



## Palm Valley boat ramp meeting held

St. Johns County hosted an open house April 21 to give the public information regarding the planned Palm Valley West boat ramp project.

Staff from the county Public Works and Parks and Recreation offices were available to answer questions and share details. The open house was held at THE PLAYERS Community Senior Center in Ponte Vedra.

The project will involve construction of a new concrete boat ramp, a new fixed wooden dock, a new floating dock with aluminum gangway, a new sidewalk, relocation of a kayak launch and improvements to parking and maneuvering areas.

The project area is on the west side of the Intracoastal Waterway with parking located under the Palm Valley bridge. The boat ramp and docks will be located adjacent and to the north of the parking area.

Bids will be received in the summer and construction will begin in the fall. Construction is expected to be complete in the spring of 2023.

A total \$1,050,000 has been provided for the project through funding from waterway access and the Florida Inland Navigation







## Local girl builds community around gaming platform

When Sofia LaBarbera's family moved to Nocatee a year ago, the 11-year-old hoped to befriend others who shared her interest in online gaming — specifically games associated with Roblox, a cloud-based platform that promotes creativity.

Coming from Atlanta, where she became immersed in gaming during the pandemic and regularly interacted with kids from all over the world, Sofia discovered there was no local club devoted to her favorite pastime.

With some help from dad Chris and mom Gina, the homeschooled sixth-grader started her own club. A meet-up was held and the kids in attendance got acquainted. But things really took off when Sofia had an opportunity to speak about her club at the link, a cultural centerpiece, innovation incubator and co-working space located at 425 Town Plaza Ave.

"It was a big hit," Sofia said.

About 40 kids and their parents attended, attesting to the need for real-world friendships even among a generation comfortable with virtual interaction. The club began to meet every second Thursday at the link and membership has grown to about 140, with an average of 30 people attending each meeting.

"I'm trying to get other people in North Florida, in Nocatee, to come play together so we can all start creating and start building and start brainstorming together," Sofia said.

Roblox has millions of games and allows players to make their own. But it isn't limited to that. In one important component, Bloxburg, players design and "build" their own structures and even towns — right down to the smallest details.

"It's an entire 3-D world down to the doorknob, the light switch, the controls," said Chris LaBarbera.

He estimated that his daughter, now 12, has logged about 9,000 hours of computer-aided design experience.

For kids like Sofia, this could lay the groundwork for a career in engineering, architecture or some related field.

Her dad hopes professionals recognize the potential in this.

"Our goal is to get various homebuilders and major building companies to sponsor some of these kids," he said. Sponsorships could fund hardware or in-game currency that would help the young participants better develop their skills.


At the same time, Chris LaBarbera hopes other communities will be inspired to form their own clubs, and that competitions could then be held.

## County memorial garden offers 'peaceful oasis' for victims

The courtyard at the Richard O. Watson Judicial Center will carry special meaning for many moving forward after the St. Johns County Memorial Garden was christened with a ribbon-cutting ceremony April 29.

The garden sits in the middle of the center's courtyard and is meant to be a place to honor victims and survivors of violence.

"For the last 20 or 30 years, victim's rights and the concern and support for victims has grown with both visibility and in their support network," St. Johns County Clerk of Court and County Comptroller Brandon Patty said. "This is an extension of that."

According to Patty, the initial victim's garden was established about a decade ago. It sat outside the courthouse walls in front of the south entrance.

However, the time was right for the garden to be upgraded and the project to move the garden inside the courthouse walls and featured in the courtyard was in the works for the past year.

Patty believes that the move will bring

the proper attention to the garden that he believes it deserves.

"It (initial garden) was in a place that made maintenance fairly difficult, and it was often overlooked," Patty said. "A victim's garden should be kept in pristine conditions or as close to it as possible. Within one of my first few months here, one of my clerks mentioned it to me and we looked into it."

A steering committee was formed to help oversee the process and Patty hopes that the committee will continue to help maintain and upgrade the garden moving forward.

"It's all about continuing to make sure that those that have suffered at the hands of another have a place and an opportunity to reflect and pause," Patty said. "The courthouse is inherently a stressful place, but this garden will hopefully provide a peaceful oasis."

The original garden and monument were created and dedicated to the memory of two members of the St. Johns County community, Stephanie "Theresa" Singleton-Gilliam and Laura Messina, both of whom died as a result of domestic violence.

Singleton-Gilliam worked as a member of the clerk of court's office.

According to the clerk of court's office, about 10 million people become victims of domestic violence each year, which equates to around 20 people every minute. Last year, 279 domestic violence injunctions were filed in St. Johns County and nearly 72,000 were processed statewide. Retired Judge John Alexander spoke about the hard times domestic violence can bring to an entire family and how he has seen such behavior be passed down to the children of the families dealing with such aggression.

"The dysfunction it causes from generation to generation," Alexander said.
"Let us remember the victims and try to make our world a better place."

## Probate, guardianship meetings benefit stakeholders

Participants keep up with evolving law

In life, only one thing is certain – aside from taxes, of course.

That's why, except in rare circumstances, we'll all have to engage at some point in the probate process.

Less common, though perhaps more often than many would suspect, is the need to become involved in guardianship. It's something people don't often see coming and one that can sow division in families and impose burdens on its members.



Inasmuch as the settlement of these two issues is determined in the courts, it is to the benefit of all involved that those charged with ensuring correct outcomes educate themselves on the many parts of the process and keep abreast of changes in the law, whether they come through legislation or judicial precedent.

To that end, Judge Kenneth J. Janesk, county Clerk of Courts and Comptroller Brandon Patty, dozens of attorneys, professional guardians and others have begun to meet quarterly to share information. The effort mirrors what some bar

associations do in larger metropolitan areas.

The idea began with board-certified tax attorney Tance Roberts, widely recognized as an authority on guardianship and probate. Roberts approached Janesk, who began his term in January 2021, and suggested the creation of such a group. Janesk, whose background had been criminal law, saw the wisdom of the proposal.

"I loved the idea," he said. "I said, 'Let's do it. I could be your best student.' Tance has been doing it for a lifetime; I've been doing it for a year. So, why would we not? Definitely her brainchild."

The initiative has proven to be a success. About 50 to 60 people attend each meeting, some in person, others via Zoom.

At a recent meeting, the guest speaker was an officer with the U.S. Navy Judge Advocate General's Corps — JAG — who was able to introduce attendees to

## Prayers, Parenting and Ponte Vedra Cross Country

Our son was stillborn. The terror of that day is burnt into my memory like a scar. There were complications and then an emergency c-section. Alexander emerged a sort of greenish blue.

In that moment before the hospital staff flew into a frenzy of action, I said something I have always regretted. "I didn't expect him to look like that." Even as the words left my lips, I realized how foolish they sounded and how true they were.

The hospital staff rushed our newborn son out a backdoor into a secret room. Earlier, a young nursing student had taken my phone and promised to take pictures as if that were a normal thing to do. Now, she walked over and slid the phone into the breast pocket of my scrubs and walked away without a word.

I did not know scrubs had breast pockets. I certainly was unaware that mine did until that moment. I even wondered if that was what the pocket was for, to hold the cell phone of grieving fathers.

And then my wife and I were alone in the operating room with our worst fears. We prayed. We prayed for the doctors and nurses, but also very specifically for our son to keep fighting and not quit. A few minutes later someone came in and announced he was alive.

We were not out of the woods, but little by little, day by day, our son got stronger. Fifteen years passed, and Alexander was headed to high school. My wife wanted him to participate in a sport. One day she suggested cross country. Other parents said great things about the coaches, and there were no cuts for freshmen.

The day of the first meet we were uncertain what to expect. We waited at the finish line. The flood of runners slowed to a trickle. And then we were alone again at a different sort of finish line. We prayed. We prayed for our son to keep fighting and not quit.

And then emerging from a haze of dust raised by a thousand pounding feet came Alexander. Most kids acknowledge the

finish. Some throw their arms up as they cross the line. Some sprint the final yards. Some collapse in a panting heap. Alexander did none of these things. His pace neither quickened as he approached the finish nor slowed once he passed. He just kept plodding along toward the comfort of the team tent.

Little by little, day by day, we watched our son grow stronger and faster. Every morning he went to school early for practice. He seemed to like it.

We started to love getting up early on Saturday morning to head to the meets. Everyone in the PVXC community was so encouraging and positive. It was like a big family built around the idea that the goal was not so much to win as to get better.

Then one day, at a place prophetically called "New World," something amazing happened. His teammates had gathered to cheer our son on as he finished the race, and as the minutes passed, they sought

me out asking where he was. He had finished several minutes earlier, smashing his personal best. He ran even faster at JV Championships. In all, he would improve his time by 11 minutes over the course of the season.

There is something magical going on at Ponte Vedra High School. The very notion that you can get a busload of over 100 kids, daily assaulted by a plethora of electronic stimuli, to get up before dawn in order run through the reclaimed swamps of Florida is astounding. But getting them to love it? That's a miracle.

As the season went on, I couldn't help but think to myself, "This is the stuff that champions are made of. This is the stuff of legends." I shared that thought with some of the coaches. I told them there was a state championship in their future. And like that day in the hospital, my words now seem a little foolish. That very year, they won their first. The Ponte Vedra Girls team won the state title. The secret of the girl's success according to head coach Rob Circelli is that "they work together, for each other."

Ponte Vedra Cross Country changed our son's life. It gave him a sense of place and purpose in a confusing world. The running is great. The life lessons are priceless. It can change your son or daughter's life also. All they have to do is commit to running the good race.

an aspect of guardianship they may not have considered.

"If you're not a veteran, or you don't know the military, you may not know what services are available for your client," said Janesk. "I'm not saying everyone left that meeting as a military law expert, but at least everyone left there with the knowledge of: I'd better ask if they're a veteran. And if they are, I know who I can call with questions now."

Probate and guardianship are areas of the law that grant judges a degree of discretion, though perhaps less so with the former than the latter.

In probate, the judge normally relies upon the deceased person's will. Should they die intestate, however, the law determines how assets are handled.

Guardianship can prove more challenging, even though there is a process for handling these cases, as well.

In a guardianship case, a claim is made that someone is unable to manage their own affairs. The stakes are high because, if the claim is borne out, the person stands to lose his or her civil liberties. It's a responsibility that Janesk takes seriously.

"They have their right to contract removed from them; they have their right to marry potentially removed from them; the right to even pick who you socialize with can be removed," said Roberts. "The right to vote, the right to make your health and medical decisions for yourself - that's a heavy burden."

A parent may object to their son or daughter limiting their freedom, or they may not even recall designating their child as the guardian should the need

Given what's at stake, it's easy to see why a judge would value input from experts in this area of the law, such as Roberts.

A key participant in these meetings is Brandon Patty, clerk of the circuit court and comptroller for the county. His office serves three main functions: it is an independent partner to the judges, the auditor for the county and the custodian of the official county records. It provides a system of checks and balances and ensures that the integrity of information needed to keep everything working is protected.

"Our entire quality of life, way of life, is built upon accurate records," he said. "If we don't have accurate records that can actually tell you if you own your home, who you're married to ... there are a lot of things that potentially are contingent upon accurate records."

In executing decisions regarding probate or guardianship, such recordkeeping is essential, especially since no one judge could possibly keep tabs on all the details of a given case.

"If I, as an individual, had to watch the timeline of all those cases, as well as all the other cases I have, it would fail,"

said Janesk. "If an attorney doesn't file a document in the right amount of time, I don't have the ability to go look at every case every day. Well, they (Patty's office) make time for it."

The importance of this is obvious when you know that there are currently more than 600 guardianship cases in St. Johns County, a third of which have a financial component to them. And where finances are involved, such cases must be safeguarded against the possibility of mismanagement and fraud.

Much is required from those who participate in probate and guardianship cases, and the sharing of information is a valuable tool to help ensure the best possible outcomes. Janesk hopes that, as this initiative succeeds in the Seventh Judicial Circuit, other jurisdictions will want to do likewise.

"Information is power," Janesk said, "and the more we can learn the better."

## Baptist Health hospitals recognized nationally for obstetric anesthesia care

"We have an experienced team of OB anesthesiologists and OB anesthetists who care for patients in the Labor & Delivery units 24/7. The team follows established, evidence-based protocols and policies, and have the resources to provide care for obstetric emergencies."

Baptist Health's Enhanced Recovery after Delivery program (ERAD) was recognized as one of the reasons for receiving the Center of Excellence designation. The program encourages patients to take an active role in improving their outcomes. ERAD helps reduce anxiety, decrease pain, promotes healing and helps increase energy levels during and after labor. Patients return to normal activities faster and are better able to bond with their babies and go home earlier.

## "Nurses, Nurses and more Nurses"

At the height of the great pandemic, in cities like Boston and San Francisco the cry went out for more nurses. In Philadelphia, the director of public health announced that what the city needed was "nurses, nurses and more nurses."

Despite sounding familiar, this wasn't a recent event. The call for nurses was issued in 1919 in response to America's most deadly pandemic, the Spanish flu. Nurses have always been the frontline troopers in the war against death and disease.

In 1854, England was embroiled in a futile war in the Crimea. Death rates for the wounded were outrageous. Hospital conditions were atrocious. Into this maelstrom of disease stepped the most unlikely of persons. A frail young woman from England named Florence Nightingale, who led 38 other volunteers to the rescue.

Nightingale, considered the first modern nurse, instituted sanitary reforms that reduced death rates in the hospitals from diseases like typhoid, cholera and dysentery. Her solution included simple measures like washing hands and more complex efforts like prefabricated hospitals and cleaning out the sewers. She was known to make rounds late into the night, long after the doctors had retired for the evening. Some soldiers called her "The Lady with the Lamp."

Less than a decade later, war broke out in America. The Civil War is still one of the bloodiest we have ever fought as a country. Early on, an American woman, a former teacher, arrived at the front lines to nurse the soldiers. Sometimes called the "Florence Nightingale of America," Clara Barton and an organization she founded called the Ladies Aid Society ministered to the wounded on both sides and gathered supplies.

Barton was often near the front. So close, that one day a stray bullet tore through her dress and killed a patient she was tending. Following the battle of Cedar Mountain, Barton arrived at a desperately overwhelmed field hospital after midnight with a mountain of supplies. After that, some called her the "Angel of the Battlefield." After the war, Barton headed up a number of relief efforts, including a team that responded to the Yellow Fever epidemic in Florida that ravaged Jacksonville in the 1880s. She also founded the American Red Cross.

Following the attack on Pearl Harbor,



the U.S. military realized they were suffering from a severe lack of nurses. There were under 1,000 in the Army and just over 800 in the Navy. Within six months that number would increase to over 12,000. In all, we would provide free training to 125,000 nurses from 1943 to 1948. Many of those, like Regina Benson, continued their nursing career after the war ended. Later, she would say that

the most rewarding moment of her time as an Army nurse was telling a mother that her son did not die alone.

Nurses' Week runs from May 6th to May 12. The latter date is Florence Nightingale's birthday. She would be 202 years old this year.

## The important role of nursing assistants

Health professionals are often unsung heroes. However, since the arrival of COVID-19, millions of people have had their eyes opened to the crucial role medical providers play in regard to helping patients and their families.

- Proximity: According to Commonwealth Medicine, there are more than 15,000 SNFs in the United States. These facilities care for nearly 1.5 million people. With so many facilities across the country, families can surely find one for a family member in need that's close to home. Routine visits from friends and family can help seniors make a smooth transition to an SNF and reassure relatives that they won't have to travel far and wide each time they want to see their loved ones.

Skilled nursing facilities can help aging adults navigate daily life when they can no longer take care of themselves.



the Blind.



## Tea with Marie owner launches ecommerce and catering

Marie Hope, owner of Tea with Marie & Everything British in Atlantic Beach, has launched the company's ecommerce website to feature an online tea shop including podcasts, videos and blogs discussing tea and British culture.

The website store allows visitors to purchase Hope's own exclusively selected products, including a personal brand of premium teas and an array of themed British gifts. She will also expand her business to include catering and coordinating afternoon tea and high tea events, along with tea etiquette as classic British traditions, among others.

"It is my hope that by engaging with an authentic British experience, the practices will be accessible without anyone ever having to cross the Atlantic," she said. "I love to create and build businesses, and expanding our capabilities is an extension of my former experience in the brick-and-mortar restaurant industry. When I feel a passion for something, there is no way but forward."

Hope's lifelong focus on her native culture is a virtual extension of her childhood, adult life, and former tea shop and restaurant.

"We have now created a virtual place to learn, reminisce and connect with likeminded people, and just generally slow down the pace to enjoy the moment," she said.

Hope was born in the small idyllic town of Clitheroe in Lancashire, England. At the age of 11, she and her parents moved three miles outside of Clitheroe to a small village called Barrow where Hope would walk a mile to the telephone box to call her friends. It was then that she realized that there was much more to life, and at that moment, her cravings for travel and new experiences were realized.

Hope attended Thomas Danby College in Leeds, West Yorkshire, England, to study business and hotel and restaurant management. Shortly after she graduated, an opportunity presented itself to manage a small café in Bermuda. Not knowing where Bermuda was, her wanderlust took over as it sounded exotic and sunny.

In May 1977, she flew to Bermuda where she spent the next seven years building her professional experience and gaining confidence.

She managed a café for three years and then taught culinary arts and restaurant service at the Bermuda Hotel College for the next four years. In 1984, she left Bermuda for a life-changing opportunity in the United States. She continued her passion in the restaurant and culinary industry, this time as the director of the Restaurant School at Walnut Hill College in the Philadelphia area.

After many years, Hope opened a space at a small farmers market in the Philadelphia suburbs of Malvern, Pennsylvania, called A Taste of Britain. During this time, she baked and sold homemade British goods as well as sourced a line of British grocery items that were difficult to find in the United States. Her customers expressed a desire for an authentic British tea shop where they could enjoy afternoon tea, scones and British pastries.

Soon after, Hope opened a tea shop on the Main Line of Philadelphia that blossomed into a popular venue. A Taste of Britain served British-style lunches and full afternoon tea events complete with tea sandwiches, scones and petit fours. Special dinners were held to honor various British holidays, such as the Queen's Birthday, Scottish Burns Night and Candlelight Christmas Afternoon teas served during December.

In time, the menu grew to include a full line of homemade British specialties, and the display shelves overflowed with British china teapots, cups, saucers, tea strainers and various British gift items. Catering services were added that focused on afternoon tea events and were well-liked for bridal and baby showers, sweet 16 gatherings and mother-daughter gatherings.

After 15 years, Hope decided to sell A Taste of Britain and eventually relocated

## Sharks secure place in history with tennis state title

Winning a state title is the epitome for every high school athlete, but what makes the title so special is the ride it takes to get to that point.

For the Ponte Vedra High boys tennis team winning a state title was something they felt confident in since the start of the season, and it came to fruition with them handing over the school's first tennis state championship trophy to athletic director Michael Harrison during a presentation May 2.

"You can't script it any better," Coach Fredo Weiland said. "Winning a state title in Florida is not easy. It will be nice to see that banner up (in the gym)."

Senior Adam Logan battled back from trailing two match points early in a tie-breaker to eventually win his match and secure the title for the Sharks.

"It was definitely stressful, knowing that everything was riding on me, but I just went back to everything I've been working on my whole life and just tried to stick with my gameplan and stay aggressive," Logan said.

It was just as nerve-racking for Logan's teammates as they watched him and rooted him on.

According to fellow senior Andrew Kelley, the group got into a prayer circle at one point.

"We believed in Adam the whole way," junior Ofek Blank said. "We just knew he was going to pull it off."

The victory will always hold a special place in Logan's heart, not only because of the magnitude of the win, but also because his dad passed away earlier in the year.

"I've been playing since I was 6 years

old and my dad was my coach," Logan said. "We learned how to play by watching YouTube together and then going on the court and figuring stuff out. He got me to where I am today, and I just devoted this season to him and wanted to do everything I could to honor him. This is the best way to do it."

Logan is one of five seniors on the roster that will end their high school tennis careers as state champions and go down in history as the group that won the school's first in tennis.

"This is the peak of my high school career," senior Callum Searle said. "It's a pretty awesome feeling, and it's something I'll remember for the rest of my life."

Senior Elias Missa was slotted in as the team's No. 6 player for most of the year and had played in seven matches, mostly in the doubles format.

However, he was thrust into a singles role to fill in for an injured player and stepped up in a big way by not losing a match at states after not playing at districts or regionals.

"Coach texted me and said that I might be playing, so initially it was a big surprise, but I knew I had been ready and was prepared," Missa said. "I just tried to treat it like one of the thousands of matches that we've all played."

Coming off the bench when your name is called is one thing but doing it in the most crucial of moments is another thing all together.

It was obvious to each of the Sharks that the intensity of the state tournament is unlike anything they see during the season, even at the district and regional levels.

"It's a lot more intense and everyone has a chip on their shoulders because its win or go home," sophomore Grant Price said.

One match the specifically stands out for Kelley during the Sharks postseason path was during the regional final against Vanguard, when he found himself down early.

"I got beat pretty bad in the first set, and I haven't had an easy season with some tears in my knee and I've been injured a lot, but I thought to myself at the changeover 'playing like this is not going to get us to our final goal and the state championships,' so I slapped myself in the face and said, 'This is going to change right now,' and I came back and won that match," Kelley said.



## **Ponte Vedra set** for high-powered state semifinal

The Ponte Vedra Sharks are two wins away from a boys lacrosse state championship and will face-off against Winter Park in the state semifinals May 5 at 7 p.m. at Paradise Coast Sports Complex in Naples.

The Sharks (18-3) have taken care of business up to this point and have showed an ability to win with an offensive explosion as they did in victories over Flagler Palm Coast and Nease before leaning on its goaltending and clutch shooting to win an 8-7 barnburner over Lake Mary in the regional final.

Ponte Vedra's semifinal matchup has all the makings of a shootout as both teams have displayed their arsenal of weapons during the postseason.

The Sharks are averaging 15.6 points per game in three games during the state tournament, while the Wildcats (19-2) have averaged 17 points per game.

There was little opposition to the Wildcats in Region 2-2A, and it led to them winning all three of their games by a double-digit margin, including shutting out Windermere to clinch a spot in the final four.

Maddox Johnson leads the Sharks high-powered attack with 56 goals on the season, followed by Will Corbett and Corey Bloss with 30 and 22 goals, respectively.

Corbett has also done an excellent job of facilitating the ball and has a teamhigh 20 assists. However, it is the depth of scoring that

makes the Sharks so dangerous to defend. That depth is evident with eight players with at least 18 goals on the season. Nolan Parlette has been a workhorse for the Sharks in net all season and the

senior and his defensive mates will surely

be up for the challenge once more against the Wildcats' dynamic offense. The Wildcats use a different approach to the Sharks as they do not have the same depth of scoring production but make up for it by having five players who

have scored 30-plus goals. Of those players, senior Lawton Dowdell leads the way for the Wildcats

If the Sharks defeat the Wildcats, they will play for the state championship against the winner of the St. Thomas Aquinas vs. Plant matchup May 7 at 7:30 p.m. in Naples.




