



Nease, Ponte Vedra High students selected as National Merit Scholars

Two students at Allen D. Nease High School and one student at Ponte Vedra High School have been selected as National Merit Scholars.

Nease students Ava Hampton and Malavika Nair each earned the designation, as did Ponte Vedra High School student Adam Snowden. All three students received a \$2,500 scholarship from the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

The students were among 2,500 Merit Scholar designees selected from more than 15,000 finalists in the 2017 National Merit Scholarship Program. National Merit scholarship recipients are those finalists in each state judged to have the strongest combination of accomplishment, skills and potential for success in college studies. The number of winners named in each state is proportional to the state's percentage of the nation's graduating high school seniors.

Scholars were selected by a committee of college admissions officers and high school counselors, who assessed finalists' academic records, an essay written by the finalist and recommendations by a high school official.

This year's National Merit Scholarship Program began in October 2015, when more than 1.6 million juniors in more than 22,000 high schools took the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®), which served as an initial screen of program entrants. Last fall, the highest-scoring participants in each state, representing less than 1 percent of the nation's high school seniors, were named semi-finalists on a state-representational basis

From the semifinalist group, some 15,000 students met the high academic standards and other requirements to advance to the finalist level of the competition.

Kohnke: Don't blame Nocatee for traffic woes

Where are all those people I hear are overwhelming us in Ponte Vedra coming from?

Let's look.

First, let's look at the number of cars that travel in-bound to Ponte Vedra and Ponte Vedra Beach. According to an analysis of FDOT and transportation statistics, 7 percent (3,500 cars) of the average daily traffic in a 24-hour period on A1A comes from the south. From the Palm Valley Bridge, there

are 10,525 or 22 percent (half of that comes from US1). The JTB ramp brings 13,000 or 28 percent. A1A from Jacksonville Beach: 20,250 or 43 percent.

The vast majority, at 71 percent, is driving into PV from the north Beaches and/or JTB. And you have 29 percent coming in from the south and west. Some of these are pass throughs from A1A South and Nocatee Parkway – that's the old 210 – because A1A is a faster route to get to Butler and the Beaches.

Next, let's look at who works here. We have four large schools that employ about 324 people. Of those, 104 reside outside Ponte Vedra. We have golf courses, clubs and hotels. The Ponte Vedra Inn and Club

has two golf courses and employs about 600 people. The PGA Tour has two courses and the Sawgrass Marriott has two courses and a club. Then we also have Marsh Landing and Players Club.

Now look at the number of restaurants, stores of every kind and office buildings – plus all the lawn people who keep the yards up, the cleaning people who keep us tidy and many more not mentioned.

We are a great employment mecca. We are bringing all those people here.

Many of these workers don't live in Ponte Vedra or Ponte Vedra Beach. They can't afford it. Nor do most of them live in Nocatee. Again, not affordable, with an average price of around \$400,000 a house. Further, the biggest place to live in Nocatee is Del Webb. Mostly retired people.

These working people come to us from the north and west – always have and always will.

Nocatee is not bringing us all these people. Some come to us via Nocatee Parkway; most come from the west and north. All those other people on the road live here and are going to work or wherever.

Now, if you want those people not to come, then I guess you've got to do the work yourselves. See, it's a lot more fun to complain when you don't have the facts. You asked them to come help us. Guess what? They did.

When interviewed, Jed Davis stated,

"We as a family try to be good citizens of Jacksonville."

Please try harder. With approximately 27,000 acres owned by the family, could not more roads on open land be constructed

to and from Nocatee to reach other highways?

A1A in St. Johns County is a way of life for thousands living off A1A. A beach community should never become a major

highway. Please don't allow this to happen. Do the right thing as a good, caring citizen.

Cultural center receives \$25,000 matching grant for 'Sound Connections' program

The Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach has received a \$25,000 matching grant challenge for "Sound Connections," the center's music therapy outreach program that serves children with special needs in three Ponte Vedra elementary schools.

Established by the Persbacker-Wyman Family Foundation, the matching gift is aimed at sparking community support for the program. The cultural center is now challenging the community to help raise \$50,000 to sustain this outreach program for the 2017-2018 school year at Ocean Palms and PVPV/Rawlings elementary schools as well as Valley Ridge Academy. From now until Dec. 1, every contribution of \$50 or more will be matched dollar for dollar up to \$25,000 to help the center achieve its \$50,000 goal.

The center's board-certified music therapists, Minda Gordon and Candice Sirak, use music to promote learning and skill acquisition at selected public schools in St. Johns County. Music therapy uses music as the therapeutic stimulus to achieve treatment goals. The practice has shown correlation to speech, singing, rhythm and motor behavior, memory for song and academic material and an overall ability to enhance mood, attention and behavior.

Community PedsCare children, families enjoy day at THE PLAYERS

THE PLAYERS and EverBank contribute \$60,000 to organization

Children and families from Community PedsCare enjoyed a morning of games and a visit from PGA Tour players last week at TPC Sawgrass, as the PGA Tour Wives Association, the Jim & Tabitha Furyk Foundation and THE PLAYERS Championship hosted them for the annual "These Kids Can Play" event.

Held during the May 9 practice round prior to the tournament, the event was intended to serve as a fun-filled distraction for the kids, many of whom are dealing with life-limiting or life-threatening injuries and diseases. The morning concluded with THE PLAYERS Championship and event sponsor EverBank each presenting donations of \$30,000 to Community PedsCare. Tabitha Furyk, who served as the event's chairperson, said following the check presentation that they are just

"It's so special for these families that have come year after year," she said with a tear in her eye. "You think about the challenges they deal with every day, and the fact that you can put something together like this that's so special is really quite an honor to be able to do."

Face painting, selfies with Ponte Vedra High School drama students dressed as superheroes, animals from the Jacksonville Zoo and a simulation of TPC Sawgrass' 17th island hole were among the activities and attractions enjoyed by the children and their families at the event's 18 different "holes" or stations. While immersed in the fun, attendees also had the opportunity to meet PGA Tour players Jim Furyk and Kevin Kisner, as well as the wives of many other players who helped orchestrate the event.

"The PGA Tour Wives Association's mission is to help needy children and their families," said Jennifer Perry, executive director of the organization. "In the different tournament markets around the country, that's what we try and do, and this is very near and dear to our heart "

Kristen Monger, who attended the event with her disabled son and daughter, said the event provides her children with a day away from the doctor and the ultimate stress that often characterizes their lives. As for Community PedsCare, she said the program is a "life support" for her family.

Run by Community Hospice & Palliative Care, Community PedsCare provides pediatric, palliative hospice services to approximately 165 children in the Northeast Florida area. Established in 2001, it is one of only a few community pediatric programs in the nation. Working in collaboration with Wolfson Children's Hospital, Nemours Children's Specialty Care and the University of Florida-Jacksonville, Community PedsCare provides kids and their families with support as the children progress through different levels of care settings, with services including counseling and spiritual support, music and pet therapy, parent support groups, respite care and more.

Community Hospice & Palliative Care Vice President of Community Engagement John Erstling explained that the annual event at THE PLAYERS Championship provides the children with exposure to the game of golf, which is an opportunity he said they may not otherwise have. Overall, he said These Kids Can Play is one of the more exciting events of the year for the children, allowing them to simply play and be like their

"Whatever it is they're battling, either medically or clinically, that's a nuisance for them," said Erstling. "This event is just a great time to see them behaving like kids. It's a celebration."

What's an average day like for you in your work for the **PGA Tour?**

As a digital producer and host for the PGA Tour, each day is different. I host digital shows, produce content for our social media channels and help maintain our website. Sometimes that includes me providing analysis and commentary for live, on-site content and other days I am locked into our website making sure all our content is promoted in the best way possible. There is no such thing as an average day for PGA Tour Digital (which is awesome).

How did you become interested in sports and golf in particular?

My love for sports began when I lived in Knoxville, Tennessee. Despite being a University of Florida graduate, I grew up a Tennessee Volunteer watching the women's basketball team three-peat in the National Championship and cheering on Peyton Manning as our QB. I became hooked on golf when my family moved to Ponte Vedra Beach in 1997 and started coming to THE PLAYERS Championship. I saw Freddie Couples put it straight in the hole on 17 from the drop zone after dunking his first shot in the water in 1999. I was immediately hooked.

What's the most challenging part of covering the PGA Tour? The most rewarding?

The digital landscape is constantly changing, which requires a lot of thinking ahead and preparing for the unexpected while covering the Tour. My job is completely different than it was a year ago. That is definitely the most rewarding part – a constant challenge and opportunity to do things that have never been done before. The most challenging part is battling the elements on site! I swear I'm a magnet for the rain. It poured on me in the desert at Palm Springs this year and that's when I knew I was basically Johnny Raincloud.

Tell us about The Daily Rally, the newsletter you started with your sister.

The Daily Rally is a daily sports email newsletter that gives you a rundown of everything that happened in sports the previous day so you can be well-informed and out the door. It focuses on both on- and off-the-field stories from all sports and will hopefully make you laugh while getting you caught up on the sports news of the day. The Daily Rally is for all audiences – from the casual sports fan to the die-hard, lifelong fan. Bonus: You can read it in under five minutes! Sign up at thedailyrally.

What do you enjoy most about living on the First Coast?

I've lived in Ponte Vedra Beach since I was 5 years old, with the exception of my time in Gainesville at UF. It has been amazing to watch it grow into the city it is today. My family is here and I absolutely cherish this place. There is so much to do and it truly will always be home, no matter where life takes me.

How do you spend your free time?

I work a lot, and a lot of weird hours on the weekends, so free time is hard to come by sometimes! I enjoy taking



Fans pack the TPC Sawgrass 17th hole at Military Appreciation Day, Sam Hunt concert

Soon after fans watched the American flag unfurled upon TPC Sawgrass' iconic island green and the Florida Air National Guard roar through the sky, General Ray Odierno reminded the crowd surrounding the 17th hole just how lucky they are to be Americans.

"There is nothing like this great country," said Odierno, who served as the

38th Chief of Staff of the Army. "We're here today to honor those who are willing to sacrifice anything to protect what this country stands for: delivering freedom and liberty to its people."

Odierno was one of the speakers at the May 9 ceremony that capped off THE PLAYERS Championship's ninth annual Military Appreciation Day, which also featured a concert from Grammy Award-

nominated country artist Sam Hunt. Representatives from all branches of the military attended the event, with several marching into place at the beginning of the ceremony as "God Bless America" reverberated across the golf course. NBC sportscaster Dan Hicks, who has broadcast THE PLAYERS Championship the past 10 years, emceed the evening.

PGA Tour Commissioner Jay Monahan thanked the tournament's sponsors, partners and volunteers, and also recognized the military members and veterans who he said are central to the PGA Tour's mission.

"There's no better way for us to come together than to be here on the 17th hole, with this spectacular weather, to honor our men and women in uniform," he said. Monahan succeeded former Commissioner Tim Finchem in January.

Odierno asked fans to remember those deployed in harm's way and their families, as they enjoy the competition and amenities of the tournament. The general, who retired from the Army in 2015 after more than 40 years of service, also extended his gratitude to the PGA Tour for supporting and recognizing the military.

Per the annual tradition of including a PGA Tour player in the ceremony, Northern Ireland native and 2010 U.S. Open Champion Graeme McDowell told the crowd you don't need to be born in the United States to appreciate the prowess of its military.

McDowell concluded the ceremony by recognizing Sergeant Thomas Allen,

a Clearwater native and Purple Heart recipient who was medically discharged from the Army after injuring his head, neck and back in an IED explosion in Afghanistan. McDowell surprised Allen by announcing that he'd be receiving \$5,000 toward child care expenses, a \$2,000 gift card to Rooms To Go and most significantly, a paid off mortgage, thanks to THE PLAYERS Championship, the Military Warriors Support Foundation and Wells Fargo. A speechless Allen said it was the biggest honor of his life to serve in the Army.

Following the ceremony, Sam Hunt played an hour of his hits, including his latest single "Body Like a Backroad," as well as older songs "Leave the Night On," "Take Your Time" and "House Party." Hunt also performed a few country covers, including Thomas Rhett's "T-Shirt" and Dierks Bentley's "Somewhere on a Beach." The country artist received a roar of applause and cheers when he recognized the military throughout the show.

"We're going to celebrate our American freedom!" exclaimed Hunt, as the red, white and blue seen around the 17th hole shined amid the setting sun.



Pro golfers share breakfast, faith with local youth

When PGA Tour golfer Wesley Bryan was growing up, he said his father used to have to drag him to church.

"I thought I knew a lot about Jesus," Bryan told local youth golfers last week at the annual FCA Golf Jax "THE PLAYERS Breakfast with the Pros." "I thought he was like this 'Get Out of Jail Free' card. But I didn't have a relationship with him."

Bryan credited the Christian fellowship and camaraderie he experienced as a teen and through playing golf with helping him develop and deepen that relationship. So much so, in fact, that when he achieved his first PGA Tour victory last month at the RBC Heritage in his native South Carolina, Bryan said he was less focused on his victory than on the greater victory celebrated on that day -Easter Sunday.

"I want this day to be as little about me as possible and more about our savior who came out of the tomb," Bryan told sportscasters Nick Faldo and Jim Nantz that day. "It was so special to get it done on such a special day."

Bryan was one of several professional golfers to share his faith with several hundred young golfers at the breakfast, held May 10 at the Sawgrass Marriott in conjunction with THE PLAYERS Championship. Tournament Chairman Kevin English welcomed students and shared a passage of scripture, stressing the important role faith plays in THE PLAY-ERS Championship and its 2,000 volunteers.

'We couldn't do what we do without the Lord shining down on the volunteers," English said. "He enables us to not just put on a golf tournament. He enables us to change people's lives. And we do that every vear by giving back millions of dollars to local

Building a foundation

Several of the pros present credited FCA golf programs with helping them keep the sport in proper perspective.

"Golf is so often inner focused," said Patrick Lamb, who noted that he first got involved with FCA at a youth golf camp in St. Augustine's World Golf Village. "It's an individual sport, and it's often easy to be so self-centered that you kind of lose sight of what's going on around you."

Connecting with other Christian golfers while on the road, Lamb said, has both helped him personally and inspired him to remain involved with FCA Golf

"It's a great way to introduce (kids) to the most important thing they'll ever know in their life," he said, "and that's Jesus."

Pro Aaron Baddeley agreed. "FCA's such a great program," he said. "It gives you that platform, a foundation you can build your life upon. It teaches you that Christianity isn't this weird thing. The gospel really, truly changes

Golfer Kevin Streelman meanwhile said the positive impact of FCA Golf inspired him to help create the GAMEDAY program, which enables kids to walk the golf course with pros who share their faith.

"We all have a platform, and one day God is going to ask us what we did with the platform He gave us," Streelman said. "I want to use my platform for more than making money and taking home trophies."

Streelman said his faith keeps him from losing sight of what's truly important in life.

"I always thought once I got on the PGA Tour, that would be it," Streelman said. "Then it was, 'Oh, I want to keep my card the next year.' Then it was, 'I want a win.' Then another win.

"There's always going to be something else if you don't have a foundation of something eternal," he told the young golfers. "God's love and eternal grace - that's a foundation you can build your life on."





Special needs children learn to golf at Tesori Family Foundation clinic at Sawgrass Country Club

PGA Tour player Jordan Spieth makes special appearance

For the second consecutive year, the Tesori Family Foundation hosted a group of local special needs children and their families for a golf clinic at Sawgrass Country Club that included a special demonstration from PGA Tour player Jordan Spieth.

A field of 25 "VIPs" participated in the All-Star Kids Clinic, which was held May 10 on the eve of the opening round of THE PLAYERS Championship. A total of 175 people, including family members, volunteers, partners and sponsors, attended. Among the volunteers were coaches from The First Tee of North Florida and eight PGA Tour caddies, including Paul Tesori himself, who is the caddie for Webb Simpson and a former PGA Tour player and St. Augustine native.

"The joy that you young people bring – the happiness, the strength – is something so beautiful," said Tesori at the beginning of the event. He and his wife Michelle, who now live in Nocatee, started the golf clinics for special needs kids in 2014 after their son Isaiah was born with Down syndrome. Before Ponte Vedra, the clinics were held at the Grandover Resort in Greensboro, North Carolina, the site of the Wyndham Championship.

Spieth kicked off last week's clinic by demonstrating the five main shots of golf: a hook, draw, straight shot, fade and slice. As he sent balls sailing high, low, left and right down the driving range, he discussed the pros and cons of the shots, as well as the strategies behind them.


Spieth, whose younger sister Ellie has learning disabilities, seemed to enjoy himself just as much as the kids. At one point, he turned to the crowd of children and asked which shot they wanted to see next. A girl pointed her finger high in the sky, which prompted the 23-year-old golf phenom to shoot a vertical bomber toward the clouds, eliciting "oohs" and "ahs" from the kids.

"If there's any way that any of us can bring more happiness to our already extremely smiling kids, then it's a no brainer," said Spieth about attending the clinic. "The happiness that's displayed is second to none."

After Spieth's demonstration, the children were divided by age group and partnered with a coach for the evening. The groups proceeded to rotate through 15- to 20-minute sessions on putting, chipping and driving, which to the enjoyment of the kids, included using the automated ball teeing system known as Power Tee.

Following the clinic, the Tesoris presented awards and prizes to each of the participants and then sent them in golf carts to Sawgrass Beach Club, where they enjoyed an all-you-can-eat pizza party.

Ponte Vedra resident Van Kerner attended the event with her special needs son Jack. She learned about the clinic last year after reading about it in the Recorder and wanted to make sure he could attend this year. Unfortunately, she remembered to sign up a bit too

Stryker donates \$20,000 to K9s for Warriors at THE PLAYERS Championship

As part of Military Appreciation Day at THE PLAYERS Championship last week, medical technology and equipment company Stryker awarded a \$20,000 donation to K9s for Warriors for the sponsorship of a service dog.

Meg Smith, vice president of clinical/quality/regulatory affairs for Stryker, presented the donation and a black and gold Stryker vest to K9s for Warriors President Brett Simon at a special ceremony held at the Birdies for the Brave Patriots' Outpost.

"Stryker has a long history of supporting our nation's military," said Smith during the May 9 ceremony. "Our relationship with K9s for Warriors reaffirms our commitment to the health and wellbeing of our veterans."

The contribution marks Stryker's second \$20,000 donation of the year to the local nonprofit. Since 2015, Stryker has sponsored eight service dogs for K9s for Warriors, totaling more than \$160,000 in support. In addition, the company has donated \$10,000 in proceeds from the sales of Stryker hats worn by PGA Tour and Champions Tour players Fred Funk and Hal Sutton to the nonprofit. Stryker offers an array of products and services in the areas

of orthopedics, medical and surgical, neurotechnology and spine.

Simon said the Stryker donations are used to fund dog food, veterinary care, equipment and the hours that are poured into training the dogs and the warriors

Based in Nocatee, K9s for Warriors trains and pairs rescued service dogs with military veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), traumatic brain injury and/or military sexual trauma as a result of military service post-9/11.

The organization was started in 2011 after Simon, a former police officer and bomb dog handler in Iraq and Afghanistan, returned home with extreme PTSD. Simon's mother, Shari Duval, noticed he was only comfortable around dogs and surmised that service dogs may be the treatment veterans need. The nonprofit has since rescued 500 animals from shelters, ultimately graduating more than 300 service dog teams from its three-week training program. Simon said each of the organization's corporate sponsors has helped in accomplishing these feats, but Stryker has gone above and beyond in doing so.

"What they've done for us has been instrumental in keeping our mission

late and was added to the clinic's waiting list, which typically is more than 30 kids deep. A slot opened for Jack, however, and he was able to attend after all

"He's been grinning from ear to ear," said Kerner about her son. "He couldn't wait until today. For him to feel like he can do something that evervone else does means a lot.'

Founded in 2009, the Tesori Family Foundation supports more than 20 local and national nonprofits throughout the year. In addition to supporting the special needs community, the foundation

benefits the elderly and the homeless, as well as many other groups in need.

When Michelle Tesori took a moment to reflect on the clinic, a few tears streamed down her face as she remarked how glad she was to be wearing sunglasses on that particular day.

"I think the joy that we see here exemplifies everything that we get to experience every day with our child in ways that we had no idea our lives would be positively impacted when he was born," she said.

Increase in Alzheimer's funding offers hope

These are times when it's exceptionally hard to make sense of what is happening in our government. It's even harder to find a silver lining. But, there are glimmering slivers of hope this month and a reason to cautiously celebrate some victories in our legislature.

Congress included a \$400 million increase in Alzheimer's research funding at the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and is expected to approve it this week. With this action, Alzheimer's research funding by the federal government will reach nearly \$1.4 billion. This nearly threefold increase over five years in NIH

funding for Alzheimer's disease is a monumental accomplishment and a bipartisan effort. Most importantly, it provides Alzheimer's researchers with the resources they so urgently need to one day prevent, treat and hopefully cure Alzheimer's – the sixth leading cause of death in our country and the only top 10 leading cause of death without a prevention, treatment or cure.

Alzheimer's currently has a hold of 5.4 million Americans and 520,000 Floridians according to the Alzheimer's Association Facts and Figures Report released in March of this year. State estimates suggest approximately 31,000 residents of Northeast Florida are living with Alzheimer's. These statistics place our state and our communities at "ground zero" for this

healthcare epidemic.

With crises like these in our families, our districts and our country, there aren't many people thanking members of Congress these days. So, it's important to take a moment out when something splendid happens in Washington. Congressman Al Lawson, a new member of Congress for Florida District 5, really listened to his constituents and immediately asked to become a champion of the Alzheimer's effort by joining the Alzheimer's Congressional Bipartisan Task Force, co-sponsoring the Palliative Care and Hospice Education Act (PCHETA) Bill and supporting a vital research funding increase during a volatile and pivotal congressional budget process. Knowing that African Americans

are twice as likely to develop Alzheimer's and that women make up two-thirds of the population living with the disease, he moved quickly with his support.

In the face of what feels like a lot of losses in our government, this unprecedented and generous collaboration celebrates a "win" for American health care. There is much more to accomplish in the world of Alzheimer's and dementia, but today, many thanks to Congressman Lawson for propelling us further down the path to one day end this disease.

Improve your retirement with exercise tips

Your golden years are certainly a time to slow down and enjoy life, but that doesn't mean you have to decrease your activity level. According to AARP, 60 percent of people ages 64 and older are considered sedentary, yet this age group can gain major health benefits from exercise. All

The CDC has found regular exercise improves bone strength, heart health, mood and stamina while also preventing chronic disease and lowering the chance of injury. maintain their independence by reducing the risk of falling and fracturing bones. Many older adults avoid exercise because they are worried it will cause further injury. While the body does take longer to repair itself when older, the benefits of exercise far outweigh the risks.

Best practices for exercising

If you're an older adult ready to exercise more, here are some tips to help:

Modify exercises. Plan to alter exercises to put less strain on your body and meet your unique needs. Many exercises can be modified so you can do them from a chair. If getting down on the floor is difficult for you, keep in mind that any floor exercise can also be done against a wall, like pushups.

Focus on low impact. Your regular physical exercise should emphasize low-impact exercises with a higher amount of reps, usually around 15 to 30. The maximum time you should exert yourself is three minutes followed by two minutes of rest.

Use full extensions. Concentrate on exercises in which you fully extend your joints, like curls. By ex-

tending, you can elongate muscles and build stronger muscle contraction.

Stay hydrated. As we head into summer, it's important for everyone to stay cool and drink plenty of water. Try to do most of your exercising inside and exercise in the early morning if you do go outside. Wherever you work out, make sure your body is getting enough water. Exercise is more beneficial and less risky when your body is well hydrated.

Buddy up. Exercising with friends or in groups is a great way to make fitness fun and keep you motivated. If you are concerned about injury, it's an especially good idea to try activities in a class setting with supervision from a trained professional.

The most important rule when exercising is to listen to your body. Once you find the regular fitness activities that best meet your needs, you are on your way to enhanced wellness and a healthier retirement.


New AARP book raises awareness of food, medication interactions

Millions of Americans age 50-plus take prescription drugs, yet few know the health risks of taking them along with certain foods and over-the-counter (OTC) supplements. Some blood thinners, for example, can increase the risk of irregular heartbeat and heart attack if taken with everyday foods like spinach, kale and tomatoes

To address these kinds of food and drug interactions, AARP and Skyhorse Publishing have released a revised edition of "Don't Eat This If You're Taking That: The Hidden Risks of Mixing Food and Medicine" (Skyhorse Publishing paperback; May 2, 2017, \$17.99). Written by Madelyn Fernstrom, Ph.D., and her husband John Fernstrom, Ph.D., the book provides a consumer's guide to understanding how mixing prescription medications with certain foods and supplements can lessen their effectiveness or even cause a serious health problem.

"Most people are surprised to learn that even healthy foods can interfere with the actions of many medicines," Madelyn Fernstrom said. "Small changes in what you eat can make a big difference in making sure your medications are working the way your doctor intended."

Examples of the book's advice include:



 Avoid eating grape-

- fruit when taking cholesterol medicine
- Steer clear of red wine, hard cheese and chocolate while on certain antidepressants
- Know which of the many herbal supplements can affect blood pressure

Covering everything from antidepressants to herbal supplements, the revised edition focuses on which foods to enjoy and which to avoid when taking the most common prescription drugs. The book is divided into eight sections covering the most widely-used medications, including antidepressants, pain relievers, blood thinners, diabetes drugs, antacids, cholesterol drugs, blood pressure medications and heart medicines.

"This book will help anybody tackle the complexities of food and medicine interaction," said Jodi Lipson, director of AARP Books. 'Don't Take This If You're Eating That' is especially useful for people taking more than one medication."

Each chapter of the book also features a "Dietary Supplements Alert" box providing upto-date information on drug interactions with over-the-counter vitamins and minerals.

Closing the gap: TechVine helps seniors benefit from smart devices

Most people remember the leap to smart devices circa 2010, when tech giants Apple, LG and Samsung forever changed the way people looked at cellphones.

Before the initial shock of a touchscreen keyboard even wore off, a generational rift formed, dividing those adapting to new technology such as iPhones and tablets and consumers who opted to hold onto their "dumb phones" – flip devices with tangible keypads meant to function as phones and not much else

According to tech educator Michael Schmitt, that shift had unexpected consequences: seniors getting "left behind" in an increasingly adaptive world. To remedy the situation, he founded TechVine, a company geared specifically toward tech education for seniors.

As a tech educator, Schmitt guides seniors through 10-week courses at beginner and intermediate levels. TechVine also offers packages, hourly lessons, group lessons and seminars.

Through each session, Schmitt said, the company aims to "eliminate the intimidation factors" commonly associated with learning to use smartphones by creating a personalized approach to them. The goal: to make the transition easy while demonstrating how technology can help with everyday activities, connectedness and functionality.

The digital divide

Schmitt first recognized the need for such a service in 2013 after returning to the United States from Italy. The former teacher, nurse and volunteer began working at AT&T, where he noticed a pattern of increasingly baffled seniors struggling to keep up with the technology that had suddenly become so deeply ingrained in their lives.

"They missed the gap," Schmitt said. "That jump from desktops to smart devices – iPads, iPhones, Androids, you name it – and as the world moved toward those devices, they continued to use what they had. All of a sudden, these devices are failing and they can't make that jump anymore."

That leap consisted of increasingly complex devices, interfaces and functionality that made telecommunication almost secondary to features like video streaming, messaging and picture taking. Each new generation of devices strays further from the basics – and it can deter seniors from trying them altogether. But technology has stopped for no one, Schmitt said, and its evolution creeps ever closer to the services vital to seniors.

"Now, suddenly even pharmacies are saying 'use our app to reorder your medication," he said. "Kids are deferring to Facebook to share photos of grandchildren, banks are recommending applications to help manage finances. There are so many different ways it becomes more necessary to [understand], but it's a completely different language."

Schmitt recognized the overwhelming abilities of smart devices as one factor keeping seniors from adapting; the other side, he said, was the frustration families often felt in trying

to get them to learn. In his own teachings, Schmitt has tapped into the desire to adapt in order to demonstrate the ways that seniors and people with disabilities could be helped with smart devices.

Guided learning

Schmitt's clientele consists of people in the Beaches area, including residents of Cypress Village, where he acted as an iPad instructor. He also installed home systems like Amazon's "Echo," which can be programmed to accept voice commands that allow users to create reminders and make small adjustments to things like the temperature or light intensity. The community served as somewhat of a testing ground where Schmitt could "tweak" his offerings to meet the mission, and where he first learned how to get seniors on board with technology that could prove helpful in their lives.

One example of his instruction is Bess Turk, a Cypress Village resident who began to lose her vision due to macular degeneration years prior to moving to the community. Turk's condition made for abrupt changes in her lifestyle, occasionally causing her to miss appointments and forget daily activities. Schmitt worked with Turk to create a system with Amazon Echo – a system that answers to the name "Alexa" – that would allow her to turn her lights off and on, create grocery

lists, schedule appointments and more with a simple voice command.

"When I met with her, hearing [what she needed] made me realize that there was so much more that could be done," Schmitt said. "And with a lot of my clients, I feel that this technology isn't just a novelty – this can be life-changing."

Schmitt noted that many of his clients are also people with disabilities or limited mobility for whom the challenge of moving around the house was made easier with voice commands.

"Several of my clients have disabilities, some blind or wheelchair bound, and for them, even moving from room to room or reaching a light switch or adjusting the temperature can be difficult," he said. "And teaching them to embrace a system that they can interact with using their voice ... that they can speak to from anywhere in the house just improves the quality of life for so many people."

Embracing new technology

As he eyes the possibility of expansion, Schmitt looks forward to opening the eyes of people who might have initially rejected the idea of a "pocket computer" in the past. In the process, he hopes more seniors will feel encouraged to get on board with smart technology.

"The end result we hope for is that they feel comfortable with and can include this technology in their daily life to interact and communicate with people and things important to them," he said. "I want to help them embrace it and stop

asking why it's so different so that they can interact with it and grow that way."

Current glaucoma surgeries aim to reduce intraocular pressure (IOP) to prevent further damage to the optic nerve. Such procedures can be invasive, however, and may produce variable outcomes.


In contrast, the CyPass Micro-Stent device is implanted just below the surface of the eye to create a new drainage pathway that prevents fluid buildup.

The procedure has minimal tissue disruption, reducing complications like scarring or bleeding that may occur in more invasive glaucoma surgeries.



Common plants that are toxic to cats and dogs

Sago palms, also known as King palms, are common plants found around homes throughout Northeast Florida

Most people don't know, however, that Sago palms are highly toxic to dogs, leading to liver failure or in extreme cases even death, if parts of the plants are eaten.

"Dogs that chew on these palms or ingest the seeds or nuts from a Sago may become extremely ill, and we unfortunately have to treat dogs for liver damage from time to time," said Dr. Abigail Bertalan at Southeast Veterinary Oncology and Internal Medicine (SEVO-Med), which specializes in the treatment of serious internal diseases

and provides cancer treatment for pets

As a specialist in internal medicine for the clinic, Bertalan has treated several dogs after they ingested parts of the Sago palm – one as recently as last month.

"If your pet does eat the bark or seeds of a Sago palm, it's best to get to a veterinarian immediately," she said. "The sooner the exposure is handled and treatment begins, the less risk of long-term complications and the better chance of survival."

While Sago palms are extremely toxic to dogs, many flowers in the lily



Who gets the pet in a divorce?

Americans love their pets. In fact, 68 percent of U.S. households have at least one pet, according to the latest National Pet Owners Survey. But whether a pet is treated like a child or spoiled like a grandchild, pets are often an important part of the family. That's why the question of who gets "custody" of the family pet may become hotly contested in a divorce.

While the term "custody" is associated with children in a divorce, family pets are not treated like children under the law. If you are attached to your pet, brace yourself for the legal reality.

The legal standing of pets derives from Western European law a few hundred years ago, which is the source of many of our laws. Historically, animals were used for work and food, and their value was based on what they could produce. The family horse, cow and pig were all considered property – the same as tools, wagons and furniture. Although the value modern Americans place on family animals changed,

their legal status is unchanged. Thus, our dogs, cats, parakeets and tropical fish are all considered property under the law.

In Florida, the first question when determining who gets the family pet might be whether it is considered "marital" or "nonmarital" property. If one party owned the pet prior to marriage, then the pet is nonmarital and should go with the spouse who owned it before the marriage. If the pet was acquired during the marriage, ownership might depend on how it was acquired. If a spouse received the pet as a gift from someone other than his or her spouse, it might be considered nonmarital, whereas a purchase during the marriage is more likely marital.

If parties do not agree on the disposition of the pet, a judge will make the decision. When a pet is considered marital, the judge will also determine its value and who gets it.

Since the vast majority of divorce cases are settled by agreement of the parties, a pet may be the subject of negotiations. The compassionate person might believe the pet should go where it will be best loved. The pragmatist might consider who will best care for the pet. And, for the heartless, the pet can be a bargaining chip to be used for leverage in negotiations.

However, most disputes about pets rarely make it to a judge for determination. Instead, people usually resolve their pet issues by agreement. Often, pets go with the children or with the spouse who is most attached to it. In some cases, both humans cannot bear to part with their pet and actually split time with it—similar to a timesharing arrangement with a child.

As with most matters in divorce cases, the outcomes vary by the humans involved. Undoubtedly, the subject of pets is often emotional, especially if they become involved in the owners' legal dispute. Nonetheless, reasonable people balance the best interests of the pet against the best interests of the person.

family – especially Easter lilies – are extremely poisonous to cats. "Cats are more common lily-poisoning victims, but they are toxic to both," said Dr. Krysta Deitz, a new internal medicine specialist at SEVO-Med's Beaches clinic. "All lilies, which are extremely popular bouquet items, are toxic to animals to some degree…including tiger lilies, tulips and calla lilies, but Easter lilies are the most dangerous. Even a sniff of the pollen can be fatal to a kitten or cat."

Deitz suggests that if you have a bouquet or lilies in the house and own an animal, make sure they're placed in a location that can't be reached by a pet. Other popular bouquet items that can be hazardous to animals include baby's breath, bird of paradise, carnations, daffodils, dahlias, daisies,irises and peonies.

While not as life-threatening as the others, there are other plants both doctors say pet owners should avoid inside and outside the home. Popular garden items that are poisonous include azaleas, buttercups, chrysanthemums, gardenias, gladiolas, hibiscus, hyacinth, hydrangeas, mums, primroses, rhododendrons and sweet peas. Climbing plants like ivy and wisteria should be off limits to dogs. Even medicinal and recreational plants are unsafe for dogs and cats, including St. John's Wort, aloe, tobacco and rhubarb plants.

"While the holidays are months away, mistletoe is also poisonous, and poinsettias can be extremely irritating to the mouth and stomach if ingested," Deitz said. "Fortunately, the unpleasant taste keeps animals from eating a lot of the plant, but it's best if you keep pets away from them."

The doctors stress that pet owners should keep their favorite flowers where they can appreciate their beauty, but lock them away when they're not at home and keep a close watch when pets are near them. Likewise, with outdoor plants, keep a close eye on pets when they are playing in the yard.

"It's not advisable to let pets out unsupervised, and you can't watch them every second, but you can help keep your pet healthy by knowing which plants and trees are toxic in your area," Bertalan said. "Just by being aware of the danger and by taking proper precautions, you can keep your favorite plants and pets safe."

Kim wins

South Korean becomes youngest golfer to capture THE PLAYERS trophy

TPC Sawgrass Stadium Course gives marquee players fits

While all the golfers everybody has heard of were ejected by Pete Dye's most well-known design at TPC Sawgrass, Si Woo Kim, a youngster originally from South Korea, showed them all how it should be done and became the youngest PLAYERS champion ever Sunday.

Until this week, Kim was the 71stranked player in the world. Now, he's the champion of the most important event run by the PGA Tour: THE PLAYERS.

The victory changes Kim's life. It gives him exemptions for five years on the PGA Tour, although he already had an exemption for two years from winning the Wyndham last summer. This victory gives him even more time to develop his career as a professional, although from the looks of things this week, his game doesn't need much work. It will also lock up his place on the Presidents Cup team.

"I'm very honored to be the champion for this amazing fifth major," Kim said through his translator. "Usually I'm very nervous, but last year I won one of the tournaments, and I could get the two years of exemption. Because of that, I can play aggressively and I wasn't that nervous this year.'

Former PLAYERS champ K.J. Choi has been a mentor to Kim and gave him advice on how to play TPC Sawgrass.

"K.J. has become a really good (role) model," Kim explained, "so because he had won before, I am kind of confident that a Korean can win one of these tournaments, and that actually helps me when I am playing."

The newest PLAYERS champ won by hitting fairways off the tee and by scrambling when he missed greens. His driving distance average was 295 yards for the week, and his driving accuracy was 69 percent of fairways for four windy days. In the final round, his greens in regulation number was only 44 percent, so it was his short game and his ability to hit recovery shots that separated him from the field.

Kim got up and in 10 times on Sunday, which was the key to his success. Three of those recovery shots were from greenside bunkers at the 3rd, 10th and 11th, which could have costs him shots. However, his bunker technique was so good that the longest putt he had after getting out was five feet. It was amazing, really.

Kim learned to play from his father, and then refined his skills with Sean Foley, who has worked with Justin Rose and for a time worked with Tiger Woods.

Although he went through the PGA Tour Q-School in 2012 when he was only 17, Kim was not able to play on the PGA Tour until he reached the age of 18. The reason he tried O-School then was because 2012 was the last year that golfers could get to the PGA Tour via Q-School. Now they have to go to Web.com Q-school and get to the top 25 on Web.com or finish in the top 25 in the Web.com finals.

In Kim's case, while he was successful in the 2012 qualifying, he did not play well enough after turning 18 in 2013, which was the end of June, to retain his card. That meant he had to go back to the Web.com in 2014 and again in 2015. In 2015, he finished 10th on that money list, which got him a PGA Tour card for 2016. He won the Wyndham Championship in 2016, becoming the season's youngest winner at age 21. He credited his time on the Web. com Tour as being instrumental in his PLAYERS victory.

Juast as surprising as Kim's victory was the fact that other, more seasoned Ponte Vedra Recorder · May 18, 2017 SPORTS 47

professionals didn't hold him off in the final round. Louis Oosthuizen shot a 38 on the front and a 35 on the back for a 73. Sergio Garcia had a 41 on the front and 37 on the back for an uncharacteristic 78. Ian Poulter, who was without a PGA Tour card a month ago, tried to push Kim, but was unable to match the youngster's skill.

To see the rest of the leader board players falling back was not as much of a surprise as it was to see Oosthuizen, Garcia and Poulter come up short of the mark. Basically, seven of the top eight going into the final round made too many mistakes, and when Kim made a mistake he was able to recover in better fashion.

The youngster was the only man standing. He played like a true champion.

"You have to take your hat off,"

Poulter said about Kim's play. "You have to respect some good golf, and that's exactly what he's done."

Poulter said he was very happy with the way he played, "barring the nightmare second shot into the last," which he admitted was a shank.

In other course news, Rafa Cabrera-Bello had the first-ever double eagle, or albatross, on the 16th hole.


"I took the risk hitting driver off the tee on 16, hit an enormous drive, and just left myself an 8-iron," he said.

He saw the shot kick of the bank of the bunker and thought it was going into the water.

"Then I saw it bump with the flag, and I didn't know what happened," he admitted

When the crowd went nuts, he knew. He threw his club into the water by mistake. "Luckily, I was able to fish it out after," he added.

Twenty-six players tried to go for the green with 3-wood or driver. Only three hit the putting surface: Tony Finau and Derek Fathauer in the morning and Freddie Jacobsen in the afternoon.

Friday

Thirty-nine players tried for the green on their tee shot with either 3-wood or driver. Nine hit the green and Luke List made the first eagle on the new 12th hole. He landed 14 feet 9 inches away.

Saturday

Forty-six golfers tried to drive the green with 3-wood or driver on Saturday compared to 26 in round one and 39 in round two. Eleven players hit the green with Cody Gribble being the only one to make eagle. His tee shot landed 7 feet 5 inches from the hole.

Sunday

Tyrrell Hatton was first to go for green and reach it on Sunday. Later in the day, Sergio Garcia also reached the green and stayed on it. In all, 41 players – more than half the field – went for the green with 3-wood or driver, compared to 26 in round one, 39 in round two and 46 in round three.

THE PLAYERS Championship continues to grow globally

THE PLAYERS Championship's efforts to expand its reach beyond the United States did not go unnoticed at TPC Sawgrass last weekend.

Nowhere was that more visible than on the final leader board, which featured players from nine different countries outside the United States in the top 15, including tournament winner Si Woo Kim of South Korea. Finishing the weekend at 10 under, the 21-year-old Kim is the tournament's second straight international winner, with Australia's Jason Day winning in 2016, and the third in four years. Following his victory, Kim praised the influence of mentor and fellow South Korean, K.J. Choi, who won THE PLAYERS Championship in 2011.

"He's been a great golfer representing Korea, and I've always wanted to be like him," said Kim, adding that Choi and Tiger Woods motivated him to start playing golf.

Trailing Kim in the top five were Ian Poulter of the United Kingdom, Louis Oosthuizen of South Africa, Rafa Cabrera-Bello of Spain and Kyle Stanley of the United States. In total, 56 international players competed in the tournament, representing just under 40 percent of golfers in the field of 147.

Since 2012, PGA Tour International Media has invited media outlets from around the world to cover these international golfers live from THE PLAYERS Championship International Broadcast Village, which is situated a few hundred yards behind the Stadium Course's 17th hole. Over the past five years, the village has grown from two broadcasters in 2012 to six in 2017. Due to renovations made to the facility this year, the village can host up to eight international broadcasters.

According to THE PLAYERS Championship Executive Director Jared Rice,

the tournament credentialed 943 media staff from 202 media outlets from 18 countries, in total. The tournament was broadcast to over 1 billion households across 226 countries and territories outside the United States, in 30 languages, he said. For the first time ever, the tournament was broadcast live in Times Square in New York City – a destination for international travelers – on the side of tournament sponsor Morgan Stanley's building. Also for the first time, Rice added, three international media outlets rebranded and dedicated their respective channels to the tournament all week long. These included Sky Sports UK/ Ireland, Fox Sports Australia and Golf Network Japan.

Reiko Takekawa, a golf writer for Japan's Kyodo News, said she believes the tournament is becoming increasingly popular overseas. She said the PGA Tour, in general, has grown in popularity in Japan over the past few years, especially with the rise of Japanese player Hideki Matsuyama. She credits the extensive international media coverage of THE PLAYERS Championship to its recognition as the sport's "fifth major," with the deepest field and most dramatic finish.

In addition to an increase in international media coverage, Rice said the number of international fans at the tournament is growing. According to the tournament director, 5 percent of the event's ticket sales were from outside the United States, which accounts for

about 10,000 of the 200,000 fans that attended. In addition, 55 percent of attendance came from outside of Jackson-ville's five-county area, he said. There's nothing more important to Rice than this

"Our number one goal is to grow the national and international fan base," he said

As a result of this growth, it was more common than not to hear people speaking in multiple languages about the tournament as you walked from hole to hole.

Edgardo Catari, a golf enthusiast from Venezuela, attended THE PLAYERS Championship this year for the first time to see the "best of the best" play in what he called a "very prestigious tournament." He went home to South America extremely impressed with the Stadium Course.

"It's the best I've seen in my life, and I've been to other tournaments," said Catari, adding that he met fans from Argentina, Guatemala, Ecuador, Japan, Italy and Spain over the weekend.

Mark Ellis, a fan from England, has been watching the tournament for years on television, and he's always wanted to attend.

"It's an absolute dream being here," he said. "I just can't believe how beautiful it is. Every single one of my friends is watching it back home: my dad, my mom, my sister, my brother, cousins and friends abroad all the same. I think it's just amazing."
