

Motorcyclist dies in accident on Valley Ridge **Boulevard in Nocatee**

An accident Friday afternoon in Nocatee claimed the life of a motorcyclist.

According to the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office, the motorcycle was traveling eastbound along a curved section in the 4000 block of Valley Ridge Boulevard when it apparently iumped the curb and ejected the rider.

No other vehicles were involved, and investigators do not believe that speed was a factor.

The rider was treated at the scene and taken to Baptist South Hospital, where he was pronounced deceased. The rider's name was not released.

Following the accident, Valley Ridge West at Joellyn Court was closed for a time to traffic in both directions.


Florida bars allowed to reopen at 50% indoor capacity

Firefighters remember those lost in Sept. 11 attacks during ceremony in St. Augustine

A large group of local residents and first responders gathered Friday morning on the front lawn of the St. Augustine Fire Department's main station to remember the nearly 3,000 people lost in the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks.

The Ceremony of Remembrance marked the 19th anniversary of the al-Qaida attacks on the World Trade Center, the Pentagon and United Airlines Flight 93, which crashed in Pennsylvania. The first ceremony was conducted two days after the attacks and has continued each year on Sept. 11.

St. Augustine Fire Chief Carlos Aviles

praised the men and women of the fire service who responded that day and the days that followed.

"It takes loyalty to remain there for weeks after the attack, painstakingly digging through rubble looking for your fallen brothers," he said. "It takes duty to drop everything that you're doing, whether you're on shift or not, and race into the city as hundreds of thousands of people are fleeing on foot in sheer terror."

The featured speaker was Gerard Durkin, retired Fire Department of New York officer.

"At 9:10 a.m., I was in New Jersey with

Surfers rescue man with dangerous medical condition

A local man is alive today largely due to the efforts of two fast-thinking surfers.

It was a beautiful Saturday at the beach behind the Ponte Vedra Inn & Club, the kind of day that draws families. It was also the kind of day that draws surfers; Hurricane Isaias was offshore on that first day of August, and it was creating ideal surfing waves.

Ben Smith had paddled out on his short board but soon found himself in a rip current.

"I started paddling, and I tried to fight against the rip," he said. "About that time, I started feeling light-headed and dizzy."

Smith has been surfing for more than 30 years, catching waves around the world. In fact, he's rescued a couple of people in that time. But he also has a couple of medical conditions, including atrial fibrillation, that occasionally flare up.

He knew he was in trouble.

He attempted to wave down another surfer, Jeff Tidwell. At first, Tidwell thought Smith was just waving hello, so he waved back. Then he turned to another surfer, Brogan Taylor, and asked, "Do you know this guy?"

When he turned back, Smith was patting his chest. Tidwell turned to Taylor and yelled, "Hey, man, something's up."

The men paddled over to Smith, Tidwell arriving first. "I was yelling for Brogan, 'Hey, I'm going to need some help; we've got to get this guy to the beach,""

The men arranged for Smith to lie on his board and grab onto their ankles so that they could tow him in.

Eventually, they entered what surfers call the impact zone, where the waves are most powerful when they break. Suddenly, a five-foot wave rose up, about to crash down on the three of them.

Taylor and Tidwell knew they would have to separate from Smith. They angled him so that he could possibly ride out the wave. After it passed, Taylor looked for Smith's board, which would be sticking up out of the water if he'd slipped off because he was tethered to the back end. But there was no sign of it.

"I look over at Jeff and I go, 'Where is he?'" said Taylor. "Jeff said right before it hit us, he looked over at him and said, 'You hold onto that board like your life depends on it '"

And Smith did just that. They found him and got him to the beach. Taylor ran for help while Tidwell stayed with Smith.

"A lady came out of nowhere," Tidwell recalled. "She said, 'What's going on? I'm a trauma nurse. Can I help?' She literally took control of the scene. She started asking for things out of the lifeguard's bag. She cut his sun shirt off of him. She backed everybody up. She asked for an umbrella for shade. She asked for towels for him to lay on."

Soon, deputies and Fire Rescue arrived and Smith was taken to the hospital.

The episode now behind him, Smith expressed gratitude for the paramedics, the lifeguards, the nurse and everyone else who helped that day. And, especially, the two men who got him to shore.

"These gentlemen were selfless, and we need more of that in our society today," he said. "Every day's a blessing; we've just got to remember it."

"I'm glad I was there to help," said Tidwell. "I would hope somebody would do it for me."

my wife and my children," he recalled. "The phone rang. It was my mother-inlaw in Brooklyn telling me frantically to turn on the TV."

He did so and watched as a plane flew into the south tower of the World Trade Center, where his sister-in-law worked. He kissed his wife, hugged his children and raced to the scene 40 minutes away.

"Upon my arrival, I could see the north tower still in flames, but the south tower no longer existed," he said.

Heading to the site from a fire station, he watched in horror as the north tower collapsed.

Durkin described what he saw that day and how he and his fellow first responders searched through the rubble for anything to help identify the victims.

"With every item I found, I prayed that I would find something that would lead to my sister-in-law," he said.

In the end, they never found her.

"The empty chair at Thanksgiving and Christmas still haunts us," he said.

Friday's ceremony concluded with a minute of silence precisely at 8:45 a.m., timed to coincide with the moment the first plane hit the first tower.

Afterward, a member of the department struck the historic 1900 fire bell in four intervals of five rings each. This is a tradition signifying the last alarm of a

firefighter. The ringing was performed to honor the firefighters, law enforcement officers, military personnel and civilians who died on Sept. 11, 2001.

Can you please briefly tell us about your background?

I am a native Floridian. I went to the University of Florida and trained in medicine there. I've been an anesthesiologist for the past 20 years. I worked for the Baptist Beaches group until the end of last year when I started focusing on interior design full time. I moved to St. Augustine in 2004 with my husband and we've lived on sailboat for the past three years. Since we love sailing and being on the water, this is something we've been saving up for our entire marriage. This is our dream house, and it just so happens that our dream house floats!

How did you get into interior design?

Creativity and art have been passions of mine my whole life. Since college, and even before, I was always designing and creating. I loved redecorating for my family members as a young adult. However, 30 years ago, interior design wasn't thought of as a real career, so my parents encouraged me to pursue a more sustainable career. I loved practicing medicine, but recently I had the opportunity to put my days in medicine behind me and focus on something different that I love just as much as medicine. In 2017, I started Design MD and did it part time until the beginning of this year when I started pursuing it full time.

What do you enjoy most about your role?

I absolutely love the challenge of taking a space that is tired, outdated or not inspirational and making it a space that speaks to the person that occupies it. What are some of the challenges that your industry/company is facing?

Another difficulty is that from a budget standpoint, people have unrealistic expectations for what items and services cost. It's challenging when people have an unrealistic idea of the financial investment that goes along with interior design.

Play in progress on OPE's new community-funded playground

This fall, students were welcomed back to Ocean Palms Elementary School with a playful surprise — a new playground, known to those on campus as The Otter Park.

This colorful, fun-filled play structure was the end result of the Ocean Palm Elemen-

tary PTO's efforts last school year to collaborate with sponsors, families and community members alike to raise the nearly \$150,000 needed to replace the existing structure, which was more than 10 years old.

Florida Department of Education awards OPE for creating change

Ocean Palms Elementary School was recently recognized as the Florida Department of Education's 2019-2020 winner of the Family and Community Involvement Award in the elementary category for Region II. This is the highest award presented by the State Department of Education.

The award was created to recognize innovation, school-level family and community involvement, and partnerships — all of which describe the school's Be the Change initiative, which prompted the award.

Be the Change is a program that brings environmental awareness to the school alongside partnerships with Beaches Go Green and Ponte Vedra High School. Beaches Go Green especially brings attention to the impact of single-use plastic waste and its effect on the environment.

Ponte Vedra High School students provided STEM education as well as presentations on how to educate the community on the need to reduce single-use plastics to the fifth-grade students. Then, with that knowledge, the fifth-grade students led the schoolwide Be the Change project, which focused on refusing, reducing, reusing and recycling. This culminated in the construction of an 8-foot light-up otter installation at the 2019 Deck the Chairs event. The

installation was composed of egg cartons, leftover construction materials and hurricane sandbags. Additionally, the school's ambassador students incorporated recycled/repurposed materials in their many annual service projects.







CITRUS TREES

Ever wonder what type of citrus trees thrive in Northeast Florida?

Growing citrus is not only great for fresh fruit, but they are beautiful ornate trees with a wonderful scent. All citrus trees

in 9A require a minimum of six hours of sunlight or more. They also require more water than most trees no matter if the weather is hot or cold. Dwarf trees are suited for smaller yards/spaces, whereas a big yard may have many large citrus trees. Fertilizing with specific citrus fertilizer quarterly is key to the success of these trees growing in our zone. Here are some of the most popular in our area:



Meyer lemon, Persian lime, tangerine, Valencia orange, ponderosa lemon, Key

lime, ruby red grapefruit, calamondin, Mandarin orange and cocktail citrus tree.

A cocktail citrus tree is grafted with 3-5 fruits including orange, grapefruit, lemons and limes. It's a great option if you only need one citrus tree in your landscaping but want to have multiple fruits. Fun fact: Each year, the cocktail citrus tree can bear different fruit than the year before!

New store features farmhouse-style furniture, accents

Christy and Josh Caldwell took a chance opening their store at a time when COVID-19 has meant widespread restrictions on social interaction. But a month after the shop opened, local residents are discovering the unique merchandise sold

Rustic Knots, which opened Aug. 15, primarily sells furniture with a farmhouse style, something Christy Caldwell describes as having a "Chip and Joanna Gaines" look, referring to the couple made famous by their "Fixer Upper" television

Much of the Rustic Knots stock is either hand-made or hand-painted and refurbished by the store's vendors, though some new furniture is sold there, as well.

'My whole goal is to get all vendors to either make or refurbish," said Christy

The Caldwells began to dabble in furniture painting last year and thought it might make for a side business.

"I thought we were pretty good at it," Christy Caldwell said. "So, we just kind of got a few cheap pieces, painted them, experimenting with different paints, and really enjoyed it."

At first, they sold their products through a website and later through a store in Macclenny. The couple began to sell home décor along with their furniture, and things were going so well that they decided to open their own store.

It was a big leap of faith and Christy Caldwell decided to quit her fulltime job as they pursued it. Her husband, meanwhile, maintained his fulltime employ-

Then COVID-19 hit, and Gov. Ron DeSantis issued a statewide stay-at-home order. The Caldwells were forced to put their plans on hold. About a month later, that order was lifted for most businesses, and the husband-and-wife team picked up where they left off. They found a space for their store and launched Rustic Knots.

Some questions to ask yourself for embracing DIY projects

In addition to spending money to improve their homes, many homeowners are spending their time on projects as well. While DIY projects can provide a sense of fulfillment and personal attachment to one's home, prospective do-it-yourselfers should ask themselves some questions before picking up their hammers and getting to work.

DO I HAVE ANY PHYSICAL LIMITATIONS?

No matter how much home improvement television shows may simplify projects, prospective DIYers should know that such undertakings are typically very difficult and oftentimes physically demanding. Homeowners with existing health conditions

DO I HAVE THE TIME?

One of my favorite Christian orators, Ravi Zacharias, tells the iaw-dropping account of Hungarian political prisoner, Andres Thomas.

The true story begins in the year 2000 when Russia released its politi-

cal prisoners, which included Andres. He entered prison at 20 years old and was released 55 years later. When Andre was liberated he would not stop talking gibberish and, of course, no one understood a word he was saying. There was much talk about executing the 75-yearold man, as many argued that he was crazy. Someone said, "At least bring in a psychiatrist to evaluate him before you execute him."

So the officials got a Hungarian psychiatrist to assess this alleged lunatic. After a few days of intense evaluation, the doctor said, "This man is not insane. He is speaking in an old Hungarian dialect. Although his prison conditions should have drove him to insanity, he is of sound mind. Give him back to us and we will make him well."

The psychiatrist's wish was granted and Andres was put in a wheelchair and released. When asked about his first request in his newfound freedom, Andres said, "A mirror."

It is hard to imagine but it is true that Andres had not seen his reflection for 55 years. When Andres held the mirror to his face, he quickly put it down and buried his face in his hands and sobbed uncontrollably. What do you think it would be like, for over half a century and not see your reflection? To start out with the robust vitality of youth and now for the first time in more than a half-century, you suddenly see what all those years have taken from you.

Ravi went on with his sense of humor to talk about how we take for granted something like a mirror. He said, "We get up every morning, do our necessary ablutions, put on innocent forms of disfigurement and walk out looking like what we wished we did; but it's really like when you come back from a long journey, you realize you resemble your passport picture more than anything else."

In closing, Ravi asked the audience, "Is there a mirror for our soul, as in a reflection of what we look like from the inside out?'

I suggest that Ravi's question is a great one to ponder. However, before we can contemplate such a profound question, do we know how to define the soul? It is commonly and widely used, such as, "She has a beautiful soul" or "He has such a kind and gentle soul."

Moreover, metaphysicists, theologians and anyone who ponders the

mysteries of human existence have questioned what the soul truly is. How do you define one's "soul?" Frankly, it was not too long ago that I could not articulate the meaning of the soul, but I can now thanks to my friend and Christian psychologist, Dominic Herbst. Dominic says, "The human soul is the part of a person that is not physical. It is a part of us that lasts eternally after our body experiences death. The spirit is the connection to God; the soul is the connection to humanity. The soul is the place where we connect with one another."

Now back to the great lecturer, Ravi Zacharias. If we put a mirror to our soul, would the reflection show kindness, love, understanding, giving and refinement in manners or would it be more akin to hostility, bitterness, entitlement and perhaps rudeness? Perhaps another question to ponder, thanks to the famous Indian-born Canadian-American, Ravi Zacharias, who spent 48 years commending the Christian faith and addressing life's great existential questions of origin, meaning, morality and destiny with eloquence and grace. Sadly, Ravi died on May 19, 2020, in his home in Atlanta after being diagnosed in March of this year with a malignant rare cancer in his spine. Ravi was 74.



One of Lightner Museum's most brilliant treasures is back after a hiatus of two years.

Following Hurricane Matthew, museum staff discovered that several pieces in the stained-glass window collection had sustained water damage and needed stabilization.

The windows were carefully removed and restored by Miami-based RLA Conservation, a group of professionally trained conservators and artists specializing in historic architecture, artifacts and sculpture. The windows were cleaned and repairs were made to stabilize the lead supports and wooden frames.

The museum then engaged Building 4 Fabrication of Atlanta, Georgia, to build light boxes that would allow each window to be illuminated from behind and facilitate display.

The end result is "Illuminate: Lightner Museum's Stained Glass Rediscovered," a 12-piece exhibition in a new gallery space on the mezzanine above the old pool. The exhibit opened Thursday, Sept. 10.

Museum registrar Kristin Zimmerman called the collection a Lightner staple.

"A lot of people have come in over the years asking where the original stained-glass window room was," she said. "So, it was really important to take good care of (the windows), to get them restored and put back on display."

A donation from Inez McDonald, along with additional donations by the Treasury Venue Collection and St. Augustine Historic Inns, funded the restoration of a total 15 windows from the collection of Otto Lightner.

McDonald first got involved after learning that the museum asked for people to "adopt" pieces for restoration.

"I said, 'That would be a good idea,'" she recalled.

She adopted the largest of the windows, a life-sized image of St. Augustine created circa 1900 by Tiffany Studios. A year later, she inquired about the restoration's progress and was inspired to do more.

"I asked, 'What would be the cost of restoring the lot?" she said. "They gave me a figure, and this is what happened."

Another of McDonald's favorites is a window from a German Gymnastic Community clubhouse in Chicago. It was created at around 1880 and depicts an early version of the German flag and a modified American flag.

While some pieces were created by Tiffany Studios, others were the work of Willet Stained Glass and Rudy Brothers Glass Studio. There are portraits, mythological scenes and Art Nouveau designs. Also on display is a Tiffany lamp with dragonfly motif.

The Lightner Museum is located at 75 King St. in St. Augustine.

Gamble Rogers Music Festival performers join Sing Out Loud virtual sessions

St. Augustine musicians who normally perform each year at the Gamble Rogers Music Festival will be a part of virtual performances this year with the Sing Out Loud Festival, streaming live from St. Johns County locations.

The Gamble Rogers Showcase will take place from 1 to 7 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 20, performing from Beluthahatchee Park, located in northwest St. Johns County on the William Bartram Scenic Highway (State Road 13). Beluthahatchee is the former residence of human rights activist and journalist/author Stetson Kennedy.

The lineup on Sept. 20 features The Skinny (Taylor and Pamela Fausset), Jamie DeFrates, Collapsible B (John Dickie and his band), Michael Jordan, The Carpetbaggers and The Obscure Brothers (Bob Patterson and

Charley Simmons).

"Gamblefest is well. We're keeping the music alive along with the memory of Gamble Rogers," said Bob Patterson, a founding member of the Gamble Rogers Music Festival who sits on the board of directors of the non-profit organization. "We are in the midst of reinventing ourselves while dealing with the coronavirus experience. We're grateful for the support from all of our fans."

The 25th annual Gamble Rogers Music Festival, originally set for the first weekend of May 2020, was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Gamble Rogers Music Festival is dedicated to commemorating the life and music of Gamble Rogers, whose passion for balladry, storytelling and the oral tradition helped shaped Ameri-

can folk music. Rogers, a native of Tallahassee, lived in St. Augustine until his death by drowning in 1991 as he attempted to save a tourist caught in a riptide.

In addition to the three-day event held each year, Gamblefest also hosts a monthly concert series. All funds raised help produce the festival each year, and supports arts education in St. Johns County, with donations to arts programs at individual schools.

In addition to the Sing Out Loud virtual concerts, the Gamble Rogers Music Festival partnered with the St. Johns Cultural Council in May for a series of live Facebook concerts.

Sharks QB hasn't lost a step following Achilles surgery

PVHS senior Jacobi Myers throws for 2 fourth-quarter TDs to beat rival Nease

Jacobi Myers was a little slow getting out of bed the morning after Ponte Vedra High opened the football season with a 24-7 nonconference victory against rival Nease. Muscles ached. There were bumps and bruises.

Unlike the pain suffered a year ago on the eighth play, Myers will again be at full speed Friday night when the Sharks host winless Palatka.

"At one point I was a little nervous," the 6-foot-2 senior quarterback said. "But I was confident."

Myers tore his right Achilles tendon on the eighth play of the season a year ago — also against Nease. A pick-six interception at rain-soaked Panthers Stadium became the catalyst that sparked an emotional, and physical, comeback

"The interception was a wakeup call," Myers said after completing 13-of-23 passes for 199 yards and two touchdown throws to senior Michael Olkiewicz. "It made me realize I have to play. After that, everything was all right."

After watching all but eight play from the sidelines in 1999, Myers helped Ponte Vedra take quick control of the Battle of the Bridge rivalry, leading the Sharks to a 10-0 lead at halftime on a 25-yard Davis Ashcroft field goal and a Campbell Parker's 1-yard run that capped an 85-yard drive.

The Panthers cut it to 10-7 in the third on Keveon Hodge's 35-yard interception return, but Myers took control with TD passes of 23 and 68 yards in the fourth.

Because of shutdowns created by the COVID-19 pandemic, both teams only had two weeks of football drills to prepare for the game. Less than five minutes before kick-off, a thunderstorm created another 45-minute delay.

"I think a win is a win," said Sharks head coach Jeff DeSandro. "There are always things we can work on and clean up. That's what we're doing this week in practice." Myers didn't show any apprehension about being back on the field. He had two surgeries to repair the tear, but he hasn't been limited in practices, DeSandro said.

"After I got cleared, I went straight back to work," Myers said. "I had to get out and play. The injury threw me

Mike Vallencourt sets course record at JAGA Senior Championship

Orange Park golfer finishes 2nd at event; new Northeast Florida resident Tim Cobb wins by 1 stroke

Mike Vallencourt left the St. Johns Golf and Country Club without a trophy Tuesday afternoon, but he left an impression that will be etched in Jacksonville Area Golf Association history.

The Orange Park golfer birdied his last seven holes in the final round of the JAGA Senior Amateur for a courserecord 10-under-par 62, but it still wasn't enough to win the 50-year-old division.

Vallencourt cut 14 strokes off his first-round score of 76 by making 11 birdies and a three-putt bogey for a 36-hole score of 6-under 136.

Tim Cobb, who moved to Northeast Florida three months ago and joined St. Johns, eventually finished with a 4-under 68 to finish at 7-under 135.

A torrential downpour stopped play for nearly an hour. Vallencourt was in the middle of the fairway at the 18th hole, while Cobb had just made the turn.

"It's a good thing I didn't know about what Mike was doing," Cobb said.

Vallencourt ultimately hit his approach at the water-logged final green, and he calmly rolled in a 12-footer to beat the course record by two shots.

"Sometimes you stand over it, you look at it, you decide where you want to hit it and it works," Vallencourt said. "Sometimes things just fall in line." The 61-year-old player decided to compete in younger Senior division for players between 50-59. Jacksonville's Gary Blackwell (73-74) won the Super Senior division (60-69 years old) at 3-over, while Kingsland, Georgia's Danny Daniels (69-71) won the Grand Senior class (70-plus) at 4-under.

Tuesday's round made the first-round troubles easy to forget for Vallencourt. He started with two bogeys and two double-bogeys in his first 15 holes before rallying with birdies at 16 and 18.

Over a two-day stretch, Vallencourt made 13 birdies in his final 21 holes.

"Seventeen is a 200-yard par-3, so all I wanted to do was hit the green," he said. "I was 25 feet away and I made it. When I stood on the tee at 18, I don't care what they say, you're nervous. I tried to take it one swing at a time.

"I didn't win, but it was way special. The bar has been reset. I had a great time. I've never had anything like that happen before. It's something I'll remember for a long, long time."

Cobb clinched the championship with a bogey-free final round.

Jaguars open season with win over Colts

The Jacksonville Jaguars defeated the Indianapolis Colts 27-20 victory last Sunday at TIAA Bank Field in the season opener for both teams.

"I'm just super grateful. My mindset today was just to play one play at a time. I have got an offensive coordinator that is calling good plays, receivers that caught the ball, an offensive line that is giving me time, and a running game that really got us ahead of the chains," said Jacksonville starting QB Gardner Minshew III. "I'm just trying to do my job one play at a time, and I'm very grateful for the opportunities and the people around me."

Minshew played turnover-free ball and threw three touchdowns. He finished 19 of 20 for 173 yards.

Wide receiver Keelan Cole Sr. led the Jaguars (1-0) with five receptions and hauled in one of Minshew's TD tosses. DJ Chark Jr. and rookie Laviska Shenault Jr. also caught TD passes.

Jaguars running back James Robinson became the first undrafted rookie running back to start the season opener in the last 30 years. Leonard Fournette's replacement finished with 90 total yards on 17 touches.

Josh Lambo converted both of his field goal attempts in the victory, the first from 50 yards in the third quarter and a 46-yarder with 2:54 remaining in the game.

Jacksonville cornerback C.J. Henderson intercepted Colts' QB Philip Rivers (36 of 46, 363 yards, TD), had five tackles and added three passes defended, including a fourth-down target to veteran wideout T.Y. Hilton in the red zone on the Colts' final play.

"I lost the game. Two drops. Never should've happened," Hilton said. "It's just one game. We came out strong, we came

out firm. It's just the tide turned and I lost the game."
