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



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

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TICKETS

Tickets are mobile-only and day-specific. They can be purchased exclusively online at THEPLAYERS.com.

Parking is purchased separately at THEPLAYERS. COM/parking. Parking passes are completely digital and cannot be purchased on-site.

Youth tickets: Up to two children, ages 15 and younger, will be admitted free with a ticketed adult all week. All children ages 6 and older must have a ticket in order to access hospitality venues.

PARKING AND TRANSPORTATION

Gate Times

Gates will open at 7:30 a.m. each day.

Parking

The General Parking Lot address is 5360 Palm Valley Road, Ponte Vedra Beach.

Parking passes are not included with ticket purchases. A separate parking pass is required for each day of championship week (Tuesday through Sunday) and must be purchased online in advance. Purchase parking at https://www.theplayers.com/parking.

Rideshare

Rideshares will drop off and pick up at the

Couples Entry off ATP Boulevard, just steps from the 15th hole.

Bike and Golf Cart Parking

THE PLAYERS offers complimentary bike and golf cart parking just past Gate B inside TPC Sawgrass. Fans should enter TPC Sawgrass from the PGA Tour Boulevard entrance, by the Sawgrass Marriott, and follow signs to golf and bike parking. Bike and golf cart parking is not available in the general parking lot. Bike racks are provided free of charge, and fans are reminded to bring their own lock to secure their bicycles.

Cashless Experience

All payments will be digital, contactless and cashless throughout the entire tournament property.

Disabled Guest Services

THE PLAYERS offers shuttle services for disabled guests throughout the tournament. Fans with a handicap parking hang tag must still purchase a parking pass for the general parking lot (off County Road 210). Once parked, golf carts will transport them to designated locations on the course. Carts operate from gate opening until 30 minutes after play ends, following a set route with specific pick-up and drop-off points.

Carts will run from the time gates open until 30 minutes after play ends and will only pick up and drop off from the designated locations below. They will not stray from the official route under any circumstances.

- Behind 17 Tee adjacent to the Welcome Experience and the Food Court
- Players left of 9 Fairway by Wine & Dine on 9.

 If disabled guests need assistance from a location without shuttle access, they should contact any tournament official with a radio.

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


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

Help keep THE PLAYERS clean and safe

Fans can text THE PLAYERS from anywhere on course to notify a staff member of an on-site issue. Text 69050 to reach a staff member while at the tournament.

Fan Code of Conduct

Spectators will be subject to expulsion and the loss of ticket privileges for the following breaches of etiquette:

- Making rude, vulgar or other inappropriate comments or gestures;
- Verbal or physical harassment of players, volunteers, officials or spectators;
- Distracting a player or any disruption of play;
- Behavior that is unruly, disruptive, unsafe or illegal in nature;
- Failing to follow the instruction of a championship official, volunteer or security personnel.

Fans can text THE PLAYERS from anywhere on course to notify a staff member of an on-site issue. Text 69050 to reach a staff member while at the tournament.

Mobile Device Policy

Spectator Mobile Device Policy for PGA TOUR Tournaments (please see your ticket for complete terms):

- Devices must be on silent at all times; flash may not be used.
- Devices may be used to capture video, audio and photos (content) in all areas throughout tournament week.
- Content may be used for personal purposes (e.g., personal social media); no commercial use.
- No live streaming or real-time coverage (e.g., no shot-by-shot coverage).
- Data use (e.g., texting) is permitted in all areas throughout tournament week.
- Phone calls are allowed only in designated areas.
- Please be respectful of play and do not interfere with players, caddies or media.
- All posted signage and instructions from tournament staff must be observed.
- Failure to comply with this policy may result in the revocation of your ticket.

Autograph Policy

- On-course autograph seeking is prohibited. (This includes, but is not limited to, tees, fairways, greens and practice areas during practice rounds and tournament rounds.)
- Autograph seeking will be restricted to designated autograph zones: practice grounds and scoring area
- No memorabilia can be brought into the tournament including pin flags, photos, trading cards, balls and other sports paraphernalia.

Alcohol Policy

- Strict adherence to alcoholic beverage consumption laws will be enforced on course and in all hospitality areas.
- Alcohol will not be served to anyone younger than 21; proof of age will be required for anyone younger than 35.
- Only two drinks may be purchased at a time; spectators are not allowed to carry more than two drinks at any given time.

Bag Policy and What You Can Bring

Fans may bring bags that meet the following quidelines:

- Opaque bags measuring 6-by-6-by-6 inches or smaller
- Clear bags measuring 12-by-6-by-12 inches or smaller

Additionally, fans are allowed to bring their own food in a one-gallon clear plastic bag, with food items wrapped in clear wrap. Reusable plastic or metal cups (up to 32 oz.) are also permitted, provided they are empty upon entry. No memorabilia can be brought into the tournament including pin flags, photos, trading cards, balls and other sports paraphernalia.

Fan Lockers

Located at the Nicklaus (by the main parking lot) and Couples (by the rideshare area) entries, THE PLAYERS offers free fan lockers for convenient and secure storage of belongings.



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Where Scheffler's repeat at THE PLAYERS stands in golf history

It's hard to repeat at any important golf event. That's why it happens so infrequently. Scottie Scheffler's repeat victory last year at THE PLAYERS was historic. He was the very first person in the tournament's 51-year history to win back-to-back. How does that compare to the other biggest tournaments each season?

For the sake of argument, let's look at how many times the Masters, the PGA, the U.S. Open and the British Open have had repeat winners.

The United States has three of the four or four of the five majors, depending on what you count. Here in Ponte Vedra, many of us count THE PLAYERS as a major. Whether you do or not is a subject for another time. Right now, we have to compare a back-to-back victory at THE PLAYERS to something, and the other majors are the only things comparable because it is the championship of the PGA Tour.

The Historic Viewpoint: The Oldest Biggie

There are plenty of repeating champs at the British Open, but that makes sense because it's been held since 1861. It actually started

SCHEFFLER: BACK-TO-BACK CHAMPION AT THE PLAYERS

BY KATHY BISSELL

Last year, Scottie Scheffler did something that neither Jack Nicklaus nor Tiger Woods nor any other golfer who has won THE PLAYERS was able to do: win the tournament in back-to-back years. Only a few have had multiple victories in the event, which is basically the Championship of the PGA Tour. When you think of it like that, no wonder it's hard to win.

Although Nicklaus won THE PLAYERS three times, in 1974, its inaugural year, and again in 1976 and 1978, his victories were each two years apart. Woods won THE PLAYERS in 2001, in his Tiger Slam year, and then not for 12 more years, in 2013.

In 2024, Scheffler did what had been impossible for the best in the world. He repeated. Nobody really knows why it's so hard to defend this tournament, but some past champions have their own thoughts on it.

The Past Champions' Theories

"It's a golf course that doesn't necessarily fit any one style of player," past champion Rickie Fowler explained some time after he won. "I saw something that was posted not long ago of kind of the recent past champions here and what guys did well from whether it was driving the ball, approach, putting, scrambling, and there was nothing really that stood out as one thing between all players."

He's right about that. We've had long hitters Davis Love III and Fred Couples winning twice each, and we've had Tim Clarke and the late

Calvin Peete, two short hitters, find the victory circle. We've had surprise winners, like Craig Perks who chipped, blasted and otherwise short-gamed the course to death. There have been tough guy champs, like Raymond Floyd and Lanny Wadkins who would just about kill the competition for a stroke. Europeans have won, starting with Sandy Lyle and going through to Rory McIlroy. There have been

out with a back-to-back champ in Old Tom Morris, followed by his son, Young Tom Morris who won four in a row, 1868-1872, and there was no tournament in 1871, so credit his victories however you like.

Others to double up on British Opens include Jamie Anderson, Bob Ferguson and Peter Thomson, who actually won three in a row. (Thomson has five in all.) There was the Great Triumvirate of Brits, Harry Vardon, J.H. Taylor and James Braid, who won the tournament 16 of 21 times between 1894 and 1914. They all had back-to-back victories in there somewhere. They were kind of like three Tiger Woods all at once, winning nearly everything around the turn of the 20th century.

U.S. players have double-dipped at the British Open, starting with Bobby Jones in 1926 and 1927, followed by Walter Hagen in 1928 and 1929. But in 1960, a legend was about to appear on the scene. He became the Elvis Presley of golf: Arnold Palmer.

That year, Palmer had already slipped into a green jacket at the Masters and hoisted the trophy at the U.S. Open. On his plane ride to St. Andrews for the British Open, he asked the late sportswriter Bob Drum, who was on the flight, what it would be if he continued winning and captured both the British Open and the PGA.

Drum replied it would be the equivalent of Bobby Jones' Grand Slam. And that's when Palmer told Drum he was going to win the Grand Slam. And yes, that conversation is where today's idea of the modern Grand Slam began. (No matter what anybody else tells you, that's when it happened because Bob Drum told me, backed up by Dan Jenkins. There are some people you just have to believe.)

Well, as much as we all would have liked for Palmer to win the Grand Slam in 1960, even The King couldn't make the game of golf bend to his desires. He was defeated by Australian Kel Nagle that year. But he became the first golfer to be frustrated by not winning the modern Grand Slam. It would dog Jack Nicklaus his whole career.

Despite the 1960 loss, Palmer returned, and in 1961 and 1962, he became the next American back-to-back winner. At that point, nobody could hold the U.S. players back. Lee Trevino caught fire in 1971 and '72. Tom Watson in 1982 and 1983. Tiger Woods in 2005 and 2006.

Finally, the Europeans got back into the consecutive win column when Padraig Harrington won the British Open in 2007 and 2008.

For a tournament that is so old, it does not really have a huge number of back-to-back champions, 16 in all, but it has more than any other important event. The reason is likely due to the fact that at the beginning, there were not a lot of golfers competing and there were not a lot of really, really good golfers. It got tougher over time. And the weather can be a beast.

The Oldest U.S. Biggie: U.S. Open

U.S. Open has been played the next longest, debuting in 1895. The first back-to-back winner was in 1903 with Willie Anderson. He actually won the tournament three times in a row and four times in all.

After Anderson, the U.S. Open refused to have a repeat winner until 1911 and 1912 when so called phenom John McDermott snagged the title. It is probably no surprise to you, if you are a golf historian, that next up was the great Bobby Jones who won in 1929 and 1930.

Seven after Jones double, his feat was matched by someone who doesn't receive many accolades in golf: Ralph Guldahl. He racked up his repeat victory at Oakland Hills and Cherry Hills in 1937 and 1938.

That was it until 1950-1951 when Ben Hogan, after his hideous cargets-hit-by-bus accident, went backto-back at Merion and Oakland Hills. No one suggests that as a plan for how to win.

champs from all ends of the globe, like Si-Woo Kim and Nick Price.

One interesting thing is the number of trophies that have gone to Australia with Jason Day and Adam Scott and Steve Elkington at the top of the list and some others who we won't mention now for reasons of diplomacy.

But as fabulous as all of them are and were at the time, none of them won the tournament two times in succession.

"This golf course isn't necessarily long, so it doesn't necessarily benefit a bomber," Fowler added. "To me, at the end of the day, it's whoever has the most control and kind of keeps it simple, fairways and greens."

Some hit more irons off the tee, he said, some hit drivers instead. Some winners putted well, but there was no constant thing that the past champs did that would translate to a "type" of golfer.

McIlroy had a slightly different view.

"I think this golf course can play so differently dayto-day, depending on wind direction, conditions," he said. "It is such a cliché here, but it really doesn't suit any one style of play or any one type of player."

He said he would have loved the chance to be the first one to repeat. But of course, Scheffler beat him to it.

Justin Thomas had a bigger picture view on why it's been nearly impossible to defend.

"I'd say because it's one of the deepest fields in golf, and it's really hard to win golf tournaments," he explained. "It's really hard to win a golf tournament once, and it's really hard to win it again."

It IS the deepest field, factually. The PGA Championship, which likes to say it has the deepest field and points to the top 100, has 20 club professionals in the tournament. That means it's not the deepest field. They hope no one will notice that.

THE PLAYERS may have some who don't want to try to play it, but most years, it has had the top 141 players in the world. Those who are stretches to that statement would be the winner of the Kaulig Senior Players, the money leader from the 2024 Korn Ferry Tour, and the money leader from the Korn Ferry Finals. All three get to play.

The other exceptions now, like Brooks Koepka and Bryson DeChambeau, have gone to the "dark side" of golf. So maybe THE PLAYERS is top 138 or so. But if a guy is good, he's likely to be in the field. He will want the trophy, the money, the status and the five years of PGA Tour event exemptions.

Thomas also pointed to the pressure and expectations that come with defending any tournament but ended up going back to the depth of the field as the main reason. When there are 144 of the best in the world, particularly the top 100, it really is a dogfight to get your hands on any trophy, never mind THE PLAYERS "Goldman."

It was then nearly 40 years until Curtis Strange mounted a charge at The Country Club and Oak Hill in 1988 and 1989. And finally, there's Brooks Koepka, who won our country's open championship in 2017 and 2018 at Erin Hills and Shinnecock Hills

So, in 130 years, we've only had seven back-to-back U.S. Open champs. And a lot of them have had Hill or Hills in the name of the courses.

The First Match Play Biggie: PGA Championship

The PGA is the second oldest important U.S. tournament, and it was begun in 1916. A man named Rodman Wannamaker, who apparently had department stores at the time, donated the trophy. And it's huge.

The PGA Championship is kind of a twoheaded beast when it comes to counting back-to-back victories. That's because. from 1916 until 1957, it was conducted as a match play event. Since 1958, it's been four rounds of stroke play.

In the match play era, there were five who were back-to-back winners: Jim Barnes in 1916 and 1919 (because there was no tournament during WW I); Gene Sarazen in 1922 and 1923; Walter Hagen in 1924, 1925, 1926 and 1927 (yes, he was apparently that good); Leo Diegel in 1928 and 1929; and Denny Shute in 1936 and

Since the PGA went to stroke play, there have only been two back-to-back winners. Brooks Koepka in 2018 and 2019 and Tiger Woods, twice, in 1999 and 2000 and again in 2006 and 2007. Does that mean Tiger Woods was twice as good as Brooks Koepka? Sounds like a good topic for a bar argument.

If you are wondering how many won in each format, it was seven total in 109 years. There were five in match play over a period of 42 years and two in stroke play over 67 years. Seems like the stroke play is the harder format!

Now, in case you are wondering what happened to Jack Nicklaus in all this, the answer is nothing. He won five PGA Championships. In fact, he has one of the most — perhaps the most — incredible records in terms of numbers: six Masters, five PGAs, four U.S. Opens, three British Opens, three PLAYERS and — ta-da! two U.S. Amateurs. Tiger Woods also has a strong record with five Masters, four PGAs, three U.S. Opens, three British Opens and three U.S. Amateurs.

The Greenest Biggie: The Masters

Now we come to the tournament that outside of THE PLAYERS — has had the fewest number of back-to-back champions. and it's surprising because if ever there was a horses-for-courses location, this is it. Jack Nicklaus has won it six times. Tiger Woods has won it five times. Arnold Palmer won it four times. Naturally, we are talking about the Masters. It was started in 1934, just under 20 years after the debut of the PGA Championship.


Although 18 players won the tournament more than once, only three have repeated as champions: Jack Nicklaus in 1965-1966, Nick Faldo in 1989-1990 and Tiger Woods in 2001-2002.

Really, that's kind of hard to believe when you think about the number of times the same players have played in the tournament. Usually, familiarity with a course breeds increased success. But I guess people couldn't play through Palmer, Nicklaus, Faldo and Woods to get to a repeat.

The Meanest Biggie: THE PLAYERS

Nearly every important golfer in the last 50 years has won THE PLAYERS. There are some that haven't. But only one person has repeated as PLAYERS champion in the 51 years that it has been held: Scottie Scheffler.

The reason, as past champions have said, is because the course hates everybody. OK, they didn't say that. I said that. Pete Dye designed it to not give anybody an advantage but to give everybody on their game an advantage. While that sounds slightly nuts, remember Rickie Fowler said the person who wins is "whoever has the most control."

No golfer has to be Superman to win THE PLAYERS, but he might want to keep a cape in his bag, just in case a Superman shot is required. The reason is the design of the golf course. Pete Dye always gives every player a chance on every shot. However, the player has to hit to the area that Pete wants him to go, or figure out some other way to avoid the trouble lurking.

We could go through the golf course, hole-by-hole and note where Pete wants guys to hit the ball. But some of them can't, some of them won't and some of them refuse to. What they are doing is lessening their chances of winning.

Pete's designs are similar to those of Jack Nicklaus, and that's not surprising since the two of them worked on several courses together in the beginning of their design careers. Many of them have a severe look. They are designed first and foremost to scare the golfer on every shot. The player who can't see beyond that is not going to do well. But Pete always gives every golfer a place to go. An example is the 1st hole of TPC Sawgrass. When you stand on the tee, it looks like the landing area is a little sliver of grass left, woods left and a yawning bunker to the right. When you get to the landing area, you realize that the fairway is almost huge, and it was just a trick of the eye to scare you. Seventeen more holes like that follow it. Until golfers learn that there's a place out there on every shot, in every fairway, on every green (well, maybe not the 8th), they aren't going to win, much less repeat.

Now, that's a lot to take in, so go make yourself a Sawgrass Splash and enjoy THE PLAYERS!

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IS A THREE-PEAT PLAYERS POSSIBLE? THE JULIA CHILD CHEF-FLER DIVERSION

If you are married to a PGA Tour pro, and he won nine tournaments last year, like Scottie Scheffler did, including THE PLAYERS and the Masters, never let him cook in the offseason. Something is bound to go wrong. A slip and fall accident on the kitchen floor that tweaks his back for months, if not years. A knife fight, because you disagree about which holiday guest gets the biggest filet. A burn when you are trying to make twice-baked potatoes. A good skewering when trying to remove the cork from a wine bottle. The kitchen is rife with danger. Whatever you do, do not let the Player of The Year anyplace near it. Lock the door. Better yet, go out to dinner or do take out.

And whatever you do, don't cook Italian. Especially don't cook ravioli. Just ask Scottie Chef-fler what happened to him.

Around Christmas, Scottie and his wife Meredith decided they wanted to have handmade ravioli. The kind where you roll out the dough, put the filling on it, put the second layer of dough on top of that and then cut out the individual ravioli (or raviolis, if you prefer). They didn't have a ravioli maker because they were not at home when the ravioli inspiration and subsequent "incident" occurred. They needed something to cut out the ravioli bits.

"The only thing there was a wine glass that we found," Scheffler explained. "I had my hand on top of it and it broke, which side note, I've heard nothing but horror stories since this happened about wine glasses, so be careful. Even if you're like me and you don't drink wine, you've got to be real careful with wine glasses. It broke and the stem kind of got me in the hand."

They immediately reached out to a doctor who had helped Scheffler with a thumb issue in the past. He was, of course, out of town, but told them what to do and referred them to another person to do the surgery on his ravioli-wine-glass-injury because there was still glass stuck inside Scottie's hand. Eeoowww!

Have these people never heard of the stemless wine glass? Were there no highball or old-fashioned glasses in the house? How about a nice cookie cutter?

"I was able to heal pretty quickly," Scheffler added.

After his self-inflicted hand injury, Scheffler was out of golf commission for nearly two months. The AT&T Pro-Am was his first

Scheffler replied, "I've got a chef. Her name's Meredith. She's pretty cute."

How can you not love this couple? Meredith and Scottie, not Rory and Scottie.

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

teeth on the beach. You can never tell what's going to be a good day for them and what isn't, but there are people who are out early every day bent over searching, searching, searching, trying to beat you to the best teeth. I once bought a megalodon tooth just to have it. I can't imagine what size beast it came from, but it had to be huge. The tooth is as big as my hand.

Staying with the gold theme, and why not, there's a T-shirt in gold with an outline of the 17th hole on the back of it.



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25 YEARS AGO: SUTTON DEFEATED WOODS

Hal Sutton was something of a phenom when he first came to the PGA Tour. In his first season, 1982, he won the Walt Disney World Golf Classic and was named Rookie of the Year. The next season, he won THE PLAYERS, and then later in the year, the PGA Championship where Jack Nicklaus finished second. He was immediately named The Next Nicklaus.

Nearly 18 years later, when the 2000 PLAYERS began, Sutton had won 11 PGA Tour titles. He'd been on numerous U.S. teams including three Ryder Cups. But at age 41, he was looking toward the end of his PGA Tour career, not the beginning of it.

For whatever reason, perhaps because he was a past champ and had four top 10s

already in the season, Sutton was asked for a pre-tournament interview. At first, the big discussion was about autograph sellers and then whether THE PLAYERS should move to May. But immediately after that, media members started in with Colin Montgomerie's quote after round one at Bay Hill, where Tiger Woods was one off the lead, that it looked to him — Colin — like everybody else was playing for second.

Sutton took exception.

"He is going in a different locker room than I was going in," Sutton replied about Montgomerie's quip.

Media members love a good brouhaha, so they stirred the pot, and asked him to clarify.

Sutton added his own experience playing the first two rounds with Woods in Los Angeles earlier in the year.

"I felt like it was important that I send a message to me and him in those two rounds," Sutton explained. "One, that I could beat him, playing with him; and two, that he knew that I could beat him playing with him."

He said it could prove valuable on a Sunday somewhere down the line.

"I need to know going into that, that, hey, I have beat him in these circumstances. And that proves one thing, that it can happen again," Sutton added.

Who knew that it would be this upcoming Sunday? No one. Certainly not Hal Sutton. Certainly not Tiger Woods.

However, in the interview, Sutton said there was a lesson he had learned in an early Ryder Cup when he was staying with Jack

and Barbara Nicklaus (because he was the only single guy on the team). Sutton asked Nicklaus if he thought his record would be the same if he were playing today, and Nicklaus said no. He said there were only three or four golfers who believed they could beat him then. So, Nicklaus won a lot. Obviously, he won a lot because he was exceptional, but he was in the head of every other golfer.

Sutton said that translated to playing against Tiger Woods, that a lot of people don't believe they can beat him.

"Some of it is put there. Some of it is selfinflicted. Some of it is put there by you all. And some of it is put there by Tiger's own doing. The guy plays great. I mean, he plays the game at a level that few people have ever known. But that system doesn't mean he can't be beat," Sutton concluded.

That week, Sutton, who still knew how to play very good golf, reached into the wayback machine and recreated some greatness. Amazingly, it was right when Tiger Woods was coming into the height of his powers.

Woods won the week before THE PLAYERS and had been on a roll, winning 10 of his previous 16 tournaments, something this generation of golfers and fans and media had never seen.

As fate would have it, at the end of round three, Sutton had a one-shot lead over Woods and a two-shot lead over Tom Lehman. Then, in the third round, the heavens opened up. It

was lightning, thunder, torrential March rain, all the usual suspects. Sutton and Woods were on the 12th hole.

Up to that point in the round, Sutton hadn't missed a fairway and missed only one green. Woods hadn't birdied the par fives, giving his opponent a three-shot advantage when play

was called.

"If there's any golf course you want to play when you're behind, it's one like this," Woods said. That's because anything can happen on the back nine.

Sutton retained his three-shot lead until the 16th. That's where he did not make birdie and where Woods made eagle. Woods gave maximum fist pumps. It could have shaken a lesser man. Sutton was now leading by just one.

But after it was over, Sutton said, "I knew it wasn't going to go without Tiger making his charge. All I can say is I was planning on him making that eagle putt."

Ever the strategist, Sutton noted that it was good because he wanted Woods to tee off first on 17. Unfortunately, Sutton was 4 over par for the week on that hole. Fortunately for Sutton, they both parred it.

Sutton was one shot up with one hole to play. Woods hit an iron off the tee, mainly because a longer club was too much for his prodigious length.

"I was really shocked when he pulled out his iron off that tee," Sutton said.

"I think I am one of the best drivers in the game, so I am going to play to my strength. And I picked out those trees in the distance, those real light-colored trees. I hit it right at it," he explained, adding that he needed an advantage on the last hole.


His driver landed in the middle of the

Then, his second shot, the 6-iron, is the one. out of all four-and-a-half days of play that has gone down in golf history.

When he struck it, he said, "Be the right club ... Be the right club to-DAY!"

And of course it was.

One important footnote to the 2000 PLAYERS is that while Sutton didn't become the Next Nicklaus, perhaps Tiger Woods did. In 2000, Woods didn't win the PLAYERS or the Masters, but he won the U.S. Open, the British Open and the PGA. Then, the following spring, he added another Masters. That run is now considered the Tiger Slam. But Woods also won the 2001 PLAYERS. He's the only one to do that in a 12-month span.

PONTE VEDRA BECOMES **CENTER OF GOLF TV UNIVERSE**

PGA Tour opens new TV production building

If you've seen the new PGA Tour headquarters building down the road from the intersection of Palm Valley Road and A1A, or for residents, across from the post office and Walgreens, then you know that another building has gone up next door. That's the TV production building, and it's getting ready to take over the golf television universe. Well, a good part of it anyway. Cue the warning music that goes dum-dum ... dum-dum ... dum-dum ...

Since PGA Tour Productions — now PGA Tour Studios — was opened in 1990, it has gone through various stages of development in programming capability to the point where it now has everything it needs to handle worldwide broadcasts. And more.

Initially, it was located in the third floor of an office building on Route 1, just south of the end of Butler Boulevard. (I know this because

I used to go there to produce a program called "The Golf Show," which was syndicated for 10 years on WGN and WOR and before that was on Prime Network and Sunshine Network and most of the sports channels across the country.)

From there Productions moved to the World Golf Village, to a 35,000-square-foot facility next door to the former World Golf Hall of Fame.

Now Productions has officially become PGA Tour Studios, and it has its own huge, 165,000-square-foot facility with things most people would not even believe possible.

To give you an idea of the size, the TPC Sawgrass clubhouse is 77,000 square feet, if that helps, and it has two floors, so 38,500 square feet each floor. This new TV production building has three floors, which means they are about 55,000 square feet each. The Publix in Sawgrass Village is about 50,000 square feet, and that's counting the back part that we never see because it's where the food comes in and gets stored until it goes onto the shelves. So, stack three Sawgrass Publix on top of each other and that's close to

the size of the Studios facility.

The new PGA Tour Studios building includes eight production rooms, eight audio control rooms and seven LED-outfitted studios, including a 270-degree LED display in Studio 1A. That means every place in that room except where the cameras sit can be lit.

PGA Tour Studios is now creating the live telecasts for the PGA Tour Champions events, Korn Ferry tournaments and PGA TOUR LIVE on ESPN +. Announcers will often come to Ponte Vedra to voice the telecasts instead of going to the site of the tournament, which some of them have different feelings about, but that's just the reality of today.

In addition, PGA Tour Studios is creating a number of new original programs like "Scottie 24" and "Xander Embedded," which were shown on PGA Tour YouTube channel, pgatour.com and PGA Tour social channels, PlutoTV, Roku, Samsung TV Plus, Tubi and XUMO.

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

content that we plan to deliver to our fans in the years to come through the new PGA Tour Studios," said Michael Riceman, PGA Tour senior vice president, content and production.

Six more similar programs are planned.

"Every new technology and forwardthinking innovation we introduce is about serving our fans and meeting them where they are, and the creative capabilities of PGA Tour Studios will help us further that mission

while showcasing the beauty of our sport," Commissioner Jay Monahan said.

At THE PLAYERS, a new World Feed of PGA Tour telecasts will debut. It is kind of like the telecast of the British Open that we used to receive from the BBC decades ago and we have lately gotten from Sky Sports. Our network would receive it and might add some additional shots of U.S. players that the Brits and the rest of the world didn't care so much about seeing.

But the PGA Tour Studios World Feed will have the ability to focus on both the tournament leaders as well as the players

from each of more than between 150 and 200 countries that carry golf telecasts. They will be able to custom-create each broadcast for each country with country specific and correct-language-speaking announcers. That, folks, is an unbelievable achievement. Somebody's going to have a headache making it work that week, for sure.

They do this by having cameras on a majority if not all players. If you've ever tried the every-player, every-shot live offering that the PGA Tour created in the past for THE

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

PLAYERS, that's what everyone would have as the base for the program. Then what happens is, for example, some shots of U.S. players are dropped out of the telecast that's going to perhaps Japan, and several Japanese players are shown instead. And while they are shown, Japanese announcers, who are voicing the telecast to Japan, talk about the Japanese players and the shots they are making. So, it's golf, tailored to the country, to the language. Then, they revert to the main telecast when they want to. If they want all Hideki Matsuyama all the time, they can have it. That's what World Feed will eventually become, and the World Feed programming at THE PLAYERS is the first

It's all made possible in part due the combination of the new Studios building and the addition of what is called PGA Tour Fleet, a group of nine state-of-theart production trucks that debuted at the Farmers Insurance Open in January. A production truck is like a studio on wheels. All the cameras are connected to it, either

wirelessly or by wire. All the audio from the announcers runs through it, and directors give instructions on what camera shots to use from it. Graphics run through it, too. There might be 25 or 30 or 40 cameras to choose from at one time, with, in the every-player, every-shot version, the ability to capture action from up to 144 cameras or live feeds from locations of tournaments.

And while sometimes there's important action at two or three locations at once that's when you rely on the guys and gals in the tape truck — and believe it or not, sometimes there's nothing but guys walking down the fairway or off the tee and nobody hitting a shot. And you'll probably still see the same shots of squirrels and ducks.

Now, somehow, they have the capability to stick shot tracers on all the shots. Personally, I love that. It's my all-time favorite feature of golf telecasts ever. There's even a new one where the tracer path is like a ribbon, and you can fly over the top of it. Love inventive electronics.

The PGA Tour Fleet is a collaboration between the Tour and CBS/Paramount+. NBC/Golf Channel/Peacock and ESPN+. It is the production center for seven live shows, including the network broadcast, four PGA TOUR LIVE streams on ESPN+ and two live streams for IMG Arena.

After the debut of the World Feed at THE PLAYERS, there will be a World Feed for all the rest of the tournaments in 2025.

Coming in 2026, PGA Tour Radio moves in. In addition, PGA Tour Studios will house Pro Shop, the PGA Tour's partner in Hollywood dedicated to creating what they call "premium content." Think of this, perhaps, as like the Netflix golf series "Full Swing."

So, there's more happening by the post office and Walgreens than you ever imagined. In fact, Ponte Vedra has just become the center of the golf television universe.



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HONEY, I SHRUNK THE **TOUR**

Fewer guaranteed places on PGA Tour starting 2026

It has always been hard to get a PGA Tour card. There are successful players who have gone through numerous Q-schools trying to score well enough to get a playing card. The record for Q-School failures probably belongs to Mac O'Grady who did not qualify for the PGA Tour 16 times from 1971 through 1981, sometimes going through two PGA Tour Q-Schools in the same year. Finally, in 1982, he succeeded. Even Mark McCumber, PLAYERS champ in 1988, failed seven O-schools before finally earning the right to play. The same thing happens every year. Some succeed and some don't.

Starting in 2026 there's a new measuring stick for who does and who doesn't get to play in PGA Tour events.

If you're new to golf, you might not even know that certain players are guaranteed a spot in, for instance, The Sony Open or the Cognizant Classic in The Palm Beaches (formerly The Honda Classic), or The American Express (a long time ago called The Bob Hope) to name just three early in the season.

Since 1983, the number on this guaranteed list of players has been 125. It's actually called the "exempt" list. What it means in normal language is that this year,

the top 125 players in FedEx points from 2024 could enter any regular PGA Tour event in 2025. Guaranteed. They are exempt from pre-tournament qualifying events. They can walk right in.

The exempt list does not include the Masters, the PGA, the U.S. Open or the British Open, all of which have their own rules for who can play. It also does not include special events like the signature events, which have had fewer players, but it does include the rest of the tournaments on the golf calendar in the United States and some outside the U.S. that are still PGA Tour-sanctioned.

The idea of an exempt list has been around for a long time, but the number of players has varied widely. Back in the dark ages of the late 1970s and early 1980s, the exempt list was the top 60. I remember talking to players in the mid-1980s who said about their careers before the exempt Tour that they had always been in the top 60, meaning they always had a place to play and compete.

As you probably know, there are more than 60 golfers in any regular PGA Tour event these days. It's usually 144 or 156, depending on daylight. But what you might not know is, historically, just because golfers enter an event, it doesn't mean they are going to get paid. Roughly half the field goes home with no money. That's still true today, even if his name is Tiger Woods or Scottie Scheffler or Rory McIlroy or Jordan Spieth.

It has been that way since the PGA Tour was created, and that was a custom taken from what

existed before the PGA Tour was officially an organization. The PGA Tour, after all, began as an offshoot of the PGA of America, the people who have traditionally run golf courses across the country. It was begun in 1968, and it has to be called a roaring success.

Back to tournaments. To fill the rest of the field after the top 60, there might have been 120 players competing for another 40 or 50 or 60 or more spots in that week's tournament. The number differed, but the situation was the same. They had to play a one-day tournament, and a certain number of players, based on the best scores, were added to the top 60 to play in that week's event. It was not only dog eat dog. It was dog eat dog, cat, birds, bread crusts and anything that was in the way of getting into an event.

As Al Barkow's "History of The PGA Tour" explained, if a player qualified for that week's tournament on Monday, he knew where he would be, at least until Friday. He would play two rounds. If he didn't make the half-way "cut," then he had to go to the next Monday qualifying and try again. These

Monday qualifiers were called Rabbits.

Qualifying every week was expensive and frustrating, running around the country not knowing when you'll have success. To explain how big the issue was, Gary McCord, who most people know from his time as an announcer at CBS, for a while lived out of a storage unit in Southern California, presumably to save money and because he was always on the road trying to qualify.

It was McCord who proposed the allexempt Tour. He did it, according to a story on golf.com, because he was at a qualifier at Doral and saw Miller Barber, who had 11 PGA Tour wins at that time, and Don January. who had won 10 times including a PGA Championship, both qualifying. McCord looked through the names and did some

quick math and realized there were golfers with a total of 54 tournament wins who were qualifying. He decided the system was nuts, although he didn't say it that way. He decided to do something about it.

So, at a tournament in Tallahassee that was being held opposite the official PGA Tour event that week, he thought he'd get a few of the guys together and talk with them about it.

In that same article, he explained that he first wanted to get support from guys who were not in the regular tournament that week, guys who were probably going to get kicked off the Tour for the next season because they weren't top 60.

He rented a conference room in the hotel where he and the others in the opposite field event were staying and got the word out and figured maybe he'd get 20 to 30 guys, but 105 showed up. He explained his idea. He wanted to expand the exempt list to 125 and told them he probably needed another 50 to go to the Tour to tell the organizing body what the players needed. He got 80 more. It was more than a majority of the players who participated on the Tour. So, he went to the governing body. Needless to say, he got a call from then-commissioner Deane Beman.

Beman was already considering changes, although not quite what McCord had in mind. Regardless, the commissioner asked McCord to attend the next board meeting and present his concept. And the board went for it, for a 125-man "exempt" or guaranteed spot on the PGA Tour, which was more than double what it had been.

So, in 2026, that guaranteed number that McCord came up with in 1982 will shrink to 100. And 25 golfers are out of luck.

Now there are some exceptions to this. Someone who has won a Tour event gets an automatic exemption for two more seasons after his victory. That means, for instance, that Thomas Detry, who won the first week of February, doesn't have to worry about his status on the PGA Tour until the end of 2027. If he finishes 130th in FedEx points at the end of this year, he is still guaranteed a spot in regular Tour events. But he better be in the top 100 at the end of 2027, or win another tournament, so that he can continue to play.

As you can imagine, there has been much complaining began by those who were 101 and above.

Regardless, there are still plenty of ways to get into an event, even with the change in exempt player numbers. Usual PGA Tour fields are between 144 and 156 now, and that means tournaments still have to find another 44 to 56 players for regular Tour events. In addition, all 100 exempt players typically don't show up at every event. So, there will be room for more players. Some of the field will continue to come from categories like Past Champions or Major winners in the last five years. Some of the rest may come from Monday qualifying, which has now morphed into Friday pre-qualifying for Monday qualifying. Others will be sponsor picks and so on.

So, while there are big changes coming next year, while the guaranteed player pool shrinks, that change may actually open up a chance for more non-exempt or non-guaranteed guys to get a shot at playing. We won't really know how it works until it happens, but there's definitely going to be a catfight for those remaining spots. In addition, at the end of the year, in the fall events, people will really be clawing their way up the points list trying as best as they can to earn enough points to play another season. Somebody may play in every event to try to gain enough points for 2027.





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
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20 YEARS AGO:FUNK BECAME OLDEST PLAYERS WINNER

Fred Funk was no phenom. He didn't make it to the PGA Tour until he was 33, but give the man credit for persistence. At age 48, he became the oldest winner of THE PLAYERS.

"I felt kind of like Herbie the Volkswagen, The Love Bug, because I'm just out there just hitting my little pea shooters, and the bombers are going 40 by me," he said about the week that would define the highlight of his long career in professional golf.

The Times-Union's Garry Smits called the 2005 PLAYERS a "Monday Marathon," and he wasn't wrong. Funk played 32 holes that day.

Because of the weather delays on Saturday and Sunday, the third round was not completed until about 12:30 p.m. on Monday. In order to finish the tournament in an expedited fashion, the groups from round

three also played round four together. Funk was not in the final group.

In addition, he started the day four shots behind Luke Donald who was leading at the time. He was followed by Joe Durant, Tim Herron and Zach Johnson, who would go on to win the Masters in 2007.

The wind was up, with gusts to 35 mph. Sand, reportedly, was being blown out of the bunkers. It wasn't a great day for golf, but someone would win by sunset on Monday. Funk played the last two rounds with Vaughn Taylor and Adam Scott, two long hitters.

"Adam can bomb, and Vaughn can take it right with him," Funk said after the victory. "I tried not to let that bother me, because I knew it was more important to be in the fairway."

Funk birdied the 16th hole to take the lead. He nearly lost it on the 17th.

"You can hit a good shot and end up in the water. You can bail out left, you think, or you just don't know what the ball is going to do, because the wind was blowing so hard," he said at the time. "I was trying to put as good a swing as I could put on it. I aimed it at the

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


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10 YEARS AGO: FOWLER'S BIGGEST VICTORY

Rickie Fowler's sudden death victory at THE PLAYERS in 2015 was, as Snoop Dogg says in one of his T-Mobile commercials, "like peanut butter on jelly on gold."

It was exceptional and unexpected. Not that Fowler can't play, but that week, he had not threatened the leaderboard until after the 12th hole on Sunday. He was, by his own admission, out of the tournament until then. Even his family agreed because his mother and sister left for the airport around 4 p.m. while Fowler was still on the course. His caddie at the time, Joe Skovron, stayed in touch with them via text. When Rickie made his charge, they turned around and came back, his sister driving.

After winning, Fowler was asked if he was worried about his sister behind the wheel, he gave an answer few could top.

"She can handle herself behind the wheel. We grew up riding and racing dirt bikes," Fowler guipped.

That dirt bike racing is probably where Fowler gets his gutsy play. He just hits fearless shots when he has to. Nothing demonstrated it more than his last four holes and the playoff at the 2015 PLAYERS.

During the final round, in his mind, the turning point came when he was able to make par out of the bunker on the 12th. Then he birdied the demanding par 3, 13th. He wasn't done, either. He continued to make up shots on the field.

"I made the birdie on 15," he recalled. "I hadn't played 16 particularly well."

But this time, he did.

"I was trying to aim kind of left side of the green and let it drift into the middle," he said about the second shot. "It was 3-wood, and I think we had 243 hole or so. The ball was a

little above my feet. I was just going to hit a choked-down 3-wood."

He said he had a similar shot at the 8th hole. which is a par 3.

"I started a little right of where I wanted to but had a good tight flight and held its line," he recalled.

It held its line well enough that Fowler was able to drop a putt for an eagle. That's when he said he felt like he had a chance to win the tournament.

"So 17, regulation, I had perfect numbers there for kind of a choked-down gap wedge," he explained.

"I've played the hole well, so just picked a line a little bit left of the target or left of the pin and hit a perfect shot, hit it right where I was looking. And I knew the putt there."

The reason he knew it was that he made a

putt from that spot in 2012. He knew it would start to break left.

"And then, where my putt was, it actually goes back right. So, I felt confident with that," he added.

When he made the putt of course the crowd went nuts.

The 18th, Fowler said, is the hardest driving hole on the course.

"I really couldn't have hit one better, both in regulation and in the playoff," he noted.

After he finished, he had to wait for the rest of the players to come in. He went to the range to hit balls and stay loose.

Fowler had finished the last six holes birdiepar-birdie-eagle-birdie-birdie. What a run.

Then, Sergio Garcia and Kevin Kisner tied him at 12-under par, which meant there would be the first three-hole, aggregate playoff ever at THE PLAYERS.

Well, naturally, this being THE PLAYERS, the aggregate playoff didn't produce a winner. However, Garcia was eliminated. Now there were two.

Kisner and Fowler went to sudden death starting at, you guessed it, the 17th.


"I had a great number there on 17," Fowler admitted. "I was able to just hit a choke down gap wedge, and it played a little longer in the playoff the two times, but just had a good number, I've always liked playing 17, it's been good to me."

Kisner also had a birdie attempt, but his

missed, and Fowler poured in his putt to seal the victory.

According to Laura Neal, who was handling press room interviews that day, no one had ever played TPC Sawgrass' last four holes in 11 strokes. No one but Fowler. His finish was 3-3-2-3.

And he was the 2015 PLAYERS champ.

camera tower behind the green, which is dead center of the green, I hit a really solid 7 iron, it went higher than I wanted but started cutting to the right. I thought it was going to be close."

He ended up three-putting the 17th for bogey. When Funk's second shot at the 18th found the greenside bunker, he was upset. When he hit it out to five feet. he was relieved. When he made the putt for par, he was elated, screaming, "Yes!" He was still one shot ahead of the field. A number that held.

The three who could not conquer Fred Funk in 2005 were Luke Donald, Tom Lehman and Scott Verplank.

"I always will cherish this win here," Funk said.

The oldest winner played 14 holes on Monday morning followed by 18 holes Monday afternoon. He posted a 71 in for the fourth round on a day when the field average was 76.512.

"We finally had beautiful blue skies. Bright, you know, just a really beautiful day," Funk recalled of the Monday. "But the wind. You look at the trees and the winds are blowing the trees halfway over. And we had 30-35 mph sustained winds and 42 mph gusts that day and it was just one of those days, like, oh c--p. I gotta go play this course and these conditions are going to be brutal."

When told he was going to have a five-year exemption for the victory, he asked, "What am I going to do with that?" In just two years he would age up to the PGA Tour Champions circuit. But it also gave him the ability to play PGA Tour events if he wanted to. It also exempted him into majors, if he wanted to play them.


McIlroy said he learned some things when he played with Scheffler over the last year, as he explained on Sky Sports. He said he's become better at strategy and picking conservative targets.


He also learned some mental toughness

— Ryder Cup. Harris English, Ryder Cup. It's
hard to argue with that because it's been true in
the past.

However, Maverick McNealy has opened the door to new guys winning the RSM last fall. He was overdue, really, and perhaps is coming into his own.

Sophie likes him a lot and thinks it's hysterical that he and his three brothers are all named after cars. There's Maverick, Scout (Maverick's caddie), Colt and Dakota.
