St. Johns County closes COVID-19 testing site

The NOMI Health COVID-19 testing site at the St. Johns County Wind Mitigation Building is no longer operational due to a lack of sufficient federal funding.

Since early March, daily testing numbers at the county site have been steadily declining, averaging fewer than 100 tests a day. This is a result of widespread testing availability in the private sector, the federal program that mails free COVID-19 tests to individuals and a decrease in COVID-19 infections.

The projects include the St. Johns County Shore Protection Project in St. Augustine Beach and the St. Johns County South Ponte Vedra Beach and Vilano Beach Coastal Storm Risk Management Project.

The Flood Control and Coastal Emergencies funding resulted from USACE evaluations of erosion impacts on the federal beach projects following the November 2021 nor'easter.

The St. Johns County Shore Protection Program will include placing about 2 million cubic yards of sand on 2.5 miles of federally authorized shoreline beginning about three miles south of the St. Augustine Inlet and extending south. The federal funding made available for this project is roughly \$37 million.

The St. Johns County South Ponte Vedra Beach and Vilano Beach Coastal Storm Risk Management Project will include placing about a million cubic yards of sand on 2.6 miles of shoreline north of the St. Augustine Inlet. The federal funding available for this effort is about \$25 million, including the district's costs for design, permitting, contract acquisition and three years of post-construction monitoring.

Both projects will use sand from offshore sources.

DeSantis awards \$1.7M to local projects

On Friday, April 22, Gov. Ron DeSantis awarded more than \$15 million to 10 Florida communities through the Rural Infrastructure Fund and the Community Development Block Grant program. Among the recipients of the latter were St. Augustine and St. Johns County.


The City of St. Augustine was awarded \$1,251,229 through the Community Development Block Grant program to rehabilitate the St. Francis House Crisis Center to meet increasing demands for service.

Mailing of St. Johns County voter registration cards temporarily halted

St. Johns County is currently in the process of redrawing and approving precinct lines and new voting locations following the 2020 census and the federal, state and local redistricting process. As a result, the mailing of new voter information cards has been

Jacksonville Beaches: 252 Solana Rd., Ponte Vedra Beach

Atlantic Beach: 599 Atlantic Blvd., Ste. 1, Atlantic Beach

suspended to allow for the adoption of the new precincts.

Once the redistricting process is complete, all registered voters in St. Johns County will receive new voter information cards and mailing of the cards will resume. These actions will occur prior to the Aug. 23 primary election.

Updated voter information cards will reflect the new districts, precincts and election day polling places. All voters are advised to review the new voter information cards carefully as their precincts and polling places may have

changed.

The St. Johns Board of County Commissioners and School Board adopted new districts in December. As voting precinct lines are based on County Commission and School Board district lines, they are being redrawn based on the new districts and all polling places are under review.

In addition, new Florida Senate and House districts were recently adopted by the state legislature and have been approved by the Florida Supreme Court and new Federal Congressional districts are currently before the state legislature.



As told to Anthony Richards

Can you tell us a little about your background?

I grew up in small town Connecticut. I received my bachelor's degree in social work, and my first job out of college was as a case worker in my hometown, where I saw my community through a completely different lens.

I followed this with several years in the mental health field working in both inpatient and outpatient clinical settings.

After I started my graduate coursework in recreational and leisure studies, one of my professors surprisingly inspired me to work with the aging population. That is when my career path took a somewhat dramatic turn, and I began working in the elderly service field in several municipalities in Connecticut.

My last position in Connecticut was as the program director for the Southwestern CT Area Agency on Aging, which is very much like ElderSource in Northeast Florida.

I oversaw the Older Americans Act programs, information and referral and the SHIP State Health Insurance Assistance Program (in Florida, it is called SHINE.)

How long have you been with the Council on Aging and how did you get involved?

I started working at the St. Johns County Council on Aging as the program director in May of 2019 shortly after deciding to move to Florida to be close to my son and daughter-in-law, who were expecting their first child that year.

I saw an opening online at the COA in St Augustine, applied and interviewed virtually.

The COA is the embodiment of a true nonprofit agency; everyone's focus is on providing worthwhile services and programs to as many seniors living in St Johns County.

What are the most rewarding parts of the job?

There are some incredibly rewarding aspects when working at the COA. For me, being able to offer services and resources to seniors and caregivers who thought no one cared or understood their situation is so gratifying.

Coming out of COVID shutdowns and now hearing the laughter and seeing the smiling faces at our COA senior centers, or the genuine appreciation when you deliver a simple meal and newspaper to a homebound senior, is priceless.

Witnessing the instant relief on a caregiver's face when you simply listen to their journey and then share the various resources available to them through COA and our sister agencies is so rewarding.



I love to hear stories from native Floridians, since they are a rare breed in Nocatee. My neighborhood is so wonderful; the neighbors really look out for one another, so I feel like I am right back to my small town roots.

What do you like to do in your free time?

Spend time with the family and my adorable grandsons! Since two of the three years I've been in Florida have been during COVID, I'm looking forward to exploring a bit more now. I plan to volunteer with an animal shelter and hope to take advantage of the amazing offerings in Nocatee and surrounding areas.

Pancake event to focus on community togetherness

What brings people closer together better than pancakes? That is what went through the minds of Jack Parker, Matt Berquist and Amy Wacaster when they came up with the idea for the Ponte Vedra Pancake Festival and Community Table.

It is a grassroots event designed to bring the local community together and will be held from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m.
Saturday, May 14, at Christ Episcopal Church in Ponte Vedra Beach.

"We tried to be conscious of the fact that families have busy Saturday mornings, so hopefully they can just stop by when they get a chance to take part," Berquist said. "Marsh Landing, Sawgrass and all the Ponte Vedra communities are welcome."

It is not a church-sponsored event; Christ Episcopal Church is just providing the use of the location along with tables and chairs.

According to Parker, who is the "brainchild" behind the event, he came up with it after being in the Ponte Vedra Beach area for years and believing there was a need for community activities that bring friends and neighbors together.

"We wanted to set up something simple that allows different groups to come together and get to know each other," Parker said.

Although pancakes are the thing that is bringing people together in this case, it

is much more than just an event centered around pancakes.

"The deeper meaning of community is what this is all about," Wacaster said.

Having been through the pandemic, the three thought that the timing seemed just right to put on an event like this.

"We've had this influx of people in our community in the last couple of years," Wascaster said. "We've all had to be so inward thinking of late, so it's nice to be outward now."

The plan is to have one long table that people can eat pancakes at and enjoy conversation.

There will also be a pancake-eating contest, where the community can showcase their appetite, as well as other

contests for adults and children to take part in and live music performing.

Ten group organizations from the local community will be the "chefs" at the event and will have the honor of cooking and serving the pancakes.

The unique twist is that each organization will have their own tent setup and will cook the pancakes based on their own recipe, which will allow for creativity to be on display and a variety of pancakes for attendees to sample.

"I think it's just a really awesome concept," Berquist said. "We definitely have a fun morning planned."

There is a \$5 entry fee per person or \$20 for a family of four to attend the event. Each ticket is all-you-can-eat.

"They (tennis and pickleball) are very similar, but at the same time they are so different," Nili said. "The ball bounces completely different, and it will need a little bit of adjustment, but I promise you that every single tennis player is ready for the intermediate play right from the start."

Other differences between tennis and pickleball include a smaller paddle and a smaller court size.

The smaller playing surface means a lot of fast-paced action for everyone involved.

"You can play singles, but the majority of pickleball is played as doubles," Nili said. "You think it's not going to be the workout and require the same fitness as tennis, but when we checked to see how many calories we were burning, it was easily comparable to tennis. It's

really crazy when you think about it, because you run a lot less, but it's just a constant movement."

Not only will The Yards introduce an option to play pickleball, but they will also offer classes for beginners to learn the rules of the game as well as some proper technique.

"Whenever I teach beginners, I have seen that one hour is enough for them to hit the ball back and forth to each other and really start having fun," Nili said.

According to Nili, there is such a family atmosphere surrounding the pickleball world and it is something she has really come to appreciate since she began playing.


A mixture of competitions and social events is what Nili sees as the plan for the pickleball club at The Yards once it opens.

"We've had a very high technique of training in all styles of dance, such as jazz, ballet and tap," Reilly said. "We came from a very competitive dance studio in North Carolina, and we just couldn't find what we were looking for, so we just said, 'Why not create the perfect dance studio?'"

One of the things the Hughes have found throughout their years dancing is that they enjoy the unique mixture of competition and comradery that exists in the dance world.

Part of that comradery they believe is making sure the dancers are involved in their community.

"We love being role models for all of the young dancers and understand the importance of hard work," Reilly said. "You want to be successful but by working hard in a fun way. It's about being there to lift each other up."

The St. Augustine Amphitheatre's Green Hands Initiative first established a reusable cup in April 2019.





Trucks of donations gathered to help Ukrainian refugees feel at home

The City of Atlantic Beach and Catholic Charities partnered to give residents of the Beaches communities an opportunity to help those affected by the war in Ukraine.

The two entities came together and held a two-day refugee resettlement supply drive April 22 and 23 as part of an event called AB Loves Ukraine.

Chris and Mark Flaschner of Atlantic Beach helped the idea turn into a reality after they had been looking for ways to get involved and help the cause.

"I was looking for a place to donate to Ukraine and was pulling up some websites when I saw that Catholic Charities of Jacksonville was a resettlement port for refugees (displaced by the war in Ukraine) to come in," Chris Flaschner said. "I was thinking that maybe I could do a drive on my own to help."

However, one of her neighbors heard

what she was thinking about doing and urged her to reach out to the City of Atlantic Beach and connected her with the mayor about a week later.

"Some really kind residents of Atlantic Beach came to city hall with this idea about a month ago and we embraced it," said Kevin Hogencamp, Atlantic Beach deputy city manager. "It's all volunteer driven."

There were about 40 volunteers that helped receive, sort and load the donated items during the two days.

The event turned out to be a grand gesture by the community, as people from around the area came out to show their support for the Ukrainians coming to the United States.

According to Hogencamp, there are roughly 100 refugees that are expected to be placed in Jacksonville through the

In 2010, Make-A-Wish led a study that defined for the first time the impact of wishes on the children and families that are part of the wish journey.

This research provided quantitative measures of the breadth and depth of the

impact of the Make-A-Wish mission – previously supported by anecdotal knowledge and assumptions – that wish impact is not limited to the immediate emotional effects on wish children. Rather, Make-A-Wish broadly enhances the quality of life for children and their families by promoting resilience and increasing well-being.

Now in 2022, this research has been expanded to include a much larger population of Make-A-Wish children and parents, in addition to medical professionals

Over a decade later, a large majority of Make-A-Wish alumni, parents, and medical providers overwhelmingly agree that the wish experience contributes to improved physical, mental and emotional health.

Wish families reported feelings of increased hope, strength, joy, confidence, self-esteem and quality of life during their wish experience. Additionally, a wish served as a coping mechanism for children undergoing treatment and marked a turning point in their medical journey.

Overwhelmingly, the families reported that a wish brought them closer together and gave them the space they needed to overcome traumatic stress, hopelessness and depression that accompanies a critical illness diagnosis.

In short, a wish provided them hope.

Stuffed animals donated to help 'alone and scared' Ukrainian children

Sage Goodall knows what its like to be a child, as he is 11 years old himself, which is why it hit him so hard when he heard about the children that were being displaced by the war in Ukraine.

"It's sad to think about what they are having to go through," Goodall said. "I don't know what I would do if I put myself in their shoes."

According to Goodall, he first heard about the tragic tales of children being sent from Ukraine to Poland as part of the evacuation process while watching the news one night.

He knew right away that he had to do something to help and asked his parents about what the next step would be.

Goodall came up with the idea to collect stuffed animals in an initiative called "Hugs for the Children of Ukraine."

"The stuffed animals will hopefully give them something to hold on to and hug when they feel alone or scared," Goodall said.

The initiative began in early April after developing a partnership with Aspire Church in San Marco, which has sent shipments of donations overseas to help the cause and they have agreed to include Sage's stuffed animals on an upcoming shipment.

The requests for donations started small with Sage making signs and spreading the word throughout their neighborhood and eventually led to him decorating donation boxes to be placed at various businesses and locations around town.

There are currently donation boxes at Mr. Chubby's Wings in Ponte Vedra, Ponte Vedra Palm Valley-Rawlings Elementary School, Emtec, Inc., Trasca & Co. Eatery, Cabana Beach Club, outside of Winn Dixie, Two Dudes Restaurant, Jacksonville Brain Balance Center, in the Publix break room, in the Fresh Market break room, Optimal You Wellness Center and at their house in the Sawgrass community.

"It's so nice to see people coming

together to care for others and not just thinking of themselves," Goodall said.

According to Rhonda Goodall, Sage's mother, some of the most donations have come from the parents at PVPV-Rawlings, where Sage goes to school, by the employees of Emtec, Inc. and the box that sits outside Winn-Dixie.

"People just keep giving and giving," Rhonda Goodall said. "I've been getting more and more calls and e-mails for boxes, so that list will be growing."

However, the biggest supporter of Sage's has been Mr. Cubby's Wings in Ponte Vedra, which has donation boxes set up inside the restaurant and hosted an event called "Sage's Karaoke Night for the Children of Ukraine" April 23 to help the cause.

More than 500 stuffed animals were either left at Chubby's throughout the day or brought to the event that night.

According to Rhonda Goodall, there were even people at the bar that donated money for Sage to go buy stuffed animals, which he could not wait to do and went to Walmart the next day and bought as many stuffed animals as he could with the money that was donated.

Sage plans to continue collecting stuffed animals until the crisis comes to an end. He currently has more than 1,800 stuffed animals.

Catholic Charities program.

"They're off to a great start thanks to these beautiful people that came out and donated," Hogencamp said. "They've really answered the call."

Flaschner believes the drive showed that there are so many people wanting to help any way they can, but they just do not know how to get started and the drive gave them that outlet to give back.

An assortment of household items was donated throughout the event, such as kitchen and bedroom accessories, hygiene products and children's toys like soccer balls.

They had initially thought that one 20-foot U-Haul truck would be enough, but they received so many items on the first day that they had to get a second 26-foot truck to handle all the items. Together, more than 2,500 cubic feet of space in the trucks was filled with new and like-new items

One resident arrived during the morning of the first day and handed Hogencamp a list, which he realized as he looked over it, that she had taken the suggestion list from the city's website and gotten each item listed, as well as other items she thought would be appreciated that were not on the list.

"It was remarkable how everything

came together," Flaschner said. "We never dreamed that it would be this big."

There have been several organizations and individuals that have donated toward helping Ukraine and its people in their time of need, but what made the AB Loves Ukraine drive so unique was that it focused on furnishing refugee families

with the essential items needed in every-day life.

"It's a shame that they're going through this, and I can't even imagine what it's like," Flaschner said. "This is one of the biggest tragedies in our lifetime."

At the end of the day, the message during the drive was clear, and it was all about collecting items to make the Ukrainian families feel as much at home in their new country as they possibly can.

"Catholic Charities will set them up in an apartment and now they will have sheets on the bed, dishes in the cupboard and clothes in the closets," Flaschner said. "It's powerful what they do."



Chemo Noir race and wine tasting set for June 18

The Annual Chemo Noir One Mile Race and Wine Tasting Event is set to be held June 18 beginning at 8 a.m. with race check-ins at the Casa Marina Hotel and Restaurant in Jacksonville Beach followed by the race start at 8:30 a.m.

The event will be the latest event helping to drive the nonprofit's mission of raising money to help those in the Northeast Florida area that are fighting cancer.

What makes Chemo Noir so unique compared to other nonprofit initiatives

is that it focuses on hosting events with wine being a focal point, as well as a party-like atmosphere that promotes having a good time by all.

The race route will begin near the Jacksonville Beach Pier and go half of a mile down the beach before turning at "Tara's Turn," where runners will have an opportunity to rehydrate while getting cheered on before heading back down the beach for the second half of the race.

Tara's Turn is named in honor of Tara Newton Richardson, who was one of Chemo Noir's initial supporters when the nonprofit was founded roughly seven years ago.

The race will not just end once the runners cross the finish line, because afterwards all participants are invited to take part in a wine tasting event in the Casa Marina courtyard.

Awards will be handed out at the conclusion of the race to the top three male and female finishers.

Swag bags will be given out to each of the participants, expect for those that

choose to do the race virtually, which became an option while the pandemic was going on and will remain in place for this year.

Instead of a swag bag, virtual participants will get an event sticker and a wine key.


Entry fees will be required to take part in the event. The one-mile run will be \$30, while the virtual option will be \$20.

BEAM celebrates re-opening of second full-service site

Beaches Emergency Assistance Ministry (BEAM) hosted its grand re-opening and ribbon cutting ceremony April 1 at their newly expanded Mayport Pantry and Service Center located at 1447 Mayport Road in Atlantic Beach with more than 50 guests in attendance to celebrate the expansion of services.

BEAM began renovations in the fall of 2019 to expand the pantry operations to include office space for in-person assistance.

The buildout was complete in March 2020, but the COVID-19 pandemic delayed BEAM's re-opening plans for the site. Two years later, BEAM clients are now able to access not only the Mayport Pantry, but also make appointments for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits assistance, nutrition counseling with BEAM's registered dietitian and emergency financial assistance.

Guests enjoyed refreshments and hors d'oeuvres with fresh ingredients from BEAM's Grace Garden, prepared by BEAM registered dietitian Maryori Tello. Partners from local churches, schools, the Mayport USO, Atlantic Beach city officials and staff, Neptune Beach officials and dedicated BEAM volunteers were among attendees. Visitors toured the food pantry and renovated office space alongside BEAM staff members and volunteers to see the facility and learn more about the comprehensive services now offered at the Mayport location.

"This pantry was dedicated in memory of my mother, Audrey Kirschner, who was a longtime volunteer and supporter of BEAM," said Kristie Kirschner, BEAM board member. "It is such an honor to see the Mayport location grow into a second full-service site. She would be so proud that BEAM continues to find new ways to help individuals in need of food assistance and wraparound services."

Since 2014, the Mayport Food Pantry has operated as BEAM's second pantry location and the first food pantry is located at BEAM's main office in Jacksonville Beach. Individuals who are food insecure and live or work within BEAM's service area may call to make an appointment for either site. BEAM's service area includes Mayport, Atlantic Beach, Neptune Beach, Jacksonville Beach, Ponte Vedra Beach and San Pablo ZIP codes.



Corner Lot acquires historic River House overlooking St. Johns River

Once hosted Mary Todd Lincoln

Primarily known as a residential, multifamily and commercial development company, Corner Lot's initiative to preserve and protect some of Jacksonville's most historic structures recently developed further when the company acquired the historic River House overlooking the St. Johns River.

Located at 2105 River Blvd., the River House has served as a hotel, a private residence and an apartment building. It also once famously hosted Mary Todd Lincoln for an extended period between 1874 and 1875. Originally called the Rochester House, it was constructed in approximately 1869 near the intersection of Leila Street and Riverside Avenue.

In addition to the River House, Corner Lot is in the process of renovating and preserving the historic Jones Brothers Building on Hogan Street, the City of South Jacksonville building at 1001 Kings Ave., and the structure located on the corner of 1st and Main in Springfield.

Signs it is time to overhaul your kitchen


2. Modern



Sharks serve up a state title

Boys tennis carries wave of momentum through state tournament

Ponte Vedra High won the boys tennis Class 3A state championship following a 4-3 victory over St. Petersburg in the final matchup April 26.

Adam Logan wound up securing the state title effort with a thrilling 10-point tiebreaker to give the Sharks the advantage it needed.

Both the boys and girls Ponte Vedra High School tennis teams won their respective regional championships April 21 to advance to the state finals in Seminole County.

The Shark boys entered the state tournament as the No. 2 seed and looked the part throughout, not losing a match until the championship tilt.

They opened with a 4-0 victory against No. 7 Barron Collier in the state quarter-finals and then followed it up another 4-0 win over top-seeded Niceville in the state semifinals.

The Sharks championship game opponent St. Petersburg was the tournament's No. 5 seed.

After convincing performances enroute to a regional title, the girls team also entered the state tournament as a No. 2 seed but suffered an early exit following a 4-0 loss to No. 7 Barron Collier in the state quarterfinals.

Although the Sharks were forces to be reckoned with heading into the team competition, they will also represent District 3-3A in the individual state tournament.

Senior Andrew Kelley qualified for state as a singles competitor, while he will also team up with fellow senior captain Callum Searle in the doubles bracket.

Kelley and Searle present a veteran presence and loads of experience that they will look to lean on along their path to a possible state title.

Junior captain Isabella Toby will look to make a run for the Sharks as an individual and will also compete in the doubles format alongside senior Kathleen Hawkins.

The Shark girls team finished the season with a record of 14-5, while the boys had a record of 18-1.


Both squads had seen their share of victories heading into the state finals as the girls had won 61% of their matches and the boys had won a mind-boggling 85% of its matches.

In the 113 matches the boys competed in through the regional tournament, they had won 97 times, as opposed to only 16 leases

First Coast Women's **Amateur set for June** 22-23 at King & Bear

Registration for amateur, senior and super senior divisions opens May 2

The First Coast Women's Amateur, Northeast Florida's premier annual women's golf championship, is set to be played June 22-23 at King & Bear Golf Course at World Golf Village in St. Augustine.

The championship will feature approximately 80 amateur female golfers competing across amateur, senior and super senior divisions via a 36-hole individual stroke play competition.

The 2022 FCWA will begin accepting applications May 2 via the Jacksonville Area Golf Association (JAGA) website: jaxareagolf.org. Those interested in playing must first meet the United States Golf Association's handicap index requirements as outlined on the website and

FCWA is open to Florida residents as well as a select number of out-of-state participants. The entry deadline is June

"We are really looking forward to the 2022 FCWA championship and are so grateful to King & Bear for serving as our host course this year," said Susie Fonde, 2022 FCWA Committee Chair. "The FCWA continues to serve as an incredible showcase of the strength of women's golf in Northeast Florida, and we hope to use this championship's platform to continue to grow the game and promote female participation in it."

First founded in 1990, the First Coast Women's Amateur attracts the top high school, college and amateur golfers in Northeast Florida and boasts a strong list of past champions, including former LPGA players, collegiate champions and leaders in the golf industry.

Additionally, the FCWA will support the following nonprofit organizations this year: Moore-Myers Children's Fund, the JAGA Scholarship Fund and North Florida Junior Golf Foundation.

The 2021 FCWA saw Jacksonville's Kaitlyn Schroeder, who recently committed to play collegiate golf at the University of Alabama, win the amateur championship division by five shots. Schroeder is the daughter of University of North Florida men's golf coach Scott Schroeder.

In the Senior division, Kim Keyer-Scott of Estero took home the title after parring her last eight holes to secure a one-stroke victory, and in the Super Senior division, Nancy Smith of Venice won by eight shots.

Senior Championship Division (age 50+) - Open to female golfers who have reached the age of 50 by June 22, 2022, with a verifiable USGA handicap index of 18.0 or better. Championship yardage: Between 5300-5500 yards.

Super Senior Championship Division (age 65+) - Open to female golfers who have reached the age of 65 by June 22, 2022, with a verifiable USGA handicap index of 18.0 or better. Championship yardage: Between 5,000-5100 yards.


