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Rare leatherback turtle nest spotted at Mickler Beach

It's quickly approaching that time of year when beachgoers can expect to see orange-and-yellow caution tape triangles indicating sea turtle nests.

While the season technically begins on May 1 and lasts through Oct. 31, St. John's County residents were surprised to spot the first sea turtle nest of the season at Mickler Beach three whole weeks ahead of schedule. And not just any sea turtle nest — a leatherback sea turtle nest.

"The leatherback nest is significant for several reasons," said Lucas Meers, director of Jacksonville University Sea Turtle Program and volunteer with Mickler's Landing Turtle Patrol. "It's the earliest nest for us (Mickler's Landing Turtle Patrol) in our documented history. This nest was laid earlier than we expected, but our team was ready to take action and mark it immediately."

The leatherback sea turtle is the

Tell me about your background. Are you from Florida?

I moved here at a young age, but I was born in North New Jersey. I lived in Pennsylvania for a little bit with my parents, then they moved here. I lived in St. Augustine, went to school, and grew up here, but then I left and went to New York City. I moved back when COVID happened because I had family here.

At the time, I was working at Le Bernardin, which is a three-star Michelin restaurant in New York City. I would moonlight at different ramen restaurants in the city in my downtime. I made it a goal to eat at almost every ramen restaurant in Manhattan.

When I moved back here, there really wasn't much for me in my line of work in St. Augustine, so naturally the next evolution for me was to open my own space, which is how Lotus Noodle Bar got its start.

How did you get into cooking and the restaurant business?

It's all I've ever done, honestly. I started washing dishes at an early age. I believe I was about 15 or 16, and a gentleman in the kitchen saw that I had a little speed, so they moved me to the kitchen and started teaching me how to cook. I started progressing through different restaurants, learning different cuisines. I worked rolling sushi, and I think that's what first piqued my interest in Japanese cuisine. Cooking has been my passion, and what I do in this life, and I'm always learning, always evolving.

Was Lotus Noodle Bar your first experience in that realm?

Yes. Now, I've run many kitchens. I've been a sous chef, and I've been an executive chef, so I have expertise in the field, but owning my own restaurant is a whole different ball game.

It's funny when people come here; I don't even feel like the owner. I feel like the chef. There's a lot that goes into it, but the thing is — anything worthwhile is never going to be easy. Otherwise, everyone would do it. I do feel like this industry is in my blood. Some people just were born to do certain things, and I think this is my calling.

You opened Lotus Noodle Bar almost two years ago now. What made you feel like this was the right time for you to start the restaurant?

I mean, do you ever really have the right time for things like that?

Everything just kind of fell into place for me. I was doing pop-ups here, and a lot of the local chefs in St. Augustine were doing these fancy prix fixe dinners. So naturally, I wanted to showcase what I was capable of doing and that's how Lotus came about. We always wanted to do a ramen restaurant, but the pop-ups led me into doing more of an elegant concept than just your

normal noodle bar where you go and get a bowl of ramen and you're out the door.

Have you felt the community support you?

It's been great. There's always a few people that don't quite understand what we're trying to do here, but a lot of people come here and they're like,

"Man, this place has a big city feel." You step in the door and you feel like you're in the Lower East Side of New York City through the service and the food and the ambiance. And for me, that's great because that's what I want to hear. We want to stand out. We want to be unique. That's our goal. It's just amazing to see the community come together.

Easter parade planned in West Augustine

St. Johns County, in partnership with the West Augustine Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA), will host the 2025 West Augustine CRA Easter Parade from 4 to 5:30 p.m. Sunday, April 20.

The community parade will begin at New St. James Missionary Baptist Church, located at 135 N. Rodriguez St., St. Augustine, and proceed west along West King Street before concluding at Collier-Blocker-Puryear Park. The event will feature marching bands, decorative floats, local organizations, public safety vehicles and community groups. Attendance is expected to reach between 1,000 and 1,500 spectators.

To ensure public safety, road closures and detours

will begin at approximately 3 p.m. and will be lifted as the parade progresses. All closures are anticipated to end by 5:30 p.m. Motorists are encouraged to plan accordingly and observe all posted signage.

Following the parade, the public is invited to attend a youth talent show at Collier-Blocker-Puryear Park. St. Johns County Sheriff's Office deputies and event volunteers will remain onsite to assist with security and crowd management.

The Recorder's garden columnist, Kathy Esfahani of Kathy's Creative Gardens & Nursery, shares her tips for growing gorgeous gardens in Northeast Florida.

KATHY'S GARDENING GUIDE

Climbing Flowers and Plants

"Never underestimate the healing power of a quiet moment in the garden." - Josephine Albert

The burst of color from a climbing flower is a stunning addition to any landscape. These plants provide a vertical design element with minimal space requirements. The plants listed below are perennials, but they are tropical; be sure to cover them when temperatures drop below 40 degrees. Visit the nursery to explore these beautiful climbers:

- Allamanda is an evergreen vine that produces trumpet-shaped, bright yellow blooms. This plant prefers exposure to morning sunlight but can adapt to an area of full sun. As a tropical plant, Allamanda loves moist but well-drained

soil. Although it is a beautiful vine to have around a patio or pool, Allamanda can be poisonous to animals if ingested.

- Bleeding heart is a tropical vine that thrives with full shade or morning sun. This evergreen plant has dark green leaves and clusters of white flowers with red accents. Bleeding heart prefers consistently moist, but not soggy, soil and can be pruned into the shape of your choice.

- Bougainvillea is a woody, tropical plant that loves the Florida heat! This vine can grow up to 40 feet long and produces beautiful flowers in orange, pink, purple, red, white and yellow. Bougainvillea will climb quickly on a trellis or arbor. Beware of thorns when working with this climber, and look for an area of full sun to encourage blooming throughout the season.

- Carolina jasmine is an evergreen climbing vine with fragrant, yellow blooms. Barring extensive cold temperatures, these plants bloom late winter through spring and thrive in

Northeast Florida. Also known as Carolina jessamine, the Carolina jasmine prefers areas of full sun. Prune when the plant finishes flowering to maintain a controlled shape and encourage fullness in the lower areas of the stem.

- Confederate jasmine is easy to grow in partial to full sun. Also known as star jasmine, these plants produce small white, star shaped blooms. Confederate jasmine can grow to more than 20 feet long if left unpruned! With a bit of attention, however, it can be shaped and pinching off the tips of the vines will encourage fuller growth.

- Mandevilla vines grow quickly and produce pink, red, or white flowers from spring through fall. These fragrant blooms have five petals and sometimes feature a yellow center. Mandevilla loves the Florida sunshine but may need shade during the hottest part of the day. Add these plants to your landscape to encourage hummingbirds to visit!

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
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

largest species of turtle in the world. Including flippers, they can be upwards of seven feet across and just as long. They can also weigh more than 2,000 pounds.

Leatherbacks are relatively rare for Northeast Florida. Our beaches see fewer leatherback nests because the species tend to nest in warmer climates. According to Meers, in 2024 the entire state of Florida only saw 1,799 leatherback nests, compared to more than 110,000 loggerhead nests, which are the state's most common species.

The last leatherback nest Mickler's Landing Turtle Patrol documented near Mickler Beach was June of 2023 and before that was June of 2020.

"We're seeing nests occurring earlier than May 1 and nests hatchling later than Oct. 31," Meers said. "Because of this, we begin monitoring our beaches on April 15 to document and monitor new nests. For any nest that remains on the beach past Oct. 31, we continue to monitor until they hatch."

The leatherback nest was discovered by Ponte Vedra Beach resident Nancy Marin, who regularly walks the beach and alerted Meers and his team when she spotted the tracks.

Experts at Mickler's Landing Turtle Patrol can categorize the sea turtle species that laid the nest thanks to tracks the animals leave behind in the sand. Leatherbacks crawl with a simultaneous gait (moving all flippers at the same time) and also leave a much larger track in the sand.

In the Northeast Florida region, all sea turtle nests are marked and recorded, as required by protocols set forth by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

Meers has volunteered with Mickler Landing Turtle Patrol for 15 years, patrolling the beaches every season for the telltale signs that a female turtle has chosen a location for her nest.

The group began as what Meers describes as a "rag-tag group of volunteers" and has since evolved into a bustling organization. The group is excited to announce that they recently signed a partnership with Jacksonville University's Marine Science Research Institute to provide opportunities for JU students to get involved in patrols and expand additional research on sea turtles and their relationship with our community.

"Building and gaining trust with the community is crucial, and we are building upon that trust with our community here in Ponte Vedra Beach," Meers said. "We are grateful for our relationships with our community because it truly takes a community to help turtles."

If you spot a sea turtle laying eggs on the beach, Meers says to "absolutely admire it, take pictures and videos, but do so from afar." The organization recommends staying about 50 feet from a nesting female, so as not to frighten her or cause her to exert excess energy.

During nesting season, beachgoers are encouraged to keep the beach "clean, dark and flat," and text (not call) the Mickler Landing Turtle Patrol phone number at 904-370-3704 if they spot a turtle or active nest.

Groundbreaking AI tool generates 3D map of the brain

It is a detailed view of the brain like never seen before.

In a significant technological leap, University of Florida researchers have created a powerful new computational and artificial intelligence tool that can generate a high-resolution 3D map of the brain in mice, allowing users to zoom in and out — from all angles, like a Google Earth map — and peer into the full set of molecules that produce energy for brain functions.

This new tool, funded by research grants from the National Institutes of Health, brings scientists one step closer to a more comprehensive understanding of the role of metabolism in Alzheimer's disease and other neurodegenerative disorders. It could open a new array of possibilities to discover targeted treatments.

Reporting in the journal *Nature Metabolism*, a research team led by Ramon Sun, Ph.D., detailed how they developed their groundbreaking MetaVision3D tool using UF's HiPerGator supercomputer. As a proof of principle, they generated a 3D-interactive atlas of the brain in both normal mice and mouse models of Alzheimer's and Pompe disease, a rare genetic disorder. Sun's lab has made its database and web server publicly accessible to support the growing field of scientists studying links between metabolism and the mind.

"Using our methodology, we can map thousands of molecules in the brain and precisely where they are located inside each brain region. It is unprecedented," said Sun, director of the Center for Advanced Spatial Biomolecule Research and associate director for innovation of UF's McKnight Brain Institute. "We couldn't have done it without NIH funding. This funding fuels our efforts to uncover metabolic drivers of Alzheimer's and pave the way for new interventions to prevent and treat this devastating disease."

Online users may explore each section of tissue in the 3D reconstruction, which illuminates nuanced complexities not visible in conventional 2D maps, providing new insights into cellular metabolism — influenced by diet, exercise and genetics — as well as into disease mechanisms.

"On Google Earth, I can zoom in on a city and see what a house looks like, what the street looks like, what cars are there. That's the level of resolution we provided



for the mouse brain in this three-dimensional space, and how they change during diseases," said Sun, also an associate professor in the Department of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology in the UF College of Medicine, part of UF Health. "You can explore and examine molecules that influence thinking, memory and brain health, including those involved in neurodegenerative diseases. You can map all the different molecules and how they are organized and distributed in fine brain structures."

To achieve the jump from 2D representations to 3D, which Sun likened to the technological jump from a flip phone to a smartphone, his lab scanned 79 brain sections one thin layer at a time using a high-tech imaging machine that identifies and counts molecules such as fats and carbohydrates, essential nutrients for brain function.

"Then we used AI to align those images and stack them together to reconstruct the whole brain metabolome," said Xin Ma, a first author of the paper and doctoral student in biostatistics who is mentored by Sun

and Li Chen, Ph.D. The metabolome is the collection of thousands of molecules that make energy for the brain to function.

As the next step, with Sara Burke, Ph.D., director of UF's Center for Cognitive Aging and Memory Clinical Translational Research, they mapped the anatomy to correlate with the molecules and used mathematical methods to verify accuracy from 95% to 99%, Sun said.

Going forward, researchers could integrate the map-making tool with established MRI imaging and genetic analyses to work toward developing treatments that target precise areas of the brain, in contrast to current treatments that can also affect nondiseased parts of the brain.

"For disease prevention and treatment, we have opened a new angle for biologists to study," said Chen, a co-corresponding author of the paper and an associate professor in the UF College of Public Health and Health Professions' Department of Biostatistics.

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
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
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Baptist Health first in Florida to participate in new brain fluid clinical trial

Baptist Health's commitment to advancing community health through innovative medical research is underscored by its participation in a new clinical study to evaluate the safety and effectiveness of a novel, minimally invasive investigational system to treat patients with normal pressure hydrocephalus.

The health system is the first in Florida, and second in the nation, to enroll patients in this cutting-edge research that could lead to less invasive procedures and improved outcomes for patients.

Normal pressure hydrocephalus, or NPH, is a buildup of cerebrospinal fluid in the brain. This excess fluid causes pressure on the brain, which can lead to neurological issues such as cognitive impairment (like dementia or memory loss), difficulty walking (gait disturbance) and issues with bladder control (incontinence). Only 20% of the estimated 800,000 adults in the U.S. with NPH are appropriately diagnosed due to the symptomatic similarities with other diseases such as Alzheimer's or Parkinson's. Since NPH primarily affects individuals aged 60 and older, these symptoms are also often wrongly attributed to normal signs of aging.

Over the last 70 years, the primary surgical treatment for NPH has been the ventriculo-peritoneal (VP) shunt. This procedure requires open-brain surgery in which a tube is inserted to drain excess fluid from the brain to the abdomen.

The STRIDE study compares the safety and effectiveness of the traditional VP shunt with the investigational

eShunt System.

This new, minimally invasive endovascular method involves inserting a much smaller shunt using a catheter from a vein in the patient's leg via a small incision. The eShunt implant drains cerebrospinal spinal fluid into the patient's venous system, allowing fluid in the brain to be absorbed by the body in a way that mimics the body's natural physiological process.

The new system allows for a minimally invasive treatment option, which could lead to quicker recovery times. Patients typically spend just one night in the hospital, with the potential for lower rates of infection and over

drainage, alleviating common problems seen with the traditional VP shunt.

Patients participating in the randomized trial will either be selected to receive the traditional VP shunt or the new shunt.

To participate in the trial, patients must meet the following criteria:

- Aged 60 or older
- Have had problems walking and take shuffling steps (small steps or slide their feet instead of lifting them) for three or more months
- Have at least two of the most common symptoms of NPH

"Normal pressure hydrocephalus is often difficult to diagnose, but having access to timely detection and prompt treatment can significantly enhance a patient's quality of life," said Dr. Ricardo Hanel, neurosurgeon and co-medical director of Baptist Stroke & Cerebrovascular Center, the only Joint Commission Certified Comprehensive Stroke Center in the greater Jacksonville region. "NPH is a reversible cause of dementia, and we are very excited to see improved opportunities for this patient population. By participating in this clinical study and others, we are exploring new treatment possibilities that have the power to transform the lives of our community and beyond."

The study is designed to support the device manufacturer's anticipated premarket approval submission to the FDA of the new shunt.



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
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Silent auction aims to end MS

Millennial lung health study begins recruiting in Jacksonville

The American Lung Association in Florida, Nemours Children's Health, Jacksonville and University of Florida have announced they are now accepting participants for a first-of-its-kind, large-scale study of millennial lung health. Nemours Children's and University of Florida are two of 35 sites across the country conducting this study.

The American Lung Association Lung Health Cohort Research Study will track 4,000 young adults (ages 25-35) at the age of peak lung health. Scientists across the country will follow these millennials for five years after their initial interviews to evaluate how their environment, lifestyle and physical activity habits affect respiratory health.

Millennials interested in participating can locate a site near them at Lung.org/Lung-Study.

"Historically, lung health has been studied only after the appearance of chronic lung disease," said Dr. Kathryn Blake, principal investigator for the Lung Health Cohort and director, Center for Pharmacogenom-

ics and Translational Research at Nemours Children's Health. "There is a critical need to better understand how a young adult's lung function declines over time. In addition, here in Florida, our residents face lung health threats like air quality impacts from climate change, teen vaping and a higher-than-average rate of new lung cancer cases. By studying the lung health of millennials in Florida, we can determine how these factors impact respiratory function and develop ways to prevent lung disease or catch it earlier."

Here are some details about the study:

- It will follow 4,000 young adults at the age of peak lung health, from 25 to 35 years old, in Jacksonville, as well as 35 other sites across the United States, painting a clear picture of lung health across geography and demography.

- Each participant will be tracked for five years on measures of lung function, respiratory symptoms and information including where they live, where and what they do for

work, as well as health behaviors, fitness, biomarkers and chest imaging.

- This study will use low-dose CT scans, which will show any signs of early or intermediate lung injury or abnormalities. Clinicians can use these to build a library of lung images in various stages of health and disease.

- The Lung Association's Airways Clinical Research Centers (ACRC) Network will conduct the research working closely with researchers at Nemours Children's Health and University of Florida. ACRC is the largest national nonprofit clinical network dedicated to asthma and COPD research.

The longitudinal study is made possible through a \$24.8 million grant from the National Institutes of Health. As the study continues, the goal is to renew the grant so scientists can continue to follow study participants for the rest of their lives.

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Book explores daily mission to find life's positivity when battling multiple cancers

Cancer is something that unfortunately most everyone knows at least someone who has been affected by it in some way or another, but for Linda Adams it has been a part of her world for much of her life.

So much so that she decided to write a short story about her journey in hopes of inspiring others to find the positives in life even when facing adversity is a daily experience.

It started with her mom, who had been a strong career-driven woman but found out that she had polycystic kidney disease and had to eventually stop working because the dialysis treatments she was on became too taxing on her.

"My mother was sick for most of my life," Adams said. "It got to the point where she would sneeze and break ribs."

Her mom died at 59 years old and shortly after Adams went in for a routine physical and that is when she found out that form of kidney disease was hereditary and had been passed down to her and eventually her brother as well.

"They estimated that at 40 years old my kidneys would fail, and it didn't mat-

ter what I did," Adams said.

She was put on a kidney transplant list and in 2009 she underwent surgery

that seemed to be successful but months later her body began eventually resisting the new kidney but after taking certain

medicine the process became a success once again.

Although she had been somewhat familiar with the disease from her mom's battle with it all those years, it was still an emotional shock to the system.

But she also remembered witnessing the strength her mom showed amid it all and strived to show that same resolve.

"I quickly realized that PKD was not just a burden to bear but a challenge to overcome," Adams said.

However, the adversity has not stopped there for Adams as on top of the polycystic kidney disease and kidney dialysis she has been faced with, she has also developed three forms of skin cancer; melanoma, basal cell carcinoma and squamous cell carcinoma since her kidney treatments began, as well as B and T cell lymphoma and Waldenstrom Syndrome, which is a rare type of blood cancer.

Most recently she started oral chemotherapy to help with the T cell lymphoma and she lives in a state of fatigue and nausea.

"I take it on Monday and don't feel good at all, and by the end of the week I'm starting to feel a little better by the weekend but then it's time to do it all over again," Adams said.

With all the waves of adversity she has dealt with for some time now she has also developed depression, and it is something that she fights with on a daily basis on top of everything else.

"I'm very honest and open about it in the book," she said. "I used to be a very social person, but now my life is more comfortable at home, and I don't go out except to go to doctors' offices."

She has started making it a point to spend time working out in her home garage because she used to be big into fitness and it allows her to rediscover the things she enjoyed doing prior to cancer forcing its way into her life.

The book is called "Live the dream-Battle the nightmare: My personal journey fighting 3 non-curable cancers,

kidney transplant and depression."

It can be purchased on www.amazon.com and is available in Kindle and paperback editions. Adams hopes to donate all the proceeds she makes from the book sales to nonprofit organizations aimed at helping those with cancer.

Invest more confidently in volatile markets

When financial markets fluctuate, perhaps in reaction to world events, inflation, or a change in interest rates, even the calmest investors can start to question their financial strategies.

But volatile markets can present opportunities to review and reaffirm investment strategies, says Tracie McMillion, head of global asset allocation strategy for Wells Fargo Investment Institute.

“Financial markets are frequently volatile — that’s their nature,” she says. “Even so, during periods of uncertainty, investors may start to question their investment decisions. Having a plan in place can provide the guard rails to help steer through and beyond the volatility.”

In addition to reaffirming and focusing on your plan, here are some strategies you can use to help weather economically turbulent times.



Match your investments to your time horizon

The simplest way to feel more comfortable about your investments is to align them with your financial calendar, no matter what happens in the financial world this month or year.

For example, do you need some of your money fairly soon or want it close at hand in case of an emergency? If so, McMillion says you should consider investments such

as cash holdings and short-term bonds that shouldn’t lose much, if any, value over the short term.

On the other hand, if you won’t need some of your investment money until you retire multiple years in the future, equities or longer-term bonds are worth a closer look. Those investments carry more risks but also offer potentially better returns.

Know what to expect from your investments

Some investors lose confidence because they don’t fully understand how their investments work. In that case, McMillion says, some knowledge of typical asset behavior is a good thing.

Consider reading up on different types of investments and asking questions of your financial adviser. Once you know how your investments are more likely to perform in certain financial markets, you can help ensure that your investment

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March sees rise in home sales, affordability, inventory

As temperatures start to rise in Northeast Florida, so do closed sales and new listings. Following seasonal trends, the housing market sees an increase in inventory as well as sales, continuing the upturn that began last month after the winter months brought lower numbers. Additionally, home prices showed a rise in affordability, which is a welcome change for buyers.

The median sales price for single-family homes in Northeast Florida's six-county region decreased by 1.8% since February, dropping to \$379,995. This caused the Home Affordability Index to rise to a score of 69, a 3% increase from February.

"While interest rates remain in line with pre-COVID levels, today's higher home prices have become the new normal," said 2025 NEFAR President, Mario Gonzalez. "Recent price dips have sparked renewed buyer interest, with a noticeable jump in showing requests and open house traffic."

In March, closed sales for single-family homes rose by 35.7% month-over-month, totaling 1,784 transactions, while pending sales were at 1,514. New listings rose noticeably by 10.6% from February to March, recording 3,656 homes.

Since February, the active inventory of single-family homes increased by 10.2% to 8,258 properties. However, this is a drastic increase from the previous year, as the number of properties has grown exponentially by 63.3% since March 2024. This rise in inventory from 2024 is a positive change for buyers, as they have many options to choose from. The median number of days on the market increased to 43 days, a 19.4% increase from February, indicating homes selling slightly slower than they did last month.



"Spring is shaping up to be a strong season for buyers. With more homes hitting the market, there's greater choice and sellers are more flexible on price, terms, and repairs," said Gonzalez.

In St. Johns County, the March 2025 median price for single-family homes did not change, sitting at \$549,000. Median days on the market rose 47.2% from February to 53. Closed sales increased by 34.3 to 415, with pending sales now at 339. New listings rose by 6.7% to 889, while active inventory increased by 14.2% to 2,258 homes, representing a 5.4-month supply. The Home Affordability Index rose slightly to 48, though St. Johns County remains the most expensive county in the region.

In Duval County, March showed a 3.6% decrease since February in the median price of single-family homes, now at \$320,000. Sales of homes decreased in speed in March, with the median days on the market rising 4.5% to 35 days. While closed sales rose 38.7% to 967, pending sales were at 772. Notably, new listings increased 12.3% to 1,945. Meanwhile, there was a

10.8% climb in active inventory, now at 4,019 homes, a 4.2-month supply. The Home Affordability Index increased since February by 5.1% to 82.

The Home Affordability Index measures housing affordability for the region. In other words, it measures whether a typical family earns enough to qualify for a mortgage on a typical home, based on current interest rates, median income and median home prices.

A higher number means greater affordability. This index measures affordability factors for all homebuyers making a 20% downpayment. An index of 100 is defined as the point where a median-income family has the exact amount of income needed to purchase a median-priced existing home. An index value over 100 means that the family has more than enough income, while a value below 100 means that a family doesn't have enough income to qualify for a mortgage loan.

strategy is in line with your tolerance for risk.

Tune out the noise

By "noise," McMillion means the constant barrage of financial reports and other news events from the 24/7 news media. "Investors usually don't need to react to the everyday financial news, no matter how topsy-turvy things may seem," she says. Keep your long-term goal in mind.

Regularly revisit your plan

There's no such thing as a completely set-it-and-forget-it investment strategy, McMillion says. It's always smart to check in regularly with your investment adviser.

Tom Nagata was in attendance as the gallery’s April artist of the month.


“When you look around, these artists are just amazing,” Nagata said. “No two artists in this gallery see the world the

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Scenic plates revisited

Contemporary artist gives vintage ceramics a modern twist

“American Scenery and Souvenirs: Transferware by Paul Scott” highlights the work of artist Paul Scott, whose familiar-looking, blue-and-white ceramics subvert traditional tableware motifs with scenes from life in America today. The exhibition will open at the Lightner Museum on April 24 and run through Oct. 27.

In the 19th century, blue-and-white transferware plates depicting American scenery, cities and iconic landmarks were mass-produced by potteries in Staffordshire, England, for export to the United States. By the start of the 20th century, these works became immensely popular collectibles, cherished by the American middle class as souvenirs of travel and experience. The collecting mania generated a new wave of souvenir transferwares imported by companies including Rowland and Marsellus, Jon Roth and Jones, and McDuffee and Stratton.

A British artist with an international reputation, Scott uses traditional designs associated with mass produced domestic tableware and alters them to comment on modern society.

“My work references and updates the original transferware created by British factories

in the 19th and early 20th centuries,” Scott explained. “During my research trips across the U.S., I became acutely aware of the stark contrast between the idealized imagery of early transferware and the contemporary landscape I was experiencing.”

In “American Scenery and Souvenirs,” nuclear power plants, decaying urban centers, abandoned industrial sites, wildfires and border walls intrude amidst the traditionally bucolic landscape. These provocative scenes transform the picturesque aesthetic associated with American transferware, challenging the viewer to reconsider the nation’s environmental and social realities.

The exhibition at the Lightner Museum presents Scott’s plates, platters and jugs alongside vintage ceramics from the Lightner Museum’s collection.

“The exhibition provides a unique opportunity to showcase parts of the Lightner collection in a new context,” said David Bagnall, executive director of the Lightner Museum. “The transferware plates in our collection were originally collected and displayed to memorialize personal travels and experiences. When paired with Paul Scott’s work, they spark a dialogue between the past and present — between the romanticized views of the 19th and early 20th centuries and America today.”

Scott’s works are held in numerous

museum collections and have been exhibited widely across Europe and the United States. He is represented in the United States by Ferrin Contemporary.

“American Scenery and Souvenirs: Transferware by Paul Scott” is presented at the Lightner Museum by the Community Foundation for Northeast Florida. Additional support comes from the St. Johns County Tourist Development Council and the St. Johns Cultural Council.

Comeback win thrusts Sharks into district championship

The Ponte Vedra Sharks are one win away from a district baseball title after the Sharks stormed back to defeat the Orange Park High Raiders 10-7 in a semifinal matchup and will face tournament host Englewood High in the District 4-5A Championship on Thursday, April 17, at 6 p.m.

The Sharks had high hopes coming into the tournament as the top seed but quickly found themselves down 5-1 after the first inning.

However, the Sharks remained calm and showcased the poise and approach that helped guide them to a 13-9 regular season record by slowly chipping away at the deficit.

They responded to the early onslaught with two runs in the second inning, one more in the third, four in the fourth and a couple in the fifth to shift the momentum in their favor.

The comeback bid was made complete during the four-run fourth inning, which was fueled by clutch hits by senior Cole Rambler and sophomore Caleb Stanton.

Rambler doubled in the frame, which set a school record for doubles in a career with 18. He also had a team-high three RBIs.

Rambler was one of four Sharks to double on the night, including Stanton, Jack Brady and Luca Candella.

Aspen McAdoo slammed the door on a potential Raiders' rally of their own as he came in after they cut the Sharks' lead to one but he wound up shutting them out from there to earn the save.

The Sharks wound up outhitting the Raiders 11-9 in the contest which allowed them to overcome a couple of fielding errors.

Sophomore C.J. McKenzie got the win for the Sharks with a solid outing where he struck out eight batters over four-plus innings of work.

Englewood won a pitcher's duel, 2-1, over Beachside in the other semifinal matchup and the No. 2-seeded Rams face off against the Sharks in the district championship for an automatic bid into the postseason.

The Nease Panthers lost in the semifinal of their district tournament 3-0 to top-seeded Fletcher and the Panthers wrapped up the season with a record of 9-17.

"We are so appreciative of the support from Mayor Deegan and the City Council as UNF Esports is poised to transform Jacksonville into a premier center for digital innovation and gaming," said UNF President Moez Limayem. "This is a significant milestone for our university and the entire community. We couldn't be more excited about the opportunity to enhance innovative technology in our region."

The esports industry, projected to grow to more than \$6.3 billion by 2030, goes far beyond gaming and will have a direct impact on the future of Jacksonville's workforce. The Flight Deck aligns with UNF's strategy to grow enrollment rapidly to serve the workforce needs of Jacksonville. UNF graduates have a direct impact on the state economy, with 80% of UNF grads staying in Florida and 70% staying in Northeast Florida.

The space will include 42 high-performance PC gaming stations; a built-in competition stage for live tournaments and team play; a broadcast studio space for live streaming, shoutcasting and content production; a flexible console play zone for casual and console-based gaming; and it will include event integration for seamless connection to the adjacent auditorium for spectator seating and large-scale events.
