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Sharks, Panthers rack up district swim titles

The Ponte Vedra and Nease swim teams battled each other in the pool as bragging rights and district titles were on the line during the District 3-3A Championship which took place at Planet Swim on Oct. 22.

The programs wound up splitting the team district titles and dominated much of the action during the day, as the Sharks' girls team won with 539 points over the 24 events, while the Panthers' boys team took home the top spot after compiling 509 points.

The schools proved to be each other's main competition throughout as the Panthers' girls finished runner-up and so did the Sharks' boys.

On the boys' side, the Panthers showcased why they are the reigning state champions with a strong performance led by district championships by sophomore Luke Zardavets, who racked up four first-place medals at the competition, including a pair of individual wins in the 100-yard butterfly and 100-yard breaststroke.

As if that did not showcase his versatility, he also took home first place medals in the 200-yard freestyle relay and 400-yard freestyle relay.

Just a sophomore, Zardavets has a bright future ahead of him, and he has learned from a talented group of

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








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St. Johns County Clerk offers veterans complimentary services

The St. Johns County Clerk of the Circuit Court and County Comptroller's office will provide complimentary passport and wedding photos, notary services and recording services for DD-214s to veterans, active-duty military, reservists and their dependents Nov. 1 through Nov. 29.

These are important services," said Clerk Designee John Rundgren. "Waiving the standard fees is one small way we can thank and honor our veterans who have served and sacrificed for our freedom and American way of life."

the Clerk's Office are ensuring a permanent digital copy is readily available in case the original is lost or destroyed. DD-214s recorded year-round by the Clerk's Office remain confidential for 62 years after separation.

Veterans can access these free services 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday during the month of November at the Richard O. Watson Judicial Center, 4010 Lewis Speedway, St. Augustine.





Elaine Perry Atkins died on October 17, 2024, in Ponte Vedra, Florida. She was 95 years old. Distinguished by her bright and curious mind, generosity and wry sense of humor, Elaine lived a remarkable life.

Born in Manhattan on July 16, 1929, Elaine was the only child of Terese Carneval and Gray Perry. She grew up in New York and attended Spence and the Gardner School. She earned her bachelor's degree in history from Vassar College in 1950. Vassar infused Elaine with an insatiable appetite for learning.

Elaine married Edwin F. "Ted" Atkins in 1951. Shortly thereafter, Ted began a career in the foreign service that spanned 30 years and included posts in the Middle East, Africa, and Europe. Elaine's natural charm and conviviality proved invaluable on the diplomatic circuit where she helped Ted develop important professional relationships that advanced American interests. Elaine embraced the diverse cultures they encountered, cultivating her interests in history, politics, art, and architecture.

Elaine and Ted shared a deep connection to Nantucket Island. They both summered on the island as children and eventually built a home there. Elaine loved returning each summer and reconnecting with lifelong friends. In her later years, she spent summers in 'Sconset with her children and grandchildren, accompanied by her devoted terrier, Fritz. Elaine was a member of the Nantucket Yacht Club and Sankaty Head Golf Club.

In 1987, Ted and Elaine moved for the final time to Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra, Florida. They were founding members of Sawgrass Country Club. Elaine embraced the last chapter of her life. Elaine volunteered in Florida's Guardian Ad Litem program and received a commendation in 1992 for her fierce and determined child advocacy. She supported the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra and Christ Episcopal Church. She traveled, returning to old haunts like Cairo and Rome, and discovering new places like Prague and London. She was an avid bridge player and occasional golfer. Her every day began with the New York Times and ended with a glass of Dewars.

Elaine was preceded in death by her spouse, Edwin Franklin Atkins. She is survived by her children, Edwin Franklin Atkins, Jr. (Virginia) of Wethersfield, Connecticut; Robert Gray Atkins (Ellen) of Concord, Massachusetts; Katherine Atkins Barrand (Stephen) of Beverly, Massachusetts; William James Stephen Atkins (Kathleen) of Marietta, Georgia; along with 13 grandchildren and 10

Tell me about HydroLight Lounge, where it is located and what it offers.

HydroLight Lounge is a water- and light-therapy wellness lounge offering a range of services: cold plunge, colon hydrotherapy (coming soon!), infrared saunas, light therapy, red light therapy and contrast therapy. We are located in the heart of the Nocatee community.

Your "menu" is really interesting. Tell me a little about that and how you decided to describe your services using drink names as the reference.

After working in advertising for over 20 years, I was ready for a change. While the advertising world has its perks and can be fun, it can also be draining. I had invested so much time and energy into my career and wanted to channel that same drive into something of my

Growing up, my mom was a nutritionist, so health has always been a part of my life. In the last five years, my perspective on health and wellness evolved — not just for myself, but for my family and kids. I started to really re-evaluate everything — what we put into our bodies and what's important for maintaining a balanced mind and body. I had already been incorporating different wellness routines into my life for years, but I began to dive deeper into the research, learning what other beneficial practices were out there.

My background in the spirits and marketing space inspired the type of wellness space I wanted to create something unique that no one else was doing.

What sets your services apart from others? Are there some unique things you offer?

During my career, I worked with a lot of spirits brands, like Jameson Irish Whiskey, and also with musicians, like Kings of Leon. I was surrounded by spirits and music every day, and that's what sparked the idea of giving the wellness space a twist. I didn't want it to feel medical, nor did I want it to be a traditional spa. I wanted to create something unexpected — HydroLight Lounge is where holistic health meets happy hour.

I infused that concept into every detail — from the menu to the design. You'll find song lyrics etched on mirrors, cocktail and music-themed photography throughout the space, and nods to a bar/lounge atmosphere with cocktail names on the menu. Occasionally, we even serve mocktails during our happy

What led to your decision to open this business? Do you have a background that inspired it?

I wanted my wellness business to have a focus, or in advertising terms, "a concept" that everything ties back to. After researching various equipment and modalities in the wellness space, I landed on a focus of water- and light-based therapies.

When I moved here, I realized that colon hydrotherapy (or colonics) was very hard to find in Northeast Florida compared to back north. Gut health is so important, and I knew this was something I had to bring to the area. There are so many people who could benefit from it, and it's rare to find right now.

While some of our services may overlap with other businesses, it's all about the way we offer them and

School Board taxes provide strongest future for St. Johns County

For the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce: Board Chair Orville Dothage and President and CEO Isabelle Renault

The Board of Directors of the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce last week voted to support school board proposals that will continue the half-cent sales tax for 10 years and add a 1-mill increase to property taxes in the county for four years. An earlier Chamber poll indicated that a majority of respondents support the taxes. Voters will decide the outcome with two referendums on the November General Election ballot.

The half-cent sales tax continuation, valued at \$37 million annually, supports capital improvements in the school district, including construction of new schools, maintaining and upgrading technology and implementing critical security systems. The 1-mill increase in property taxes is expected to bring an annual \$58 million in revenue and will enhance salaries and benefits for educators and other staff, allow more investment in student safety and preserve important educational programs, like STEM, art and the successful career academies.

While any new or additional tax increases the potential burden on businesses in St. Johns County, and while raising taxes is not the first choice, we see this as a strategic investment, rather than an expense — an investment in

schools, students and the future of St. Johns County.

State regulations limit school districts' options for

raising revenue, whether for capital outlays like construction and security improvements, which are funded by sales tax, or operational expenses like teacher salaries and instructional materials, which are funded by property taxes. A millage increase to fund those critical operational expenses is the "last lever the school district has to pull," Superintendent Tim Forson said at the Chamber's Economic Development Council Breakfast on Sept. 20, noting that property tax is a vital component of school funding in Florida.

During his presentation, Forson spoke passionately about the importance of strong schools as a function of a

community's high quality of life. Despite St. Johns County's consistently top-ranked status, the school district is currently facing substantial job vacancies and difficulty retaining employees, from teachers to bus drivers, Forson said. Average teacher salary in the county is just \$53,484, making it among the lowest in Northeast Florida, despite the county's higher-than-average cost of living.

St. Johns County is fortunate to have such a strong public school system, and our schools are an economic engine for the county, attracting businesses looking to establish or expand in Northeast Florida. We know that a community with strong schools helps businesses attract employees, creating more opportunities for commercial growth to meet the demands of a larger population.

Our county is fortunate also to be property-rich, with a residential development boom in the last two decades. From 2005 to 2023, the county's population doubled from 160,266 to 320,110 — but with that growth, the number of students grew more significantly, from 23,273 to 51,826. More than doubling the school-age population has put tremendous stress on our schools, but as more people move to the area, revenue raised through property taxes helps alleviate some of that burden.

We understand the concerns about higher property taxes, especially if you're also a commercial property owner

and paying this increased tax on both your home and your business. But the county continues to grow, and the school district expects to add 13,600 students by 2033. Residents and businesses must be prepared to make the investment necessary to maintain the top-ranked schools that drew many of us here and that we've come to expect.

We know that a high-quality education leads to a well-prepared workforce. By investing in education, we will help ensure that students develop the skills they need to succeed in the modern economy, providing a pipeline of capable, qualified future employees. Investing in education also fosters innovation and entrepreneurship. Programs like the career academies in the county's high schools contribute to creating future business leaders and innovators who will drive economic growth and create opportunities in the region, benefiting the broader business commu-

To maintain our growth and our excellent schools, St. Johns County must remain competitive with neighboring counties, most of which have lower cost of living but higher average teacher salaries. Duval, Clay and Nassau counties have all passed millage increases that will help fund teacher salaries; if St. Johns County does not pass the millage increase, the teacher pay gap will continue to widen year over year, increasing the risk of losing excellent teachers to these other school districts.

The school district also invests heavily in student safety and wellness, with St. Johns County sheriff's officers at each school, as well as nurses on staff, which is not typically found in neighboring school districts. Tax revenue supports these critical measures, which contribute to a safer, healthier community — and yet another reason businesses will continue to look to grow in our area.

Ultimately, these tax measures will support our economy and the future success of the business community. Thriving schools contribute to the overall vitality of our county and quality of life. The St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce encourages you to vote in favor of these proposed taxes in November.


Doyle showed her long-distance prowess by also winning gold in the 500-yard freestyle.


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

Two votes, one decision: Investing in the future of St. Johns County Schools

To The Editor:

St. Johns County has been a topperforming school district for the last two

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As the business of public education grows more complex and funding challenges intensify, we must ensure our schools have the tools necessary to meet these challenges. In St. Johns County, two upcoming ballot measures will determine the future of our schools: the extension of the half-cent sales tax and the introduction of an ad valorem property tax option. These two votes represent one critical decision — the decision to invest in the infrastructure and people needed to ensure our children are prepared for the future.

The half-cent sales tax, which is set to expire, has played a vital role in this success. The money generated by this tax has stayed right here in St. Johns County, allowing us — not the state — to decide how best to invest in our schools. As a member of the Sales Tax Citizens Advisory Committee tasked with overseeing how these funds were spent, I can confidently say that taxpayer dollars were used wisely. The promises made to our community were kept: the district built eight new

schools, expanded 11 others, upgraded the roofs on 13 schools, provided new computers for teachers and students at all schools, and made critical security upgrades to schools and buses across the

The extension of the half-cent sales tax will provide the time needed to finish the important building and infrastructure improvements requested by parents and school leaders. The sales tax is a tool to address these critical building needs, but it cannot be used to support the great faculty and staff who are key to our children's success. For that, the district needs an additional tool — the ad valorem property tax — to ensure it can recruit and retain the high-quality staff our students deserve.

That's why both are equally important. The sales tax builds safe schools and the property tax fills them with great people from bus drivers and custodians to teachers and instructional support staff.

Many surrounding districts already have the ad valorem property tax option, and

they use it to increase teacher salaries. Without this option, St. Johns County risks losing talented teachers to those districts. If we want the district to continue attracting and retaining the best educators for our kids, they need the tools to stay competitive.

As a taxpayer and a parent, I understand the importance of accountability for our tax dollars and the life-changing impact our schools have on children. That's why I support both measures. The district has proven it can spend wisely and for the benefit of all students in all parts of the district.

This November, two votes will determine the future of our schools, but the decision is clear. Let's vote yes on both measures to continue investing in the success and future of St. Johns County schools.

The St. Johns County Clerk of the Circuit Court and County Comptroller's office is celebrating six months of successful operations for the Customer Care Call Center. Since its April launch, the call center staff has handled more than 48,000 calls by providing easier access to critical government information and services.

"The Customer Care Call Center plays a key role in improving our office's operational efficiency," said John Rundgren, clerk designee. "By handling a high volume of calls and minimizing wait times, the call center has enhanced our ability to serve residents more quickly and effectively, ensuring they receive timely assistance."

The Customer Care Call Center was designed to streamline communication, improve response times and enhance overall customer satisfaction. By routing calls through live customer clerks assigned to the call center, residents avoid automated phone recordings and receive immediate assistance. This allows deputy clerks to focus on critical functions with direct impacts on life, liberty and property. The uninterrupted focus is vital to maintaining the accuracy of records.

Staffed by five full-time clerks, the Customer Care Call Center offers immediate and knowledgeable support to residents. Since its launch on April 22, the call center has handled 48,778 calls, averaging 7,800 calls per month. The team assists with a range of court-related inquiries as well as recording services like passports and marriage licenses.

Even as Ben & Jerry's ice cream shop opened in Nocatee in September 2020, franchise owners Jessica Shaw and husband Steven Chubbuck were already seeking ways to support their neighbors. Since then, the popular outlet for tasty treats has maintained a commitment to the community.

For the past three years, the shop has partnered with Ponte Vedra High School in a community initiative to provide valuable, real-world job skills to students with learning differences, helping to prepare them for future employment opportunities.

Shaw said the initiative, aptly named Scoop of Inclusion, was inspired by a program her son Aidan had previously taken part in. That program offered him opportunities to work at different places in the area. Shaw watched Aidan grow as a person, with improved confidence

and a realization that he could have a life on his own.

The franchise owners soon realized that they could use their local store in a similar way.

"We're just trying to give these kids the same experience that my son got to have," said Shaw.

Up until this year, student participants mostly cleaned, put the chairs out and got the store ready to open for the day. But this year, the program has expanded so that the students can welcome guests and, with some guidance from experienced staff members, take orders and check customers out on the

"It has always just been a part of my upbringing and faith that has led me to want to use whatever I've been blessed with to help others," Wuerffel said. "And, even if you don't have much, you can always find a way to help."

Well, that graph is now a reality as Desire Street Ministries is headquartered in Atlanta and is reaching neighborhoods throughout the region.

"Our model is that we partner with existing organizations and help them to achieve their plans, and there are so many things we are involved with," Wuerffel said. "A lot have after-school programs and some are even small schools themselves, but we also help organizations that offer affordable housing options and job placement."

He knows the importance of the Florida-Georgia rivalry very well, having won all four times he played in the game, and he enjoys getting to reconnect with so many former players at the event every year.

"I joke that it might be the only win we get this weekend," Wuerffel said.

How a trust helps to transfer wealth to heirs

Talking with clients about the legacy they wish to leave behind is an essential part of my job as a financial adviser. How do they want to share their wealth with loved ones and charities that matter to them? What values do they want to pass down and what financial goals do they want to support for

their children and grandchildren? How can they transfer their assets in a tax-efficient and planful manner? These are some of the many questions we cover in the course of these conversations.

If you find yourself asking similar questions about your own legacy, it may be time to think about whether a trust would make sense for your situation. Read on for a primer on how trusts work and their key benefits.

What is a trust?

In the simplest terms, trusts are legal entities that hold assets for the benefit of another. Trusts have three core components. A grantor is someone who creates and typically funds the trust. A beneficiary is someone who receives benefits from the trust assets, such as income, principal, or the right to use property (like a home). A trustee is someone who holds the legal title and manages the trust assets according to its terms. The trustee can be

the grantor, another person considered qualified to handle trust administration, or an institution, such as a bank.

When the grantor sets up a trust, they specify:

- the intended purpose,
- named beneficiaries and trustees,
- provisions about when and what benefits/distributions each beneficiary will receive,
 - the trustee's duties, and
 - when the trust will end.

Key trust attributes

Trusts might take effect while you're living or upon your death. Here is a brief overview of the most common types of trusts:

Living trusts vs. testamentary trusts

Living trusts, as the name implies, are established and funded during the grantor's lifetime. The assets in a living trust can remain available for the grantor's use and benefit during their lifetime, and usually pass to beneficiaries only after the grantor's passing. Similar to a will, a living trust provides the grantor broad discretion to specify how assets are distributed to the named beneficiaries. For example, a beneficiary may need to reach a specified age before receiving assets from the trust. Because assets held within a living trust typically avoid probate upon the grantor's passing, they may be transferred with less delay and expense. The trust's assets and terms typically remain confidential among beneficiaries, as compared to the public disclosure usually involved with probate.

A testamentary trust is established at your death based on instructions laid out in your will. A trustee is identified who will manage assets on behalf of the trust's beneficiaries. After the will goes through probate, designated

assets are shifted into the trust. The grantor can specify in advance how trust assets should be managed and how they are to be distributed to beneficiaries.

Revocable trusts vs. Irrevocable trusts

Trusts can be revocable or irrevocable. Only trusts that are established during the grantor's lifetime might remain fully revocable. This allows the grantor to alter the trust or even cancel it altogether if desired. While that flexibility can be beneficial, there are no immediate tax advantages and no creditor protection for assets held in the trust.

An irrevocable trust typically limits the grantor from making any meaningful changes to the trust. When established, the grantor often gives up ownership and control of the assets contributed to the trust. While this might involve making a taxable gift, this type of trust can be potentially advantageous from a tax perspective and for protecting assets from creditors. Note that testamentary trusts are generally irrevocable and cannot be changed except in very limited circumstances, such as a court amendment.

Consider trusts in your planning process

Keep in mind that trusts are not just for those with significant wealth. Anybody seeking to preserve assets for children or grandchildren, avoid the expense and delay of probate, maintain greater privacy about their estate or protect assets from creditors may want to explore the advantages trusts can offer. Trusts are complex and there are fees associated with setting them up. Consult an experienced financial adviser and an estate attorney to review your situation and consider whether a trust makes sense

Financial issues to consider before marriage

Married couples face some financial considerations that single individuals simply don't. For example, married couples can file their taxes as married, either jointly or separately, at both the federal and state level. But does simply checking a different box on your tax forms guarantee a better outcome? Not necessarily.

If you both earn roughly the same amount, being married and filing jointly could bump you into a higher tax bracket. On the contrary, if one spouse earns little or no income and the other is the primary wage earner, filing jointly may result in paying less taxes. In other words, by tying the knot, you may wind up owing the IRS more or less than if you remained single. Your tax adviser can help determine the potential outcome for your situation.

Domestic partnerships and civil unions

Although a handful of states recognize domestic partnerships and civil unions, the IRS does not. So, while these designations may offer some of the same rights and responsibilities available to married couples, it's only at a state level and on a state-by-state basis.

Benefits for married couples

Here are a few benefits married couples can enjoy, assuming both spouses are U.S. citizens:

- The ability to transfer an unlimited amount of assets to your spouse, free from federal gift or estate taxes, either during life or at death.
- More tax-planning options upon inheriting your spouse's retirement account.
- The right to open an IRA on your spouse's earnings record, if you are unemployed.

Timing your marriage

If you're thinking about marriage,

choosing a wedding date that accommodates family, friends and employers — not to mention the venue and reception hall — can be a wedding planner's greatest challenge. To complicate matters even more, should you also consider the IRS when selecting a date? Your tax adviser can help you decide, but here are some things to think about:

Your tax filing status is determined on Dec. 31 of each year. For tax purposes, that means even if you wait until the last day of the year to walk down the aisle, the IRS will consider you married for that entire year. If there is a notable disparity between your two incomes, getting married by Dec. 31 could benefit your tax situation. However, if your combined income pushes you into a higher tax bracket, you may want to wait to the following year to marry to avoid a negative impact on your current-year tax bill.

Income isn't the only factor that influences whether marriage could impact your tax situation. Answering questions such as who incurs deductible expenses, who can claim children as dependents and what tax preferences you might qualify for can also help you gauge the potential effects of marriage on your tax situation — and help you determine the best time to exchange vows.

Karadaglić, known as MILOŠ, has appeared as a soloist with other great orchestras including the London and



Junior defensive end Reece Beck continues to find his groove with the Sharks' defense and has popped a lot in recent weeks and that was the case once again.


Beck had three of the Sharks' six sacks on the night and was also credited with two more quarterback hurries, four tackles for a loss and recovered a fumble.
