



Dr. Robin Rose is the new executive director of Girls Incorporated of Jacksonville. Rose was hired after Peg Ganger, the former executive director, retired in September.

Girls Inc. is a national organization, with 82 affiliates in the United States and Canada. Through after school, literacy, summer and outreach programs, Girls Inc. seeks to empower all girls to be Strong, Smart and Bold.

As the mother of three grown daughters, Rose is passionate about the organization's mission. She has been with Girls Inc. for two and a half years. Prior to leading the Jacksonville division, Rose served as the CEO of the Girls Inc. Sarasota division, and prior to that position, she headed Frameworks of Tampa Bay, Inc., an organization which teaches youth to manage their emotions, develop healthy relationships and make good decision for academic, career and personal success.

Rose and her husband, Capt. Wayne Ziskal, associate professor of aviation at Jacksonville University, currently live in South Ponte Vedra but will be relocating to St. Augustine after construction of their new home is completed.

Where are you from originally?

I am a native of Winston-Salem, North Carolina, but I'm a military brat. My dad was in the Air Force. I've lived all over the world as a kid; it had its pros and cons.

How are you adjusting to your Jacksonville transition so far?

I think one of the things that I like about this area is I'm a southern girl born and bred, so I really like this area that's very reflective of the gentility of the South — some of the customs of the South. I've lived in South Florida for quite a while. I did my PhD in Ft. Lauderdale, and then I lived over in Sarasota where I led Girls Inc. I was the CEO over there.

I am now the new CEO for Girls Inc. here in Jacksonville. Though the climate is milder than here, you don't get the same sense of southernness [in those cities] as you do here, and that's something that I really appreciate about this area.

What do you like about living here?

I really like the business community in this area; I love the group of strong, smart and bold women that I have met in Ponte Vedra — women in the Women's Giving Alliance, women who are really committed to youth issues. There are just so many amazing things about this area and about the really great work that people are doing for kids — not only girls, but all kids — to make sure that they thrive in life and that has always been my personal calling and ministry.

How long have you lived in Ponte Vedra?

I just moved here August. My husband I just got married last November; we're getting

I relinquished the reigns in Sarasota, once they had found my successor, so I could do a seamless transition. So, the whole time [my husband and I have] been commuting between one coast to the other. He's a professor at Jacksonville University and a retired American Airlines captain. He teaches aviation at Jacksonville University.

How did you come by your new position?

Luckily for me, the CEO who was here, she was really the interim executive director and I knew her well from the Girls Inc. family, and she reached out to me. I applied and got the position.

Tell me about Girls Inc.

The mission of Girls Inc. is to inspire all girls to be strong, smart and bold. And really what those three words mean — they are related to the development of the whole child.

So, strong means we are delivering research-based programming to girls that helps them make healthy life choices for themselves to avoid risky behaviors. And that's really important for girls of all ages.

Smart, is exactly what it sounds like, which is around academic achievement, but we also know that that strong bucket, that healthy living bucket, that you don't like your body and you don't like a million things about yourself, that that lends to a low self-confidence which has impacted academic achievements. [At] Girls Inc. Jacksonville, we serve girls who are sort of the lower economic homes, to make sure that they know how to read, and our K-3 program is really around reading and literacy quite a bit.

And then the bold programming that we do is around teaching girls life skills. So, communication, conflict resolution — those skills and tools that they need to advocate for themselves throughout their lives.

So I like to say that the mission of Girls Inc. is very much about helping to break generations of cycles of welfare and poverty and to dream higher and to think bigger about who you want to become and have all of those resources at your disposal. I really love Girls Inc. for that mission.

What are some of your goals as the new executive director of Girls Incorporated of Jacksonville?


We're a national organization with 82 affiliates in the United States and Canada, and one of the things here in the Jacksonville area is people don't know the mission of Girls Inc. They have an opinion that we just do a safe place for girls to go after school because all of our programs are after school — but it's so much more.

So raising that brand awareness and helping our community understand the relevance of single gender education programing, why it's so needed and really the intentional work that we do in those three buckets and to set girls up for success along with schools and along with the community and families. I'm a big believer [that] it takes a village to raise a child these days — more than ever before. So helping people to understand our mission and to raise that brand awareness in Jacksonville is something that I will be working on very strategically along with the staff and board.

What do you enjoy doing in your free time?

[I enjoy] working out — running is definitely something important to me just to help maintain balance in my life, which is a good thing. I love the ocean — so walking on the beach or anything that has to do with that. [I like] bike riding, kayaking – those kinds of things. And with my husband being a retired airlines pilot, we have that ability to travel. I have four grandbabies. One is in Denver and two are in Sarasota, so as much as I can get to see those grandkids, is what I do.

Artwork, furniture and home décor

The Arc Jacksonville was founded 50 years ago by a group of parents, families and educators who wanted to create new opportunities for children with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The mission of the organization, to help these individual achieve their full potential and participate in community life, is accomplished

through programs and services that serve over 350 individuals daily at several locations t h r o u g h o u t Jacksonville.

Among the programs and services the organization offers, which include but are not limited to employment opportunities, job skill training, education and advocacy, The Arc Jacksonville offers two distinct



programs that creatively engage the individuals the organization serves.

These programs channel a creative outlet while simultaneously benefitting the induvial participating in the programs.

A.R.T., which stands for Artistic Realization Technology, is an art method program open to individuals participating in Max Care. Paintings are created by a "surrogate" artist, but all manner of the design aspect of the art piece is designed by the I/DD individual for the surrogate artist to create the actual art piece.

These works of art are available for purchase with half of the proceeds benefitting the individual as earnings and half of the proceeds being invested back into the program. A full catalog of artwork along with pricing information, is available online at www. arcjacksonville.org/a-r-t-program.

Transform Abilities is a budding program that allows individuals to earn a fair wage through the creation and sale of furniture and home décor accessories made from reclaimed and recycled materials.

The items are all made from solid wood and include several different styles of coffee tables and matching end tables, book shelves, wine racks, tool carts and holiday décor items.



A cost calculator is used to determine the cost of the piece based on labor and materials, but décor items generally range in cost from about \$5-\$25 and furniture is in the price range of around \$40-\$350 depending on the piece.

The program also offers a customizable furniture option, where the public and commission a furniture or accessories. A popular option is using Pinterest for inspiration and having someone's "pinned" item be created by the individuals in the Transform Abilities program.

Dried herb mixes and Barkin' Biscuits

The North Florida School of Special Education, located in Jacksonville, was established in 1992 with a mission to improve the lives of students with mild to moderate intellectual disabilities through academic, vocation and social skills.

One of the schools programs, Berry Good Farms, was established with the goal of teaching horticulture to NFSSE students ages 6-18 and a self-sustaining industry for transition students, ages 18-22 and post

graduates, ages 22 and over.

At the farm, the students and post grads grow a variety of fruits, vegetables and herbs. Besides the sale of seasonal produce to students, the community, restaurants and caterers, Berry Good Farms also produces packaged food items such as Barkin' Biscuits dog treats and dried herb mixes.

The products are created by students with fresh, cultivated items grown at the farm. Barkin' Biscuits are \$6 per box and spice and ranch dip mixes are \$3 each.

Another way to support the organization is through the farm adoption program. Options range from purchasing a buckets of worms or garden tools for a student, all the way up to adopting the farm, greenhouse or aquaponics program for a year, and everything in between such as adopting a vegetable garden or berry producing row. Prices range from \$25 all the way up to \$10,000.





A grand opening celebration and ribbon cutting for The Sea Turtle Hospital at UF Whitney Lab in St. Augustine took place Saturday, Oct. 24. Hundreds were in attendance on Saturday to tour the new facility and participate in family-friendly activities.

The sea turtle hospital will focus on three cornerstones: rehabilitation, research, and education. There are four 1,100 gallon tanks that can hold up to four turtles each located at the hospital. Each tank has its own filtration system and the capability of using the center's sea water system or it can be self-contained for guarantined sea turtles or for other special circumstances, for example, if red tide is present in the area.

The sea turtle center fills a void we've had here in Northeast Florida, sea turtle founding trustee committee member, John Perkner articulated. Prior to the opening of this facility, injured or sick sea turtles found in Northeast Florida had to be transported miles away for treatment, the closest treatment and rehabilitation facility being the Georgia Sea Turtle Center on Jekyll Island.

The Sea Turtle Hospital at Whitney will also treat turtles affected by the Fibropapilloma virus, a mysterious disease that impacts the health and well-being of sea turtles. Through the

Fibropapilloma research initiative. Faculty at the sea turtle hospital will also be researching the mysterious virus in order to better understand it.

thanked addressed the crowd and thanked them for supporting the sea turtle hospital.

"I'm constantly amazed at the dedication that the local community has for sea turtles and for their natural world," Martindale said.

"This opening of the sea turtle hospital here is an immense opportunity for biologists like us to learn more about the transmission of disease in the marine environment about and there's plenty of faculty, for example in Gainesville, that are interested in utilizing this facility and I think that you're going to see enhanced involvement, and a bridge if you will, between Whitney Lab and the Gainesville main campus," he said.

Martindale also noted that they have had constant support University of Florida in Gainesville, as well as the Aquatic Animal Health at the UF College of Veterinary Medicine and Dr. Terry Norton, director and veterinarian of the Georgia Sea Turtle Center. He also said that an emerging pathogens institute in Gainesville that's also expressed a lot of interest in utilizing this resource for their own research. The Sea Turtle Conservancy located in Gainesville helped outfit the surgery center.

Funding for the sea turtle hospital was accomplished through private donors and a State License Plate Grant from the Sea Turtle Conservancy, making it truly a community and grassroots-type effort, according to Martindale.

As if on cue, two days after the grand opening, a juvenile green sea turtle was found floating near the Swoope Site Boat Ramp in New Smyrna Beach. "Swoope" became the hospital's first official sea turtle patient.

Gas in Swoope's GI tract was causing the sea turtle to float. Swoope was also diagnosed with the Fibropapilloma virus and underwent a CT scan at Precision Imaging Centers in Jacksonville to make sure the sea turtle didn't have any internal tumors along with the external tumors the turtle had from the virus.

Once Swoope's red blood cell numbers increase, he or she will undergo surgery to remove the tumors.

Fantasy Farms is a "farm" in the least traditional sense.

Where there should be bright red barn doors, there's a red wrought iron gate nestled in brush and hidden behind the colossal palm trees lining South Roscoe Boulevard. Between unassuming churches and residential communities is one of North Florida's best kept secrets: an eclectic mix of classic cars, exotic animals and a modge-podge of kitsch collectibles that add up to create one bizarre wonderland called Fantasy Farms — and it's unlike anything else.

Fantasy Farms is a semi-private property and 501c3 non-profit founded by interior designer Louie Williams that plays host to a variety of animals, many of which are rescues. A few among them are an umbrella cockatoo, several macaws, two

wallabies, ring-tailed lemurs, peacocks and an ocelot — all housed on two acres of land in the heart of Ponte Vedra.

For its proximity to the beaches and the shopping centers of the town, it may as well be a rainforest or a tropical island all its own. It's a corner of the world that Vice President of Operations Ramon Jimenez calls "a hidden gem."

"I'm ex-military — I did 25 years Navy and I thought I'd seen everything in my travels," Jimenez said. "I thought I'd seen all the world had to offer but this microcosm of a place in such a small town — it's a blast. Unlike anything I'd ever seen."

And those rarities don't end with animals. Fantasy Farms also houses a selection of automobiles collected by Williams and President Frank Barker, including one red 1955 T-Bird that

belonged to Colonel Sanders, a green 1954 Foxtrot MG and a 1929 Hacker-Craft boat.

But the real showstopper is Roscoe's, the all-in-one dining hall, dance floor, bar and pop-culture museum. The floorspace is a wall-to-wall time trip featuring cultural artifacts: a Mrs. Pac-Man machine, shelves stocked with model cars and a collection of vintage Pez dispensers, an authentic piece by the late Keith Haring, a miniature Japanese slot machine overflowing with tokens, animatronic mascots, vinyl records and an assortment of neon signs and strobe lights are just a handful of the collected pieces on display. It extends to an outdoor bar with even more eccentricities; a gigantic Piggly Wiggle sign and a displaced (functional) traffic light adorn the dock. As Vice President of

Marketing Scott Nelowet said, the oddities add to the charm.

"It's a completely random assortment of things that just work together," said Nelowet. "It's a mix of items that makes this place a completely unique experience."

And it's an experience the team at Fantasy Farms is excited to share according to Vice President of Administration and Finance Cathy Dugan.

"We've been closed for so long and there's just so many neat and cool things here," Dugan said. "We don't want to get too big, but we want to continue to rescue these animals and keep educating the community about the wildlife here."








JACKSONVILLE MARINES CONTINUES CONTI

In November, Lance Corporal Jacob M. Bell and Corporal Gabriel Gonzalez were presented with the Robert A. Mette Memorial Award and Mette Memorial Scholarship, respectively. Each year, locals remember Robert Allen "Bob" Mette with the two honors at the annual Marine Corps Birthday Ball.

Bob Mette stands out in the minds of his high school classmates because of his involvement in the community and his school, but also because he was the first member of the 1956 Landon High School graduating class to die. Mette received his Landon diploma on June 8, 1956, in Jacksonville and died just 65 days later on August 12, 1956 at the U.S. Naval Hospital in Camp Lejeune, N.C.

The Western Union Telegram began, "I regret to inform you that your son Pvt Robert Allen Mette USMCR is critically ill at this hospital due to Acute Meningitis." Mette's father was enjoying a quiet Sunday morning at home with his two younger sons when the message was delivered. Mr. Mette immediately drove to Mayfair Baptist Church to pick up his wife, Cora. They packed quickly, and the Mette family headed to Camp Lejeune in Jacksonville, NC, to be with their oldest son. Their trip was in vain – Bob Mette died that afternoon before his family arrived.

The news of Mette's death shocked and saddened his high school classmates and the community. Mette was a high-profile high school athlete, active in his church, and little league baseball coach and an active participant at Landon.

On Dec. 22, 1955, Mette had joined the 2nd Amphibian Tractor Co., U.S. Marine Corps based in Jacksonville. One of Mette's obligations as a U.S. Marine Corps Reservist was to attend two weeks of active duty training each summer. The designated training base for 1956 was Camp Lejeune in Jacksonville, N.C. After a day of liberty during the following August, Mette became ill and disoriented and was admitted at the U.S. Naval Hospital. Mette died that afternoon of acute spinal meningitis.

After Mette's death, John Lanahan, then the commanding officer of his Marine Unit, established the Robert A. Mette award in memorial of his outstanding leadership, dedication and involvement with the unit and his community. The first award was given in 1956 to a young man from Jacksonville Beach.

Additionally, since 1999, the \$1,000 Mette Family Scholarship has been presented annually by Richard Mette on behalf of the Mette family. It recognizes one Marine for academic achievement. Bob's only surviving brother Richard is fully involved in his brother's memory. He donated the Robert A. Mette Memorial Plaque for many years, and in 1999 he established the \$1,000 Mette Family Scholarship to compliment the Robert A. Mette Memorial Plaque. These two awards are presented annually to two Marines in the Jacksonville-based 4th Assault Amphibian Battalion, 4th Marine Division.

"I am most proud and honored each year, on behalf of my brother and my family, to hand out the Robert A. Mette Memorial Award and Scholarship," Mette said. "These two winners should take price in personifying the strong leadership traits the Marines so greatly cherish. The professional excellence and service to the Marine Corps is in keeping with the spirit of this award of the past number of years."
