# Remains identified as missing swimmer

The St. Johns County Sheriff's Office (SJSO) said the remains found on the beach Sunday, Oct. 15 in the 3,000 block of South Ponte Vedra Boulevard have been positively identified as those of missing swimmer Dale Robert Kopf, who was last seen Thursday, Oct. 12

Kopf, 47, was a St. Augustine resident. Following an autopsy, Dr. Deanna Oleske of the District 23 Medical Examiner's Office has determined that the cause of death was drowning, and the manner of death was accidental.

The swimmer was last seen in the ocean body surf-

ing shortly before 7 p.m. on Oct. 12 in the 2,900 block of South Ponte Vedra Boulevard. According to St. Johns County Fire Rescue Public Information Officer Jeremy Robshaw, Kopf entered the water with another individual. That individual came ashore, however, returned to the beach and then could not locate Kopf.

Resources from the Sheriff's Office, Fire/Rescue, Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission (FWC) and the U.S. Coast Guard searched for the victim by air, boat and ground but were unable to find him. His remains were located the morning of Oct. 15 at 10 a.m. on the beach.

# Sawgrass Marriott celebrates 30th anniversary

In 1987, Ronald Reagan was the president of the United States; a gallon of gasoline cost 89 cents; "Lethal Weapon" and "RoboCop" were playing on movie theatres across the country and the Sawgrass Marriott had just become a new destination in the Ponte Vedra Beach community.

Now in 2017, much of the aforementioned has drastically changed, but the Sawgrass Marriott has remained a Ponte Vedra mainstay. In fact, the resort is celebrating its 30th anniversary in the community this month.

The hotel's employees celebrated the occasion last week by enjoying cake and taking a team photo in the lobby. Even hotel guests joined in for the fun, enjoying cupcakes to commemorate the anniversary.

"Whether you've worked here three months, three years or 30 years, it's been a heck of a ride," said Sawgrass Marriott Golf Resort & Spa General Manager Todd Hickey. "The community has been behind us every step of the way."

For longtime employee Janice Elkins, the anniversary was especially momentous. She started working at Sawgrass Marriott when it opened in Ponte Vedra Beach in 1987, and she has never left.

"It's mindboggling, really," said Elkins. "I had no idea I'd be here this long when I





started. I've enjoyed every day, every minute and everyone from the managers we've had to the ones we have today."

Elkins' role at the resort has mostly stayed the same over the past 30 years: She answers telephones on the switchboard.

However, the way in which she has conducted that job has most definitely changed.

"At the beginning, I did a lot of phone connections for groups," she said. "Eventually that was taken over by audio visual with all the modern technology. At the very beginning, we didn't have the modern technology, so I was it."

Tom Ayres, the resort's director of engineering, has worked at the Sawgrass Marriott for 24 years, so the anniversary was significant for him too.

"I've seen the resort evolve over these years," he said. "And it's an emotional, happy moment for me to see the 30th anniversary."

As for that evolution, Ayres said many of the most noticeable changes have taken place in the hotel's lobby, which he said previously featured a waterfall, island bar and palm trees that rose up to the fifth floor. Now, with the renovations that have taken place over the past 10 to 15 years, he said the lobby has been extended, stairs have been relocated, a new bar has been added downstairs and the resort's restaurant name has changed several times, among other renovations.

Overall, Ayres said it's been an extremely positive experience to work for the resort.

"It's a great place to work and a great company to work for," he said. "I'm very proud to be a member of this team."

# North Florida Land Trust asks for donations to purchase land for conservation along Guana River

North Florida Land Trust (NFLT) is looking for donors to assist in the purchase of a 4.3-acre plot of land along A1A North. The property is located next to the McGarvey-Goelz Preserve in Ponte Vedra Beach, and it is currently advertised for sale for residential or multifamily development. But NFLT would like to purchase the land for preservation.

"We introduced ourselves to the


realtor's representative and were able to negotiate a purchase price of \$400,000 for the property," said Jim McCarthy, president of NFLT. "We have until Dec. 1 to raise the money to purchase this piece of land, which would give us access to property we already own and allow for public access for picnicking, canoeing and baseling."

The land, which is located at 1105 A1A

N., is a wetland parcel with 0.55 acres of uplands containing a mixture of live oak hammock and cabbage palm that is surrounded by the freshwater wetlands of the Guana River. It is among the 112,346 acres in NFLT's seven-county focus area in critical need of preservation. The land contains a quality marsh habitat that is rich with wildlife, including roseate spoonbills, tricolored herons, great egrets, snowy egrets, white ibis, clapper rails and

The Guana River is the northernmost waterway feeding into the Guana Tolomato Matanzas National Estuarine Research Reserve (GTM Research Reserve). It is one of 28 coastal sites designated to protect and study estuarine systems in the U.S. Those interested in donating to help with the acquisition of the property should send their donation to NFLT at 2038 Gilmore St. in Jacksonville or donate online at www.northfloridalandtrust.org. # Veterans Council of St. Johns County holds annual Wreaths Across America drive

The Veterans Council of St. Johns County is currently raising funds for its annual Wreaths Across America drive. The efforts conclude Dec. 16 with volunteers honoring veterans by placing remembrance wreaths on the gravestones of fallen military personnel at the St. Augustine National Cemetery at noon.

The council's goal is to raise enough money to place wreaths on more than 1,200 gravesites in the cemetery. Individual wreaths are \$15.00, but for each two wreaths purchased, the council receives a third wreath without charge.

Retired Sgt. Maj. Ray Quinn, a chairman of the local Wreaths Across America project for four years, said the overall event was founded by a Maine resident working in the Christmas tree business who had a large quantity of leftover holiday wreaths.

In 1992, Morrill Worcester of Worcester Wreath Company realized he wanted to honor U.S. military veterans with the extra wreaths by placing them at Arling-

ton National Cemetery. With the help of Maine Senator Olympia Snowe, Worcester transported the wreaths on a convoy to the cemetery during the holidays, and that single act became a nationwide event in which volunteers have converged each year at hundreds of locations across America to pay their respects.

"It's quite an honor just to place a wreath and honor one of our fallen veterans," Quinn said. "When I observe the people of our community that come out to the wreath laying ceremony, it's such a touching event

"One sweet lady told me that she lost her brother in the Korean War, and his remains were never returned, so for her—it's like honoring her brother," he added.

For Dick Williams, a Ponte Vedra resident and volunteer for Wreaths Across America, the Veterans Council project is an opportunity to honor fallen military personnel alongside members of his community. Williams shared the wreath-laying project with members of the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach to promote the event.

"I figured if I wasn't aware of it, I was sure others in my community didn't know about it as well," Williams noted.

The ceremony is moving, Williams said, because members of the community, including youth groups, get involved each year

"It's a wonderful opportunity for children, middle schoolers and high schoolers to be able to honor and maybe even learn a little more about what our service men and women have done," he said.

Williams is promoting the council and campaign to help raise enough money to purchase the necessary number of wreaths for the ceremony. He also feels an extra pull to honor and work with veterans to make sure local and federal government agencies are responsive to their needs.

# CTTF Board releases Ponte Vedra Beach/Palm Valley traffic study survey

The Ponte Vedra/Palm Valley Citizens Traffic Task Force Board (CTTF) circulated the first of its two online traffic surveys on Oct. 9 through the emailing lists of the Ponte Vedra Beaches Coalition, the Ponte Vedra Community Association, the Palm Valley Community Association, the Ponte Vedra Municipal Service District, the North Ponte Vedra Beaches Coalition and the Sawgrass, Marsh Landing, Plantation and Player's Club homeowners associations.

The survey is intended to collect input on short-term improvements (approximately five years) that can be made to various intersections in Ponte Vedra Beach and Palm Valley that would improve traffic flow and safety at those locations. A second survey will be circulated in mid-November asking for input on the widening of A1A and Mickler Road.

Both surveys were developed by the CTTF Board to solicit feedback from area residents and businesses as a result of recommendations proposed in a recent study commissioned by St. Johns County and the North Florida Transportation Planning Organization.

All Area residents are encouraged to complete both the short-term and the long-term surveys. By doing so, they will assist the CTTF Board in prioritizing the individual projects and help determine which improvements, if any, should be made.

### What's your background?

The Michigan/Indiana region between I-94 and I-80 is where I spent most of my first four decades, including Michigan universities for undergrad and grad school. I majored in accounting and auditing with grad work in production and cost control. Most of my early CPA career was devoted to auditing manufacturers in the region. I was also raising my daughter Jennifer, who would eventually head to Indiana University Bloomington. When she left for college, I left for Peace Corps Paraguay, which would kick off my passion for international development.

### What was next for you?

Four months after I arrived in Paraguay, the country's longtime dictator was overthrown, and the country was somewhat in turmoil. I stayed for another two years, picking up Spanish while organizing farmers' cooperatives, teaching accounting and even auditing an infamous agricultural collective. When I returned to the U.S., I was hired by the U.S. Mint San Francisco as a production controller, which led me to spend the next 15 years in Northern California. At the millennium, I switched from manufacturing coins to chemicals. But in 2004, the bust reached the pharmaceutical industry. By then, my daughter, her husband (Dr. and Mrs. John Lazzara) and my three young grandsons (Alex, Davis and Will) were settling in Ponte Vedra, so I was lured to the East Coast.

I soon joined JEA's internal audit staff, where I worked until my retirement in June 2015. While working at JEA, I was asked to translate for some water projects. JEA water department engineers had partnered with Engineers Without Borders (EWB), Rotary and others. A site selection team was formed in 2012 to assess various Honduran projects, and I was invited to go. Suddenly I was back in the international development field and would make five trips to Honduras over the next three years. On a whim, I decided to look at the Peace Corps website for Response (volunteers who have previously served as Peace Corps volunteers). There was an interesting short-term assignment: organizing a goat milk cooperative in Nebaj, Quiche, Guatemala. Six weeks after I retired from JEA, I was serving in Peace Corps Guatemala, where I would live and work until March 2016.

### We understand you're headed back to Guatemala soon. What's the project all about?

I will be returning to Guatemala to assist with a water project in the community of La Esperanza in Sololá. The Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach, Beaches Rotaract and Rotary District 6970 are primary funding partners, with technical and construction support from the University of North Florida College of Engineering, Wisconsin Water for the World and Agua Para La Salud. Peace Corps Guatemala has offered to assign a volunteer to the community to teach hygiene and water quality monitoring once we complete the system. The volunteer will work with the community water board (Junta del Agua) to assist in establishing water rates and measuring consumption from a meter we are installing at each of the 120 houses and the school. The community of La Esperanza has raised nearly 30 percent of the construction funds, plus donating all of the unskilled labor, locally sourced sand, gravel and framing timber.



### For people who are unfamiliar with the global challenges surrounding water, what would you tell them?

To health professionals, clean water is key to avoiding waterborne parasites and related illnesses; 5,000 deaths daily are attributed to unclean water. To me, it is the key to success for so many women in the world. If they spend four hours daily hiking to streams and carrying water back to their houses, this time is lost for other productive purposes. Guatemalan women could earn money in coffee fields, textile weaving, raising vegetables or my favorite, raising goats. Children, usually girls, who have to carry water often miss school. As they hike to the remote streams, they are also vulnerable to assault. Clean/readily accessible water is key to health, but it also unlocks success.

### What other civic efforts do you take part in around the community?

In addition to the many service projects initiated by the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach, I also participate in the First Coast Returned Peace Corps Volunteer (FCRPCV) initiatives. From Daytona to Brunswick, Georgia (the First Coast), there are approximately 200

Returned Peace Corps Volunteers (RPCVs) living and working in your midst. As a FCRPCV board member, I assist with Peace Corps advocating, recruiting and also refugee/immigrant settlement efforts. In 2017, FCRP-CVs won the Loret Miller Rupee award for outstanding RPCV organization in the U.S.

### What do you like to do in your free time?

Like so many Ponte Vedra grandmothers, I enjoy my grandson's successes in school, sports and scouts. I participate in an inquisitive book club and a challenging bridge game. Two to three times weekly, I don my PFD (personal flotation device) and step into a 42-foot long dragon boat with my fiberglass paddle for a work-out on the Intracoastal Waterway. I compete with the Jacksonville Dragon Boat Club throughout the Southeast, and sometime beyond. We qualified for races in Italy next July and plan to compete on the Arno River in Florence. Other nights you might catch me ushering at Ponte Vedra Concert Hall or the St. Augustine Amphitheater. I enjoy all types of live music. This past weekend, I was camping with several of my ushering friends at the Suwannee Roots Music Festival in Live Oak.

According to Quinn, there has been a "resurgence of appreciation" for veterans since the 2002 Iraq invasion. However, the retired sergeant major said that NFL players using the American flag and the national anthem as a platform for protest

constitutes a "measure of disrespect."

"It's my opinion and not that of the Veterans Council or Wreaths Across America," Quinn prefaced. "I feel that it is a measure of disrespect, what we've seen in the NFL. There are forums to get your message across but during a period of time when we're recognizing our nation and our sacrifices that the flag represents, what we've seen is not the time to do that."

Although Quinn is critical of the NFL's

recent anthem protests, he said there's been a positive change in the perception of veterans since the Vietnam War, and a majority of Americans appreciate their service.

Quinn asserted that the Wreaths Across America project is beneficial for veterans and the community because it's an opportunity for people to learn about history and appreciate the sacrifices of U.S. military personnel.

"I think part of the motto of Wreaths Across America is to learn and to teach," Ouinn added.

Anyone can participate in the Dec. 16 Wreaths Across America event at the St. Augustine National Cemetery; there is no sign-up required.





# Beaches dental office casts Shadow to brighten more than patients' smiles

"Everywhere you go, there he is "

Hence the name Shadow. And patients at Eccella Smiles seem to love him.

Shadow, a 2-year-old, 90-pound, three-legged Weimaraner, is the cuddly pet therapy dog at Dr. Scott Wagner's dental practice, located on Marsh Landing Parkway in Jacksonville Beach

Shadow ended up with the Wagner family thanks to Dr. Wagner's wife, Kate, and her passion for the breed. Kate Wagner is the Southeast regional coordinator for the Grayter Good Weimaraner Rescue, which helps Weimaraners of all ages across the United States to find permanent homes or foster homes. Shadow was an abuse case found in Mississippi, and a team of seven people traveled 12 hours to bring him to the First Coast and his forever home, as well as his new career.

Shadow has been with the Wagners about a year now and has assisted at the dental practice around six months for two to three days a week.

"He just makes himself at home and goes up and welcomes everybody," Dr Wagner said.

For the most part, patients love seeing Shadow at the office, and if for some reason a patient is allergic or not a fan, Dr. Wagner says the office is respectful of that. And some who weren't sure about having a dog there at first were quickly convinced by Shadow

"Once they get to meet him, they totally dig him," Dr Wagner said. "He's super soft and he just loves everyone from the little kids who come in to my oldest patients, to everyone in between. He just wants to be loved on."

Considering his job, Dr. Wagner says having the extra help that Shadow provides goes a long way toward changing perspectives in his field of practice.

"The whole goal is just to have everyone feel good and be more relaxed," he said.

The Wagners have two other Weimaraners: Allie, a rescue, and Bella. They recently lost two others, Hanna and Porter. But it was Shadow's unique personality that made him a good fit for Eccella.

"He definitely does change just the attitude in the office of a lot of patients," Dr. Wagner said. "He'll sense someone, if they're upset or nervous, and he'll hop into the room and just puts his head on their lap. To be so young, he's very intuitive about that."

Kate said her love for Weimaraners began around 17 years ago when, without knowing anything about the breed, they got Hanna—and some surprises.

"I got the crazy dog that is as emotionally needy as a 4-year old," she said. "They're not like any other dog."

But because she was a big animal lover, she knew she couldn't get rid of her new Weimaraner; so, she got another one.

"I became that crazy Weimaraner lady," Kate said.

After meeting Scott, Kate worried that having two "crazy" dogs might derail their relationship, but instead, he fell in love with them too.

Kate said the fact that Weimaraners become so attached and can be high-strung is the reason she focused on them.

"I'm crazy about the breed because they are one of the highest rate of return breeds, just because of how needy they are," she said. "It's just become a real passion of mine."

However, according to Scott, Shadow doesn't really fit the Weimaraner mold.

"Shadow is in his own world," Scott said. "He's just Mr. laidback."

And Kate says Eccela Smiles patients see in Shadow what her family sees.

"People love him," she said.
"He really has such a following at the office."

Dr. Wagner expects Shadow to have a long and successful career as a pet therapist at his office.

"I foresee as long as he's healthy and happy and continuing to love on people, he'll continue to be there in his part-time role," he said.

The audience rode a wave of emotions as David Frei, longtime voice of the Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show and pet therapy expert, shared dozens of stories – some comical, all heartwarming – during his keynote address at the second annual Therapy Animal Expo hosted by Therapy Animal Coalition on Oct. 7, at the Schultz Center in Jacksonville.

Frei's voice often choked with emotion when he recalled some of the patients, many of them children, whose lives have been touched over the decades by his four therapy dogs.

"His stories were inspiring," said Marcie Ryan, a Beaches resident and pet therapy volunteer at Baptist Medical Center-Beaches. "I have felt those same emotions when I've taken my dogs to visit patients at the hospital."

With a nod to Jacksonville,
Frei told the story of his interview
for Fox News Channel with Bill
Wynne, who was based in the
South Pacific during World War
II. A fellow GI found a 4-pound
Yorkshire terrier in a foxhole.
Wynne ended up with the dog and
named her Smoky. She helped the
war effort by running cables and
wires through pipes, but it was
Smoky's other "job" that connected her to the expo audience.

While he was hospitalized with dengue fever in 1944, Wynne's buddies brought Smoky to the hospital to cheer him up. After seeing Smoky, nurses asked Wynne if he would allow them to take the dog on their rounds to visit the injured troops – if their commanding officer approved.

The commanding officer did approve, and it was none other than Dr. Charles Mayo, son of Mayo Clinic co-founder Dr. Charles Horace Mayo. Once Wynn recovered, he and Smoky regularly visited the wounded in military hospitals. Animal Planet credits Smoky with being the first therapy dog on record.

"When I think about pet therapy, I think about the great things our pets do for us and for other people," Frei said. "That's what it's all about. You are changing people's lives, at least for the moment. And, it will change your life, too."

Kristi Leonard, a Ponte Vedra resident and president of the board of Therapy Animal Coalition, said Frei brought to life the profound impact of pets.

"In addition to his keynote address, he provided helpful information and insights during a roundtable discussion among the chairs of some of our local pet therapy programs," Leonard said.

Since the first Therapy Animal Coalition expo in 2016, the number of therapy animal teams volunteering in Northeast Florida has increased by 64 percent, according to the organization.

# Pay yourself first, automate, get out of the way

In our endeavors, we should position ourselves for the best chance of success.

This concept applies to investing as well, as it is vital to make a prudent and informed deci-

sion based on proven principles that historically have shown excellent results. Moreover, if we want to stack the odds in our favor, there is no more critical belief than to "pay ourselves first" and then allow our money to work for us (hopefully grow) for the next 10, 20 or 30 years.

Unlike life, stock market returns—measured by the S&P 500—have been shown to be less volatile when viewing results from a long-term perspective than when witnessed from a short-term view. Of course, life works just the opposite, as the present is much more predictable than the future. This dichotomy is the primary reason that investors cannot hang onto stocks for the long-term. In other words, they allow their present emotions to wreak havoc with their investment decisions.

Of course, short-term, gut wrenching volatility of the stock market can be scary even for seasoned investors. However, when we gaze at the same information over a long period of 10, 20 or 30 years, the unpredictability is not as frightening, which is why I believe the foundation of successful investing is "time." We need to understand that time is our friend!

Furthermore, if we are a "pay you first" investor that automates our decision making process and then gets out of the way, bear markets (extended decline in stock prices) are good for us! That is correct because bear markets can be a wonderful opportunity to buy stocks at a lower price, which can help us build wealth quicker.

Regrettably, long-term investing is not sexy enough for many investors. Instead, there are too many eager beavers hyperventilating with excitement while watching shows with talking heads that make endless predictions about the economy and the next great hot stock. We need to get rid of the noise and nonsense because if we do not, the chances are high that we will fall prey to the dynamic duo of fear and greed, which repeatedly creates remarkable chaos for one's portfolio.

Paying yourself first and getting out of the way is a simple principle in theory but an incredibly difficult one in application. Because of the difficulty to remain disciplined to pay ourselves first is why we should automate. Automation relieves us of the burden of having to write checks repeatedly.

Unconsciously investing monthly, quarterly or yearly essentially eliminates our need for will power. In other words, our goal is to remove the temptation of not paying ourselves first! Sadly, the way I see it is that most folks pay everyone first and whatever is left, they "invest" in themselves. Paying yourself last has usually not been a realistic strategy for building wealth. Not only is this methodology arguably a poor way for you to become independently wealthy, but it flies directly in the face of another vital principal: keep expenses relatively low, reduce liabilities and here is the key, diligently build a base of solid assets.

The secret to building wealth is not the strategy itself, but rather the execution. Without question, the biggest risk to my long-term wealth creation is me! Guess who the biggest risk is to your long-term wealth creation? You!

There is simply no escaping the fact


that managing human behavior is the keystone to being a successful investor because our emotion and short-term thinking make us strangers to common sense. In the end, psychology trumps financial education! To build wealth over the long haul, we must have the desire, discipline and willingness to do what so many others simply will not or cannot do.

In the final analysis, building wealth is simple but not easy. The primary roadblock for most folks is their tendency to seek complexity and ignore simplicity, which has been alive and well for years, and it shows no sign of slowing down. I will allow Leonardo da Vinci to provide me with my closing remark: "Simplicity is the ultimate sophistication." Pay yourself first ... automate ... get out of the way!

# Junior Pee Wee team posts undefeated season, eyes conference championship

Led by head coach Scott Owen, the Ponte Vedra Sharks Junior Pee Wee team has capped off a perfect 7-0 regular season and earned a No. 1 seed for the conference playoffs.

The Sharks powered their way to this unblemished record using a scheme similar to that of our local NFL team: ground-based offense, control of the clock and stifling defense. Unlike the Jaguars, however, the PV squad has been consistent from week to week, and has only given up 12 points the entire year.

The road to the postseason began Sept. 23, when PV put its 3-0 record on the line at Oakleaf Black. The Knights threw everything in their playbook at the Sharks, attacking both in the air and on the ground, hoping to generate chunks of yardage and keep the voracious PV defense on its heels.


Nevertheless, Oakleaf was able to manage only one explosive play, a 20-yard gain on a counter, and simply could not light

# Nease, St. Augustine set for showdown

After a commanding 63-28 win over Middleburg last week, Nease has continued to intensify its showdown against undefeated St. Augustine.

The Panthers (4-3, 2-0 District 4-6A) and the Yellow Jackets (6-0, 2-0) face off at 7 p.m. Friday at Nease.

Standout running back Jareem Westcott continues to be a dominating force for the Panthers' offense, rushing for 241 yards and four touchdowns against Middleburg.

"Jareem is having a great season and surpassed the 1,000-yard mark for the season last week," Nease coach Tim Krause said. "He is a huge part of our offense because he has the ability to turn a 4-yard run into an explosive play."

A week after going 11 of 12 for 222 yards and five touchdowns against White, quarterback Preston Staples was 3 of 7 against the Broncos, but he made his completions count, throwing for three touchdowns and 139 yards. Receiver

Ashton Wood caught two of the TD passes for a combined 112 yards receiving, and tight end Zach Sheffer had a 27-yard TD reception.

"Our plan will always be to establish the running game and create opportunities off it in the passing game," Krause said. "Preston did a great job executing when called upon. When we are running effectively downhill and can capitalize with play-action down the field, we are a dangerous offense."

While the Panthers have been racking up the numbers offensively, St. Augustine's defense has been clamping down, holding opponents to an average of 10.5 points per game. The Yellow Jackets have given up just seven points in their last three games, which included shutouts of Englewood and Ponte Vedra.

"We have a lot of respect for St. Augustine and the program they have built," Krause said. "They challenge you to play a clean, complete game in all three phases in order to win. As a coach, it is a fun game to prepare for because it challenges you to put kids in the best possible situations to succeed."

With the Panthers and Yellow Jackets tied atop the district standings, the winner on Friday will likely be in control of the conference.

"We know this is a big game for our program and our school community," Krause said. "The challenge is to make sure we play under control and don't allow the moment to be too big for us. As a team, we feel like we have continued to improve and build confidence in each other, and we are looking forward to Friday."

# Sharks win on Senior Night

Then junior Reese Russi teamed up with Murrah for a 12-yard score. Russi caught three balls for 43 yards on the night.

Junior Nick Pirris made the score 28-0 when he hauled in a toss from freshman quarterback Jacobi Myers on a play that covered 36 yards. The half ended with the Sharks up 28-7.

Ponte Vedra's defense stopped the Braves on a fourth-and-2 at the home team's 33-yard line, and four hard runs by Calvin gave the Sharks a first down at the Braves' 32-yard line. Then sophomore Tommy Zitiello gathered in Murrah's perfect pass to push the Shark lead to 35-7.

Following Zitiello's score, Parker wasn't able to get a first down and had to punt the ball away. Minutes later, Toma's touchdown catch gave Ponte Vedra its sixth TD and a 42-7 advantage.

Parker scored again in the fourth quarter but saw the point after blocked and trailed 42-13. Sophomore Collin Magill—with 30 yards on 13 carries—combined with Calvin to grind out three first downs to set up the final Shark score. It came when underclassman Zach Chattaway bulled over defenders from 2 yards out with one minute left in the game.

The Sharks offense benefitted from a solid effort by their defense. Parker was forced to punt three times, and the team turned the ball over on downs three times and had a pass intercepted (by Zitiello).

Leading tacklers for the Sharks were Herring with five and Connor McDonough, Gibson Pardue, Zitiello, Pete Merlini and Nick Greco all with four.

Next week, the Sharks face their toughest challenge of the season when they travel to Trinity Christian.

up the scoreboard. For its part, PV unveiled a high-percentage, intermediate-range passing attack to complement its patented "ground and pound" offense.

Tight end Jack Pelot was the primary beneficiary, leading the team with four receptions, including a fourth quarter touchdown from 20 yards out. This score emphatically put the game away, yet the Knights never really threatened. The game's other TDs were rushes, contributed by Zach Martus, Ben Burk and Corbyn Fordham respectively, making the final score 23-0.

Another away contest loomed for the Sharks on Sept. 30, though an easier road trip to the recreational complex in Jacksonville Beach. Unlike Oakleaf, Jax Beach physically challenged Ponte Vedra at the line of scrimmage, fought to keep the game competitive and really forced the Sharks to earn a 12-0 victory.

The passing attack that had proved effective against the Knights never got on track against the Jaguars. Shark quarterbacks

combined for four pass attempts, with three incompletions and one interception. In a by now-familiar scenario, what won the day offensively for PV was a methodical, bruising ground game that produced 165 yards and two TDs, one by Burk and one by Bennett Baumgartner.

The relentless nature of the rushing attack was personified by Fordham's performance. Of his five total carries, four produced critical fourth down conversions in which he attacked defenders and refused to go down until he

had bulled past the first down

The Sharks' sixth contest was a Hurricane Irma "make-up" game held at a neutral site (St. Augustine) against Fleming Island Blue, the sole remaining unbeaten team in the First Coast Conference. Spoiler alert—the muchanticipated dogfight between the top-ranked squads never materialized, and PV won easily.

The Sharks were unintimidated from the outset, forcing a quick Eagle three-and-out to start the game and then, after a change of

possession, ringing up a 38-yard Fordham rushing touchdown on the team's first offense snap. The PV defense played an exceptional game, led by Fordham with two tackles for loss and two fumble recoveries. Linebacker Maddox Bostic had four tackles (including three for loss) and a fumble recovery of his own.

Fleming Island did not threaten the end zone until late in the game when the score was out of reach. Noteworthy on the offensive side of the ball was exemplary play in the trenches. The Shark offensive line consistently blew the Eagle defenders off the ball and opened large holes for ball carriers. Backs would generally be 4 to 5 yards beyond the line of scrimmage before they were touched by a defender. Baumgartner led all rushers with 75 yards; rushing TDs came from Fordham (two) and Burk, rounding out the score at 20-6.

Homecoming at Cornerstone Park on Oct. 14 was a festive affair, and the Sharks did not intend to let Orange Park spoil the proceedings, nor their perfect record. The Raiders, having scouted PV, were wise enough not to run "up the gut," and into the teeth of the defense.

They therefore mixed passes with runs outside and had some moderate success with that strategy, but did not generate enough consistency to mount a sustained drive, let alone put points on the board. The Sharks were able to notch their fifth shutout of the season, by a score of 19-0.

Baumgartner was again the leading rusher with 71 yards and two first half scores, while wide receiver Griffin Owen added an insurance TD late in the game on a well-executed 9-yard jet sweep. The defense was paced by defensive backs Joe Mahoney (five tackles and one pass broken up) and Brian Case (second interception of the season).

Coach Owen, rightfully proud of his players and coaches, looked ahead to the postseason, commenting, "Between our kids and our staff, I like our position right now. We are playing well, but have the ability to make the adjustments and corrections needed to clear up any mistakes we detect."

The top-seeded Sharks open postseason play on Oct. 21 in the conference semifinals, with a rematch against No. 4 seed Orange Park at Jax Beach.






