
As serving our veteran and military communities is one of St. Johns County's highest priorities, the St. Johns County CARES Nonprofit Assistance Program now includes

St. Augustine Art Association hosts virtual show for middle school students



St. Augustine police chief retires to take on role of code enforcement manager

St. Augustine Police Chief Barry Fox will take on the role of code enforcement manager as part of his transition plan for retirement as chief, which will be April 30, 2021, after 28 years of dedicated service to the city.

Assistant Chief of Police Anthony Cuthbert will run the day-to-day operations of the St. Augustine Police Department until a chief of police is selected by the city manager.

"I'm happy for Chief Fox on his well-deserved retirement. But even more, I could not be more pleased to have his continued service to the city in this position," City Manager John Regan said. "Chief's passion and dedication to our community's safety and well-being will certainly be a factor in bringing our code enforcement efforts to a new level."

The recent establishment of the Short-Term Rental (STR) registration program requires a code enforcement manager who supervises dedicated code enforcement officers and an administrative assistant.

The manager will be responsible for coordinating responsive efforts of the STR code enforcement officer, as well as other code enforcement officers who oversee general municipal code violations and complaints.

Fox set several goals when he started his tenure as St. Augustine's chief of police including, but not limited to, agency accreditation, increased retention of the workforce and decreased crime rates. While serving as chief, the addition of body cameras and the Community Outreach/Quality of Life programs also came to fruition. In 2019, in collaboration with downtown business owners and city leadership, Fox championed the need for increased code enforcement and improved safety with the Quality of Nightlife Strategic Plan, to include ways of lessening the strain on law enforcement

officers when it came to code enforcement.

"With the growing volume of short-term rentals and the continued growth of the hospitality industry, there will be a need for more oversight, but not from a law enforcement standpoint," Fox said. "I am excited to continue to serve the City of St. Augustine and its residents in this new role."

With quality of life and livability being two of the tenets of the city's visioning plan, Fox believes he can better serve community stakeholders.

"I have built long-standing relationships with businesses city-wide, and I have always believed that the enforcement of municipal code is not the primary role of law enforcement, but we have had to work together to keep the community safe, prosperous, and orderly with the staffing and resources that we had," he said. "However, by creating this program, it will give us the chance to have a more direct, open line of communication, and a collaborative role with our stakeholders, as opposed to an authoritative police presence when addressing municipal code complaints and violations."

Fox was appointed chief of police in 2016 following the retirement of then-Chief Loran Lueders.

Fox also praised the support of his wife and family in the past several years.

"My wife has been the pillar of our family, and my kids have been very patient," he said. "But it is time for me to step back from chief, be available for my daughter (age 15) and my son (age 8) and pass the torch to our next chief of police to continue our good work."

Per the city charter, a list of eligible candidates from current staff will be provided to the city manager by the Civil Service Board from which he may select a chief. If no qualifying applicant is selected, the Civil Service Board can then provide a list of candidates from outside the organization. Homeless vets honored with new recreation room at Clara White Mission

Homeless veterans in reemployment programs at the Jacksonville Clara White Mission were recently honored with the first recreation room at the facility.

Donors rallied from the three surrounding counties to furnish the room with a foosball table, indoor basketball, magnetic dart board, board games, masks, furniture, military service wall hangings, supplies and services of a professional painter.

Located in the highly populated veteran city of Jacksonville, the Clara White Mission Veteran Program was designated by the We Can Be Heroes Foundation for delivery of food and goods. The male veterans dormitory and the female veterans Boulevard House provide a welcoming place for veterans in need to live while working toward independent living.

Clay County, Duval County and St. Johns County donors included Community Presbyterian Church of Atlantic Beach, American Legion Auxiliary 233 of Ponte Vedra, Women's Tuesday Mah Jongg Group of Fleming Island and anonymous veterans and volunteers with the We Can Be Heroes Foundation.

Virtual veterans exhibit launched by SJC clerk of Circuit Court and Comptroller's office

St. Johns County Clerk of the Circuit Court and Comptroller Brandon J. Patty recently announced an exhibit highlighting local veterans via their recorded discharge certificates.

The clerk's office began recording discharge papers, which later became DD-214s, during the fall of 1919, one year after World War I ended. Dr. Susan Parker, clerk historian, was able to locate records within the clerk's records warehouse to create the virtual exhibit of discharge certificates from residents of St. Johns County.

"Creating this exhibit was a wonderful learning experience for me," Parker said. "The armed forces discharge documents comprise just one of the historic collections conserved at the clerk's office."

The exhibit highlights the various roles of just a few of the hundreds of veterans in war and peace from the days of the Spanish-American War through World War II.

"I thank Dr. Parker for building this great exhibit and telling some of our local veterans' stories," Patty said. "It's fascinating to look back and see how our neighbors and those who came before us served our great country.

"From 1919 to present day, we gladly record discharge papers, now DD-214s, for free. Having us record the papers is an easy way to ensure their safe-keeping and availability if ever lost."

Local Rotary clubs donate PPE masks to area schools

The Rotary Clubs of Bartram Trail, St. Johns, Ponte Vedra in Nocatee, St. Augustine Sunrise and St. Augustine Beach joined to donate 2,700 PPE COVID-19 face masks to 25 local schools in order to help teachers and staff.

Earlier this fall, Rotary District 6970 Area Gov. Jack Murray learned local teachers would need assistance with PPE supplies. Murray believed local Rotary Clubs could do something to help teachers and staff.

"I started with my wife's club, Ponte Vedra in Nocatee," Murray said. "MaryBeth is the club's president-elect and I asked if her club would like to partner with our club to help. It took off from there. Many Rotarians have family members who are teachers, so they were ready and willing to help when asked." A call was made to St. Johns County Superintendent of School Tim Forson for the school district's approval and support. With a few more quick calls to other Rotary clubs in the county, Mur-

ray soon had five Rotary clubs wanting to help with this project.

"We then took the project and submitted it to the district for foundation matching

funds," Murray said. "The District Foundation team, led by Past D-6970 Gov. Jeanette Loftus, reviewed it and shortly thereafter approved our project. We were able to start

small with what looked like maybe a few hundred masks to a school or two and turn it into 2,700 PPE masks to help 25 local schools throughout St. Johns County."

Shovels were put in the ground and The Rev. Adam Greene, head of the Episcopal School of Jacksonville, and Andy Kidd, director of athletics, thanked donors Stephanie and Mark Chesser and Matt and Shannon Connell of Conser Moving and Storage for providing the lead gift for the project. The facility will be named Conser Beach Volleyball Center.

"We feel very blessed to be able to do this," said Mark Chesser. "All of us are blessed to have the opportunity to be at Episcopal, and we are grateful to the administration for supporting beach volleyball."

Kidd praised the committee, which formed over the summer, with the vision for beach volleyball and new center.

"In a time of unprecedented challenges brought by the pandemic, it's an amazing feat that a conversation we started in the summer has resulted in adding a new sport and this new facility in time to open for play in January, and it would not be possible without the work of the committee and the support of all of the donors," he said.

Mark and Tyra Tutor named one of the six courts in honor of their daughters Thea (class of 2018) and Zoe (class of 2022). Parents Dwight and Christine Cooper asked their daughter Jordan (class of 2021) to identify two Episcopal employees to recognize who have made a positive impact



William "Bill" Joe Wilson

William "Bill" Joe Wilson, 80, of Jacksonville Beach, Florida passed away on October 16, 2020 after a courageous battle with Parkinson's disease. Bill is survived by his loving wife of 33 years, Marilyn, his son Chad (Bern) and their 3 children Charles, Emily and Kevin, son Bryan (Carla) and daughter Kerry Prehn (Frank), their mother Pat Kennedy; brother Jack "Buddy" (Ann), sister Bettie Leah DeRoulhac, and the many nephews and nieces, related or not, who called him "Uncle Bill."

Bill was born and raised in rural south Texas. He was preceded in death by his parents, Isaiah Wilson and Ruth Urban Wilson; and brother Robert "Bobby." Both mother and brother passed from PD related illness.

Bill served in the Armed Services, then went on to earn Math degrees at Pan American University, Texas A&I and a PhD in Statistics from Texas A&M. He briefly held faculty positions at Texas A&M and Louisiana State at Lafayette before starting his 30 year career at the University of North Florida where he received numerous awards as an Outstanding Teacher, and a prestigious Distinguished Professor Award based on his accomplishments in the areas of teaching, research and publication and professional service. He also co-authored textbooks and initiated a program to aid others with statistical problems and, for a time before his retirement, served as an Associate Vice-President in Academic Affairs.

He retired in 2005 and in Spring of 2006, after months of testing, he was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease. His

ment involved playing golf, continuing with his weekend "Rubicon" charter fishing business, using his carpentry skills to build things, and traveling with

plans for retire-

Marilyn, however, now he added Parkinson's. He became active in the Parkinson's Foundation's Advocacy in Research program to recruit candidates for clinical trials. He attended local Parkinson Support Groups and saw the need to disseminate information which led to his creation of the First Coast Parkinson's disease Newsletter, then a webpage which listed local support groups, exercise programs, events, and other articles. Bill also arranged a successful roundtable seminar involving 10 health providers (neurologists and therapists) and 100 participants. The Davis Phinney Foundation recognized Bill as a "local hero" in 2014. He continued his active fight against Parkinson's through attending Parkinson's Runs and in particular, participation in Rock Steady Boxing for persons with Parkinson's.

Bill once wrote: "Parkinson's is a relentless fighter who never slows down. It is hard to keep from allowing it to guide your life. But it can be done. Resist the temptation to stay in bed, resist the temptation to avoid exercise class because it is raining, and resist all the other things that Parkinson's throws at you."

Bill wanted to do what he could to find a cure. He donated his brain to Mayo Clinic for research. Bill also had plans to create a local Parkinson's Center for people with PD and their caregivers to offer resources to increase the quality of life for those with the disease and opportunities for patients to participate in research.

Commitment, passion lift local Bike MS team to record

This year's traditional Bike MS: PGA TOUR Cycle to the Shore was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but that didn't stop Florida's top fundraising bicycle team from getting together locally and celebrating a soon-to-be-record effort.

Formed in 2010 and made up of 38 Jacksonville Beach, Ponte Vedra Beach, Gainesville, Tallahassee, Orlando and Palm Beach area riders, Big Bananas gathered recently in Nocatee to simulate an event that usually takes them to Daytona Beach and back with more than 1.000 Bike MS riders.

The scaled down one-day ride failed to impact the team's commitment and

fundraising passion. They have already collected more than \$150,000, on the way to a record \$156,000. That total would give Big Bananas the distinction of being the MS Society's No. 1 team in the country for 2020.

In 11 years, the team has raised more than \$1.2 million and in 2019 was awarded the MS Society's Circle of Distinction Award.

Next year's Bike MS is scheduled for Oct. 23-24. The Big Bananas' next fundraising project will be its annual free gift wrapping in December outside of Hallmark and Five Below in Jacksonville Beach.





Since the start of the Ponte Vedra Auto Show in 2003, the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce has been in the driver's seat. This year, responsibility for the event is being passed on to a St. Augustine business known for its commitment to classic and collectible automobiles.

Art 'n Motion of St. Augustine will operate the show with some help from the

"It had actually been something I had been wanting to get into, so it was a perfect fit," said Justin Felker, who co-owns the business with his father, Paul Felker.

The show is presented in part by the St. Johns County Tourist Development Council.

One of the first decisions the new operators had to make was rescheduling the event from its original date — Sept. 27 — to Nov. 15.

"Being in November, the weather will be nicer," Justin Felker said. "That was one of the complaints in the past, how hot it was."

In addition, the date change — which will be permanent — steers the show away from the heart of hurricane season.

In fact, Northeast Florida statistically sees its lowest rainfall of the year in November. The average high temperature is about 75 degrees, about 10 degrees lower than in September.

Plans for the transition to a new operator began in February. This being the first year for Art 'n Motion, the show will be similar to years past. There will be a few changes, however.

The car corral, initiated last year, was originally a place where owners could display vehicles for sale. This year, it will be for display of cars brought in on the day of the show; these will not be eligible for judging.

Vehicles to be judged must have signed up in advance; the number of judged vehicles has been capped at 200.

Vehicles for the car corral will be accepted between 7 and 8:45 a.m. while space allows.

In another change, there will be no golf cart award this year, though Felker said a special golf cart show might be part of future events.

Art 'n Motion is already looking ahead to future shows.

"Starting next year, it's going to be a two-day event," said Felker. "We're going to try to do some other activities, not just a car show. Things that the community can embrace, though nothing's

set in stone."

Looking at the cars and trucks already signed up, Felker called it "good quality

The range of vehicles expected to appear in the show runs from a 1907 Cadillac currently housed at Art 'n Motion to a brand new Nissan Z-car.

"The majority of stuff, I would say, is '50s, '60s, '70s," Felker said. "That's the era that's popular. That's what people grew up with."

A special focus this year will be on the 50th anniversary of the Z-car. In addition, Ford GT models will be high-

Felker has had an interest in automobiles since childhood. He has worked with a local racing team and today buys and sells classic and collector cars.

Art 'n Motion is part dealership, part museum, part art gallery — Felker calls classic automobiles "an art you can interact with." The public is welcome to visit and view these vehicles close up.

The business is housed in an early 1900s, industrial-style building at 283 San Marco Ave. Weddings, parties and other events are held at the site by House of Assembly Events, a business owned by Felker's sister, Erin Felker-Murphy.

The 18th annual Ponte Vedra Auto Show will be held at the Nocatee Event Field, 245 Nocatee Center Way. Admission and parking are free for spectators.

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Auto Show celebrates 50th anniversary of Z Car

Nissan's practical sports cars have been engaging drivers in the U.S. since 1970

Cars have a way of bringing people together, whether it's just to admire their sleek beauty, be blown away by their power and speed or to bond over brand loyalty, automobiles hold a particular allure.

And Nissan's Z Car series is a special breed of its own, said Chris Brewer, director of communications for The Amelia Island Concours d'Elegance and judge at this year's Ponte Vedra Auto Show, where the 50th anniversary of the model-year Z Car will be celebrated.

Brewer, 47, said nostalgia is a big factor when it comes to his love for the Z Car, which was originally known as the Datsun 240Z when it in launched October of 1969 at the New York Auto Show.

"These are the cars are cars that I really wanted when I was a kid," said Brewer, 47. "I preferred the Japanese imports when I was younger. That was something that really excited me."

That first generation of the Z Car — 240Z, 260Z and 280Z — ran from 1970 to 1978. Through those years, minor modifications were made, often to meet new government requirements, but the look remained similar.

In 1979, the second generation of Z Car — the 280ZX — came along, followed by the third generation of Z Cars, the Z31 300ZX in 1984 and the Z32 300ZX in 1988 1990. Nissan stopped building the Z32 in 1996 but returned with the 350Z for the 2003 model year. The 370Z was introduced in 2008 and is still made and sold at dealerships today.

Brewer said the appeal of the Z Car was in its durability — and affordability.

"It's The original Z was done really well," Brewer said. "When launched, it was a brand new sports car that could to compete with the likes of the Porsche 911 and Chevrolet Corvette. But it had a much lower price point, so folks who wanted something sporty that offered strong performance and could drive one home from the dealer for a lot less money."

However, the early model Z Cars have seen their market skyrocket, lately.

"The Z following is pretty faithful, pretty loyal and as of late, the early 240Z Cars have started to see quite a jump in value, with some going for more than \$100,000," Brewer said. "That's a significant jump from what they were valued at even five years ago."

The Z Car is still a good deal for the most part, especially compared to other sports cars on the market, Brewer said.

"These cars are accessible," he said. "They were very accessible financially, too, for a number of years, and there are still many of them on the market at an affordable cost. For those looking to get



into the hobby, the Nissan Z Car is a great

Not only do they boast the sleek design and power of many other sports cars, with a more affordable price, the early Z Cars are also not a mechanical nightmare, which is a huge bonus to Brewer.

"At best, I'm a hack mechanic, but there's not much I can't fix on my 1971 Datsun 240Z," Brewer said of the now-restored car he bought 10 years ago for \$300.

He also has been able to share his passion for the Z Car with his 17-year-old daughter Abbi, who owns a 2004 Nissan 350Z.

"It's a lot of fun for us to work on them together," Brewer said. "There's just something about it that has been really significant for our relationship as a father and daughter to have those cars as something we can talk about."

"She takes a lot of pride in her car," he said. "It's part of who she is."

Bonding over vehicles is the core component of auto shows, as people from all over share in a mutual appreciation for the automobile, both old and new.

"I think automobiles unite you," Brewer said. "That's why the Ponte Vedra Auto Show is also such a great event, because people from all walks of life come together for a common purpose."

Brewer said events like the Auto Show, which is held outdoors, are even more important now as a way for people to be able to connect, safely.

"It's a way to spend some time together in a time when it's hard to find opportunities available to do that," he said.

But regardless of what model car a person loves, it's the attachment to others the love of cars offers that is so special to Brewer, and the idea that something created to give us independence can be such a big factor in our identity and how we connect.

"To think that something that's so autonomous can bring us together in a community is really neat," he said. "That's a big part of why I love the automobile."

The Ponte Vedra Auto Show is 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Sunday, Nov. 15, at Nocatee Event Field. It will be a great opportunity to see one-of-a-kind cars and connect with fellow automobile aficionados.

And maybe an opportunity to experience the joy Brewer does when he takes out his scrappy 1971 240Z.

"When I'm behind the wheel, I'm usually grinning from ear-to-ear," he said.

John Kaiser keeps one of his mostprized possessions, an original 1967 Ford Fairlane driven by Fred Lorenzen at the Daytona 500, in a climate-control storage unit, far away from the sun's peroxiding rays and safely protected from normal wear and tear.

Best In Show takes home \$500 and a special trophy.





A recent study on burnout conducted by the European Society of Cardiology followed more than 11,000 participants over 25 years. They found that those with the highest levels of burnout were at a 20 percent increased risk for AFib, the most common heart arrhythmia, which increases risk of stroke five-fold. This is why it's important to understand how stress impacts the heart and what we can all do

to reduce stress and protect heart health.

HOW STRESS IMPACTS THE HEART

Your body's response to stress is supposed to protect you. But, if it's constant, it can harm you. The hormone cortisol is released in response to stress. Studies suggest that the high levels of cortisol from long-term stress can increase blood cholesterol, triglycerides, blood sugar, and blood pressure. These are common risk factors for heart disease. This stress can also cause changes that promote the buildup of plaque deposits in the arteries. Even minor stress can trigger heart problems like poor blood flow to the heart muscle. This is a condition in which the heart doesn't get enough blood or oxygen. And, long-term stress can affect how the blood clots. This makes the blood stickier and increases the risk of stroke.

All of these factors add up to harm the body in a myriad of ways, not the least of which is damage to the artery walls and subsequent plaque buildup. This buildup impedes blood flow and can even lead to complete blockages. As a result, the risk of major cardiovascular events such as heart attack and stroke are far higher than



yet entirely understood, scientists believe that both genetic factors and environmental triggers are involved. Its onset is sudden and is not related to diet or lifestyle. In T1D, the body's immune system destroys cells in the pancreas that produce insulin, meaning the body produces little to no insulin to regulate blood sugar and get energy from food. There is nothing you can do to prevent T1D, and — at present — nothing you can do to get rid of it.

HOW TO REDUCE STRESS AND PROTECT HEART HEALTH

Managing stress is a good idea for your overall health, but it has specific benefits for your heart health. Many studies have documented that various forms of stress can take a toll on the heart. You might be experiencing workplace stress, financial stress, caregiver stress or disaster-related stress. The good news is that you can take steps to reduce your stress that will improve your mental and physical wellbeing.

Committing to regular exercise is a heart-healthy habit, and research shows that people who exercise report fewer days of bad mental health. Even if it's just a simple walk, moving your body can work wonders for your heart and your stress levels.

In particular, recent studies have shown the practice of yoga to improve the quality of life of patients living with AFib. For example, a trial led by Dr. Naresh Sen of HG SMS Hospital in India found that over 16 weeks of yoga sessions, AFib patients saw their symptom episodes drop by about half.

In another study conducted by the European Society of Cardiology, yoga was performed for one hour, once a week, for 12 weeks in the hospital with an experienced instructor. The yoga program included light

movements, deep breathing, and meditation. The study found that patients who did yoga had a better quality of life, lower heart rate and lower blood pressure than patients who did not do yoga.

Doing things you enjoy is another simple way to relieve stress. The more you take care of yourself and experience pleasure, the less reactive you will be to outside stressors. Finding time each day for socially distant and stress-reducing hobbies like gardening, reading a book, playing with pets or listening to music can have significant positive impacts on your heart.

Finally, make sure you're getting enough sleep. A good night's sleep makes you able to tackle the day's stress more easily. When you are tired, you are less patient and more easily agitated, which can increase stress. Most adults need seven-to-nine hours of sleep per night. Practicing good sleep hygiene along with stress-lowering tactics can help improve your quality of sleep.

It might help to remind yourself that our lives will go back to normal someday soon. Keep trying to stay positive and follow good social distance practices including wearing a mask. We can all get through this together.

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

Butterfield Garage holds PAM Jam throughout November

Inaugural event brings together poets, artists, musicians to share stories

This month at the Butterfield Garage Art Gallery a group of passionate poets, artists and musicians came together to create pieces for the inaugural PAM Jam.

Although the name is short, the history behind PAM Jam is anything but.

"Now we have the 'p' for poetry, and the 'a' for artist, so all that is left is a musician," Bodor said.

As both poets and artists finished collaborating, they handed their combined works over to a musician to be turned into a song. Bodor's words and O'Neal's painting were used as inspiration for bluegrass band Skin & Bonz in its song, "Present Moment

The original idea for PAM JAM was to host a live concert where musicians would perform their new songs in front of live audiences, but when the COVID-19 virus hit, plans changed.

Instead of trying to arrange a restricted concert at the Butterfield Garage, the founders of PAM JAM decided that pre-recording the songs as music videos would allow gallery guests a better opportunity to appreciate the culmination of all three collaborations at once.

While browsing the artworks at the Butterfield, guests can find QR codes with links to the coordinated music videos posted next to the poetry pieces.

Members of the PAM JAM are coining the event the "perfect pandemic project," because despite the aspect of collaborating, participants were still able to work efficiently while isolated.

Ponte Vedra, Nease get rare chance to reset

Sharks play at Columbia; Panthers go to Oakleaf for rematch in football playoffs

First there was COVID-19, along with the delays and uncertainty that followed.

Then came the injuries and the unexpected resignation of Ponte Vedra High head coach Jeff DiSandro.

What followed was even more bewildering – even more injuries, a regular-season-ending three-game losing streak and a tropical system called ETA.

"I've been doing this since 1995, and

I've never seen anything like this," said PVHS interim coach Brad Kessel.

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Like every other program in Northeast Florida, local teams also have been forced to adjust to the threat of contact tracing — and the mandatory quarantines that come with it — for the coronavirus.

Despite all the turmoil, the Sharks will wipe the slate clean when they play at Lake City Columbia at 7:30 p.m. Friday night in the first round of the Class 6A playoffs.

Nease will get the same reset. The Panthers play at Oakleaf Friday in the Class 8A playoffs.

Nease (1-7) lost at Oakleaf two weeks ago, but the Panthers were without several key starters, including quarterback Will Cain and running back Taliek Golphin.

While Oakleaf was 6-3 in the regular season and coming off a stunning upset of unbeaten Clay High, 41-14, a week after it beat the Panthers 35-14.

But like Ponte Vedra, the Sharks and Oakleaf are starting over again in the postseason.

After winning five of its first six games, the Sharks lost their last three. A big part of that was the loss of quarterback Jacobi Myers, who suffered a lower leg injury in the fifth game.

He hasn't played since.

"COVID has been its own little challenge," Kessel said. "We're glad to be back to even again. We have a chance to be

young again and have fun."

Injuries have been especially tough. Not only was Myers benched by his injury, so were senior wide receiver Alex Madson, tight end Jacob Greer, senior lineman John Louis Mazzella and defensive back Mason Romero. Kessel said of the group, Ramero may be able to play Friday.

"We haven't started the same 22 kids since Game 1," Kessel said. "There are so many injuries, it's hard to remember all of them."

At the same time, Kessel said the Sharks have remained resilient.

"There are no excuses," he said. "We'll go out and do our best. For us, that means we have to get back to having fun."

Sharks to play Jensen Beach for 5-A championship

Defending state champion Ponte Vedra is back on familiar ground – in another state championship game.

The Sharks eliminated Ocala Vanguard last week to earn a spot in the Class 5A finals against Jensen Beach on Saturday, Nov. 14, at the Suncoast Credit Union Arena in Fort Myers.

The first serve is set for 1 p.m. Considered a national powerhouse, Ponte Vedra now has won all 26 matches this year and 35 overall — including 34 sweeps — dating back to last season. The Sharks also won the state championship in 2017.

This year's group may be the best yet, according to head coach Robin Mignerey.

"We have a talented team," she said. "It's not easy when everyone's hunting for you. Now we're down to one game."

The Sharks are led by senior outside hitter Amy Burkhardt. She leads the team in kills (210).

But Ponte Vedra has other key players, including junior outside hitter Rachel Johnson (181 kills), sophomore middle blocker Zeta Washington (146 kills), sophomore setter Jessica Shattles (176 points from serves and 705 assists), freshman middle blocker Chelsea Sutton (45 blocks), junior forward libero Ava Witt (261 digs), junior outside hitter Kendall Mignerey (204 digs) and sophomore middle blocker Zeta Washington.

"We have a lot of weapons," Mignerey said. "There's not a lot of pressure on one person. We're not one-dimensional."

The playoff brackets were determined in a blind draw. Despite being the defending state champion — and being ranked 13th nationally — the Sharks were forced to compete in a play-in game.

"It's been a long four weeks," Mignerey said. "When we started, we knew we had to win eight games. We're 7-0 so far."

Jensen Beach could be No. 8.

The Falcons are 20-1 and on a 17-game winning streak. Jensen Beach earned its spot in the finale by eliminating Tampa Robinson, 25-23, 25-21, 25-17.

"We've had a good environment this week in the gym," Mignerey said. "I think that will help. Some of our players have been here before. We have others who will be trying to win their first [championship]. The keys is to not overthink everything."

Jaguars win battle for AFC South cellar; lose war to Texans 27-25

Sunday's game between the Jacksonville Jaguars and AFC South rival Houston would be for last place in the division. Both teams entered the game 1-6.

Texans quarterback Deshaun Watson's performance translated to a 27-25 win

over Jacksonville. Watson completed 19of-32 passes for 281 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions.

Houston (2-6) beat the Jaguars (1-7) twice in the same season for the 10th time in franchise history and sent them into the division cellar.

The positive story for the Jaguars was the play of rookie quarterback Jake Luton, subbing for an injured Gardner Minshew.

Luton ran for a 13-yard score to bring the Jaguars within two points in the final minutes of the game. He completed 26 of $38\ passes$ for $304\ passing\ yards$ and two touchdowns, one rushing, one passing.

"I felt confident," said Luton. "We talked on the sideline when we came out and I just told them 'Hey, just do your job. If all 11 of us do our part every play, we don't have to press, we don't have to go super-fast, just do your job and we'll drive it down field.""

His performance marked the most passing yards by a rookie QB in their debut in Jaguars history. Luton is expected to start Sunday against Green Bay.

"He'll get better the more he plays," said Jaguars head coach Doug Marrone. "That was really like preseason game one as far as getting out there and going to play. He did some good things."

His first completion of the game and his career came on a 73-yard touchdown to wide receiver DJ Chark Jr., marking the third-longest completion by a rookie signal caller in franchise history and the longest completed pass by any rookie in the NFL this season.

"Yesterday (Sunday) was a good indication of what we'd like to see going forward," said Marrone about Chalk. "DJ's done a good job. We haven't thrown as well at times this season. That might have been due to Gardner's injury when he was in there playing. We were able to throw yesterday and he made some big plays. He did a really good job of stretching the field for us."

Chark caught seven passes for 146 vards. His 73-vard TD catch on Jacksonville's third play from scrimmage was the longest reception of his career and the longest reception by any Jaguars player since wide receiver Donte Moncrief scored on an 80-yard reception in 2018.

Kicker Josh Lambo connected on two field goals, including a 59-yarder, tying Josh Scobee's franchise record for the longest field goal in team history. Lambo sustained a hip injury against the Texans. On Monday, the Jaguars placed Lambo on the reserve/injured list. This marks Lambo's second time on the list this season, so he is not eligible to return in 2020.

Running back James Robinson finished with 25 rushes for 99 yards. He scored his seventh TD of the season on a one-yard

Linebacker Myles Jack led the Jaguars with 11 tackles, including one tackle for loss, and has now tallied double-digit tackles in four of six games this season. Jack also forced the second fumble of his career which was recovered by defensive tackle DaVon Hamilton for the first fumble recovery of Hamilton's career.

On Monday, the Jaguars released safety Doug Middleton. The Jaguars also signed offensive lineman Garrett McGhin and kicker Aldrick Rosas to the practice

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
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
