's cultural community during his museum career, including positions as associate director and interim director of the Jacksonville Art Museum and director of the Cummer Museum of Art & Gardens.

The award, which includes a \$10,000 unrestricted grant, recognizes an artist whose work brings distinction to Northeast Florida, and is named for the late Ann McDonald Baker, whose leadership helped create and nurture cultural gems, including The Community Foundation's Art Ventures Fund, the Arts Assembly (now the Cultural Council), Douglas Anderson School of the Arts and Greenscape.

The award was presented to Bunker by members of the Baker family of Ponte Vedra Beach at a private reception.

Nease sweeps PVHS in rivalry showdown

The Nease Panthers swept both contests with their rivals from Ponte Vedra this season after topping the visiting Sharks 45-35 on Friday, Feb. 7.

Just as they did in their first outing with the Sharks, the Panthers came from behind in the fourth quarter to pull out the victory before another near-capacity crowd at Nease. The sweep for the Panthers was their first pair of victories over PVHS since the 2009-10 season. The victory now boosts Nease all time edge in the tightly fought series to

The final 10-point margin did not reflect how tight the game was. With 1:09 left in the game, the Panthers held a slim two-point lead before scoring the final eight points, all from the free-throw line.

The Panthers started fast and finished strong as they now take their 15-7 record and top seed in district play this week into the FHSAA playoffs. Nease jumped out to an early 15-5 lead, aided by eight first-quarter points from senior guard Kyle Baidas.

The visiting Sharks fought back to outscore Nease 13-4 in the second quarter to trail by a single point at halftime. Nothing was decided in the third quarter as Nease took a slim 28-27 lead into the game's final period.

The Sharks took their first lead early into the fourth quarter on a 2-pointer by freshman guard Nathan Bunkosky, but that lead would

be short-lived. The Sharks' leading scorer on the season, sophomore Luke Pirris, then picked up his fourth foul that sent him to the bench. Pirris would return with less than 2 minutes remaining where he netted 1-of-2 free throws to pull the Sharks within two points of Nease at 37-35.

That would prove to be the final point earned by the Sharks, who came up empty shooting from the field the rest of the way, missing all nine of their last shots. After not making a single free throw in four attempts entering the final quarter, the Panthers netted nine in a row during crunch time to pull

Baidas, for the second year in a row, proved to be a thorn in the side of the Sharks. The sharp shooting guard led his Panthers in scoring with a season-high 17 points, the same total he tallied in Nease's win over its rivals last season. Baidas' running mate in the backcourt, Payton Nordness, was also in double figures with 11 points.


Coach Josh Bailen's squad also won the rebounding battle with the Sharks by a 30-20 margin. No Sharks players were in double figures, with Bunkosky and Pirris coming close with nine points each.

The second-seeded Sharks (10-14) were eliminated from the District 4-5A playoffs after a 47-42 loss to Seabreeze on Tuesday night.

The top-seeded Panthers (15-7) hosted Mandarin in the District 1-7A semifinals Wednesday night. The game wasn't over by






