Brattin, James running for MO State Senate

Incumbent Rick Brattin, R, Harrisonville will face off against Raymond James, D, Leeton, for the Missouri State Senate District 31 seat in the Nov. 5 election.

A small business owner, James is running for his second term in office. James has served in a number of local positions, including the Johnson County Central Dispatch 911 Board and as an Environmental Public Health Specialist for Johnson County.

Each candidate was asked to fill out a questionnaire. Answers were limited to 150 and are listed in the order the candidates appear on the ballot. The candidates' responses have been lightly edited for grammar and a few were edited for length.

Why are you running for office?

Brattin: It has been my honor to serve this Senate District since my election in 2020, and I would like to have the opportunity to serve a second term so I can keep standing up for our Constitution and fighting to make sure truly conservative legislation is passed by the Missouri Senate.

James: Every Citizen has a duty to do what they can with what they have, where they are to make their community better. Such as serving as a Scout leader or volunteering at a food bank. I saw our current State Senator called intentionally dysfunctional by his own Governor. Saw his attacks on Women's Rights, his efforts to ban books and his attacks on families with gay or trans children. While he professes to be for parental rights and claims to be for protecting children he ignores the rights of parents and citizens to make their own decisions. You are Free to make decisions that conform to his church's teachings not yours. He voted to ban abortion. Voted to force 12 year old rape victims carry to term. Perseverance led him to be on the STS-128 mission, which launched on August 28, 2009, that launched to the International Space Station via Space Shuttle Discovery.

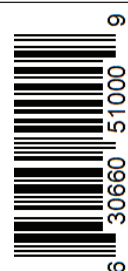
Most importantly, perseverance led him to the University

knitted, finished many beautiful and intricate cross stitch pieces, hung wallpaper, upholstered furniture, caned chairs.

In the 1970's, she established a knitting group with like-minded women – a group that lasted through the years though its original members have dwindled. As an architectural preservationist, she refurbished two Warrensburg historic houses. She researched both houses and had them placed on the National Register of Historic Places (Herbert A. and Bettie E. Cress House and the Lewis and Sophie Griebel House).

Nancy was a gardener. Her yard won best lawn of the year more than once and was included in the garden walking tour of Warrensburg. She grew trees, shrubbery, and flowers, heritage roses being her favorite.

Her final years were made easier by the support of her care-giver Robbyn McColligan, her loving neighbors the Thomas family, and her friends throughout the decades and around the world. Her husband Robert and son Christopher both preceded her in death. She is survived by her three daughters: Susan, Robin, and Elizabeth (husband Wayne), and by her four grandchildren: Brent (wife Hannah), Benjamin, Michael (partner Amanda), and Abagael (partner Adira).

Arrangements were made under the direction of Sweeney-Phillips & Holdren Funeral Home in Warrensburg. There will be no service but memories to the family are appreciated.

Nancy was a civic-minded activist. She received a bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Texas. She always voted, was an associate of the Danforth Foundation, began the League of Women Voters in Warrensburg and was behind the opening of the Planned Parenthood clinic. She worked in the PR department of CMSU, turned to teaching at the Writing Lab there, and took a master's degree in English from Central Missouri State University, writing her thesis on the letters of Emily Dickinson.

Nancy was adventurous and independent, traveling and living abroad in Romania, England, Greece, and Hungary. And she remained independent living at home, despite physical hardships, until it was no longer possible. While at home, she loved art, classical music, the ballet, and literature. Her house was full of books, paintings, and music. Guests were always treated to a cup of coffee and a pastry from Andres in Kansas City.

Nancy was a creative person. During her life she sewed clothes and quilts,

be closer to his daughter, who lives in Buckner.

Byars, 73, worked in boarding schools for many years serving upwards of 9,000 kids during his time. But, he never felt the schools were serving food the right way.

"I've had as many as 600 kids at a time," Byars said. "So, when you're feeding that many (kids), you have a lot of processed food."

Having spent time in seven different culinary schools and many restaurant kitchens, Byars has seen the deficiencies and adequacy in today's food market. Opening up his own food truck, where he can control the ins and outs of his product, seemed like the best thing to do.

"It's about giving (the customer) an experience," Byars said. "I'm a little bit older and so I grew up caring about customer

service. That's the most important thing."

Looking for the best deal is a theme for the One Man Band Food Truck.

Byars purchased his food truck from China, saying the price was hard to beat. Buying it just before the COVID-19 pandemic began, Byars didn't receive his truck until three months later.

The truck itself can't be classified as a truck, however. To move it around, Byars drives a small motorcycle that, with the rest of the truck hooked up, can reach a mere 35 miles per hour. Byars could care less about the speed because of the small price he paid overall and the perks coming within the truck itself.

"It came with a grill and everything you see in here," Byars said pointing to the truck's built-in fridge, freezer and other amenities.

Byars believes that food is only good when the customer leaves satisfied. Burger joints are

around every corner in the U.S., but if you have the best burger, people have a reason to come back.

"You can get anybody to come eat with you once, but how do you get them the second time or the third time?" Byars said.

For the One Man Band Food Truck, which got its name because Byars runs it on his own and was inspired by the One Man Band Diner in Utah, accommodation is key.

Nobody wants to pay an arm and a leg for a hamburger in the same way nobody wants extra fat that they can avoid. Byars avoids both of those with a dedication to freshness and the customers he cooks for every day he is open.

"Your taste buds are different than mine," Byars said. "If you're a customer and you come in, you say, 'I prefer not this, or I'd like a little bit more of this,' then I will accommodate you and make it your way, because who's eating it?"

All of the meat and produce at One Man Band is done fresh and local. Byars grinds his own hamburger meat, dices all his vegetables and only outsources his bread from Philadelphia.

"The difference in our food is it's all like what I grew up with. More fresh and it's not been processed a lot," Byars said.

And don't worry, the food isn't pricey either. For less than \$20, customers can order from a range of sandwiches like its best-selling Philly cheesesteak and receive a bottled beverage and hot and ready french fries. Not available during lunch, the One Man Band Food Truck also offers breakfast burritos.

Byars said he is looking to expand more on his menu with fresh squeezed lemonade and handcrafted pizzas in the future.

Meeting scheduled to educate over new program for bed and breakfasts, short-term rentals

City of Warrensburg staff invite the public to attend an educational meeting regarding the new licensing and inspection program for bed and breakfast inns and short-term rentals.

This new program provides standards to ensure the safety, health, and general welfare of both guests and the public. The intent of the meeting is to review the program requirements and answer questions concerning the process of completing inspections and obtaining a business license.

The meeting will be held at 2 p.m. October 16 at the Municipal Center, 200 S. Holden Street.

Based on both evolving local conditions and state and national trends for regulating these establishments, the City adopted two ordinances (Ordinance No. 5825 and Ordinance No. 5826) related to bed and breakfasts and short-term rentals in late 2023. All bed and breakfast inns or short-term rentals operating inside Warrensburg City limits will be required to successfully complete an inspection and get a city business license prior to June 1, 2025.

Inspections held between January 1 and February 28 are free, and any inspection after March 1 is \$125 per inspection. Short-term rental/bed and breakfast operators are encouraged to call in their inspections before January 1. Moving forward, this license must be renewed each year by June 1 and a new inspection will be required to renew the business license.

MoDot schedules resurfacing along Route Z

The Missouri Department of Transportation will be conducting lane closures on Lafayette and Johnson County Route Z between Interstate 70 and U.S. Highway 50 for resurfacing.

Work will take place from Friday, Oct. 11 until Thursday, Oct. 31, from approximately 7 a.m. until 4 p.m. daily. This project will involve the use of a flagging operation with pilot cars to help traffic navigate through the work zone. All work is weather permitting.

Motorists are reminded to slow down and pay attention while driving in work zones. Not all work zones look alike. Work zones can be moving operations, such as striping, patching or mowing. They can also be short term, temporary lane closures to make quick repairs or remove debris from the roadway.



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Charter and Go partners with University of Central Missouri to enhance aviation, technology education

WARRENSBURG — Charter and Go, a rapidly growing tech startup in the air charter industry, has announced a long-term partnership with the University of Central Missouri.

The collaboration has been in development for the past three years and officially marks Charter and Go's first partnership with a higher education institution. The success of the partnership is evident, as four individuals from UCM's internship program have since been hired into full-time roles at Charter and Go.

"We're thrilled to partner with UCM and work closely with such talented students. As a UCM alumnus, it's especially rewarding to give back to the program that helped shape my career," Huff said. "This collaboration allows us to nurture the next generation of tech professionals while also driving innovation within Charter and Go. The students bring fresh ideas and energy, and by working on topics like cloud computing, serverless applications, artificial intelligence, web applications, cybersecurity and aviation, they're earning real-world experience that will help them succeed in their careers."

"This partnership is a unique opportunity for our students to gain hands-on experience with industry-leading technology while working closely with professionals in the field," Dr. Copus said. "It aligns perfectly with our commitment to providing students with practical, real-world applications for their studies. No, the government does not control the weather

The devastation of Hurricane Helene has reactivated a juicy conspiracy theory that has been floating in and out of the public consciousness for the past 30 years.

The story goes like this: A United States military science project called HAARP (High-frequency Active Auroral Research Program), stationed in Alaska and begun in the 1990s, discovered how to control and

weaponize the weather. Now, the federal government uses HAARP to punish its foreign and domestic political enemies by enhancing hurricanes, conjuring up blizzards, and causing earthquakes.

In the latest retelling of the tale, the feds have used HAARP to enhance Hurricane Helene and make sure rural Appalachia, a Republican stronghold, is too weakened to vote. Or, in another version, the hurricane was sent to destroy Appalachia so developers could swoop in and access valuable mineral stores lying underneath the Carolina mountains.

Here are two things I know for sure: I do not trust the government, and weather manipulation science is real. Here are two other things I know for sure: the government did not control Hurricane Helene, and it cannot control the weather.

I love a good conspiracy theory, so I did some light reading on HAARP and the history of weather manipulation science. I encourage you to do the same. Start with the easy stuff on Wikipedia, and then extend your search to the detailed primary sources mentioned in the articles on HAARP. You will be able to see what HAARP is, what it does, and why people are afraid of it. You will learn a lot about the history of scientific attempts to control the weather, what we can do, and what we cannot. I found it fascinating and slightly spooky, although not at all in the “government is sending natural disasters to kill us” sense.

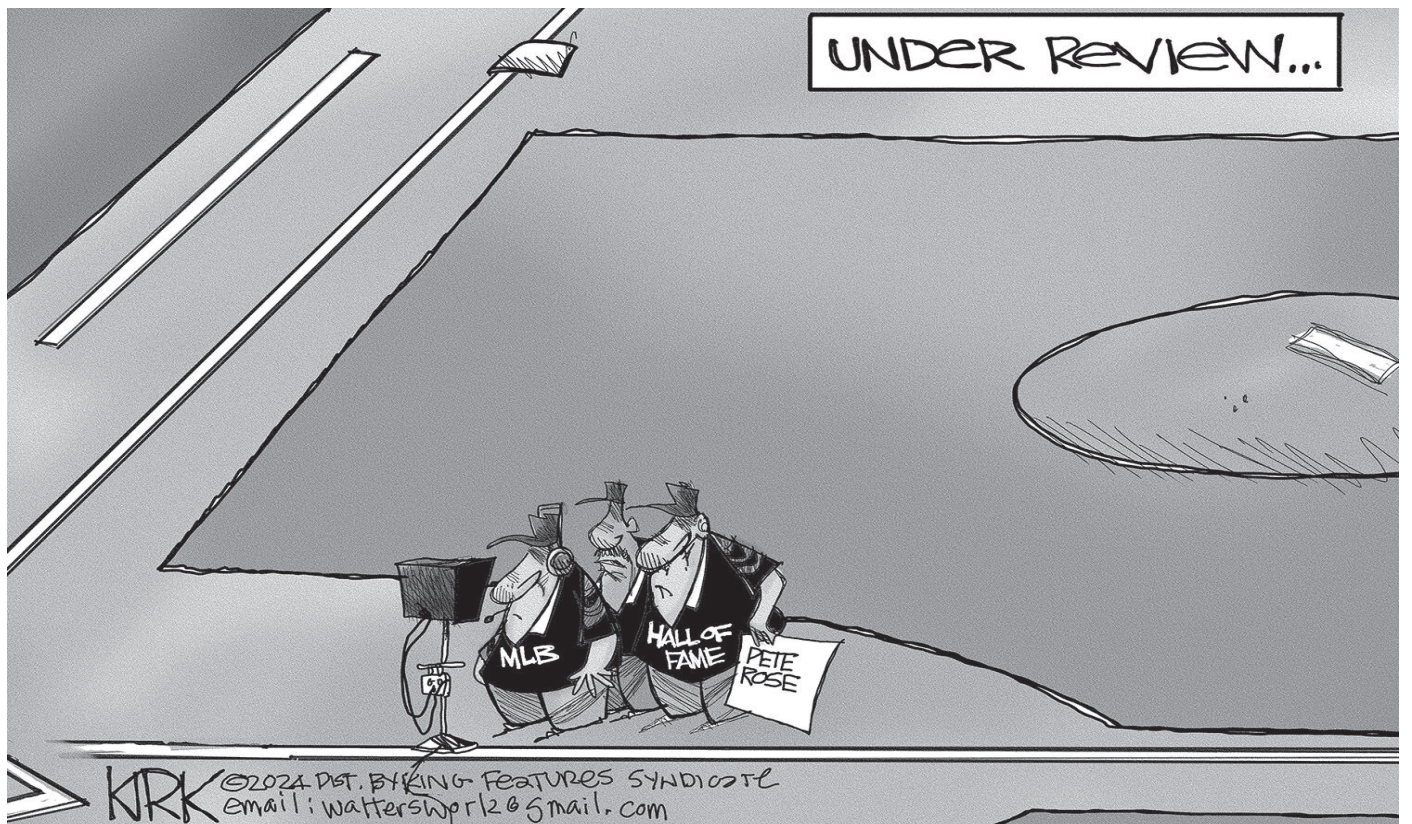
Our distrust of the federal government runs so deep that many of us will believe it's up to anything nefarious, no matter how kooky or improbable the theory may be. Mind control, weather control, lizard people, alien doppelgängers ... the reason we suspect our leaders are capable of these things is because we know they're power-hungry charlatans who would absolutely use those technologies if they were available. But they're not. We can see that by looking around us. Our federal government is criminally incompetent, stupid and wasteful. We cannot have it both ways — either they are evil masterminds with power, or bumbling idiots with power. It is pretty clear to me it's the latter, which is bad enough.

God is the one who controls the weather. Remember that guy? The one who is more powerful than any earthly prince and is in control, no matter how wild things get? Sometimes I think it's simpler and less painful for Americans believe in the conspiracy theories. An evil cabal controlling the world and doling out natural disasters is an easier thing for the mind to reckon with than a good God who somehow also allows things like Helene to happen to his people. So we discard the Problem of Evil and clamp down on a problem that is slightly easier to get our heads around: the government is behind it all. As author G.K. Chesterton famously quipped, “once abolish the God, and the government becomes the God.” It's an idol we both worship and loathe, powerful and terrible, but one that we can hold out hope will be smashed, so we finally see what makes it tick.

The power idols have is given to them only by the people who bow down and worship. They have none of their own. They feed on offerings of rumors and tales, dreams of dominance and unfounded fears. Idols are just as happy to be thought boogymen as benevolent gods, because power is power. The more power people believe you have, the more people you can control.

The government is an idol, not God. It cannot control the weather. Do not let it control you either. Do not buy into conspiracy theories that give it the power it so desperately craves.

Do you really know your nose?

Regardless of age or level of education, sometimes we think we know things only to find out we were wrong or knew only a fraction of the facts. That's what happened last week when I discovered details about the human nose that blew my mind (and my nose). Since we're at the beginning of cold and flu season, I'll share a story that your nose knows, which perhaps you don't.

I owe this revelation to a writer named Sarah Zhang, who wrote an article for The Atlantic about a year ago titled “Everything I Thought I Knew About Nasal Congestion Is Wrong.” I was skeptical when I saw the headline because I didn't think there was much to know about congestion. Your nose is stuffy. You blow it. End of story.

But according to Sarah's article and the experts she interviewed, the nose is so much more complex than that. When I noticed that the subtitle of her article was “You really have two noses,” I knew I needed to sniff out the truth.

I've been a nose owner for five decades, so I as-

sumed I knew how this thing works. And even though I'm not great at math, I was convinced I had precisely one nose. But that's because I was foolishly judging my nose by its cover. It might look singular, but those two nostrils are the entry points for completely separate structures.

You know that tiny piece of the nose located between your nostrils? Think of it like a wall separating two hallways that lead to side-by-side rooms. For various reasons ranging from genetics to injury, sometimes the wall is crooked or curved, and that's okay because, usually, it's harmless. But sometimes the crooked wall partially blocks one of the passageways. That crooked wall is called a “deviated septum.”

Regardless of whether the wall is straight or not, those separate passageways are like twins who

look alike but work different schedules. At any given time, one half of your nose is more open than the other half. Most of us don't notice it, but those nasal twins are trading off on handling the work. The “dominant nostril” switches sides every couple of hours in what doctors call the “nasal cycle.” (When we're sick and hosting gobs of mucus, we can more easily feel which nose twin is open for business and which one is currently a dead end.)

Why do our nose twins operate on this back-and-forth schedule? No one is exactly sure, except for God, who probably has a good reason. Maybe they trade off because the nose has to work around the clock while the other facial organs get to relax. The eyes mostly shut down during sleep, and the mouth often goes slack. But the nose keeps breathing in and out, filtering air, and detecting smells.

Your nose twins are like two bouncers standing in front of a busy nightclub. Sometimes they get irritated because they're dealing with everything trying to get into the club, including dirt, allergens, and viruses. Most of the time, the bouncers kick them out with a sneeze. But oc-

asionally, a troublemaker slips through and inflames the linings inside our twin noses.

When those linings get angry, they swell up like the Incredible Hulk. The more they swell, the more congested we feel. Blowing the nose helps get the extra gunk out, which is great, but it won't help with swelling. That's why decongestants are designed to temporarily reduce swelling inside the nose.

But suppose all the swelling and mucus back up into the sinuses (which are usually pockets filled with air). In that case, you may feel like a solid brick of gunk has formed behind your face, causing pain and (in my experience) chronic crankiness.

We're at the time of year when ragweed gets rowdy and Covid cranks up, so it's important to know what's happening right under your eyes. Your nose twins are partnering in an intricate dance to help you breathe, and breathing — according to 100 percent of doctors — is good. It's as plain as the nose on your face.

Low prices do not always neglect quality

If you have not sampled wines from the Iberian Peninsula, Spain and Portugal, you are missing some very excellent wines that sell for even better prices.

I have often indicated, there are no longer any bad wines being made, only wines that you may not like. Modern technology has lifted winemaking from a hit and miss endeavor to a science. Among the beneficiaries for this change were the wineries of Spain and Portugal.

In the years after World War II, the wines of Iberia tried to fill the gap in the supply of wines affected by the war but unfortunately, their wines were waning.

It did not take long for help to arrive in the form of modern winemaking techniques and improved sanitation. With those in place, their wines took a quantum leap in quality.

Today the Spanish and Portuguese wines are the equal to wines made anywhere in the world. There is one Sword of Damocles that is still hanging over the heads of their wines, price. Wine customers often associate price with quality.

This casted a deep dark shadow on the wines of

Iberia as their economy and cost of living permits their wines to sell at, shall we say, very attractive prices. Please, please, please do not judge quality by price anymore.

I have sampled and enjoyed a Gallo Hearty Burgundy at \$9.99 for a magnum and poured a \$127 bottle of cabernet sauvignon wine from a famous name producer, down the drain, with witnesses to both events.

La Capilla 2019 Crianza (\$24)

This full bodied red wine comes from the Ribera del Duero grape growing district in the north central part of Spain and is made from a grape variety indigenous to that specific region, the Tinta del País.

Going even further, the wine was aged in oak barrels, allowing the wine to pick up the best attributes

of the wood and also soften the wine.

The wine displays a deep, ruby color and an aroma of black fruits, oak and just a hint of pepper and vanilla while the flavor offers blackberries, blueberries with hints of vanilla and spice in the background.

This is an excellent wine and to me, was reminiscent of a fine Cabernet Sauvignon.

Marques de Caceres 2018 Rioja Reserva (\$18.50)

Here is another Spanish wine that is made from mostly tempranillo grapes.

In this example, there is a balsamic background that adds a very interesting extra layer of enjoyment to the flavor of this wine. The finished wine has spent two years aging in oak barrels resulting in a dark wine offering the aromas black fruits, coconut, mocha and oak.

These aromas join the flavor and carry right through to the very long and flavorful finish and is a wine that leaves nothing to be desired and an excellent example of the quality that Spanish wines have achieved.

Marques de Caceres 2020 Crianza (\$15)

This wine was also made from 100% tempranillo grapes from the Rioja district of Spain and displays its traditional dark red color which acts as an introduction to the flavors and aromas of strawberry, raspberry, vanilla and just the right amount of oak.

The Marques de Caceres 2020 Crianza is an excellent ambassador for tempranillo wines and the Crianza style.

Symington 2021 Altano Douro Red (\$14.99)

Here is a wine that has been made from a blend of the most popular of the Portuguese wine grapes; 40% touriga, 30% tinta barroca, 30% tinta roriz.

What resulted is a wine that offers a prominent black fruit flavor and aroma accented by a hint of oak.

To eliminate one question that might arise, this wine is not a sweet port and the only thing that they have that is common is its very dark color courtesy of the indigenous touriga grapes, which in this case have been made as a dry wine to accompany a meal and not for or as a dessert.

for its film photography, had a truck outside the event geared with its newest mammographic technology and the ability for locals to schedule their next mammogram. In addition, many local businesses and sponsors of the WMMC set up booths at the event to answer questions from attendees.

"We've scheduled so many mammograms that we've realized that we need to improve our equipment and efficiency at the Western Missouri Medical Center," Glover said.

Glover said that the hospital will launch its "Empower Through Early Detection" plan in 2025. The plan consists of purchasing two state-of-the-art three-dimensional mammogram machines and a new ultrasound machine to better evaluate those

with dense breast tissue or inconclusive mammogram results.

"The current machines that we have (take around) 25 seconds," Glover said. "The new machine (will take) four seconds. So less pain, improved patient experience and a better image."

The project will cost \$855,000, according to Glover. The hospital will have a fundraising event for the project in January.

Guest speaker Ashley Walls spoke on her breast cancer diagnosis at the age of 29. After a gym workout, she felt her upper body and something didn't feel right. She got a mammogram screening which determined the tumor found in her breast wasn't in the correct location. Six months later and another mammogram screening

later, however, the tumor had doubled in size and Walls was diagnosed with Triple-negative breast cancer in Sept. 2021.

Walls was shocked at the diagnosis that only makes up 50% of all breast cancers.

"I really didn't know anything about it," Walls told the Star-Journal. "I didn't have a family history or any risk factors that would have made me higher on the scale for doctors to watch for."

Over the next few years, Walls went through chemotherapy, radiation, immunotherapy treatments and many surgeries to fight her cancer. Amidst that fight, she gave birth to her now 10-month-old son Cash.

Walls unfortunately may never be considered cancer-free due to spots on her lungs and liver that have

occurred over the past year before Cash's birth. But she is continuing to fight and inspire others.

A math teacher at Blue Springs High School, Walls is using her platform to educate her fellow peers and her students.

"As soon as I got diagnosed, being a teacher, I always wanted to learn," Walls said. "I share that through the young adults having cancer and the children having cancer, both of which being pretty rare."

At the end of the first semester of school, Walls holds a fundraiser where students can shave or cut their hair to raise awareness for children with hair loss. Over the years, the fundraiser has raised several thousands of dollars.

"It kills me to see that you know so many people have been affected by

breast cancer," Walls said. "Breast cancer doesn't discriminate. It can happen at any age, as you can see in my situation. My goal is for people to raise awareness and continue to get their checks, do their self-checks, so that hopefully they can catch it early on if they have anything."

Walls wanted the women in attendance to make sure they were receiving checks yearly. She also encouraged women to be active and have good support behind them.

"My parents were my ultimate caregivers throughout my treatment," Walls said. "My family and friends made sure that I never went to chemo alone, and I've always had somebody there to cheer me on."

She also asked those who don't have breast cancer to continue spreading the

word and raising awareness of the disease that affects one in every eight women in the U.S.

"You don't have to have breast cancer to be able to change the world," Walls said.

WMMC Director of Communications and Development Jennie Snapp thanked those in attendance and presented women who had beat breast cancer with gifts from the hospital.

"I've had the honor of being a part of this event for the last seven years," Snapp said. "Each year, this event has grown and evolved into an evening filled with love, support and commitment to cause."

his life and mission in the stars.

Hernández grew up in Stockton, California, as the youngest of four children. He worked in the fields harvesting crops along with his family.

When he was 10, Hernández watched the last Apollo space mission, Apollo 17, on black and white television in 1972.

"I still remember the reporter Walter Cronkite narrating that moonwalk," Hernández said. "That's when it hit me. I said, 'I want to be an astronaut.'"

A long road awaited Hernández before he could end up in space. But, the road was paved with the help of Hernández's father, who gave him a recipe for success.

"First, determine your purpose in life," Hernández recalled. "Second, recog-

nize how far you are from it. You got to draw yourself a roadmap. You gotta prepare yourself according to the challenge."

Hernández's father pointed to his son's textbooks and said to put his efforts into them. Then after college, make the same effort in Hernández's line of work. Hernández said he added a sixth ingredient to the recipe: perseverance.

"This is what I live by every day," Hernández said.

Using that recipe for success, Hernández graduated from the University of the Pacific in Stockton with a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering. He earned his master's degree in electrical and computer engineering from the University of California, Santa Barbara after receiving a full scholarship to attend.

After college, in 1987, he

accepted a full-time job with Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, working on signal and image processing applications in radar imaging, computed tomography and acoustic imaging.

Later in his career, Hernández worked on developing quantitative X-ray film imaging analysis techniques for the X-ray laser program. Using these techniques, he co-developed the first full-field digital mammography imaging system. This system has proven helpful in detecting breast cancer at an earlier stage than film/screen mammography methods. Hernández won recognition awards for his work on the project.

He has also worked in the international arena, representing Lawrence Livermore and the U.S. Department of Energy on Russian nuclear non-proliferation issues.

But, Hernández's efforts were always aiming for the stars of NASA.

After being denied 11 times previously, Hernández was finally accepted on his 12th attempt in 2004 as a NASA astronaut candidate, joining 10 other candidates as the 19th group of astronauts.

Five years of grueling physical and mental training followed Hernández's acceptance until he was ready to go to space in 2009 as part of the STS-128 mission as the mission's flight engineer.

"They snapped this picture of me smirking face-to-face," Hernández said of a photo during his presentation. "Why am I smirking? Because I know in a few hours, I'm gonna realize a 37-year-old dream of going to space."

Before he left, Hernández took time to answer ques-

tions from the audience, take pictures, and sign copies of his book "Reaching for the Stars The Inspiring Story of a Migrant Farmworker Turned Astronaut" that was on sale outside the auditorium.

Hernández's biographical film "A Million Miles Away" starring Michael Peña as Hernández is available on Amazon Prime Video after being released in 2023.

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Ashcroft, other midwest participate in election security and integrity summit in Nebraska

OMAHA, Neb. — Four secretaries of state and a federal agency director in cybersecurity described their work Wednesday as a line of defense in upholding election integrity and security ahead of the Nov. 5 election.

Nebraska Secretary of State Bob Evnen, in explaining the reason for Wednesday's summit, asked simply, "Why not?" He said the Midwest states of Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri and South Dakota have demonstrated that elections can be safe, smooth and secure.

"Election security is not static. Election security is not a one-and-done deal. Election security is dynamic," Evnen said at the news conference. "If you're going to continue to address these dynamic challenges to elections, then you do so in a dynamic fashion."

The 'imperative' of election confidence

The National Counterterrorism Innovation, Technology and Education Center, or NCITE, headquartered at the University of Nebraska at Omaha, hosted the event.

Evnen's three counterparts from Iowa (Paul Pate), Missouri (Jay Ashcroft) and South Dakota (Monae Johnson) joined the event, which Evnen said he expects to be repeated in future years. Kansas Secretary of State Scott Schwab participated in other summit events, including briefings on NCITE research, but was unable to attend the news conference, officials said.

Pate, who is in his fourth term as Iowa's secretary of state, said he has seen elections evolve and become

"more aggressive" in the past two decades, particularly through technology.

Yet election confidence remains essential, Pate said, and secretaries of state are doing everything they can to uphold integrity and security.

"It's imperative that Americans, and Iowans, have confidence in those election results because the day after the election, if they don't believe that that's their governor or their senator or their president, our Republic has fallen without a single bullet being fired," Pate said. "That's not acceptable, so we're going to continue to be vigilant and do what we can on our front."

Director Jen Easterly of the U.S. Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency, said CISA stands "shoulder to shoulder" with election officials nationwide. She said she has "tremendous confidence" in U.S. elections.

Easterly said CISA was established in 2018 from a previous U.S. Department of Homeland Security agency in part due to foreign attempts to influence the 2016 presidential election and after election infrastructure was designated as "critical" infrastructure.

Security protocols and training

The agency helps state and local election officials to prepare for any threats, including ransomware, physical threats and threats from foreign adversaries (such as Russia, Iran and China). Some of the support the agency provides, Easterly said, are security assessments, hypothetical scenario training and training for de-escalation and anti-active shooter incidents.

"At the end of the day, we know that elections will be safe. They will be secure.

They will be free. They will be fair. But there will be things that go wrong," Easterly said. "The good news is these disruptions, while problematic, will not affect how votes are counted and how votes are cast."

Evnen said some of the ways that Nebraska has partnered with CISA in the past two years have included weekly scans of all 93 Nebraska county election websites for vulnerabilities, giving local officials "gov" emails and website addresses and setting up internal protocols for day-to-day security.

"These are important steps we're taking across Nebraska to ensure that our cyberinfrastructure is protected," Evnen said.

Pate said those steps are national standards as officials "plan for the worst and hope for the best."

Elections for 'we the people'

All five secretaries of state who partnered with NCITE this week are elected Republicans, and Ashcroft said the officials don't serve just Republicans or Democrats or Libertarians or any other third parties in their respective states.

He said if officials do their job well, they are the basketball ref or linesman of a football game who "no one notices."

The secretaries of state and Easterly invited more people to get involved in the election process, such as serving as poll workers or watchers, and for anyone who has questions to ask.

"We run elections for the people of the states," Ashcroft explained. "We run elections for our government because it is how 'we the people' decide that our Republic will move forward."

Ashcroft added that no

matter who wins or loses, or which issues pass or fail, "at the end of the day, the American people can drink their beverage of choice and either celebrate or commiserate, but know that they were a part of the decision, that their votes counted and that the votes made a difference."

The election officials noted that it is typical for "official" results not to be finalized for up to a week after Election Day, but they said that's due in part due to the need to process provisional ballots, as well as conducting the "checks and balances" needed to ensure accurate results, particularly in close races, or possibly hand-count some ballots.

But for the most part, the secretaries of state said of their jurisdictions, most election results are typically available within a few hours of polls closing on Election Day. "I believe in getting quick results out, my colleagues do, but we all believe in getting it right, and we believe in making sure that every American, no matter where Uncle Sam has sent them, has the right to participate in our elections," Ashcroft said, indicating overseas voters.

Johnson, from South Dakota, said the "greatest unease" about the general election is the period between when polls close and when results are finalized. She said officials are workshoping scenarios with public safety teams to ensure that post-election events proceed smoothly and on time.

"Protecting the voting process and its facilitators is a collaborative process, and we have full faith in our state's ability to overcome any disruptions," Johnson said.

NCITE research

Gina Ligon, director of

NCITE at the University of Nebraska at Omaha, said the center, which includes 38 partner universities, is working on four projects, such as tracking threats to election workers through federal charges and possible threats from emerging technologies.

Ligon said the federal charges are the "tip of the iceberg" as federal charges are a "really high bar," while other NCITE research includes threats or violence specifically against election officials in swing states, including Pennsylvania, Arizona and Georgia.

Those states have seen the largest spikes in data in recent years, Ligon said.

That project is extending to Nebraska, partially with the competitiveness of Nebraska's 2nd Congressional District for president. There are currently no federal charges, according to Ligon.

Other research, out of the University of Arkansas, includes interviews of election workers who have faced threats of violence. Initial research has indicated women don't always report when they are victims of violence, Ligon said, and that people don't understand when they cross First Amendment protections from anger to prohibited threats.

"As much as people say this is nothing new — 'we've experienced this for a long time' — our data just doesn't support that," Ligon said.

"It's up to all of us"

As of this time, Easterly said, there have been no specific election threats from terrorists, though she noted federal authorities thwarted the apparent plans of an Oklahoma City man on Tuesday and charged him with allegedly plotting a terrorist attack on Election Day in support of ISIS.

"If there are other things that we are seeing from the terrorist landscape, we will ensure that election officials are apprised of that immediately," Easterly said.

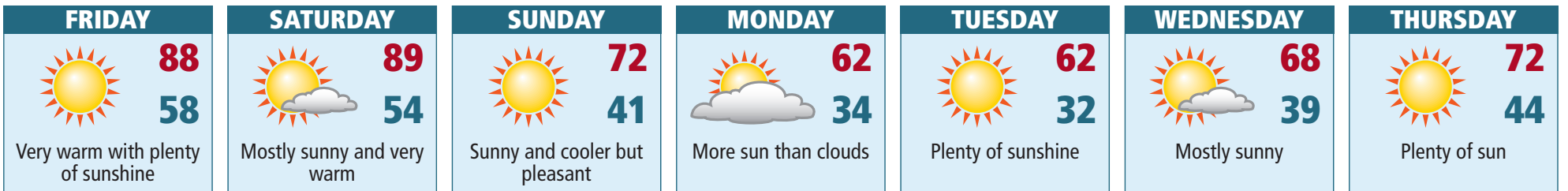
Easterly said the period between Election Day on Nov. 5 and the presidential inauguration on Jan. 20 will be critical. She said foreign adversaries will try to create a "wedge" and attempt to "shred our institutions" or sow discord as each milestone of certification and validation passes.

"That's why it's up to all of us as Americans — as the secretary [Ashcroft] said, 'We the people' — these elections are for us," Easterly said. "It's up to all of us to do our part in protecting and preserving our democracy."

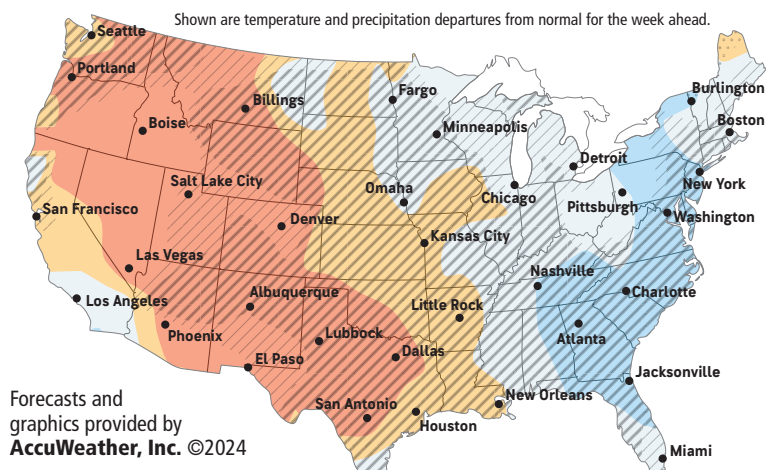
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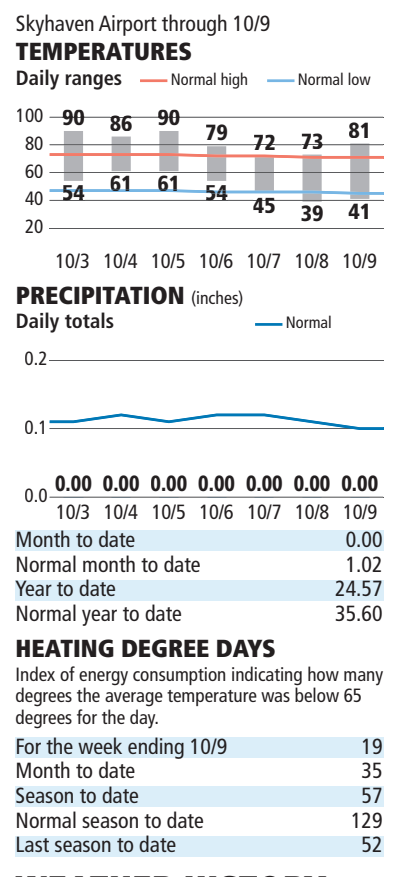

MOON PHASES

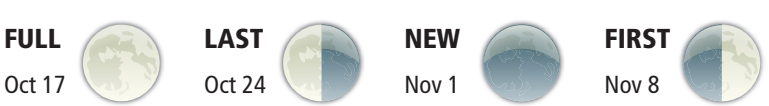

Missourians to vote on paid sick leave and minimum wage hike next month

A measure that would guarantee paid sick leave for over 700,000 Missouri workers who currently lack it, as well as gradually raise the minimum wage to \$15, will appear on voters' ballots next month.

The ballot initiative, called Proposition A, has been backed by various unions and workers' advocacy groups, social justice and civil rights organizations, over 500 state business owners and others.

Some business groups, including the state Chamber of Commerce, have opposed it, especially the guaranteed sick leave portion. But thus far there hasn't been a coordinated opposition campaign.

The campaign in favor of the measure, called Missourians for Healthy Families and Fair Wages, has raised over \$5 million — including from out-of-state groups that don't disclose their donors— and collected 210,000 signatures to have the issue placed on the statewide ballot.

Most expect the ballot measure to succeed, given polling, national trends with similar ballot measures and the lack of coordinated opposition. Missourians have approved minimum wage increases on the ballot twice before by wide margins.

"We believe full-time work deserves better than poverty," said Richard Von Glahn, campaign manager for Missourians for Healthy Families and Fair Wages, "but current minimum wage — that's what it leads to."

The current minimum wage in Missouri is \$12.30, which is equivalent to \$492 per week, before taxes.

And without sick leave, proponents argue, workers have to choose between their financial and physical wellbeing — going into work sick or losing out on a needed paycheck.

"Everybody gets sick. Everybody has a child or someone they care for that gets sick," Von Glahn said, "But when there's an unequal ability to care for yourself or care for

your family, that is unjust."

Businesses would be required to provide one hour of paid sick time for every 30 hours worked, up to five days per year for small businesses and seven days per year for larger businesses. Small businesses are those with fewer than 15 employees.

Some business groups have said the proposal constitutes government overreach in what should be the decisions of business owners.

"A business owner's ability to set their own workplace policies and procedures is really the bedrock on which our free enterprise system is built," said Kara Corches, interim president and CEO of the Missouri Chamber of Commerce and Industry. "So this is creating a new mandate for employers in terms of wage as well as paid leave policy, that is really against that principle of 'let business decide.'"

"...We want to make sure that Missouri is the most business friendly state in the nation, and we don't think that this proposition is sending that message," Corches added.

Sick Leave

The ballot measure would make sick leave guaranteed for 728,000 workers who currently lack it statewide, or over 1 in 3 Missouri workers, according to an analysis from the progressive nonprofit the Missouri Budget Project.

Many of those who lack paid sick leave are the lowest earners.

"Sick days are very common amongst the highest paid workers, you know, executives, those types of positions," Von Glahn said, "but particularly in some of the lower wage industries — the industries that we've been calling essential for a number of years now — construction, retail, food service, nursing home, childcare workers, they lack access to this."

Employees would be allowed to take the time for mental or physical illness, to take care of a family member, or due to a domestic violence situation,

according to the proposition.

Employers could require documentation when a worker takes three or more days off in a row, such as a doctor's note, but wouldn't be allowed to require disclosure of detailed health information.

Corches said the paid sick leave part of the measure is what "gives us a little more heartburn, just because it's so nebulous," and open to interpretation. She pointed specifically to confusion around provisions that would give employees a civil cause of action to sue if employers break the law, and another provision that prohibits employers from retaliation when workers take leave.

"Business owners have enough on their plates, just trying to, you know, keep their businesses open, retain and recruit employees, and this nine page new proposition is very complicated and is going to make compliance quite challenging," Corches said.

If the measure passes in Missouri, the paid sick time provision will kick in on May 1, 2025.

Ray McCarty, CEO of Associated Industries of Missouri, a business advocacy organization, raised concerns that "you will have people that abuse the system," meaning those who take sick leave who don't qualify. McCarty said in some cases employers may need proof of the legitimate absence earlier than three days in, or need to ask for more detailed information.

Missouri would join 15 states that require employers to provide paid sick leave. The United States, unlike nearly every other country, lacks federal paid sick leave, so states, as well as cities, have taken the lead.

In states that have adopted sick leave mandates, employees take, on average, two more sick days a year than prior to the law going into effect, a National Bureau of Economic Research report found.

Studies have found that offering paid sick time can increase workers' productivity and reduce illness, and generally adds little or nothing to business

expenses.

Nebraska and Alaska also have paid sick leave on the ballot this year.

Minimum wage

The ballot measure also would raise the state's minimum wage to \$13.75 next year and \$15 in Jan. 2026.

The increase would affect over 562,000 workers in the state, according to the Missouri Budget Project, or nearly one in every four workers. The minimum wage would be adjusted based on inflation every year after 2026.

McCarty said most members in Associated Industries of Missouri already pay at least \$15 hourly, though they may not realize the "whole wage scale will slide up," meaning raising the minimum wage could have spillover effects on other wages, for businesses to remain competitive.

He said some employers could go over to Kansas and pay less, so may choose to be based in neighboring states.

The states neighboring Missouri already have lower minimum wages, except for Illinois, which is \$14 per hour.

A coalition of hundreds of businesspeople in the state have signed on to support the ballot measure, arguing the policies help their bottom line, causing lower employee turnover, increased productivity and better health and safety conditions.

Ballot initiatives to raise the minimum wage are generally likely to succeed, and have previously succeeded in Missouri, amidst legislative inaction or opposition.

Voters approved a minimum-wage hike in 2006, with 75% of the vote, and again in 2018, with 62% of the vote.

Advocates have had success with ballot measures as, for years, Republicans in the legislature have voted against or failed to hear proposals to increase the minimum wage, Von Glahn said. In 2017 the legislature passed a law prohibiting cities from raising the minimum wage beyond that of

the state's, after St. Louis city passed an ordinance to raise the city's minimum wage.

The federal minimum wage has been stagnant, at \$7.25, since 2009. Thirty states, including Missouri, have a minimum wage higher than the federal one.

'Confident it will pass'

Missourians for Healthy Families and Fair Wages has so far raised over \$5 million, according to campaign filings.

That includes two \$1.2 million donations from the D.C.-based Sixteen Thirty Fund, in August and October, a progressive nonprofit that is not required to disclose its donors. Other large donors include Missouri Jobs with Justice Voter Action and the D.C.-based The Fairness Project.

The campaign has purchased over \$1.4 million in television ads, slated to begin airing next week, according to Federal Communications Commission filings.

The ballot measure would change the state law but not the constitution, meaning the legislature could overturn it, but that is unlikely, McCarty said.

"I don't see any politician in their right mind — if this passes with a high percentage of votes, which we expect it will — I don't see any politician in their right mind completely repealing the entire law," he said, citing potential concerns about overturning the will of voters.

Corches said the Chamber is focused on the election and would only "start looking at, is it possible to modify this in the Capitol" if it passes.

Von Glahn said Prop A will be a test of whether or not the legislature "respects the will of voters."

The St. Louis University/YouGov poll conducted in August found the ballot measure had a strong backing, with 57% of those surveyed supporting it.

"We feel confident that it will pass next month, but we're also doing the work," Von Glahn said. "I mean, we've got people out canvassing every day, talking to voters about it."

Company recalls nearly 10 million pounds of meat and poultry dishes for listeria contamination

A company is recalling nearly 10 million pounds of meat and poultry products made at an Oklahoma plant because they may be contaminated with listeria bacteria that can cause illness and death.

BrucePac of Wood-

burn, Oregon, recalled the roughly 5,000 tons of ready-to-eat foods this week after U.S. Agriculture Department officials detected listeria in samples of poultry during routine testing. Further tests identified BrucePac chicken as the source. The recall includes 75 meat and chicken products.

The foods include products like grilled chicken breast strips that were made at the company's facility in Durant, Oklahoma. They were produced between June 19 and Oct. 8 and shipped to restaurants, food service vendors and other sites nationwide, government officials said.

The products have

a best-by date of June 19, 2025 to Oct. 8, 2025. Officials said they are concerned that the foods may still be available for use or stored in refrigerators or freezers. The products should be thrown away, they added.


There are no confirmed reports of illness linked to the recall.

Eating foods contaminated with listeria can cause potentially serious illness. About 1,600 people are infected with listeria bacteria each year in the U.S. and about 260 die, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Listeria infections typically cause fever,


muscle aches and tiredness and may cause stiff neck, confusion, loss of balance and convulsions. Symptoms can occur quickly or to up to 10 weeks after eating contaminated food. The infections are especially dangerous for older people, those with weakened immune systems or who are pregnant.

contributing minutes, while sophomore Rylee Vierthaler played some.

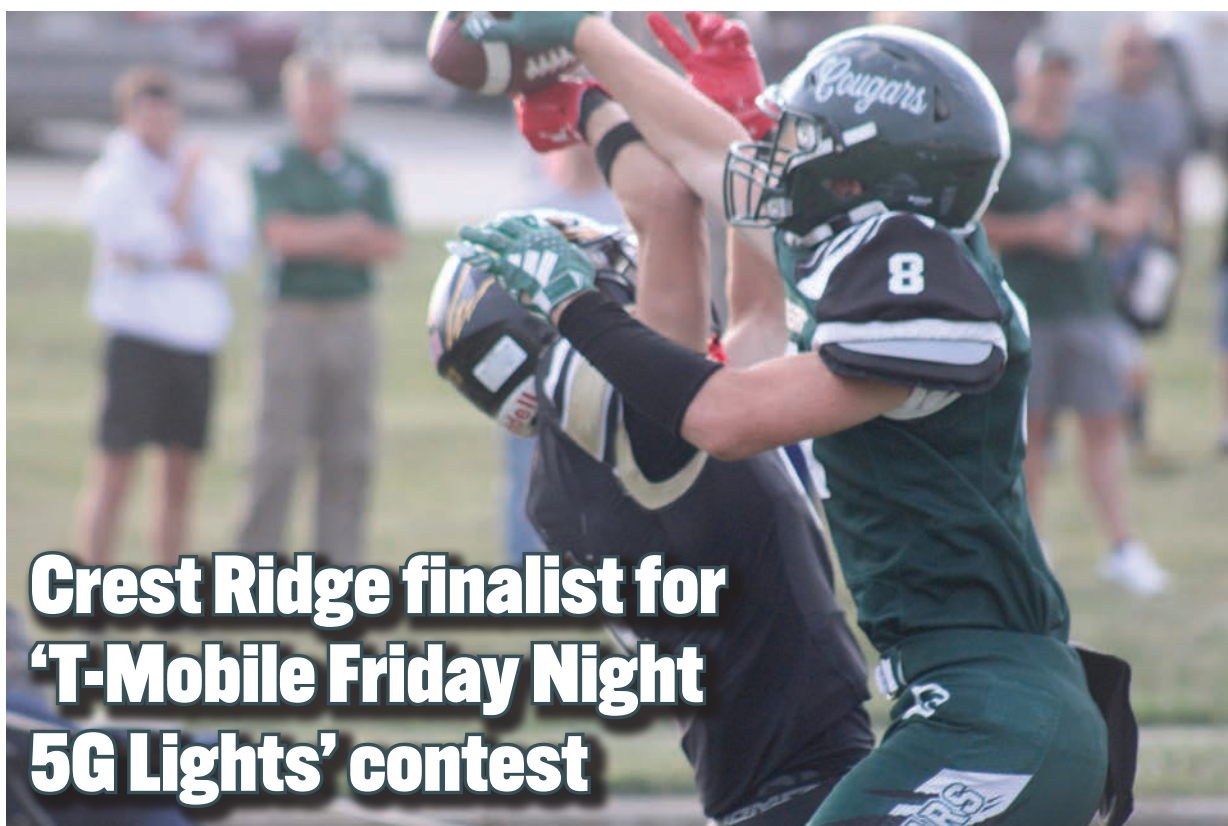

All games are within a hour's drive, however, with three out of the four teams continuing their conference schedules.

Following back-to-back down to the wire contests, Warrensburg will have the chance to catch its breath against a Center team that has been shutout in three consecutive games.

Knob Noster plays Richmond (4-2, 1-1 MRVC East) and Holden (3-3, 1-1 MRVC East) in the final two weeks of the regular season while Lafayette County plays Lexington (1-5, 0-2 MRVC East) and Carrollton (4-2, 0-2 MRVC East).

Senior running back Sam Livingston leads the Panthers on the ground, running for 108.3 yards per game. He's tallied 13 rushing touchdowns

this season. Add a return for a touchdown, he's visited the endzone 14 times in 2024.

Knob Noster had two takeaways last week, continuing its string of games with at least one.

The Panthers are taking on a Lafayette County team that fell a touchdown short of undefeated Warsaw in week three.

The Huskers trailed Holden after a half last week, but went on to win 42-21.

Lafayette County is averaging 45.3 points per game while limiting its opponents to 19.5. Knob Noster is averaging 42.8 points per game, while limiting its opponents to 9.8.

Holden (3-3, 1-1 MRVC East) at Richmond (4-2, 1-1 MRVC East), 7 p.m.

Holden will look to bounce back from last week's loss to Lafayette County against Richmond.

On paper, the Eagles handled the Huskies much better than the Spartans.

Holden's key to frustrating Higginsville began with an early blocked kick by senior Jacob Andes.

University of Central Missouri Mules Baseball Assistant Coach and Recruiting Coordinator Alex Backhaus has been named the 2024 American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA)/Marines NCAA Division II National Assistant Coach of the Year, it was announced Wednesday, Oct. 9, by the ABCA.

Backhaus, who is in his eighth season as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for the Mules, helped lead the Mules to the MIAA Regular Season and NCAA Division II Central Regional Championships in 2024 as UCM compiled an overall record of 52-10 and a MIAA mark of 29-4. Central Missouri advanced to the College World Series for the 20th time in program history.

UCM hit a single-season re-

cord 126 homers and 38 triples and stole a season-record 197 bases. The 38 triples, 126 home runs and 197 stolen bases are also MIAA records. In addition, Central Missouri compiled program and MIAA single season records for RBIs (605), runs (662) and total bases (1,344).

Outfielder Brennen van Breusegen was named the MIAA Player of the Year and was a consensus First Team All-American while fellow outfielder Carter Young and pitcher Conner Wolf also earned All-America accolades from various Division II baseball organizations. In addition, Wolf was the MIAA and D2CCA Central Region Pitcher of the Year.

Van Breusegen, Young and designated hitter Vance Tobol all

earned College Sports Communicators Academic All-American honors for their successes both on the field and in the classroom.

In Backhaus's eight seasons with UCM, Central Missouri has won six MIAA Championships and three NCAA-II Central Region Titles, and advanced to the College World Series three times, including a runner-up finish in 2021.

Backhaus graduated from William Jewell in 2012 with a degree in Physical Education and earned his master's in education intervention from Ottawa in 2014.

Alex and his wife, Jaimie, were married in 2015 and have a son, Ty, and daughter, Mae, as well as two dogs, Lebowski and Elphie. Backhaus's dog, Lebows-

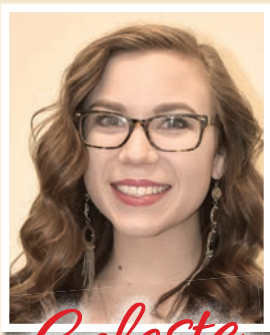

What are your qualifications?

Brattin: As a Christian and a conservative, I believe that our values and our fundamental rights must be protected, and I won't back down. As a small business owner, I know that big government gets in the way of our economy, and I have worked to keep government smaller and reduce the tax burden.

James: I have served my community since I was a kid. Boy Scout Senior Patrol leader, Scoutmaster, US Army Master Sergeant (21 years), Volunteer Firefighter (10 years) , 911 Dispatch Center Board Member, an Environmental Public Health Specialist for Johnson County and currently volunteering with our homeless population. Recently Widowed, after 39 years, I have the time to do the job as my three stepdaughters are grown as are my grandson and granddaughter. I have lived, worked and observed governments in several countries and states. Seen what can work and what can happen when politicians put themselves before the people they serve. I have a deep sense of duty and think everyone should do their part in making our community better for all of our citizens.

Do you support Amendment 2, which would legalize sports betting in the state of Missouri? Why or why not?

Brattin: I'm personally opposed to gambling, but I also believe it is up to the individual. I oppose Amendment 2 because it should be passed through the legislative process and placed into state law, instead of being potentially placed in our state constitution through the initiative petition process.

James: I support it as I do not think the government should limit your personal freedom. If you want to read a book, read it. If not, put it back on the shelf. If you want to attend a Church or a Pride Festival, attend. If not, don't. I don't think it will result in any more money for schools. The GOP has in the past offset money coming from gambling. The gambling tax does go to the

school. However, if the school got one dollar from the state, the state then gives .90 cents + .10 cents from gambling. It is how the GOP has been able to give tax breaks to their wealthy donors diverting money that had been going to schools from the general fund. I will try and not allow a decrease in state support and schools get more money as a result of having gambling.

Do you support Amendment 3, which would establish a right for individuals to make decisions about reproductive health care, including abortion and contraceptives without governmental interference? Why or why not?

Brattin: I oppose Amendment 3 and truly hope that this misleading measure is rejected by the people of Missouri. Not only would it legalize abortion at any stage of development, it would also potentially undo legislation passed last year that protects minors from the life-changing impacts of radical gender reassignment procedures.

James: I think people should control their own bodies and make their own medical decisions based on what is best for them and their family, not the Government. Religions that believe life begins at conception should follow their religion and allow other religious believers who believe that life begins with the first breath to follow their religion. Forcing a 10 or 12 year old rape victim to try and carry to term is almost certainly insuring she will lose her future fertility, if not her life, and makes no sense to most people. Abortion bans have resulted in women's deaths as physicians wait until there is a medical emergency, as required by law, to perform an abortion. A woman may choose to try bedrest and wait to see if she can "hold on " and deliver in a couple weeks but that decision, and the risk, is hers not the Government's.

Do you support Amendment 7, which would make the Missouri Constitution consistent with state law by only allowing United State citizens to vote, limit

registered voters to a single vote and require the winner of a political party primary to be the single candidate at a general election? Why or why not?

Brattin: I fully support Amendment 7, which will protect the integrity of our elections and prevent liberal activists from forcing "ranked-choice voting" - a voting system that favors radical leftist candidates - on people across our state.

James: It is illegal for noncitizens to vote. The wording on this bill is Ballot Candy and has nothing to do with the intent of the bill. Added, in my opinion, in a dishonest way to get voters to vote for the measure. Rank Choice voting should be an option for citizens of cities, school districts and other governmental districts to adopt if the voters in that district see fit to adopt. If the voters want it they should be able to do it.

Do you support Proposition A, which would increase minimum wage to \$13.75 per hour, increasing \$1.25 per hour each year until 2026? Why or why not? Editor's note: The question also asks voters to approve sick leave. The item was unintentionally not included in the questionnaire to candidates.

Brattin: I oppose Proposition A. Artificially inflating wages will hurt small mom-and-pop businesses while making inflation worse.

James: As a Environmental Health Specialist / Health Inspector I support the Sick Leave that is in this Proposition that is not mentioned in the question. Food service workers are supposed to not work when sick but many do not have sick leave. When rent is due next week and you do not have sick leave you tend to start thinking you are not that sick. You will be extra careful and wash your hands more often and it will be OK. It is not OK to work while sick. If you do not want food service workers working while sick, especially diarrhea, they need sick leave. I will be voting for it.

Do you support limiting social media usage for minors through

the form of state legislation?

Why or why not?

Brattin: While I personally limit my children's usage of social media, it is not the government's place to tell families what decisions they should make. I believe that parents should play an active role in shaping their children's lives without being subjected to government mandates.

James: I do not support this. Parents need to Parents. Supervise your child while online. I do support voluntary efforts by social media companies to restrict some sites/content to adults only. You show an ID when entering a bar, you should also have to prove your age if a social media company asks for it.

How can Missouri improve the quality of mental health resources for its citizens?

Brattin: Missouri has a number of mental health resources available for citizens, and the best way to improve them is to ensure funding is not being spent on bureaucratic overhead but invested in programs that provide the care that Missourians need.

James: We could stop the hate and vitriol towards the "others". Legislators Protesting at Pride Events, talking about how normal human relationships are an abomination and people are going to hell are harmful to many families. That is the easy, cheap thing we can do right now to stop a lot of bullying and the resulting suicides. Othering people based on religion, ancestry, skin color or gender makes no sense in 2024 and frankly it never did.

Access to care, online and in person, our medical insurance programs have to allow access to mental health professionals. We can fund Medicaid programs for mental health and seek federal funds to improve our programs.

How would you change funding for K-12 and higher education?

Brattin: I believe strongly that parents should be able to choose educational options that are the best fit for their children, and I would like to see true school choice available for every child across our state. Funding for K-12 education should follow the

child, not be doled out by formula. For higher education, I would like to see a focus on funding programs that prepare young Missourians for the working world and for jobs of the future. Schools that do not serve their students well should receive funding cuts, as should schools that prioritize fancy new buildings over quality instruction.

James: I would look at the funding formula. I hear the GOP controlled House and Senate say that our schools are fully funded according to the formula yet the school boards say they need additional funds. We need state funds for transportation and an increase in funding to schools. I would look at the large tax breaks given to the wealthy in the last 10 years and reverse them as Trickle Down does not work as Daddy Bush said it is Voodoo. I would not fund vouchers in any form, public funds are for public schools only.

How can Missouri combat fentanyl trafficking?

Brattin: We have to put an end to the soft-on-crime prosecutions in our state's largest cities. Criminals will keep bringing drugs into our state if we keep putting them right back out on the street with little more than a slap on the wrist. In addition, I believe that our state should keep looking for opportunities to enforce immigration laws that our federal government has been ignoring. Much of the fentanyl coming into Missouri is coming through the southern border, and putting a stop to illegal immigration will help stop the flow of illegal drugs and other smuggling.

James: Education on the dangers of buying medications from online sellers. Education on the dangers of illegal drugs that are often spiked with fentanyl stressing the safe and legal use of Marijuana instead. We need dedicated task forces of Federal, State and local police to find and prosecute traffickers.

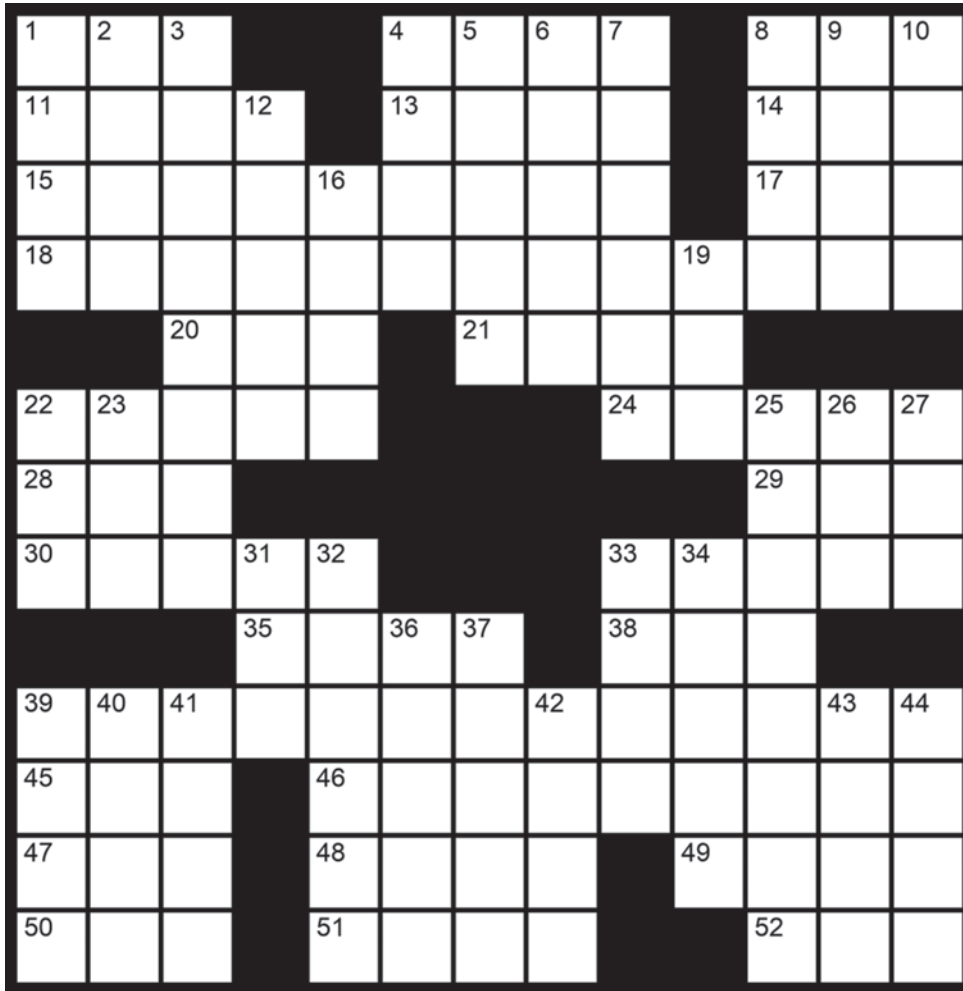
