Tractors are being loaded on trailers and soon the exhibit hall will be filled with all manner of equipment designed to make agriculture easier and more cost effective.

"This year's Ag Expo will be Friday, Feb. 7 from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturday, Feb. 8 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.," Ag Expo chairman Kevin Daniel told the Democrat. "There are a lot of vendors of wanting to show their products and they spend a lot of time getting them here and on display."

"There's always a variety out there, of all kinds of different products and services," Daniel said. "This is just the part of our fundraiser each year that we give back to scholarships. 100% of our funds are reserved for scholarships and promoting youth in agriculture."

"There's a lot of activity that's not just geared for agriculture," Daniel said. "There's something there for everybody, there's a lot going on. A lot of the area businesses and people are always here to support us, and they have been supporting us for a number of years."

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

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



Karli Smith, of Houstonia, was honored in May 2024 with agriculture scholarships that will help her achieve a degree in agribusiness management at the University of Missouri-Columbia.

Smith, a freshman at MU, is the daughter of Arron and Casey Smith. She received \$10,000 from the Central Missouri Ag Club, the Billie Ficken Memorial scholarship through the Ag Club, and the Dennis Klenke Memorial through the Ag Club and American Farmers Association (AFA).

Smith graduated from Northwest High School in 2024. She was also selected to go to an AFA seminar in In November 2024.

Smith said she became interested in agriculture because she grew up on a cattle farm.

"Growing up, we had a small little cattle farm out in the country," Smith said. "So, we were always involved with that. So, I think being involved with that so young is what sparked my love for it growing up. I was always very involved with FFA. That just grew the flame a little more. That's when I decided that I wanted to keep agriculture in

my life for the entirety of it. So, that's why I'm going to Mizzou to get an agbusiness degree."

While attending high school, Smith was a Pettis County R-V FFA member. She added that she was surprised to learn she received the scholarships at graduation.

"I went into the interview, and it was a little scary if I'm being honest," Smith said. "But I was surprised, but I was also very grateful because going to a big university is kind of intimidating. All the bills and stuff were piling up when I was looking at it all, and I was like, oh my goodness. But receiving that scholarship made me very grateful for this community and all the people in it."

When Smith was in her early teens,

she showed her horse for the Missouri State Fair at the 4-H and FFA competitions held in the summer before the Fair begins in August. She has also shown hams and bacon at the MSF.

Once she receives her degree, Smith plans to go into sales, but she wants to remain local and stay based in her hometown.

Smith shared some advice for other youth seeking a career in Ag.

"I would say to just do it," Smith said.
"Because there's so much that agriculture can give you. And I've already met so many amazing people in the one semester that I've had at Mizzou. So, I would say, just go for it."

# Ag student Shelby Dotson says growth involves risk

Living on a family generational farm is one reason Shelby Dotson, Sedalia, enjoys agriculture.

Due to her love for agriculture, Dotson also received scholarships in 2024, which will help her obtain a degree in an agriculture-related field.

Dotson, a freshman at the University of Missouri-Columbia, is the daughter of Allen and Autry Dotson, who own a 300-acre crop and cattle farm in Pettis County.

She received \$5,000 from the American Farmers Association and the Central Missouri Ag Club in May 2024. Dotson was also selected to go to an AFA seminar in November 2024.

Dotson graduated from Northwest High School in Hughesville in 2024 and is pursuing a major in agribusiness management and a minor in accounting and animal science.

She became interested in agriculture because her late grandmother, Bonnie Dotson, previously owned the family farm before her parents.

"I went to Sedalia (schools) during elementary school," Dotson said. "Then I went to Dresden and still didn't see a lot of farm people. Then I got to choose my high school. And that's why I went to Northwest because they have an FFA

program. And I wanted to be involved in that."

While in high school, Dotson was involved with the Pettis County R-V FFA, where she served as the chapter president last year, and in 2022-2023, she was the area eight parliamentarian.

Although she never showed livestock, she competed in contest teams with the Missouri State FFA, which went to statelevel competitions at MU.

"I've been to state three times," Dotson said. "My sophomore year for the Meats' Evaluation; my junior year for Food Science. My junior year for Food Science, we actually won our district contest. Then last year we went to state for Farm Management."

Once she obtains her degrees, she plans to become an accountant, but she is also interested in working for the government, possibly as a loan officer.

"I want to do something agrelated," Dotson said. "Like for the government, I want to work for the Department of Agriculture."

Dotson said her advice to other young people interested in agriculture is to "take all the chances you are offered."


"And even if it makes you uncomfortable, there's no room for growth unless you take a risk," Dotson said.



The Central Missouri Ag Club Banquet Pie and Cake Baking Auction was held Saturday, Jan. 25, at the Pork Place on the Missouri State Fairgrounds.

The auction raised a record amount, totaling \$43,100 for kids in agriculture.

Janice Klenke is the chairman of the long-running event.

"It started out as city folks and country folks getting together to appreciate agriculture," Klenke told the Democrat. "It's evolved since then to having a pie contest and raising money for kids for scholarships and 4H and FFA and all kinds of things."

Sponsors like Wood and Huston Bank, FCS Financial, MFA, BTC Bank, Central Bank and others pull together to support the event and the kids who will benefit from the funds raised.

"This community is rooted in agriculture," Central Bank of Sedalia Senior Vice President Erica Petersen said. "To have an event like this where we can give back to the community makes everything happen for us. One of the beauties of the agriculture community is everybody always gives back, and that's what keeps things going; teaching the next generation and being there to support each other."

A hearty dinner and some live music made the banquet a special celebration of the lasting bonds made in the AG community.

"We love being a part of this event, we've been so blessed to be here for several years now," Petersen said. "For the last few years, we've been the pie people; so, we get to walk around and showcase the pies during the auction. At the end of the day you get a really yummy pie, but you also get to support something that's so vital to our community."

A local grandmother and her granddaughter found approval from the judges for the pies they baked and ended up winning prizes, plaques and commendations.

"I won Grand Champion on my Peanut butter French-meringue pie," Sharon Bruner said. "I was having trouble this morning getting my crust, but other than that it's very simple. It just takes a little time."

Contestants had to bake two pies for Saturday's event, one to be sampled by the judges and one to be raffled off.

"I enjoy cooking to begin with, and it's for a very good cause for the kids. I've been

active with 4H for 32 years and I just like doing it," Bruner said. "My son was in 4-H and then I've got two granddaughters in 4=H now, my one granddaughter brought a pie tonight, too. It's in the Youth Division.

11-year-old Hadley Bruner from Warrensburg took the second-place prize for her Star-Spangled pie. Like her grandmother, Sharon, Hadley also had some initial trouble with the crust, but experience gained on projects through 4-H helped her work through problems to ultimate success.

"It was kind of difficult because the crust didn't turn out very well," Hadley admitted. "I do cake decorating, painting, arts and crafts, bacon, ham."

For Central Missouri farmers who are used to banding together to face the rigors of raising crops and livestock, the annual dinner is a chance to now help the next generation get a proper start.

"We do want to thank all our farmers," Danny Young, Central Mo Ag Club President told the gathering. "wW know that it's not an easy life, people don't realize that they're the ones that they sell everything wholesale and they buy retail. Sometimes that's hard way to make a living, but that's what they do. It's a big business now, you must treat it like a big business. It's a different world than it used to be, we recognize that, we're trying to promote that and help the next generation get into agriculture."


