Panel backs Black history museum in St. **Johns County**



St. Johns County's bid to host the new Florida Museum of Black History received a significant victory Tuesday, May 21, when a state panel voted to recommend it over the two other leading contenders.

The recommendation by the Florida Museum of Black History Task Force, while advancing the county's cause, is not the last word. By July 1, the task force will submit a report to the governor, Senate president, speaker of the House and minority leaders of the Senate and House. A feasibility study will also be undertaken.

Following that, the Legislature will consider legislation to commission, construct, operate and administer the museum.

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
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
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
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Exhibit recalls rabbis' support of MLK

Commemorating the 60th anniversary of St. Augustine's historic segregation protest, The LJD Jewish Family & Community Services (JFCS) is hosting an open gallery day Sunday, June 2, at the Frisch Family Holocaust Memorial Gallery in Jacksonville. Admission is free.

The gallery's "We Could Not Be Silent" exhibit tells the story of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as he aided the local Black community and allies in desegregating properties in St. Augustine in June of 1964 — and how the groups faced intense hostility and violence in response.

Recognizing how the silence surrounding the Holocaust allowed it to happen, former Freedom Rider Rabbi Israel Dresner joined 15 other rabbis to support King in the movement. They were all eventually imprisoned and wrote a moving letter to the Jewish

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community from their jail cell about their experiences, a copy of which is included in the exhibit.

JFCS Holocaust educator Melissa Williams said that, while they've displayed the exhibit for a while now, their usual 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. hours make it more challenging for the general public to visit.

"We want to make it accessible to all," Williams said. "It only made sense to do so during the month it all took place 60 years

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

Tell us a little about yourself and your background.

My name is Sarah DePasquale, and I grew up in New Hampshire, so I'm from up north, but went to high school in Sarasota and college at UF, which is also where I met my husband.

We've moved to Jacksonville and have been here for about 13 years now.

Where did the idea to start Unbridled Bar come from?

Once we moved to Jacksonville, after a while I had just reached the point where I knew I wanted to work for myself and be my own boss.

I had always been a bartender but started branching out and doing wedding photography on the side.

I started to really get into that world and began making connections and getting to know people in the wedding business.

I had seen the horse trailer idea in another market and thought about trying it here in Jacksonville.

So, we bought a horse trailer, and then a second one, and the business got its start.

We got our first trailer in 2019 and were able to serve cocktail drink mixes during COVID, which kept us in business during that time when big events were not taking place.

What goes into turning a horse trailer into a mobile

There's a lot that goes in to make it happen and convert it.

Luckily, I had a really good bar regular that was able to really help in the construction and creation process for the trailer.

I was the first trailer on the market in Jacksonville, which was great but it also meant that it took some time to convince people and venues that the horse trailer mobile bar concept was just what they were looking for.

However, although it took a little bit of convincing, once they realized what we had to offer it really took off from there.

How has the reception been to the idea within the community?

It has been very rewarding, and I've enjoyed the opportunity to partner up with the local community and with organizations for their events.

We have really done a lot with K9s For Warriors and the fundraising events they have. It's always nice to get your name out there some more while also helping out a great cause like that.

We've definitely developed a client base, especially when it comes to the holidays, such as Christmas parties and other events that take place often or annually.

The more events we do also help us spread the word about our business and all that we do.



Tuesday's vote ranking St. Augustine as the top site was 5-4. The two other sites were Eatonville in Orange County and Opa-Locka in Miami-Dade County.

If St. Johns County receives final approval, the museum will be built at the site of the former Florida Memorial College, which was moved to the Nation's Oldest City from Jacksonville in 1918. The college later relocated to Miami in 1965 out of concern for student safety amid racial tensions following passage of the Civil Rights Act.

As set forth in legislation signed May 11, 2023, by Gov. Ron DeSantis, the museum will be a multipurpose facility capable of generating self-sustaining revenues with research and storage facilities, meeting rooms, banquet facilities and a performing arts theater.

In anticipation that the museum may be awarded to St. Johns County, the Board of County Commissioners has approved a motion to approve the draft and negotiation of a purchase-and-sale agreement with Florida Memorial University, which still

owns the property located at the intersection of North Holmes Boulevard and West King Street.

St. Johns County has a rich Black history. Fort Mose was the first free Black settlement in what is now the United States. In fact, the 1738 fort is currently

being reconstructed.

St. Augustine is the only place in Florida where The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was arrested. That happened June 12, 1964, at the Monson Motor Lodge where King asked to be served at the Whites-only restaurant. That incident and demonstrations

by local African-American activists and others have been credited with helping to win passage of the 1964 Civil Rights Act.

St. Johns County, which experienced West African influences by the Gulluh Geechee people, was the site of the first Black Catholic school in Florida and was home to prominent Black leaders, including author Zora Neale Hurston; musician and singer Ray Charles, who attended Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind; Dr. Otis A. Mason, the first African-American to be elected school superintendent in Florida; Capt. Francisco Menendez, former slave and founder of Fort Mose; and Lt. Gen. Ronald L. Bailey, the first African-American to command the 1st Marine Division.

Baseball great Jackie Robinson spoke here on June 16, 1964, at King's urging. James Weldon Johnson, author of the Black National Anthem, was a frequent visitor from Jacksonville; author Langston Hughes spoke here in 1954; and abolitionist Frederick Douglass spoke in St. Augustine in 1889.

Other local sites affiliated with Black history include Butler Beach, the AC-CORD Civil Rights Museum and the Lincolnville Museum and Cultural Center.

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
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Events to mark 60th anniversary of the Civil Rights Act

Sixty years ago, St. Augustine played a pivotal role in passage of the Civil Rights Act. This year, more than a dozen St. Johns County-area cultural organizations have collaborated to present a full month of events and exhibitions to commemorate the Civil Rights Era and celebrate the people who brought positive change to the nation.

Numerous free and ticketed events will be held for the public to learn more about the 1960s demonstrations organized by Dr. Martin Luther King and local activists including Dr. Robert Hayling, along with activities that explore five centuries of Black history in America's oldest city with tours, speakers, film, concerts and new permanent and temporary exhibitions.

Students take stand against tobacco

To the Editor:

The need for youth to speak up and make their voices heard about the issues they care about is as important as ever, which is why one student-led organization in Florida is leading the way in the fight against the tobacco industry and the addictive products that target youth.

Students Working Against Tobacco (SWAT) is a statewide youth organization focused on educating, empowering and mobilizing Florida youth to revolt against and de-glamorize Big Tobacco. As a member of the St. Johns SWAT chapter, I believe SWAT is an important cause more youth should get involved in. SWAT allows my fellow SWAT club members and I the opportunity to share the harmful effects of tobacco products such as cigarettes, vapes and dip through tabling events and tobacco-related observances such as Not A Lab Rat Day and Take Down Tobacco National Day of Action. Despite significant progress over the years, tobacco and e-cigarette use is still prevalent, and the tobacco industry's antics must be stopped. SWAT is working to change the social norms associated with tobacco, including e-cigarettes.

SWAT has been educating and empowering youth and communities since

1998. SWAT has had several successful initiatives throughout the years. "Not a Replacement" was a statewide campaign where thousands of youth reminded tobacco companies that they are unique individuals with the potential to make a positive impact on their community. "Not a Lab Rat" is the current statewide campaign that focuses on the truth behind e-cigarettes and how youth can stop the spread of misinformation. Through such initiatives, SWAT continues to work toward changing the way people think about tobacco, making it less desirable, less acceptable and less accessible.

My reason for joining SWAT was clear. The first time I saw SWAT, Students Working Against Tobacco, a few upperclassmen sat at the table asking people to sign it. Since I already had strong feelings against nicotine, signing the table was a no-brainer. Some time went by, and I saw the table again. At this moment. I realized that I could make a difference as a leader within the club. So, I contacted the club's sponsor, Dr. Bundshuh. She told me I could help become part of the club's leadership the following year. Joining SWAT helped me by being taught how to campaign against the harmful effects of nicotine. We inform our peers that are walking by when we are tabling about the adverse impacts that nicotine has. Fast forward to this year, the club has expanded, and the number of people involved is at an all-time high. Because of this, the club

leaders were fortunate enough to sit down with the St. Johns County School Board chair, Mrs. Beverly Slough. We explained to her how we make a difference as the leaders of SWAT. While there are over 300 active SWAT clubs in Florida and over 4,300 active youth members in Florida, it was remarkable to know that our school drew enough attention to attract the school board chair. Being in SWAT has made me feel like I have made a difference within the school, and the ideologies we represent in our program have made their way across the county.

In our community, the St. Johns SWAT chapter helped make a difference by recruiting youth to join SWAT during eighth grade ramp-up at Creekside High School, attending local events to promote the dangers of youth e-cigarette use, organizing community and beach cleanups and meeting with our St. Johns County School District chair, Mrs. Beverly Slough, to voice support for antitobacco and anti-e-cigarette in school policies, and partnering with our local organization such as Hanley Foundation, EPIC Behavior Health, Prevention Coalition of St. Johns County, St. Johns County Health Department, Tobacco Free St. Johns and National Guard DDRO to bring Red Ribbon Week and Prevention Week to our school. We

were honored to attend regional SWAT club meetings to discuss different ways SWAT students in other counties are promoting SWAT and educating their peers and local community.

There is still work to be done to protect our generation and future generations from the tobacco industry. By working with peers, students can create change that will keep tobacco products out of St. Johns County and improve the health of our family, friends and community. SWAT is open to all Florida youth in sixth-12th grades. There is a SWAT chapter in every county in Florida, and some counties also have clubs in schools and community organizations. In St. Johns, we have two SWAT clubs. One is at St. Augustine High School, and one is at Creekside High School. Next year we are hoping to have five active SWAT clubs during the '24-25 school year.



County hears about alternative housing options

As St. Johns County seeks solutions to its shortage of attainable and affordable housing, the Board of County Commissioners heard from a member of the Affordable Housing Advisory Committee on Tuesday, May 21, regarding "missing middle housing."

Architect Greg Burke spoke on this type of housing, which bridges the gap between single-family homes and large apartment complexes. This includes smaller-scale structures such as duplexes, triplexes, fourplexes, courtyard apartments and townhouses — these representing a common type of housing in America prior to 1940, according to

Euclidean zoning, which separates land use by type — residential, commercial, retail, industrial — has become the standard in America today. It has been blamed for a variety of undesirable consequences. Small businesses have been excluded from residential neighborhoods. People have become more dependent on automobiles, contributing to a rise in

emissions and congestion on the roads. And there have been instances of housing discrimination.

The idea of restoring the "missing middle" supports housing for people within walking distance of work or shopping or, at least, offering access to transit.

Burke gave a slide presentation to show how diverse housing options can fit into existing neighborhoods. He pointed out how these options can make for good

To encourage this type of housing, the county might need to look at modifica-

tions to its zoning, though there is some concern that the state's 2023 Live Local Act, which aims to increase the availability of affordable housing, can override efforts by local officials.

There is little question that St. Johns County has an affordable housing crisis. In April, the median price of a home here hit \$600,000, an 11.4% increase over the previous month and far beyond the ability of working-class families to afford. There is a growing concern that those working in "essential jobs" will no longer be able to live here.

Clerk Patty to be deployed to Middle East

St. Johns County Clerk of the Circuit Court and County Comptroller Brandon J. Patty has been ordered by the U.S. Navy to support overseas contingency operations in the Middle East commencing on Friday, May 24.

"As I finalize preparations for this deployment, I appreciate the warm words of support from Gov. DeSantis in granting my leave of absence," said Patty. "Being called to serve overseas in uniform is an absolute honor and privilege. While I will be serving you in a different capacity for the time being, we will continue meeting our important mission, protecting taxpayer dollars, and seeking opportunities to make your interactions with us easier than before."

Patty received official notification of his selection for an involuntary mobilization in December. In accordance with Florida Statutes, he submitted a leave of absence request to DeSantis, who responded with support and approval.

"Thank you for your service, both as a county officer and as a member of the Armed Services of the United States of America," said DeSantis. "I join your friends and family in looking forward to vour safe return."

Deployment orders are scheduled to run until the end of the year.

In his absence, Patty has appointed a designee to fulfill his responsibilities. The Clerk of Courts senior leadership team will continue to manage their portfolios and divisions while deputy clerks maintain customer service across all court and county functions.

Women's walking club fosters supportive atmosphere

Walking is seen as a way to get exercise, but it can also be a great social tool and a unique way to get to make friends and get to know your community.

That is exactly the approach that Anne-Marie Mitchell had in mind when she started the Ponte Vedra Women's Walking Club about a month ago.

However, she did not know what to expect and although she believed in the idea she is blown away by the following it is creating in just a short period of time.

After just one month, the club's Facebook group page has 400 members, and Mitchell is anxious to see the amount of people it impacts in the future. "It has grown up very quickly, and I didn't even realize the response it would have," Mitchell said. "It has been really touching. What I thought would be just a nice fitness group has already turned into so much more."

One of the major benefits of the Facebook group is that it allows members to share stories and support for each other between planned walks, the conversations and interactions continue even days and weeks after the walk has ended.

As the name implies, women are the focus of the group, and it includes all age groups, from children to senior citizens.

"I had been thinking about starting this group for several months because I feel like a lot of women want a community they can be a part of," Mitchell said. "I saw a lot of running clubs in Jacksonville when I researched, but I know I'm not as ambitious to run and I know a lot of women who don't necessarily want to run but would rather power walk."

The club not only promotes stronger physical health but can also be helpful in improving the mental health of its members.

Mitchell has already met so many women with varying reasons why they chose to come out on the walks and she has found that it does not matter if they are someone who is new to town and just looking to meet people or someone who has lived in the area for a long time but is just looking for new friends or just a different way to network from a business standpoint.

"This has been a cure for a lot of women's loneliness," Mitchell said. "When women come together they are very nurturing, and that's what this club is all about. I believe that is so needed especially in the years since COVID."

Even though Ponte Vedra is in the name, Mitchell wants the club to reach out to any women in the area looking to grow their community of relationships, and that includes fellow beach communities, such as Jacksonville Beach, Atlantic Beach and Neptune Beach.

The walks are held at various locations throughout the area on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays, which gives the members plenty of options to choose from depending on what their schedule looks like that week.

Each walk starts at 9:30 a.m. at that week's designated site. The club's monthly calendar of walk destinations can be found by going to pvwwc.com.

"I even want to do some beach walks in the future," Mitchell said.

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




Upon acceptance into the program, they sign a contract to maintain a 2.5 grade point average, uphold good behavior and attendance and stay drug and crime free. 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World Golf Village survey results presented

At its regular meeting Tuesday, May 21, the St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners heard the results of a public survey regarding uses for the 36.07 acres of property at the core of World Golf Village.

The survey showed strong support for continuance of the IMAX Theater, as well as dining options and highend retail establishments.

In April, the board approved the purchase of the 17,865-square-foot theater, the 32,329-square-foot structure currently housing PGA Tour Productions and the inventory of the World Golf Hall of Fame. The property also includes the lake, common area and parking spaces. The county already owns the 64,113-square-foot Hall of Fame building.

The purchase price is \$5.5 million.

In July 2022, the World Golf Foundation made known its intention to move the Hall of Fame to Pinehurst, North Carolina, its original home. It had been located in St. Johns County since 1998.

As of Dec. 31, 2023, operations had ceased at the Hall of Fame and the building was conveyed to the county. The PGA Tour and World Golf Foundation have requested to lease back the production facility, located at 21 World Golf Place and South Legacy Trail, until March 2025 in order to move those operations to the PGA Tour Global Headquarters in Ponte Vedra.

In anticipation of a purchase and sale agreement, two citizen meetings and the online survey were conducted to solicit public input on how best to use the assets. The survey ran from July through September of last year. The public meetings were held Sept. 27 and 28.

At the May 21 meeting, Brett Wiler, senior director, economic development and strategic planning, for TPMA Inc., a consulting firm, presented the findings.

In all, 4,900 people responded to the survey, 54% living within five miles of the property.

More than half the respondents reported visiting World Golf Village up to 10 times last year, with 14% visiting more than 50 times. Top reasons for these visits were: IMAX Theater, 52%; dining, 50%; and other, 31%.

Asked what they enjoyed about their experience, 71% of respondents checked scenery and ambiance, 41% mentioned convenience and accessibility and 34% selected services, such as retail and restaurant establishments.



When asked for suggestions to improve the World Golf Village experience, 77% of respondents supported an increase in retail and dining options. More than half supported more or better activities.

Asked about the IMAX building, 63% preferred it remain a theater. Regarding the Hall of Fame building, 65% of respondents said they would like to see it used as an entertainment facility. Other high scores went to dining, leisure or recreation and cultural uses, such as a museum. Respondents did not want to see an automobile dealership, industrial facility or luxury apartments there.

The top vote-getter for uses of 21 World Golf Place was professional or corporate offices.

Respondents strongly preferred that the county continue to hold and maintain the 36 acres of parking, drainage, right of ways and submerged lands on South

Legacy Trail.

The survey was not without its critics. One World Golf Village resident said the questions were posed as though to visitors only, rather than including the perspectives of those who live there.

Based upon these findings, TPMA recommended the county retain the IMAX Theater; focus on restaurants and dining; add high-end retail; consider entertainment, leisure, athletics and/or cultural facilities; consider incubation or headquarters for targeted industries identified through the economic development strategic plan; and consider parking access and traffic needs.

The commission agreed to direct staff to bring back an RFQ (request for quotation) seeking proposals and bids from private developers to form a public-private partnership to redevelop and manage the properties.

Generation WOW is a girl-focused program that emphasizes leadership, education and mentorship to uplift girls with the power of the positive and the possible. Generation WOW's programs build future leaders and empower the achievements of young girls.

Recognizing the mission common to both programs, Maya Jones from Jax-THRIVE and Ivey Dionne from Generation WOW combined their efforts to offer this workshop. Refugee girls from Afghanistan paired with high school girls from Ponte Vedra High School and Episcopal School of Jacksonville and spent the Saturday afternoon together.

This event sparked a higher confidence and greater self-esteem of safety in all the Afghan girls in attendance, integrating the two clubs' main ideals. Both Jones and Dionne wish to continue to fuse their clubs to make a lasting impact on the local female, refugee community.







Fiber artist exhibits unique works at First Coast Cultural Center

The First Coast Cultural Center's newest exhibit features the work of textile artist Jessica Pinsky, who is making a name for herself in a medium that deserves greater attention in the art world.

"It's a really, really niche thing," she said during an opening reception Tuesday, May 21. "I like being a big fish in a small pond."

Pinsky makes weavings on a floor loom, but her art goes far beyond producing patterns or even images.

Her work is abstract in a way that invites the viewer to ponder the meaning behind each of the pieces, the details of which are unquestionably intentional. One is immediately struck by bold decisions to allow specific portions to "droop" in contrast to areas of tighter weave. The artist's choices regarding color, material, size and shape add to the overall effect.

Pinsky said the works are very personal.

"They're actually about issues that tend to be really hard to talk about, like difficulty getting pregnant, the crazy time that women have navigating early motherhood and stuff like that," she said. "I think just traditionally women are told that lots of those topics are very taboo, so it's nice to be able to talk about them through art."

Some of her pieces exhibit a greater level of accessibility, such as those in her "Birth Experience" series. The overall effect transcends whatever specifics are personal to the artist and connects with a more universal experience, especially among women.

In the First Coast Cultural Center exhibit, Pinsky is showing large black-and-white works, a series of unique pieces measuring 10-by-10 inches and weavings based upon art originally produced by her children.

For the latter, she selected two of her daughter's paintings to reproduce on the loom.

"I'm fascinated by her because, like kids in general, they just can make so many decisions; they don't secondguess themselves," Pinsky said. "Grownups do that. ... It's awesome to watch her. I'm really inspired by her."

Through a painstaking process, Pinsky was able to make the loom do with yarn what her daughter did in paint. But she laughs when comparing the two processes.

"This painting that took her less than 10 minutes to do took me about four months!" she said.

The black-and-white works were created under a tight schedule. With one week to produce them, she eschewed color to reduce the number of choices and used the same material throughout.

But Pinsky thrives when working within a set of parameters, which she said often leads to big discoveries.

The smaller pieces were created for a show in Cleveland, Ohio, where Pinsky lives and runs a nonprofit, Praxis Fiber Workshop.

Each of the pieces, originally numbering 100, keeps within the same color palette while remaining varied in as many ways as possible.

At the opening on May 21, Pinsky gave a presentation and answered questions from members of the public. At the end, First Coast Cultural Center Executive Director and CEO Donna Guzzo announced that Pinsky's work would soon be exhibited in Aviles, Spain, as part of an art exchange. Aviles and St. Augustine have a sister-city arrangement.

Pinsky's work will be displayed through July 5 at the First Coast Cultural Center, 6000B Sawgrass Village Circle, Ponte Vedra Beach. Admission is free. The center is open 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays.
