ana Stallings, a seasoned Jacksonville entrepreneur, owns a Kilwins store in the St. Johns Town Center and is preparing to open her second location in St. Johns County.

Tell me about vour background.

I've lived in Jacksonville for a little over 30 years. We moved here because my husband was in the Navy, and we raised both of our children here, who now have children of their own. I've kind of been an entrepreneur all my life. I owned and operated a children's daycare center for over 20 years, and in the midst of that I realized that I wanted to do something different, which is when I opened my first Kilwins. And now you own two Kilwins locations. Tell me about your new store.

Yes! Two months ago we opened a second Kilwins location on County Road 210, in St. Johns, and it's the first Kilwins with a drive-through, the first standalone location. It's been a big adventure for us because at first the franchise didn't really believe in doing a drive-through, but we thought: Why not? Everybody wants to stay in their cars and use a drive-through.

It's all new to us; even though a drive-through isn't new to most people, it's new to our Kilwins family. It's proved to be a great destination. It's just so fun to have the area.

How is your new location unique?

This new store is twice the size of our Town Center location. It has indoor and outdoor seating. which is just awesome. There aren't very many days that it's a perfect day to sit outside and eat ice cream, right? This location, because it's twice as big, it's just easier to see all the products, and thanks to all the windows it's

very bright inside!

What do you like the best about what you do?

I've always loved food, baking and cooking. It's just fun because people come in and they're excited. It's a place where you create memories with families. They come in because they want a sweet treat, or it's somebody's birthday, or there's a celebration. In the new location, we see so many grandparents bring in their grandchildren. We just love seeing them sit at the table.

Spanish Polonial home COASTAL GEM

his exquisite Spanish Colonial jewel is partially surrounded by an ancient oak forest. It is situated 30 feet above the ocean on one of the highest dunes in the area and straddles two lots, giving it 320 feet of beach frontage and some of the most magnificent views on the Northeast Florida coast. As you walk toward the ground floor bedrooms there is a library/study with another woodburning fireplace bordered with decorative Portuguese tile. The complete interior of this room is lined with custom fabricated maple cabinetry and shelving. And high on the wall facing east there is a small stained-glass window, giving the room a splash of color from the outside morning sun.

There is also a master bedroom suite and two guest bedrooms downstairs, all with custom-designed Italian tile floors and showers in their respective bathrooms. There are two more bedrooms upstairs, both with balconies and panoramic ocean views. Both share a double bathroom with separate showers and custom Italian tile work. Finally, there is a modern kitchen with Sub Zero refrigerator and other modern appliances along with a kitchen dining area and informal bar seating.

WINNERS ON THE FIELD, LIFE MAKE UP HALL OF FAME CLASS

he Georgia-Florida Hall of Fame inducted its 2024 class on Nov. 1, and the group can probably best be described as "winners."

Fred Weary and Mike Peterson were introduced as the Florida Gators' inductees, and both were teammates on defense when the Gators won the school's first national championship in 1996.

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Weary set a school record of 15 career interceptions and looked back on his first appearance in a game and how he inserted himself onto the field and wound up never losing his starting spot from then on.

"We ended up losing the game, but I ended up getting SEC defensive player of the week," Weary said. "It was thanks to the confidence that I had, and I knew if I could just show them what I was doing in practice, I could also do it in the game. If you all have confidence in what you're doing, I want you to please put your mind on it and go do it, because without that self-confidence I had, I wouldn't be up here today."

Peterson had Jacksonville ties from the time he spent in the NFL as a member with the Jaguars, and even had one of his former Jaguars' teammates Marcus Stroud in attendance, which he made sure to mention during his acceptance speech with Stroud having played at Georgia.

"We all know Marcus likes to talk a lot, he's a big d-lineman, and they always seem to like to talk," Peterson chuckled. "But I figured out a trick if you want to get a former Georgia player to quit talking, just ask them what's your record against the Gators? By the way, I'm 3-1 (against Georgia)."

However, Peterson was not the only one with Jacksonville close to his heart among this year's inductees, as Jacksonville native and Bolles School graduate Mike Fisher represented the Bulldogs.

The defensive back is best known for being a member of the famed "Junkyard Dogs" defense at Georgia and for sealing the 1980 national championship with a late interception in the Sugar Bowl against Notre Dame.

Bill Goldberg was the second Georgia representative in this vear's class and is also a member of the WWE Hall of Fame after a career in professional wrestling and is an actor.

He played defensive tackle for the Bulldogs and went 3-1 against the Gators in the late '80s.

"I'm a defensive lineman, not a wrestler or an actor, or a commentator, and I will be one until the day I die," Goldberg said. "I'm appreciative of that, proud of that, and thankful for that. I made it a mission of mine through all my exploits to try and set an example not just for kids, but for little Jewish kids to know that they could break the stereotype. That's the great thing about football, it doesn't matter who you or where you come from, it just matters who's next to you and who you represent."

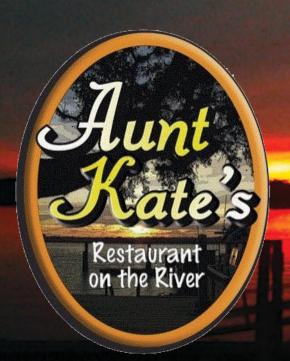

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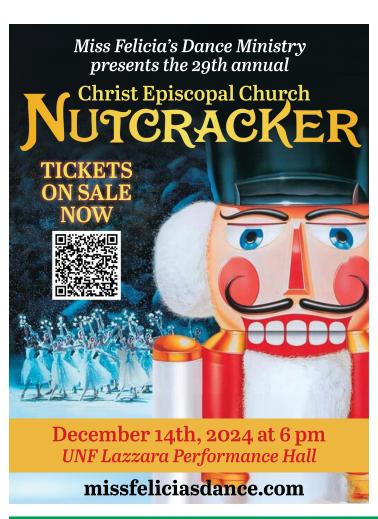
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JACKSONVILLE SYMPHONY YOUTH ORCHESTRAS

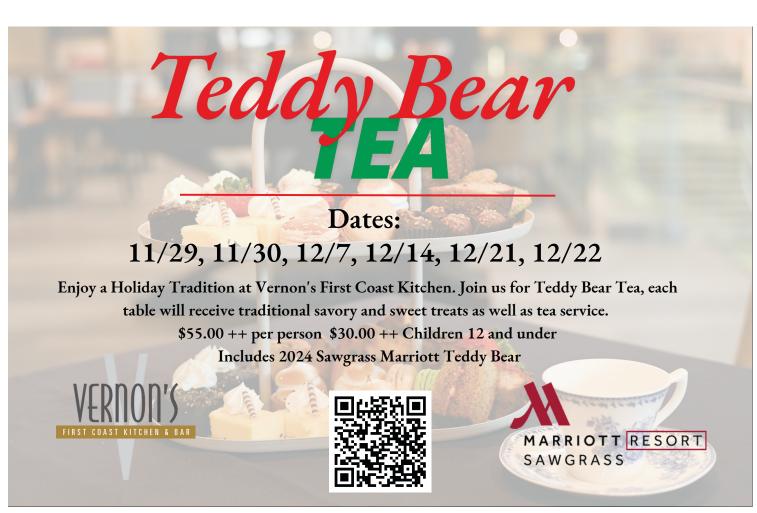

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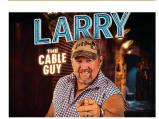
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
