





## St. Augustine marks 20th anniversary of 9/11

On the morning of Sept. 11, 2001, New York City firefighter Lt. Robert Aponte was in the fire station in Queens and heard a voice came over the intercom with news that today sounds understated.

"A member of our house watch who was watching TV said, 'Put the TV on. We've got a problem at the World Trade Center," Aponte recalled.

The broadcast showed a small hole in the North Tower. Aponte thought maybe a wayward pilot had crashed into it.

But then, the firefighters gathered around the TV watched as a commercial airliner struck the South Tower. They switched the firehouse radio to the Manhattan frequency.

"One of the first transmissions that I heard – that I'll remember forever – was a member who got on the radio and said, 'Manhattan, we have jumpers down,'" Aponte said.

The retired firefighter gave his account of that day 20 years ago during St. Augustine's Ceremony of Remembrance,



held Saturday, Sept. 11, at the city's main fire station.

Hundreds attended the ceremony, which included remarks by St. Augustine Fire Chief Carlos Aviles and an invocation by the Rev. Matt Marino of Trinity Parish. A minute of silence was timed to coincide with the exact moment the first plane hit the first tower.

In addition, a "Survivor Tree" sapling planted in front of the fire station was dedicated. It is a descendent of a tree discovered at Ground Zero in October 2001. The tree was severely damaged but was rehabilitated.

Also dedicated was a piece of steel recovered from the World Trade Center site. It was donated by retired New York City firefighters James Svendsen and John Westfield.

The ceremony concluded with "Striking the Four 5's." Prevention Chief and Fire Marshal Bob Growick rang the local department's 1900 fire bell in four intervals of five rings each. This tradition signifies the last alarm of a firefighter.

In his presentation, Aponte recalled how he was told to take a bus downtown. There was a lot of chatter among those on the bus, which abruptly fell silent.

"From the Triborough Bridge, you normally could see the whole New York City skyline," Aponte said. "We realized at that point the second tower was down. The Trade Center was gone."

Downtown, Aponte encountered a firefighter he knew who was returning

## Nephew of 9/11 firefighter continues tradition of remembrance

Throughout the weekend remembering the 20th anniversary of the events of 9/11, there were many tributes, but one held locally at Veterans Park had an extra sense of emotion tied to it.

Steve Helewa recently moved to St. Johns County from New York in July and was 12 years old when his uncle Paul Pansini died as a firefighter responding to scene at the Twin Towers that day.

"I had 12 years with him, and I feel like I remember every one of them," Helewa said. "His impact lasted because that's where I get my love of the outdoors. Every time I go fishing, I think about him, and it feels like he's right there with me even all these years later."

It is a tradition of Helewa's family to have a gathering to raise and lower his uncle's casket flag each year on Sept. 11 in Cape May, New Jersey, in honor of his uncle.

"Unfortunately, with relocating I knew that I wasn't going to be there this year," Helewa said.

He reached out to St. Johns County Parks and Recreation and asked if he could continue the tradition in his new Florida home.

"Their response was overwhelming, and they figured something out in 48 hours," Helewa said. "They asked if I would continue to do this for years on. I look forward to working with the parks department, Sheriff's Department and the county to put together a nice ceremony every year."

Pansini worked at FDNY Ten House, which was the closest responding fire-house to the World Trade Center on 9/11, assigned to the engine.

According to Helewa, his uncle was

working that day, but there was a firehouse up town that was a man short, so he volunteered to go and fill that spot. While he was on his way, the first plane crashed

"By the time he made it to the firehouse that was in need, they had left, so he grabbed some gear and went down by himself," Helewa said. "For a long time, we didn't know where he was. We just knew that he wasn't with Ten House and he wasn't with the firehouse he was

## DeSantis thanks first responders, military on eve of 9/11 anniversary

## Governor also criticizes Biden administration

#### **By Shaun Ryan**

Gov. Ron DeSantis visited Palm Valley American Legion Post 233 on Friday, Sept. 10, to thank first responders and military personnel on the eve of the 20th anniversary of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

He also took the opportunity to address recent mandates announced by President Joe Biden regarding coronavirus vaccinations

"When you have a president like Biden issuing unconstitutional edicts against the American people, we have a responsibility to stand up for the Constitution and to fight back," DeSantis said. "This is a president who has acknowledged in the past he does not have the authority to force this on anybody. This order would result, potentially, in millions of Americans losing their jobs. I think we should be protecting people's jobs, not trying to kick people out of work right now."

On Thursday, Sept. 9, Biden announced that all employers with more than 100 workers would have to require vaccinations or weekly testing of employees. That mandate would come in the form of a rule by OSHA.

In addition, Biden is issuing an executive order requiring vaccination for federal employees and contractors who do busi-

ness with the U.S. government.

DeSantis noted that these actions failed to recognize people who have immunity through infection.

"We will be acting in the state of Florida to provide protections for people," he said. "People should not be cast aside because they make a medical decision for themselves. They should not lose their jobs. They should not be unable to put food on their table just because they made a different decision than the powers that be are demanding that they make."

On Monday, Sept. 13, media outlets reported that DeSantis warned local governments in the state that they would face a \$5,000 fine per violation if they required employees to get vaccinated.

Remembering 9/11

In his remarks concerning the Sept. 11 anniversary, DeSantis also took the Biden administration to task for the manner in which it vacated Afghanistan, calling it "a total fiasco."

"As we look to the 20th anniversary of the 9/11 attacks, we do that with an even heavier heart than we have over the previous anniversaries in light of the service members that were tragically killed in Afghanistan very recently," he said.

On Aug. 26, suicide bombers and gunmen attacked people outside the airport

in Kabul. Officials reported that 13 U.S. troops and 60 Afghans were killed.

DeSantis asked those gathered at the post to remember the families suffering from these losses.

"I can only imagine the Americans that have been left behind," he added. "What may be happening, and what may happen over the coming days, weeks and months."

A veteran of the U.S. Navy who served in Iraq during The Surge, DeSantis thanked members of the U.S. military for their service in the War on Terror and the first responders who put their lives on the line to rescue victims of the 9/11 attacks.

"All the people in uniform who were running into those buildings," he said, "climbing up all those stairs, trying to usher people to safety, knowing full well that they would likely never see the great, blue skies again because of what was happening. The chance of them making it out alive was virtually zero at that point, and yet they went in and were able to save hundreds, if not thousands, of people."

DeSantis praised K9s for Warriors, which helps veterans facing certain hardships as a result of their service, and thanked the families of active military personnel who are also asked to make sacrifices.

from the World Trade Center site. The man described seeing people jumping to their deaths. He couldn't see the faces of the women, because their dresses blew across their faces. But the men were another matter.

"Bob," he said to Aponte, "the men, they stared at me the whole way down."

Soon, the firefighters in the staging area knew they would be needed – they'd seen Building 7 collapse.

For the next eight hours, Aponte worked with a team to collect all the spare air canisters they could find from every apparatus that wasn't buried. These canisters would be an improvement over the thin paper masks worn by firefighters working the scene.

Finally, he was able to go home to his wife and children. And there, he cried uncontrollably.

In the ensuing days, he was assigned to work The Pile, searching for survivors.

After then-Mayor Rudy Giuliani announced the end of the rescue mission and declared the site a salvage mission, the fire department faced another challenge: funerals for the 343 firefighters.

Fortunately, fire departments from all over the country had reached out and asked how they could help.

"What they did for us, they came and attended our funerals in their full-dress uniforms," Aponte said. "The funerals I went to, I saw patches from all over the world: Spain, Portugal, Finland, Switzerland, San Francisco, Oregon – you name it, they were there. Because us New York City firefighters, we just couldn't do them all."

When the list of all the deceased firefighters was published, Aponte knew 50 of them

"I was one of the lucky ones that day," he said.

going to. It was nerve-racking."

In October 2001 a memorial was held with an empty casket, because Pansini's body had not been found.

"They did find his body in April of 2002, and we were able to hold a proper burial and he was laid to rest," Helewa

At the time of Pansini's death he had three children, and his son has followed in his father's footsteps of public service as an environmental conservation officer in the state of New York. Helewa's father and brother are both members of the New York Police Department and he spent time as an EMT.

"The day before, I was walking home from school and it was pouring rain, and

I was about three-quarters of the way home when my uncle pulled up with my aunt," Helewa said. "She said, 'Get in,' and he said, 'Janice, he's almost home and he's soaked, why are you going to make him get in our dry car?' She said, 'shut up, Paul. Let him get in the car,' but that was just his sense of humor. He was the funniest man I've ever met in my life."

Helewa now has children of his own and he wants to make sure that the future generations who weren't alive to experience 9/11 firsthand always remember the heroic sacrifices and emotions tied to that fateful day.

"Sometimes I hear my kids tell stories about him, and it's like they were there even though they never met," Helewa said. "I just want to continue to let their legacies live on."

#### County bookmobile hosts outreach in Nocatee

The St. Johns County Public Library System's bookmobile hosted a special outreach event Sept. 14 as part of September being National Library Card Sign-up Month.

The event was free and open to the public and took place at the new Council on Aging offices at Flagler Health+ at Nocatee.

Presentations were given on how to use the library catalog online, access downloadable materials, utilize databases and place requests for physical and downloadable materials, details about in-person and virtual library events for all ages and many more topics.

Anne Crawford, in charge of adult services at the Ponte Vedra Beach branch, gave a tutorial on how to navigate some of the online services available once a person signs up for a library card.

These services include an app called Hoopla where members can select up to seven materials to check out at a time. It allows them to browse a collection of videos, music, eBooks, comics, graphic novels and digital audiobooks.

She explained how to check out books online and talked about the various online databases that can be accessed.

"Part of what we are doing today is letting the community know how we can help them," said Leslie Goode, with the library staff's outreach program. "Hoopla is like our Netflix."

Goode offered an opportunity to tour of the county's bookmobile and ask questions about future stops planned.

According to Goode, the bookmobile spans generations of readers.

"People in their 30s and 40s come on board and talk about how they grew up with the bookmobile and they have that nostalgia," Goode said. "But then you have the young ones that will plop on the floor and just start looking at books. It's great to be able to provide that."

Those in attendance were able to apply for a library card on site during the event, if they did not have one already, and check out any materials found in the bookmobile.

According to the schedule of upcoming stops on the library system's website, popular destinations to find the bookmobile throughout September will be at various Publix locations across the county.

"We're not back to our full schedule at this point, but we're pretty much just doing our larger community stops," Goode said. "We're so grateful that we've got a good relationship with Publix."



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## Tennis tournament to raise funds for cancer research

The largest charity tennis event in the greater Jacksonville area is back.

SenioRITAs at Sawgrass Women's Tennis Tournament returns in October after a one-year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2020, the RITA Foundation – of which SenioRITAs is a part – chose not to actively seek donations. Still, friends, family and corporations helped to raise \$208,104.

"Our sponsors contributed anyway," said Beverly Roman, a member of the tournament committee. "And we had a wine raffle, which made \$5,000."

Donations allow the foundation to contribute toward Mayo Clinic cancer research, Baptist Medical Center patient programs and "The Buddy Bus," a mobile mammogram unit for the underserved. This year, the foundation has added a grant for the DigniCap system, which helps prevent hair loss during chemotherapy.

RITA stands for Research Is The Answer. It is a Jacksonville-based volunteer nonprofit organization, and its mission is to raise awareness and money to help in the fight against all cancers, with emphasis on breast cancer.

The tournament is a three-day event and will be held Oct. 15-17 at the Saw-grass Racquet Club, 9175 Preston Trail East, Ponte Vedra Beach. Its popularity is manifest as nearly 300 women typically participate.

"They come from not just Jacksonville," said Roman. "They come from Georgia, Tennessee and other states. We've had quite a following."

The women's doubles tournament is played in divisions by age and level of play. The age groups are 40-54 and 55-plus.

A signature feature of the tournament is the array of pink flags along the tennis walkway, each of which represents a loved one who has been hit by cancer and includes a personal message to that person. This year marks the tournament's 22nd anniversary.

A kickoff party is planned for 5:30 p.m. Oct. 5 at Pusser's Bar & Grille, 816 State Road A1A North.

This will be followed by a live and silent auction dinner party from 6 to 9 p.m. Oct. 11 at the new Sawgrass Country Club Golf Clubhouse with a "SenioRITAs in Wonderland" theme.

"There will be seating for everyone,

which we haven't had in the past," said Roman. "It should be a really nice event."

There will be a tennis exhibition from 6 to 9 p.m. Oct. 15 at the Sawgrass Racquet Club

Each year in the United States, 222,000 women and men are diagnosed with breast cancer, and 45,000 die from it. To date, the RITA Foundation has raised more than \$5.7 million for local cancer research and patient care. Of that, the tournament – one of three RITA fundraising events – has raised more than \$2 million.

"It's all donated," said Roman. "Nobody takes a penny. Everybody on the committee is very committed to help eradicate this awful disease."

## Week 4 Football Preview

#### Nease, Ponte Vedra resume district play

Nease football is flying high following a 49-6 route of Orange Park last week, but now they must quickly shift the focus as they re-enter district play at 6:30 p.m. Sept. 17 on the road against Atlantic Coast.

There is not much to critique about the Panthers' (2-1, 1-0) performance against the Raiders, as they played about as flawless as a high school team can play.

The Stingrays (2-1, 0-0) are coming off a dominant win of their own, 39-21 over Sandalwood, and have showed signs of being a very dangerous team with a 27-24 win against Mandarin to open the season.

However, sandwiched between the wins is a 40-7 loss to Riverside. The Stingrays have shown a tendency to surrender points defensively, having allowed an average of 29.3 points per game through the first three weeks.

Meanwhile, the Panthers have shown an ability to frustrate opposing offenses and have surrendered and average of 16.6 points per game.

Because of this, the Panthers have

the defensive edge going in, but do not be surprised if it turns out to be a highscoring affair.

The Stingrays offense revolves around senior running back Arthur Walker, who ran for 196 yards and 268 yards in the wins over Mandarin and Sandalwood, respectively.

The key to the Panthers' success in the game is slowing down Walker and putting the pressure on sophomore quarterback Baylor Hayes and the passing game to win the game for the Stingrays.

Striking first and establishing an early lead is also a recipe for success for the Panthers, as it may force the Stingrays to get out of their comfort zone and away from pounding the ball on the ground.

Ponte Vedra also goes on the road to face district opponent First Coast at 6:30 p.m. Sept. 17, as they make the trip up to the northside of Jacksonville.

It has been an up-and-down season for the Sharks (1-2, 0-1) offense, which has had both a highly productive outing and ones where it is a battle to pick up first downs and maintain

possession.

The consistent presence every week for the Sharks is its defense, which has been reliable, but has been put in tough spots at times having to deal with short fields following turnovers.

They have demonstrated a knack for creating turnovers of their own, especially in the secondary, which has six interceptions on the young season, three by junior Nathan Bunkosky.

Buccaneers (0-3, 0-0) senior Larry Edwards is a dual-threat quarterback that can make plays with his arm and his legs.

Edwards has thrown for 497 yards and four touchdowns with no interceptions, something the Sharks will be hungry to change. He also leads the team with 84 rushing yards on 12 carries.

Edwards' favorite target is shifty wideout and fellow senior Van Adams Jr., who has hauled in 297 yards and three touchdowns on 12 catches.

Despite the rapport between Edwards and Adams Jr., the Buccaneers have only scored a combined seven points in their last two games.

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




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








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
