

# Proposed neighborhood is incompatible with environment — and laws

I am greatly concerned about the residential development proposed for 1044 Ponte Vedra Blvd. There have been countless developers that looked at purchasing this property over the course of ten plus years, but learned there is not enough buildable land to sustain a profitable purchase for a development this size. GreenPointe states that they can build 30 homes because it is zoned for 30 homes. Regardless of zoning, you are dealing with what Mother Nature had provided you. This property is a mixture of wetlands and uplands which is the floodplain servicing the Guana. GreenPointe needs to build on the uplands of this property and not the wetlands of this property.

According to The US Federal Government, 91% of this property is coded PF01C and PEM1F. PF01C is Freshwater Forested/Shurb wetlands. Officially coded as Plustrine (wetlands) which is designed to be seasonally flooded. PEM1F is Freshwater Emergent Wetlands which is also coded as Palustrine system (wetlands) which are semipermanently flooded. The only buildable land is coded as Upland Hardwood Forests, which makes up only 3.2 acres

or 9% of the property.

Not to mention, the soils are 50% Tisonia Mucky Peat, which are "frequently flooded," according to the US Department of Agriculture.

Not to mention, this property is in a floodplain for the Guana River, which is one of only 28 federally protected estuarine research systems in the US. "A floodplain is an area of land adjacent to a stream or river ... that experiences flooding during periods of high discharge." This are is designed to be under water.

Not to mention, Obama and the US Government passed a new bill last month in Congress. "The policy (Executive order No. 13690) illustrates the awareness that we should not build things that are vulnerable to flooding now or in the future." Due to climate change and the resulting sea level rise, the government is adding more stringent requirements for where Federal buildings, etc., can be built.

Now builders "offset" the destruction of wetlands by mitigation. This means that they can build on wetlands in one place by "buying" wetlands in another place. But when you look into the laws of wetland mitigation, you will see that this practice cannot apply here.

According to the national Environment Protection Agency, US Army Corps of Engineers and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, the legal wording for wetlands mitigation is "restoration (re-establishment or rehabilitation), establishment (creation), enhancement and/or in certain circumstances preservation of wetlands, streams and other aquatic resources for the purposes of offsetting unavoidable adverse impacts which remain after all appropriate and practicable avoidance and minimization has been achieved."

Clearly, building a residential neighborhood for profit does not fall under the category of "unavoidable."

Again, build on the dry land of this property — not the wetlands.

### Commissioners do not deserve our trust

When hearing and voting on rezoning and variance issues, Ponte Vedra's citizens deserve commissioners who we can trust to seek out and consider input from all affected citizens, conduct an open and fair hearing process and follow the input of their own legal counsel and the local zoning board.

Our commissioners' recent hearing of a developer's proposed access road onto Corona Rd. was a travesty of fair process and decision making unworthy of their constituents' trust.

The citizens most adversely affected

by the proposed zoning change did not become aware of the proposal until a few concerned people noticed a single small sign buried in vegetation on the property to be developed and went door to door to gain input the weekend before the County Commissioners Meeting. Yet, as acknowledged by the commissioners at the hearing, they had been meeting with the developer behind closed doors for two years.

The Ponte Vedra Zoning and Adjustment Board recommended denial of the proposed change based on its failure to meet the Land Development Code and danger to many citizens. At the County Commissioners Meeting, the commissioners attempted repeatedly to deny representatives of opposed citizen groups equal time to present their arguments and rebut the developer's. Only after the intervention of the county attorney were those representatives allowed to present their petition and speak. Without adequate explanation, the Commissioners then overruled the recommendation of the Ponte Vedra Zoning and Adjustment Board and the majority of citizens and approved the proposal.

The citizens of Ponte Vedra deserve much better leadership!

#### Players by the Sea Theatre open submission call

# New BEAM Thrift store opens at 7north

On a biting cold and windy morning of Feb. 5, dozens of volunteers and supporters of the Beaches Emergency Assistance Ministry gathered to celebrate the long-anticipated grand opening and ribbon cutting of BEAM's newest thrift store location at 7north.

The chilly temps didn't deter the line of loyal BEAM (Beaches Emergency Assistance Ministry Inc.) thrift store shoppers who lined up in the early morning hours to be among the first customers of the new, larger store they have eagerly anticipated.

The thrift store is located in the 7north building located at the corner of Third St. and Seventh Ave. N. - the former Jacksonville Beach U.S. Post Office location. The building is owned by Beaches United Methodist Church which neighbors the property. The church spearheaded what will be a number of collaborative partnerships with community and non-profit leaders of local ministries that provide assistance to underserved Beaches residents.

This store has been a long time in the making," said BEAM Executive Director Susan King. "We had hoped to open last summer and it has been an extraordinary effort by the church, by this group and we are just thrilled and excited."

The new store has tripled the available retail space and made for better parking options and more convenient donation drop-off. This location is the organization's third thrift store. BEAM's first store, located at 1110 Shetter Ave. in Jacksonville Beach opened two years ago. The second location opened last summer in Mayport at 1447 Mayport Rd., Atlantic Beach.

The 18,000 square foot building sat vacant for five years. The building is worth an estimated \$2 million. It recently underwent a complete renovation, made possible through a generous donation and efforts by Pastor Jerry Sweat and the congregation of Beaches United Methodist Church.

The building will eventually house a number of services for the Beaches community. The opening of BEAM Thrift at 7north is the first piece of that vision to begin operation. In March, a satellite location for Feeding Northeast Florida, the community's food bank that serves 17 area counties, will open. The Beaches Community Food Bank will be managed by BEAM and serve as a "Hub-and-Spoke" model for FNEFL. Since the satellite location will have on-site refrigerators and freezers for food storage, it will allow FNEFL to streamline delivery operations to the food bank and make the organization more efficient in the process. The Beaches

Community Food Bank will be a distribution site for the organizations, faith-based agencies and non-profits that feed area homeless and underserved individuals. The third component of services offered will be mental health services that will include advocacy, education and resources.

Beach Church worshipers raised \$1 million in the spring and summer of 2015 for the building's renovations. Additional funds from churches, foundations and individuals will allow for further upgrades to both the exterior and interior of the buildout and a reserve fund for future upkeep, management and maintenance of the property. Operations of 7north will be governed through a board of directors that will be overseeing the mission. Long-term tenant leases and revenue sharing will allow 7north to be a selfsustaining operation.

Neptune Beach Mayor Harriet Pruette and Atlantic Beach Mayor Mitch Reeves also attended the ribbon cutting. "We like to say that we're three cities in one community and this is a good example of that today," Jacksonville Beach Mayor Charlie Latham said before cutting the ribbon.

Annually, BEAM supports more than 20,000 Beaches residents with over \$900.000 of services. Founded in 1985, BEAM helps low-income families and individuals in the Jack-

Services include rent and utility assistance, food pantries, an organic garden that provides thousands of pounds of fresh vegetables and fruits to their clients annually, nutritional educational programs and a Back to School program serving about 1,000 kids each year. Revenue generated from thrift store sales go towards BEAM's programs.

"We didn't get here by ourselves. There was a visionary leader of the Beach United Methodist Church (who) really saw this building that had been sitting vacant for so long as a community asset and that church worked very hard to create this space. We're going to be the first of many things going into this building, but it's a very exciting day for us here at BEAM," King said.

The Shetter Ave. and Mayport thrift stores are open Tues.-Sat.,10 a.m.-5 p.m. BEAM Thrift at 7north is located at 318 Seventh Ave. N., Jacksonville Beach and is open Mon.-Sat., 10 a.m.-6 p.m. Donations will only be accepted at the new location. # Candidates speak to Republican Club about election

## Conrad, Lareau vie for County Clerk of Courts

While the presidential election has captured the imagination and attention of the vast majority of voters, the voters of St. Johns County will have an important decision to make on Election Day this year. Voters will choose between two candidates to elect the next St. Johns County Clerk of the Circuit Court and Comptroller.

The two candidates, Governorappointed current Clerk Hunter Conrad and 32-year clerk of courts office veteran George Lareau, spoke on Monday to those gathered for a meeting of the Republican Club of Greater St. Augustine. The candidates spoke about their backgrounds, answered moderated questions and fielded questions from club members.

The Joint Select Committee on

Judicial Personnel of the Florida Legislature calculates that the Clerk and Comptroller's Office performs close to one thousand different constitutional and statutory functions. The Clerk's office acts as the clerk to the Board of County Commissioners, the clerk to the judiciary and is the custodian of records for the clerk system. The clerk also plays a role as an auditor for the county.

"We don't write the budget," said Conrad in describing the position. "We make sure that [the commissioners] are spending the money appropriately as laid out by the county. It's a vital piece of the administration of the county."

But in terms of day-to-day function, much of what the Clerk does centers on individuals in the county."

"In addition to making sure land transactions are recorded without errors, making sure court proceedings are accurately reflected in the docket, paying the county's bills — the Clerk's duty is to serve the public," said Lareau.

Conrad, 29, was appointed as St. Johns County Clerk of Courts by Florida Gov. Rick Scott in October 2015. Conrad filled the vacancy gen-

erated by the resignation of Cheryl Strickland. Conrad is a St. Augustine attorney, who previously practiced with Canan Law and served as an assistant state attorney in the Seventh Judicial Circuit. He also holds an accounting degree.

"As a citizen of St. Johns County, I find it disappointing that someone in charge of an office that's running well could be replaced by someone with no experience," said Lareau, who is also running for the seat. "I trust the voters will remedy this."

Lareau boasts more than three decades working in the St. Johns County Clerk of Courts office and was appointed as interim Clerk by a Seventh Circuit judge before Conrad was appointed. Lareau served as deputy chief clerk for 19 years, but says that if elected, he would eliminate the position in order to streamline the office and cut costs.

Lareau spoke about the handson experience he would bring to the seat, while Conrad relied on his plans for the future to entice voters.

"Government has gotten out of control. It's too big - it's only getting bigger," said Conrad. "At least, at the local level, if we can do things to maintain common sense fiscally conservative solutions, that's what I want to do.'

Lareau spoke about the many changes the clerk's office has implemented during his tenure in order to serve the county with the best resources available.

"I've been involved in transitioning the clerk's office from a system of manually storing records in books and ledgers to one of the best and most progressive Clerk's Offices in the state of Florida," Lareau said. "We have clerk's offices from all over the country come to St. Johns County to see how we do things because we do them so well."

Lareau framed himself as a successor in a line of exemplary Clerks.

"Try and find a negative article about your St. Johns County Clerk's office," he said. "You will not find one because [Carl] 'Bud' Merkel did it right, Cheryl Strickland did it right, and under Cheryl's leadership, I did it right. I'll continue to do it right."

The vote for the St. Johns County Clerk of Courts and Comptroller will be on the Nov. 8, 2016 ballot, and the winner of the seat will take office in January 2017.



Check your water. Is the water in your home fluoridated? If not, talk to your dentist about possible supplement options, as toothpastes and some foods may provide the amount you need. Fluoride works with your saliva to protect the precious tooth enamel from both sugars and plaque.

**Schedule regular checkups.** When you're a busy parent, it's easy to let dental checkups slip off your radar, but making regular appointments may be more important than you think. Your pediatric dentist will assist in preventing dental disease and cavities and point out any developmental issues. Get your children acquainted with their dentist

early and make sure they know the dentist's office is nothing to fear.

**Seek helpful resources.** It can be helpful to find a guide for teaching children proper oral hygiene habits. For example, parents and teachers alike can visit *ColgateBSBF.com* to download free materials and activities specially designed to help educate kids about keeping their smiles bright. Colgate is committed to improving children's dental health through its Bright Smiles, Bright Futures program. You can also try your local Boy Scout troop, where there is a Dentistry merit badge course (*bsa.org*).

Introduce flossing early on. Flossing removes food particles and plaque in places where a toothbrush can't always reach. Beginning at age 4, you should floss for your children. By the time they reach age 8, most kids are able to floss on their own. Be sure to give regular reminders of how necessary it is for your kids to remember to floss.

Encourage a balanced diet. A well-balanced diet is essential for developing strong, decay-resistant teeth, so your children need the full range of vitamins and nutrients. Frequent snacking on sugar or starchy foods like cookies, candy, pretzels and potato chips combine with plaque on teeth to create acids that attack the teeth enamel and may lead to cavities.

# Dark chocolate consumption may lower your blood pressure, reduce cholesterol and stress

Valentine's Day is just around the corner and merchants have stocked their shelves with plenty of chocolate treats to keep chocoholics everywhere satisfied. What you may not know are the potential health benefits chocolate can deliver — if you choose the right chocolate.

Of the chocolate available, the kind that provides the biggest therapeutic benefit is dark chocolate. The helpful compounds in chocolate are polyphenols and flavanols — antioxidants that protect the body from damage. In fact, cocoa beans contain higher concentrations of antioxidants than many fruits. Choose dark chocolate with a minimum of 70 percent cocoa solids to get the most health benefits. With more cocoa solids than milk chocolate, dark chocolate is also often lower in calories, fat and sugar than its sweeter cousin. Specifically the polyphenols seem to positively impact blood pressure and cholesterol.


ing dark chocolate can reduce blood pressure. A number of studies support this theory. Research published in the Journal of the American Medical Association (2007) revealed eating dark chocolate (approximate 30 calories daily) was linked to blood pressure reductions — and without causing weight gain! The polyphenols seem to have the magic effect on blood pressure. In

a study contrasting dark chocolate versus white chocolate (which has no polyphenols) hypertension patients who consumed dark chocolate daily for 18 weeks saw a reduction in systolic as well as diastolic blood pressure while the patients who ate white chocolate saw no change in

their blood pressure levels.

In research released in February 2011, scientists found that chocolate can raise the body's levels of HDL cholesterol (good cholesterol) and lower LDL (bad cholesterol). Scientists remarked that the polyphenols spur the production of specific proteins that are abundantly found in HDL cholesterol.

At the same time, the polyphenols appear to multiply the development

of LDL receptors, which then lower the amount of LDL cholesterol.

In addition to helping lower blood pressure and reduce cholesterol, chocolate has also been shown to reduce stress.


According to a study published in the Journal of Proteome Research (2009), participants who rated themselves as emotionally stressed ate an ounce and a half of dark chocolate daily for two weeks. Researchers noted the chocolate influenced the metabolism and subsequently lowered the amount of stress hormones in the participants. However, before you bite into that chocolate treat, remember, chocolate can be high in sugar, fat and calories, so eating in moderation is vital. If you have health conditions such as diabetes, consult your health care provider to make sure it is safe for you to consume chocolate.

# How to protect more than your heart this Valentine's Day

### 4 ways to make the best of a potentially bad situation

There may be no worse feeling than having your heart broken, especially on Valentine's Day.

"But anyone who has had their heart broken — whether in a divorce or a long-term relationship where assets were an issue — knows that romantic heartbreak can extend to financial heartbreak," says attorney Hillel Presser of the Presser Law Firm, P.A., which specializes in comprehensive domestic and international Asset Protection. Knowing that your liability is limited, asset-wise, may even help hungry hearts in a relationship. Presser, author of "Financial Self Defense" (www.assetprotectionattorneys.com), offers four ways to start protecting your assets from a possible bad breakup in the future.

• Get the prenup. One barrier to the

pre-marriage agreement is that intended spouses hesitate to raise the delicate subject of a prenuptial agreement. Few believe their marriage can fail, and many fear that a prenup communicates distrust. But a pre-marriage agreement is the safest way to protect yourself from a future divorce, Presser says. Consider a prenup as a mature consideration for those who can admit that not everything works out perfectly in a marriage.

- Don't cohabit without a cohabitation agreement. A cohabitation agreement defines the couple's property rights. More than a few want to avoid the legal and financial complications from marriage particularly when one party has substantially more wealth. Many of these folks are seniors who don't want to disqualify themselves for Social Security or pension benefits. But if things go wrong your former partner may have a claim on your assets.
- Write a post-nuptial agreement even if you're married. Married spouses may want to contractually agree on how they'll divide their assets should they later divorce, and most states allow for these post-nuptial agreements. As with pre-marriage agreements, Presser says, the enforceability of the post-nuptial agreement requires the agreement to be fair; that both spouses fully understand the agreement; that neither party defrauded the other; and that each party had independent legal counsel.
- Keep your good credit. Good credit is one asset you must diligently protect during divorce. You'll lose your good score if your spouse runs up huge bills on your charge accounts and credit cards. It's difficult to financially cope during the turmoil and expense of divorce, but there is a path, Presser says.

First, immediately notify your creditors that you will no longer be responsible for your spouse's debts. Next, destroy and revoke all credit cards on which you have liability. Finally, publicly disclaim liability responsibility for your spouse's future debts.

"Knowing that your wealth and assets are protected is liberating," Presser says. "Whether or not you've been hurt before, don't fall for the idea that romance is perfect; it's not. When things go bad, the power of the positive can easily turn to the power of the negative. I advise folks to avoid fear by reasonably protecting themselves in marriage, cohabitation and divorce."






and adjusted their lineups. After just a few weeks of practice they wanted to observe and evaluate their veterans and new signees.





# Ponte Vedra defeats Palatka to win District Title

It surely wasn't the start they were looking for, but the ending suited Ponte Vedra's varsity basketball team just fine in last Friday night's 60-52 victory over Palatka. The win earned the Sharks their 3rd district championship in five years and improved their overall record to 17-10.

The victory also earned the Sharks home court advantage when they resume FHSAA tourney action tonight (Thurs, Feb. 11) when they host Gainesville Eastside at 7:00 p.m.

After an easy 80-43 victory over Menendez in the first round of the district tourney, the Sharks were expecting a much tougher game in their rubber game against Palatka. And a tough game it was!

The two district rivals had split their earlier games played during the regular season, with both teams holding serve on their home court.

With many of the late arriving crowd still waiting in long lines that formed outside the Ponte Vedra gymnasium, Palatka quickly jumped out to an early 9-0 lead, much to the delight of the large following of Panther rooters who made the more than one hour jaunt from Putnam County.

It was not until nearly five minutes had elapsed in the opening quarter before Ponte Vedra was able to score, but a 9-4 Ponte Vedra run closed the gap to a more manageable five point deficit at the break, with Palatka on top 14-9.

After being held scoreless in the first quarter, JD Pirris came alive in the second stanza by slashing through the tenacious Panther defense to score six of Ponte Vedra's 12 points as the Sharks closed to within three of Palatka at the halftime intermission.

The Sharks were trailing 33-30 with 3:47 remaining in the third quarter

before the tide turned into Ponte Vedra's favor. A Palatka player was called for a technical foul, and Pirris made them pay as he canned both of the free throws. Pirris then followed up with another of his patented driving layups to give the Sharks their first lead of the night, 34-33 with 3:15 left in the third.

Senior Matt Johnson then netted back-to-back 3 pointers to extend the lead to 42-36 to help steer the Sharks to a 44-38 lead heading into the final quarter. Pirris and Johnson combined to score 16 of the Sharks third period points. The 23 points scored in the quarter by PVHS were more then they had tallied in the entire first half of action.

Johnson continued his stellar play into the final period by scoring the Sharks first six points, but Palatka would not go away. The Sharks would build their lead to 10 and seemingly had the game sewed up with but 2:15

left in the contest.

However, when Palatka's pressing defense denied Pirris, Johnson and junior Eston Hensley from receiving the ball, three Ponte Vedra turnover had trimmed the Shark lead down to five points with 1:13 remaining. With the Sharks attempting to run out the clock, much to the total surprise of many in the packed Ponte Vedra gymnasium, one of the Shark players unloaded an ill-advised three point attempt. Chris Tomacewski bailed his teammate out by coming up with a clutch offensive rebound and Palatka was forced to foul, sending JD Pirris to the line.

Pirris, who was a 71 per cent free throw shooter as a sophomore, had a dismal first half of the season at the stripe, including a woeful 3-11 at the line in a December game against St. Augustine. Those days are now well in the distant past as JD, since the start of the New Year, has made better than 80% of his free throws. Pirris salted the game away by hitting 4 clutch free throws, while Hensely took a perfect feed from Johnson and scored in the final moments as the Sharks advance to the regionals with their 60-52 victory.

Johnson (17 points, eight rebounds and five assists), and Pirris (21 points, nine rebounds and five assists) had monster nights for the victors, while 6'3" junior forward Eston Hensley (10 points, five rebounds, three assists and no turnovers) also had a solid performance. Coach Beech however, will need better play from his remaining players in the rotation if the Sharks are to make some noise in the upcoming regionals.

Mike Nicandri could have made the night much easier for Beech and the Sharks but he has had to sit out the last couple of games due to concussion issues. Much to the surprise of many of the Palatka followers, who brought three bus load of students to Ponte Vedra for the game, they did not see 6'7" Shark sophomore Jack Johnson play in the contest.

On January 8, in the Shark 76-65 victory over Palatka, Johnson came off the bench to set a school record with 8 blocks, while adding an impressive seven rebounds and six points to his stat line.

Gainesville Eastside, losers in their district final to Alachua Santa Fe 66-51, will be the Shark's opponent tonight with a scheduled tip off at 7 p.m. With another large crowd expected, local followers are urged to arrive early to avert a repeat of last Friday when a number of fans missed the early moments of action while waiting in the long lines to purchase tickets.

A win against Eastside will also assure the Sharks of hosting a regional semi-final on Tues., Feb. 16, against the winner of the regional game between Alachua Santa Fe and Palatka.

# Jaguars tout projects as enhancements to fan experience

Coming off a 5-11 record last season the Jacksonville Jaguars unveiled off field plans at last month's State of the Franchise presentation. Owner Shad Khan and president Mark Lamping unveiled designs and details for three new projects for EverBank Field, as well as the club's 2016 ticket pricing.

"All of us are proud to take this opportunity to give our fans and partners a crystal clear look into where the Jacksonville Jaguars are as a franchise, and where we plan to be in the future. And we plan to be in Jacksonville," Khan said. "But, we don't want to be a franchise, on or off the field that merely exists. We want to thrive and be respected.

The stadium improvements include a complete re-imagining of the US Assure Clubs, a covered Flex Field and an amphitheater. All were approved unanimously by Jacksonville City Council in December.

**US Assure Clubs** - The design includes the installation of a glass wall

between the Upper and Lower Clubs and the stadium bowl on each side of the stadium The improvements will include the installation of premium seating products—club tables and bar rails; distinct theming of each Club interior to reflect the demographics and tastes of fans; and upgraded premium padded seats for all club patrons.

Covered Flex Field - Located along Gator Bowl Boulevard at the south end of the stadium, it is designed to serve multiple purposes. It will be a climate-controlled, covered pavilion with multiuse synthetic turf. Sliding "hangar" doors will allow the space to be used both in closed and open air formats. The facility will provide a venue for the football team to practice during inclement weather, and entertainment events on game days as well as year-round events for other special purposes.

**Amphitheater** - Designed with 5,500 fixed seats and additional room for temporary seating. It will be located at the south end of the stadium, under a continuous roof that will cover both the amphitheater and the Flex Field.

**Ticket Pricing** – In 2016, 5 percent of the seats in the stadium will decrease in price. Ten percent will be unchanged and 46 percent will be unchanged if they are renewed before the early renewal deadline of Feb. 29. The effective increase in average ticket price will be 3.6 percent.

#### ROBINSON BOWLS THEM OVER

- Jaguars' second-year wide receiver Allen Robinson made the most of being named to the 2016 Pro Bowl in Honolulu. Robinson had a game-high 102 receiving yards including a 55-yard reception and a 50-yard TD catch in his first Pro Bowl appearance. A 2014 NFL Draft pick from Penn State, he caught 80 passes for 1,400 yards and a franchise-record 14 touchdowns in 2015. Robinson's receiving yards were the second-most in franchise history behind Jimmy Smith's 1,636 in 1999. His 17.5-yards-per-reception average led all NFL receivers with 80 or more receptions by more than two yards. Last Pro Bowl player was middle linebacker Paul Posluszny following the

# Dye's Valley Course busy with two collegiate tournaments

Florida's men's golf opened its spring season with a 23-stroke victory at the Sea Best Invitational at Dye's Valley Course at TPC Sawgrass highlighted by the first individual title of freshman Sam Horsfield's college career.

"It was a great day. The team won, and I got the individual win, so it was a great day. I couldn't be more proud of these guys. We've been working our butts off this whole winter, and the results showed this week," Horsfield said.

No.45 ranked University of North Florida claimed a fifth-place finish and Jacksonville University came in tied for

UNF sophomore Jordan Batchelor recorded a career low 69 in the final round to earn a team-leading 14th place finish with a 54-hole total of 214. As a team, the Ospreys posted a three-round score of 860 after a final round 286. It was the team's third top five team finish of the year.

Osprey's freshmen Andrew Alligood and Phillip Knowles, who both tied for 18th at 216. Freshman Travis Trace finished tied for 29th at 218. Senior Taylor Hancock finished tied for 51st at 223.

"We got good rounds from Jordan and Travis to help carry the team," said

UNF head coach Scott Schroeder. "We had a solid finish to start the spring but made a bunch of mistakes that we need to learn from to get where we want to be by the end of the year."

Franck Medale led JU with a 219 total (75-71-73). David Wicks had a 223 (72-74-77), as did Raul Pereda (72-73-78). Ryan Jahn had 227 (76-73-78), and Sam Uhland had 229 (74-79-76).

"The best team won," said Dolphins' head coach Mike Blackburn. "We played hard; it just wasn't our week. We've got some work to do in the next two weeks before we head down to Gainesville."

Horsfield was one of four Gators to earn top-five finishes. Horsfield, the first Gator freshman to collect an individual title since Billy Horschel in 2006, finished the tournament with a 7-under 203. It was his best tournament score of the year.

Florida shot a 3-over 283 in the final round to total -14 (826) and clinch the victory. Horsfield shot an even-par 70 to edge out sophomore teammate Alejandro Tosti by three strokes.

"It's been a lot of hard work, a lot of early mornings, a lot of sacrifice, and they came out and were unbelievable this week," added Gators' head coach JC Deacon. "I think the first round was our lowest round since 2011. What a

way to start the spring."

Florida will host JU and UNF for the two-day SunTrust Gator Invitational in Gainesville beginning Feb. 20.

**UNF TAKES HUGHES CUP** - The North Florida women's golf claimed their first outright victory over Jacksonville University posting a 9.5 to 2.5 decision in the 4th Annual Hughes Cup Match also played at TPC Sawgrass Dye's Valley Course.

"The team played extremely well and held themselves together throughout the entire day," said UNF head coach Joanne Berglund. "We fought hard through the morning matches and it was great to come out with the lead going into the afternoon matches. The team set a goal to go 6-0 in the afternoon singles matches and it was exciting to watch them do just that."

The Ospreys earned a pair of victories in the best ball matches. The two squads split the scoring in the foursome (alternate shot) matches over the back nine of the Valley Course. Frost forced a delay in the start of play, the singles matches were forced to be shortened due to darkness but UNF proved strong in the solo competition as the Ospreys swept all six matches for the victory.

"While this isn't the result you want in your first event, I saw a lot of good things from our team today," said JU head coach Jennifer Borocz. # Florida Album Quilts


Back in the 1840s, ladies would carry around a small album with blank pages to be filled with autographs, sayings, pictures, drawings, etc. from their friends. By the 1890s some ladies in Baltimore Maryland had the idea of having pieces of fabric signed by their friends since an indelible pen had been invented. Some of the ladies who made "crazy quilts" decided to upgrade them to more sophisticated, elaborate quilts by asking their friends to not only sign the blocks of fabric, but to embroider, paint, or embellish the blocks in any way they wished; thus, the Baltimore Album Quilts were started.

Many of these beautiful quilts have lasted through the ages and may be seen in quilt museums as well as nationally recognized museums such as the Metropolitan in New York and the Smithsonian in Washington, D.C.

Several years ago, I decided to make a

Texas Album Quilt, related to my family. By then, there was a method of printing pictures on fabric. This process is much better now, and pictures look as though they are printed on paper. I started out by printing a picture of my mother and dad for the center block. They were married 57 years before my dad passed away. There are white lovebirds in one block with mom and dad's wedding anniversary date embroidered on it. They married Oct. 20, 1920.

A block has pictures of my father in his WWI Army uniform along with my two brothers who served in WWII in the Navy. Also in that block is a pen and ink drawing of a coal driven railroad engine that was done by my Headmaster, Ted Sanford, at Ft. Worth Country Day School where I taught for fifteen years. My dad and brothers worked for the Texas and Pacific RR most of their lifetime. You'll also notice the three stars in that same block, representing Mr. Whoozy who was a three star, Vice Admiral in the Navy.




Another block has an Irish blessing printed on it since we were all very Irish. Another block had my mom's favorite hymn, "The Old Rugged Cross," printed on it along with 3D irises, one of her favorite flowers. The name "BOYD" is appliqued in the center of a large red heart in another block, as that was my maiden name. "Forget-me-Nots" flowers surround the heart. The 'Rose of Sharon' block that I designed, is special as that was my mom's favorite flowering shrub.

My son, Patrick, is my pot of gold at the end of the rainbow in another block. He is truly my treasure on earth. That block also has my favorite things in it: my love for kitty cats, dogs, sewing, quilting, piano and music, and tea sets. I am shown sewing on my machine in my classroom, as I always taught children how to use my machine and how to hand quilt. My three precious grandchildren are pictured in another block.

Texas was my home for many years, and the shape of Texas done in the Texas flag colors with bluebonnets, the state flower, is a necessary block. A Hawaiian paper-cut block of palm trees and hibiscus represents my new home, Florida. It has been said that my hibiscus looks a lot like Disney's Mickey Mouse — hmmmmm. This quilt is hand appliqued and hand quilted.

The techniques that I used making this quilt are hand applique, ruching roses, 3D applique, hand embroidery as well as machine embroidery, pen and inking, and hand quilting. Making an album quilt is truly a treasure or heirloom.

Feb. 12 at 10:00 at the Players Community Center on Landrum Ln., off CR-210 behind the Shell station, I shall be teaching a class on "Color and Baltimore Album Quilts with a taste of Florida." This will be at the monthly meeting of the Ocean Wave Quilters Guild. Everyone is invited.


