



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Superintendent 'cautiously optimistic' new school choice law won't negatively impact St. Johns County Schools

The superintendent of the St. Johns County School District is "cautiously optimistic" that county schools won't be negatively impacted by new education legislation recently signed into law by Gov. Rick Scott.

Beginning with the 2017-2018 school year, Florida students will be able to attend any public school in the state that has space available. Locally, that means students residing in Duval, Clay, Putnam or other nearby counties could apply to attend public schools in St. Johns County, the top-ranked school system in the state. While outof-district students would be required to provide their own transportation, once an out-of-district student was accepted at a school, he or she could not lose that seat to an in-district

Proponents of the law say it will enable more Florida parents to provide a high-quality education for their children.

By expanding Florida's school choice options, parents and students will be able to find an education solu-

tion that best fits their needs," Florida House Speaker Steve Crisafulli (R-Merritt Island) said in a statement following the law's April 14 signage.

For a school district that is growing at a rate of 3 to 4 percent and building two to three new schools a year just to keep pace with enrollment, however, the new law does pose challenges, St. Johns County School Superintendent Joseph Joyner acknowledged.

"We opposed it from the very beginning," Joyner said. "We don't have any empty seats, so any seat we give up is problematic."

As of September 2015, the St. Johns County School District had 35,704 students in grades K-12. Because of the county's significant population growth, Joyner said, the school district's planning includes seats allocated for anticipated students who will one day live in the many new communities currently under development across the county.

"The problem comes when someone takes a seat that you had planned for upcoming development," he said. "If someone comes from out of county and takes that seat, when

new homes are built here, that seat is

Complicating matters, he added, is the fact the state Department of Education has yet to provide school districts with technical assistance to ensure the new law is properly implemented. "We just want to know what the rules are so we can start mapping our plan out," Joyner said. "We intend to protect our future seats aggressively."

To that end, Joyner said, education leaders have been lobbying officials to let individual school districts determine their capacity. That would give St. Johns County the ability to ensure seats remained available for current and future county residents.

"I could say, 'These houses are being built, we need those seats," Joyner said. "In my verbal discussions with

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Elected officials update Chamber on legislative session

Mental health services, Summer Haven River restoration among recently funded projects

Restoring the Summer Haven River and aiding residents struggling with mental health issues were among the legislative accomplishments highlighted by local elected officials last week at the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce quarterly Economic Development Council breakfast.

Held April 22 at the Renaissance Resort at World Golf Village, the event featured a legislative update from state Sen. Travis Hutson, state representatives Cyndi Stevenson and Paul Renner, and Board of County Commissioners Chairman Jeb Smith. In describing their activities at the county and state levels, officials noted that many of their actions were aimed at making government operate more efficiently, or in some cases undoing the damage unwittingly caused by government in the first place.

In the case of the Summer Haven River, for example, state Rep. Paul Renner noted that problems initially arose when the government stopped spending a few thousand dollars a year to replenish the dunes and maintain the area.

As a result, he said, storms eroded the dunes and silt built up in the river, destroying the area's oystering activities and impacting navigation.

"So what was originally a \$1,000 problem became a multimillion-dollar problem," Renner said.

Thanks to the efforts of local legislators, he noted, the recently passed \$82 billion state budget included \$2.8 million to restore the Summer Haven River.

FACT Team

Stevenson noted that residents of St. Johns and Putnam counties will now have access to expanded mental health services through \$1.3 million in funding to bring a Florida Assertive Community Treatment (FACT) team to the region. Comprised of psychiatrists, nurses, case managers and other clinical professionals, the FACT team provides wraparound services to assist residents struggling with mental health issues and prevent them from requiring hospitalization.

"It costs \$120,000 to care for someone in an in-patient setting," she said, "but just \$12,000 to stabilize them in an outpatient setting."

Stevenson also discussed the recent passage of the state's new school choice law, which allows Florida students to attend any public school in the state if there is space available.

"When I first heard about this bill, I thought the same thing everybody else did — 'Are you crazy?'" she said. "But this bill wasn't written for St. Johns County. It was written for people trying to find a way to get their children a good education."

Stevenson said the law was designed for good schools that had available capacity and wanted to open seats to students who wanted them.

In contrast, the top-ranked St. Johns County School District has no available capacity — a determination, she stressed, that was strictly up to local school officials to make.

Hutson noted that despite having a state delegation comprised of freshman legislators in a political environment where seniority rules,

St. Johns County was well-represented due to the level of cooperation among them.

"As a freshman senator, my two colleagues next to me made my job a lot easier," Hutson said. "We work really well together; when one of us takes the lead on an issue, the others are there to offer help and support."

Renner agreed. "Some people worry about knowing all the rules, while others say it's more important to know the Rule Chairman," he quipped. "But we work cooperatively. We look at the entire Northeast Florida region and recognize that problems don't end at the county line. Because we work together, we can outpunch our weight."

legislators, they said that was their intent. So I am hopeful and cautiously optimistic."

School Board Member Kelly Barrera concurred with Joyner's assessment.

"Dr. Joyner has been at the forefront

of this issue," Barrera said. "He's been in contact with Tallahassee, and I trust we will be able to do what's necessary."

Barrera noted that because the new law isn't scheduled to take effect until the 2017-2018 school year, school officials have time to try to address the challenges the law may pose for high-growth school districts such as St.

Johns County.

"I think we have time to address this legislatively," she said, "and that next year we'll have an opportunity to make revisions."

State Rep. Cyndi Stevenson also agreed that the intent of the new law was to leave the decision as to whether a school district had the space to accept out-of-district stu-

dents in local hands.

"This has to be completely within the school board's discretion," Stevenson said last week at a St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce economic development event. "What's in this (law) now is local control of the decision to determine if there is capacity... and if we need to, we'll do more work in that area to get it right." Council on Aging marks opening of new Ponte Vedra adult day care program

County and state officials joined with the St. Johns County Council on Aging and members of the community last week to celebrate the opening of the Ponte Vedra Memory Care Center's new statelicensed adult day care program.

Held April 21 at the Memory Care Center – located adjacent to the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall – the event included refreshments, tours of the facility and a presentation on dementia by Robert Trenholm of the AgeWell Center for Senior Health. Also on hand was state Secretary for Elder Affairs Sam Verghese, County Commissioner Jay Morris and Council on Aging staff and board members who helped raise the funding needed to create the center.

"This is called 'inspiration plus hard work equals magic," said former Council on Aging Executive Director Cathy Brown, who worked with Morris, COA board members and the community to make the center a reality. "This place is gonna be poppin'! It's a real solution for this community."

Brown said that an estimated 1,200 residents in Ponte Vedra Beach alone are struggling with Alzheimer's or some other form of dementia. To address that need, the Memory Care Center offers programs for people at various stages of memory loss. The Integrative Memory Enhancement Program offers an ongoing program for individuals with either diagnosed or suspected early-stage memory loss. The five-hour program meets from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. twice a week and incorporates a variety of games, activities and mental stimulation exercises, along with chair aerobics and meditation.

At the open house, for example, program leaders took participants through a trivia contest, singing popular songs and trying to identify the singer.

"Currently, the Council on Aging operates the program at nine locations across the county," said IMEP's Michelle Sanchez, noting that the program fee is \$10 per hour. "Some grant funding is available for those who need financial assistance."

The newly opened adult day care program, meanwhile, provides services for individuals with more advanced memory loss or dementia. Open for three weeks, the adult day care operates from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. In addition to a large general gathering space known as the "Sunshine Center," the facility includes an activities room where participants can take part in arts and crafts and music therapy. Rehabilitation services are also provided on-site by therapists from Brooks Rehab.


"Day services are one piece of the puzzle," Brown said. "It provides family

The center also provides activities and services for participants' family members, she added.

"The secondary victim of dementia is the caregiver," she said, "so we do a lot around providing caregivers with support."

Council on Aging Executive Director Becky Yanni said that the adult day care center is licensed for 40 participants. Already, the program has eight participants.

"Once the word gets out, we believe it will fill up quickly," she said. "We know the need is there."

I enjoy exercising, traveling with my family, boating, lying by the pool or going to the beach. Obviously, summer is my favorite season. I can't imagine living where it's cold.

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
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

Cleaning up the coastline

New environmental advocacy group targets trash on beaches

What started as her 8-year-old daughter's innocent question — "What if everyone just picked up one bag of trash per day?" — has become a self-described "trash crusade" for Jacksonville Beach resident Tobi Myers-Browning.

Inspired by her daughter's idea, Myers-Browning recently started a campaign to pick up a bag of trash every single day for 365 days and post about it on a blog. Coastal Conscience, an environmental conservation group, officially kicked off April 9 with a beach cleanup on Jacksonville Beach in lieu of a launch party.

"We're basically just a group of people who are looking out for the here and now – things



that we can do to protect our coastlines and our natural Florida so that they're going to be here for our children and their children," said Myers-Browning, who refers to Coastal Conscience volunteers as ambassadors.

Although the organization is new, it is already raising

awareness. Myers-Browning has been approached by Beaches residents curious about what she is doing and wanting to get involved. From others, she has received a lot of thanks.

"It's not for us," she said. "It's for our community."

Trash, as Myers-Browning is quickly finding out, can pose serious health and safety risks for unsuspecting beachgoers. Glass and condoms are among some of the common items she comes across. Plastic is also a number one find — in fact, Myers-Browning mentioned in one of her blog posts that "it is difficult to walk down any of our local beaches without finding plastic." She and her daughter recently stumbled upon one of the most bizarre finds of their

trash crusade yet — part of a possible Cuban refugee raft that washed ashore in the Guana Preserve on or around April 19.

Sometimes, Myers-Browning and the group, which is currently comprised of her three daughters and herself, walk along Third Street to pick up trash before it becomes beach trash. She takes photos of what she finds and puts them on the website to raise awareness. She also posts to the Coastal Conscience facebook page using the hashtag #gettrashy2016.

In addition to Myers-Browning's daily trash-pickup dedication, the group is going to host a group clean-up in different areas up and down the coastal areas of the First Coast including Vilano, Ponte Vedra, Neptune, Atlantic and Mayport. Volunteers are welcome. Coastal Conscience held a group cleanup day on April 23 at Helen Cooper Floyd Park in celebration of Earth Day.

"I don't expect everybody in Jacksonville or in the beaches area to drop everything that they have and come out and pick up a bag of trash with me every single day, but if one person could do it once a month, or even once a quarter, that's one bag of trash that's off the ground," Myers-Browning noted.

"The Coast Guard urges you to call this number if you believe you are in any danger or there is a potential for your situation to worsen," said Lt. Christina Erapalli, chief of the Sector Jacksonville command center.

Erapalli stressed that the phone number is for emergency use only, and that anyone who willfully places a hoax call is guilty of a felony and may face penalties including incarceration, fines and a civil penalty as well as reimbursement to the Coast Guard for costs incurred while responding to a hoax.

"Hoaxes can also place our rescuers' lives in unnecessary danger and reduce our ability to respond to persons who may truly need help," she said.

A secondary phone number is available to report other emergencies, such as pollution, suspicious activity, waterway issues, and any other maritime concerns: (904) 714-7557. Boaters, however, are encouraged to continue to report emergencies via VHF radio on channel 16.

The change to new phone numbers is a result of Coast Guard Sector Jacksonville's recent move to a new joint facility. This facility houses the Sector Jacksonville command center, where search and rescue and other operations are coordinated.





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
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Bolles students excel at state science, Chinese competitions



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



My research shows that less than 50
percent of U.S. stock investments beat the S&P 500 since 2000. Furthermore, the data suggests that the average actively managed stock mutual fund underper-

data suggests that the average actively managed stock mutual fund underperforms about 2 percent per year. Obviously, the 1-2 percent (average) fees charged by active mutual funds are a headwind not faced by passive index funds. I argue that costs should not be factored into the equation when comparing passive vs. active investing, as fees are not a function of the investing strategy.

In theory, all S&P 500 index funds should have the same performance as they are benchmarking the same index. There are a few differences, however, hidden in the various fund's composition that cause the vast majority of investors actually to underperform the S&P 500. The primary reason for this underperformance is due to fund expenses, including trading costs. At the end of the day, passive investors are almost guaranteed to underperform the index they are trying to beat. For many investors, including the author, this is unacceptable, as we do not want to be a little below average. It is not in our DNA. Most of us are driven by the opportunity to beat the average (index).

If you know anything about Vanguard, you know they typically stand for DIY (do it yourself) passive index investing. According to a Vanguard 2013 research report, "Advisor's Alpha," Vanguard reiterates its long-held position that "over longer time horizons, active management often fails to outperform market benchmarks." In other words, it is tough to beat Mr. Market, especially after expenses. Therefore, according to Vanguard, if a client-advisor relationship is based on

the adviser delivering market-beating performance, the client is unlikely to get what they are paying for. But what if the advisor works to add value in other ways? According to Vanguard, a financial advisor could potentially add about 3 percent in value to a client's portfolio.

If your financial advisor's services and tactical recommendations are providing significant value, then cost should be a minor issue. Thus, it begs the question: How much is your financial advisor worth? I submit that a great advisor should be worth far more than the expense of your investment portfolio. If you are just paying your financial advisor to select investment products, such as stocks, bonds, mutual funds, etc., I believe you and your advisor are missing the boat on the added value of sound investment planning provides. For instance, I do a lot more work for my clients than just implementing investment strategies. I counsel on everything from estate investment planning issues to tax mitigation, to college planning, to insurance planning and review as well as liability issues. I consider myself my client's life planner and they should, and often do, take advantage of all the resources that I have to offer where there

It is my experience that specific investments are typically much less important than many of the other investment planning decisions. In the final analysis, you should determine the benefit that your advisor creates. If there is little to no value, there are plenty of competent, ethical, fee-based financial advisors anxious to talk with you or go the way of DIY.

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
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Local program encourages kids to 'Venture' out of their comfort zone

When most teenagers have the day to themselves, they might opt for a mall crawl with their friends or a day at home in front of the television.

Few would consider sailing off the coast of Florida's Keys to capture kingfish, or learning how to nock an arrow "after school activities." But that's what the teens and young adults of Ponte Vedra's Venture Crew 288 do.

These activities — or "venturing," as they're known — are part of the curriculum for Venture Crew, a coed, youth-led program by Boy Scouts of America for kids aged 14 to 21. According to the crew's founder and advisor Richard Basye, it's a program tailored to promote the growth of the kids who get involved.

"The primary objective of venturing is to teach life skills, leadership and how to lead a good, wholesome life," Basye said.

Venture Crew 288's activities include leadership training accomplished by putting kids in "officer" roles and through leadership developmental courses. Kids also participate in a slew of experiences hand-picked and planned by the "venturers" themselves for quarterly weekend trips. One week, that might include learning to safely shoot rifles and pistols, while another could include a lesson in archery. Other activities organized by leaders are trips to indoor speedways, obstacle courses and rock climbing walls.

Participants also host fundraisers (such as cooking and bake sales) to fund their summer camps and out-of-state venture trips, and do service projects in the community, such as working with Ponte Vedra's United Methodist Church and participating in beach cleanups.

"It's through these activities that the crews learn to work as teams and share responsibilities," Basye said. "Our leaders plan the day trips, the fundraisers and the community service projects. And the kids are always looking for volunteer opportunities and ways to help."

Most recently, the crew ventured out to Key West for spring break, where they sailed out for a weeklong adventure aboard a 95-foot sailboat and shared the duties of living on a ship as a team. In addition to cooking, venturers learned to man the sails, steer at the helm, fish and snorkel.

It's activities like these that foster positive growth and development in teens and young adults and what Basye says is the best part — seeing the difference venturing has made in the lives of his crew

"Watching these kids grow up and become confident is just ... the greatest thing," he said. "To see them grow into responsible young adults has been so rewarding."



Beach boutique links three generations of artists

Mother-daughter team pays homage to the woman who started it all

Cathy Thomasson and Cara Burky know what it means to be busy.

When the mother-daughter team behind Jacksonville Beach's Sidney Cardel's isn't running their store, they're everywhere: zipping from city to city at home and abroad finding the varied assortment of furniture, accessories and decor that make their boutique; or redecorating and re-imagining their space for the latest collection of items that adorn its walls throughout the season

But for all the bustle at their twoyear-old storefront, time seems to slow at Sidney Cardel's. Burky and Thomasson greet incoming customers and bag goods with the movement and expertise of a pair born to helm a seaside beach boutique, the two moving around one another with the familiarity of best friends and business partners.

"We have fun here," Thomasson said. "When you're working with your mother or daughter, there's just a level of trust that comes from having a family member with you."

The sentiment was echoed by her daughter.

"We both want this business to work and be wonderful," Burky said. "And it's nice being involved in something with someone who is as equally emotionally invested as you are."

Sidney Cardel's brick-and-mortar origins began with a more obscurely located store on Second Street by Jacksonville Beach back in 2011. But in a manner of speaking, it started more than 30 years ago with Thomasson's ambition and a vow shared between

mother and daughter.

Many visitors are surprised to learn that "Sidney" is neither Cathy nor Cara, though she's every bit as much a part of the store as they are.

"Sidney Cardel was my mom's pen name," Thomasson explained. "She was a writer, a poet and we wanted the store to be a reflection of her and in her memory. In everything she was an artist, and her originality and thinking was passed on to us."

Indeed, "Sidney" operates as a motif that appears everywhere from the store to the logo to the website — an enigmatic force evident in the styling of each nook and cranny. She overlooks the floor from the perch of a framed, sepia-toned print behind the counter with all the spunk one might imagine for the origin of a business

spanning three generations of women. Thomasson and Burky can't hide the fondness that plays about their features when they look to a photo of Sidney posed with her back to a palm tree, hips cocked and sporting a winning smile,

"I love it when people ask, 'Who is Sidney Cardel?' Or 'Are you Sidney?' and we get to share that with them," Burky said. "We get to share her story and she's as much a part of the store as we are. And I think her spirit is here ... I think people walk away from our store having felt her spirit in them."

The two credit her with the artistic, entrepreneurial instincts that led them to start the business after Burky graduated from Florida State University and moved to Tampa, Fla. for a job.

Thomasson had always been interested in opening a store, and said the timing was right, so she called her daughter with her plans and Burky moved to Jacksonville.

The pair split duties, whether that includes buying merchandise, re-stocking and styling the store, or more collaborative efforts like providing personal design services. The combination of their work and shared vision is what makes it possible for them to cater to a variety of tastes and age groups.

The progression was natural; for all their differences, Burky and Thomasson say their contradicting styles and taste for spontaneity have only helped them run a business together, even with the challenges that inevitably come with working as a mother-daughter team.

"It can be difficult working with your mom or daughter 24/7, but there's a lot of great perks to it as well," said Thomasson. "I get to see my daughter a lot, which is great. And Cara's got a flair for design. We're both artists and so was my mom, so we got that artistic creative gene and Cara got that in an even bigger way. So it works out well and we have a good time."

Ultimately, Thomasson and Burky hope that Sidney Cardel's doubles as a shopping destination and a source of inspiration for anyone who comes through their doors, be it artistically or professionally. And they encourage other mothers and daughters to take the opportunity to work together, as well.

"More than anything, we want people to come in and leave feeling inspired, whether they buy something or not," said Burky. "And hopefully other mothers and daughters will take away the fact that even if it's hard, striking that balance between business partners, friendship and mothering is very rewarding."

Dalí, Degas and Renoir are just a few of the famed masters whose works will soon be on display in Sawgrass Village, as longtime St. Augustine art dealers Cutter & Cutter open a new gallery in Ponte Vedra Beach.

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

From painting and coloring to jewelry making and origami, Art with a Heart in Healthcare's artists and volunteers work with the children at their

hospital bedside.

"It's so helpful because it gives the children something to distract and entertain them," said Cheryl Barnett of First Tennessee Bank, a sponsor of the exhibi-

tion. "It also gives family members a little break while the children are doing their artwork, so the program is really beneficial for the whole family."

Barnett, who attended the opening of the Ponte Vedra Beach exhibit, said she found it interesting to see how each child decorated his or her own mask.

"They are so special and so touching because each child chose to tell a story," she said.

For example, one child with cystic fibrosis decorated her mask to look like a pair of healthy lungs in order to raise awareness of her disease. Seventeen-year-old Cheyenne, meanwhile, decorated her mask as though it were assembled from jigsaw puzzle pieces.

"Everyone has pieces to their puzzle and some are the pieces to a puzzle," Cheyenne wrote. "The difference is how the pieces fit together."

Art with a Heart in Healthcare artist Maddie Firestone also attended the exhibit. After volunteering with the program and working with children at the Ronald McDonald House, she soon joined the program as a contract artist.

"My favorite part is the bonds you make with the children," she said. "I love the moments when kids aren't feeling well and they get so into the art that they completely forget they're in a hospital setting and they haven't had

their pain medication."

Ponte Vedra residents Dana Minyard and Patti Peeples said they enjoyed the exhibit.

"It's both heartbreaking and uplifting," Minyard said. "It really runs the

gamut of emotions."

"Unmasked" will be on display at the Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach through May 28. Gallery hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday.


"Every charity has volunteers," Machaby noted. "Imagine the money a nonprofit could raise if their volunteers had home parties or purchased art online."

The festival presented a relaxed atmosphere, where children ran and played in the field — throwing a football or kicking a soccer ball. Many Nocatee residents arrived at the event via golf cart, and families picnicked on blankets or relaxed in lounge chairs while enjoying the acts. There were also many local vendors on site, including Stubbess, GuanaBana Ice Pops, North Guana Outpost, Belle of the Boulevard, Ponte Vedra Plastic Surgery, the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce, and many more.

Songs by songwriters

In 2012, Paige had the idea to host a songwriters' retreat in her hometown of Ponte Vedra. The first festival had only 150 people in attendance and took place in a private lot located off Roscoe Boulevard, hence the name Roscolusa. The con-

Volunteers wearing blue Tom Coughlin Jay Fund t-shirts were scattered throughout the festival, eager to spread the word about the organization and sell raffle tickets for prizes such as horseback riding lessons, posh getaways, golf outings, and facials. All of the proceeds from the raffle benefited the organization. When it came time to do the drawings, representatives from the organization, including volunteer and cancer survivor Luciana Butler took to the stage to share their stories of survival.

Another Jay Fund volunteer, Marie Olsen, is a supporter of the organization because of the help it gave her family when her daughter was diagnosed with cancer.

"My daughter was 19 when she was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia (AML) and the Jay Fund helped us tremendously," Olsen said. "When she went into remission, (the Jay Fund) gave her tickets to concerts and that kind of thing, so she really felt like she was a normal teenager again."

The Jay Fund also helped the family financially with bills and money for Christmas, she added.

While Olsen's daughter lost her battle with the disease, she carries on volunteering with the organization in her honor. "I didn't even know they existed before my daughter got sick," she said. "I'm so glad that this community has this."

The Ponte Vedra Sharks continued their relentless pursuit of the state lacrosse championship last week, posting second and third round play-in wins against Lake Brantley and Maclay — their 23rd and 24th straight wins of the 2016 season without a defeat.

The Sharks put away Lake Brantley 16-5 April 19 at the Shark Tank, then Saturday traveled to Tallahassee to eliminate Maclay from title competition, winning 8-4. 

Sculptures by the Sea Project to foster arts education, beautify the beaches

A year-long public art installation in Jacksonville Beach will foster arts education and appreciation while beautifying a previously undeveloped piece of property in Jacksonville Beach.

The UNF Sculptures by the Sea project will display student sculptures on a newly landscaped and designed walk on property owned by MountainStar, located at 480 First St. S. in Jacksonville Beach, across the street from the city's Oceanfront Park. MountainStar Capital and the Lazzara Family Foundation provided a \$50,000 gift to UNF to support students and its sculpture program, headed by Dr. Jenny Hager, UNF associate professor of sculpture. MountainStar Capital also donated the land's use for the year-long event.

"Because of their passion and enthusiasm for art, the Lazzara family has generously provided a forum not only for our talented students to display their creative artwork but a beautiful space at the beach where the entire public can come and be inspired," said

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UNF President John Delaney. "We're appreciative of this family's impact on UNF and this community."

The gift supported the creation of 11 miniature sculptures, which were entered into a contest for the public art installation. Five finalists were chosen by a committee comprised of professional artists, art professors, a Jacksonville Beach City Council member, a member of the Cultural Council of Greater Jacksonville and members of the UNF SACC.

The winning sculptures to be on display by UNF seniors include "Ongoing Life" by Gillian Harper, "Still Swimming" by Emily Pinnell, "Symbiosis" by Mary Ratcliff and "Wild Bird" by Diana Shepherd. "Ode to Franklin County" will also be on display by UNF junior David Peters.

"This piece of property is now not only beautified but the sculptures can be enjoyed by anyone visiting the beach," said Christopher Lazzara, CEO of MountainStar Capital and chair of



"We are thrilled this project has come to fruition from an idea we had to support UNF while providing a creative way to showcase its sculpture program. The art will be installed in early June and the property will be open to the public for free from dawn to dusk for the next year.



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
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
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
