

President and CEO Monica Hernandez. She credited her team for their work. "I always say my team and I, we leave our hearts on the table each and every single time — every event, every initiative."

Hernandez was also president and CEO during the 2019 recognition.

"I want our members to equally feel as proud to know that the organization that is representing them works really hard to create partnerships with other organizations to benefit the entrepreneur," she said.

One could argue that a spirit of entrepreneurship resides in the character of Hispanic people.

"It is in our blood," Hernandez said. "It is how we were raised. To open a business, to work hard and provide for our families, to plant roots and be successful."

The FCHCC was founded in 1992. It serves St. Johns, Duval, Clay, Nassau and Baker counties. It fulfills its mission through education, networking, connections and elevation of Hispanic businesses and culture. It currently has nearly 200 members.

Membership is open not only to businesses that are Hispanic-owned. A growing Hispanic population benefits any business seeking a growing customer base.

"If you are a business owner looking to tap into the Hispanic community, we can help with that," said Hernandez.

The FCHCC provides workshops, networking opportunities and all-day conferences that focus on its core mission.

Recently, it conducted a conference titled Hello, Entrepreneur — Hola, Emprende — that featured panel discussions, presentations and speakers. Among the latter were representatives of the Small Business Association, and Jessie Ball duPont Fund, Bank of America, Wells Fargo, the Community Foundation and more.

The financial component was critical as minority entrepreneurs often face obstacles when seeking capital.

"So, we [FCHCC] work furiously finding ways of creating that connection, of making sure that, as entrepreneurs, they understand the various options available for capital," said Hernandez.

For instance, funding may be available through grants, alternative types of loans or Community Development Financial Institutions.

The FCHCC also conducts monthly networking events featuring a variety of speakers.

Next on the horizon, the FCHCC is planning its fifth annual Excellence in Business Awards — Talentos Hispanos. Six awards will be presented: Rising Star Award, Up & Coming Business Award, Business Leader of the Year, Small Business of the Year, Corporate Business of the Year and a Business of the Year Award for a woman-owned business.

The event will be held from 6 to 9 p.m. Dec. 13 at WJCT Studios, 100 Festival Park Ave., Jacksonville. Ticket prices are: \$125 each for FCHCC members, \$150 for non-members and guests. A special ticket sale is planned for Black Friday.

"If you are going to go, buy your tickets on Black Friday as they are going to be discounted," Hernandez recommended.



New technology is changing the autism detection process

Hope Haven, a leader in developmental and educational services for children, is now the only provider in Northeast Florida to offer groundbreaking Earli-Point Autism technology, which is a new diagnostic tool designed for early detection of autism in young children.

According to Dr. Alison Cato at Hope Haven, the staff was given training pertaining to the new technology in May and it is now an offered tool.

EarliPoint uses advanced eye-tracking technology and state-of-the-art algorithms to identify early social and communicative patterns associated with autism, enabling diagnoses as early as 16 months old.

By incorporating EarliPoint, Hope Haven is transforming early autism care in the region.

This technology allows clinicians to observe a child's visual tracking and responses to social cues, analyzing how the child engages with social stimuli.

The system generates insights about a child's social development that traditional

methods might miss.

"What captures their attention could be another child's face (in the video), but for a child with autism they may be more interested in objects or movement in the scene instead of the human interactions,"

Another aspect that differs with the new technology is that the test only takes

12 minutes compared to the 45 minutes to an hour a typical evaluation takes, where a doctor evaluates how a child interacts with toys, looking for repetitive tendencies in their play and then using their clinical judgment.

For children with autism, this means access to earlier diagnoses, paving the way for timely interventions that can

significantly enhance social and cognitive development.

"Research consistently shows that early intervention can make a remarkable difference in the lives of children with autism," said Stella Johnson, Hope Haven CEO. "With EarliPoint, we are able to provide earlier diagnoses and tailored support, which is critical during these formative years."

For the families served by Hope Haven, the availability of EarliPoint brings new hope and confidence.

"Families are relieved to hear about the technology because before they may have been on a waiting list for longer," Cato said. "To our knowledge, we're the first to adopt this technology in Florida, and we're excited to see how it can be even further used."

According to Cato, the diagnosis of autism can also be important in leading to helping with the access to additional resources and the costs associated with it.

Hope Haven's commitment to delivering cutting-edge tools like EarliPoint reflects its broader mission to ensure that every child can reach their full potential.

Tell us a little about yourself and your background.

I grew up in Jacksonville and then went away to Florida State for college before coming back and working in youth and family services for my entire career.

I went to college on the law school path, as from the time I was five years old I thought I was going to be an attorney.


But then I took a psychology class and did some internships with juvenile justice and worked at a Boys and Girls Club in Jacksonville, and I never looked back from there.

We start working with children as young as 16 months old and also help young adults get a job and anything else in between.





American hero remembered at gathering

Members of the Allen D. Nease NJROTC had the honor and privilege of presenting the family of John L. Patton with an American flag for his service to our country. Mr. Patton, a 101-year-old Navy veteran, passed away on Oct. 19, 2024. He left behind a shining legacy of service, surviving some of the most momentous battles in the Pacific Theater during WWII. The Patton family and friends have committed to a \$1,000 scholarship to be given to a deserving Nease cadet annually in honor of Mr. Patton.







Holiday heart syndrome: Protect your heart this season

The holidays are a time to celebrate with family and friends, but all that cheer can sometimes be hard on your heart. Rich meals, busy schedules and alcohol consumption contribute to a spike in cardiac emergencies during this time of year. A study in the British Medical Journal shows the weeks between Christmas and New Year's are especially high-risk, with heart attacks peaking on Christmas Eve.

One issue to watch out for is "holiday heart syndrome," which often shows up after moderate to heavy alcohol consumption and can lead to an abrupt onset of atrial fibrillation (AFib). It can cause symptoms like a racing heartbeat, shortness of breath and even fainting. While these episodes sometimes resolve on their own, they can still be frightening and dangerous. Knowing the risks and taking simple steps to protect your heart can help you fully enjoy the season — and many more to come.

Listen to Your Body and Don't Delay

This season, it's more important than ever to pay attention to how you're feeling. Symptoms like chest pain, discomfort in your arms or jaw, nausea or lightheadedness can all signal a heart attack

or other emergency. The sooner you seek help, the better your outcome is likely to be. Remember: putting off care to avoid disrupting holiday plans isn't worth the risk. If you think you're having a heart attack, call 911 immediately.

Keep Up with Your Medications

Between holiday travel, closures and the hectic nature of the season, it's easy to lose track of your medications. However, skipping doses or running out can be dangerous, especially if you have a heart condition. Make sure your prescriptions are refilled before pharmacies close and set a reminder to take them as prescribed. This small step can make a big difference in keeping your heart healthy.

Skip the Extra Round of Drinks

Holiday parties and family gatherings often mean raising a glass, but too much alcohol can lead to a sudden episode of holiday heart syndrome or worse. Binge drinking, which is more than five drinks in two hours for men or four for women, raises your blood pressure and disrupts your heart rhythm.

Even moderate drinking can increase your risk of heart-related events for days afterward. For the best heart health, limit alcohol to no more than one drink per day. If you're thinking about skipping alcohol altogether, your heart will thank you. More and more studies suggest that minimizing alcohol is important for optimal sleep and cardiovascular health. Over the long term, habitual drinking of more than five alcoholic beverages per week

may have the potential for adverse health consequences.

Take a Moment to Breathe

Let's face it: the holidays are stressful. From shopping to cooking to entertaining guests, it's easy to feel overwhelmed. Unfortunately, all that stress can take a toll on your heart by raising your blood pressure and triggering your body's fightor-flight response.

Make it a point to carve out time for yourself. A brisk walk, a quiet moment with a cup of tea, or even some deep breaths can go a long way in keeping your stress levels — and your heart — in



O TAKE CARE OF YOUR SKI

As the body's largest organ, skin is of the utmost importance to overall health. The skin protects against germs, regulates body temperature and enables tactile sensations, says the Cleveland Clinic. Despite those vital functions, skin is easily overlooked in health care regimens.

Even though the skin is susceptible to aging just like every other part of the body, there are steps everyone can take to maintain healthy skin throughout their lifetimes. Dermatologists, including those from the American Academy of Dermatology, share tips on how to care for and protect the skin so it looks beautiful and functions properly.

- Use sun protection. One of the key ways to care for the skin is to protect it from the sun. Over time, sun exposure can cause age spots, wrinkles and elevate the risk for skin cancer. Always use a broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher. Apply generously and be sure to reapply every two hours or more if you will be swimming
- Stay away from tanning beds. People mistakenly think that using tanning beds is safer than sitting out in the sun. However, tanning beds emit harmful UV radiation that



can cause skin cancer just like the sun. The AAD says one indoor tanning session can increase the risk of developing melanoma by 20 percent. Use self-tanning products instead for a golden glow.

• Quit smoking or never begin. Smoking makes the skin look older and contributes to wrinkles. Smoking narrows the tiny blood vessels in the outermost layers of the skin, decreasing blood flow to the skin and making the skin more pale, says the Mayo

Clinic. Smoking also depletes oxygen in the skin and can damage collagen and elastin, the fibers that give skin its elasticity and strength.

• Avoid an overload of products. Many dermatologists suggest their patients stick to the basics daily, which includes a mild cleanser, moisturizer and sunscreen. Drinking plenty of water also helps the skin. Exfoliating the skin once a week can help remove dead skin cells, but don't overdo it,

which can lead to excess oil production and

- · Select the right products for your skin type. Choose products that pertain to your skin type, which may be sensitive, normal, dry, oily, or a combination thereof.
- Don't forget the lips. Many people treat their entire faces but then do not address the skin on their lips. Skin cancer can form on the lips, so use a lip balm that has an SPF of 30 or higher. Petroleum jelly can add moisture to the lips if they feel dry.
- Visit a dermatologist. A dermatologist is an expert in many conditions of the skin, hair and nails. He or she can perform an annual examination to look at the entire body and determine the health of skin, and identify any moles or spots that may be of
- Check your own skin. People are advised to pay attention to their skin and look regularly for new spots; spots that are different from other spots on the body; moles that itch, bleed or change color; and any other things that seem not quite right.

Taking care of the skin throughout the years can help a person look and feel his or



3 short-term fitness goals that can lead to long-term success

Fitness-based New Year's resolutions are popular every year, but people who aspire to make such changes recognize how difficult it can be to achieve them. In fact, the Forbes Health/One Poll survey found that roughly 44 percent of respondents indicated their resolutions flamed out at the two- or three-month marker.

term fitness goals is to establish monthly minimum exercise sessions. Individuals accustomed to a sedentary lifestyle can resolve to exercise three days per week in the first month of their resolution, and then increase that by a day in the second month. A consistent schedule when designing this goal is imperative, which is why it can make more sense to plan for three days per week as opposed to 12 days per month.

3. Resolve to walk a mile per day. Walking is an accessible cardiovascular activity that can have a profound effect on overall health. Walking also can help condition sedentary individuals' bodies for more strenuous activity, which is a transition

many people aspire to make when setting long-term fitness goals. A daily one-mile walk won't require a significant commitment of time, but it can help acclimate the body to routine exercise. As the effects of a daily walk begin to take hold, individuals may find it easier to engage in more strenuous physical activities, making this an ideal stepping stone on the way to achieving long-term fitness goals.

Short-term goals can help people remain motivated as they pursue more substantial goals that take longer to achieve. Such an approach can be especially useful for individuals resolving to improve their physical fitness at the start of a new year.

DAILY DENTAL HYGIENE TIPS FOR OPTIMAL ORAL HEALTH

Dental health is an important component of daily life. Although clean teeth and gums make for a healthy mouth, oral health also is tied to general health throughout the body. Guardian Insurance indicates that, if left unaddressed, bacteria in the mouth can multiply and spread elsewhere through the bloodstream. Gum disease has been linked to diabetes, respiratory ailments, heart disease, and even Alzheimer's disease. As a result, it is essential to maintain proper dental hygiene. Best practices for maintaining healthy teeth and gums involve various

techniques. Here's how to brush up on maintaining a healthy mouth.

- Brush at least twice per day. Utilizing toothpaste and a soft-bristled toothbrush, be sure to brush teeth each morning and night. Be sure to brush all tooth surfaces, including the backs and the sides. Brushing after every meal also can be done to keep teeth even cleaner.
- Brush correctly. Position the toothbrush at a 45-degree angle toward the gums. This will help sweep away plaque and bacteria

at the gum line, according to the Cleveland Clinic. Do not use a medium- or hard-bristled brush, which can damage the gums and tooth enamel. Move the toothbrush in gentle, circular motions to remove plaque.

- Don't neglect your tongue. Bacteria also can build up on the tongue, leading to bad mouth odor and additional oral health problems. Gently brush the tongue along with the teeth.
 - Use toothpaste with fluoride. Fluoride has come under scrutiny due to its potential effects on overall
