Beaches Museum presents 'Holidays in the Village'

The Beaches Museum welcomed about 200 visitors Thursday, Dec. 17, for its "Holidays in the Village" celebration. The specially configured event held in the adjacent park gave area residents some much-needed relief from the cares of the outside world.

Amid ongoing coronavirus concerns, the holiday tradition.

"We took two events that we normally do over the holidays — our Beaches North Pole Express and our 'Holidays in the Village' — and we combined them into one," explained museum Executive Director Chris Hoffman.

Merrymakers wanting to attend the ticketed event signed up for specific time slots so that no more than 50 guests would be in the park at a given time. In addition, face masks were required and social distancing was maintained.

For those attending, these were small concessions. There was plenty to see in the historic park, and the spirit of the season was evident all around.

Entertainment was provided by the Rhythm Theory Tap Ensemble and a three-member band called Senior Moments, which performed railroad songs and holiday favorites.

The museum's 1911 Train Engine was transformed into the North Pole Express, where

Hope is here: First COVID-19 vaccines given at Baptist Health

Medical center delivers its first 250 doses of the Pfizer vaccine to team members

Team members and physicians joined in queue early last Friday morning, filled with hope and excitement to receive the first doses of the COVID-19 vaccine at Baptist Health.

Tujuana Dudley, RN, nurse manager on a COVID-19 unit at Baptist Medical Center South, was the first to receive the vaccine, followed by other team members and physicians who work in COVID-19 units, intensive care units and emergency centers across the system.

"I know it's my duty to receive the vaccine to keep those around me safe," Dudley said, who lost a family member recently due to COVID-19. "From the time the pandemic first arrived in March, we've seen firsthand how COVID-19 can impact patients, their families and our community."

Baptist Health vaccinated 250 team members last Friday, with additional vaccinations expected in the coming weeks as more supply becomes available.

"This is a historic day at Baptist Health," said Brett McClung, FACHE, president and CEO of Baptist Health. "We are privileged to now have access to the single-most important tool to fight CO-VID-19. We are so proud of our team members for their leadership in taking this vaccine. This signal of hope is a definite sign that we have reached the beginning of the end of this pandemic."

The room was filled with celebratory applause and cheerful tears as vaccines were distributed, a significant milestone in the fight against COVID-19 in the community and in the country.

Though the Pfizer vaccine was recently approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for emergency use authorization, the planning for vaccine allocation began weeks in advance, orchestrated by a multidisciplinary Vaccine Allocation Team (VAT) at Baptist Health.

COVID-19 vaccines are the best tool available to prevent the spread of COVID-19, but wearing masks, washing hands and social distancing all remain important to ending the pandemic.

Mike Crowder is a children's author and illustrator living in Ponte Vedra. To date, he has published two books: "Wild about the Alphabet! (and Other Tales)" and "Hammy Hammerhead's (almost) Big Adventure!"

Tell me about your books.

"Wild about the Alphabet! (and Other Tales)" is a book about animals, cleverly disguised as an alphabet book. It's "chock-full o' fantastic illustrations, brilliant writing, interesting facts and biting humor... It's not just a book about the alphabet, either! It's a book about animals, too! Designed to grow with your child, it's already educated and entertained children up to 13, college students and even grandparents - not just preschoolers. With the exception of the quail, this book contains many fascinating animals, and I bet it's the first time you've ever seen a coelacanth! (It's a prehistoric fish, thought to be extinct until 1938, when someone accidentally caught one in the Indian Ocean!) It's not your Gramma's ABCs!

"Hammy Hammerhead's (almost) Big Adventure!" is a storybook about sharks, cleverly designed as, well, a storybook about sharks. It takes place in the mountains of Florida (stay with me on this), in the world's largest aquarium, bigger than anything you can think of, unless you can think of a state or maybe a planet. Hammy, a hammerhead shark of about 10 "people-years" in age, begins his day eating a chummy bowl of Yum-Os — I mean a yummy bowl of Chum-Os) cleans his room, meets his pals for some pufferball, beats the school bully at free throws and makes a new friend.

I see that you do both the writing and illustration. Do you have a background in writing or art?

I have always wanted to be an artist and drew every single day of my life since I could hold a crayon. I went to SCAD, graduating in '87. I began courtroom illustration in the late '80s and was also picking up the occasional side-gig doing logos and T-shirt designs.

What prompted you to become a children's author?

My story is the same old cliché, really. I was in a near-fatal car accident and in a coma for 11 days; the best 11 days of my life – I got to sleep! Short story long, I basically stopped drawing for fun until '09, when I met my fabulous wife, Gwen. She had seen a drawing I had done in college of a chimpanzee in the shape of an "M" and decided I should do a whole alphabet.

Finally, in '17, after years of relentless, yet non-stop, wheedling, pleading, cajoling, prodding and, yes, nagging, she finally convinced me to do it, and the rest is history.

In three words or less, no. I'm an overgrown kid at heart, and I have better recall of the first 27 years of my life than the last

Well, the fame and fortune, of course! At least that's what they tell me. LOL. Until then, I really do enjoy hearing about folks enjoying my books. It means I've done it right.

I like the beauty, the quiet and the


In your spare time, what do you like to do?

"conductor" John Milio and "engineer" Keith Baker chatted with guests. Children took turns ringing the train's bell.

Santa and his elf, Sprinkles McFlurry, welcomed children from the porch of the East Coast Railway Foremen's House. Though these visits were socially distanced, the children were excited to speak with the North Pole visitors.

One of the highlights was a living history re-enactment on the porch of the Oesterreicher-McCormick Cabin, which dates back to 1873. A family dressed in period garb demonstrated how people would have decorated their Christmas trees more than a century ago.

Both the cabin and the foreman's house were decorated by the museum's Master Gardener group.

Finally, the decorated Chapel provided a good background for photos.

"Holidays in the Village" was the museum's sole event in December and only the second event since COVID-19 forced a curtailment of public activities. In November, the museum held a tour of the H. Warren Smith Cemetery.

Hoffman said people have been very understanding of the measures the museum has had to take to keep visitors safe.

"We're just really proud of our community for continuing to come out to support and enjoy the museum, understanding the new realities of the way we must do things," she said

"It was victorious," said Roberts. "Neighbors came out and could greet each other, people set up tables and had a glass of wine and said hi to one another. It was beautiful."




Perhaps the most rewarding part of the evening was seeing just how many community members came together to donate gifts in the toy drive.



As most of us know, the stock market (Dow Jones Industrial Average) has been on a gut wrenching rollercoaster ride this year amid the coronavirus pandemic. Stocks started the year strong, breaking the record for the

longest-ever bull market in February but then the unthinkable happened in March, a pandemic slammed the United States, which essentially brought most economic activity to a halt. In a matter of 22 trading days, the S&P 500 fell 30%. Ouch! Who would have thought at that time, the stock market was on the verge of an unbelievable advance that will make it back to all time high, which is about a 64% advance even as Covid-19 cases continued to soar. As of this writing (December 21), the Dow Jones Industrial Average is up 5.88% while the S&P 500 increased 14.39%, which does not include dividends.

While reading a thought-provoking commentary from the well-respected economist, Brian Wesbury, I was reminded, once again, about the perils of trying to time the beast (stock market). Yep, in this author's humble opinion, it is an un-winnable game over time. During my 36 years as a financial advisor, I am yet to witness anyone who successfully buys low and sells high. Sure, I have seen one get "lucky" from time to time, but eventually he or she succumbs to the death spiral of market timing akin to one that believes they can repeatedly win at the casino. It is simply not possible to time the market, regardless of all the heavily credentialed gurus on CNBC and the like who claim they can.

According to Mr. Wesbury, "Imagine being told back at the beginning of 2020 that the world was about to be hit by a global pandemic that would lead to massive government-imposed shutdowns of business activity around the country.

Cultural Center to open new location in Jax Beach on Jan. 4

The Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach is opening a new facility in Jacksonville Beach, the first step in expanding its services to reach more artists, art students and art lovers in Northeast Florida.

The new studio is scheduled to be open to the public on Jan. 4, at 3972 Third St. South in the Trader Joe's shopping complex. It will house classes in visual arts and music, plus workshops, camps for children and the Cultural Center's popular Market, where various artistic creations by local artists provide gifts and decorative options in a wide range of prices.

The Cultural Center, a St. Johns County icon for more than a quarter century,

is shifting its services from its former headquarters at 50 Executive Way in Ponte Vedra Beach. That building has been sold to Roanoke Vinton Radio Inc., a Virginia corporation.

"That building served the Cultural Center and its array of artists and students very well for 26 years," Executive Director Donna Guzzo said. "It was showing its age, however. And COVID conditions were limiting the space we could use for most of 2020 and into 2021. "We were planning to sell the building eventually to complete plans to move into a future arts complex on St. Johns County land near the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall. The opportunity to sell now on attractive terms ignites our ambition to meet the demands of a wider audience for arts and arts services."

The Allman Betts Band to perform at St. Augustine Amphitheatre Feb. 6

On Saturday, Feb. 6, jam-rock group The Allman Betts Band will take the stage at the St. Augustine Amphitheatre.

Tickets for The Allman Betts Band are currently on sale. To protect the health of guests, artists, team members, crew and the well-being of live music, enhanced health and safety measures are in place.

When The Allman Betts Band released "Down to the River" in June of 2019, the debut album represented not only the first time the group had recorded together, but in fact was the first time the seven-piece ensemble had ever played together. If "Down to the River" was the sound of the band's combustible sparks igniting, then "Bless Your Heart" is its bonfire, built for the summer of 2020 and beyond.

A double-album follow-up fueled by road-forged camaraderie and musical intensity, vibrantly reflecting the individual and collective experiences of these seven, all drawing inspiration from the band's symbolic hometown — a place Devon Allman calls "the United States of Ameri-

In 2019, as "Down to the River" topped charts and dotted playlists, The Allman Betts Band toured relentlessly. Sold-out U.S. theaters in spring turned to festival dates in summer, even crossing the Atlantic for a string of European appearances. It was in Germany in late July when Allman, the group's co-founder, guitarist and singer, required a tour-ending hospital stay for surgery. His recovery postponed several ensuing shows, but the writing for a second album enthusiastically continued.

Along with co-founder, guitarist and singer Duane Betts, the pair already had a growing notebook of new songs, largely composed on the tour bus or in hotel rooms in cities and towns across the country. They re-enlisted Stoll Vaughan, a singer-songwriter from Los Angeles (via Kentucky), who'd collaborated on five of "River's" nine tracks, to advise on the developing material. And they booked a return to Alabama's Muscle Shoals Sound Studio, the historic recording facility where they'd cut the debut, as well as re-signing Grammywinning producer Matt Ross-Spang to reprise his role helming the recording.

Over a week's time, they recorded 13 songs, with additional tracking in Memphis and St. Louis. Within the eclectic repertoire are the familiar — stacks of guitars; electric, acoustic and slide; a throttling, percussive rhythm section — and the fresh.

"I think we definitely challenged ourselves, pushed ourselves artistically, and widened the spectrum on all levels. We wanted something that was a little more sweeping. A deeper experience," Betts

Said Allman, "I hope what people hear on 'Bless Your Heart' is a band that's having a love affair with being a band."

Ravens sack Minshew 5 times in 40-14 rout of Jaguars

BALTIMORE | Former Jacksonville Jaguars defensive end Yannick Ngakoue had two sacks, including a forced fumble, in the Baltimore Ravens' 40-14 victory over his former team last Sunday.

Baltimore sacked starting quarterback Gardner Minshew five times.

"This is what they brought me here to do," Ngakoue said. "They brought me here to come change the game, to be a critical part of the defense. That's my job. That's what I intend to do."

Minshew completed 22-of-29 passes for 226 yards and two touchdowns with no interceptions as the Jaguars have lost a franchise-record 13 consecutive games.

"I was talking to Yan during the game," Minshew said. "He's so competitive, as am I. I really tried to tune him out because he chirps a little bit, but I just know that's how Yan is. (He's) a guy that I have a ton of respect for, one of the great competitors in our league."

Jacksonville scored late when the outcome was not in doubt.

Minshew completed a 17-yard touchdown pass to rookie running back James Robinson with 9:09 remaining in the third quarter. A 13-yard TD pass from Minshew to wide receiver Chris Conley with 1:48 left cut the Ravens' lead to 40-14.

Ravens QB Lamar Jackson completed 17-of-22 passes for 243 yards and three touchdowns with one interception — and rushed 10 times for 35 yards and a touchdown.

The Ravens outgained the Jaguars, 409-267, and held the Jaguars to 61 first-half yards.

Matthew Judon set the tone on the Jaguars' second offensive snap with a sack for a safety that staked Baltimore to an early 2-0 lead. Once the Jaguars fell behind early, Minshew was forced into obvious passing situations, which made Baltimore's pass rush even more relentless.

"There's obviously a lot of frustration. Obviously, a lot of people are upset," said Jaguars head coach Doug Marrone. "I'm sure people are embarrassed. There's a lot of that, but we don't let the personal feelings come into play when we have the opportunity to fix things and try to work to get better."

Following the New York Jets' 23-20 upset of the Los Angeles Rams, the Jets (1-13)

moved into a tie with the Jaguars for the rights to the No. 1 overall pick in the 2021 NFL Draft. Should both clubs lose their remaining two games, the top spot would be decided by a tiebreaker based on strength of schedule. Entering Week 15, the Jets (.592) had a higher SOS than the Jaguars (.536), meaning Jacksonville would have the inside track on potentially drafting Clemson QB Trevor Lawrence, the presumed top selection in next year's draft.

"We're trying to win," Marrone said Monday. "We're doing everything we possibly can. That is my job right now, and I owe it to the coaches and players."

The Jaguars will play the Chicago Bears (7-7) at TIAA Bank Field on Sunday before playing the Indianapolis Colts on the road to close out the regular-season.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER

Ponte Vedra System/ Sawgrass Grid Bacteriological Monitoring Public Notice

What happened?

Our water system did not meet the requirements of a drinking water standard. Although this is not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened, what you should do, and what we did to correct this situation.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. For public water systems, such as ours, monitoring is required for Total Coliform in our wells and in the distribution system. The well samples are used to indicate the quality of the source water and whether our water treatment methods are acceptable, and are collected prior to disinfection, while the distribution system monitoring indicates whether or not the disinfected drinking water you receive meets health standards. Due to an oversight, during the 2020 compliance period, our wells were not sampled for Total Coliform. Therefore, while the distribution system was monitored and confirmed the quality of your drinking water at that time, we cannot be certain of the quality of the source (i.e., well) water at that time. However, well samples were collected on September 23, 2020 and November 17, 2020. All tested

What should I do?

Coliforms are bacteria that are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially harmful, waterborne pathogens may be present or that a potential pathway exists through which contamination may enter the drinking water distribution system.

Any customers who are concerned about their exposure to Coliforms can choose alternative sources of water for ingestion.

What does this mean?

This is not an emergency. If it had been, you would have been notified immediately.

What is being done?

This is what we are doing to correct the problem: An operational review has been conducted and additional safeguards have been put in place to assure this type of oversight cannot occur in the future.

This problem has already been resolved




