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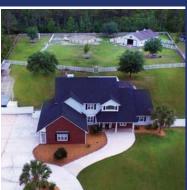
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Sheriff: time to change 'false narrative' on cops

When St. Johns County Sheriff David Shoar addressed the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach July 21, his remarks were preceded by an introduction that highlighted Shoar's 12 years as sheriff, four years as St. Augustine's chief of

police, 24 years in the National Guard and 35 years in law enforcement.

But when it came to explaining how he got into law enforcement to begin with, Shoar sheepishly acknowledged it was all about the heat.

"I had just moved to St. Augustine and was working construction," Shoar told Rotarians. "Here I was, this Irish Catholic Yankee boy up on the roof in 100-degree heat when suddenly this police car rolls by with the windows up. I said, 'That dude's got air conditioning!

"So while my motives became more noble later on," he quipped, "originally I just wanted air conditioning!"

Shoar turned serious, however, when he addressed a different kind of heat now facing law enforcement in the wake of a string of police officer shootings across the nation. With some Black Lives Matter protesters publicly calling for police officers to be murdered, Shoar said it's a situation he didn't expect to see during his career.

"If you told me 10 years ago what (the climate toward law enforcement) would be today, I'd have said, 'You're crazy, it will never happen,'" Shoar said. "We've got stop the false narrative that has taken hold about police officers.

The current dialogue is not healthy for our country."

That narrative, he contended, began in earnest in Ferguson, Missouri following the shooting of Michael Brown. In the wake of Brown's death, protests arose after some purported witnesses claimed that Brown said, "Hands up, don't shoot!" before he was killed. An in-depth investigation later proved that story to be false; far from cooperating, Brown actually was attacking the police officer at the time he was shot. Yet the false story continued to be advanced by groups organizing protests around the country.

"People in leadership positions jumped to conclusions about what turned out to be a completely false narrative," said Shoar, noting that the Brown case led to the founding of Black Lives Matter.

"All lives matter to us in law enforcement," Shoar said. "We come to work every day with one goal in mind: to help people. And there is no profession in America today that holds itself accountable as much as law enforcement.

"I've had to fire officers," he continued. "I've put officers in prison. I've suspended them – and we document

every bit of it. We've got bad actors, no question. We deal with them."

Finding solutions

Shoar acknowledged that minorities have a valid point when they complain about being stopped repeatedly by law enforcement simply while driving to work or school. But because officers are so often called to high-crime neighborhoods, he said it's understandable that in those areas, officers are more apt to expect situations to become violent. He also pointed to statistics that show young black males commit a disproportionately high share of all shootings, robberies and violent crimes.

"What we've got to do is figure out why that is occurring – why does this young generation have such hopelessness and despair that is causing this outrageous level of crime?" he said. "The problem is not the police – the police are just responding to the problem."

Shoar said that parenting and a return to core spiritual principles are needed to address the problem.

"We need to return to Christ, our Judeo-Christian roots and embrace God," he said. "The very nature of our culture and our civilization is on the line."

Angie's Subs in Jacksonville Beach hosted a "Cops and Kids" event July 21 with Jacksonville Beach police officers and children from Northeast Florida Boys and Girls Club beach campus.

According to Angie's Subs Owner Ed Malin, the event was funded by a frequent customer who wished to remain anonymous. The donor wrote a check for \$2,000 designated to treat police officers to lunch. Malin said he then took it one step further and had the idea to invite children to dine with officers.

"They're the impressionable ones in our society who see what's going on with the police today and they're the ones that need to be taught that cops are just like everybody else," Malin said. "Some of them are what we would consider at-risk kids, so they're going to get a chance to talk to a police officer and have a good lunch."

Jacksonville Beach Police Department Sgt. Keith Shackelford, Sr. was one of the police officers in attendance. Shackelford, who used to be a school resource officer and is the father of three grown children, said he believes having interaction with kids is always good thing.

"I think for the most part kids do see us in a positive light," he said, "but this just gives (us) a little more interaction with them one on one."

St. Johns River ferry to close temporarily for repairs

The St. Johns River Ferry will be closed Monday, July 25 through Sunday, July 31 for maintenance.

The car and passenger ferry connects the north and south ends of A1A, linking Mayport with Fort George Island. Operated by the Jacksonville Transportation Authority since March, the daily ferry departs every half hour for the approximately one-mile voyage across the St. Johns River.

As the owner of Jacksonville Beach institution Angie's Subs and Angie's Grom, Ed Malin has a strong connection to the Beaches area. A third-generation First Coast resident, Malin has been in the food and beverage industry for 30 years. He is now making his first run for public office, seeking the 4th congressional district seat being vacated by the retiring Ander Crenshaw. — By Jennifer Logue

You grew up in Palm Valley. How has the area changed since then?

I was in the first class at Nease High School back in 1982. We were 10th graders then, with no 11th or 12th grades in front of us. Back then, there was only a two-lane road from the Palm Valley area to US 1. There was no Nocatee, no Gate station, no traffic light at the intersection of US 1 and CR 210. There was a Gator Lodge on US 1 across from Nease, and to call it a convenience store would be a compliment. It did have cold drinks and a Space Invaders arcade game that got many of my quarters after school.

Palm Valley back then was still "the sticks." The valley was the other side of the tracks to Ponte Vedra – mostly mobile homes and small, single-family homes. Back before The Players was built and the swamps were drained into "the canal," we used to catch coolers full of shrimp from July through October by throwing cast nets off the docks along the waterway.

How did you become involved in the food and beverage industry?

I moved to Houston around 1986 and I took a job waiting tables there in a restaurant called The Mason Jar. This job would be my first foray into the restaurant industry. I graduated quickly to bartending, noticing that was the place the ladies tended to congregate. I stayed in Houston for a year and then moved back to Jax, taking many different jobs in the industry until buying Angie's Subs in 1999.

What's the most challenging part of running your businesses?

The restaurant business is a very competitive and challenging business to operate. There are many moving parts, many aspects to profitability and many regulations to adhere to. I tell my employees we are in the food service industry: 50 percent of what we do is food and the other 50 is service. If we don't pay attention to either half, we will fail. One of the greatest life experiences for me is to have been the proprietor of a Jax Beach tradition. Angie's Subs has existed to some degree for over 40 years at The Beaches. I have owned it for the last 18 years. In that time, I have employed some of the finest young people that the Beaches have produced. Teaching them some aspects of the food service industry, giving many of them their first jobs, then watching them grow and become parents and hard working adults has been a great reward for me. The most challenging thing is staying competitive and staying profitable at the same time.

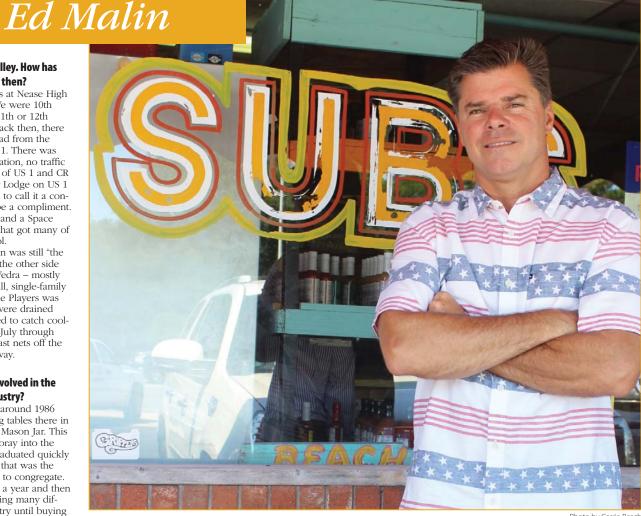

What prompted you to run for Congress?

I have been a frustrated American taxpayer for many years. When I saw that Ander Crenshaw was retiring, I tossed out the idea of running for his seat to my wife. She said go for it. I did.

What are the key issues you'd like to address if elected?

1. Eliminate the federal income tax, capital gains tax, death tax, inheritance tax, corporate tax and payroll taxes, and replace them with a national sales tax. Making this one change would solve a myriad of problems.

2. Fix the VA. It is ridiculous that here in a Navy town our vets, who have sacrificed for all Americans, have to drive by five of the best hospitals in the south to go to a hospital in Gainseville. If our congress can figure out how to get 59 million people food stamps every month, they should be able to take care of our vets.

3. We have to figure out how to stop the chaos that is spreading in the Middle East without American boots on the ground. It sounds impossible, but for years America helped to keep the peace through diplomacy and payoffs to the best bad guy on the block. All threats from Middle East extremists must be dealt with, ideally on Middle Eastern soil. Terror on American soil cannot become the norm.

4. It is time we eliminate the Electoral College. It is possible today for 12 states to pick the next POTUS. What people want is transparency in elections. Not Barack Obama's definition of transparency, Webster's definition. Transparency and uniformity in federal elections are needed for more engagement from the electorate.

You're in a race against some established politicians. What do you think you bring to the race as a first-time candidate?

Entrenched politicians are doomed. Career politicians have created the mess that is our federal government. Take the income tax. Everyone knows it is a broken system. Everyone knows it is completely unfair, corrupt, burdensome and confiscatory. Yet no one in

Congress is really working to fix it or eliminate it. The American taxpayer is waking up, and I am going to be a very loud alarm clock for them.

You are running a self-funded campaign. How do you plan to try and compete against better-funded candidates?

Campaigning for this seat is the toughest thing I have ever undertaken. The two guys at the top of this race will have spent 10 times what I have spent when this is over. Knowing that they can beat me with quantity of messages, I have to beat them with quality.

I am a sandwich maker. I started out with a tiny takeout sandwich shop. Nearby was a Quizno's, a Subway, a Firehouse, a Larry's and numerous fast food joints. Those guys could kill me on price and quantity. But they could not beat my quality. Eighteen years later I am selling more sandwiches from one location than many of those guys combined. Quality over quantity will win.

PV Beaches Coalition meeting hosts SJC Clerk of Court and Sheriff's candidates

Local residents had an opportunity hear from the candidates seeking election to the Clerk of the Circuit Court and St. Johns County sheriff Monday, when the candidates attended the July 25 meeting of the Beaches Coalition.

Clerk of Circuit Court and Comptroller candidates Hunter Conrad – who is running for re-election – and George Lareau were asked to explain the duties and functions of the Clerk of Court's office. Conrad said the office serves two major functions: serving as the legal custodian of all records for official records of the county and handling the functions of the comptroller.

"We are the check and balance to the county commission," Conrad said. "we don't set your budget – that's within the commission's purview. But what we do is make sure the budget is being spent in accordance with what's been approved."

Conrad was appointed by the governor to the clerk of court position following the retirement of his predecessor – a move that surprised Lareau, who had worked in the Clerk of Court's office for 32 years, 19 of them as the chief deputy clerk. At the time of Conrad's appointment, Lareau said, he was serving as interim clerk of court.

Conrad noted that it was within the governor's purview to make executive hiring decisions, and said his background as an accountant and attorney made him well-qualified for the position. During his tenure as clerk, he said, he had brought private-sector efficiencies to the office, eliminating waste and identifying county assets that are under-utilized while working to put more office functions online.

Then it was time for the candidates for St. Johns County Sheriff to speak: Sheriff David Shoar and opponent Debra Maynard. Now serving his third term as sheriff, Shoar highlighted his 35-year career in law enforcement that included four years as St. Augustine chief of police and 12 years as sheriff. He also served 24 years in the Army National Guard.

Maynard worked as a teacher for more than 25 years. She was hired by the St. Johns County Sheriff's office in 2007, where she worked for about five years. Currently, Maynard works for a contractor as a project manager and office manager.

Whereas Shoar believes his long career in law enforcement qualifies him for re-election, Maynard said she believes that she can bring different attributes to the job.

"I love the job of law enforcement and what I can bring to it is a lot of diversity and a lot of different perspectives," she

One of the questions from the audience was if the candidates believe that the sheriff's office is adequately funded or do they see any need for making significant requests for additional funding.

Shoar said that while the sheriff's office has always been adequately funded, the department has not added a sworn road deputy to its staff since 2007. In that same time period, Shoar noted, the county has acquired 53,000 new residents.

"I can tell you this," Shoar said, "not adding law enforcement when you've added 53,000 people is an astounding fact."

Maynard agreed that more officers are needed

"We need feet on the street – bottom line," she said. "When you call, people need to show up. It's super important to make sure we're meeting the needs for our community."

Hana is a certified public accountant and works at H. Hope Hana CPA. She graduated from the University of Florida with a Bachelor of Science in Accounting, and received a master's degree in Taxation at the University of North Florida. 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The Plantation at Ponte Vedra Beach unveils renovated Beach Club

The Plantation at Ponte Vedra Beach recently finished the second phase of its multimillion dollar renovations to its amenities with the completion of the Beach Club.

In addition to its previous offerings, The Plantation rolled out a host of new features for the Beach Club, including new decking and stone pavers, additional parking, new interior lighting, a permanent gas fire bowl, and travertine on the replaced and expanded pool deck.

According to Rob Schlingmann, general manager and chief operating

officer, the renovations also feature upgraded landscaping – including the addition of mature palm trees – as well as an enlarged entrance to the property, more oceanfront seating and air conditioning in the existing cabana.

"I think overall the member experience has improved," Schlingmann said. "A lot of (the renovations) were decided because of our changing demographics, and the Beach Club is one of the most used amenities at The Plantation."

The changes come after The Plantation's facilities improvement plan was proposed two years ago; in December 2014, the owners of The Plantation at Ponte Vedra Beach voted in favor of moving forward with plans to renovate and revitalize the amenities, and building began in August 2015. The Beach Club's renovations build upon renovations completed during the first phase of the master plan, which consisted of the addition of an amenity park and

full croquet lawn, open-air pavilions, a playground and an open space area. The final phase – the golf course revitalization – began in September 2015, and the course is expected to reopen Oct 1

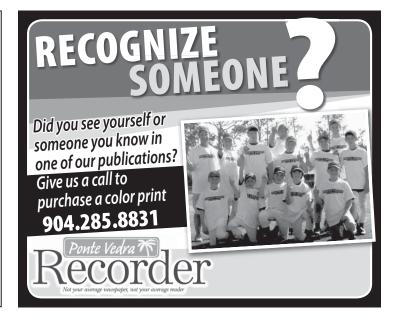

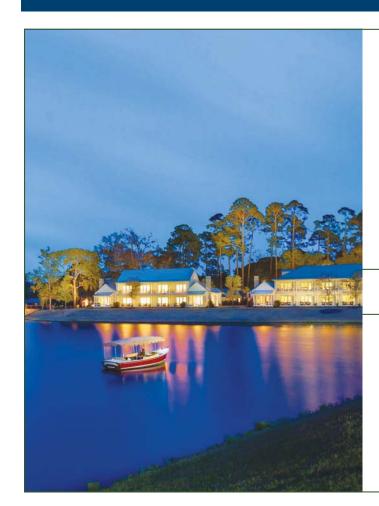

Back-to-school sales tax holiday Aug. 5-7

Dresses

Florida's three-day back-toschool sales tax holiday will take place Aug. 5-7 this year, enabling parents to take advantage of summer savings on clothing and other school-related pur-

During the tax holiday, Florida law directs that no sales tax or local option tax will be collected on the purchases of clothing, footwear and certain accessories selling for \$60 or less per item. Certain school supplies selling for \$15 or less per item will also be tax-exempt.

New this year, qualifying businesses may choose not to participate in the sales tax holiday. Qualified businesses must send a written notice to the Florida Department of Revenue by Aug. 1, and notices stating that the business will not be participating in the tax holiday must be posted at each business location. Complete details are available on the Florida Department of Revenue website. Examples of other places of business where the tax exemption will not apply include theme parks, entertainment complexes, public lodging establishments and airports.

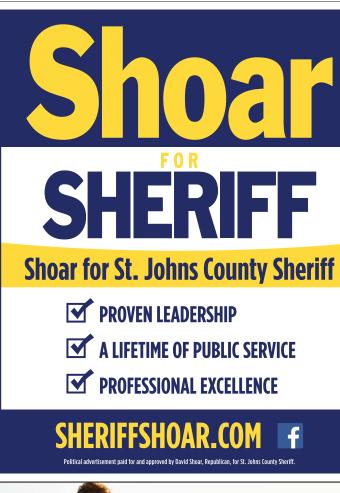

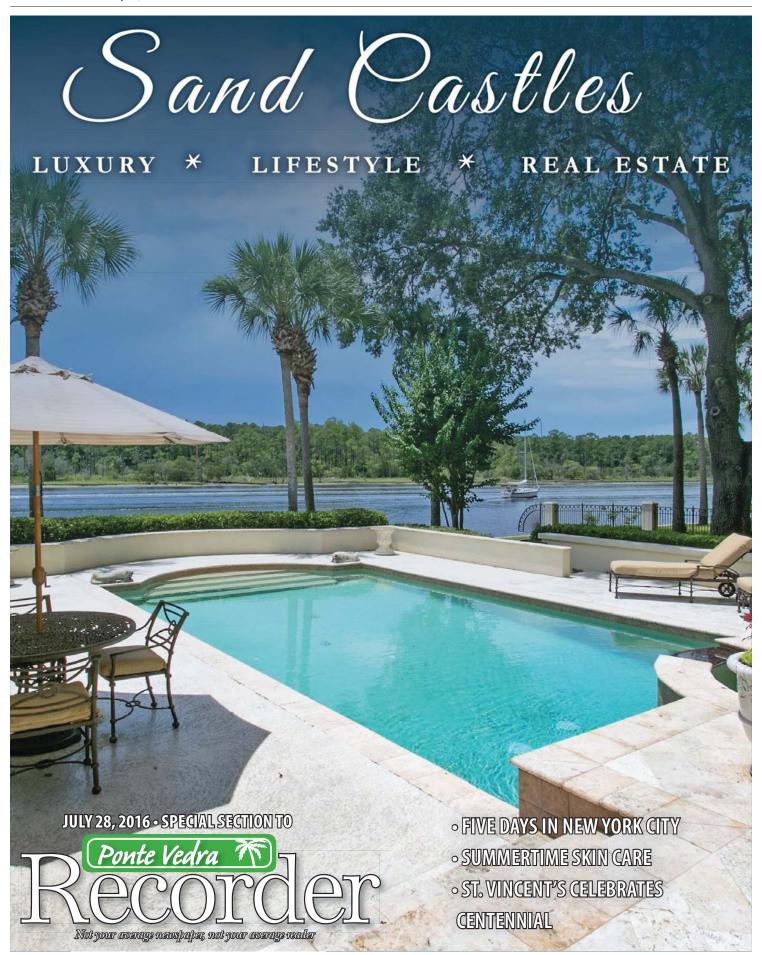

Market shifts: Understanding 'leading' indicators

Each week, real estate professionals are asked the following question: How is the real estate market doing? The answer given most often, if statistical in nature, generally refers to the following two categories:

- What is my home worth?
- Homes sold (are units up or down?)

This certainly makes sense from the public's point of view. This type of information gives an overall sense of what is happening, and depending on the answer can make you feel comfortable or uncomfortable with the current state of the market. But here is the challenge: This type of information is considered a "lagging indicator." That means it has already happened – great for an overview, but not if you want to determine the direction of the market.

What we have learned from the past is that national shifts in the real estate market occur somewhat gradually. From a local standpoint, however, the change can be swift. How do we ensure that we are keeping an accurate pulse on the direction of the real estate market? The answer to that question is to start understanding leading indicators. Here are two leading

indicators our agents study to get a better feel for our market:

- · Number of showings each month
- · Days on market for our listings

Let's take a look at both measures, starting with the number of showings. Each month, I track the number of showings that our listings have scheduled. Our office carries more than 400 listings, so this measure is statistically significant. If our showings are even or up, it is most likely safe to say that our market is healthy. If I see a dramatic drop or even a dramatic rise, that could be cause for concern.

I can report that as of June our number year-to-date is up from the same time period in 2015. This should come as no surprise to most. Now, this is not the be-all, end-all to understanding the market overall, but a key component in determining a shift.

Once a listing is posted in the MLS, the number of days to sell the home is tracked. This statistic is called "days on market." Obviously, if that figure starts to rise or fall, that also could be a warning that a shift is on the way. It is a key discussion point when agents list homes.

For the listings sold in our MLS, "days on

market is down 9.1 percent from 2015 YTD. This is not a sign of a shifting market. As a whole, our market continues to appear healthy.

Please keep in mind that to truly understand what the market is doing, you do need to study it. Certainly, there is more than one measure that is required to understand if our market is shifting. For instance, our overall market could be up 4.7 percent in closed units, but certain regions of Northeast Florida could be down.

That is why it is critically important to establish solid relationships with real estate professionals. They have instant access to this information and can assist in making wise choices when it comes to purchasing or listing a home.

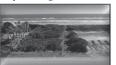

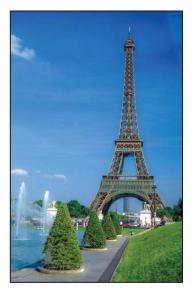
The sightseeing was whirlwind because of time constraints, but most of our goals were accomplished and we only lost Jane a couple of times.

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All aboard for a good cause: CSX Charity Train Ride benefits community

Have you ever taken a train ride for charity? In 2007, my husband Dale and I boarded a CSX train for a wonderful evening filled with great dining and an

enjoyable ride aboard a beautiful train all in the name of charity!

Here is how this unusual ride began. In 2002 CSX Executive Vice President Clarence Gooden was hosting dinner aboard the CSX office car with his guest, the newly elected Sheriff John Rutherford. The sheriff explained how pleased he was to fulfill all the commitments he made during his race for sheriff – with the exception of one very important campaign promise he had made to renovate Mallison Park to rid the area of drug dealers.

According to Sheriff john Rutherford, "The CSX Charity Train resulted from a violent drug problem and a very good community steward."

This campaign promise, explained Rutherford, would cost approximately \$100,000 to set up a Police Athletic league (PAL) program within the park. Gooden told the sheriff maybe he could help him raise that amount. And in that single moment, the idea of the Charity Train Ride came to life!

Gooden suggested to his right-hand organizer Rosemary Thigpen they could charge \$5,000 per table to include the private office car ride with dinner and entertainment. All proceeds would go directly to improving Mallison Park. With a plan mapped out and the course charted, the inaugural CSX Charity Train departed Jacksonville's Prime Osborn Center for a ride to Tampa that would return that evening. An entertainment car was included, and a meal of surf and turf was served.

CSX's Gooden, along with 18 tables of supporters, helped fulfill the sheriff's campaign promise. With the \$100,000 raised that evening, the First CSX Charity Train that departed in the spring of 2003 was a huge success!

"Since that time," Rutherford said, "the PAL expansion saved Mallison Park, the community enjoyed a dramatic drop in crime and the children have a wonderful place to grow and play."

The following spring, Gooden decided to host the train again. This time, the train would benefit two charities, Angelwood – a charity supported by the sheriff, who served on its board – and the American Heart Association, a charity with

which Gooden was involved. A new route was charted and since 2004, The CSX Charity Train Ride has run to and from Waycross, Georgia. Several of the private cars that are used in the event have served presidents during their presidential campaigns.

As the Charity Train Ride has grown, so has the addition of new charities. In 2016, 11 organizations received a total of \$410,000 raised. Each charity had two

Since its first journey in 2003, The Charity Train Ride has raised nearly \$4 million for more than a dozen charities, with 100 percent of the donations going directly to charity.

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Summertime skin care

As aestheticians, we get asked a lot of questions about skincare, especially during the hot summer months. We've put together a list of the top "most commonly asked skincare

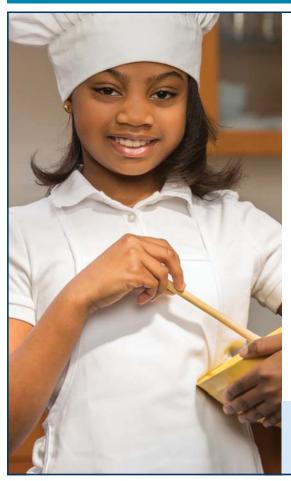
What does sunscreen actually do? Depending on the type and its ingredients, sunscreens either absorb or reflect the rays from the sun that are harmful to your skin.

What does "SPF" mean? SPF stands for Sun Protection Factor. This refers to the amount of time you can stay in the sun before you start to burn. While this can vary depending on your skin type, on average it is usually about 10 minutes. So let's say you have a sunscreen with an SPF of

50. You would take the number 50 and multiply it by 10; this would give you 500 minutes of protection in the sun (about 8 hours.) If you have an SPF of 30, then you would multiply 30 times 10 and that would give you 300 minutes of protection (5 hours.) Keep this in mind the next time you go to purchase a sunscreen.

If I buy waterproof or sweat-resistant sunscreen, do I still need to reapply? Yes. Reapplying sunscreen is still vital, since the sunscreen comes off as you sweat, even if it's sweat resistant. As a rule of thumb, you should re-apply your sunscreen every hour

Tips on how to prep your pool if a storm strikes

Prepping your pool before a hurricane strikes is not something that's necessarily on your radar when a storm is approaching, but would you even know what to do to get your pool storm ready should the need arise?

With a little planning and preparation, you can protect your investment - and your property - from an impending hurricane, tropical storm or severe weather.

Sam Shaver, owner of the Ponte Vedra and Jacksonville Beach Pinch A Penny locations, said the main concern of their customers is the pool overflowing due to heavy rains.

"Ideally, (you should) lower the pool level to about 6 to 8 inches before the storm and if it does rain, the pool would be able to take the water to where it won't overflow," Shaver said.

It's important not to drain the pool completely, he said, because if the water table is high, the pool could pop up out of the ground.

The other concern is the chlorine level of the pool.

"You want to make sure that the chorine levels are at the optimum between

two and four parts per million and ideally (you want) to shock the pool," Shaver said.

Shaver also recommended turning off all your equipment during the storm and said it's best to move any furniture or objects around the pool into the garage or away from open areas to avoid their becoming projectiles in strong winds.

After the storm, Shaver recommends that pool owners bring a sample of their water to the closest Pinch A Penny store and have a free seven-point test for water balance done. The customer will receive a print out of the results and can be advised about what action they need to take to get their pool back to optimum

In addition, the Pinch A Penny Pool Patio & Spa website offers additional tips on what to do before the storm and after the storm:

Before the storm

- · If you decide to remove any child safety fencing, do not allow children near the pool after the fence is removed.
- · Shut down power at the breaker panel if there is a chance the pool motor

or other electrical equipment could be submerged.

- · Sandbag the area around the motor or other electrical equipment if possible, wrap the exposed equipment in waterproof covering and tie it securely.
- Do not drain the pool completely. If you decide to lower the water level to help prevent the pool from overflowing, it is not recommenced to drain past the bottom of the skimmer, as running the pump dry can cause serious pump dam-
- · Add extra liquid chlorine and circulate the pool as much as possible before the storm or add a 4-pound floating chlorinator to the pool to provide some sanitization in case you lose power and cannot run your pump. You may want to add an algaecide to further prevent a

possible algae bloom.

After the storm

- Remove debris from the pool.
- Reset your circuit breaks and pump timer if you lost power during the storm.
- · Remove any covering from the motor or other equipment to allow for airflow. If the pump motor has been submerged, it should be removed for professional cleaning and drying.
- Return the pool water to its proper level. Empty the pump and skimmer baskets and open the appropriate valves to allow water to circulate properly when the pump is turned back on.
- · Repair or replace any screens, doors, fences or gates used to prevent children from entering your pool unat-

Preparing your heart for storm emergencies

Hurricane season is underway, and while most people prepare their homes and families when a storm hits, they don't always take steps to protect their hearts.

Not only can hurricanes and other weather emergencies result in a loss of food, water and medical care, but they can also lead to significant stress that can be fatal for those with heart disease. By managing your stress and taking a few extra precautions, you can stay heart-healthy during a weather emergency.

Control stress

Hurricanes, tornadoes and other emergencies can cause acute stress that increases your risk of heart attack or stroke. In fact, a study from the American Heart Association found that after Hurricane Sandy, the hardest-hit counties in New Jersey experienced a 22 percent increase in fatal heart attacks. Acute stress can reduce control of your blood pres-

sure, increase heart rate and cause more forceful heart muscle contractions, according to the American Psychological Association.

During an anxiety-provoking event such as a

weather emergency, you can use several methods to help manage your stress. Practice breathing from your diaphragm, focus on relaxing your muscles and do moderate exercise. The ultimate way to relieve stress – and the best way to ensure your safety – is to evacuate if you know a storm is approaching.

Prepare healthy meals and medication

Every household should have a stock of healthy, non-perishable food items in case of a power outage, but it's especially important to include diet-specific foods for family members with heart disease that meet their need for proteins, vitamins, fruits and vegetables. Ideal proteins during a storm include canned meats, chili, beans, nuts and all-natural protein powders. Energy bars, crackers, dried fruit, unsweetened applesauce and low-sodium canned vegetables are other good food sources. While you should have non-perishable food sources if the power goes out, you can still eat perishable foods in the freezer for up to 24 hours, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

In addition to heart-healthy meals, make sure to refill any heart medications prior to a storm, stock up on any medical supplies you will need and stay hydrated.

Know the signs of a heart attack

Medical services may be more difficult for you to reach, and to reach you, during a storm. Being aware of the early warning signs of a heart attack can help you get assistance for yourself or a loved one in time. Though some heart attacks are sud-

den and intense, most begin with mild pain or discomfort, according to the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute. Symptoms of a heart attack include: chest discomfort that lasts more than a few minutes, shortness of breath, cold sweats, nausea and discomfort in other areas of the upper body, including the arms, back, neck, jaw or stomach.

If you believe you or a loved one might be having a heart attack, call 911 immediately. It's also helpful to know CPR in case anyone should ever experience a cardiac arrest in your presence, as this could be a lifesaving measure.

Although a major storm can be stressful, with the right preparations, knowledge and stress-management tools, you can ensure your heart outlasts any emergency.

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New documentary spotlights work of K9s for Warriors

Jacksonville screening beginning of national exposure for film, nonprofit

Jacksonville's San Marco Theatre played host to a special private screening last week of a new documentary that spotlights the efforts of K9s for Warriors to train and pair service dogs with veterans dealing with PTSD and traumatic brain injury.

Held July 21, the screening was preceded by a red carpet reception at Grape & Grain attended by K9s for Warriors staff, supporters, volunteers – and canines. Volunteer Mary Daniel was accompanied by service dog Delaney – named for retired Rear Admiral Kevin Delaney – while K9s for Warriors "Puppy Raiser Advisor" Barbara Jennings brought Victory.

"We are very excited to see the film," Jennings said prior to the screening. "The documentary shows a K9s for Warriors graduation class where Victory's sister, Faith, graduated with a veteran."

The name of the veteran paired with Faith? Christian. "Sometimes I think the matches are just meant to be," Daniel said with a smile. "I know Delaney will definitely be paired with a Navy veteran to honor (Rear Admiral Delaney) and that tradition."

Also on hand for the event were representatives from Early Times® Kentucky Whisky, which produced the short documentary.

"Early Times has a long history of working with veterans," said Senior Brand Manager Marc Hindorff. "We were looking for a veterans' organization to partner with and came across K9s for Warriors. We were just so impressed by the tremendous job they were doing helping veterans get back into society."

What particularly moved Early Times, Hindorff said, was hearing from K9s for Warriors graduates about how the program essentially gave them their lives

"We thought, 'How do we get that message out?" Hindorff said. "The idea for the documentary just grew from there."

Working with K9s for Warriors, Early Times connected with retired Army Sergeant First Class Joe Swoboda and his service dog, Lilly – both of whom were present for last week's screening.

"We met Joe and instantly fell in love with him," Hindorff said. "He has such a great heart and is so passionate about helping other veterans, and the documentary has given him a platform to reach even more of them."

'Reinforcements'

Titled "Reinforcements," the documentary follows Swoboda on a five-day road trip with a young veteran named Travis who is struggling with PTSD. When Swoboda first proposes the trip from Washington DC to K9s for Warriors' Camp K9 in Ponte Vedra, Travis is hesitant

"I can't really deal with crowds and public places anymore," he says in the film, later noting, "When I came home, I didn't do anything. I didn't talk to anyone, I didn't eat...It doesn't go away. There's no off switch."

Swoboda assures him, though, that he will be there to assist him and the two begin their road trip by first visiting Arlington National Cemetery. From there, the pair travel to Kentucky, where they visit an Early Times barreling plant and pick up some dog houses made from barrels to deliver to Camp K9. While there, they meet with another K9s for Warriors graduate, who tells Travis that prior to the program, he was taking a "bag full of medications" from the VA that he feared was

only making his condition worse.

Then, while training with his service dog at Camp K9, the veteran recalls, a thunderstorm triggered a nightmare. "Skip woke me up licking my face," he recalls, "and I said, 'I'm not taking any more meds from the VA'"

The pair meet with another K9s for Warriors graduate in Georgia before arriving in Ponte Vedra to attend the K9s for Warriors graduation and present a donation from Early Times to the program. As the film concludes, Travis's outlook appears to have improved and he expresses renewed hope for the future.

Following the San Marco screening, Hindorff noted that "Reinforcements" has been entered for consideration into 30 film festivals, and has already been accepted into the Louisville International Film Festival. After being shown on the festival circuit, he said, the film will be made available for public viewing, which Early Times hopes will raise awareness of the issues facing returning veterans.

"We throw the term 'PTSD' out there a lot without really understanding what that means," he said. "I think the film does a really good job of showing what veterans go through."

Swoboda agreed.

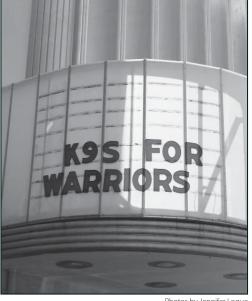
"We know driving down I-95 there are no IEDs, we know that," he said. "But soldiers get so used to being on patrol in these dangerous areas. You get so used to looking at every piece of trash, every movement, every person around you, it drives you crazy. It gets to a point that vets just don't want to come out of their house."

Swoboda is pleased that "Reinforcements" has been entered in so many film festivals for the exposure it will bring to PTSD and the help that programs such as K9s for Warriors can offer to veterans who are struggling to reintegrate into civilian society.

"I want to stop the suicides," Swoboda said. "I hope every vet in the country gets to the see this film, so they'll know that there is life after combat. It won't be the same, but it can be great."

Predicting The Future

One of the questions increasingly being asked these days has to do with the timing of the next recession. There are those who see the current economic climate remaining in place for years and those who see a recession in our near future. On what does the second group base their opinion?

• The very slow to flat growth in U.S. Gross Domestic Product (GDP), a measure of the output of all goods and services produced in this country annually. A healthy growth rate is in the 4 to 5 percent range; a modest growth rate is 2 to 3 percent. Our current growth rate may slip toward 1pecent this year. A recession is defined as two consecutive quarters of negative GDP growth - we are closer to that now.

· The declining jobs growth as reported in recent monthly jobs numbers coupled with an increase in weekly unemployment claims. Many see this trend as an early predictor of a recession, as fewer people working results in reduced consumption, which in turn causes a recession.

· Decreasing to non-existent corporate profitability. The earnings reports on corporate profitability for the first quarter of this year were largely underwhelming, with many corporations reporting lower profitability than was predicted despite fairly modest predictions. This trend suggests that a recession may already exist in the manufacturing sector and could easily spread to other sectors.

Those who disagree with this assessment suggest that the election of a new president, with the expectation of

policy changes, economic stimulus and a possible reduction in taxes will get the economy moving and keep us out of a recession. While that argument holds promise, we'll all have to wait unit November to see the outcome of the race for the White House. More government spending, which will cause the already voluminous national debt to balloon even further, will not be a great move for the economy as a whole.

I cannot predict the future any more accurately than anyone else, but if historical trends mean anything, we are closer to a recession than some will admit and just a few negative surprises away from a market correction.

This year marked JAGA's inaugural presentation of the Bill Black Award in honor of the long-time JAGA director who believed in creating a scholarship for area golfers.

"No one volunteered his time to this game like Bill," said Jim Howard, director of golf at the Ponte Vedra Inn & Club. "He loved every part of it, especially working on junior events and supporting the future of golf. He set a personal example for me and stood for what JAGA is all about."

The retired quarterback is perhaps best known for his famous "Hail Mary" pass that gave Boston College the win over the University of Miami in the 1984 Orange Bowl. He went on to play in the United States Football League and then the Chicago Bears and New England Patriots through the late 1980s. He then played in the Canadian Football League for eight years and was named the league's "Most Outstanding Player" an unprecedented six times. In 1998 he signed with the National Football League's Buffalo Bills, was selected for the NFL Pro Bowl and carried the Bills to the playoffs. At the age of 38, Flutie signed a contract with the San Diego Chargers to become their starting quarterback. After four seasons with the Chargers, he was offered the opportunity to finish his career with his hometown team, the New England

Flutie achieved numerous honors during his college and professional football career, including All American at Boston College, College Football Player of the Year, 1984 Heisman Trophy Winner, and Grey Cup Most Valuable Player (1991-1994/1996/1997).

Flutie graduated from Boston College with degrees in Communications and Computer Science and is married to his high-school sweetheart, Laurie Flutie, and is the father of two children. He and his wife established the Doug Flutie, Jr. Foundation for Autism in 1998 in the name of their son Dougie, Jr., to help less-fortunate families who have children with autism. He also created the cereal Flutie Flakes, the proceeds from which benefit the foundation. The Flutie Foundation has raised more than \$12 million for autism causes.

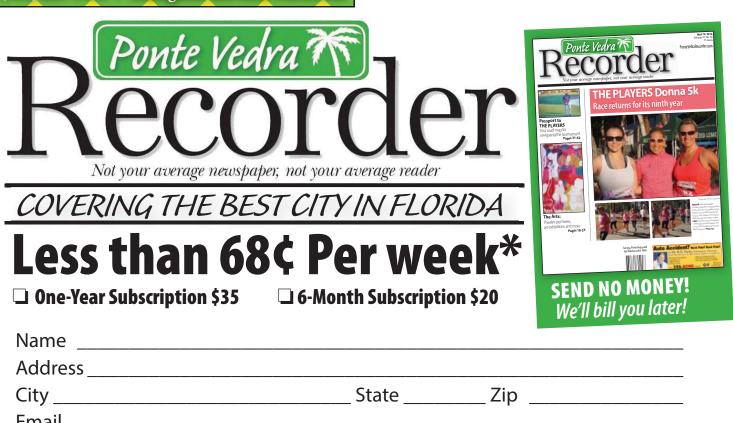

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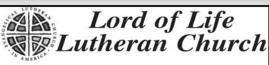
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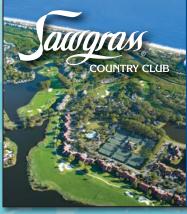
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
