#### Navy veteran Thomas Gage proud of service on aircraft carriers

avy veteran Thomas
Gage lives in Ionia, but
grew up in Alamogordo, New Mexico
After graduating
high school in 1975, he decided to
follow his brother's footsteps and
enlist in the military.

"My brother did it first," Gage said. "I wasn't real crazy about the other branches of service, so the Navy took me and I went. I started out as an Aviation Boatswain's handler; I handled the aircraft on the flight deck."

Gage worked on aircraft carriers, and it was his job to make sure planes were transported safely from place to place.

"I was Tractor King, I was the lead for all the tractor drivers," Gage said. "We were the ones that moved all the aircraft up on the flight deck. I did that for two years before I got out of the Navy in '79."

Gage served on both the USS Forrestal and USS Carl Vincent carriers over his 20 year career.

"It's a floating city, it's all self-

contained; we make our own water, we make our own power, the only thing we don't do is grow our own food," Gage said. "We load up and can carry enough supplies to get us through at least six months."

Only stopping for food occasionally, the ships could remain at sea for months.

"The only fuel that the nuclear carriers take on is flight fuel," Gage said. "They don't take on fuel for the for the boat because it's all nuclear power."

After his first four years in the Navy, Gage decided to try civilian life.

"I got out for nine months and said working in the oil field's too much like work and went back in," Gage said. "That was 1980, I finished out my career, did 20 years altogether."

Gage returned to the service an Aviation Structural Mechanic and worked on structures and hydraulics of the aircraft.

"I did a lot more because I got qualified." Gage said. "I also had a brief time down in the arresting gear." Gage said. "But I didn't like the grease."



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Gage worked on the cable system used to stop landing aircraft.

"I caught the first F-14 that landed on the USS Forrestal," Gage said. "The arresting gear is just under the flight deck. It's big and it weaves the cable up to the flight deck. I ran the hydraulic side of it below decks."

The work took a team of qualified men to load and reset the arrestor after each launch and landing.

"I set the tension on it, the guy up on the flight deck that's watching everything from the catwalk he's the one that actually does the braking," Gage said. "Then down the end you've got a guy we call the hook runner, he makes sure that the cable comes off the hook, the cable comes back, and we do it all over again."

Gage said the Navy gave him opportunities he never imagined back in New Mexico.

"If you don't know what you want to do, the military is the way to go because you can learn a lot and not pay a dime," Gage said. "They'll send you to school, they'll train you, it's a great experience and it can make a man and a woman out of you."

The experience is waiting, it just takes

the right person to take advantage of the opportunity.

"It's all what you make of it," Gage said.
"It can be tough, long hours, but things
on the newer carriers are a lot better. You
have good camaraderie, everybody knows
when you pull away from port that the survival of everybody on the boat depends on
camaraderie, the crew working together
and just doing your job."


Gage gained confidence in his abilities and found his place in a carrier with over 5,000 other crew.

"I'm proud of the service that I performed," Gage said. "I was kind of one step ahead and one step behind being in conflicts, but I support our men and women that are are in the military, I worked with a lot of them out of Whiteman, I worked with a lot of them over in Afghanistan because I was a contractor over there."

Gage's brother, Fred, also had a distinguished career and put 29 years into the service. Gage also has a son-in-law in a tanker squadron.

He loves spending time with his wife Deborah, playing with his grandkids and riding his Harley.

## Retired Marine Corps Major John Schwent helps veterans find purpose after their service

ohn Schwent admits that, like many teens about to graduate from high school, he didn't know where his life was going.
Growing up in Arkansas with his single mother to rely on, he wanted a sense of direction and belonging.

All signs from his family tree pointed him toward serving for his country.

"My grandfather was a World War II veteran in the Navy and I had uncles in (the) Vietnam (War)," Schwent said. "We were a very patriotic family."

Schwent's turning point was after a chat with his cousin, who was four years into his service in the Marine Corps and had returned home on leave.

"(He said) training with a bunch of other Marines was tough. I'm an athletic guy, so I excelled when being challenged," Schwent said. "He convinced me that the Marines were the best, and I wanted to be part of the best."

Schwent was 17 when he signed up for the Marine Corps in 1986 and headed off to San Diego for boot camp. Afterward, he was shipped off to Jacksonville, North Carolina, the home of the 246-square-mile Camp Lejeune.

"I spent about six years in North Carolina, end up deploying on a warship in 1990 and also the USS Saipan," Schwent said. "(We) ended up getting called out of the Mediterranean (Sea) to go take part in what would be called Operation Sharp Edge in Monrovia, Liberia."

As the First Liberian Civil War broke out in Dec. 1989, U.S. diplomats and citizens were refused exit from the country through the U.S. Embassy. The U.S. Navy and Marines were tasked with Operation Sharp Edge, a noncombatant evacuation of the embassy. The 22nd and 26th Marine Expeditionary Units evacuated personnel and were supported by the USS Saipan, Schwent, and other U.S. ships.

The evacuation was completed in Jan. 1991, and almost 2,500 people were safely evacuated out of Liberia.

Schwent returned to the U.S. from that deployment for independent duty at a Marine Corps reserve duty station in Alabama. However, three days after checking in, his unit was mobilized to California in support of Operation Desert Shield.

"We were going to get a five-week desert package before we took our artillery unit overseas," Schwent said.

Schwent's unit was not sent to Iraq to help in Operation Desert Shield and Operation Desert Storm. Instead, they returned to Alabama, where Schwent decided to pursue the college education he had missed when he joined the Corps.





"While in Alabama, where I had been three years there, I submitted some paperwork to be to become an officer. It was the Marine Corps Enlisted Commissioning Education Program (MECEP)," Schwent said.

MECEP students like Schwent were allowed to attend a four-year college full-time while maintaining activeduty status. Schwent chose the University of Memphis for his bach-

elor's degree in finance and graduated in 1996.

"By the time I graduated from college, and I got commissioned as the second lieutenant, and I'd been in about 11 years at that point, and (soon) I was a staff sergeant."

Schwent was 28 at the time he became a staff sergeant. He retained his role as a Marine Corps officer for 12 years, working as Deputy Director of the Marine Corps Total Force Systems and remaining active in marksmanship as the officer in charge of the Kansas City Marine shooting team.

He also earned a master's degree in business administration from Webster University in 2002 and a master of science degree in information systems from Naval Postgraduate School in 2003.

Schwent retired as a Major in Dec. 2008 at his last station at Richards-



Liking his surroundings, Schwent decided to stick around and live in Missouri.

Gebaur in Kansas City.

"I loved a small town," Schwent said.
"I've been in San Diego, Chicago, Atlanta, and Dallas, (but) I'm attracted to just a smaller, more rural area and I love the outdoors, hunting, fishing, hiking, camping and you have all of that stuff here."

After retiring from the Marines Corps,

Schwent's adventures never seemed to stop.

In 2009, he became the Chief Executive Officer of Iron County Hospital (now Iron County Medical Center) in Pilot Knob.

"The hospital was failing and it was recommended that I give it a shot," Schwent said. "You know, I'm not a hospital guy, but it just comes down to leadership."

Putting his degrees and past leadership experiences to the test, Schwent helped get the hospital back on its feet before he retired from the position in 2012.

"It was a four-and-a-half-year-old hospital, (but during those) four and a half years, it only had four profitable months," Schwent said. "I came in and revamped everything, and we went 27 consecutive months in the black and the hospital became stable." Schwent served as head coach of the Marine Corps Wounded Warrior Shooting Team which won 65 medals over four Warrior Games, a Para-Olympic competition for all military services, from 2010 through 2014. He has also served as the head coach of the Special Operations Command (SOCOM) Wounded Warrior Shooting Team since 2016.

However, throughout all his successes, Schwent's pièce de résistance was the creation of Camp Valor Outdoors.

Beginning in 2013, Camp Valor Outdoors in Kingsville, serves as a getaway for wounded and disabled veterans and veterans with PTSD.

Through outdoor activities like art, beekeeping, hunting and competitive shooting, retired veterans—both young and old—can share their service experiences with like-minded individuals, compete in friendly competitions, and find peace of mind.

"It's saving lives and changing lives, both the combination of active duty and veterans who participate," Schwent said. "Seeing how adaptive sports and the outdoors had such an impact on their lives, that was kind of what was going through my mind when I started up Camp Valor Outdoors."

Schwent, a 23-year Marine Corps veteran, saw the firsthand effects of being a serviceman occur with his fellow Marines, some of whom he has lost to suicide.

This experience motivated him to lead a hospital, to coach the Wounded Warrior Shooting Team, and ultimately to start Camp Valor Outdoors.

"It's very fulfilling to see these warriors come through our program and be hesitant to open up and be standoffish and to see how once they get together they realize, 'I'm not different here. They're just like me. I'm not alone,'" Schwent said. "Oftentimes, they're not getting what they need at the (Veteran's Affairs office), but because we're veterans, they tell you they're so thankful for providing this opportunity."

Camp Valor Outdoors is a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization with programs for retired veterans that include shooting sports, fishing events and its newly established honeybee program that produced 650 pounds of honey last year, with all sales being reused to buy equipment to produce more.

The organization is also building tiny homes for homeless veterans in Kingsville. It is aiming to build 10 completed homes along with a community center fit with washers, dryers and desktop computers.

"I'm the one receiving the gift of joy when I see the difference in their lives and the smiles on their faces," Schwent said. "I could tell you stories about what these guys have shared. They were suicidal, and they were just waiting to get here. The only thing that held them was the knowledge that they had an event to attend with other people like them, and that was what they held on to hope for."
