





Short-term rentals under scrutiny as St. Johns County looks to develop possible ordinances

Controversy over regulation goes all the way to state level

As the popularity of Airbnb and similar short-term rental platforms has skyrocketed, communities like St. Johns County have been struggling to catch up.

Joseph Cearley, special projects manager for St. Johns County growth management, said the county is currently working toward developing a few possible ordinances in an effort to regulate the growth of short-term rentals, if that is, the state doesn't roadblock them first.

Recently, a Florida Senate committee approved a proposal that would take power away from the cities and counties to regulate vacation rental properties. The bill would preempt any ordinances of counties to the state's legislation. Regardless of the possible quashing, however, Cearley has developed two directions for the ordinances that will be decided for approval by the commission on March 17.

Cearley said the meeting will vote on which direction for regulation the county wants to go. The possible ordinances mainly favor noise mitigation, occupancy and parking regulations. Cearley said the county does not intend to include restrictions for owner-occupied units, however.

"Property owners are upset about living next to these 'party houses,' is what they're calling them," Cearley said. "They have a lot of people coming in, parking all up and down the road, either trashing the place or being loud."

Although the possible ordinances would regulate short-term rentals, Cearley said they aren't overly restrictive, with one variation setting the maximum household occupancy at 16 people.

"It's nothing too major," Cearley said. The city of St. Augustine, however, recently passed its own version of restrictions in late January that greatly restricts short-term rentals, causing many complaints from rental owners and agencies. The ordinance claims a \$400 permit fee, one off-street parking spot per bedroom and a seven-day minimum stay for rentals within certain zones.

The county's laws would not conflict with the city of St. Augustine, as it is annexed. Cearley said St. Johns County cannot regulate frequency of duration (how long a guest stays) or stop anyone from registering a rental due to a prior state law prohibiting that type of regulation. The city, however, cited a much older law that was in place before the state's law changed. Currently, the House Bill 1011 and Senate Bill 1128, if passed at the state level, would preempt both the city's and county's laws.

Local foundation for autism hosts annual gala

The HEAL Foundation hosted its annual gala and fundraiser Feb. 20 at the Ponte Vedra Inn & Club, where guests ate, drank, danced and went on an auction spree to help raise \$136,000 to "help enrich autistic lives."

Gala guests were welcomed with open doors and an open bar as they lined up for their drinks of choice. They also picked at the hors d'oeuvres in the center of the room, ranging from chips and guacamole to salad and veggies, all in bite-size martini glasses, ensuring attendees still had room for the main dishes off to the side: brisket, shrimp and grits, crab cakes and more.

HEAL founders, husband and wife Bobby and Leslie Weed, later took the stage with their entire family, thanking guests for their attendance and generosity.

Since HEAL began doing fundraising galas, "I'm proud to say we've raised over \$3 million dollars so far," Bobby Weed said as the audience applauded. "It's been wonderful to start this foundation on behalf of Lanier and all the families and individuals we've met and everyone that's supported us along the way. We couldn't do this without all of you."

Lanier is the Weeds' 21-year-old daughter who was diagnosed with autism at 18 months old and is the inspiration behind the HEAL Foundation.

HEAL uses its funds to "Help Enrich Autistic Lives" all over Duval, St. Johns and surrounding counties, by donating grants, iPads and tricycles to local schools and organizations. And as honored guests, students from Westside High School stopped by the gala to strut their stuff with their new trikes, donated by HEAL.

After the special appearance, a lively auction had guests out of their seats, bidding against each other for luxurious prizes, including a large party at the Ponte Vedra Inn & Club, trips abroad and an original painting by one of HEAL's gala guests, who also has autism, 21-year-old artist Gentry Gudal.

The live auction's final total came to \$136,000 which was \$66,000 over the foundation's \$70,000 goal.

"It's unbelievable how much we raised in only 10 minutes," Leslie Weed said after the gala, which was only the first of two HEAL events that week. It was followed by

Ponte Vedra Beach Rotary, Beaches Go Green join forces for Mickler's Landing cleanup

Saturday's strong winds and brisk early-morning temperatures didn't deter hundreds of local residents from gathering at Mickler's Landing for a community beach cleanup.

Organized by the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach in partnership with the nonprofit Beaches Go Green, the volunteer effort saw everyone from young children and local high school students to senior citizens fan out across the beach to collect cigarette butts, debris and other litter.

'We wanted to do an event for the 'Family of Rotary," said Rotarian Marc Savy, noting that the international service organization sponsors EarlyAct programs in local elementary schools as well as high school Interact programs and a Rotaract Club for young professionals. "The (Ponte Vedra Beach) Rotary regularly cleans up A1A, but obviously that wasn't a safe option for young children. We wanted to organize an event in an environment where everyone from the youngest kids to the adults could participate."

Savy reached out to Beaches Go Green, which enthusiastically got on board with the event. The organization provided hundreds of collection buckets and gloves, while local restaurant Trasca & Co. Eatery provided coffee, cocoa and post-cleanup pasta for the legion of volunteers.

"It's really awesome to see so many organizations and businesses come together for an event like this," Beaches Go Green Executive Director Taryn Montgomery said. "It shows that people care and really want to get involved and help the environment."

Bob Davenport was among the volunteers present. Also known as "Bucket Bob," Davenport regularly patrols Mickler's Landing, collecting thousands of cigarette butts, trash, clothing, towels and other items left behind by beach goers. After the recent Valentine's Day holiday, he said, the beach was littered with deflated mylar balloons, which can choke and suffocate birds and turtles.

"Not all balloons go to heaven," Davenport quipped. "They come back as trash; instead of letting balloons go, how about planting a tree?"

Still, Davenport said he was pleased to see the strong turnout for Saturday's cleanup.

"It's good to see more people out here participating," he said. "It would be great if it could be done more regularly."

Local Backyard Buffalo micro dairy dishes out unique, creamy treats

Sometimes a craving for something can last for hours, settling somewhere deep and laying in wait until properly fulfilled.

When a craving like that strikes, it's less like wanting something than being haunted by it.

One day, Punita Patel, Palm Valley resident and owner of Backyard Buffalo micro dairy, had just that sort of peculiar hankering, one she couldn't shake.

"I don't like American tea," Patel said. "I couldn't figure out why it was so different from Indian tea. That's where it started," she said of her business, "because I wanted a good cup of tea."

As it goes, the special ingredient to great Indian tea isn't the leaves, but the milk. Specifically, water buffalo milk, a common dairy ingredient to many Indian food staples, such as khoa, paneer, ghee and shrikhand, which is a yogurt-like product that Backyard Buffalo specializes in.

Currently, there is only one other water buffalo farm in Florida and only a handful in the U.S. For Patel, this meant a lot of work for a decent cup of tea.

Patel started Backyard Buffalo three years ago with no prior experience, having worked in the nonprofit sector prior to moving to Ponte Vedra Beach.

"I didn't know how to milk the buffaloes," Patel said. "I didn't know anything about buffalos and I've never seen them up close. So, to bring a buffalo in my backyard was super intimidating."

Today, the farm houses eight buffalo, with three currently producing milk. Patel's first and favorite, Goldie, recently had her first calf born on the farm. Each morning, Patel wakes up early for a milking, where she acquires only about 2.5 gallons — much less than a typical dairy cow, which produces around 8 gallons per day.

Patel did a lot of research and asked a lot of questions before starting Backyard Buffalo. The farming community accepted her with open arms. As hard as the work is, Patel said she has found it incredibly rewarding. She soon learned that there are few buffalo farms in the United States because the yield per animal is low. With low profit margins, the milk doesn't take well to an American industrial setting. According to Patel, the product, however, is worth the effort.

Buffalo milk is typically creamier and thicker than cow milk, having less water content. It has a mild, sweet flavor that is often described as richer than regular milk. Patel said that is because buffalos

deliver a more "concentrated" version of milk for their babies, which has more minerals like calcium, phosphorus, magnesium and potassium per ounce.

A water buffalo milking involves somewhat of a pampering hand. Without the cosset of a familiar face and routine, they will "pull the milk," meaning, hold the milk from leaving the udder. Patel utilizes a gentle touch with the aid of some delicious barley she acquires from Green Room Brewery after leftover craft beer production. While the buffalo munch away, they let down their teats and Patel fashions on an automatic stainless-steel pump that smoothly sips out the milk with a whirling electric purr. The process usually takes two to three hours.

From that, Patel pasteurizes and creates an array of unique products, which she sells at farmers markets to an increasingly ravenous crowd. Because her yield is so low and her farm small, she is currently "breaking even," although selling out of product every week. Shrikhand, her "yogurt" product is becoming increasingly popular, however. Her sweet, creamy version is often accompanied with lemon or mango puree and flavored with cardamom and nutmeg. It's a style that hails from her hometown in Gujarat, India.

"I wasn't sure how it would sell in this market," Patel said. On a whim, "I took some to the farmer's market and it was a sell-out, a hit from day one. That's when I realized, this is it."

These days, Patel said people are coming back, specifically looking for shrikhand, and finding themselves disap-

pointed when she is out. Unfortunately for them, Patel owns the entire market for buffalo milk shrikhand in the United

"People come craving it," Patel said.
"They have to wait until next week."
They usually do.

Beaches Museum hosts Boardwalk Talk honoring novelist Zora Neale Hurston

Tru Leverette speaks about Hurston's achievements and contributions to African American history

Tru Leverette, Ph. D., associate professor of English at the University of North Florida, was a guest speaker the Beaches Museum Feb. 25 as part of the museum's Boardwalk Talk lecture series.

Leverette's lecture, entitled Zora Neale Hurston and the Pleasure of her Company, drew a packed crowd to the Beaches Museum Chapel in Jacksonville Beach.

Zora Neale Hurston is most famously known for her novel, "Their Eyes Were Watching God," however, Leverette also spoke about her lesser known contribution toward the Harlem Renaissance, her anthropological studies and her enigmatic personal life. Hurston, who died in 1960, was one of the first scientists to actively document and capture African American oral tradition folklore, such as "Brer Rabbit" and "Signifying Monkey." Because of her work, many firsthand recollections

and retellings were captured and preserved.

Growing up in the all black town of Eatonville, Florida, Leverette said Hurston also spent some time in Jacksonville

while attending school. Here, Leverette said, was where she first experienced racial discrimination as she retells in her essay, "How it Feels to be Colored Me." Due to her experiences, much of Hurston's fiction work takes place in Florida. Today, Orange County celebrates a Zora

Neale Hurston festival every year at the anniversary of her death.

Hurston's work is widely recognized as some of the pinnacle literary achievements during the Harlem Renaissance. She died in 1960, however, she was mostly unrecognized until years after her death, during the 1970s. She is known for capturing African American dialect as it was spoken in the South in the 20s and 30s, which can be tied back to her work preserving the region's folklore, also known as "Lying Sessions."

Leverette's presentation was held at the Beaches Museum honoring Black History Month. Next month the museum will be celebrating women's suffrage with Dr. Peggy Macdonald presenting "Florida's Female Pioneers," on March 5 at 6 p.m. For more information on upcoming Boardwalk Talks or chapel events, visit, beachesmuseum.org.

CITRUS TREES

Ever wonder what type of citrus trees thrive in Northeast Florida? Growing citrus is not only great for fresh fruit, but they are beautiful ornate trees with a wonderful scent. All citrus trees in this region require a minimum of six hours of sunlight or more. They also require more water than most trees no matter if the weather is hot or cold. Dwarf trees are suited for smaller yards and spaces, whereas a big yard may have many large citrus trees. Fertilizing with specific citrus fertilizer quarterly is key to the success of these trees growing in our zone. Here are some of the most popular in our area:

Meyer Lemon, Persian Lime, Tangerine, Valencia Orange, Pon-

derosa Lemon, Key Lime, Ruby Red Grapefruit, Calamondin, Mandarin Orange and Cocktail Citrus tree.

A Cocktail Citrus tree is grafted with three to five fruits, including orange, grapefruit, lemons, and limes. It's a great option if you only need one citrus tree in your landscaping but want to have multiple fruits. Fun fact: Each year, the Cocktail Citrus tree can bear different fruits than the year before.

Are your financial and tax advisors talking?

Now that we've closed the book on 2019, it's officially tax season. As you prepare your tax returns for the April 15 deadline, you might already start looking for opportunities to improve your tax-related financial outcomes in the future. And one important step you can take is to connect your tax professional with your financial advisor. Together, these professionals can help you take advantage of some valuable strategies:

- Roth vs. traditional IRA If you're eligible to contribute to a Roth IRA and a traditional IRA, you might find it beneficial to have your financial advisor talk to your tax professional about which is the better choice. Generally, if you think your tax rate will be higher in retirement, you might want to contribute to the Roth IRA, which provides tax-free withdrawals (if you're older than 59½ and have had your account at least five years). But if you think your tax bracket will be lower when you retire, you might be better off with the traditional IRA, which offers upfront tax benefits - specifically, your contributions may reduce your annual taxable income in a given tax year. Your tax advisor may have some thoughts on this issue, as well as how it might fit in with your overall tax picture in retirement.
- Taxable vs. non-taxable income Turning taxable income into non-taxable income can lower your current year's tax bracket. Depending on your income, you could potentially subtract your traditional IRA contributions (or your SEP-IRA contributions if you're self-employed) from your taxable income. And even now, it's not too late to affect the 2019 tax year, if you still haven't reached the IRA or SEP-IRA contribution limits. Before you file your 2019 tax returns, your tax professional can tell your financial advisor how much you would have to contribute to your traditional IRA, SEP-IRA or similar account to potentially lower your taxable income. If you make the contribution, your financial advisor can illustrate how it would impact your retirement picture and make a recommendation on how to invest the money. (You can fund your IRA with virtually any type of investment — stocks, bonds, mutual funds, and so on.)
- Capital gains taxes on mutual funds You might think you have total control over taxes related to your mutual funds. After all, you decide how long to hold these funds before selling shares and incurring capital gains taxes. However, mutual fund managers are usually free to buy and sell new investments as they see fit, and some of these sales could generate capital gains taxes for you. If these taxes are relatively large in any one year, your tax professional may notice and could relay this information to your financial advisor. This doesn't necessarily mean these

"Most surgeons use ambulatory surgical centers," he told me. "Here we have a spa-like setting. We believe in raising surgery to not just an art, but an experience."



away suits to veterans. One of those suits ended up on the cover of Folio magazine. And all the time we talked about our visions for the future and his desire to have everyone see beyond 20/20. I wanted people to see the future, he wanted them to see it with perfect vision.

Sometime later, I went back to the surgical center. I asked questions. "How long

does each surgery take," I asked?

"Seven to 10 minutes," he replied, "each surgery is unique and customized to the individual patient."

I started to ask another question, but he interrupted me.

"I don't just see eyeballs," he said. "I see their faces looking up at me saying please help me, Dr. Gulani. I trust you."

I smiled and started scribbling. I knew I was going to write something, and I loved that line. As I wrote he attempted to interrupt me with a wry smile and said, "I feel

obligated to do my best," adding, "and repay that trust with vision."

That day patients came from all over the world. One was a race car driver from Sweden, blind in one eye, which sounded sort of dangerous to me. I was glad he left with two good eyes. A patient from Egypt told me that, "many surgeons failed in my Lasik, until they all suggested I travel to Dr. Gulani."

Other patients came from London, Dubai, and Canada, as well as a doctor from Idaho, who had done her research and decided Gulani was her only hope to fix her cataract surgery complications.

As we were leaving, Gulani shared his plan for an event to honor visionaries in our community and asked if I wanted to help. It seemed like a noble cause, so I agreed. He slapped me on the back and said "You, Scott, are a pearl."

And so, we await the next chapter, Friday, March 20 at the River Club, when the Gulani Crystal Ball Beyond 2020 Event will be held. Someone will be named a visionary.

Couple's collaborative careers serve them and their clients well

Since he was 14 years old, Karsten Jacobson had a passion for numbers and investing, even researching financial investments on his own as a high school student in Springfield, Missouri.

During a freshman-year business class, his teacher told the students to close their eyes and imagine where they would be in the future — their careers and who they would work for.

Their jobs require different but overlapping areas of expertise in the financial services industry. Which means what they can do together, for each other and their clients, adds up to more than the sum of each part.

Especially "this time of year, when we are extremely busy, it works out really

well," Karsten said one recent day in Daysi's office. "When she has clients who have questions that are more my wheelhouse, I can come down and answer them."

Daysi agreed. "When they start asking questions about investments, retirements, social security benefits and financial planning, I answer—and then they start asking more in depth questions, and I'd rather they ask Karsten. I leave that to him."

Karsten and Daysi met as students at the University of North Florida in 2015. She was majoring in accounting and finance and he was a financial services and finance major. They met during a study abroad class, while touring the wine industry in Portugal.

Karsten had come to Jacksonville with the U.S. Navy and after getting out of the service, was furthering his education to pursue his childhood dream.

As soon as she gained American citizenship, she applied and was accepted and ended up working for them for 10 years as a revenue

agent in Jacksonville.

"I really enjoyed working for them," Daysi said. "The tax world is fascinating, really interesting," and to further her education, "the IRS gave me the flexibility to go to school full time."

They married in April 2017. Both had been married before and had children, so they created a blended family with three children, and then added a fourth.

"We always had a connection working together," Daysi said of her and Karsten. "For me, it was important to help people. When I worked for the IRS, I worked with people who were getting audited and ripped off by their accountants. They were not being advised and that's why they were in trouble. They were scared, but there was not much I could do; I was working for the government."

Alhambra show succeeds at skewering corporate world

Long before Don Draper personified the cool, corporate "Mad Men" executive of the 1960s, "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying" tackled the same topic as a Broadway musical. And nearly 60 years later, The Alhambra Theatre & Dining's production of this popular show succeeds in skewering a corporate culture that really hasn't changed all that much from the '60s.

"How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying" centers on J. Pierrepont "Ponty" Finch, a lowly window washer who, armed only with the self-help book of the show's title, bluffs and blusters his way up the corporate ladder of a large company. Along the way, he encounters many of the same peeves and pitfalls encountered by white-collar workers today.

Nepotism? Check out Bud Frump, the boss's sniveling, sneaky and supremely unqualified nephew. Old school connections? Better let the boss think you went to the same college he did. Office romances and infidelities? "How to Succeed" has them in spades.

Many of the show's songs, in fact, address some of the common corporate problems still around today. In "The Company Way," a mid-level manager instructs Ponty in the fine art of corporate camouflage, keeping your head down and your mouth closed so that no matter what happens to the company or who gets fired, your job will always be secure. "I Believe in You" – sung by Ponty to his own reflection in the executive washroom mirror – pokes fun at the

culture of positive self-affirmations. And in today's era of #metoo and heightened awareness of sexual harassment, "A Secretary is Not a Toy" seems positively prophetic.

The Alhambra is known for the quality of the musical theatre talent it attracts to Jacksonville, and the "How to Suc-

ceed" cast is among the best to grace the stage at the nation's oldest continuously operating dinner theatre. As J. Pierrepont Finch, Christopher Lewis brings just the right combination of boyish charm and bravado to the role, and his ringing tenor vocals are outstanding. Similarly, Lindsay Nantz shines as secretary Rosemary, conveying a sunny, chipper '60s optimism with her Broadway-quality voice. Ricky Cona's Bud Frump is the smarmy office backstabber you love to hate, while Maddie Bryan relished her role as Hedy, the boss's mistress.

If life in the office hasn't changed all that much since the 1960s, "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying" proves it helps to at least be able to laugh about it.





On Saturday, Feb. 22, the Ponte Vedra Sharks wrestled particularly hard for Coach Josean Gonzalez and Assistant Coach Rich Maritato, finishing third at the District Championships.

The strong showing was particularly meaningful for Maritato, who plans to retire at the end of the season after 37 years of coaching.

Maritato, 73, also known as "Pop" in the wrestling room, has done a lot for the sport of wrestling in Northeast Florida. He was first exposed to wrestling when he encouraged his sons to pick up the sport in New Jersey, where he raised his family. Then, during his sons' careers, he went from being a father in the wrestling program to a full-time assistant coach for almost four decades.

Maritato moved to the First Coast in 2004 with his wife Sharon to be close to his family. Over the years, he was an assistant at Nease High School and also at Florida School of the Deaf and the Blind in St. Augustine. He spent most of his coaching career in Florida, however, at Ponte Vedra High, where both his grand-

sons, Troy Maritato and Rett Maritato, have wrestled with successful careers.

During his tenure, Maritato has had district champions, state qualifiers and even a state champion.


