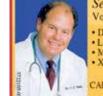

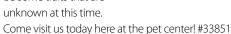

Congressional candidate David Bruderly addresses Beaches Democratic Club

The dredging of the St. Johns River, U.S. military activities and the tenor of the presidential campaign were among the topics congressional candidate David Bruderly discussed at a recent meeting of the Beaches Democratic Club.

Held Sept. 20 in Neptune Beach, the meeting was attended by approximately 45 people, who listened as Bruderly explained his positions on a variety of issues. Bruderly is running for the 4th congressional district seat being vacated by the retiring U.S. Rep. Ander Crenshaw.

Bruderly expressed his opposition to the dredging of the St. Johns River, charging that those who support the project have no proof of a return on investment and are providing "a subsidy for Asian shipbuilders."

When asked about his position on simplifying the tax system, Bruderly suggested that a more progressive tax system is needed. He expressed his support for a carbon tax and a "21st century Glass-Steagall Act." He also discussed U.S. military activities, saying that he opposes the "politics of fear" being waged in the current presidential campaign and expressed the view that America must be "brokers of peace." On the topic of health care, Bruderly declared health care to be a human right, and described himself as a "rational and progressive" candidate.

Bruderly said he welcomes the chance to have a face-to-face debate with his Republican opponent, former Jacksonville Sheriff John Ruth-

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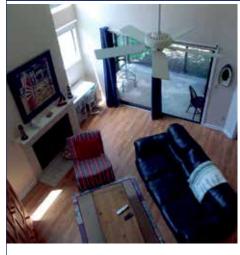




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Watermarke developers withdraw application for comp plan amendment

Project partners pull application in order to preserve right to resubmit it

Moments before a county commissioner could make a motion to deny their application, the developers of the proposed Watermarke resort last week withdrew the application for a comprehensive plan amendment that would allow them to construct a private resort and beach club on Coastal Highway at Vilano Beach.

At the Sept. 20 meeting of the Board of County Commissioners, Commissioner Rachael Bennett concluded nearly five hours of presentations, discussion and public comment by making a motion to approve transmittal of the proposed amendment. When no one seconded Bennett's motion, however, Commissioner Jay Morris indicated his intention to make a motion to deny the application, prompting the developers' attorney to request its withdrawal. County Commissioners then voted to accept the application's withdrawal.

The hearing was but the latest chapter in the proposal to build a resort with 120 hotel rooms, 50 villas, a 39-slip marina and

70,000 square feet of resort amenities on Coastal Highway/A1A approximately 1.5 miles north of Vilano Town Center. The proposal has sparked community opposition, with some Vilano Beach residents forming the group Save Our Vilano to oppose the project.

The Sept. 20 BCC meeting was held before hundreds of residents wearing white, many of whom sported white t-shirts proclaiming their opposition to the resort plan.

"It was clear that, with the numbers of opposition present, we were not going to get the votes needed for transmittal," Developer Steve Magiera said. "By withdrawing the application, we preserved the option to reassess the plan and potentially resubmit our application in the months

ahead "

While saying that he and his project partners appreciate the passion of the Save Our Vilano members, Magiera said he doesn't believe the group is representative of the views of the wider community.

"Since the hearing, we have received numerous phone calls, text messages and emails from the working residents of the Vilano area expressing concern that the Save Our Vilano group purports to represent all of the Vilano area," he said. "Their message to us is that the 150 people that attended the hearing...do not represent the other 3,000 plus Vilano area residents."

A question of commitment

Much of the Sept. 20 hearing focused on a provision in the developers' application

that would give them the right to revert back to the property's current Residential C zoning should the resort project fail to move forward. Currently, the property is approved for a 79-unit residential development. That provision didn't sit well with Morris, who said he'd never encountered such a request in his six years on the board.

"I've never seen that put in where you kind of want (to have) your cake and it eat it too," Morris said. "You're trying to rezone something, but if it doesn't work out all right for you, you want to go back to what you had before that you're trying to get away from now."

The inclusion of that language, Morris said, caused him to question the developers' commitment to making the resort a reality.

Magiera disputed that assessment.

"I can tell you that there's no shortage of dedication to this project," he said at the hearing. "We wouldn't have gone through this for seven months if we weren't dedicated to this project.

"We don't know where the world is going," he continued, "and the market for this kind of investment capital could dry up."

Commissioner Jimmy Johns also expressed concern.

"The recession has made all of us gun shy," he said. "I share the concern with this 'we'll have it one way or the other de-

The district school system plays a big role in St. Johns economy. The rapid growth and reduced state support received from past years creates a constant money squeeze on dollars available to meet the ever raising and pressing need to provide quality education for all students.

This week's focus group meeting highlighted the continuing financial challenges facing the district. Some of the results are: over 300 mobile classrooms are needed to meet the over 38,000 students. New elementary schools cost approximately \$34 million; new high schools cost about \$55-60 million dollars. School board policy and Superintendent Joyner have implemented a program of staffing each school with a nurse. Part of the rationale for this is the stated 25 percent of the student population having a "chronic health" problem. State support is not provided for this program.

While the impact fee ordinance for rapid growth counties is intended to offset a substantial part of the cost of new capital investment, the amount reported – while varying over the years – is about 12 percent of the annual cost. Impact fees received by the county for needed roadway and parks and other facilities is not known, but is all part of the required new infrastructure by the rapid growth of our county.

While the selection of a new superintendent is well underway, one of the factors to sustaining a top-rated school district will be improved management and planning between these elected bodies. Much of the county's quality of life, and what so many find enjoyable about our county, rests upon improved management of the continued growth we face and the resources needed to pay for it.

I spoke at the BCC meeting Sept. 20 regarding the Vilano request for a comp. plan change from residential to a resort hotel. What I didn't say and regret is the following:

Developers are always with us. But this is a clear example of what I call development speculators. These are people who hunt around for smaller pieces of land – anything from 10 acres to 50 – that may be zoned RS 1 (one per acre) or R2 (at two per acre) and then try to increase this by the use of variances that will add more homes to the site. We have seen a lot of this in Palm Valley and Ponte Vedra.

One group got bonus points for additional lots by donating to affordable housing in St. Augustine. Another wanted to add more homes by claiming bonuses for using energy-efficient building techniques. Still another in Ponte Vedra wants to add truck loads of dirt to an

pending on the economy.' I'm concerned it's not been vetted enough."

Those sentiments were echoed by some of the residents who spoke during the public comment portion of the hearing.

"Watermarke is a conundrum in the fact that their attorney proposed that if it is not a success, then it can revert back to the original Residential C plan," Vilano Beach resident Linda Doherty said. "Does this sound like a confident, right kind of development plan?"

Other residents focused on the issue of compatibility, saying such a large commercial property would be out of place in their neighborhood.

"A commercial space bigger than the White House... has no business being inserted into our residential community – at least according to our comprehensive plan," resident Brandy Schmidt told commissioners. "Please vote to keep big commercial development where it belongs."

Former County Commissioner Mary Kohnke, meanwhile, told the board, "You were elected to represent the interests of current residents. There will always be those who try to lure you with the interest of higher property taxes for new projects, even if they're not compatible. If these projects were so compatible, they wouldn't be asking for comp plan changes."

While Bennett offered the view that a resort would have less impact on the county than a residential development – which would impact schools and other county services – her fellow board members failed to support her motion to approve transmittal of the amendment.

"I'm all for commercial construction...I hope you build this project," Morris said. "You're just building it in the wrong location."

Following the application's withdrawal, Magiera said the Watermarke team was reassessing its resort proposal "to determine whether a mutually agreeable and financially feasible alternative exists."

In the meantime, he said, the developers will move forward with the residential option for which the property is already zoned.

"We still believe the resort option is the highest and best use for this property," he said. "The residential plan has always been an option – we just don't believe it's the best option. Nevertheless, we will immediately begin to get all necessary permits and file construction plans for the condominiums given the 2018 and 2021 expiration dates for the PUD."

Bill Nesbitt, a spokesman for Save Our Vilano, said the group has no issue with that project.

"Save Our Vilano recognizes the right of this or any responsible developer to build out the currently in force residential PUD that the land owner requested and was granted in 2007," Nesbitt said.

Should the resort proposal be resubmitted, however, the group will reassert its opposition.

"Save Our Vilano remains vigilant and opposed to any change in the comp plan that would allow higher densities and large commercial projects along A1A," he said. "The prevailing view across this barrier island of 5,000 residents is to continue as an area of residential neighborhoods along with a vital town center on Vilano Road."

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Every drop counts: Ribault Garden Club gathers to discuss water conservation

Water conservation issues facing the local community was the focus of the Ribault Garden Club's annual "Coffee and Program" breakfast meeting held Sept. 22 in Jacksonville Beach.

"This time of year is always exciting because it's the first group meeting of the year," said Eileen Zebroski, a youth garden coordinator and club member. "It's a time of catching up because many of us are seeing

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one another for the first time in a year. But it's also important because we'll be discussing things that affect all of us."

The meeting continued the club's tradition of discussing a subject of environmental studies with special guest Deirdre Irwin, water conservation coordinator of St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD).

Irwin urged the members to think of what they can do in the present to stave off overuse.

She noted that Jacksonville's population is expected to grow significantly in the next few years.

"We don't want to wait until it's too late," she said. "It's better to know 15 years early on why conservation is important right now."

Irwin offered several tips, suggestions and resources for local residents to encourage conservation habits while also recognizing some of the challenges of water conservation.

"Some people underestimate just how difficult it can be to save water because the change isn't immediately beneficial to them," she said. "Saving water can be costly. Effective water conservation sometimes requires buying new appliances and changing our own behavior – but it's important because we're relying heavily on conservation."

Invest in "sense" – Irwin suggested investing in EPA WaterSense labeled fixtures to aid conservation in the home. Products with the label meet the EPA's specifications for efficiency and are backed by testing and

Irrigate less – Irrigation systems are among the biggest uses of water in St. Johns County. Irwin addressed a frequently overlooked aspect of water conservation by focusing on the ways outdoor usage is costing residents.

"It just doesn't make sense to irrigate every single day," she said, suggesting that during the dormant season irrigation could be reduced to as little as once per week. "Even with advanced irrigation systems, it's possible to overuse water."

To remedy this problem, Irwin recommended more efficient means of maintaining gardens and lawns with micro-irrigation, the practice of watering only the areas that need it while avoiding things (such as mulch) that don't

Water-wise landscaping – Irwin also noted a major source of inefficient irriga-

tion practices: impractical landscaping. Site-appropriate landscaping choices such as planting vegetation native to the area, increasing the areas of shade in large yards to avoid overwatering plants and reducing areas of irrigated turf were a few tips presented. "Groundcovers" such as African Lily, Holly Fern and Mondo Grass fare well in shady areas, while trees like Crapemyrtle and Shumard Oaks provide shade without looking "out of place" in yards.

Form new habits – Irwin encouraged behavioral changes for more efficient water usage.

Things such as turning the faucet off when brushing teeth, running dishwashers only when they're full, checking and fixing leaks, setting clothes washers for the appropriate load size and filling bathtubs to one-third are small yet immediate ways to reduce individual water usage.

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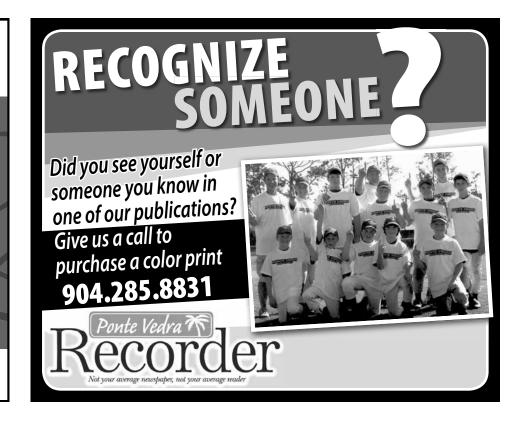

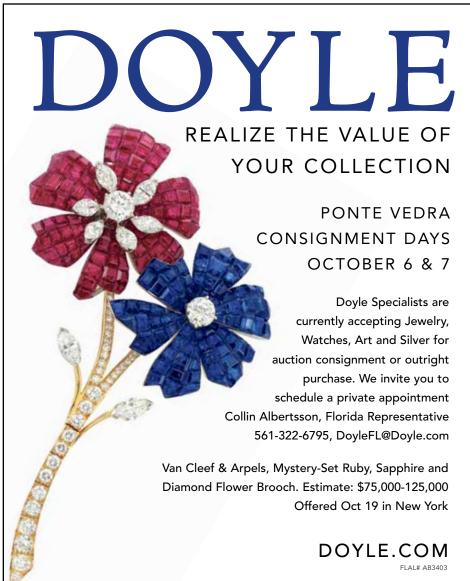

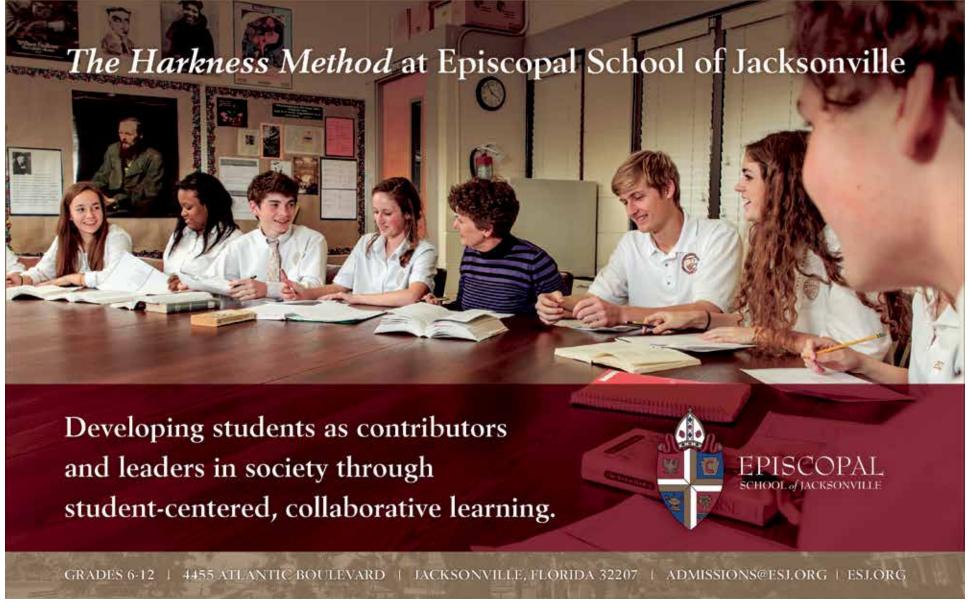
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Sheriff's Office offers tips on 'Parenting Tech-Savvy Kids'

The video shows a 10-year-old girl sitting at the computer in her bedroom, typing away.

Chatting online, the girl happily makes plans for a play date with her 10-year-old friend, Sam. Only "Sam" isn't 10 and he isn't a friend; he's an adult man who has cleverly tricked the girl into revealing her phone number, address and the fact that she

"If you think this doesn't happen, it does," Lt. Mike Strausbaugh of the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office told a group of Nocatee parents and kids last week. "We have a whole unit that sits behind closed doors and searches the internet for people like this who are looking for kids."

How to parent and protect children who are often far more technologically savvy than their parents was the focus of Strausbaugh's presentation Sept. 20 at Nocatee's Crosswater Hall. The 90-minute seminar provided attendees with background on a variety of topics – from social media and cyberbullying to internet pornography and sexting. And in order to protect children from the dangers on the internet, Strausbaugh said, parents first need to familiarize themselves with the programs and apps today's kids are using.

"My son can run rings around me when it comes to this stuff," Strausbaugh said. "They are far, far better at this than we are and there's a lot of dangerous stuff on the internet."

Cellphone secrets

Many parents may be unaware of the number and variety of applications - or apps - available to kids on their cellphones, Strausbaugh said.

"It's a different world than we lived in." he said. "We used to carry backpacks; kids today may still carry backpacks, but their entire life is in

that phone."

At the presentation, attendees viewed an ABC News segment where parents of a group of 11- to 13-year-old girls were surprised to learn their daughters had applications such as Calculator% – an app designed to look like a regular calculator but that can hide photos and other files from prying parental eyes. One mother was shocked to learn that her 11-year-old daughter had more than 1,000 Instagram followers and was receiving messages from strangers asking "R U a virgin?"

"She's 11 - do you think she even knows half of those people?" Strausbaugh asked. "When we were kids, we had like 10 or 15 good friends," he said. "Now, kids consider people they 'know' or 'like' on Instagram to be friends – and that's scary."

Strausbaugh recommended that parents check their children's cell phones periodically for questionable apps, photos or text messages.

We as parents cannot be afraid to ask for that phone and look at that phone," he said. "It's your phone."

Internet pornography and sexting

Research shows that the average age of first exposure to internet pornography is 11, Strausbaugh said.

"Kids are one click away from some pretty serious stuff that will imprint on their brain forever," he said.

Also of major concern: sexting, or the sending of sexually explicit images or content. It's a serious problem, Strausbaugh said, with many girls saying they were pressured by a boy to send sexually explicit photos, only to have the boy share the images with the world online.

'If you have young ladies, make sure no matter what boys ask for, they don't get involved in (sexting),"

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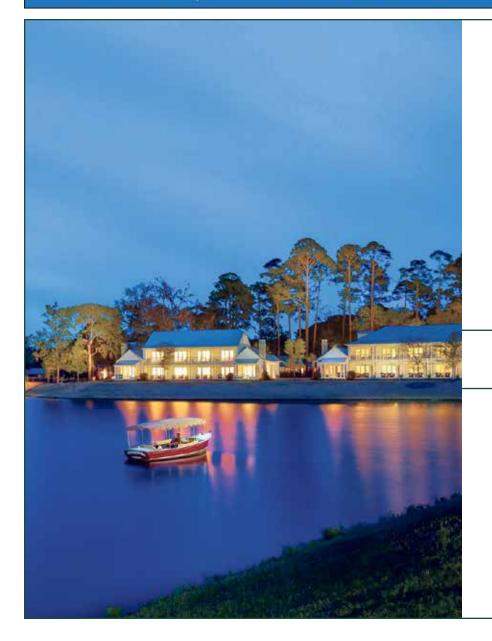

While a first offense is considered non-criminal and carries only a small fine and community service requirements, a second sexting offense is a misdemeanor. A third offense is a felony. What's more, if the first offense involves sending images of a sexual act, it automatically becomes a felony.

nature of the internet and the fact that the victim cannot escape from the torment even in their own home. At the Nocatee presentation, attendees watched a video about the true story of a girl who was bullied at school and online so relentlessly that she ultimately committed suicide.

"We're behind the eight ball because people can sit behind their computer screen and fling that stuff out there," said Strausbaugh, who noted that girls are more likely to bully peers online than boys. "It can get real nasty real fast."

If a parent suspects their child is being bullied online, Strausbaugh said, they should notify school administrators. In 2013, the Florida legislature passed a law that allows schools to discipline students for off-campus harassment.

"Schools used to just deal with what happened within the walls of the school," he said. "That law gives them the right to go out and discipline (students) for what they do online."

Above all, Strausbaugh said, parents mustn't be afraid to have a frank conversation with their children about both the positive and negative sides to the online world, and to remind them that whatever they do or say online has the potential to be seen by everyone.

"It's like living in a glass house – everything is visible to someone," he said. "Character counts online, just like it does in school. You want to be known as a good digital citizen."

TPC Sawgrass upgrades key to club's future, general manager says

When it comes to planning for the future of TPC Sawgrass and its signature event, THE PLAYERS Championship, General Manager Bill Hughes says it all comes down to three little words.

Grow the game.

"(At TPC Sawgrass) we are all in charge of growing the game," Hughes told attendees at the July 14 joint luncheon meeting of the St. Johns County and Jacksonville chambers of commerce. "Because if we don't grow the game, we have no game."

Achieving that goal, he said, requires an understanding that, unlike other golf clubs, TPC Sawgrass is all about showcasing THE PLAYERS Championship and serving an increasingly global audience that flocks to Ponte Vedra Beach each year for golf's "fifth major." He pointed to the opening of the \$32.5 million clubhouse in

2007 as a seminal moment in the elevation of TPC Sawgrass and even The PGA Tour as a whole.

"The clubhouse changed the whole complexion of what the tour is," Hughes said. "To see what has happened since then ... it didn't happen by luck. It's the result of a strategic business plan, and (Executive Director) Matt Rapp and his team have executed that plan on every pillar."

Now, Hughes and his staff are preparing for the next phase in TPC Sawgrass's evolution as the golf course undergoes a \$50 million renovation. Hughes outlined for chamber members a number of the major upgrades happening, including re-grassing all the greens with new varieties of grass, enlarging eight greens and lengthening two holes. Other improvements underway include ripping up the driving range and making it bigger and building a new golf course maintenance facility.

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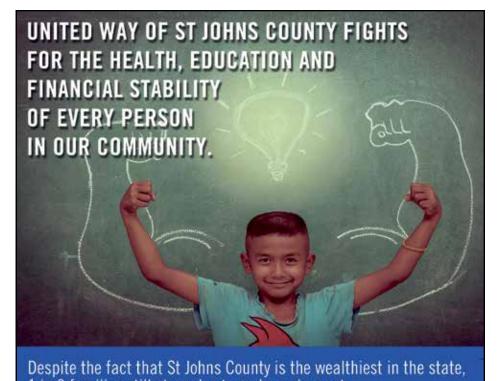

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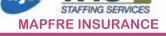












Sawgrass Beach Club hosts 'Chamber at Noon'

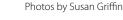

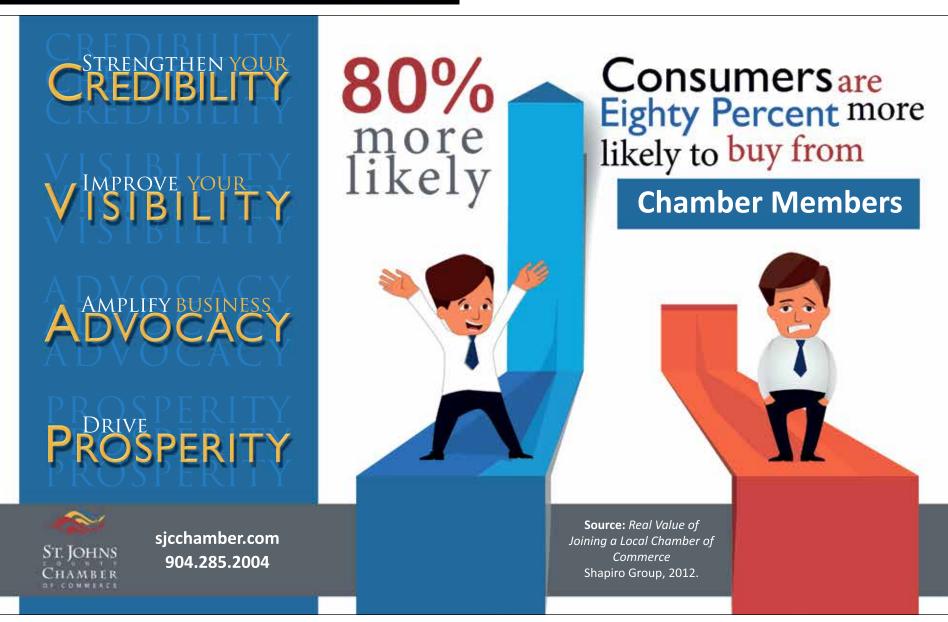

Transportation improvements key to county's growth, officials say

The connection of 9B to St. Johns Parkway, improvements to Race Track Road and efforts to deal with traffic and parking issues in St. Augustine were among the priorities highlighted by local, state and county transportation officials at a St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce breakfast.

As Florida's population continues to increase, officials said, transportation improvements are critical to ensuring continued growth and prosperity both locally and statewide

"By 2030, we'll have 6 million more people calling Florida home," CSX Vice President Quitin Kendall told attendees at the Aug. 26 breakfast presentation sponsored by the chamber's Economic Development Council. Locally, he said, estimates predict that St. Johns County will have as many as 150,000 new residents by that time.

"For this continued growth, we've got to ensure Florida remains successful," Kendall said, "and we need to plan for Florida's future and that includes transportation."

Traffic study, PV Greenway among items discussed at PVB Chamber meeting

Improving traffic and transportation safety and a proposal to build a traffic-separated greenway trail in Ponte Vedra were among the topics discussed at a luncheon meeting of the Ponte Vedra Beach Division of the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce

Held Sept. 14 at the Sawgrass Beach Club, the luncheon featured presentations by Greg Leonard of the Citizens Traffic Task Force and Deb Chapin of the PV Greenway & Preserve initiative.

The Ponte Vedra/Palm Valley Traffic Study – which focuses on A1A from Mickler Road to the Duval County line, Palm Valley Road, Solana Road and Roscoe Boulevard – is scheduled to be completed by next summer.

"This entire process and the completion of the study will happen by June of next year, so the study piece of it is at least in our foreseeable future," Leonard said. The study results and recommendations will be made public at that

time, in June or July 2017.

After the traffic study is completed, the next step will be figuring out how to mobilize funds. Possible sources of funding include the federal government, FDOT or the county, but asking the county for new funds at this point in time is a very uphill task, Leonard said.

The action plan set forth by the PV Greenway & Preserve initiative, meanwhile, has been largely accomplished, organizer Deb Chapin said. The grassroots group, which proposes to create a multiuse traffic-separated greenway trail system, has gained a lot of policy maker support and established a lot of partnerships, she said. Currently, the group is in the process of looking at obtaining a 501(c)(3) nonprofit status, and is seeking funding to help with the group's website which Chapin said should be online in a couple of weeks – as well as maps and renderings. A business plan for maintenance also needs to be established, she said.

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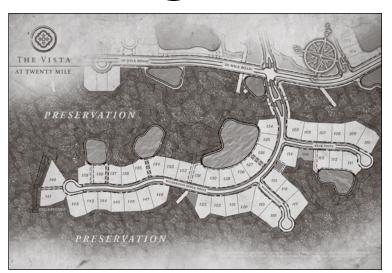

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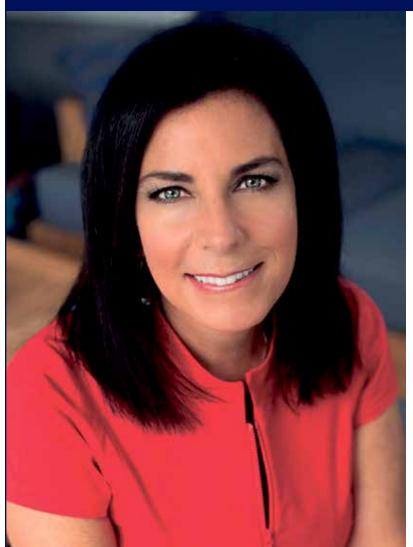

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New programs, expanded repertoire boost Jacksonville Symphony attendance

An expanded repertoire, high-quality guest artists and a commitment to making classical music accessible to everyone are just a few of the factors that have boosted attendance at the Jacksonville Symphony in the past year, Music Director Courtney Lewis says.

Lewis – who begins his second season as music director this week – addressed members of the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach Sept. 22, sharing his vision for what the Jacksonville Symphony is and what it can become.

"The symphony is much better than people think it is," said Lewis, who joined the orchestra after stints in Boston, New York, Minnesota and Los Angeles. "When we plan a season, we try to give everybody something they'll enjoy."

Lewis has implemented a number of programs aimed at making the symphony more accessible and more relevant to contemporary audiences.

"When I joined the symphony," he said, "the orchestra was in a need of a more varied diet."

In addition to adding pieces by such legendary composers as Mozart and Haydn and what Lewis calls the "big, juicy romantic repertoire" of 19th century composers, the symphony's upcoming season will feature pops performances ranging from Disney songs and Bugs Bunny to the 50th anniversary of The Beatles' "Sergeant Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band." The symphony will also offer several of its popular movie nights, whereby a popular feature film is screened as the orchestra performs the film's score live. This season's film screenings will include "West Side Story."

Broadening the appeal

To attract new audiences, the Jacksonville Symphony has developed new programs that aim to accommodate

busy lives. Through its "Symphony in 60" program, for example, people who work downtown can arrive at 6 p.m. on a weeknight, have cocktails and then enjoy a one-hour concert. During the performance, HD cameras give the audience a new perspective on what the musicians are doing during the concert. Following the performance, the audience is invited up on stage to meet the musicians.

"We hear so much that classical music is an art form that's dying and this proves that's not the case," Lewis said. "We're trying to explode that sense."

Lewis is also committed to bringing high-caliber musicians to perform with the symphony, drawing on the best musical talent in the world

"We're seriously upgrading the quality of guest artists," he said. "As we try and build the Jacksonville Symphony, it's really important for us to work with the best people."

A series of free community concerts and a presentation of the child-friendly opera "Hansel and Gretel," meanwhile, will offer additional opportunities for local residents to experience the symphony.

Challenging expectations

The 2016-2017 Jacksonville Symphony season begins Sept. 30 with a performance of Igor Stravinsky's "Rite of Spring," a piece that was highly controversial when it first debuted in 1913.

"When it first premiered, there were fist fights and people threw tomatoes at the stage," Lewis said. "We hope that doesn't happen this time."

Yet the response to the now-classic "Rite of Spring" does illustrate a fundamental question regarding art forms like the symphony, Lewis observed.

"Should (artistic performances) just comfort and entertain us," he asked, "or actually challenge us to think about who we are as a society?"

To that end, Lewis wants to introduce more contemporary classical music to the Jacksonville Symphony's repertoire.

"For some reason, when we hear about new classical music, we run for the hills," he said. "We're working very hard to change that."

Jacksonville Symphony to perform three free community concerts

For the second year in a row, the Jacksonville Symphony will provide free community concerts to the residents of Northeast Florida.

Plans call for three free concerts in October to celebrate the 2016-2017 season opening.

"Our goal is to reach more of North Florida," Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra President and CEO Robert Massey said.

"Last year, we entertained more than 201,000 people. We continue to seek out community venues to reach more residents and allow everyone to experience the symphony."

The Mayo Clinic Community Concert Series will be held Oct. 7 at 8 p.m. at the Seawalk Pavilion in Jacksonville Beach; Oct. 8 at 8 p.m. at the Times-Union Center's Jacoby Symphony Hall; and Oct. 9 at 6 p.m. at Bethel Baptist Institutional Church in Jacksonville.

Music on the program for the concerts includes Beethoven's Symphony No. 5 in C minor, Op. 67 along with Antonín Dvořák's "Carnival Overture" and Igor Stravinsky's Orchestra Suites No. 2 for small orchestras.

Music Director Courtney Lewis will lead the orchestra at each appearance.

"I'm excited about bringing the symphony to more venues in North Florida," Lewis said.

"Our appearance at Bethel Baptist Institutional Church is a 'first' for the orchestra. We know that when we share our music with people, they become more interested in attending and supporting the symphony."

The symphony is planning a second week of free community concerts in spring 2017.

Susan G. Komen awards Mayo Clinic \$600,000 to develop breast cancer vaccine

The Susan G. Komen Foundation recently awarded The Mayo Clinic Jacksonville \$600,000 to develop a vaccine to prevent breast cancer.

Komen Scholar Keith Knutson, Ph.D. will use the grant to develop the vaccine by identifying proteins present only in tumor cells that will trigger an immune response.

"We are so thankful for our friends, family and neighbors who fight alongside us, helping to reduce the number of breast cancer deaths in North Florida, both on the ground and through research," said Delores Wise, executive director of Komen North Florida.

The grant was part of nearly \$33 million in new research grants announced by Susan G. Komen, the world's leading breast cancer organization. Grants were made to facilities in seven countries and 23 states. In addition to the Mayo Clinic Jacksonville, the University of Miami's Miller School of Medicine and the H. Lee Moffitt Cancer and Research Institute received grants of \$180,000 and \$450,000, respectively, to fund other treatment and prevention research. Since 1982, Florida research facilities have received more than \$14 million from Susan G. Komen.

"For nearly 35 years our organization has

been a leader in the fight to end breast cancer, changing how people think about, talk about and treat this disease," said Komen President and CEO Judy Salerno, M.D., M.S. "Not only will these grants accelerate our understanding of key areas in breast cancer research, but they include funding for early-career investigators."

The grants are part of Susan G. Komen's goal to reduce breast cancer deaths in the United States by 50 percent over the next decade.

"As federal research dollars become increasingly difficult to secure, these awards give promising young researchers an opportunity to establish their careers, and help ensure breakthrough breast cancer research continues for years to come," Dr. Salerno added. "Their work is essential to achieving our vision of a world without breast cancer."

Grants funded in this round by Susan G. Komen include 38 grants focused on stopping metastatic breast cancer; 15 grants exploring novel treatments for aggressive forms of the disease; 21 grants aimed at advancing techniques for detecting primary and recurrent breast cancer; and 12 grants aimed at identifying the causes of breast cancer disparities and testing ways to overcome barriers to care

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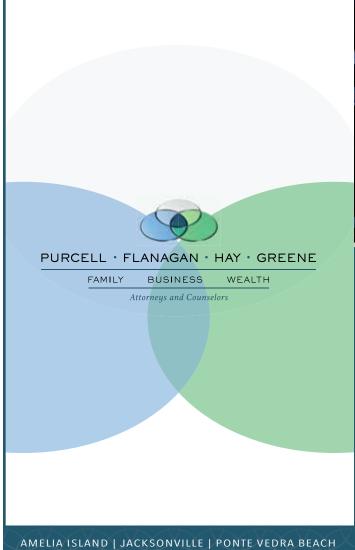
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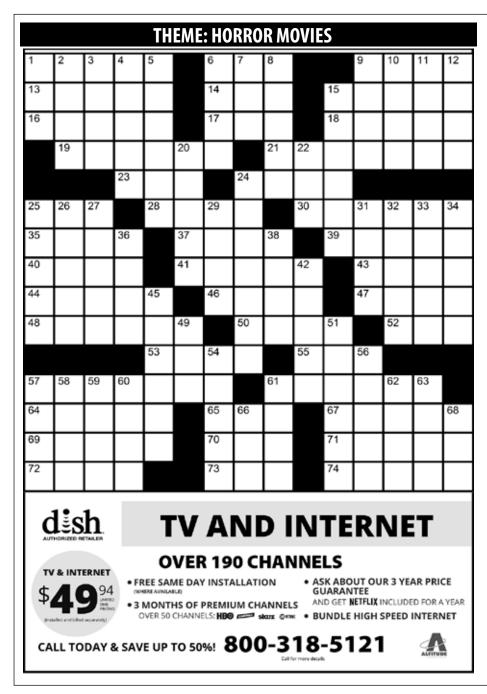

Sharks settle score with Pedro Menendez

The Ponte Vedra Sharks had a score to settle with Pedro Menendez Friday night and settle it they did. In 2015, the Falcons handed the Sharks an unexpected 25-20 defeat after Ponte Vedra had rolled to four straight wins and had visions of an undefeated season. The payback came as the Sharks pummeled the Falcons 49-22 in a game that was not nearly as competitive as the score might indicate.

Ponte Vedra scored early and often behind the passing and running of quarterback Nick Tronti and running back Hal Swan and Tronti's talented group of receivers. Tronti found his tight end Kit Connelly wide open over the middle for a 46-yard touchdown before the game was two minutes old.

Moments later, Ponte Vedra forced a threeand-out punt and was back on offense near their own 40-yard line. A pair of passes to Jake Maguire picked up 20 yards and Swan's 37-yard burst gave the Sharks a first and goal inside the Falcon 10. Tronti's keeper took advantage of the field position as he scored the first of his three running touchdowns.

Linebacker Sam Barnhard's fumble recovery of the ensuing kickoff put the football

back in Tronti's hands and the senior quarterback went immediately to wide-out Marshall Few for 36 yards. Few's remarkable catch came despite the Falcon defender's apparent interference. It wouldn't be his only remarkable catch of the game. He made a brilliant diving grab in the end-zone in the third quarter for the final PV touchdown.

With the Sharks again in the shadow of the Falcon goal posts, Tronti rolled left on a keeper for a touchdown and a 21-0 score.

The Shark defense contributed to the rout when Andrew O'Dare forced another Menendez fumble giving Ponte Vedra the ball near midfield. Swan and Zach Walton took turns chewing up yardage in big chunks. Swan's plunge from a yard out put Ponte Vedra up 28-0 just as the second quarter started.

Menedez found a soft spot in the Shark defense on their next possession by completing a 70-yard pass to a wide-open receiver. Responding to their touchdown, the visitors forced a PV punt, then marched 50 yards to a fourth and goal situation at the Sharks' one-yard line but weren't able to

The Sharks, aided by a pass interference call, used big running plays by Swan

and Tronti to move 99 vards as the first half clock ticked down. Swan ran in from four yards out for the touchdown with 25 seconds left in the half.

The breakdown in the Ponte Vedra secondary that led to Pedro's first score came

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Jaguars fail to hold late lead, remain winless

Justin Tucker kicked a 54-yard field goal with 1:02 to play as Baltimore kept the Jacksonville Jaguars winless with a 19-17 win Sunday at EverBank Field.

"It was a tough hard, fought battle," Jaguars Coach Gus Bradley said. "I know the problems. And I am the problem fixer."

Tucker accounted for most of the Ravens' offense with field goals of 43, 42 and 37 yards in the victory.

With the Ravens' trailing 17-16, Brent

Urban blocked a Jason Myers field goal that allowed Baltimore one last shot at victory. Myers had put the Jaguars up by one point minutes earlier on a 49-yarder.

Jaguars QB Blake Bortles threw two TDs but also three interceptions, the last one with 16 seconds to play in the game. Bortles finished 24 of 38 for 194 yards and rushed for 17 yards

The boo birds came out after his first pick. "If I went to somebody's work and performed as bad as I did, I would boo them too," Bortles said.

Neither team seemed to be able to take control of the game. The Jacksonville running back tandem of T.J. Yeldon and Chris Ivory combined for a total of 31 yards.

Baltimore QB Joe Flacco threw two interceptions but also ran for the team's only TD on a seven-yard run. Flacco was 29 of 40 for 214 yards. Steve Smith caught eight passes for 87 yards for the Rayens. Baltimore had 84 yards on the ground mostly on the heels of Terrance West's 45 yards.

Allen Robinson caught two touchdown passes of three and 11 yards from Bortles.

Robinson had seven catches for 57 yards.

Defensively, rookie defensive end Yannick Ngakoue registered his second consecutive game with a sack-fumble when he brought down Flacco on second-and-three with 39 seconds remaining in the first half.

Ngakoue registered his first career sack last week at San Diego. Defensive tackle Malik Jackson also registered his first sack of the season and first sack with the Jaguars.

Linebacker Telvin Smith registered seven tackles against the Ravens. Smith extended his league-leading streak to 19 games with six-plus tackles and also eclipsed 250 career

Safety Tashaun Gipson registered his first interception with the club in the fourth quarter. Linebacker Paul Posluszny registered his 15th career interception when he intercepted Flacco with less than five minutes remaining in the fourth quarter.

The Jacksonville Jaguars defense forced a three-and-out on Baltimore's first offensive possession, marking the first time this season and the first time since Week 13 of the 2015 season at Tennessee that Jacksonville's defense has forced a three-and-out on their opponent's first offensive possession.

The Jaguars defense also forced a threeand-out on the Ravens' second offensive possession, marking the first time since Week 8 of the 2014 season against Miami that the Jaguars defense forced three-andouts on two consecutive possessions to begin a game.

Jacksonville is now 0-3 and will play the Indianapolis Colts next Sunday in London. The Ravens improved to 3-0.

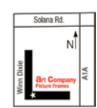
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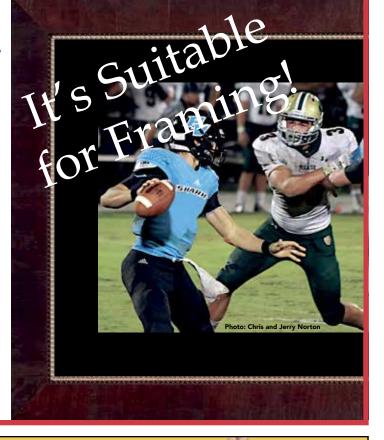

The Sharks finished their scoring on Marshall Few's second brilliant catch of the game, this one covering 33 yards.

The Sharks' record improved to 4-0 and they have scored an average of 45 points in each of their last three games. Tronti's stellar season continues as he completed nine of 18 passes for 169 yards and two TDs. He also ran for three scores. Swan carried 18 times for 145 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Few caught five passes covering 93 vards and one TD.

The Sharks hit the road for a conference game against Westside on September 30 at 7 p.m.

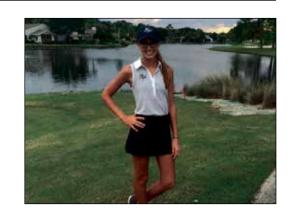
Under the direction of Coach Clint Finlay, McKevitt is in her fourth year of varsity play, improving her performance each year.

Along with junior Sophie Membrino, she looks to lead the Sharks to a repeat of their district and regional championships and make a successful run at the state championship.





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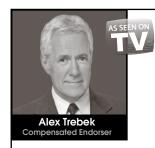
