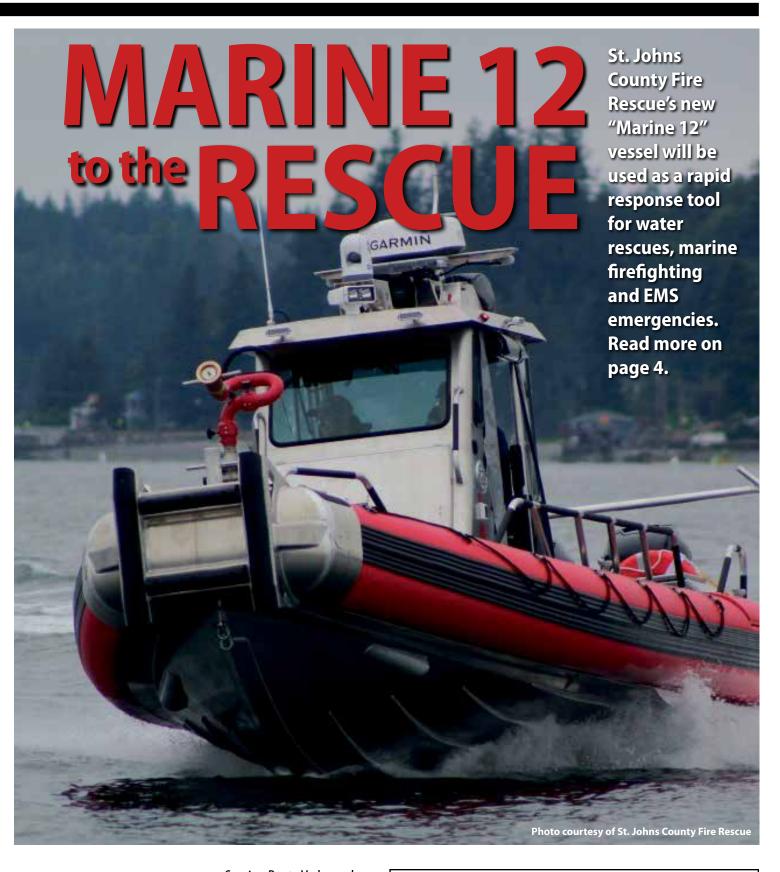

Waldron wins District 3 primary recount by 7 votes

After a primary election night victory that had District 3 County Commission candidate Paul Waldron ahead of Jerry Cameron by just nine votes, a Sept. 1 recount secured Waldron's primary victory, albeit by an even slimmer margin of just seven votes.

Unofficial election results on Aug. 30 had Waldron ahead, with 12,468 votes to Cameron's 12,459. The slim margin of victory triggered an automatic recount, as Florida law mandates that a machine recount be conducted any time a candidate is defeated or eliminated by 0.5 percent or less of the votes cast in the race.

Following the initial machine recount, Cameron picked up two votes due to the inclusion of a provisional ballot that initially had not been counted and a second ballot that went uncounted due to a machine jam. With an even smaller margin between the candidates, election officials proceeded to manually examine the thousands of ballots recorded as either under votes or over votes before confirming Waldron as the winner.

Due to the entry into the race of write-in candidate Sheamus McNeeley, Waldron's name will appear on the Nov. 8 general election ballot.

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St. Johns County Fire Rescue welcomes addition of new vessel

"Marine 12" to aid in water rescue, firefighting efforts

St. Johns County Fire Rescue (SJCFR) took delivery of a new vessel in August after being awarded a Federal Port Security Grant in 2015 for its purchase.

Dubbed "Marine 12," the new vessel will be used as a rapid response tool for water rescue, EMS emergencies and marine firefighting efforts on all waterways and near shore Atlantic waters within the county. According to SJCFR Captain Jeremy Robshaw, the addition of Marine 12 will alleviate the volume of the department's emergencies as well as increase the types of emergencies it can respond to.

"SJCFR has built a strong and professional marine rescue response program within the department," he said. "The addition of this vessel to our mission response provides us the ability to safely and efficiently mitigate a variety of emergencies."

The acquisition comes after an intensive procedure; prior to receiving the grant, SJCFR was subject to a detailed application process that included around three months of research, documentation, writing and data collection to prove eligibility based on a stringent set of guidelines. The department then formed a committee to develop policy, training and specifications for the new vessel construction. After deciding on a vendor – SAFE Boats International – Marine 12 became a reality.

"SJCFR is proud to have been chosen for funding through this competitive federal grant program," Robshaw said. "Our application clearly showed the need for this vessel and the enhanced response capability it would provide."

The new vessel, which is the first firefighting vessel placed into service by the department, was a much needed and welcome improvement over existing equipment. In addition to being capable of pumping more than 450 gallons of water per minute during firefighting operations, Marine 12 can provide search

and rescue response to vessels and missing swimmers both in- and off-shore.

"Previously our vessels were limited to only near-shore rescue capability," Robshaw added, noting the inclusion of GPS, sonar, radar and forward looking infrared (FLIR) in the Marine 12's body of search and rescue tools. "The new vessel will be a fully outfitted emergency medical response resource carrying a full complement of advanced life support equipment while being staffed with paramedics."

Aside from improving performance and emergency response, Marine 12 also provides the department

with the added benefit of improved safety conditions for SJCFR personnel in high-risk situations – a high priority of the department and Fire Rescue Chief Carl Shank, according to Robshaw.

"The nature of responding to emergencies creates situations where personnel are asked to take risk in order to protect the general public and also mitigate the incident at hand," Robshaw said.

"The technology and equipment this vessel represents allow us to both keep our personnel safe and give them the most appropriate resources available to provide rescue, emergency medical care and firefighting operations in various hazardous marine conditions."

The 29-foot SAFE vessel is now moored in a local marina and is available for response to marine emergencies at all times. The department is currently in the final phase of design for a permanent, secure docking facility to house Marine 12 that is expected to be completed by summer of 2017. The facility will also house other public safety vessels at the Vilano boat ramp. Construction of the facility was made possible through the Federal Port Security Grant program and local matching funds provided by the St. Augustine Port Waterway and Beach District.

The Watermarke Team has also been working with the St. Johns County Planning & Zoning Agency on the traffic implications of The Watermarke and preliminary calculations confirm significant reductions compared to the currently approved residential plan.

The Right Choice

In order to bring The Watermarke plan to life, there needs to be a one-time change in the Future Land Use designation established by the St. Johns County Comprehensive Plan from Residential C to Residential D – this will allow for "hotel, motel and club facilities." The St. Johns County Planning & Zoning Agency has recommended that the St. Johns County Board of Commissioners approve the change.

The "right kind" of development plan ensures maximum benefits to the surrounding community, and minimal impact on the environment and traffic. The Watermarke Resort & Club is the "right kind" of plan for Vilano Beach.

The Watermarke will not encourage sweeping commercialization of Vilano Beach. In truth, it ensures the opposite—that one of the few significant parcels of waterfront land left in Vilano Beach will be used for a less-invasive, less resource-intensive purpose that will bring far greater economic and aesthetic benefits to the local, county and regional economy than a 79-unit residential development.

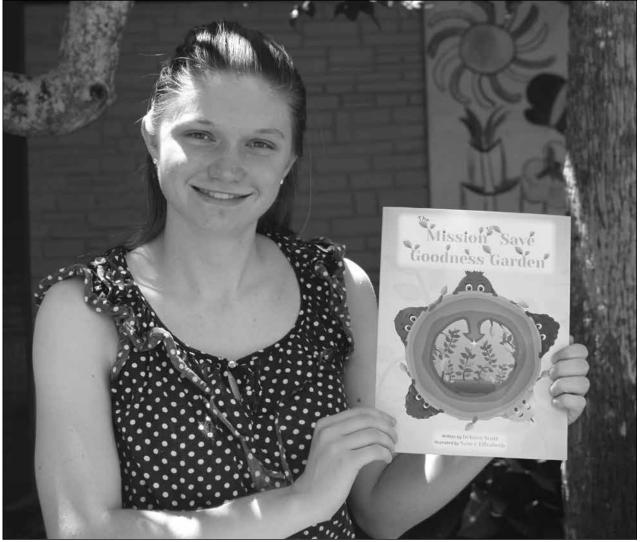
said that she was out taking

Energy storage market focus of Ponte Vedra Rotary Club presentation

Members of the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach had an opportunity to learn about the burgeoning energy storage market last week, when Blake Frye, senior vice president of global sales for UniEnergy Technologies, gave a presentation to the service organization

Frye, a Ponte Vedra Beach resident, offered attendees some background on the development of and uses for energy storage – from smaller-scale uses such as serving as a backup power source for hospitals, to large-scale storage that helps the electrical grid function more efficiently and economically.

"It's a brand new market that's been emerging for the past five years," Frye said. "The market is now is estimated to be in the tens of billions of dollars and is on its way to the hundreds of billions."

Using breakthrough technologies such as flow batteries, Frye explained, large amounts of energy can be stored and distributed more efficiently. In doing so, such technologies may one day eliminate the need for traditional "peaker plants," or power plants that only come online during peak periods

"That's a very inefficient way to produce energy," Frye noted.

In addition, flow battery technologies such as those developed by UniEnergy are also recyclable, storing more energy with greater efficiency at significantly reduced costs.

"It doesn't decay," Frye said of Uni-Energy's Vanadium battery. "It actually gets better as you use it."

If you see a speed limit sign for 35 miles per hour or less, it's quite possible you may see a golf cart riding down the road beside you.

Many Floridians are taking advantage of the state's accommodation to allow Low Speed Vehicles – also known as LSVs or "street-legal" golf carts – on the roads. For many, it's a convenient and fun way to travel short distances.

Currently, the Department of Motor Vehicles requires several upgrades to standard golf carts in order to be approved for streetlegal use, including a special windshield, turn signals, brake lights, seat belts, speed requirements and several other safety-minded accessories. These upgrades generally add approximately \$1,500 to the cost of an ordinary golf cart, plus DMV fees, tag fees and insurance costs. In turn, most people agree it also generally increases the resale value of the car for that same amount. Once a car has been titled, it's easily transferrable and coveted by those who don't want to go through the somewhat cumbersome inspection process at the DMV.

There are some communities in Northeast Florida, including Atlantic Beach, that are proactively pursuing ordinances to allow golf carts on the road with even fewer requirements, which could mean less out-of-pocket expense for golf cart owners who want to share the road. Other Florida communities, such as Flagler Beach, have embraced these relaxed restrictions, which offer golf cart owners a new money-saving option. By registering their golf cart with the city for a small annual fee, these golf cart owners can take advantage of LSV status at a

significantly reduced cost. Such ordinances are also encouraging residents to use their golf carts in place of traditional vehicles in an effort to help with parking challenges and traffic flow, with the added bonus of being an eco-friendly alternative to cars with gas emissions.

But make no mistake: Golf cart owners who live in an area without a relaxed city ordinance for golf cart use on the roads could be in for a rude awakening. Riding a golf cart on a public road without street-legal status could be quite costly – the owner may be ticketed. Police officers are also said to be cracking down on those without tags, insurance and the proper safety equipment.

Golf cart friendly communities are nonetheless on the rise, giving residents an opportunity to get out and enjoy the Florida sunshine while also helping to forge new relationships, offering neighbors a chance to visit and interact more. In addition, owning an LSV can provide significant cost-savings by reducing traditional wear and tear on a family's automobiles.

"We're seeing a tremendous increase in the number of customers who are inquiring about and purchasing street-legal carts," said Garrett Wilson, owner of Jacksonville's XL Custom Golf Carts. "This is an exciting time for North Florida, as we're finally seeing the shift that other cities around our state have embraced for years."

his airboat club in New Orleans just hours after Hurricane Katrina made landfall.

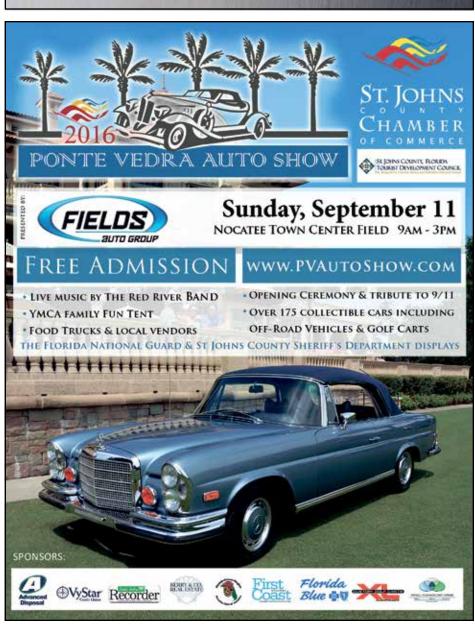

When he's not at the fire station, he now runs the business with the help of nine great team members, including his wife Kimberly.







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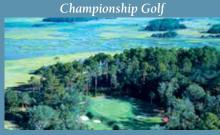
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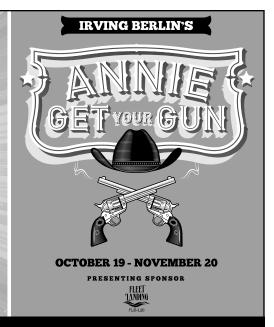


















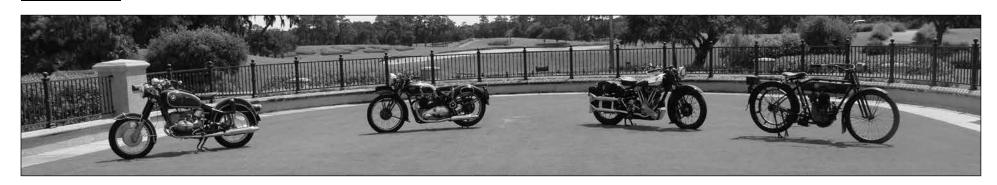

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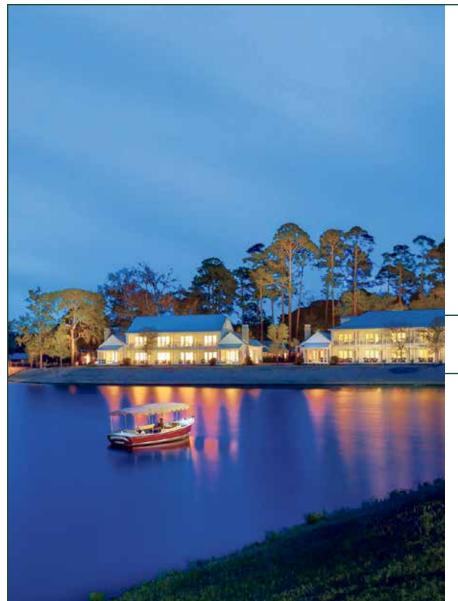
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Is it love – or something else?

Plain and simple, the man you've described views you as his booty call - and little else. Nothing in your story convinces me that he will become emotionally available to you, or that you will ever get his heart offered to you.

But where are you in this story? What has allowed you to settle for so little from a man this long, getting so little in return? RiverLife hosts youth fishing tournament

Atlanta's Terron Ward rushed for two scores as the Falcons came away with a 17-15 victory over the Jacksonville Jaguars in the final NFL preseason game for both teams.

"This was a good game for us as far as an evaluation tool," Jacksonville Head Coach Gus Bradley said. "We didn't play a number of our starters – 25, 26 guys something like that. We really wanted to use it as an evaluation tool for guys that are fighting and battling to make the team."

Jaguars rookie QB Brandon Allen, a sixth-round pick from Arkansas, had two TD passes, including a 25-yarder to Shaq Evans. He also completed a pass for a two-point conversion and finished 17 of 26 for 164 yards.

"I thought he did good," Bradley said of Allen's play. "There were a couple of plays where we missed some big plays and had an opportunity for some explosive plays, the one with the interception their guy made a great play. I felt like we still had a chance there, but overall his procedure, his tempo, his poise which were his strongest attributes showed up tonight."

Jacksonville (1-3) held out all of its starters, while the Falcons (3-1) used some of their regulars in

limited roles. QB Matt Ryan took the Falcons' first snap, handing off to Devonta Freeman. Then they both sat out the rest of the game.

We came out in the game and in the first half, I thought we did some really good things. In the second half, we had our opportunities and just missed some opportunities for some points."

Jacksonville rookie linebacker Myles Jack, a second-round draft choice from UCLA, was in on the first four tackles. Cornerback Josh Johnson had one of two Jacksonville interceptions. Jason Myers missed field goal attempts of 57 and 49 yards for the Jaguars.

In a roster move, the Jaguars have signed sixth-year wide receiver Arrelious Benn. To make room on the roster, the club placed third-year offensive tackle Josh Wells on the team's Reserve/Injured list. Wells sustained a right thumb injury during training camp.

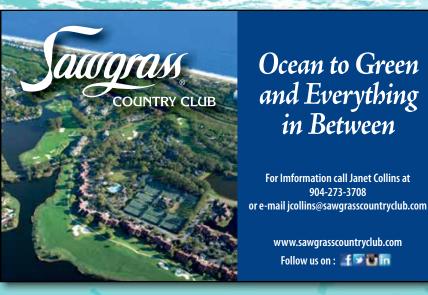

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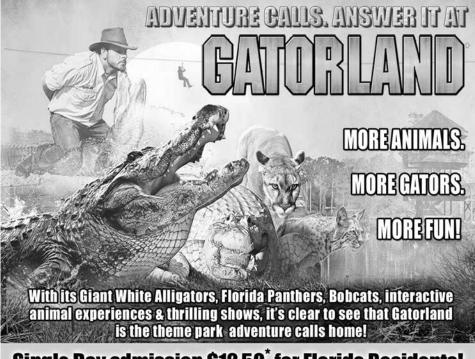






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
