St. Johns County students perform well on 2022 assessments

Students across the state demonstrated performance gains in the final year of the Florida Standards Assessment, with the St. Johns County School District leading the way.

Commissioner of Education Manny Diaz Jr. announced the results Thursday, June 30.

"Every single Florida teacher, student and parent should be proud of the progress we've made over the last year," he said. "As a department, we're looking forward to building on this great work through the many learning initiatives and improvements on the horizon."

Any of that progress going forward will be measured differently, as legislation signed by Gov. Ron DeSantis in March replaces the assessments with progress monitoring.

Educators have long lamented the volume of time devoted to preparing for the assessments, time subtracted from classroom instruction.

"Florida's education focus should be students' growth and how we restore the conversation between parents and teachers in support of students' growth," DeSantis said in 2021 in proposing the change. "In this final step to eradicate Common Core from our assessments, our administration is implementing the lessons learned from progress monitoring both during the state's recovery and from our districts and schools that were already showing how we can better support students reaching their own unique growth goals."

This year, achievement gaps between African-American and White students narrowed on all social studies and science assessments.

African-American students' performance increased by 8% in civics, 4% in U.S. history, 3% in fifth-grade science, 2% in eighth-grade science and 1% in biology 1.

Hispanic students' performance increased by 6% in civics, 3% in U.S. history and 3% in fifth-grade science.

Overall, compared with 2021 results, Florida students' performance increased by 5% in the civics end-of-course exam, 2% in the U.S. history end-of-course exam and 1% in fifth-grade science. Performance remained unchanged for eighth-grade science and decreased by 1% in the biology 1 end-of-course exam.

Here are the results for the St. Johns County School District:

- English Language Arts (grades 3-10): 73% received a passing score. Unchanged from 2021. This is the highest percentage among all Florida school districts.
- Mathematics (grades 3-8): 78% received a passing score, a 1% increase from 2021. This is the highest percentage among all Florida school districts.
- Algebra 1 (grades 6-12): 77% received a passing score, 23% higher than the state average. This is the highest percentage among all Florida school districts.
- Algebra 1 end-of-course exam (grade 12 and lower): 75% received a passing score, a 4% increase from 2021. This is the highest percentage among all Florida school districts.
- Geometry (grades 6-12): 77% received a passing score, 27% higher than the state average. This is the highest percentage among all Florida school districts.
- Science (grade 5): 69% received a passing score, 1% lower than in 2021. Only Nassau County scored higher, with 70%.
- Science and biology 1 end-of-course exam (grade 8): 72% received a passing score, 2% higher than in 2021. This is the highest percentage among all Florida school districts.
- Biology 1 end-of-course exam: 84% received a passing score, 1% lower than in 2021. This is the highest percentage among all Florida school districts.





a passing score, 2% higher than in 2021. Only Lafayette County scored higher, with 96%.

• U.S. history end-of-course exam: 85% received a passing score. Unchanged from 2021. This is the highest percentage among all Florida school districts.

Individual schools

For the spring Algebra 1 assessment, 100% of students at Landrum Middle School, Pine Island Academy and Freedom Crossing Academy received a passing grade. At Landrum, 79% achieved the highest level — equivalent to an A in traditional grading. At Pine Island, 75% achieved the highest level.

At Nease High School, 72% received a passing score. At Ponte Vedra High School, it was 84%. Valley Ridge Academy and Palm Valley Academy both had 98%.

For the spring geometry assessment, 100% of students at a dozen schools received a passing score. They were: Landrum Middle School, Valley Ridge Academy, Freedom Crossing Academy, Palm Valley Academy, Sebastian Middle School, Switzerland Point Middle School, Mill Creek Academy, Gamble Rogers

Middle School, Patriot Oaks Academy, Liberty Pines Academy, Pacetti Bay Middle School and Fruit Cove Middle School.

As a new school, Pine Island Academy did not have any data for this year.

Once again, Landrum led the way, with 95% achieving the highest level. Freedom Crossing Academy was second with 92%

At both Nease and Ponte Vedra high schools, 85% received a passing score.

For the spring biology 1 end-of-course exam, 100% of students at three schools received a passing score. There were: Sebastian, Switzerland Point and Gamble Rogers middle schools.

At Nease High School, 91% received a passing score. At Ponte Vedra High School, it was 92%.

For the spring civics end-of-course exam, 93% of students at Landrum Middle School received a passing grade. At Valley Ridge Academy, it was 94%. Palm Valley Academy: 91%. Pine Island Academy: 93%.

For the spring U.S. history end-of-course assessment, 90% of students at Nease High School received a passing score. At Ponte Vedra High School, it was 94%. In this category, PVHS led the county with 48% achieving the highest level.

Grand opening for a grand facility

Ascension opens new hospital in St. Johns

Ascension St. Vincent's Health Center's new hospital opened in St. Johns County and did so in the grandest way, as the facility hosted the public for a community event and ribbon cutting on site July 1.

The free event was a chance for the public to get acquainted with their new hospital as well as share in some fun family activities while they were there, as games, vendors and mascots from local sports teams were present.

According to Sean McAfee, vice president of nursing with Ascension St. Vincent's, pride was the No. 1 emotion he and the staff at the facility were feeling.

"As a member of St. Johns County, myself, I can't be prouder of this facility," McAfee said.

The hospital hopes to fill a need for the residents in the northwestern region of the county by providing them with another necessary option when medical issues arise.

"This county is the fastest growing county in the United States, so the access was very much needed," McAfee said.

Even prior to the hospital taking its first patient, McAfee had already heard positive feedback from the community, the county's emergency medical services and the police departments that they are partnering with.

The hospital's construction began in December 2020 and that idea was made a reality during the ribbon cutting ceremony July 1.

The structure is 150,000 square feet with 56 in-patient beds, 15 emergency room beds and six operating rooms.

"It really is a state-of-the-art facility, not only in a high-tech perspective,

but when it comes to low tech as well," McAfee said.

An example of the efficiency of even the low-tech aspect of the hospital is with its "medical mall," which greets anyone who first walks in through the main entrance of the building.

This is done by cleaning up the sight lines and helping a person find where they need to go to help speed up their process and make the situation as seamless as possible.

"When you walk in, you can see everywhere you need to go," McAfee

Ponte Vedra Library closed after fire damage

The Ponte Vedra Beach Branch Public Library is closed until further notice due to a maintenance issue caused by the building catching on fire Friday, July 1.

The fire was appeared to be started during a point when severe weather came through the area, but it is unclear how the weather system led to the building eventually catching on fire.

St. Johns County fire and rescue crews were able to extinguish the fire once arriving on scene, and no injuries were reported. An investigation into the incident is underway.

However, the damage occurred has forced the library to be closed until further notice as the situation gets worked out.

According to the St. Johns County Public Library System, all items currently checked out will not be due or accrue fines during the closure period and all holds will be delayed.

All scheduled events and meet-

ings are also cancelled or will need to find a new location in the meantime as a result.

The entire facility is closed to the public, including the book drop.

Be a cactus in a world full of delicate flowers

Summer is here, and it's hot! What plants love hot weather? Succulents! What better way to spend some time

way to spend some time around your home than creat-

ing a succulent garden or planter that needs minimal attention?

Succulents love dry heat and very little water. Sounds like the perfect plants, right? These plants have evolved in climates that are almost unbearable, with rocky terrain and desert landscapes. They retain water in their leaves and stems, thus needing to be watered only occasionally. Due to their unique nature, they also can survive in winter single digit temperatures — amazing!

You can create a succulent garden in the ground, in a planter, or even in a

rock garden.

Some of the most popular varieties are cactus, sedum, purslane, agave, aloe, echeveria and crassula.

Tips on creating a succulent planter:

• Choose a shallow, wide planter


with a drainage system. These plants do not like sitting water.

- Look for a potting soil designated for succulents.
- When purchasing succulents, remember that some varieties need more sun than others. Try to group similar plants together for appropriate care
- Space succulents 1-2 inches apart in the planter; they don't need much room to grow!
- Add fun finishing touches such as marbles, sea glass or rocks around the succulent planter.

said. "The elevators to the patient floors, the cafeteria, a personalized help desk, surgery check-in and even kiosks along the wall if you can register yourself. That is a highly unusual approach in your traditional hospital."

Some of the little things the hospital is doing that they hope goes a long way in

adding to a patient's experience include a "living wall," which is featured as part of the "medical mall" and has live greenery on it that can be touched, and towel art that is a common sight in many of the rooms.

Many of the usual specialties that have become expected from most hospitals will also be offered at the facility, such as orthopedics, neurology and general surgery.

"Really any service line you can imag-


ine, we've got," McAfee said. "From a staffing perspective we really do have strong care teams, but from a personal and Ascension perspective, we really want compassionate people and I think we've been successful and getting that."

Being part of the Ascension outfit of facilities can not only be a helpful tool when sharing resources, but it also played a large role during the developmental phase of the hospital, as they figured out what ideas they could borrow from other hospitals while making it the best fit for St. Johns County.

"We were really fortunate here to have already had built a facility in Clay County not too many years ago and we were really able to learn from that to improve here," McAfee said. "We have some really highly-skilled leaders at the other Ascension facilities here in the Jacksonville market, and it's been a real blessing to have."

Pickleball has certain advantages for seniors

Pickleball is considered the "fastest growing sport in the United States," and there are plenty of reasons why that is

According to Maria Nili, pickleball director at The Yards in Ponte Vedra Beach, one of the main reasons the sport has caught on in recent years is the ability for anyone to play together.

She believes a competitive and fun game of pickleball can be played by a group of people regardless of their ages or experience level.

That separates it from other sports that are perhaps more well-known and is why it has become a popular game among senior citizens.

"The majority of pickleball is played as doubles," Nili said. "You think it's not going to be the workout and require the same fitness as tennis, but when we checked to see how many calories we were burning, it was easily comparable to tennis. It's really crazy when you think about it, because you run a lot less, but it's just a constant movement."

This is what makes it so unique and perfect for seniors. The fact that they can get an excellent workout while not having the same wear and tear on one's body.

Although it looks and feels like tennis, the play is different due to the equipment used.

"They (tennis and pickleball) are very similar, but at the same time they are so different," Nili said. "The ball bounces completely different, and it will need a little bit of adjustment, but I promise you that every single tennis player is ready for the intermediate play right from the start."

Nili speaks from experience, having played tennis all her life and even been around it at the college and professional levels.


Because the ball does not bounce as high and a smaller court and paddles are used, it does not require as much running, but still requires a lot of constant side to side movement, which although still plentiful can be easier on a person's joints and muscles as they age.

Most of the play during a pickleball play takes place within a box in front of the net known as "the kitchen" that is 7 feet in length and 20 feet wide.

However, Nili warns not to let the shorter playing surface ease you into thinking that it is any less of a sport, as the action still comes quick and intense.

Social Security and Medicare financial outlooks improve slightly due to rebounding economy

An economy that is recovering from the pandemic faster than expected means that the Social Security and Medicare trustees are predicting that both programs' trust funds will remain solvent longer than they forecast last year. While this is a shortterm improvement, major difficulties loom unless Congress acts.

Social Security retirement benefits and Medicare Part A benefits are financed primarily through dedicated payroll taxes paid by workers and their employers, with employees and employers splitting the tax equally. Employers pay 6.2% of an employee's income into the Social Security system, and the employee kicks in the same. For Medicare, the amount is 1.45%. Self-employed individuals pay the entire payroll tax. This money is put into trust funds that are used to pay benefits.

The trustees of the Social Security trust fund now predict that if Con-

gress doesn't take action, the fund's balance will reach zero in 2034 one year later than predicted last year. The main reason for the improved outlook is a "stronger-than-expected recovery from the pandemic-induced recession," Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen and Labor Secretary Matt Walsh explained in a statement. The report also stated that the disability insurance trust fund, which pays disability benefits, will not be depleted for 75 years. If disability and Social Security benefits are combined, then the programs would be able to pay full benefits until 2035.

Once the Social Security fund runs out of money, it does not mean that benefits stop altogether. Instead, retirees' benefits would be cut. According to the trustees' projections, the fund's income from payroll taxes would be sufficient to pay retirees 77 percent of their total benefit (or 80 percent if the disability insurance fund is included).

The Medicare trust fund's outlook has also improved slightly. Medicare's Part A hospital insurance fund,

which pays for inpatient hospital services, will be partially depleted in 2028 — two years later than predicted last year. After 2028, the fund will only be able to cover 90 percent of total benefits.

The trustees emphasized that their estimates are very uncertain due to potential changes in the economy. If the country slips into a recession, both programs will suffer.

The trustees recommend that Congress take immediate action to address the problem. Steps lawmakers could take to shore up Social Security include eliminating the cap on income subject to tax. Right now, workers pay Social Security tax only on the first \$147,000 of income (in 2022). That amount can be increased, so that higher-earning workers pay more in taxes. The Social Security tax or the retirement age could also be increased. Fixing Medicare is more complicated, but some possibilities include lowering drug costs and increasing payroll taxes.

Virtual reality helps connect residents with dementia

Ponte Vedra Gardens Alzheimer's Special Care Center is always looking for ways to further open up the streams of communication with their residents and they are now using virtual reality to do so.

Thanks to a partnership with Viva Vita: Live Life, an organization that specializes in delivering virtual reality to senior communities across the country, they have implemented the program for the past six months.

Since it got started, Ponte Vedra Gardens Program Director Jennifer McCormick has seen a difference being made in the people's response to it.

"It's certainly the way of the future," McCormick said. "Especially during COVID, we began trying to find ways to help seniors feel more connected."

According to McCormick, everyone at the facility has some form of dimension, but they can all take part in the virtual reality exercises if they choose to.

The program offers many different types of trips to various locations around the world. Destinations, such as, trips to Cairo, Paris and Ireland, and locales around the U.S.

Not only are these and many other trips available, but new virtual realities are be-

ing added to the selection each month.

"We can specialize the experience based on what the resident's specific personality and cater to what their interests are," McCormick said. "We even have trips to the Louvre and the Mona Lisa for those interested in the arts."

McCormick has seen the virtual reality tend to create an opportunity for residents to connect with those around them that may not have existed before.

She attributes this to the avenues of conversation that it opens up, such as perhaps sparking a memory of a time when they visited the place they just saw in virtual reality, and it gets them wanting to talk about it.

"With dementia, it can be hard for them to express thoughts, but this gives them an outlet," McCormick said. "We've had a lot of success with men. They really seem to enjoy it."

When it comes down to it, virtual reality is just something so fascinating to so many people, even to the point where staff wants to take part in it and they are allowed to, because it allows for the experience to be further shared.

The facility only has two headsets, which each have a screen that goes over the eyes of its user. Having it in a headset

new foods and dishes while traveling, but staying true to certain general dietary principles can keep your immune system strong and healthy and you from getting

- Consume a diet rich in nutrient-dense
- Avoid junk foods, processed foods, sugar and other foods that can tax your immune system.
- Take a high-quality probiotic supplement to help prevent constipation.
- In areas where the local water is questionable, avoid eating anything not thoroughly cooked or veggies washed with tap water as well as ice and foods made with local water (drinks/soups/stews, etc).
- Stay hydrated this is key while traveling but consume only filtered, bottled, boiled or chemically treated water in countries where the water supply may be contaminated with amoebas and other parasites.

Take care of your feet

Foot blisters are a common problem for trekkers, shoppers and sightseers. These blisters can turn the trip of a lifetime into a miserable experience. Blisters are caused by friction from your shoes or clothing rubbing repeatedly against your skin, causing friction burns. Using tape, moleskin, blister block, topical antiperspirants, baby powder and a shoe and boot dryer can all help prevent foot blisters. Having your feet professionally fitted for shoes or boots of proper length, width and volume can also help eliminate possible friction points.

Stretch often

Stretching prevents muscles from tightening and helps keep them flexible and strong while helping to keep back pain at



The importance of screening

As one might expect, the COVID-19 pandemic reduced the number of screenings that we saw exponentially in the local Jacksonville area. With many patients and staff worried about the spread of the virus, patients were staying home and skipping their annual check-ups and other medical appointments. On top of this, elective medical procedures were postponed or halted to prioritize the pandemic's urgent care demands and to limit its exposure and spread to everyone.

We have found that the delay in cancer screenings has caused many cancers to go undetected. My colleagues and I are now diagnosing a higher than average amount of patients with advanced-stage cancers. According to the National Cancer Institute, in 2020 approximately 9.4 million screening tests that would have normally taken place in the United States did not occur. Because of the pandemic, we saw a decrease in screenings and therefore many of our patients are now being diagnosed with cancers that could have been caught and treated earlier if they had come in for their screening. Routine cancer screenings are important for detecting

cancers in their early stages, which can improve treatment success and lead to a higher survival rate.

With the COVID-19 pandemic nearing its end, my colleagues and I are beating the drum for a return to routine screenings in order to reduce the diagnosis of advanced-stage cancers. At ACC, we emphasize the importance of regular screenings so that cancers can be detected early and treated successfully. Breast, colorectal and prostate cancer screenings are among the most successful methods to help detect cancer in its early stages.

Regarding breast cancer screening, traditional mammography is still considered the gold standard for screening.

Traditional mammograms can be performed in combination with breast ultrasound, 3D mammogram, and biopsy if needed.

Contrast-Enhanced Mammography, a cutting-edge technology that permits the evaluation of breast tissue for signs of early breast cancer with a high degree of sensitivity, is also offered at ACC and is an excellent diagnostic option for high-risk patients.

Breast cancer is frequently asymptomatic and undetectable on a physical examuntil the cancer is more advanced. Mam-

mographic screening allows us to detect breast cancer before symptoms arise.

Colorectal cancer screening is another crucial cancer screening that can help detect colorectal cancer in its early stages.

Screening for colorectal cancer often involves a colonoscopy, which can also detect precancerous polyps.

Following a successful colonoscopy, patients may not need a subsequent procedure for up to 10 years.

Other forms of colorectal screening include a fecal occult blood test, sigmoid-oscopy, virtual colonoscopy and DNA stool test.

Prostate cancer screening is one of the quickest and easiest cancer screenings.

Prostate cancer affects one in eight men at some point in their lifetime.

Screening for prostate cancer should begin at age 50 for men who are at average risk, age 45 for men who are at high risk, and age 40 for men at an even higher risk.

The most common prostate cancer screening method is a PSA test, which measures the prostate-specific antigen in your blood.

PSA screening can detect prostate cancer at an early stage when it is still very curable.

Author to speak on using real life experiences in fiction


An award-winning author of eight novels, Judith Erwin is a retired attorney, former freelance writer and devotee of the arts, especially dance.

Rest when you can, know your limits


Exploring new sights and foods



form makes the process much more portable than if it was attached to a larger monitor.

"It is so nice, because I can take it right to their room and they can enjoy it," McCormick said. "It is much more convenient."

Each virtual reality session lasts about 15 to 20 minutes.

However, due to the increasing interest in the program, McCormick says there are plans to get more accessories in the future, including an additional headset and the possibility of adding a large screen where the virtual reality projections the user is seeing can also be viewed by those without a headset.

"I've been here for six years, and they introduced something similar years ago, but it didn't have many options," McCormick said. "I think it will only continue to grow. It's only the beginning."



The Iconography of the Rolex Watch

I wear a Rolex. My Dad wore one. So did my grandfather. My grandfather wore two, one on each wrist. I think, originally, they were set to two different time zones, probably Philadelphia and London. As he got older, neither was set properly most of the time. I think he just liked wearing

I don't wear the watch to tell the time. If I want to know what time it is, I look at my phone. Although, I frankly have a pretty good internal clock. I usually just sort of know what time it is. Reading that last sentence, I think it has deeper meaning. Maybe it does. Anyway, I wear the watch because it makes me feel good.

In 1952, Elizabeth II became Queen of England, beginning her incredibly long reign. Her coronation more than a year later provided a breath of inspiration to a dying Empire. It certainly inspired a group of determined climbers. They

called themselves the 1953 British Mount Everest Expedition. This was the ninth expedition to attempt to summit Mount Everest. The first eight had failed, some disastrously.

The Rolex corporation sent the expedition seven Rolex watches. Later, they would send 13 more. Each member of the party had one. Rolex wanted its watch to be the first at the top of the world. Two Englishman made the first attempt for the party. They ran out of oxygen 300 feet from the top. The second group was a New Zealander named Edmund Hillary and a Nepalese Sherpa named Tenzing

Each man wore a Rolex Oyster Perpetual. Tenzing Norgay now owned two Rolex watches. He had been given a gold one the year before for being part of a Swiss Expedition that came tantalizing close to the summit. The pair reached the summit at 11:30 a.m. on May 29, 1953.

News of their success reached Britain on June 1, the day of Queen Elizabeth's coronation. The press dubbed the news a coronation gift. Elizabeth presented each of the 37 members with a special Coronation Medal with the words "Mount Everest Expedition" engraved along the rim.

Today, it is extremely difficult to buy a Rolex. Like so many other goods, people have been hoarding them. Michael Dudley of Underwood Jewelers, the leading Rolex expert in our area, told me that speculators buy all the Rolexes they can get their hands on in hopes they can sell them later for more. There is speculation in other luxury watches, he explained, but it is not as robust as in the Rolex market. No one knows why. Perhaps it is because Rolexes are iconic, like the people who

"Chuck" Yeager climbed into the cockpit of the Bell X-1 high above the lonely Mojave Desert. The X-1 was a rocket with wings designed to go super-fast. The plane weighed 5,000 pounds but carried 8,000 pounds of rocket fuel that would burn off in two and a half minutes. Yeager climbed into the plane gingerly. Two days earlier he had fallen from a horse and broken two ribs. He did not want anyone to know. On his wrist he wore a Rolex Ovster.

They dropped the X-1 out of the belly of a B-29 bomber at 30,000 feet. Yeager, who shot down 11 Nazi planes in a P-51 Mustang during World War II, then lit the switch for his assault on the sound barrier. Tom Wolfe says that when some people on the ground heard the sonic boom, they thought Yeager was dead. He wasn't. He was hurtling across the heavens at 699 miles per hour, faster than sound, faster than anyone ever.

\$5.4M OK'd for Ponte Vedra Concert Hall 'Balcony Project'

The St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners recently approved \$5.4 million for Ponte Vedra Concert Hall's "Balcony Project" with a unanimous vote of 5-0.

This approval comes at a monumental moment for the St. Johns County Cultural Events Division, which operates Ponte Vedra Concert Hall and The St. Augustine Amphitheatre. The Friends of the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall, a nonprofit advocacy group, was instrumental in representing the community support for this "Balcony Project" alongside the Cultural Events Division.

During the June 21 commissioner meeting, Commissioner Henry Dean moved to "get this transfer done immediately" in order for Ponte Vedra Concert Hall to get started on construction. Shortly after, Commissioner Jeremiah Blocker said he was "happy to make a motion."

The approval of the "Balcony Project" and overall expansion of Ponte Vedra Concert Hall come at a time of extreme competitiveness within the entertainment industry as artists are eager to tour.

"We were ecstatic when we received the news," said Gabriel Pellicer, general manager of the St. Johns County Cultural Events Division. "We look for-

ward to elevating the venue experience for patrons and artists, and ultimately continuing to build upon the success of these past 10 years."

The County Commission approved the "Balcony Project," in part, due to the Cultural Events Division obtaining \$8.9 million in grants from the SBA Shuttered Venues Operators Grant. The grant was established to support the live entertainment industry during uncertain economic conditions caused by the CO-VID-19 pandemic.

Although Ponte Vedra Concert Hall is owned by the county, the "Balcony Project" will have no effect on St. Johns County residents' ad valorem tax dollars. However, the direct economic impact of this project to the county is expected to be positive for years to come

"I am very excited that the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall expansion has received the full support of the Board of County Commissioners for an incredible expansion opportunity," said Blocker. "Combining federal, state and local funding, our community will be the centerpiece of art and entertainment for Northeast Florida. This is an opportunity to enhance the quality of life for residents that we could not miss. Every resident

of St. Johns County will have the opportunity to enjoy a world-class experience at the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall with the leading entertainers on a global stage."

Constructed from the foundation of a Baptist church in 2011, Ponte Vedra Concert Hall has solidified itself as a must-play venue amongst a vast array of artists and hosts up to 140 concerts and events each year.

Ponte Vedra Concert Hall's diverse programming has brought some of the biggest names in live entertainment, including rock-and-roll legends like Graham Nash, Art Garfunkel and Lindsay Buckingham, emerging artists such as country-blues singer Charley Crockett and soulful bass-guitarist Thundercat, as well as renowned comedians like Kathleen Madigan and Rob Schneider.

"The Ponte Vedra Concert Hall is a treasure that improves the quality of life for all Northeast Florida residents and visitors," said Steve Gard, former president of the Friends of the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall. "The completion of this project will fulfill a dream that began more than 10 years ago when the concert hall first opened its doors."

The current plans for Ponte Vedra Concert Hall's balcony include 190 stationary seats, with two rows on each side of the venue, and four rows in the rear. With this expansion, concert hall's seating capacity will increase by 25% from 486 seats to 608.

Additional updates to the venue include enhanced food and beverage points of sale, updated restrooms, staircase, elevator as well as additional gathering spaces for patrons.

The "Balcony Project" will reimagine the existing building to optimize its current structure. Construction of "The Balcony Project" could begin as soon as late 2023. While under construction, Ponte Vedra Concert Hall will pause all programming and events.

What is a HELOC?

Homes symbolize many different things, including an investment in one's future.

Bank of America says a home equity line of credit, often referred to as a HELOC, is a line of credit secured by your home. It is a revolving credit line that can be used for various expenses. The Credit Union of Southern California reports that a HELOC credit line is issued by a lender and has a limit and variable interest rate that is secured by the equity in your home.

A HELOC is similar to a credit card in that they both provide revolving credit. Investopedia says revolving credit is an agreement that permits an account holder to borrow money repeatedly up to a set dollar limit while also repaying a portion of the current balance due in regular payments over time. But unlike credit cards that may have high interest rates, the interest rates of HELOCs often are lower - a significant advantage when paying off large amounts of borrowed money.

Home equity accessed through a HELOC can be a great source of value for future renovations, large purchases such as cars, educational expenses, and alternative debt repayment. The credit limit of a HELOC depends on your credit standing and unpaid debts. It also is determined by the market value of the home and how much you owe on your mortgage. According to Credit Karma,

banks tend to limit the amount borrowed to no more than 85 percent of the appraised value of the home, minus what is owed on

the mortgage. HELOC terms also vary, but they can run for as long as 30

Even though there are many benefits to HELOCs, there is a downside to using a home as collateral. Investopedia says home equity lenders place a second lien on the home (in addition to the first mortgage lien). Defaulting on HELOC payments can result in legal action and a home being repossessed. Another potential pitfall is a lender may reduce or freeze your credit line after missed payments. Even though banks attempt to limit how much can be borrowed through HELOCs to help avoid potentially negative situations, they are not without risk.

Borrowers considering a HELOC have other options, including home equity loans. Homeowners can speak with financial advisors to learn more about their options for maximizing equity in their homes.

Cox featured as Adele Grage artist for July

To have one's artwork on display is a feeling of accomplishment and amazement, and it is something that never gets old for local artist Jim Cox anytime he gets the opportunity to do so.

The Ponte Vedra Beach resident's most recent showing begins July 9 at the Adele Grage Cultural Center located at 716 Ocean Blvd and Seventh Street in Atlantic Beach and will remain on display throughout the rest of the month.

"My art really falls into more of an impressionism type of art," Cox said. "It's not photorealism, but you can look at my art and see what it is."

His impressionist nature can be discovered by looking and taking the time to study his paintings.

"There are elements in my art that are not really abstract, but based on some of the techniques I use, I can take some chaoticlooking things and turn them into something that gives you the impression or ice or snowflakes."

The ideas for his paintings usually come from his past experiences or details he notices in everyday life, including an array of seafood themes.

"All the seafood stuff comes because that was my summer job out of high school and in college," Cox said. "I don't know what it is about food and still lives, but just something that intrigues me about it."

Cox grew up in Baltimore and first discovered his talent and love for art when he was in high

"I was very fortunate to be involved in a high school with a very serious art program," Cox said. "My professor ran it like a college studio, which meant we weren't allowed to paint anything less than 4-feet-by-4-feet. There was nothing on a sketch pad."

To this day, Cox's early training is reflective in his work, because almost all the things he paints are a large scale that are made to hang proudly on a wall.

He pursued his passion for art and as a result got accepted into the arts program at Jacksonville University in August 1974.

Although he would love to paint even more than he has, there has been times when he has gotten away from it due to life situations and getting involved with a career in sales.

However, he has rediscovered his creative juices in recent years, and he's loving every minute of

"This is just an incredible outlet for my peace or mind, wellbeing, whatever you want to call it," Cox said. "It's been real fun."

He spent several years in Orlando in the past and took part in some art shows down there and has done about a dozen shows in his lifetime.

Cox is also a regular at North Beaches Art Walk in Neptune Beach, but because it is an outdoor setting, he only takes his prints there to show on site. As a result, he is really looking forward to presenting his original work during the upcoming

Interacting with the viewers of his artwork is one of the aspects that he enjoys the most.


"I love to have conversations with people one on one, because most people take a look at a piece of art and say whether they like it or not, but there is normally so much more within it," Cox said. "When I have the opportunity to point out some of the things in there, hopefully they'll walk away with a more discerning eye the next time they look at somebody's art and see beyond the initial impression."

He will be holding a reception from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. the opening night and will be there in person to answer any questions.

Local author's volume cited by **International Book Awards**

Ponte Vedra resident Mike Mulhern was recently named a finalist by the International Book Awards for his volume, "The Repentant Racist" (Best Seller Publishing; \$4.95 e-book; \$9.95 paperback; \$19.95 hardback; available from Amazon.com).



The book recounts his evolving racial attitudes as a child growing up in New York and New Jersey in the late '40s and early '50s until the present day.

As a boy, he believed that being

white made him superior to Black people.

"It was the way things were, so they must have been that way for a reason," he adds. "I was the beneficiary and not the victim of this, so why should it have been any concern of mine?"

All that changed when he went to college in the South in Louisiana and Mississippi.

"There, I learned the region specialized in two cottage industries," he said, laughing, "racism and football."

As his contact with Black people grew exponentially compared to what it had been in the North, he was able to witness overt racism firsthand. He characterizes himself as "a New Jersev Yankee in King Cotton's Court," living in the 1960s where racism was the norm, and he was expected to accept it if he wished to be accepted himself.

His interest in history caused him to develop an unusual hobby: driving around - tape recorder in hand - interviewing the reported last-surviving slaves who had been liberated from involuntary servitude by the Civil War.

"None of them escaped a lifestyle of poverty, but they were survivors, hangers-on, making the most of the lives that Southern society at large forced them to lead," he said.

Some of his slave interviews are recounted in the book.

While in Louisiana, he lived in an integrated neighborhood where there was a lot of racial tension. This helped him get over the last vestiges of racism he still had in him.

"I learned that if I wanted to hold all Blacks responsible for the actions of the worst of them, then I had to be willing to own the deeds of people like Adolf Hitler and Vladimir Putin, who, like me, were white," Mulhern said.

In addition to his own personal recollections, Mulhern follows the course of unfolding racial tensions in America starting from colonial times in an effort to show how we got to where we are today.

"With regard to race, America has

been plodding on a course of two steps forward, one step backward during the 157 years that have elapsed since the end of the Civil War," Mulhern said. "Lots of anti-racist measures have been enacted on paper, but these have done little to create change in the human heart. Don't despair! The prospects of hope are as brilliant as the rising sun, and the change that is needed will appear when both Whites and Blacks decide enough is enough and work together to allow that new day to dawn."

Mulhern wrote for The Ponte Vedra Recorder in 1997 and during his tenure at the paper, he won an award from the Florida Press Club for "General Excellence in Sports Writing."




